
Dear Sir:

On my return, I find your esteemed letter of Dec. 10th, wherein you report short weight in certain cases. I presume this all occurred, as explained to you when at the Mint; that is, when our scales were out of order. We have now had them adjusted, and I do not look for any shortage in the future. Still, we think the suggestion you make, of our sending you 50 lbs each of nickel and bronze blanks to be used in making up shortages if any occur, is a good one; and I will have sent to you by express today or Monday, 50 lbs of blanks, ^{each} as they are now coming through our presses. I cannot tell at this moment, whether these will be light or heavy weights, or the regular standard weight. I presume, however, this will make no difference for the purpose for which the blanks are wanted.

I now expect to be in Philadelphia again during the coming week, and shall take great pleasure in calling again at the Mint, when we can discuss this matter further if we find it is necessary.
