GAS FURNACE **EXPLOSION**

Blast at Colorado School **Building Due to Pilot** Failing to Close

W. H. Reeves, city manager; C. Vandewater, municipal building superintendent, and Delos J. Jones, city plumbing in-spector, this morning investigated the explosion of a gas furnace in the Colorado street school, at the corner of Colorado and Louise

The explosion, which occurred during school hours yesterday afternoon, fortunately was of a minor character, and no one was injured, although pupils and teachers were frightened.

The investigation showed that the furnace, situated in the basement, is regulated from the first floor. It was turned off shortly before noon, but the pilot did not close entirely and sufficient gas escaped to collect in the top of

Blast Breaks Casing
When Henry Kirkby, the janitor, attempted to light the fire again during the afternoon, the gas in the top of the furnace extended the statement of the furnace extended the statement of the furnace extended the statement of ploded, breaking the casing and allowing the top to drop over the side of the furnace. Had Mr. Kirkby been standing directly in front of the furnace instead of one side he undoubtedly would have been seriously injured.

The escaping gas was laid to the misplaced pilot. Officials or the school board this morning took steps to have the furnace and pilot repaired. Three hundred pupils were in school at the time of the explosion, but perfect order was maintained. The building was not damaged in any way.

Freshmen Will Not Enter New Educational Plant, **Decision Reached**

In response to a demand created by the unprecedented increase in the number of oupils attending the Glendale Union High school, the board of trustees last night decided to foster the idea of a Junior High school for Glendale.

Despite the recognition of the advisability of establishing such an institution, the board has never been in a position heretofore to take up the idea, it is stated, and the removal of the tenth, eleventh and twelfth grades to the new building on East Broadway will give the room necessary for the establishment of a Junior High school in the old high school building on Harvard street.

The ninth grade, or freshmen will not be moved, along with the three upper classes, to East Broadway, but will remain in the old high school building. The seventh and eighth grades of the intermediate schools, which, with the ninth year class, constitute a junior high school, will not be moved from their present classrooms, at least until the opening of the new school year in Septem-



State's Highway Program Sees 428 Miles of Roads Completed and Accepted

By HARVEY M. TOY

Chairman, California Highway Commission
Despite the handicaps under which the present California Highway Commission and its engineering forces have been working during the past year, 1923 has been one of the biggest ears, to date, in the history of road building in California.

Highways completed and acsted during the year, aggregate 28 miles, of which 142 miles ere grading and surfacing, and 9 miles reconstructed pavements. Contracts are in force at the present time and bids are in the office for 346 additional miles. of which 296 are grading and suracing, and 57 reconstruction of

avements or grade. Expenditures for the eached \$15,542,928.26 on De-ember 15, 1923. Of this sum, approximately \$12,000,000 bond inds spent for new construction and \$3 500,000 was motor vehicle eccipts expended for mainteance and improvements.

Federal aid collected during year amounted to \$3,011,-

The amount expended on mainenance during 1923 is the larg-est annual expenditure for this yet made by the State Highvay Department, and is evidence the commission's determinaion to build up a thorough-going naintenance department in all ections of the state. In this we have the hearty co-operation of he state highway engineer.

Forty-five parcels of land for naintenance stations and repair gasoline tax is now turned over have been acquired hroughout the state after careful study of the locations. They repsent an aggregate present value of \$328,000. Three new divisions have been created during the year o facilitate the work.

It is the opinion of the writer hat never before have California ighways been maintained as well during 1923. The building up of this department has only just egun, but we are determined that the future, it shall be a big feature of the highway work.

The present commission came into office in January, a year ago.
