

In February, 1876, he accepted the portfollo of chief commissioner of lands and works in the Elliott cabinet, and on returning to the people for confirmation in this position was re-elected. This position he retained until the general election of 1878, when he was re-elected by his constituents, but in consequence of the defeat of the Elliott administration, Mr. Vernon was in opposition.

In 1882 he was not a candidate for reelection, but in 1886 he was again returned, and on the death, in 1887 of
Hon. Mr. Smythe, he accepted office in
the Davis government as chief commissioner of lands and works. At the general elections in 1890 he was again returned by his constituents, and turned by his constituents, and was given the position of chief commission-er of lands and works in the Robson government. He also held the port-folio of mines and agriculture in the Davie government during its term of office, between June. 1893, and March. 1895, and on the advent of the Turner-government in the same year retired

government in the same year retired from politics.

Mr. Vernon in 1877 married Miss Banks, who died in 1885, leaving two children. During his later years' residence in British Columbia Mr. Vernon was engaged solely in the management of his private interests. Possessed of simple means he became identified with most of the important development projects as they were mooted and his heldings to-day must represent a considerable sum.





From the testimony offered, it appears that at Cordova the Olympia discharged coal out of hold No. 3 and general merchandise out of hold No. 2. In three of her four holds she carried coal, and the discharging of coal and merchandise from holds 2 and 3 left the stern a little high on leaving Cordova. The reason for failure to discharge from the bow instead of from the forward holds lay in the fact that at Valdez, another port of call, the only hold from which she could discharge was the after hold. It was this apportionment of the cargo that later portionment of the cargo that later sulted in the failure of the Olympia answer her helm and the ensuing

Testimony further showed that at the Testimony further showed that at the time the Olympia went ashore a hurricane was beating up the waters of Prince William Sound, and it was impossible to distinguish the big whitecaps from the breakers that dashed against the rocks of Bligh Island reef. To add to the difficulty a coating of ice covered the black and red buoy off the southern end of Bligh Island, making it more difficult for the captain to get his bearings.

#### SHELTER SOUGHT BY BEATRICE IN NORTH

Princess Had Dirty Passage From Skagway, Arriving Last Night

Winds blowing with hurricane force jesting the waters of the north into turbu-lent rage, blinding snowstorms, rendering navigation practically impossible, and the coldness of the temperature, which froza the seas as they came abourd the vessel, were greatly responsible for the late ar-rival of the C. P. R. steamer Princess Beatrice, Capt. McLeod, which reached port last right several days behind her schedule time from Skagway and other northern points.

schedule time from Skagway and other northern points.

The trip north was nothing out of the ordinary, the weather being a little rough, but the return passage is credited by the officers of the Beatrice as being the worst, they have encountered for many moons. On several occasions they were forced to seek shelter, unable to outride the heavy gales. All the time the vessel was in the north the temperature never registered higher than sero, sand different limes tell far below that point. Sp dirty was the weather off Juneau that the Princess had to remain there for many hours until the gales ceased in fury.

Southbound for Ketchikan the steamer headed into a northeast gale which battered her about severely. Many seas were shipped, and, as the mercury hung low, ice caked on the decks. Tossed around so badly, Capt. McLeod decided to head his vessel for shelter, and she lay in a singlittle harbor during the night. While the Beatrice was lying at Prince Rupert last Saturday a howling gale swept up the harbor, blowing with such velocity that the steamer Camosun, riding at anchor, parted her chain, losing 75 fathoms of it. Crossing Queen Charlotte Sound the crew were rocked in the cradle of the deep, the Beatrice driving into a sigring gale which caused her to roll and pitch badly.

The Princess Beatrice brought south 50 passengers, the majority of whom Jeft the vessel at Vancouver. She had consid-

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





The danger of the destruction of gun turrets or conning towers could be avoided by thicker armor plating without unduly increasing the weight of those parts. It would be another matter if progress in the construction of airships and aeroplanes subsequently enabled them to carry really considerable quantities of very destructive explosives with them.

FIERCE BATTLE IN SOUDAN. all French Force Defeats Five Thousand Tribesmen.

As a result of the fighting which took place near Drigeli, the capital of Mas-salit, forty-seven French officers and men were killed and seventy-three wounded. The dead include Lleut.-Col-onel Moll, who was in command of the

force.

There were originally three hundred men, but the force had been talnned by sickness, so that considerably less than that number reached Drigeli. On the following day two hostile armies of natives made a furious attack on the little French force. There were in all about five thousand tribesmen, and for an hour and a half they hurled themselves repeatedly upon the French, who

the enemy broke and fled, leaving seven hundred dead on the field. The victory for the French had been dearly bought, for in addition to the leader, Capt. Jolly and five European non-commissioned officers were among the killed. Major Maillard took com-mand when Colonel Moll was killed.
