Let a fence, however, he made of whatever materinit it may, it ought always to be well and properly built. Never try to build a fence liy ney slight of hand tricks, hocus, pocus, or black art. To conjure up a good and substantial fence out of a few pieces of rotten sticks, and oppose it as a barrier to breachy cattle, is a notahle undertaking, at which some persons have a mighty fine knack.-Such ingenuity deserves the reward of sitting down at the first table of the Berinicide's feast, in the eastern tale, and lanqueting with him and Shacabac on their insisible dainties. These patent conguratiom fences are excellent horn books to teach cattle the $a, b, c$, of unruliness, and the abs of jninping over, or shoven down, all opposition; like some of our more stardy politicians, when fully bent on carrying a point.-Some begin with a weak fence, perhaps three rails high. - When their cattle have lsarned to leap over or throw down this, they add another rail, and now and then a stake or a prop. Eyen all this the tractable animals soon learn to wake nothing of.

To promise is most courtly and fashionable : performance is a kind of will or tertament, which argues a great sickness in his judgement that makes it." dy, promises are a crop much cultivated in the kinowing fields of this every-vne-be-sharp world of ours, and they are as plenty as blackberries will be by and by, but though, like cempliments, they cost nothing, and are easily raised from the most unpromising soil of cool heads and colder hearts, yet they are a very unprofitable crop, seldom going for more than they are worth; the vender may plume himself on his knack at bargaining, when the vendee pockets his purchase, and smilingly trips away; but the imposee may often discover the article to be dannified, and, with a different show of conctenance, may happily turn it pon the imposer's hands: then will there the accusation, velitation, litigation; and the planter in these fields will find to his cost, that of raising manypromises there is no end, and that much fibbing is a weariness of the flesh.-The promising voice of the people is most Wofully misñoinered vox Dei!-Never depend too much on promises or ver. balisms, in the trausaction of husiness. Ink in suct cases is preferable to wind. If it is proposed to you to make a wordy agrcement, exclaim, as Napoleon was want frequently to do, "bak! "" words are wind, let us have it in black and white, according to the precise understanding of the thing, and "reduced to a demonstration," so as to elout effectually the harpy talons of the law; ocherwise, in a day or two hence, we may "have our doubts."
Attend to potatoes, peas, beans, cucumbers, corn, oate and barley. Set early cabbages, and don't forget turnips. Planting time is here : no spots on the sun-no cooling eclipses-and corn will do nicely-with goed hocing. Sook the seed in copperas water, for about forty-cight hours, putting an ounce or more to cvery quart of the seed soaked.

One way of protecting it agninst the assaults of these marauders, $i$, to soak it in water, then roll it in sulphur, and plant it immediately: sulphur is of itself a manure, but by no means so efficacious for maize as plaster: it should always, therefore, after heing sonked some hours, be rolled in plasier belore plaiting. - The effect of this application on the growing crop $i$, very great indeec..-Remember that the largest and best seed-potatoes will produce the largest and best crops. - Break off the most thrifty shoots of your seed-cabhage-stumps, and set these shoo:s out no you do plants; they will produce very early and large cobbiges : break them from the stumps, not cut them, as the broken fibrous pmrts will the more readily form roots. Don't plant your corn ton deep, for deep planting deprives it of much of the influence of the sun and atmosphere, and exposes is 10 a weight of cold earth that contains little vegetable food, and that becomes so baked by the sun as to keep the feeble plant from starting to the surface. Water young plants in the eveuing. Weed flax. Weed your gardens sboroughly.

Ju.y.-If you intend in thrive, 'tis now time that you were all alive; we hermitizing sure will do, when you've much business to go through; where corn and grass start full in view, and ask a brisk and jovial crew, to treat them as injustice due, you must not sit and ruminate beneath the sycamore, or prate about what you have seen or done, for haying now should he begun. Another evil is the quean's cuil, a disorider to which many of the fair aex are often subject. It generally arises from a too frequent twe of the snuff box, the pipe, the tobacco-box, the aqua pitce bottle, and the Waverley novels; and manifests itself in an wter aversion to cold water, ivory combs, soap-suds, close caps, cropped tresses, and short nails. The most probable mode of effecting a curc is, to substitute lavender for the snuff-hox, wormwood for the pipe, sweet lag for the tolnace box, spruce beer and dic: drink for the nqua-vilae, and the Bible for Waverley.
