Designed and planted by Edward Jones, gardener, who writes us as follows: "Enclosed you will find photo of tulip bed, which did remarkably well this season. A remarkable feature of this bed was, in spite of an elevation of three feet at centre, the design came out perfect all over. The bed was 30 feet across, and the design, a star of five points, coming down to within one and one-half feet of edge of bed. 2,10o bulbs of Yellow Prince Tulips were planted five inches apart, and a delightful fragrance from that variety filled the air for thirty feet. Between points of star, right down to edging, forming a perfect ground I had planted 2,500 Vermilion Brilliant Tulips, four inches apart, which color was very intense. The edging was made of 400 LA Reine Tulips, planted six inches apart, of double row, very close together".

## HYACINTHS.

Directions for planting in the open ground.-October and November is the proper time, but they can be set out at any time, as long as the ground is open and the bulbs remalu sound. The best compost for their culture is the following: one-third river or sea sand, one-third well-rotted cow manure, and one-third good garden mould; or, where the soil is naturally light, well-rotted cow manure liberally intermixed is all-sufficient. The beds composed of the above compost should be well dug to a depth of fourteen inches, and aised from two to four inches above the level of the walks. The bulbs should be planted evenly about six inches deep (to the bottom of the bulbs) and from tive to six inches apart ; if planted at uneven depths they will not bloom at the same time, but irregularly. Care must be taken not to press the earth too firmly around and over the bulbs some successful gardeners follow the plan of setting each bulb in a handful of clean sand, which insures drainage. atter planting rake the bed smooth, and after the ground has frozen tolerably nard in early winter cover with dry litter, leaves or coarse manure. If this covering be applied before freezing weather. it renders the bulbs liable to the predations of field-mice.

For culture in pots.-Prepare the above compost, adding, if possible a quantity of leaf mould. The most favorable time for planting is September, October and November. The size of the pot dependson the number of bulbs planted in a single one; three bulbs in a pot of say six inches in diameter have a rich massive effect; one or two bulbs in each may be planted in proportionalely smaller pots-two bulbs in each are very effective. In potting, each bulb should remain one-half above the surface of the soil; when thus ilanted, water them well, to imbed the bulbs firmly in the soil, allowing them to remain in this condition one or two dajs; then bury the pots in the open ground to the depth of six inches for eight weeks, in which condition the preparatory root growth necessary to a vigorous development of their flower scapes is made. After this period take up the pots and remove them to a room not heated, but not socold as to freeze. Being exposed to the light for the first time, they are, of course, very delicate. Care should therefore be exercised not to place them in the direct rays of the sun for two or three days. When about ready to flower bring them to the ordinary living-ioom, where the warmth will soon cause them to bloom. By so bringing them out, a few at a time, you can secure a beautiful succession of flowers all winter. They will need occasional watering until they begin to grow, when they should have an abundance of air in mild weather, and plenty of water.
(hase a shelf in the dark part of the cellar, change the water every ten days or tho woeks. keep them in the dark, cool place from six to eight weeks, then remove them to the light (not too strong). If then kept in a cool room they will produce very fine spikes and remain in bloom a long time.

Everybody should have one of these effective beds at this small cost. Eight feet in diameter or twenty-four feet in circumference, requires 250 bulbs, planted five inches apart. I25 Chrysolora, rich yellow, and I25 belle Alliance or Verboom, brilliant scarlet-these are planted as per above illustration. Price for the 250 bulbs, $\$ 3.50$.

## TULIPS LIRLV SINGLE TULIPS

NOTHING is more beautiful than a bed of tulips in the spring. They are the showiest flower in bloom at that time of the year. They should be planted in beds of any design, made of a good portion of loam and manure mixed well with the soil ; the distance apart should be about four inches. The bulbs must be planted about four inches deep. A covering of long manure or straw for over winter is very beneficial for the bed. Tulips are also excellent for growing in the house ; four or five bulbs to six or seven inch pots, or they can be forced in the greenhouse with good results.
