# PRICES SOAR

Threatened Wheat Shortage Causes Bull Activity; May Reach \$1.50

Talk of \$1.50 wheat has been revived by the phenomenal strength shown by the grain market recently. Thomas Temple Hoyne, author of "Speculation" and other financial texts and expert on market movements, offers his analysis of the present situation and its promise for the farmer.

CHICAGO, June 19 .- Nature always delivers the goods for the farmer, and rature has added 12 to 13 cents to the price of wheat, 7 to 8 cents to corn, 1 to 3 cents to oats, and 7 to 8 cents to rye since Congress adjourned without doing anything for agricultural relief beyond threshing out vocally its schemes for legislating high prices into ex- Farmer-Labor Convention to istence.

At the opening of the grain markets today, prices of the grains were all markedly higher than they were a year ago at this Wheat was 13 to 15 cents higher, corn 3½ to 10 cents higher, oats 5 to 7½ cents higher, and rye 1 to 3 cents higher.

Hughes went into considerable detail in explaining his position that the Oriental exclusion provision in the new immigration bill was not much different than the regulations now in force between the two governments to shut out an influx of Orientals.

Must Enforce Law He explained, however, that it had been the desire of President City Council Orders Halt Coolidge as made known several times, to continue to regulate imdiplomatic migration through channels rather than by Congressional enactment, adding that the law, having been duly enacted, must be enforced.

Flat denial was made that the immigration law, as alleged by the Japanese government, violated any of the provisions of the com-mercial treaty of 1911 between the United States and Japan.

ENGINEERS WAR OVER BOULDER DAM

PASADENA, June 19 .- A hot battle over the Boulder canyon dam project on the Colorado river, rated as the greatest proposed hydro-electric power and irrigation development in the United States ,was precipitated here today at the convention of the American Society of Civil Engineers. Following the reading of a paper prepared by Colonel William Kelly, chief engineer of the Federal Power Commission, condemning the Boulder eanyon project and recommending power development of the Colorado river by private capital, A. 

### **GOVERNMENT RED TAPE**

The Congress or the Cabinet that takes steps to eliminate unnecessary detail in the administration of the government is one that will confer a lasting benefit upon the nation. It is to be expected that there should be system and efficiency of the highest order in the business of the government, but there is no reason for unnecessarily hampering and discommoding those for whom the government exists.

The announcement was made that a fund had been subscribed by charitably-inclined individuals for the dependents of the sailors who were killed in the accident aboard the U. S. S. Mississippi last week. This was to tide them over the emergency until government red tape could be unwound to allow them pensions or such other remuneration as they were entitled to. If the dependents of these men have any claim upon the government, and of course they have, why not allow them their due now before it is necessary for them to become objects of charity? It is disgraceful that the mothers and wives of these boys, who gave up their lives as they did, for the greatest and the wealthiest nation in the world, should have to accept alms.

The same thing is true in many cases of disabled veterans of the world war. A former soldier was asked why a certain comrade of his was receiving compensation from the government while he, who needed it worse, was not. He said, "Because he was persistent. He camped on the doorstep and insisted on what was due him. They wore me out with red tape and detail and I gave up in disgust."

Congress at the last session voted a twenty-five per cent reduction on income taxes the past year. This was passed before March 15 when income taxes were due, but in spite of the president's request that it be made immediately applicable Congress preferred to compel the people to pay the full amount of the tax and then provided for a refund later.

Common sense could eliminate a lot of unnecessary detail in all departments of the government.

### PROHIBITION A FAILURE?

Prohibition has been branded as a failure. Anyone who wants liquor can get it. Bootlegging has become a highly remunerative profession. There are those who have always been abstainers who would like to see the Volstead law repealed because they think it a failure and that it encourages law breaking. The statement that there is more drinking now than before Prohibition is absolutely ridiculous.

It is true that those who want liquor can get it. Some boys and girls in certain circles carry flasks. Their elders do it and they have learned to drink just as children of drinking parents have always learned to drink. But there is a very much larger class of American children growing up who do not have the opportunity and the temptation to drink that they would have had without prohibition. It is these boys, and girls, too, who are being benefited by prohibition. There will be fewer and fewer people drinking in each succeeding generation, and it will not be so many years before the man who makes, sells or buys liquor will be regarded as the law-breaker he is. Prohibition was a radical reform, just as the abolition of slavery was radical, and it could not be expected that it should be accomplished all at once.

As for the Volstead law encouraging law breaking; those who commit murder would not be law-breakers if there were no law against murder. Of course there is no law-breaking where there are no laws. The time will come when those who violate the Volstead law will be regarded in the same light as those who break other laws.

### Good Old Days, Then And Now

Life on the farm is very dif-ferent now than it was thirty or forty years ago. The farmer and his family and his hired help were so isolated then that it made farm life far from agreeable. Progress had been made with farm machinery and the farmer had the reaper and the binder and the steam thresher, but the tractor was undreamed of and all plowing and much of the other farm work had to be done laboriously with a team.

The farmer's wife had practi-cally no conveniences or aids to her work. The entire family rose before dawn and worked until after dark, from the time they began to break ground in the spring until after the corn was ll husked late in the fall. Then there was leisure to cut the year's supply of wood, do the butchering, mend the harness and do other necessary jobs.

Some of the family usually

made the trip to town once a week for supplies, driving a team, at some seasons of the year over almost impassable roads. But there was little that the farmer of that day had to buy aside from flour, sugar, coffee and such staples. He butchered his own cattle and hogs and cured his own meat and his wife used the surplus fat for making soap. Vegetables and fruit were raised and canned or dried on the farm. The house-wife made her own bread, pies and cakes, churned her own but-ter, and had her own chickens

Of course there were neighborhood social affairs and in the winter months the young people went to town occasionally, but, during the summer there was not much rest or recreation for the dwellers on the farm.

Consider the lot of the farmer today. He has every convenience in the way of improved machinery, his hours are the same as those of the city man except, perhaps, in emergencies. He goes about his work more intelligently for he knows more about the science of farming. Very often he, or his son, or his help have had university training in agriculture. At least they have the benefit of gov-ernment and university experiments in farming methods.

The farmer's wife often has the same conveniences in her home as her city sister. The family is connected with the outside world by telephone and the family car and good roads lessen the distance between the farm and the city If the family wish to remain home in the evening they have the phonograph or they hear concerts in far-off cities by means of the radio. Perhaps the son of the house or the hired man has jumped into his roadster and is often to town for a good time, and this is in the busy season as

well as in the winter months.

The farmer sells his stock on the hoof and buys his meat, he sells his cream and buys butter and cheese. He sometimes buys fruit and fuel.

The life of the farmer and his family and his help has entirely changed in the last three or four decades. The farmer should be the last to wish for the good old
