Terms. Prices named herein are subject to the following discounts: Five per cent. allowed, to be deducted when cash accompanies order. To customers of approved credit, accounts are payable 60 days from date of invoice, except where special prices and terms are arranged for. Grass, Grain, Clover and Bird Seed, Implements, Fertilizers and Insecticides are șubject to no discount whatever, but are strictly net cash.

Orders are filled promptly upon receipt or a reason given with acknowledgment of same.
Prices. As it is impossible to predict our exact demand, our prices are made subject to change without notice, and goods being unsold when order reaches us. We, however, carry very large stocks, and if orders reach us in good season, full satisfaction may always be expected.
C. O. D. orders can be sent only by express. Such orders should be accompanied by a remittance in part payment, to guarantee charges.

The success of a business enterprise is never more apparent than when the promoters of the same have to seek more commodious quarters at the expiration of each lease. The firm whose name is found at the head of this article was organized in 1897 by R. W. Clucas ani Arthur T. Boddington, with a store at 501 W. I3th Street. The business grew rapidly and in May, 1899, as larger quarters had then become an absolute necessity, a three years' lease was taken of the premises at 342 W . I4th Street, consisting of a large store and basement; and the business was transferred thereto. These premises have in turn, however, now proved inadequate to accommodate the continued increase in trade, and the firm has just secured 812 and 814 Greenwich Street, corner of Jane Street, where the floor space is $50 \times 100$ feet in dimensions.

One very convenient feature in the new store consists in having the shipping department quite separate from the store proper; a doorway on the Jane Street side provides ingress and egress for all goods, and the consequent bustle and noise incidental to a busy shipping department is isolated from the business end of the store, while yet on the same level.

Where, at the commencement of this firm's career, but one employee only was required in addition to the two principals, to-day a force of sixteen people is needed to handle the work. Mr. R. W. Clucas, as in the beginning, occupies the managerial chair, taking charge of the home trade, catalogues, etc.; while Mr. Arthur T. Boddington is on the road the most of the time, his reputation as an effective salesman being so well known throughout the country as to need no special mention here.

The Clucas \& Boddington Company are up-to-date in their business methods, as is to be noted by their tactful manner of placing their wares before the buying public. Not only do they advertise freely, but they follow this up by circularizing the trade monthly with a list of seasonable stock, and also issue two elaborate catalogues yearly, one in the Spring and the other in the Fall.

One of the special features of this house is their system of cold storage for bulbs; as many as 100,000 are put down at one time, and whatever the season of the year they are able to supply the bulbs of lilies. Their "three-leg" brand of Lilium Harrisii has made them famous and is believed to be as good to-day as it ever was.

They are the sole representatives of the French bulb syndicate, "Union Horticole," and, while on the subject of bulbs, we might say that 75 per cent. of their entire trade is done in bulbs alone. They are also the sole agents in the United States of Ed. Pynaert van Geert, the celebrated palm grower, of Ghent, Belgium, and handle a tremendous quantity of palm stock.

Cycas stems are also a special line; some twenty-five to thirty tons have passed through their hands this Spring. Palm seeds is another feature worthy of mention; of arecas alone 100,000 seeds have been received, with equally large quantities of cocos and kentias.

In conclusion, the fact that the business of the Clucas \& Boddington Company has more than doubled itself each succeeding year proves without a doubt that unbounded success is attending their energetic and well-directed efforts.

Can be Depended Upon Flowering before Christmas if planted in September.
With us, the retarding of Lilium Longiflorum in cold storage is no longer an experiment, but an unqualified success. No stronger proof of this fact is required than the increasing demand we receive.

GROW THEM COLD AT FIRST TO GET ROOT ACTION. This is the principal secret and the point to be watched most closely, and is where growers sometimes make a failure at any month of the year. We do not recommend planting during June and July (on account of the temperature only), some growers not having a proper location in which to start them.

## FERTILIZERS.

During the months of October and November the sheep are brought in from Dakota and Montana and collected in covered barns and fattened prior to killing. They are fed upon screenings from the grain elevators of the Northwest. The droppings are taken to a drying plant and exposed to a moist heat of 350 degrees, long enough to kill the germ of any seeds which they may contain, and afterward dried and passed through a $20-m e s h$ sieve, which insures a uniform product.

The articles in commerce trsually sold elsewhere is ordinarily dried by being exposed to the sun and air and allowed to ferment, by which process it loses most of its fertilizing qualities and ammonia. By the method used in preparing the manure we send out, the ammonia is retained, making it a much more valuable article.

The grain upon which the sheep are fed is rich in nitrogen, and therefore the product we sell has a larger value than what has heretofore been sold under the same name.
