





#### Drivers Too Speedy, Asserts Judge Lowe

Nobody is safe on the streets nd highways now-a-days- according to Judge F. H. Lowe who considers the speed mania dangerous

About fifty traffic cases are on the docket for trial Friday morning already. Most of the offenses occurred over the holiday. "Just look at the rate of speed these drivers were going," remarked Judge Lowe. "Listen to this: Forty-one miles, forty-one forty, forty-one, forty-five, fortyone, forty, forty-one, thirty-five, thirty-seven, forty, thirty-eight, forty, thirty-eight. That's just a sample!

'These arrests were all made within the city limits where the speed limit is from twenty to thirty miles an hour. them were arrested in the most dangerous places. Some of them were stopped of that narrow strip of Verdugo road; some were halted on Brand boulevard and others

on Broadway." The speed gauges established set by local traffic oficers is considered absolutely accurate by Judge Lowe. He called attention to the fact that some of the traps recently were tested by himself and members of the city council. It was found that speeds gauged at forty miles an hour really proved to be nearer forty-three by the speedometer.
