


Seeds, bulbs, and plants are now entitled to special express rates, which are considerably lower than on general merchandise. Substitutions and Adjustments. Late in the season some

stock may be exhausted so it is advisable, if you do not order early, to name substitutes, or instruct us to use our judgment in filling your order if, by chance, certain varieties which you desire should be sold We never substitute unless instructed to do so.

When a remittance is not sufficient to pay for the goods ordered, we will send the quantities for which the remittance pays.

With regard to errors, we take every possible precaution to avoid their occurrence. Notify us at once if your order is not properly filled and we will make the necessary adjustment.

BUY BULBS NOW FOR NEXT SPRING'S GARDEN PAGEANT

E SURE that your 1924 garden will have a goodly number of Dutch bulbs to brighten up the early spring days, for a garden without Tulips, Daffodils, Hyacinths, Crocuses, and the host of little bulbs like the Snowdrops and the Squills is really only half a garden.

About the time the snow is leaving, and sometimes before, the beautiful, white, pendent flowers of the Snowdrops appear, to be shortly followed by yellow- and purple-flowered Crocuses, the Glory

of the Snow, the Squills, and other small-flowered bulbous plants.

Late in March, and for the next two months, the dazzling yellows of the Narcissi or Daffodils dispel the final traces of winter's gloom, for spring has surely come. This year you should enlarge your eollection of Narcissi: Daffodils, Jonquils, etc.; next year and the year after you can add to it—but then your adding stops, for the Federal Horticultural Board has ruled that after 1925 no species of Narcissus may be

imported.

Late in April the bright reds and yellows of the Early Tulips unfold their glory, to be followed by the Late or May-flowering Tulips in equally brilliant yellows and red, dainty pinks and ehaste whites; and there are the Darwins, Breeders, Bybloems, Bizarres, and the Parrot Tulips with their fringed edges, all beautiful and all interesting. A wonderful array over which to enthuse. Why not make bulb culture your hobby? It's lots of fun, and as to expense, that is left to one's own judgment; it does not cost much.

There are no better plants for home decoration than the Tulips, the Hyacinths, and the Narcissi or Daffodils. Grow them in abundance, so you can give them to your friends. They will thrive equally well in the window garden, the coldframe, the hotbed, or forced in the greenhouse.

Plant the bulbs as soon as possible this fall in narrow beds along the walks, or beside the house walls, among the perennials, or in front of shrubbery where their glory will be enhanced by the dark



Exhibition Hyacinth bulbs are unsurpassed for growing in pots but are not suitable for outdoor work; they are too large to grow in Hyacinth glasses but may be flowered in any large vase, if this is preferred to pot culture. (First-Size Named Hyacinths are offered on the following two pages, where more complete descriptions are given of some of the varieties offered below in Exhibition Size.) Hyacinths in Glasses

Hyacinths should not be started in water before the end of October. The bulbs require a certain period of rest and, if started too early, they will not develop a satisfactory root-growth and, consequently, will produce an imperfect flower.

With proper attention, the Hyacinth will produce as fine a flower in water as in soil. For this purpose, use only the most perfect bulbs and, before placing them in the glasses, free the base of the bulb from dust, remnants of old decayed roots that may still adhere, and any other impurities. This will prevent contaminating the water. After thoroughly cleaning the interior of the glasses, fill them with pure, soft water. Rainwater cannot be recommended. The entire base of the bulb must be in contact with the surface of the water and remain so until the roots develop. Replenish the water as it evaporates or renew if it becomes offensive. Place them in a cool and dark location, letting them remain there until the roots nearly reach the bottom of the glasses. Should any of the roots after starting show decay, lift the bulb out of the glass and remove such roots. When bringing them to the light, place them where they are cool, as the flower will develop better and last longer.

Varieties Specially Adapted for Water Culture

These are the highest grade of First-Size Hyacinths of such varieties as have been proved by test to be the best adapted for growing in glasses. The bulbs are not so large as Exhibition Hyacinths, but are so selected for size and shape that they will fit well in the cup of the Hyacinth glass. For full descriptions, see list of the First-Size Named Hyacinths.

Single Named Varieties

These Are Equal to the Bulbs Some Houses Offer as "Exhibition" or "Mother Bulbs"

First-Size Hyacinth Bulbs are suitable for both indoor and outdoor culture, being used almost exclusively for growing in pots and pans, as they force easily and bear large, well-developed trusses. They produce the largest flowers outdoors also but, on account of their long stems and heavy spikes, should not be planted in windy or exposed situations. (See page 7 for ordinary bedding Hyacintbs.)

We are no longer listing the double varieties as they have little to recommend them but their novelty and seldom give satisfactory results. The single-flowering varieties force more readily and make far larger and finer trusses.

Culture in Pots, Bowls, or Boxes

Use porous soil thoroughly mixed with well-rotted manure and some sand, and provide for drainage. A single bulb will require a 5-inch pot. Allow same proportionate space when planting a number of bulbs in larger pots or window-boxes. Remove any sprouts there may be at the base of the bulbs. Plant the bulbs so that the top appears just above the surface of the soil, water thoroughly, and place in a cool, dark but airy situation until the roots are well established, then bring to the light.

Miniature or Dutch Roman Hyacinths

These are the 3-year-old bulbs of the Dutch Hyacinths, easily forced and largely grown for winter flowering. Can be forced in pots, pans, or grown in bowls and vases in Holland Fiber. They bloom later than the true French Roman Hyacinths but produce larger spikes. Five to six bulbs can be potted in a 6-inch pot. Treatment same as for Dutch Hyacinths.

French Roman Hyacinths

These are the true Roman Hyacinths, invaluable for early forcing. The flowers are much smaller than those produced by the Dutch Miniature Hyacinths but earlier and more graceful. The ease with which they can be grown in pebbles and water, like the Paper-White Narcissus, as well as in soil or fiber, and their long-lasting quality, make them especially desirable for forcing in the home, where they may be had in bloom from Thanksgiving until Easter. Allow plenty of time for them to establish roots before bringing them to the light.



Hyacinths for the Garden

CULTURE.—The soil must have good drainage and be dug to a depth of 12 inches. The beds should slope from the center outward for surface drainage. Well-rotted manure, dug in, will suffice for the wants of the bulbs and also for the usual bedding plants to follow in such surface drainage. Well-rotted manure, dug in, will suffice for the wants of the bulbs and also for the usual bedding plants to follow in such beds the next spring. Plant the bulbs 6 to 9 inches apart and to a depth, from the crown of the bulb, of about 5 inches in heavy soil and 7 inches in light soil. Protect the beds with 3 to 4 inches of leaves or light litter, gradually removing this in the spring. It is still better to cover with several inches of well-rotted and light manure, allowing this to remain on the beds in the spring, as this mulch keeps the beds moist and cool, and the blooming period is thereby considerably lengthened. The bulbs can be planted any time from the first of October until the ground freezes. They may even be planted later if precaution is taken, before too heavy frosts or snow, to cover the spots where the bulbs are to be planted with either litter or coarse manure. However, early planting is preferable, as the root-growth has time to develop, and the plants better to withstead the winter and also contributing to the production of large and more perfect flower prices. enabling the plants better to withstand the winter, and also contributing to the production of larger and more perfect flower-spikes.

Named Single Bedding Hyacinths, Extra Quality

We strongly recommend the use of Named Bedding Hyacinths for outdoor planting in preference to Unnamed Hyacinths under color. The latter are made up of many varieties in mixture, which are not uniform in height, color, or time of blooming. When Named Bedding Hyacinths are planted, uniformity in color, height of plant, and time of blooming are insured and at a cost not much in excess of Unnamed Bedding Hyacinths.

TULIPS

For gorgeous display as an early spring flower, the Tulips are, without question, supreme. They are so entirely hardy and easily cared for, and they flower so freely in city or country, in sun or shade, that their popularity never wanes but increases year by year. By proper for, and they flower so freely in city or country, in sun or shade, that their popularity never wanes but increases year by year. By proper selection of varieties, their flowers may be enjoyed from early April to June and they come in almost every conceivable hue, surpassing all other flowers in range and brilliancy of color. Those who know Tulips in their infinite beauty and variety do not wonder at the wild enthusiasm and speculation which raged in Holland during the first part of the seventeenth century, when single bulbs of new varieties sold for more than their weight in gold. For centuries before the "mania" in Holland, the Tulip had been cultivated and greatly prized by the Turks, who had even at that time developed many improved varieties from the native wild forms of Persia and Asia Minor.

There are several classes or types of Tulips, differing in height and season of bloom, range of color, and other characteristics. All are easy to grow and hardy outdoors, while most of them are also easily forced in pots or pans in the house. The Single Early Tulips are the first to bloom in the spring. In outdoor beds, the bulbs should be planted 5 to 6 inches apart and covered with 3 or 4 inches of soil. For house culture, plant four to six bulbs in a 6-inch pot and a proportionate number in the larger bulb-pans. Treat them in the same manner as Hyacinths and remember that a good growth of roots is essential before the plants are brought into the light.

In the following lists of Tulips we have indicated by figures after the names of varieties the average height in inches to which they grow. Varieties most suitable for forcing are indicated by a star (*).

The order of flowering is indicated by the letters A, B, C, and D. The difference in time of flowering is not great, so that those under the A class can be planted with those of the B class, and the B class with the C class, and so on.

Mammoth Breeder Tulips

The Breeder Tulips have been favorites in Holland for centuries, but it is only within recent years that they have become known

GIANT DARWIN TULIPS

Without question, the Darwins are today more popular among lovers of Tulips than any other class.

They are noted for their clear, bright colors, their tall, sturdy growth, and their large, beautifully formed, cup-shaped flowers. Although brilliant, their colors are not harsh and, consequently, the different varieties harmonize well when planted together or with other flowers.

In season they follow two to three weeks after the Early Tulips, and their blooming period overlaps that of the Late or Cottage Tulips. The colors range from the palest lilac through slate-blue, purple and maroon to almost black, and from blush-white through rose-pink and scarlet to crimson.

Some varieties of Darwin Tulips are suitable for forcing, but it is for outdoor beds and borders that they are best adapted, and there they reign supreme. If you have room for only one bed of Tulips, by all means plant Darwins.

We especially recommend deep planting, say, from 6 to 8 inches deep; varieties like Speciosums require at least 8 inches, with an ample amount of sand beneath the bulb to insure proper drainage. Cover the beds with leaves or litter during winter. Lilies thrive well in borders, formal gardens, or shrubbery, and usually flower at a time when the shrubbery has ceased blooming. The following varieties have proved to be sorts that may be planted in the fall or, with the exception of Lilium candidum, in the spring with excellent results. We often receive orders for Lilium candidum for spring delivery. They arrive from France in September, and must be planted by November 1.

Most Lily bulbs, being of late maturity, do not arrive in our country until October and November, which is conceded to be the best time to plant. Where the ground is liable to freeze before late Lilies arrive, it should

be mulched with leaves or manure.

Lilies marked with a star (*) will not be ready until the latter part of October or November

EASY TO GROW BULBS INDOORS

The steadily increasing demand for indoor flowering bulbs, with requests for information as to cultural methods, indicates clearly the greater appreciation of the potential pleasures and educational features that are to be derived easily and inexpensively, by both young and old, from this phase of gardening.

The obtainment of beautiful fragrant flowers from Christmas till the opening of the outdoor season, bringing with them a profusion of cheer from the preceding summer's sunshine, dispersing the dreariness of long winter days, is well worthy the performance of intricate and arduous tasks. Yet, all that is required is the following out of a few simple directions requiring no special skill, and the bulbs wanting nothing better than "usual home conditions."

The time of blooming for bulbs can be hastened or retarded at will, so that one can figure to a nicety just when the blooms will be at their best, providing one takes into consideration the fundamental fact that the embryonic flower is already developed and inherent within the perfect forcing bulb itself. All that is required next is to bring about the conditions that will properly stimulate these inherent qualifications into concerted action.

From its inherent stores the bulb will develop a root system, and

to this end will have to undergo necessary changes requiring, (1) darkness, (2) low temperature, (3) enough moisture, (4) four to lourteen weeks' time, depending on the kind of bulbs.

Once the bulbs are well rooted, all that is needed to bring them into bloom is the stimulation by light and warmth. This should be accomplished gradually, requiring a few days to two weeks from the time the bulbs have been taken from the dark and cold to being time the bulbs have been taken from the dark and cold to being brought into full sunlight and warmth, when they will nearly have completed leaf growth. For the attainment of finest and largest flowers an excess of heat should be avoided and an equable tempera-

ture of about 55° to 62° Fahr. is most desirable. Growing Bulbs in Soil; Receptacles.—All bulbs thrive and grow best in light, porous soil that can be prepared by mixing a good, rich, garden loam with about one-fifth its bulk of clean, sharp sand. Bulb pots known as azalea pots (see page 32) are designed especially for the larger sizes of bulbs such as Tulips and Hyacinths. Small bulbs, such as Crocuses and Freesias may be grown in low fern pots. It is a good practice to soak the pots in water for several hours previous to filling with either earth or fiber; particularly is this true in the case of pots used for

Hyacinths. Planting the Bulbs and Storing.—When ready to plant, place bits of broken crock over the hole in bottom of pot in such a way as to impede soil sifting and yet allow water drainage. Next, fill the pots to within 2½ inches from the top with slightly moist soil; on this layer of soil place the bulbs and fill with earth so that just the tips of the bulbs are left uncovered. The pots should then be put away in a cool place for rooting, which may be in a cellar, attic, in a trench dug for the purpose, or in a cold-frame or spent hotbed.

In any or all of these places, conditions of darkness and coolness must be obtained. If placed out- a doors in trenches that are & eventually filled with earth so as to cover about 6 inches over the pot, no further watering will be necessary until time of removal. Indoors, how-ever, the saucer in which the pots are placed should be filled with water every few days.

Blooming Period. Hyacinths, Single Early Tulips and Forcing Daf-fodils will be ready to bloom after ten weeks in the cold and dark Double Early Tulips, and other varieties of Narcissi, Darwins and late

Trench for storing potted bulbs outdoors varieties of Tulips and Crocuses will require twelve to fourteen weeks of rooting period,

while Freesias require only four to five weeks for rooting and will compromise with regard to darkness, semi-darkness or shade being sufficient. After the rooting period, the pots should be removed to a

place where the temperature and light conditions are a little heightened, and should then be thoroughly watered. The advancement to full sunlight should be gradual, and the best and longest lasting flowers will develop in uniform temperatures of 55° to 62° Fahr.

Fertilizer.—An excess of fertilizer is undesirable in bulb culture and should be avoided. Such pot plant fertilizer as Stim-U-planT, Bon Arbor, White Rosc Plant Food, and Bowker's, used according to container directions, will prove

beneficial. Growing Bulbs in Water .- Growing bulbs in water is the easiest method of indoor bulb growing and offers possibilities in French Roman Hyacinths, the Chinese Sacred Lilies, Nosegay and Paper-White Narcissi, the popularity of which has been well established

by their unfailing merits at a most welcome time. Directions for the culture of any bulbs not given elsewhere in this catalogue will be cheerfully furnished upon request by our Information Bureau Department.

Hedge Plants

Ready for delivery September 15 to October 15. Plant out as soon as received. Hedge plants should be set close together in a single row for best results. Set about 4 inches apart for a low hedge; 8 to 10 inches apart for a high hedge; and $1\frac{1}{2}$ to 2 feet apart for specimen bushes. Prune back top and roots before planting.

California Privet (Ligustrum ovalifolium)

This popular hedge plant thrives everywhere except in very dry or very shady spots. It is a rapid, vigorous grower requiring and benefiting by frequent trimming. The glossy dark green leaves remain on until midwinter and new leaves appear very early in the spring so that Privet is almost an evergreen. It can be pruned into any shape desired and may be kept as Iow as 12 inches or grown as high as 10 feet.

In very severe winters it will sometimes freeze down to the

ground, coming up again from the roots the following season. To guard against damage from heavy snows in winter, it is best to trim Privet hedges to a pointed or rounded top which will shed the snow and, incidentally, allow a greater amount of sunlight to reach the lower branches.

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Your Lawn—Some Practical Advice

The best two times to start a lawn or pasture are early spring and early autumn—the seasons of abundant moisture, warm days, and eool nights. Spring sowings should be made as soon as the ground ean be prepared to receive the seed, while fall sowings should be made during September.

Good Soil and Proper Drainage are absolutely necessary to produce a fine lawn. For best results, there should be no less than a foot of good surface soil—preferably a heavy loan. Where it is necessary to grade the surface, all subsoil should be removed and replaced with good earth. Unless the soil is sufficiently rieh, apply a liberal quantity of well-rotted manure and dig or plow it in, to thoroughly incorporate it with the soil. A heavy application of manure is particularly advisable on light or sandy soils where, otherwise, the grass is liable to burn out in hot, dry weather.

Prepare the Seed-Bed Thoroughly. Rake or harrow the surface fine and even. After sowing the seed, rake again lightly and firm the soil with a lawn roller. Do not attempt to dig, rake, or roll a lawn when the ground is wet. On Banks and Terraces, where the seed is liable to be washed off by rains before it has sprouted, a quiek eatch can be secured by mixing the seed with moist earth about one week before sowing; then, at the expiration of that time, when the seed (with the earth) is sown, much of it is ready

to sprout.

The First Cutting should not be made until the young grass is 3 to 4 inches high and even then it should not be cut too short as close cropping is injurious to a new lawn. Mow the lawn, thereafter, at intervals of about ten days and rake off the clippings. Grass sown during September will, under favorable conditions, grow sufficiently to necessitate one cutting before frost, in which case the clippings should be left on the lawn to serve as a mulch.

Frequent Rollings are beneficial after a lawn is once well established, especially in early spring after the winter frosts have

drawn up the roots of the grass.
