

# PLANT IN THE FALL

### HYACINTHS

Culture. Hyacinth bulbs do best in a rich, light, sandy loam with proper drainage. We advise against the use of fresh manure. November and December are our most successful planting months. For outdoor planting, set bulbs 6 to 8 inches apart each way. Cover with 4 inches of soil. Hyacinths are also fine for growing indoors during the winter in pots or pans or in special glasses filled with water.
