ARRANGEMENTS MADE TO CREATE COUNCIL

Presbyterian General Assembly Asks Synods Throughout Canada to Elect Representatives; Resolution Passed on Question of Prohibition.

Port Arthur, Ont., June 13.—The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada this foreneon completed arrange ments for the appointment of the 150 commissioners who will represent the Presbyterian Church at the first meeting of the General Conneil, which will be the supreme body of the United Church of Canada. The list of 150 will be made up of the Moderator and the two Clerks of Assembly, ex-officio, and the forty-two members of the Union Committee, the rest to be elected as follows: The Synod of the Maritime Provinces, 16 and 5 alternates; Montreal, 15 and 5 alternates; Toronto and Kingston, 20 and 6 9 and 4 alternates; Saskatchewan, 9 and 4 alternates; Alberta, 8 alternates; Hamilton and London, 20 and 6 alternates; Manitoba, and 4 alternates; British Columbia, 8 and 4 alternates.

UNITED CHURCH

WILL HAVE LARGE

Toronto, June 13.—The organic union of the Presbyterian, Methodist and Congregational churches under the plans in the proposal adopted by the Presbyterian General Assembly will create a very powerful ecclesiastical organization from a numerical standpoint. The census of 1921 gives the number of persons belonging to the churches which will come under the union-plan as follows: Methodists, 1,158,744; Presbyterians, 1,408,812; Congregationalists, 30.—574; total, 2,598,130. or 29.55 percent of the people of Canada. Allowance must be made, of course, for the possibility of dissentients breaking away and forming another church.

The leading Christian denominations outside of the union are: Roman Catholics, 3,835,662; Anglicans, 1,407,559; Baptists, 421,739; Lutherans, 257,484, and adherents of the Greek Church, 155,822.

CHINESE MILITARISTS FORCE PRESIDENT LI TO GIVE UP OFFICE

Peking, June 13.-President Li Yuan Hung, with a hostile army of his countrymen at the gates of his capital ready to enter if he should refuse to vacate his office, yielded to the pressure of the militarists to-day and left for Tientsin at 1.30 p.m. on a special train.

An hour earlier General Feng Yu Hsiang, Military Inspector of the metropolitan area, had issued a final warning that he would invade Peking unless the President left.

President Li made a spectacular dash from his residence to the station in a motor car, followed by cars containing his personal guards. The train, already under steam, having been prepared for such an eventuality, pulled out immediately. The Vice-Minister of War and a few faithful adherents waved goodbye to the President.

The city was quiet this afternoon. The flight of Li Yuan Hung left the Peking Government not only without a President but without a Cabinet. The Cabinet of Premier Chang Shao Tseng resigned June 6, ostensibly because of a disagreement with the President over the appointment of petty officials, but actually it was said, because of the financial impasse and the other difficulties faced by the Chinese Government.





Manson Motor Signals for B.C. To Reduce Traffic Accidents

Standardised motor car turning and stopping signals were announced today by Attorney-General Manson.

They are the international signals, and are to be put into effect immediately. Penalties are provided for failure to carry out these signal rules. "I appeal to all motorists to make use of these signals at all times, so use of these signals at all times, so as to give a warning to both pedestrians and approaching motorists and assist in the prevention of accidents." Mr. Manson said in making the announcement.

The regulations have been framed under the Motor Vehicles Act by the Attorney-General after consultation with the automobile clubs of Victoria and Vancouver, and after gathering infosmation as to regulations, in use in other parts of the continent. The regulations are part of the proposed uniform wehicle law adopted at Cleveland by the executive committee of the International Traffic Officers' Association, and are practically uniform throughout Canada and United States. The signals for turning to the left and to the right are uniform

sociation, and are practically uniform throughout Canada and United States. The signals for turning to the left and to the right are uniform throughout the Pacific Coast; signal for slowing up or stopping is uniform, except in Oragon, where the hand is waved up and down.

The Atorney-General's new motor regulations are:

"(1) Before turning, stopping or changing the course on the highway of any vehicle, and before turning such vehicle when starting the same, it shall be the duty of the operator thereof to first ascertain whether there is sufficient space for such movement to be made in safety, and in the operation of other vehicles may reasonably be affected by such turning, stopping or changing of course, the operator shall give a signal plainly visible to the operators of other vehicles, of his intention to turn, stopor change his course. Such signal shall be given either by the use of the hand and arm or by the use of an approved mechanical or electrical device.


