a. Following the 20 April election, the Tokyo-to Government was instructed to continue the campaign of informing the public as to the election procedure of the House of Representatives. The local government intensified its campaign of election information through radio broadcasts, street broadcasts, newspaper, placards and hand bills. Reports received from the surveillance teams indicates that the turn-out of voters during the 25 April election exceeded the number of voters cast during the 20 April by a total of 199,249 persons.

21. Local publicity on elections

a. The apparent apathy on the part of many voters toward the election of the House of Councillors seemed to be due to the erroneous belief that the House of Councillors would be the same as the House of Peers. The Tokyo-to Government was instructed to step up the campaign of informing the voters as to the nature of the election to overcome some of the ignorance characterizing so many of the voters. For two or three days before April 20th, the local government intensified its campaign of election information through radio broadcasts, street broadcasts, window displays, poster displays, and hand bills. According to reports received from the surveillance teams, this campaign of information had some positive results on the turn-out of voters. A little better than 50 percent of the voters exercised their rights on April 20th, which the following figures reveal:

- a. Little or no knowledge of candidates, particularly in the rural districts.
 - b. Inadequate campaigning on the part of candidates.
 - c. Little publicity by press.
