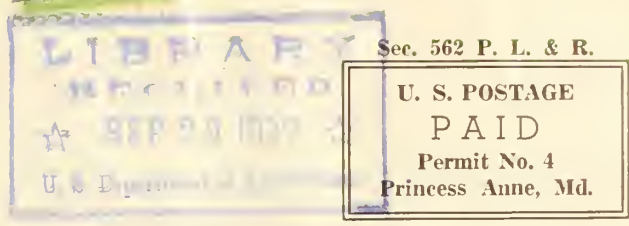

ADVANTAGES OF FALL PLANTING

Our years of experience in the nursery and orchard business has taught us that everyone should practice fall planting, whenever it is possible to do so, providing climatic conditions throughout the winter are not too severe, and also providing they can obtain well matured nursery stock. We especially recommend the planting of fruit trees and small berry plants, with exception of Strawberry plants, in most locations, but in case of doubt write us and we will advise if it is practical for your particular territory.

The advantages of planting in the fall are; that the grower can get freshly dug stock which never goes through storage, and when planted from nursery row to orchard, the roots will quickly heal where cut when dug. Also winter rains will firmly set the dirt about the roots and the tree is ready to start with the first sap movement in spring. Again by fall planting the grower has time to give more attention to this work and better results will be obtained by the extra attention to the planting.

By fall planting, we mean anytime that the ground is not frozen or the air temperatures not below 40 degrees during the fall and early winter months. Should a cold snap come while planting, wait until it warms up and go ahead, but be sure to mound a cone of earth around the tree about 12" high to afford support, drainage and protection from winter winds. Note here, however, that we do not recommend planting to be made on land which has a tendency to leave from frost, unless the tree is treated as above, and in the case of plants, that they be heavily mulched. In all cases do not trim or cut back the tree until spring.

Again be sure the nursery stock is well matured, and if you deal with a responsible nurseryman, he will not ship until the stock is right. Should you desire fall planting we will do our part to give you the right kind of stock. Let your order come forward so we can prepare to ship at the right time.

DELIVERY SERVICE

Our policy of giving free delivery on all orders of \$50.00 or more to distances of within five hundred miles of our nursery will be continued this year in spite of the fact that freight rates have been advanced. Where orders are large enough to justify it, our trucks will deliver direct to your farms. This means less than forty-eight hour service on your stock from the time it is dug until it is delivered, ready to plant. Special freight allowances will be made on large orders received from a distance of more than five hundred miles from our nursery.

— — G E — — Which will you plant—Yearling Peach Tree or June Bud Peach Tree.

We are going to present a few facts about the growing of peach trees by these two methods and let you be the judge as to which type of tree you should select for planting.

1. Yearling peach, or dormant bud peach as they are sometimes called, are produced by planting the peach seed in the fall, allowing the seedling to grow during the following summer, the tree then being budded in August, as a rule. This bud remains dormant until the following spring when the seedling top is removed and the bud allowed to grow, giving the bud a full summer to make its growth and maturity. In the yearling tree you have a root growth of two years and a top growth of one year.

2. June budded peach are produced by planting the seed in the fall, budding these seedlings early the following summer in May or early June. At the time of budding, the seedling is cut or broken in the top, and as soon as the bud starts, the seedling is further broken down, and in a short time the entire top of the seedling is removed. As the bud starts its growth the branches are suckered out to a certain height. This is done principally to force the tree to a greater height. Under favorable conditions June budded trees grow very rapidly and in most cases are dug and sold to the planters the same year, thus giving him only a one year root and a one year top to the tree.

It has also been found that yearling peach trees have proved more disease resistant to many of the common diseases of the peach tree. The yearling peach tree has a harder wood and a harder root system in which to store an abundance of vitality and natural stamina for resisting diseases, which the young and more tender wood of the June budded trees does not have, due to its very short growing life.

The "ERLY-RED-FRE" originated as a chance seedling in the orchard of Wm. Perry near Chase City, Va. Apparently the "ERLY-RED-FRE" is the result of the planting of a Red Bird Peach Seed planted fall of 1928. Our attention was first called to this splendid peach in 1935 and we instructed Mr. Perry to bud the variety off to see whether it would produce true to type in succeeding generations. The second generation trees bore in 1937 at 2 years of age, the fruits on these being identical with those on the Parent tree. The original tree and second generation trees both bore a heavy crop in 1938, it being necessary to thin the fruit on all trees. These same trees repeated in 1939, having a normal crop on them which was thinned lightly, when other varieties in the same orchard were killed out almost entirely with late frosts. We have never in all our observations of peaches known of an early peach having so many good characteristics which are so outstanding. The fruit borne in 1939 being the finest specimens we have yet seen of the variety. The tree blooms medium early, the blossoms being medium open type, pink and self-pollinating. We picked the first fruits of 1938 crop June 11th, the main crop being harvested between June 14th and 20th. The first peaches were picked from the trees June 20th in 1939 crop, all peaches being picked from the trees by June 28th, the ripening season being just a little later due to seasonal conditions and fertilization methods followed in 1939. The first fruits each year were picked with the first fruits of the Red Bird variety and continued on thru the Red Bird and the beginning of the Greensboro season. The fruit is very highly colored with an attractive bright red on a creamy white background. The skin is tough and medium thick. The flesh of the peach is of such texture that it does not show bruises through the skin for several days after being bruised and is a clear white through to the pit. We believe this peach has one of the smallest pits of any cultivated peach we know of in existence.

Specimen peaches we have sent out by Express and P. P. have carried up to 1000 miles in perfect condition and remained edible for several days after arrival. We have actually kept tree ripened peaches for 12 days after picking without any refrigeration. The peach shows unusual quality, being equal to a tree ripened Belle of Georgia. The peach resembles the Hiley Belle in shape when ready to pick. The fruit averages large for an early peach, some specimens weighing 12 ounces and the entire crop under normal conditions and care can be packed out 2 1/2" and up if desired. The tree is very vigorous, resistant to Bacteriosis, bears while very young and is very productive. The season of 1938 was abnormally wet and the Erly-Red-Fre proved very resistant to Brown rot; Red Bird in the same orchard under same care being almost a total loss. The 1939 season was abnormally dry prior to harvest time and again the peaches held up well and sized up, so it would seem that the peach will adjust itself to seasonal conditions and give results beyond that of most Early peaches. This peach originating in the temperate regions should adapt itself to most all peach producing areas North, South and West. It should prove one of the best money making peaches ever offered Southern Peach growers, because it is definitely the FIRST RIPENING FREESTONE PEACH NOW IN CULTIVATION TO OUR KNOWLEDGE, FOLLOWING CLOSELY THE MAYFLOWER AND PRECEDING THE GOLDEN JUBILEE SEVERAL WEEKS.

Mr. C. J. Mitchell of Stanton, Ala. sent us the above photograph stating this was an average tree in his orchard of 1600 trees planted in Dec. 1936, the photograph being taken the following August. This is their 3rd growing season and are averaging more than 1/4 bu. of peaches to the tree and ONLY 1 TREE IN THE ENTIRE PLANTING IS FRUITING NOT TRUE TO LABEL. These trees were our small yearling peach trees 18 to 24 inch grade. Mr. Mitchell is justly proud of this orchard and it proves the ability of Bountiful Ridge Trees to grow and produce wherever they are planted.

The FISHER Peach

Nature Triumphs—Giving Us a Distinct New Yellow Peach of Superb Appearance and Quality Ripening 10 Days Before Golden Jubilee. The Fisher Peach Leads the Parade of Yellow Freestone Peaches With Universal Commercial Possibilities.

The Fisher Peach Is Hardy—Medium to Large Size—Highly Colored With Handsome Appearance, Superb Quality and Shipping Ability.

Growers in All Peach Producing Areas Can Realize Its Possibilities. Step Up Your Yellow Peach Season by Planting Fisher Peach Trees This Year.

The FISHER peach was discovered as a bud sport of the VALIANT in August 1934 near Queenstown, Ontario, Canada. Mr. Fisher found these large well formed peaches growing on a single limb of a Valiant tree in his orchard, being attracted to the peach from the fact that it was ripening fully 3 weeks before the Valiant peaches on the rest of the tree. Realizing the commercial possibilities of a peach of this type and season, Mr. Fisher's next concern was whether the fruit would carry through to succeeding generations. To test it as quickly as possible he top worked a two year old Valiant tree with 12 buds from the Sport limb the first week in September, 1934. The Parent limb again bore a heavy crop in 1935 and the peaches developed as they did in 1934. THE PEACH WAS MEDIUM TO LARGE, YELLOW FLESHED AND A FREESTONE. THE PEACH HAS A DARK RED BLUSH COVERING NEARLY HALF OF THE PEACH; EXCELLENT FLAVOR, FINE GRAINED FLESH SHOWING NO RED ABOUT THE PIT. The Parent limb repeated with a fine crop in 1936 and the top worked tree set a crop which required thinning, the remaining peaches on the top worked tree developed exactly as those on the Parent Limb. HERE WAS A PEACH OF FINE QUALITY, A YELLOW FREESTONE PEACH. In 1937 Mr. Geo. W. Kemp and Mr. Homer Kemp of our nursery journeyed to Canada to see this peach. The original limb as well as the top worked tree had a fine crop and on August 12, 1937 we photographed the peach in colors with our moving picture equipment. We also photographed the Marigold, Oriole and Golden Jubilee in the same orchard so as to give the comparative season of them.

Mr. Geo. W. and Homer Kemp again went to Canada in 1938 to observe the FISHER PEACH on the original tree and second and third generation trees all of which came through again with a fine crop in 1938. Our first opinions of the peach were further confirmed. More color photographs were taken of the peaches as they were on the tree. THE BOUNTIFUL RIDGE NURSERIES HAVE ENTERED INTO A GROWING AND DISTRIBUTION CONTRACT WITH MR. FISHER FOR THE DISTRIBUTION OF THE FISHER PEACH TO THEIR CUSTOMERS IN THE UNITED STATES AND CANADA.

NOTE

Ripening order of varieties designated by bracketed numbers after name. Varieties overlapping in ripening season indicated by sub-letter. Example, Elberta and Hale are about same season and are designated by numbers 13 and 13A. We have endeavored to give you authentic ripening order of varieties, we list, but variations may occur due to soil, fertilization and climatic conditions.

MAYFLOWER. (1) Earliest peach. Red all over, size medium, quality good, semi-cling.

MIKADO. (2) The Mikado is again being given a great deal of publicity as a hardy, productive, early yellow peach ripening about two weeks after Mayflower or six weeks before Elberta. The tree is of medium size and vigor and should be interplanted with other varieties for cross-pollination. The fruit is medium in size, round, semi-cling, attractive yellow and blushed with red. Quality is very good.

RED BIRD (Early Wheeler). (3) Earliness, high color and productiveness make it very valuable. Cling, very large. Creamy white over-spread with a bright, glowing red. Good shipper.

ERLY-RED-FRE. (3a) See opposite page.

GREENSBORO (Semi-Cling). (4) Large yellow with splashes of bright red; highly colored; flesh white, very juicy and of good quality. Hardy, early.

EARLY ROSE. (5) A white cling peach. Variety is a favorite with Southern peach growers.

FISHER PEACH. (5a) See opposite page.

ORIOLE. (6) Introduced by New Jersey experiment station in 1925 an early yellow freestone peach ripens a few days ahead of Cumberland. Fruit medium size, yellow in color, blushed with red and notable for fine quality. Tree is vigorous and productive. The fruit buds are very resistant to cold and will grow where others fail.

CUMBERLAND. (6a) A N. J. Station Prodnet. A seedling crossed with Greensboro. The tree is a vigorous grower and as hardy as Carman. The fruit is larger than Belle of Georgia; attractively colored with red, oval in shape. The flesh is white, almost free, firmer and better quality than Carman or Alton. Ripens just before Carman.

GOLDEN JUBILEE (6B)

A PROVEN MONEY MAKER

No General Planting of Peaches is Complete Without A Liberal Amount of Golden Jubilee Trees.

A development of the New Jersey Experiment Station, first offered by us during the Fall shipping season of 1928. Planted and producing in every peach producing section of the United States and Canada and stands without an equal as an early, yellow, freestone peach of exceptional quality. The Golden Jubilee is a second generation seedling of the Elberta crossed with the Greensboro. The tree is unusually hardy. The buds resist low Winter temperatures better than Elberta and open later than Elberta which insures a regular crop. The blossoms are self-fertile. The peach is medium to large size and firm. The peach develops better if a well balanced fertilizer is used. As the tree grows older the fruit becomes firmer and develops more naturally. It proved to be the best money-making peach of the South this year, many sales running as high as \$3.00 per bushel. Ripens about four to five weeks before Elberta.

CARMAN. (6c) Hardy, sets fruit well, early white peach, red color, flesh medium fine, juicy. A home market variety.

RADIANCE. (7) Large oval, white fleshed freestone, good quality, good color, ripens after Carman.

FAIR'S BEAUTY. (7a) An early peach following Golden Jubilee three to five days. Tree vigorous, spreading, very hardy in bud, often producing a crop when other varieties are winter killed. Fruit is medium to large in size, skin a deep golden yellow blushed with bright red, the flesh is firm, tender, melting and juicy. Fruit hangs exceptionally well to tree and when full ripe is a perfect freestone, clinging slightly when the peach is hard ripe, an excellent market and canning peach.

ROCHESTER. (8) Large, yellow and red peach. Flesh yellow and of fine quality.

COLORA PEACH (9)

Possibly The Most Outstanding Hardy, Early, Yellow Freestone Peach in Cultivation.

Tree and Buds Stand Low Temperatures Where Other Varieties Fail.

High Color, Superb Quality, Size, and a Market Leader Are Reasons Why You Should Plant Colora This Year. Introduced in 1936.

Our own introduction of a new frost resistant, yellow freestone peach. Second generation trees as well as the original branch have withstood temperatures during the past winters of about 17 degrees below zero, when most other varieties such as Elberta, Hiley Belle, Belle of Georgia, Early Elberta and J. H. Hale were wiped out by these low temperatures. The peach is an attractive yellow, freestone well-colored and of excellent quality, ripening about 15 to 20 days before Elberta. In size, it is about the same as Elberta. We believe the planters will find this a valuable variety for planting in cold areas.

NEW EARLY HILEY. (9a) A new strain of this famous peach originating in Georgia. Has all the characteristics of its famous parent, but is a full week earlier in ripening.

VEDETTE (9B)

A Peach of Proven Merit Adapting Itself To Southern Peach Areas.

Size, High Color, Excellent Quality and Shipping Ability Establish the Vedette as One of the Leading Peaches to Follow the Colora.

A product of the Vineland Experimental Station, a seedling of Elberta, resembling that variety in color and type of flesh, but is more globular in shape, more highly colored, and of much finer quality. The fruit is large size, yellow fleshed, freestone. The tree is vigorous, very hardy, comes into bearing early and is very productive. The Vedette is proving very satisfactory in trial plantings near Columbia and Clemson, South Carolina. The fruit is firm and a good shipper, ripening about one week after Golden Jubilee. A fine peach that promises to be a real money-maker for the Southern Planter.

SOUTH HAVEN. (10a) An excellent peach, tree thrifty and productive. Peach of Elberta type, ripening 15 to 18 days before Elberta. Freestone, yellow fleshed, ripens its crop over a period of ten days, making it desirable for local or roadside markets.

HILEY BELLE. (11) Medium size, white fleshed, freestone peach, beautiful red blush, and tough skin, juicy and tender.

SLAPPY IMP. (11a) A selected strain of Slappy which we consider superior to the regular Slappy variety. Yellow freestone, very good quality, ripening Hiley Belle time.

VALIANT. (11b) A seedling of Elberta introduced by Experiment Station, Vineland, Ontario, Canada. A large yellow fleshed, high colored peach, ripening 3 to 7 days after Vedette. Excellent quality fruit, hardy tree and very productive. We recommend the Valiant.

GOLDENEAST (N. J. 87). (11c) A large, firm oval, highly colored commercial peach ripening at the Hiley and Eclipse season. Usually a freestone. A promising variety for sites south of central New Jersey where favorable elevations, soil and climate prevail. A recent development of the N. J. Experimental Station.

ECLIPSE. (11d) Dark red, yellow fleshed, freestone peach, firm texture, good flavor. Ripening with Hiley.

CHAMPION Free. (11e) Large yellowish-white mottled with red. Flesh white and red at pit.

CRAWFORDS EARLY. (11f) Large, round, bright yellow with red cheek, flesh yellow, juicy, sweet, quality good.

FITZGERALD (Free). (11g) Improved Early Crawford. A bright yellow blushed with red. Flesh deep yellow and of best quality. Early freestone.



These trees were Bountiful Ridge Grown 3-4 ft. grade, yearling stock of the Hale Haven variety, planted Dec. 10 to 15, 1936 at Sand Hill Experiment Station near Columbia, S. C.

Planted in light sandy soil with only soiling crops used as fertilizer they averaged 7 to 8 feet after two growing seasons.

The producing records of this orchard for 1939 shows they averaged more than ½ bushel of U. S. No. 1 peaches to the tree, many peaches being over 3 inch size. GAGE ELBERTA (14A)

A Disease Resistant Bud Sport Of The Famous Elberta Peach, Which We can Recommend Highly.

This splendid peach originated in the orchards of Mr. John Gage near Texico, Illinois. Recommended for resistance to bacterium pruni. The tree grows thrifty as the Elberta and looks much like the old time Elberta. Gage Elberta blooms from two to four days after Elberta and apparently has a very strong blossom setting a crop of fruit under unfavorable conditions. The fruit is so near the Elberta that only an expert can distinguish the difference. It ripens two to three days later than Elberta.

This variety is proving well adapted to the Southern conditions in the trial plantings at Columbia and Clemson, South Carolina and is to be preferred over the Elberta in many respects.

Very favorable reports are coming to us from Ohio, Indiana, and Illinois on the Gage Elberta and some large orchardists are planting it in preference to the Elberta in large quantities.

THE BRACKETT PEACH. (14b) This is a comparatively new variety in some sections, but has been tried and proven one of the most profitable peaches in the South. Its season is about five days after Elberta, with a beautiful orange-yellow skin tinged with carmine. Flesh is a deep yellow and much higher flavored than Elberta. 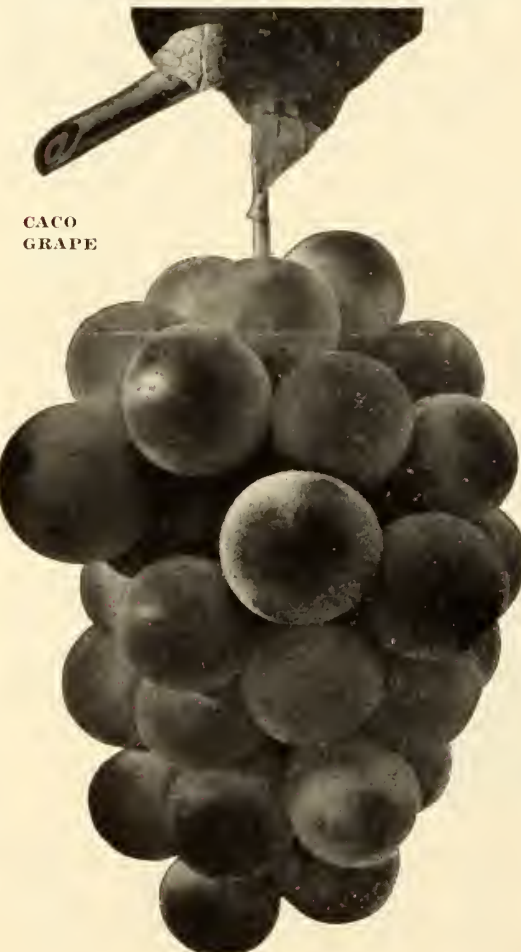

PIONEER. Named by Dr. Coville of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. The bushes are stocky, seldom exceeding 4 feet in height with a tendency to be broad rather than high. Its stems are stout and stiff and the winter color of the young growth is a delightful red. Pioneer produces heavy crops of berries close set in the cluster. They are larger than Rubel; of medium blue color and fine flavor.

CONCORD. The bush is of upright habit and at maturity exceeds six feet in height. The young growth is bright red in winter. The berries are large, frequently reaching three-quarters of an inch in diameter. They usually ripen a few days earlier than Rubel and are fine in flavor and appearance.

RUBEL. Well developed bushes stand six feet or more high, vigorous and beautiful. The stems are slender, but sturdy. The winter color of the young wood is a rich red. The large berries are of a fine blue color. Planted extensively for commercial fruit production.

JERSEY. The bush is of vigorous habit and grows very large. The winter color of the young growth is a light red over golden brown. The berries are the largest of any here listed, of a very light blue color and ripen about the same time as Rubel.
