FURTHER FIRES BAVE OCCURRED IN VALPARAISO

Shortage of Food at Santiago and Famine May Result If More Re-

(Associated Press.)

London, Aug. 22.—A cable dispatch filed late last night by the agent at Valparaiso, of Huth & Co. says that slight shocks continue, and that further large fires have produced there. Gloomy Outlook.

Santiago de Chile, Aug. 21.—No real-y definite news has yet been received ere from Valparaiso except the gov-rnor's official report to the president, outlining the situation and adding that he earnestly requests reinforcements of troops, which to-day were sent to him troops, which to-day were sent to him by forced marches. The governor says that the only flumination of Valpara-iso is that furnished by burning build-ings. There is a terrible scarcity of drinking water, and difficulty is experienced in burying the dead, adding

to the panic prevailing.

Centenary of His Discovering the Great River Occurs Two Years From

It was, as far as can be gathered or was discovered. Certain it is that on July 2nd he sighted the se and, for the first time, found the river he had been following from May 22nd was not the Columbia. Such an event should not go unhonored in the Royal City. From the wealth derived from the Fraser and the product of its forests New Westminster has been largely built up and some suitable celebration should mark the centenary of Simon Fraser's first landing where the city

now stands.

Such a centenary is an epoch in the history of the province and New West-minster is the proper place to mark the occurrence. The cricketers from the Royal City, some of its most enthus-iastic supporters, are now in Victoria and for that reason the suggestion is thrown out at the present time.

On its banks from Suma to the sea, are located some of th to the sea, are located some of the most flourishing municipalities to be found in British Columbia. Chilliwack would certainly pay a tribute to the memory of Simon Fraser, for in that district some of his lineal descendants still reside. NEW TRAIN TO CONNECT WITH EMPRESS LINERS

Large Portion of Business Section of Ontario Town Wiped Out by Fire.

Montreal, Aug. 21.—The Canadian Pacific authorities announced to-day that, beginning with the arrival of the steamship Eempress of Britain at Quebec on August 31st a new transcontinental train will be put on. The new train will be made up entirely of sleepers and will run from the wharf at Quebec to the wharf at Vancouver. Quebec to the wharf at Vancouver where close connection will be made with the Empresses sailing for the Orient every three weeks. With the new service it will be possible for passengers to leave London every three weeks and reach Hongkong in thirty days travelling at the control of th weeks and reach Hongkong in thirty days, travelling all the way from Liverpool on C. P. R. ships or train and making the journey with only two changes, in five days better time than is possible by any other route. The new train will make the run between Quebec and Vancouver in 33 hours. The equipment will be the best that the road possesses. The new service is the sesses. The new service is the result of an arrangement made to carry British mails, and it is expected that it will result in securing a very large proportion of British travel to the East for the C. P. R. route. Similar arrange-ments will be made for mails and through passengers eastbound.




