1. The following item appeared in the Singapore Straits Times on 5 September 1952:

"There was excitement in two towns in the Federation today when people saw what they believed to be a flying saucer.

"Several hundreds of Seremban citizens rushed out of their homes, offices and shops to look at a strange object in the sky traveling from west to east. They described the object as a "flying saucer". That was shortly before noon.

"Several phone calls were made to the Straits Times office here reporting the phenomenon and asking what it was.

"Mr. R. Singam, a businessman said he saw a streak of smoke in an otherwise clear sky. It stayed in the sky for about 10 minutes before going eastwards.

"There was no plane, no drone or sound of any kind at the time he added.

"In Batu Pahat, reports our correspondent there, crowds gazed skywards at a white "plate" streaking westwards at great speed.

"It is the second time in the last few days that a strange object has been seen."

DETAILS:

1. Investigation opened at the direction of the District Commander, predicated upon receipt of information furnished by Mr. [redacted], [redacted], Albuquerque, New Mexico, regarding sighting an aerial object over Albuquerque, New Mexico, on 6 September 1952.

2. The following information was furnished by Mr. [redacted], [redacted], Albuquerque, New Mexico (paint salesman): [redacted] reported that he, his wife, and Mrs. [redacted], [redacted], had been sitting in the patio of the [redacted] home and at 2115 hours had sighted a round object about the size of a basketball, red in color with a long red tail, approach from a Southwesterly direction, pass overhead and disappear into the Northeast. No sound was emitted by object. The object seemed to be solid and pulsated or flickered. [redacted] advised that the object was very red, with a red tail and moved with a "jerky" motion. [redacted] did not estimate the speed of the object nor its altitude.
