

HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the Northwest Pro-vinces, excepting 8 and 20, not reserved, may be nomestcaded upon by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 100 acres, more or less.

HOARSTEAD DUTIES: A settler who has been granted an entry for a homestead is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans.

At least six mouths' residence upon administration of the land in each year during the term of three years.

(3) If the settler has his permanent-residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements of this Act as to residence must be at land.

APPLICATION FOR PATENT should be made at the end of three years, before the Local Agent, Sub-Agent or the Homestead inspector.

Before making application for patent the settler must give six months' notice in writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Otlawa, of his intention to do so.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST MINING REGULATIONS.

MINIOR REGULATIONS.

Coal: Coal lands may be purchased at \$10 per acre for soft coal and \$20 for anthractic. Not more than \$20 acres can be acquired by one individual or company. Royalty at the rate of ten cents per ton of \$2,000 pounds shall be collected on the gross output.

Quantum A free miner's certificate is granted upon payment in advance of \$7.50 per annum for an individual, and from \$50 to \$100 per annum for a company according to capital.

A free miner, having discovered mineral in place, may locate a claim 1,500x1,500 feet. The fee for recording a claim is \$5.

At least \$100 must be expended you the claim each year or paid to the mining recorder in fleet thereof. When \$600 has been expended or paid, the locator may, upon having a survey made, and upon complying the state of the control of the first particular to the first particular for the payment of a royalty of 2% per cent, on the sales. PLACER maining claims generally are 100 feet square; entry fee \$5, renewable vearly. A free miner may obtain two leases to deredge for gold of the miles encountry and the discretion of the Minister of the Interior. The lesses shall have a dredge in operation within one accountry and the date of the lesse for each five miles. Rental, \$10 per annum for each mile of river leased.
