

ECLIPSES IN THE YEAR 1827.

THERE will be four Eclipses in the Year 1827: Two o the Sun and two of the Moon, in the following order-

1st. The first will be of the Sun, on the evening of the 25th of April, at 10 hours 38 min. "s lat. 511 min. north; the Sun will be centrally eclipsed on the meridian at 11 hours 16 min. in long. 125 deg. east, and lat. 87 deg. 31 min. north.

2d. The second will be of the Moon, on the morning of the

11th of May, partial and visible as follows:

Beginning at 2 hours 23 minutes. Middle 3 hours 56 min. Ecliptic Opposition 8 4 hours 1 minute.

Moon sets 4 hours 55 minutes.

End of the Eclipse, 5 hours 29 minutes.

Digits Eclipsed, 11 five-sixth on the Moon's southern limb. or from the north side of the Earth's shadow.

3d. The third will be of the Sun on the 20th of Octoberthe conjunction will take place in the morning at 11 hours 23 minutes, in long. 6 signs 26 deg. 283 min.—Moon's lat. 483 min. south; the Sun will be centrally eclipsed on the meridian at 11 hours 57 min. A. M. in long. 65 deg. 14 min. west, and lat. 69 deg. 40 min. south.

4th. The fourth and last will be of the Moon on the morning and evening of the 3d November—the Opposition 8 will take place at 55 minutes in the afternoon, consequently invisible. This Eclipse will be visible to every part of Great-Britain and Europe; the obscuration will be about 101 digits from the

Moon's northern limb.

Venus will be Morning Star until the 7th of October, from that time Evening Star throughout the year.

One Ball close, for one square rigged vessel,

One Ball half hoisted, for two ditto, Two Balls close, for three ditto,

Two Balls separated, for four ditto, A pendant of any colour for five ditto,

A do. under a Ball, for six ditto,

A do. over a Ball half hoisted for seven ditto,

A do. under two Balls close, for eight ditto,

A do. between two Balls separate for nine, ditto. A flag of any colour, for ten or more ditto.

[The above are hoisted at the East or West yard arm, according to the quarter the vessels first appear in, with the addition of a Ball at the centre of the yard until the Rig of the vessels can be made out, when one or more of the following descriptive colours will be hoisted at the most head:]

An Union Jack for a Flag Ship, with or without a squadron.

Do. with a red pendant over, for a two decker. Do. with a blue pendant over, for a Frigate.

Do. with a white ditto ditto, for a small armed vessel.

A blue pendant, for a Merchant ship.

A red pendant, for a Merchant brig.

A white pendant, for a topsail schooner or sloop.

A flag blue and white horizontally, a neutral fleet.

A pendant white and blue, a neutral man of war.

A blue flag, a neutral merchant ship.

A flag, red, white and blue, an enemy's fleet.

A pendant, red, white and blue, an enemy's man of war.

A red flag, an enemy's merchant vestel.

An Union Jack, over Neutral or Enemy's signals, the vessel is detained, or a prize.

A white flag over any signal, vessel bears a flag of truce.

A red flag pierced white, for the Digby packet.

A ball at the mast-head, vessel is on shore, or in distress;— Should immediate aid be necessary, guns to be fired.

In thick weather, a gun will be fired at Partridge Island, in answer to each gun heard at sea.—When a vessel requires a pilot, her descriptive pendant. Il be shewn at a yard arm, instead of the ball.

FARMERS' CALENDAR,

From an AMERICAN ALMANACK, for the Year 1827.

JANUARY.—Sisters and Brethren of the Household of Agriculture, let me give you glad greeting, and wish joy to your homes, on the return of another New-Year. Peace, innocence, health, happiness, gratitude, he yours, during its progress. Abundant crops crown your labours. Contentment sweeten all your enjoyments. Charity spread wide your hands in succour to the Benevolence urge you to interpret the deeds and words of others us favourably as you can; forbidding you at all times, and in the most doubtful cases, to put the worst constructions on any one's conduct; and teaching you the forgiveness of injuries and enemies, as you yourselves would hope to be forgiven. Love expand your hearts to the embracement of the whole human family. And devotion lift them up, in awe, humility, and grateful adoration, to the Great Father of all, the Mightiest, the Wiscst, the Best, whose bounty, mercy, and love, shower plenty and joy throughout the universe.—His goodness may you experience in life, his mercy in death, and his boundless, universal love in that brighter and better world, where felicity will be as perfect as it will be endless.

The superstition of the ancients in regard to eclipses, was carried to an excess almost surpassing belief. Philosophical treatises were written to show against what regions the malevolent effects of any particular eclipse were simed; and the writers affirmed, that the effects of an eclipse of the sun, continued as many years as the eclipse lasted hours; and those of that of the moon as many months.—In 1133, on the 2d of Aug, there was a terrible

eclipse of the sun, during which the stars were seen—and the awful consequence was a schism in the church, three Popes at once, assuming each, to be the legitimate successor of Saint Peter. The great solar eclipse in 1800 made a most melancholy and haneful change in the seasons, if we may be lieve the fanciful family of the croakers.

Don't keep your cuttle constantly on salted fodder; they will tire of it.

Give your forward cows good hay and occasionally some potatoes.

Manch.-Every farmer should mind his p's and q's in these times, which try men's purses and prudence; he should neglect neither his vespers, nor his vigils, nor his matins; business should, at times and seasons all, he his primum mobile: his motto should be semper paratus; when his affairs demand instant attention, delay should not be permitted to obtrude his ungainly, burly bulk into his company; when his interest and duty both unite, and lie plain and straight before him, he should never say, as Peregrine Pickle, when over hazy, was wont to do-" I have my doubts"-though it was natural enough in Pere, for when Sir Richard, the skilful Sowler, had given him a fit of the ninepins, and he was tumbling and rolling about in all the dignity of dirt, he might well be troubled with doubts of his own identity. Yes; every farmer should possess as much decision of character as our American traveller Ledyard, who surprised the official person that asked him how soon he could be ready to set off for the interior of Africa, by replying promptly and firmly, "To-Morrow." Every farmer's wife, too, should cheerfully bear her share in the heat and burden of the day, and beautifully carry her yoke evenly with her yoke fellow. Neither gudding nor gossiping ought to lead her to forget the high duties of her calling. When the one or the other lures her astray, we would accost her, as Homer tells us Hector, the hero of Troy, did his wife Andromache- Go home, and mind your own business. Follow your spinning, and keep you maids to their work." Their Penny of observation should go to the purchase of experience. Every merchant should be a fair, yet cautious dealer. Every parson should have at least as anxious a solicitude for the flock as for the fleece. Every doctor should avoid making unconscionable bills, and holding our false hopes to patients who can never recover.

funcing materials are the cheepest and most plentiful, will be also the most tenerally used. But stone walls are unquestionably the best kinds of fence. Let a fence, however, he made of whatever materials it may, it ought always to be well and properly built. Never try to build a fence by any slight of hand tricks, hocus, pocus, or black art. To conjure up a good and substantial fence out of a few pieces of rotten sticks, and oppose it as a barrier to breachy cattle, is a notable undertaking, at which some persons have a mighty fine knack.—Such ingenuity deserves the reward of sitting down at the first table of the Bermicide's feast, in the eastern tale, and banqueting with him and Shacabac on their invisible dainties. These patent conguration fences are excellent horn books to teach cattle the a, b, c, of unruliness, and the abs of jninping over, or shoven down, all opposition; like some of our more sturdy politicians, when fully bent on caraying a point.—Some begin with a weak fence, perhaps three rails high. - When their cattle have learned to leap over or throw down this, they add another rail, and now and then a stake or a prop. Even all this the tractable animals soon learn to make nothing of.

MAY .- " Promising is the very air o'er the time : it opens the eyes of expectation: performance is ever the duller for his act; and, but in the plainer and simpler kind of people, the deed of saying is quite out of use. To promise is most courtly and fashionable: performance is a kind of will or testament, which argues a great sickness in his judgement that makes it." Ay, promises are a crop much cultivated in the knowing fields of this everyone-be-sharp world of ours, and they are as plenty as blackberries will be by and by, but though, like compliments, they cost nothing, and are easily raised from the most unpromising soil of cool heads and colder hearts, yet they are a very unprofitable crop, seldom going for more than they are worth; the vender may plume himself on his knack at bargaining, when the vender packets his purchase, and smilingly trips away; but the imposee may often discover the article to be damnified, and, with a different show of conctenance, may happily turn it upon the imposer's hands: then will there be accusation, velitation, litigation; and the planter in these fields will find to his cost, that of raising many promises there is no end, and that much fibbing is a weariness of the flesh.—The promising voice of the people is most wofully misnomered vox Dei!—Never depend too much on promises or verbalisms, in the transaction of business. Ink in such cases is preferable to wind. If it is proposed to you to make a wordy agreement, exclaim, as Napoleon was wont frequently to do, "bah!" words are wind, let us have it in black and white, according to the precise understanding of the thing, and "reduced to a demonstration," so as to clout effectually the harpy talons of the law; otherwise, in a day or two hence, we may ' have our doubts."

Attend to potatoes, pens, beans, cucumbers, corn, oats and barley. Set early cabbages, and don't forget turnips. Planting time is here: no spots on the sun—no cooling eclipses—and corn will do nicely—with good hooing. Soak the seed in copperas water, for about forty-eight hours, putting an ounce

or more to every quart of the seed soaked.

JUNE .- " A man may see how this world goes with no eyes. Look with thine cars: see how you justice rails upon you simple thief. Hark, in thine ear: change places; and handy dandy, which is the justice, which is the thief?....Thou hast seen a farmer's dog bark at a beggar? and the creature run from the cur? There thou might'st behold the great image of authority: a dog's obey'd in office.—The usurer hangs the cozener. Through tattered clothes small vices do appear; robes and furred gowns hide all. Plate sin with gold, and the strong lance of justice hurtless breaks: arm it in rags, a pigmy's straw doth pierce it. Get thee glass eyes if thou art blind, and seem to see things thou dost not, as many a scurvy politician oft will do."—If one method of treating seed corn, in order to its preservation from worms, birds, &c. be found not to succeed well, some other of the various modes ought to be tried. One way of protecting it against the assaults of these marauders, is, to soak it in water, then roll it in sulphur, and plant it immediately: sulphur is of itself a manure, but by no means so efficacious for maize as plaster: it should always, therefore, after being soaked some hours, be rolled in plaster before planting. The effect of this application on the growing crop is very great indeed.—Remember that the largest and best seed-potatoes will produce the largest and best'crops.—Break off the most thrifty shoots of your seed-cabbage-stumps, and set these shoots out as you do plants; they will produce very early and large cobbages: break them from the stumps, not cut them, as the broken fibrous parts will the more readily form roots. Don't plant your corn too deep, for deep planting deprives it of much of the influence of the sun and atmosphere, and exposes it to a weight of cold earth that contains little vegetable food, and that becomes so baked by the sun as to keep the feeble plant from starting to the surface. Water young plants in the evening. Weed flax. Weed your gardens theroughly.

July.—If you intend to thrive, 'tis now time that you were all alive; no hermitizing sure will do, when von've much business to go through; where corn and grass start full in view, and ask a brisk and jovial crew, to treat them as injustice due, you must not sit and ruminate beneath the sycamore, or prate about what you have seen or done, for having now should be begun. So, to it, boys, with sithe and rake, and let the best precedence take the lowders of the fragrant field, to whom the rest are bound to yield. Before the sun has risen, rise, and to your mowing hie, for thus they work it who are wise, and from their slumbers fly. It will be the best way in the cool of the day to husband your strength; and then, when at length the sun's scorching rays set you all in a blaze, you can relax from your toil, and repose you awhile, beneath the dark sycamore, which we told of before, till the heat shan diminish, when the day's work you may finish. But shun cold water's deadly chill, though thirst is urging you to swill, if you don't wish yourself to kill; and let not rum too freely flow, and set your gizzard in a glow, lest von become unskilled to mow, or get too hazy e'en to go.

All, then, should be in action, since they wish: for pleasure. To action, too, should all resort, if they wish for health, without which no pleasure can be enjoyed. Exercise is the true elixir of life, so long sought for in vain by the ancient alchemists, while sweating at midnight over their crucibles, and watching the birth of the grand arcanum. The Persian physician was well aware of this, who ordered a hollow battledoor to be made, in which he enclosed his medicines, and requested his king. on whom luxury and indolence had fastened a complication of disorders, to play daily with the instrument at shuttlecock.—Hear what the famous German doctor Siegfried Schroeder Schoenderbrohgendostruger, says to this very point, in the 999th page of the 222d fol. vol. of his immortal work, entitled, "Ich Den Eifrigen Lehrer Der Warheit Beit Der Froh Die Hand," or, Physic brought home to every one's business and bosom; the idea is no less grand than original.— Keep no more cats than will catch mice; if you do, my word for it, you will have a sickly house, overrun, not only with the mice aforesaid, but, what is much more to the purpose, with as many powders, and drops, and pills, and boluses, and nostrums, as if pomp itself had determined to listen to poor king Lear, and take physic in earnest. Gather corn-stalks. Get off the flax-seed. Put the cider-mill in order for making good Old Orchard, the true yanky whiskey. Gather the appled as they fall. Sow winter grain, if not done already. Don't let the pigs to digging your potatoes, nor the hens, hawks, and squirrels to shelling the corn, nor the cattle to picking the npples, as they are bad workmen, and apt to do the business in a slovenly way. Spread out flax to rot. Gather your white beans. Pull seed hemp, and secure it in your harns.

OCTOBER. - Many evils are in the world, and if they cannot be cured, they must be endured. The king's evil we have all heard of, it we have neither seen it, nor suffered it. Not in the least disconcerted at so strange a reception, he changed his tone, and said, 'I am come to condole with you upon the great misfortune that has befallen you :- yours is, indeed a desperate case: you are so completely deaf and blind as not to know your old friends!'-Sovereign remedies: For the gott, to and water; whooping cough, ipecacuanha; bile, exercise; corns, easy shoes; les vapeurs noirs, blue ruin; rhoumatism, new flannel and patience; tooth-ache, pluck it out; debt, oxalic acid; love, matrimony; scolding wife, smoking; closefistedness, plenty of aqua-vitæ. But we have done, or we shall enlighten the world as much as Dr. Radcliffe said he would do, who used to threaten some of his brethren of the faculty, that he would leave the whole mystery of physic behind him, written on half a sheet of paper. - Dig carrots, beets, turnips, parsning cabbages, &c. early in the month, if not done the last of October .bees under shelter. Carry celery into the cellar. Finish ploughing he ground gets too hard.

EMBER. - Innocent mirth, gayety, and recreation, are surely not criminal. Pastime and amusement, at suitable seasons, and not unduly extended, are proper, and even necessary; for youth. But don't, while engaged in your sleighrides, or seeking pleasure in any other mode, do not fly to strong liquors as a means of promoting cheerfulness. Do not let the Dalilah Rum lure you too often to her fiery embraces, and while she lulls you to sleep in her lap, shear close your locks of reason, depriving you of both bodily and mental strength; least, when you go helplessly from her dalliance, every stick, and stone, and straw on your path should prove a Philistine in the way. - FAREWELL.
