Shaw, Judge of the district of Dharwar, in appeal, No. 402 of 1861, amending on remand from the High Court the decree of the Moonsilf of Chickodee. It was argued before the High Court on the 24th June and 12th August 1868. Mr. White, with Rao Saheb V. N. Mandlik, for the special appellant, and Mr. Marriott, with Mr. Shantaram Narayen, for the special respondent. On the 6th April the Hon'ble Mr. Justice Tucker delivered the following judgment :--This action was brought in A. D. 1861 by the widow of Hammantrai Nimbalkar Sarlaskar Naik, as guar-tand of her infant son, to redeem an inam estate ex-tending over nineteen fields which appertain to the Naikship of Sholapoor in the talooka of Chickodee, Bel-gaum collectorate, on the ground that this estate had been mortgaged by the minor's father to the grandfather of the defendant No. 1, and to the fathers of the defend-ants Nos. 2 and 3 in Shaké 1762 (A. D. 1841), and that the mortgage debt had been fully liquidated. She con-sequently demanded to be put in possession of the inamdar's estate in the lands mentioned in the plaint, which was originally mortgaged, without further payment, and state that she possessed a deed, dated the 27th May 1855, exouted by the father of the defendant No 1, by which an arrangement was made as to the application of rents and profits to the discharge both of the interest and principal of the debt, and that if an account was taken according to this set-tement, the debt would be found to be entirely paid off. The defendants field separate written statements, in

off. The defendants filed separate written statements, in which they pleaded that the lands claimed by the plain-tiff had been conveyed to them by a deed of mortgage and conditional sale, which sale had, under the terms of and conditional sale, which sale had, under the terms of the agreement between mortgagor and mortgagoes, be-come absolute, and that consequently the plaintiff pos-sessed no equity of redemption that the alleged deed of 1855 was a forgery, and inadmissible in evidence, being unstamped, and that as the person, who executed this deed, was dead, the defect of want of stamp could not be corrected. The second and third defendants added that this document, if it had been genuine, would not have affected their rights, as they were not parties to it, and that the father of the defendant No. 1, who is alleged to have executed this deed, had no authority from them to make any change in the terms of the mortgage, and so what he did would not bind them.

bind them. At the first trial, the Moonsiff Azam Madhavra Krishna rejected the claim to redeem, as he held that the deed, dated the 27th of May 1855, refer-red to in the plaint, (original exhibit 4 and copy exhibit 6,) was invalid without a stamp, and not bind-

The plaintiff appealed to the District Judge, assert-ing that as, the lands in question appertained to a ser-vice watan, namely, the Naikship of Sholapoor, Hun-muntrao, the original mortgagor, had only an estate for life in the said lands, and could not, under Reg. XVL of 1827, section 20, and the interpretation of that section made by the late Court of Sudder Adawlut, alienate the lands or mortgage more than his life interest in them; that consequently the issues, which arose in the suit, had not been raised, and that the deeds, (ex-hibits Nos. 13 and 14) had been misconstrued, and the agreement No. 6 improperly rejected as it required no stamps. The District Judge, Mr. F. Lloyd, confirmed the

Lloyd, confirmed the Moonsiff's decree, he being of opinion that the agree-ment No. 6 did require a stamp; that the lands in dispute were inam and free from any condition of service, and that under the terms of exhibit No. 13, the respondents were entitled to retain absolute pos-session of them. The District Judge further held that it was not competent to the widow of deceased mortgagor to bring this action on behalf of her son, who was a minor. The plaintiff then made a special appeal to the High Court, urging among other things that the District Judge was in error in not decreeing that an account should be taken and redemption allowed, if the mortgage debt had been satisfied, and in hold-ing that the plaintiff, as guardian, was not competent to sue on behalf of her infant son. Beside the bed, with no dress on but a chemise, was a female who turned out to be a lady of rank and one of the leaders of the fashionable world in Paris. This lady was arrosted on suspicion of being a murderess, but her husband very shortly came to claim her, and the commissary of police being satisfied that the officer had committed suicide, she was set at liberty. The story goes that the commandant, who had carried on an intrigue with the lady for the last six months, had in that time completely ruined himself by ministering to her extravagance. It was remarked that on the shoulders of the lady were some recent scratches, and these, it appears, were occasioned in the attempt which she made to prevent Commandant Thevet from committing suicide. M. Thevet's son, a young man of 18, was at the races, and had arrived at the house, just as his father was about to expire. He was prevented from entering, and taken to the house of a military man, where the sad news was broken to him. The occurrence happaned on Sunday week. M. Thevet was buried Thursday last without the usual military honours being paid.—Express.

GENERAL GRANT INDISCREET.

Some further " developments," as the Americans say, in the history of corruption have come to light in New York and elsewhere. Ex-Governor Fenton, " a most York and elsewhere. Ex-Governor Fenton, "a most respectable man," as the *Tribune* would at any time vouch, is stated by several witnesses to have received 20,000 dollars for signing a bill "legalizing the acts of the directors in the famous Erio war." This evidence was given before a committee of the Albany Legisla-ture. But still more striking circumstances are stated affecting General Grant himself. They are told, not by an enemy, but by a Republican, in the columns of the *New York Nation*. He says that the Presi-dent nominated Mr. Stewart to an appointment "the day after he had presented General Grant with a cheque for 65,000 dollars. for a house given to him by a number of gentlemen, of whom Mr. Ste-wart was one." Another of his nominees, Mr. Boris subscribed for the purchase of a horse for General Grant in Philadelphia. "General Grant's avowed determina-tion," says the writer, "to bestow a number of valu-able offices upon his personal friends is not wise or just." He mentions one or two other instances. This is not corruption on the part of the President, but it is very remarkable indiscretion.—*Pall Mall Gazette*.

# SIR VINCENT EYRE ON RUSSIAN INFLUENCE IN THE EAST.

# MEN OF THE SECOND EMPIRE.

No. I.-." L'HOMME DU DEUX DECEMBRE." THE French had a very poor opinion of the President of the Republic until the morning of the 3rd December, 1851, when their ideas respecting him changed of a sudden. It occurred to them then that there might after all be something in this man whom they had held so very cheap before ; and their esteem for him rose considerably when it was found that his coup d'état had not been confined to the mere 'sweepof street with companies of soldiers, but that h had seized all the great men of the land in their night-shirts and had them put into prison. There is a story told of a certain Persian monarch who, being of an amiable disposition and desirous of winning the affection of his subjects, inaugurated his reign by acts of clemency. Singularly enough, however, the effects of his benevolence scarcely tallied with his expectations, for instead of hearing himself styled "the Light of the Universe," "the Pet Son of Allah," and other things in the same strain, he found that his lieges everywher spoke of him with flippancy, not to say with contempt, spoke of him with flippancy, not to say with contempt, and that his royal person was made the subject of much unseemly jesting. Whereupon, he called a friend into council and asked him for his opinion. "I think," said the friend, who was a man of parts, with notions of his own concerning government, "I think, perhaps, you have gone the wrong way to work ; suppose yoa try the opposite course." The monarch was distressed at this counsel, but he took it, and gave orders that a few of the principal citizens of Tcheran should be scourged that very morning. The result was eminently satisfactory. Theneforth the people show-ed a just appreciation of their kings. All they had wanted to be sure of was that he understood the duties of his office, and, once that point had been happily settled, they and he got on capitally together. Louis Philppe, however, made the mistake of believing that half-measures could sneeed with such a people as his. He did not know the French. Steady, peaceful, humane, a good man in private life, a Tory at heart, and a nobleman in thought and instinct, he was just the sort of King that would have suited the Eng-lish. There were a great many of the qualities in him which served to make Palmerstone so popular amongsi us. He was stately, affable, and sceptically humour-ous; but having English manners and English tastes and having, moreover, allowed his political opinions to mould themselves upon English institutions, he was much too apt to guage his countrymen and ours by the same measure, and to think they could both be govern-ed in the same way. Whilst he was on the throne of France he would never read French papers; he thought them shallow and firviolous. What he knew of the state of his kingdom and of Europe he gathered from the *Times* and the *Morn-ing Chronicle*; which his seitser, Midme. Adelaide read to him every evening.
