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HYACINTHS

The Hyacinth is one of the most beautiful, as well as the most fragrant winter and early spring flowering hardy bulbs. For house culture in the winter there is nothing in cultivation more beautiful, and for the garden in early spring they deservedly stand foremost in the list of all spring flowering bulbs. They are also adapted for growing in water in the house.

INDOOR CULTURE—Plant the bulbs from September to December, in rich sandy loam, using one bulb for a 5-inch pot, four in a 6-inch pan, six in a 7-inch pan, or they may be planted in a flat or window-box. Have the soil loose and good drainage. Insert the bulbs so that the top or crown is just visible. Water thoroughly and then set the pots, pans or boxes away in a cool, dark but dry place for several weeks. Keeping them in the dark will allow the roots to grow, so give them plenty of time for rooting. Plants can be gradually brought to the light, when top growth will commence, and water regularly and plentifully. Plants should be kept in a sunny window, removing them from window on a severe cold night.

OUTDOOR CULTURE-Plant bulbs any time from October until the ground is frozen solid. Set the bulbs so that their tops are three or four inches below the surface and six to ten inches apart, in any good, well drained garden soil. A slight covering with straw, leaves or manure is advisable to protect the bulbs during the winter. Do not cover until the ground is slightly frozen and before very severe weather comes. Remove the covering in early spring, when severe freezing is over and growth commences

GLASS CULTURE—Dark-colored glasses are best. Fill glasses with water, until the base of each bulb rests on the water, and set away in the dark as directed above for pot culture. As fast as the water in the glasses evaporates, fill them up and if the water becomes impure, change it, cleansing the roots well. A small piece of charcoal in the glass will keep the water pure for a long time. When there is a good growth of roots, bring the glass to the light and keep in a cool room near a window, but not in a close, warm room or near a fire-place. Keep the glasses sufficiently filled with water.





Tulips will thrive in any soil and are easily cultivated, alike in the house or in the garden. They are unquestionably the most showy of spring flowers and are justly celebrated for their brilliant decorative qualities. Planted in masses large or small, they produce a brilliancy in effect surpassing any other flower. OUTDOOR CULTURE—Plant builds outdoors the end of October or beginning of November, setting bulks 3 to 4 inches deep and 4 to 6 inches apart. Give protection with a covering of leaves or coarse manure, removing same early in the spring. 

This class of bulbs is indispensable for winter use and early spring flowering. They are perfectly hardy (except Polyanthus), growing and doing well in almost any position, whether in sun or shade, moist or dry. For best effects they should be planted in clumps in the hardy borders, amongst the grass, under trees, etc. For blooming in the house during the winter, all varieties are well adapted, filling the room with their rich fragrance. They are very desirable as cut flowers and will remain perfect in water for days after being cut.

INDOOR CULTURE—Pot bulbs as soon as received in good turfy loam. Set pots in a cool, dark room and keep slightly moist for one or two months so they may root; then remove to the window for flowering.

OUTDOOR CULTURE—In planting bulbs you must be guided by the size to determine the depth and distance apart to plant them. Allow 4 to 5 inches between small bulbs and 6 to 8 inches between large ones. The bulbs will soon fill the space and form a compact mass. Plant bulbs from 3 to 5 inches deep, according to size.

Narcissus Poeticus

Pheasant's Eye or Poet's Narcissus

The well known old-fashioned favorite with white flowers, the cups margined with a distinct rim of scarlet, of exquisite fragrance and borne on long stems. 



The cooler the room, provided there is no frost, the better the Lilies will thrive. To be attractive, the dish should contain three to six bulbs.
