# Catalogue of the Portraits, Miniatures, &c., at Castle Howard.

THE following Catalogues of Portraits are printed in continuation of those given last year, and though Castle Howard is in the North Riding, its owners have been so much connected with the East Riding by property there, and in other ways, that a record of their portraits here seems but fitting; and as many of the portraits of this family are at Naworth Castle in Cumberland, some of which have been moved from Castle Howard, a further Catalogue of those that are there is appended to make the account more complete.

I must express my thanks to Lord Carlisle and to his daughter, Lady Cecelia Roberts, for the kind assistance they have given me, and also to Dr. George C. Williamson for his valuable help in connection with the miniatures, and particulars relating to them, and, lastly, I must not omit to mention the great help I have received from the lists and catalogues made at different times by the late John Duthie, who died at Castle Howard on the 8th December, 1899, aged 75, without which I could not possibly have completed this work.

In the small room adjoining the entrance in the north-west, or new wing are some fourteen engravings, and at the foot of the staircase are a number of antique busts, &c., whilst on the walls above are

twelve oil-paintings—Nos. 1 to 12—not portraits, two being views of Castle Howard by *W. Marlow*, six of Ruins at Rome by *Pannini*, one picture by *Titian*, one by *Snyders*, one by *Van Dyck*, and one of a Naval Battle, by *Van der Velde, the elder*; and some Gobelin tapestry.<sup>1</sup> Near the top of this staircase, in the corner, are the two following pictures:—

14. Lady Elizabeth Percy, daughter and heiress of Josceline, 11th and last Earl of Northumberland, born 26 January, 1667, and on the death of her father in 1670 she was thought to have succeeded to the Baronies of Percy, Lucy, Poynings, Fitz-Payn, Bryan, and Latimer (though the representation of these Baronies was vested in the coheirs of the 7th Earl). She married (1) in 1679 Henry Cavendish, Earl of Ogle, only son of Henry, 2nd Duke of Newcastle. He dying *s.p.* 1680, she married (2), 1681, Thomas Thynne of Longleat, who died *s.p.*—being murdered in 1682, and she married (3), 30 May, 1682, Charles Seymour, 6th Duke of Somerset. She died 23 November, 1722. On canvass  $72 \times 54\frac{1}{2}$  in.

15. Charles Seymour, 6th Duke of Somerset, born 13 April, 1662, married (1) as above mentioned, Lady Elizabeth Percy, and (2) 4 February, 1725-6, Lady Charlotte Finch, 3rd daughter of Daniel, 7th Earl of Winchilsea, and 2nd of Nottingham. The Duke died 2 December, 1748, at Petworth, and was buried in Salisbury Cathedral. Dressed in the robes of the Order of the Garter. On canvass  $51 \times 39\frac{1}{2}$  in.

16. Charles Mordaunt, 3rd Earl of Peterborough, K.G. In the robes of the Order of the Garter. He was born about 1658, was First Lord of the Treasury, 1689-91, created, 9 April, 1689, Earl of Monmouth, succeeded his uncle, 19 June, 1697, as Earl of Peterborough. He married (1) in 1678 Carey, daughter of Sir Alexander Fraser, Bart. She dying 1709, he married (2) some years afterwards Anastasia Robinson. He died, 25 October, 1735, on board his yacht off Lisbon, and was buried at Turvey in Bedfordshire, 21 November, 1735, aged 77. Canvass  $43 \times 39$  in.

17. Sir Harry Goodricke, 2nd Bart. of Ribston, Co. York. In buff coat and armour with a crimson sash. He was son of Sir John, 1st Bart., by Katherine his 1st wife, daughter and coheir of Stephen Norcliffe. He was born 24 October, 1642, succeeded his father, Sir John, 1st Bart., November, 1670, was M.P. for Boroughbridge in ten parliaments, 1673 to 1705, was Envoy Extraordinary to Charles II. of Spain, Lieut.-General of the Ordnance, 1668-1702, and P.C., 1689-90. He married Mary, sister of George, 1st Lord Dartmouth, daughter of Col. Wm. Legge by Elizabeth, daughter of Sir Wm. Washington. He died *s.p.* at Brentford, Middlesex, 5 March, 1704-5, was buried at Ribston, and was succeeded by his half-brother. On canvass 50 × 40 in.

19. Portrait of a lady. Unknown. Dressed in white in the fashion of the early part of the 19th century. Unfinished. On canvass 31½ × 23½ in. Brought from London, 1865.
20. Lady Anne Howard, Dowager Viscountess Irwin, 2nd daughter of Charles, 3rd Earl of Carlisle, by Anne his wife, daughter of Arthur, 1st Earl of Essex. She married (1) 8 May, 1718, Richard Ingram, 5th Viscount Irwin, who died of the small-pox, 10 April, 1721 *s.p.* She married (2) at St. George's Hanover Square, 11 June, 1737, Col. William Douglas, of Kirkness in Scotland, whom she survived. She was an authoress, and wrote several poems, which are mentioned by Walpole in his "Royal and Noble Authors," and also in Duncombe's "Feminead." Dressed in white. On canvass 56 × 39½ in.

21. Lady Georgiana Spencer (afterwards Duchess of Devonshire) as a child. Born 9 June, 1757, married 5 June, 1774, William Cavendish, 5th Duke of Devonshire, K.G., and died 30 March, 1806. In white with purple ribbon. On canvass 29½ × 24½ in.

8 June, 1743, Henry, 4th Earl of Carlisle, and after his death she married (2) 10 December, 1759, at Whitehall, Sir Wm. Musgrave, 6th Bart., of Hayton Castle, Cumberland. She died 22 January, 1795. She dying at Orton Longueville, Hunts., 27 July, 1742, he married (2) 8th June, 1743, Isabella, daughter of William Byron, 4th Lord Byron. Dressed in brown coat, and wearing a blue turban. In the Corridor leading to the Central Hall are many pieces of Roman and Greek sculpture, and there are also medallion portraits, in relief, of Lady Mary Howard, afterwards Lady Taunton, and of the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Charles W. G. Howard.

### THE HALL.

The paintings in the Hall, which is 33 feet square by 60 feet high, and 100 feet high into the Dome, are by *Antonio Pellegrini*, of Padua, who was born 1674, and died in 1741; the subjects being the "Fall of Phaeton"; "The Four Elements"; "The Twelve Signs of the Zodiac"; "Apollo and the Nine Muses"; "Apollo and Midas." "The Four Quarters of the Earth"; "Mercury and Venus"; "Phaeton soliciting Apollo to drive the chariot of the Sun"; "Vulcan," &c.

On the ceiling of the Saloon, "Aurora."

On the ceiling of the Upper Saloon, "Venus and Minerva," and on the walls, "The Rape of Helen"; "Achilles in disguise among the daughters of King Leonidas"; "Ulysses in search of Achilles"; "Ulysses and Ajax disputing for the armour of Achilles"; "The Sacrifice of Iphigenia"; "Æneas carrying his father Anchises from burning Troy," and "Troy in flames."

On the ceiling of the Little Gallery, and the two small staircases, various subjects. The date of all these paintings was 1712. The ceilings of the Corridors in the Old Wing are painted in various designs by *Mr. Kemp*.

There are six curious old Maps of the Estate, of different dates, three of them hanging in the West side passage, and the other three in that on the East side. They are as follows:—

SMALL DINING ROOM.

In the small Dining Room looking into the East Court are no pictures.

In the passage going East, are eleven water-colour drawings (Nos. 42 to 52), of which two are views of Naworth Castle, and one of Lanercost, and eleven sketches (Nos. 53 to 63), whilst on the side staircase are seven pictures (Nos. 64 to 70), but no portraits.

JANET ROOM.<sup>2</sup>

In this Sitting Room are forty-three water-colour drawings (Nos. 71 to 113).

LITTLE GALLERY.

In the East or Little Gallery are forty pictures (Nos. 114 to 153), of which eleven are oil paintings, twenty-two water-colour drawings, of which two are views at Naworth, by the present Earl of Carlisle—one with the present Countess of Carlisle and three of her children in the foreground, and the other has portraits of her son, Michael, and her daughter, Lady Dorothy Howard, also a

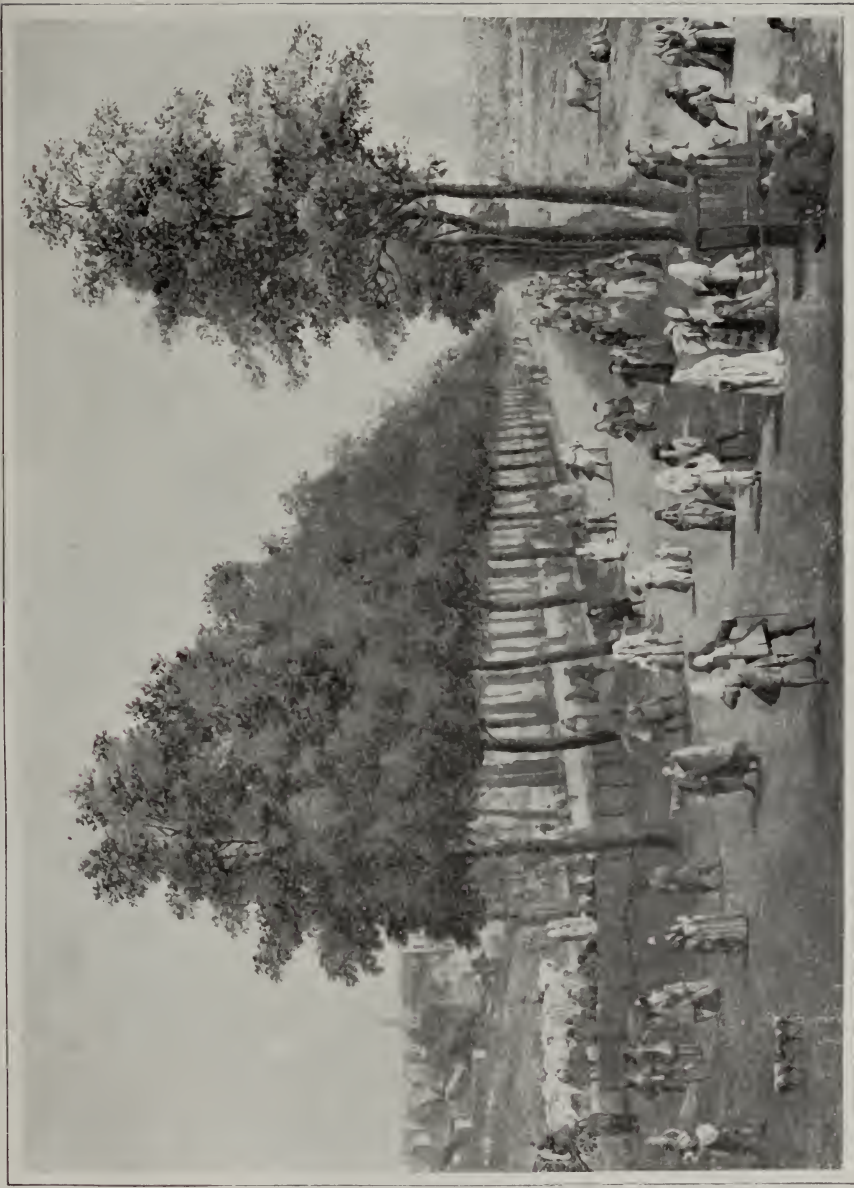

## CASE I.

1. Sir John Fenwick, 3rd Bart. of Fenwick, Wallington and Hexham, co. Northumberland, son of Sir William Fenwick, 2nd Bart., by Jane, daughter of Henry Stapleton, of Wighill, co. York, was born 1644, being aged 10 in 1654, succeeded his father, *circa* 1682, was M.P. for Northumberland in five Parliaments, 1677-1687; married 14 July, 1663, at St. James's, Clerkenwell, by Licence (he aged about 19, she about 16), Mary, eldest daughter of Charles, 1st Earl of Carlisle. He being implicated in a plot for the restoration of James II., was apprehended and committed to the Tower, and indicted for High Treason, 28 May, 1696. As it was however against the law of the land to convict a person of High Treason on the oath of only one witness, an *ex post facto* law was made to apply to this case, the Bill being carried by small majorities in both Houses, and he was accordingly condemned, and beheaded on Tower Hill, 27 January, 1696-7, aged 52. He was buried the following day in the Church of St. Martin-in-the-Fields. His widow, who had been unremitting in her exertions to save his life, died 27 October, 1708, aged 60, and was buried in York Minster, where there is a monument to her memory. 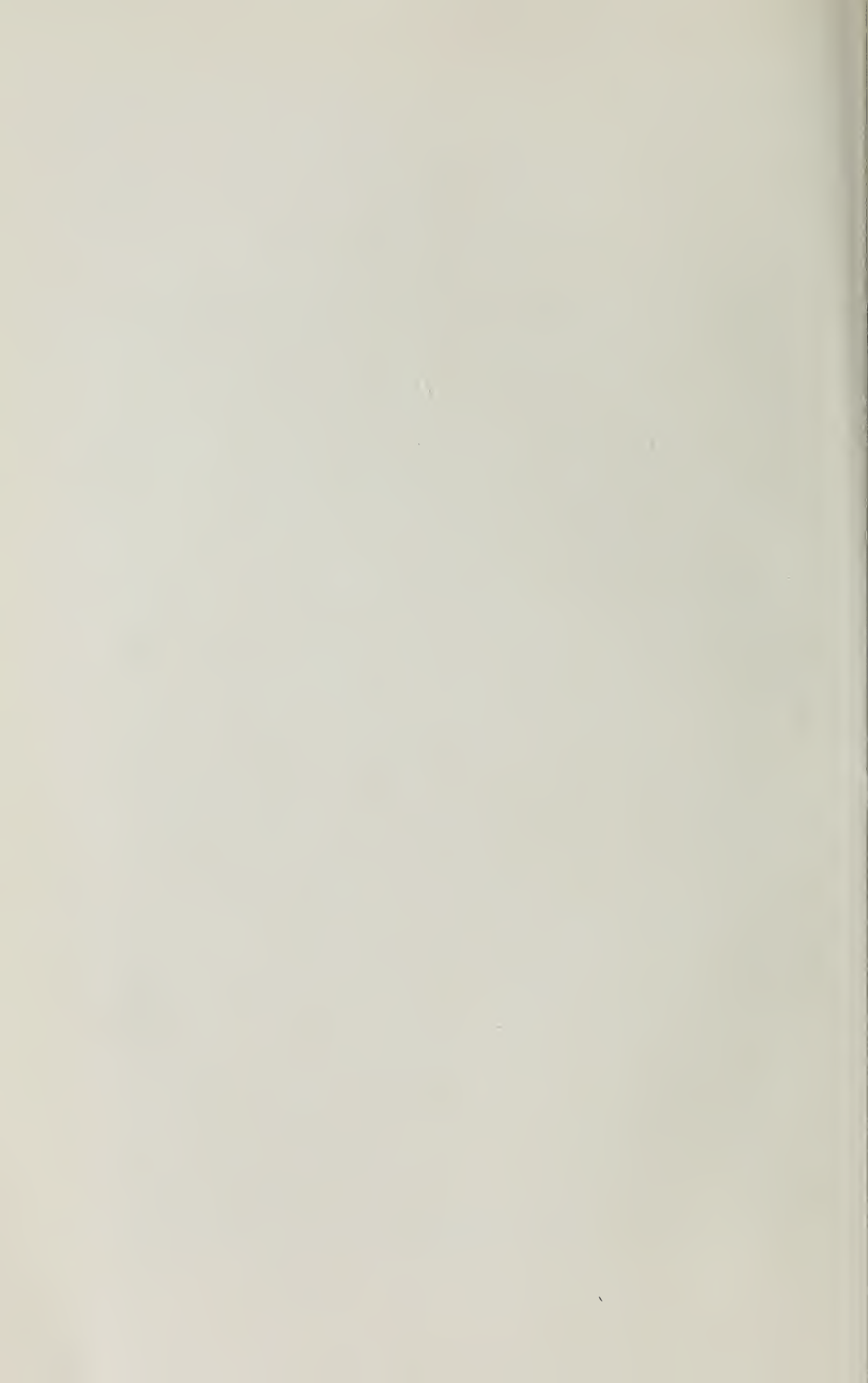

THE CHAPEL.

In the Chapel there was formerly some ancient stained glass, representing the Martyrdoms of St. John and of St. Catherine, acquired by Frederick, 5th Earl of Carlisle, in 1803, for £84. This has been removed to a window looking South into the West Court, and after extensive alterations the Chapel was re-opened on the 15th April, 1875. The paintings and decorations are by Mr. Kemp, the paintings opposite the windows being the Annunciation, and the figures of Moses, David, Isaiah, Micah, Zechariah, and Malachi, and in the other compartments are inscriptions from their writings, having reference to the doctrine of the Incarnation. Over the font is a large composition, representing the Baptism of our Lord. Between the windows on the North side are angels with scrolls and inscriptions. The upper panels over the Choir seats have figures of angels with musical instruments; and the corresponding panels in the Sacrarium have angels with the instruments of the Passion of our Lord. Framed in the reredos and on panel is a painting, "The Man of Sorrows."

The stained glass windows are by Morris, representing the

Annunciation, the Nativity, the Adoration of the Magi, and the Flight into Egypt, from designs by Burne Jones.

The Organ is by Harrison. It has three full manuals and a large pedal organ.

The Reredos, inlaid marble floor, alabaster walls and the Font are by Messrs. Field, Pool & Son.

The Wood carving is by Milburn, of York.

The Brass work of the Screen is by Longden & Co., of Sheffield.

The Parqueterie is by Howard, of London.

The whole of the Architectural work has been designed by, and carried out, under the personal directions of Mr. R. J. Johnson, Architect, principally by the workmen on the estate, under the supervision of Mr. Ware, the Clerk of the Works.

There is a brass to Lord Lanerton's memory, at the West end, with the following inscription:—

On the South front and in various other places, the paintings on canvass in panels over doors, &c., already mentioned, are by *Sebastian Ricci*, born 1659, died 1734, thirty-five in all.

The Obelisk in the Park, at the intersection of the Lime Avenues, has a Latin inscription relating to the Duke of Marlborough's Victories, of which it is a memorial, and the date 1714.

The Entrance arch at the Inn has a Latin inscription on each side to the effect that it was built in 1719, by Charles Howard, 3rd Earl of Carlisle.

The designs of the various Temples in the pleasure grounds are taken from Classic originals, and that of the Mausoleum, also built by the 3rd Earl, was taken from Bramante's little temple in the Church of San Pietro in Montorio, which latter fact we

learn from the 6th Duke of Devonshire's handbook to Chatsworth, &c., where he mentions this in speaking of a view he had in the Stag Parlour at Chatsworth of the above little temple in the Church of San Pietro, by *Vianelli*, a celebrated water-colour painter in Naples.

The following Catalogue of the Pictures at Naworth Castle is compiled from one made by George, present and 9th Earl of Carlisle, and begun by him in October, 1893; finished in 1895; additional notes being added to it, and alterations where the pictures have been moved, being made, to correct it to the present date.

THE HALL.  
NORTH END.

1. Thomas, Viscount Howard of Bindon, 2nd son of Thomas, 3rd Duke of Norfolk, by his 2nd wife Elizabeth, eldest daughter of Edward Stafford, 3rd Duke of Buckingham, was born about 1520; created 13 January, 1558-9, by his cousin Queen Elizabeth, Viscount Howard of Bindon, co. Dorset. He married (1) in or before 1542, Elizabeth, daughter and eventually sole heir of John Marney, 2nd Lord Marney, by his 1st wife Christian, daughter and heir of Sir Roger Newburgh. He married (2) after 1565 Gertrude, daughter of Sir William Lyte, of Billesdon, co. Somerset; and (3) on 7 June, 1576, at Carshalton, co. Surrey, Mabel, daughter of Nicholas Burton, of Carshalton. She was buried at Marnhull, co. Dorset, and was mother of Frances, the well-known Duchess of Richmond. He married (4) Margaret, daughter of Henry Manning, of Greenwich, Marshal of the Household to Henry VIII., Edward VI., Queen Mary, and Queen Elizabeth. He died 28 January, 1581-2, and was buried at Marnhull. He was succeeded by Henry, his eldest son by his 1st wife. His widow married (2) as his 2nd wife,

Sir Edmund Ludlow, of Hill Devereil, Wilts, and died 1635. Full length, on canvass, in the robes of the Order of the Garter; white wand in left hand; hat with ostrich feather, in right hand.

2. Lady, with a crucifix in her right hand, a taper in her left hand, wearing a ruff, an embroidered gown and hoop petticoat in the fashion of Queen Elizabeth's reign. Possibly this is the portrait which Mr. Henry Howard, of Corby, in his "Howard Memorials," thought might prove to represent Mary, daughter of Sir John Caryll, of Harting, co. Sussex, wife of Sir Philip Howard, the son and heir of Lord William Howard. Full length.
3. King Charles I. In armour and buff boots, bâton in right hand. Full length.

OVER GLEN ROOM DOOR, UPPER ROW.

5. Francis, 5th Lord Willoughby, of Parham, son of William, 3rd Lord, by Frances, 2nd daughter of John, 4th Earl of Rutland. Born about 1614; succeeded his elder brother Henry, who died in infancy (1618), having only survived his father's death (1617) a few months. He married before 1634 Elizabeth, 2nd daughter and coheir of Edward Cecil, Viscount Wimbledon, by his 1st wife Theodosia, daughter of Sir Andrew Noel, of Dalby, co. Leicester. She died before her husband. He was a Parliamentary commander, and was accused by the Parliament of high treason, 7 August, 1647, and made his peace with the King in 1648. He obtained from James Hay, Earl of Carlisle, in 1647 a lease for 21 years of the Caribbee Islands and the post of Lieutenant-General thereof. He arrived at Barbadoes 29 April, 1650, and proclaimed Charles II., for whom he held the Government till 1651, as he subsequently did from 1663, when he captured St. Lucia. He died without male issue, being drowned in a ship that was lost, with all hands, in a hurricane off Martinique, in July, 1666, on an expedition against Guadaloupe, and was succeeded by his brother William. Head and shoulders. Canvass 26 x 22 in.
6. Portrait of a man. Head and shoulders; long hair and black skull cap; black doublet and broad white collar. On canvass.

## LOWER ROW.

7. Queen Catherine Parr, 6th wife of King Henry VIII. Born 1513; daughter of Sir Thomas Parr, of Kendal, Master of the Wards and Comptroller of the King's Household, by Matilda his wife, daughter of Sir Thomas Green, of Green's Norton, co. Northampton. She married (1) Edward, Lord Burgh of Gainsborough; (2) as his 3rd wife, John Nevill, 3rd Lord Latimer, who dying in 1542-3, she was sought in marriage by Sir Thomas Seymour, brother of the deceased Queen Jane, and had consented, when she received the news that she had been selected as the 6th wife of the King, to whom she was accordingly married 12 July, 1543. After the King's death she married very shortly (some say 34 days after that event) her old lover Sir Thomas Seymour, who was created (16 Feb., 1546-7) Lord Seymour of Sudeley, on the accession of his nephew King Edward VI. He was also made Lord High Admiral of England and K.G. She, who had become a Protestant after the death of her 2nd husband, and was for the rest of her life a very zealous one, died 5 September, 1548, in her 36th year, little more than eighteen months after the death of the King, her 3rd husband, and was buried in the Chapel at Sudeley Castle. Her 4th husband survived her, and was executed on Tower Hill, 28 March, 1549. Her portrait is to the waist, three-quarter face looking to the right. She wears a black coif lined with white, a black gown with ermine sleeves, and in her right hand she holds a gold box. On panel.
8. Theophilus Howard, 2nd Earl of Suffolk and Lord Howard of Walden, K.G. To the waist, nearly full face; dressed in a black doublet, his hand on his hip. He was the eldest son of Thomas, 1st Earl of Suffolk, by his 2nd wife Catherine, daughter and coheir of Sir Henry Knyvett, of Charlton, co. Wilts, by Elizabeth, daughter and heir of Sir James Stumpe, of Bromham, in that county. He was born in 1584, and was baptized at Walden on the 13 August in that year; succeeded his father 28 May, 1626; and had married in March, 1612, Elizabeth, 2nd daughter and coheir of George Home, Earl of Dunbar, by Catherine, daughter of Sir Alexander Gordon, of Gight. He died at Suffolk House, London, 3 June, 1640, and was buried at Walden on the 10 June; his eldest son James succeeding him as 3rd Earl of Suffolk. Painted in 1630, on panel 31 x 25 in.
9. Philip Howard, Earl of Arundel, eldest son of Thomas, 4th Duke of Norfolk, and only child, by his 1st wife Mary, 2nd daughter (and only child that had issue) of Henry Fitz Alan, Earl of Arundel. He was born 28 June, 1557, at Arundel

House, Strand, and baptized 2 July following, at the Royal Chapel, Whitehall, Philip of Spain, after whom he was named, being one of his godfathers. On the 24 February, 1579-80, he succeeded his maternal grandfather as Earl of Arundel (his mother having died on 25 August, 1557, in her 17th year). He married in 1571 at the age of 12 years, and again two years later when 14, Anne, one of the children of his stepmother, Elizabeth, Duchess of Norfolk, being eldest of the three sisters and coheirs of George, Lord Dacre of Gillesland, and daughter of Thomas, Lord Dacre of Gillesland, by Elizabeth, the above-named Duchess of Norfolk, daughter of Sir Francis Leyburne. He died in the Tower of London, 19 October, 1595, after about eleven years' imprisonment there, and was buried first in the Chapel of the Tower, but removed in 1624 to West Horsley, Surrey, where his widow lived, and afterwards to Arundel. His portrait, to the waist, dressed in white doublet and black cloak, is on panel, 30 × 25 in.

## UPPER ROW IN THE HALL.

10. Charles Howard, 3rd Earl of Carlisle. Three-quarter length ; wearing a grey periwig and blue velvet coat ; his left hand resting on a volume of Pope's Works. Painted on canvass. He was born 1669 ; married 1688, Lady Anne Capel, and died at Bath, 1 May, 1738 [See his portrait at Castle Howard].
11. Charles Howard, 3rd Earl of Carlisle, when young. Three-quarter length ; grey periwig and silk drapery over his arm. Painted on canvass.
12. A Military Commander. Unknown. In full wig, breast-plate, and buff coat. A landscape, with engagement in the background. On canvass.
13. Charles Spencer, 3rd Earl of Sunderland. Three-quarter length ; looking to the right (the spectator's right), wearing a full-bottomed wig and grey velvet coat, the Riband of the Order of the Garter, and a gold key. He was the 2nd but only surviving son and heir of Robert, 2nd Earl of Sunderland, by Anne, only surviving sister and heir of John Digby, 3rd Earl of Bristol, 2nd and youngest daughter of George, 2nd Earl, by Anne, daughter of Francis Russell, 4th Earl of Bedford. He was born 1675 ; and married (1) 12 January, 1694-5, Arabella, 5th and youngest daughter and coheir of Henry Cavendish, 2nd Duke of Newcastle, by Frances, daughter of the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. William Pierrepont, of Thoresby, who died 4 June, 1698, leaving an only daughter, Lady Frances Spencer, who married, as his 1st wife, Henry Howard, 4th Earl of Carlisle. Lord Sunderland married

(2), in January, 1699-1700, Anne, 2nd daughter and coheir of John Churchill, 1st Duke of Marlborough, by Sarah, daughter and coheir of Richard Jennings. She died 15 April, 1716, and he married (3) 5 December, 1717, Judith, daughter and coheir of Benjamin Tichborne (younger brother of Henry, Lord Ferrard of Beaulieu) by Elizabeth, daughter of Edward Gibbs, of Gloucester. He died 19 April, 1722, and was buried at Brington. He was a member of the Whig Ministries in the reigns of Queen Anne and King George I. He advised the impeachment of Sacheverel, and was accused of being implicated in the scandal of the South Sea Bubble, but was declared innocent. He was a great collector of books, and formed the Sunderland Library, which was at Blenheim until recently.

14. Lady Arabella Cavendish, 5th and youngest daughter and coheir of Henry Cavendish, 2nd Duke of Newcastle, by Frances, daughter of the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. William Pierrepont, of Thoresby. She was born 19 August, 1673, and married, as his first wife, on the 12 January, 1694-5, Charles Spencer, 3rd Earl of Sunderland, as already mentioned. She died of the small-pox, 4 June, 1698, and was buried at Brington. Her only daughter was the 1st wife of Henry Howard, 4th Earl of Carlisle. Three-quarter length. In yellow gown and light grey drapery, with loose lawn sleeves. On canvass.
15. Portrait of a Lady and Child. Unknown. The lady in white gown and blue drapery. The child standing at her knee. On canvass 48½ in. × 38½ in.
16. Lady Anne Percy, 3rd daughter of Algernon, 10th Earl of Northumberland and Anne Cecil, his 1st wife. She married, as his 1st wife, Philip Stanhope (afterwards Earl of Chesterfield), grandson of Philip, 1st Earl of Chesterfield, and she died *s.p.s.* in 1654. She holds a flower in her hand, and is dressed in a red gown with sleeves to the elbows. On canvass 48 × 39.

17. Lady Elizabeth Percy, daughter and heir of Josceline, 11th Earl of Northumberland, by Elizabeth, daughter and coheir of Thomas Wriothesley, 4th Earl of Southampton. She was born 1667; married (1) Henry Cavendish, Earl of Ogle, son and heir of Henry, 2nd Duke of Newcastle, who dying *v.p.* and *s.p.* 1 November, 1680, in his 18th year, she married (2) Thomas Thynne, of Longleat, who was murdered 12 February, 1681-2; and (3) as his 1st wife, 30 May, 1682 (then in her 16th year), Charles Seymour, 6th Duke of Somerset. She died 23 November, 1722, aged about 55. She was first cousin of Lady Anne Capel, the wife of Charles, 3rd

Earl of Carlisle. Her portrait, which is on canvass, represents her, full face, long light hair, low gown, broad blue sleeves, and touching a bouquet of roses.

18. Josceline Percy, 11th Earl of Northumberland, only son and heir of Algernon, 10th Earl, by his 2nd wife Lady Elizabeth Howard, 2nd daughter of Theophilus, 2nd Earl of Suffolk. He was born 4 July, 1644; married 23 December, 1662, Elizabeth, youngest daughter and coheir of Thomas Wriothsley, 4th Earl of Southampton, by his 2nd wife Elizabeth, daughter and coheir of Francis Leigh, Earl of Chichester. He died without male issue at Turin, 21-31 May, 1670, aged 25. His only surviving daughter was Lady Elizabeth Percy (No. 17). Three-quarter length, seated. In long wig, flowing brown drapery, and loose linen sleeves. In the background a Castle by the sea; possibly Warkworth. On canvass.

OVER THE FIRE-PLACE.

19. Elizabeth Dacre, wife of Lord William Howard, 3rd and youngest daughter of Thomas Lord Dacre of the North and coheir of her brother George, Lord Dacre. She was born 17 December, 1564; married at Audley End, Walden, 28 October, 1577, and died 9 October, 1639. She brought Naworth, and also Hinderskelf (now Castle Howard), and estates at Morpeth, into the Howard family. Full length; three-quarter face. Dressed in black gown and coif, white ruff and cuffs. She holds a fritillary in her left hand; a rosary hangs on the crutch of her stick at her right hand; a cut yew hedge in the background. On canvass 86 in.  $\times$  42 $\frac{1}{2}$  in.

20. Lord William Howard, 3rd son of Thomas, 4th Duke of Norfolk, being the 2nd son by his 2nd wife, Margaret Audley. He was born 19 December, 1563; married, as above-mentioned, Elizabeth Dacre, who brought Naworth and large estates in Cumberland, Northumberland, and Yorkshire into the family. From this marriage descend the Carlisle branch of the Howard family, and also that of Corby, in Cumberland. He died 9 October, 1640. Full length; three-quarter face. His right hand rests on a red-covered table, his left on the hilt of his sword. Dressed in black, with plain white collar. On canvass 84 in.  $\times$  42 $\frac{1}{2}$  in.

21. General George Monck, 1st Duke of Albemarle, Earl of Torrington, and Baron Monck of Potheridge, &c., K.G., 2nd son of Sir Thomas Monck, Kn<sup>t</sup> by Elizabeth, daughter of Sir George Smith, of Maydford, co. Devon, Kn<sup>t</sup>. He was born at his father's house at Potheridge, co. Devon, 6 December, 1608. Was one of the 62 members of Cromwell's Upper House, and afterwards was raised to the peerage, 7 July, 1660, by Charles II. for the part he took in effecting the Restoration. He married 23 January, 1652-3, Anne, daughter of John Clarges, and he died 3 January, 1669-70. Three-quarter length; nearly full face. In buff coat, red sash and the blue Riband of the Order of the Garter, bâton in his right hand. On canvass.
22. Oliver Cromwell. Born 1599; died 1658. Three-quarter length; nearly full face. In full armour, bâton in right hand; left hand on sword hilt. A page, in red, ties a white scarf round his waist. On canvass.

23. Henry Percy, 9th Earl of Northumberland, K.G., son and heir of Henry, 8th Earl, by Katherine, eldest daughter and coheir of John Nevill, 4th Lord Latimer. He was born April, 1564; married in 1594, Dorothy, daughter of Walter Devereux, 1st Earl of Essex, and widow of Sir Thomas Perrott. He died 5 November, 1632, and was buried at Petworth. Three-quarter length, seated; nearly full face. His head resting on his hand; his elbow on a red covered table. Dressed in black, with gold bands on the sleeves of his coat. On canvass.

34. Montague Bertie, 13th Lord Willoughby of Eresby, and afterwards 2nd Earl of Lindsey, K.G., son and heir of Robert, 12th Lord Willoughby, who was created Earl of Lindsey. He was born 1608, was summoned to the House of Lords as Lord Willoughby in his father's lifetime, 31 October, 1640, and succeeded his father 23 October, 1642, as 2nd Earl of Lindsey. He married (1) 18 April, 1627, Martha, Dowager Countess of Holderness, sister of Charles, 1st Viscount Cullen, who died July, 1641, and he married (2) about 1647, Bridget, widow of the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Edward Sackville, who died 1646, and daughter and heir of Edward Wray, Esq. He died at Campden House, Kensington, 25 July, 1666, aged 58, and was buried at Edenham. Bust, three-quarter face to the right. Long hair; in armour with white collar, right hand resting on helmet. On the picture is painted this inscription:—

35. Thomas Wentworth, 1st Earl of Strafford, K.G., son and heir of Sir William Wentworth, of Wentworth co. York, Bart. He was born on Good Friday, 13 April, 1593, created 2 January, 1639-40, Earl of Strafford, having been previously created 22 July, 1628, Baron Wentworth, and on 13 December, 1628, Viscount Wentworth. He married (1) at Londesborough 22 October, 1611, Margaret, eldest daughter of Francis, 4th Earl of Cumberland. She died *s.p.* August, 1622, and he married (2) 24 February, 1625, Arabella, 2nd daughter of John Holles, 1st Earl of Clare. She died October, 1631. He married (3) October, 1632, Elizabeth, daughter of Sir Godfrey Rodes, of Great Houghton, co. York, who survived him. His history as Lord Lieutenant of Ireland is well known, and he was attainted and executed on

Tower Hill, 12 May, 1641, in his 49th year. Bust, full face, dressed in black, with broad white collar. On canvass  $36 \times 27\frac{3}{4}$  in.

36. Charles Howard, 1st Earl of Carlisle, born 1629, died 24 February, 1684-5. Bust, in oval, three-quarter face to the left, long hair, breastplate and buff sleeves, slashed with white. On canvass  $23 \times 24$  in.
37. Anne Clifford, Countess of Dorset, Pembroke, and Montgomery, daughter and heir of George, 3rd Earl of Cumberland, by Margaret, daughter of Francis, 2nd Earl of Bedford. She was born at Skipton Castle, 30 January, 1589-90, married (1) 25 February, 1608-9, Richard Sackville, 3rd Earl of Dorset, who died on Easter Day, 28 March, 1624, his 35th birthday. She married (2) 3 June, 1630, (as his 2nd wife) Philip Herbert, 4th Earl of Pembroke and Montgomery. He died 23 January, 1649-50. She survived him and died 22 March, 1675-6, in her 87th year. Bust, three-quarter to the right, black head dress, collar coped with lace falling on her shoulders, black gown, 2 coats of arms on the canvass denoting her two marriages. On canvass  $29 \times 24$ . The following inscription is on this picture:—

38. Thomas Howard, Earl of Arundel and Surrey, K.G., son and heir of Philip, Earl of Arundel, the eldest son of Thomas, 4th Duke of Norfolk. He was born 7 July, 1585, married in 1605 Lady Alethea Talbot, 31d daughter and co-heir (and eventually sole heir) of Gilbert Talbot, 7th Earl of Shrewsbury, by Mary, youngest surviving daughter of Sir William Cavendish. He was created 6 June, 1644, Earl of Norfolk. He died at Padua, 26 September, 1646, aged 61, and was buried at Arundel. Bust, three-quarter face to the right, in a black doublet, with a ruff, and wearing a collar of knots and roses. On panel  $30 \times 24$  in.
39. Henry Howard, Earl of Northampton, K.G., younger brother of Thomas, 4th Duke of Norfolk, being 2nd son of Henry, Earl of Surrey, by Frances, daughter of John de Vere, 15th Earl of Oxford. He was born 25 February, 1539-40, was restored in blood (his father having been attainted). 8 May, 1559, created 16 March, 1603-4, Earl of Northampton and Baron Marnhull co. Dorset. He died unmarried at Northampton

House in the Strand (which became in later times Northumberland House), 15 June, 1614, aged 74, and was buried (as Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports) in the chapel of Dover Castle. Bust, three-quarter face to the right, dressed in black, with ruff. He wears a broad brimmed black hat, and a collar of knots and roses with George. On panel  $29\frac{1}{2} \times 26\frac{1}{2}$  in.

40. Thomas Howard, 1st Earl of Suffolk, K.G., 2nd son of Thomas, 4th Duke of Norfolk (but eldest son by his 2nd wife, Margaret, daughter and eventually sole heir of Thomas Lord Audley, of Walden). He was born 24 August, 1561, and succeeded to his mother's estates on her death, 10 January, 1563-4. He was created Lord Howard de Walden by writ 24 October, 1597, and on 21 July, 1603, Earl of Suffolk. He married (1) Mary, 2nd of three sisters and coheirs of George Lord Dacre, already mentioned. She died *s.p.* 7 April, 1578, aged 14, and he married, (2) 1583, Catherine, widow of the Hon. Richard Rich, eldest daughter and coheir of Sir Henry Knyvett, of Charlton, Wilts., by Elizabeth, daughter and heir of Sir James Stumpe, of Bromham, in that county. He died at Suffolk House, near Charing Cross, (the Northampton House above alluded to, which was afterwards called Northumberland House on passing by inheritance to the Percy family) 28 May, 1626, aged 64, and was buried at Walden. He commanded a ship against the Spanish Armada, and in 1605 he discovered the Gunpowder Plot, finding the Barrels of Powder under the Houses of Parliament, and with his uncle, Lord Northampton, was the chief Minister of James I. Bust, three-quarter face to the right, in black, with ruff. He wears a narrow brimmed black hat, and collar of knots and roses with George. On panel.

41. Lucius Cary, 2nd Viscount Falkland, son and heir of Henry, 1st Viscount. He was born 1610, and married 1630, Lettice, daughter of Sir Richard Morison, of Tooley Park, co. Leic. His virtuous and intrepid character is well known in history. He was with the King at Edgehill, and at the siege of Gloucester, and fell at the first battle of Newbury, 20 September, 1643, aged 33, and was buried at Great Tew, co. Oxford. Bust, three-quarter to the right, long hair, broad lace collar, black doublet slashed with white. On canvass  $28 \times 23$ .

42. Sir Philip Howard, brother of Charles, 1st Earl of Carlisle, and 3rd but 2nd surviving son of Sir William Howard, of Naworth, and Mary, daughter of William, 4th Lord Eure. He was Knighted at Canterbury, 26 May, 1660, M.P. for Carlisle in 3 Parliaments, from 1661 to 1681 and he married at St. Martin's-in-the-Fields, 23 April, 1668, Elizabeth, daughter and heir of Sir Robert Newton, of London, Bart., and widow of Sir John Baker, 3rd Bart., of Sissinghurst, Kent. She survived him, and died November, 1693. He died in 1686, and was buried in Exeter Chapel in Westminster Abbey, on 15 April, in that year. He left a son, Philip surviving.

The inscription on this picture is :—

“ Philip Howard, brother to the  
 “ 1st Earl of Carlisle,  
 “ Slain at Rowton Heath, 1645.”

The latter part of this is an error, for it was his uncle Philip Howard, who was slain at Rowton Heath.

He was born 1473, and married (1) Lady Anne Plantagenet, 5th daughter of King Edward IV., by Elizabeth Wydville, his Queen. She died without surviving issue, 1512, and he married (2) Elizabeth, daughter of Edward Stafford, 3rd Duke of Buckingham, by Eleanor, daughter of Henry Percy, 4th Earl of Northumberland. He died at Kenninghall, Norfolk, 25 August, 1554, aged 80, and was buried at Framlingham. To the waist. Three quarter

face to the left. Black cap and black coat with white fur collar and red sleeves, and he wears collar and George and holds a gold wand in his right hand, and a white staff in his left. On panel.

45. Sir George Lisle, son of Lawrence Lisle. His career as a Royalist Commander in the civil war is well known. He was knighted by the King at Oxford, 21 December, 1645. He was born 27 March, 1814, was M.P., for East Cumberland, 1842 to 1879, married 8 August, 1842, Mary Priscilla Harriett, 2nd daughter and coheir of James Parke, Lord Wensleydale, who died 26 August, 1843, a fortnight after the birth of her only child, George James, present and 9th Earl of Carlisle. The Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Charles W. G. Howard, died on Good Friday, 11 April, 1879, at Holker Hall, and was buried at Lanercost, 17 April, 1879. Three-quarter to the right, seated. Dressed in brown coat, holding hat in right hand, and stick in left, Background of trees. On canvass.

47. Anne Viscountess Preston, 2nd daughter of Charles Howard, 1st Earl of Carlisle, by Anne his wife, daughter of Edward Howard, 1st Lord Howard of Escrick. She married 2 August, 1670, Sir Richard Graham, 3rd Bart., of Esk and Netherby, who was created 21 May, 1681, Viscount Preston, and Baron Graham, of Esk, in the Peerage of Scotland. He died 22 November, 1695, aged 47. The date of her death is unknown. To the waist. Her head rests on her right hand,

hair dishevelled. Her left hand holds a paper with this inscription "Nothing can repair my loss." At the back of the chair is a small Statuette of Minerva. On canvass  $24 \times 29$  in.

48. Richard Viscount Preston, son and heir of Sir George Graham, 2nd Bart., of Esk and Netherby, born 24 September, 1648, married as above mentioned Lady Anne Howard. He was M.P., for Cockermouth, 1675-81, and for Cumberland, 1685-7, and having in 1681 been created a Peer of Scotland as above mentioned, James II. created him an English Peer as Baron Esk, about the time of his dethronment, but this was not recognised by the House of Lords, who declared the patent void in 1689, and ordered him to prison for his presumption in claiming his writ. He was afterwards taken prisoner when about to join James II. in France, and on 17 January, 1789-90, was sentenced to death, having been found guilty of high treason, but was subsequently pardoned, and he died 22 November, 1695, aged 47, and was buried at Nunnington, co. York, Bust, three-quarter to the right, long hair, black coat and broad white collar. On canvass  $28\frac{1}{2} \times 24\frac{1}{2}$  in.<sup>30</sup>

He died unmarried at Padua, 13 December, 1677, and was buried at Arundel, nearly a year afterwards, 11 December, 1678, being succeeded by his brother Henry. Bust in oval, three-quarter to right. In white full bottomed wig, white handkerchief and armour. In oil, on copper.
5. Thomas Howard, Earl of Arundel, grandson of the 4th Duke of Norfolk and grandfather of the 5th and 6th Dukes. He was born 7 July, 1585, married 1605, Lady Alethea Talbot, and he died at Padua, 26 September, 1646. On Ivory.

6. Sir John Howard, K.G., 1st Duke of Norfolk, so created, 28 June, 1483, as also Earl Marshal of England, son and heir of Sir Robert Howard, Knt., by Margaret, daughter of Thomas Mowbray, Duke of Norfolk. He was born about 1430, and was slain at Bosworth, 22 August, 1485, having married (1) 1442 Catherine, daughter of William, Lord Molines and (2) 1466, Margaret, widow of John Norreys, and previously of Nicholas Wyfold, and daughter, of Sir John Chedworth. Bust in circle, three-quarter face to the right. In black doublet slashed with red and small white collar, black cap and white feather. He holds gloves in his right hand. In oil, on panel.
7. Katherine, daughter of William, Lord Molines, and 1st wife of John, 1st Duke of Norfolk, K.G., to whom she was married as above-mentioned in 1442. She died 1452, and was buried at Stoke Neyland. Bust in circle, three-quarter face to the left. In white gown with gold brocade pattern and sleeves, black cap, and white feather. In oil, on panel.

5. Henry Howard, Earl of Northampton (see No. 39). Three-quarter face to the left, black beard and moustache, small black toque with white feather, black doublet, large lace ruff. On a blue ground. Painted on card, 1606.
6. George Clifford, 3rd Earl of Cumberland, son and heir of Henry, 2nd Earl, by his 2nd wife Anne, daughter of William, Lord Dacre. He was therefore first cousin to Elizabeth Dacre, the wife of Lord William Howard. He was born 8 August, 1558. Married 24 June, 1577, Lady Margaret Russell, 3rd and youngest daughter of Francis, 2nd Earl of Bedford. He died 30 October, 1605, aged 47. He was a great Naval Commander, and made nine voyages, most of which were to the West Indies, where, in 1598, he took Porto Rico.

Three-quarter face to the left, long black hair, and earrings, a gilt gorget with alternate C and S in the border, white doublet. Painted on card. On this miniature is the following inscription :—

“Anno Domini 1594. Æt. suæ 37° ”

7. Thomas Howard, 4th duke of Norfolk, born 10 March, 1536, beheaded 2 June, 1572. Three-quarter face to the left. Short hair, small black cap and white feather, dark armour and small frill, pink scarf. On a tawny ground. Painted on card. On this miniature is the following inscription :—

“Ætat. suæ 19.”

#### MINIATURES.—CASE III.

1. Colonel Robert Lilburne. He was the eldest son of Richard Lilburne, of Thickley Punchardon, co. Durham, by Margaret, his wife, daughter of Thomas Hixon, Yeoman of the Wardrobe to Queen Elizabeth. He was born in 1613, being 2 years old at the Heralds' Visitation of Durham in 1615. At the beginning of the Civil War he entered the Parliamentary army, and in 1644 was a Captain in the Earl of Manchester's army, and in 1647 Colonel of a regiment of foot in the “New Model” army. He was one of the leaders in the opposition of the Army to the Parliament. In 1648, he put down a rising in Lancashire under Sir R. Tempest, and received the thanks of Parliament and the grant of Bear Park, and in December, 1648, he was nominated one of the King's judges, and as such signed his death-warrant, his name being 28th in the list of signatures. In 1651 he defeated Lord Derby, who was marching to join Charles II. at Worcester. In 1655, he and Colonel Charles Howard were appointed deputies from Lord Lambert, who was Major General for Yorkshire, Durham, Northumberland, Cumberland, and Westmoreland. He was M.P. for the North Riding of Yorkshire, 1656. At the Restoration he was one of the nineteen persons excluded from the Act of indemnity, except by a special Act of Parliament. He was tried 16 October, 1660, and sentenced to death, but the sentence was commuted to imprisonment for life, either in Plymouth Castle or St. Nicholas Island. He died at the latter place in August, 1665. He had married Margaret, daughter of Richard Beke, of Hadenham, co. Bucks., by whom he left three sons. Three-quarter face to the right, long black hair, and very slight moustache, black armour, and plain linen collar. Blue background.

2. Lady Effingham, afterwards Countess of Nottingham, viz.: Katherine, eldest daughter of Henry Carey, 1st Lord Hunsdon, by Ann, his wife, daughter of Sir Thomas Morgan. She married in July, 1563, as his 1st wife, Charles Howard, 2nd Lord Howard, of Effingham, who succeeded to the title, January, 1572-3, on the death of his father, William, 1st Lord Howard of Effingham, who was younger son of Thomas, 2nd Duke of Norfolk. He was created 22 October, 1596, Earl of Nottingham, having been made K.G. in 1585, and Lord High Admiral in the same year, and as such was in command of the English Fleet at the defeat of the Spanish Armada. She died at Arundel House, Middlesex, 25 February, 1602-3, and was buried at Chelsea. Three-quarter face to the left, long hair and jewelled tiara. Blue background, with stars and rays descending on her head.
3. Lady Arabella Stuart (so thought to be). Three-quarter face to the left, low brocaded gown with red scarf over right shoulder, long hair. Blue background.
4. 155. Lady Anne Churchill, 2nd daughter of John Churchill, 1st Duke of Marlborough, and second wife of Charles Spencer, 3rd Earl of Sunderland, to whom she was married January, 1699-1700. She died 15 April, 1716. Three-quarter length, three-quarter face to left. She is represented sitting with a child standing by her knee, and resting her left hand on his shoulder, and holding his hand with her right hand. She is dressed in a white gown with blue drapery over her knees. On canvass.
156. Lady Mary Howard, 3rd daughter of Charles, 3rd Earl of Carlisle. Face three-quarter to the right, dressed in a blue gown, and resting her hands on a straw flower-crowned hat. On canvass.
157. Lady Anne Howard, 2nd daughter of Charles, 3rd Earl of Carlisle, born 1696, married (1) 8 May, 1718, Richard Ingram, 5th Vincent Irwin, who died of the small-pox, 10 April, 1721, without issue, and she married (2) 11 June, 1737, at St. George's, Hanover Square, Colonel William Douglas, of Kirkness, in Scotland. Face three-quarter to the right, dressed in red gown, holding in her right hand a pearl bracelet which she is placing round her left wrist. On canvass 35 × 27 in.

158. Lady Elizabeth Howard, eldest daughter of Charles, 3rd Earl of Carlisle, born 1695, married 15 April, 1719 (1) Nicholas Lechmere, Lord Lechmere, of Evesham, co. Worcester, so created 4 September, 1721. He died of apoplexy, aged 52, at Camden House, 18 June, 1727, without issue, his peerage becoming extinct; and she married (2) 25 October, 1728, Sir Thomas Robinson, of Rokeby Park, co. York, Bart., and she died *s.p.* 10 April, 1739, æt 44. Face three-quarter to the left, dressed in white satin gown, holding a basket of fruit and flowers in her left, and an apple in her right hand. On canvass 35 × 27 in.

## WEST WALL.

159. Josceline Percy, 11th Earl of Northumberland, dyed at Turin,  $\frac{21}{31}$  May, 1670, ætat 25. Head and shoulders in oval, face three-quarter to left, long red hair, grey drapery over his shoulder.
160. Charles Howard, 2nd son of Charles, 3rd Earl of Carlisle, Colonel of a Regiment of Foot in 1738. Face three-quarter to the right, dressed in a grey velvet coat, a waistcoat, and wearing a full bottomed powdered wig. His left hand gloved holds a glove. On canvass 35 × 27 in.
161. Arthur Capel, 1st Earl of Essex, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, 1672. He was eldest son and heir of Arthur, 1st Lord Capel, of Hadham, by Elizabeth, daughter and heir of Sir Charles Moryson, Bart., of Cassiobury Park, co. Herts. He was baptized 28 January, 1631-2, created on 20 April, 1661, Viscount Malden, co. Essex, and Earl of Essex; married 19 May, 1653, Lady Elizabeth Percy, daughter of Algernon, 10th Earl of Northumberland, by Anne, his 1st wife, daughter of William Cecil, 2nd Earl of Salisbury. He died in the Tower 13 July, 1683. (See Nos. 164, 165, 168, 169.) Face three-quarter to left, nearly full-face, light moustache, light full bottomed wig, brown satin drapery, and white tie. On canvass 29 × 24 in.
162. Henry Capel, Lord Capel of Tewkesbury, so created 11 April, 1692, 2nd son of Arthur, Lord Capel of Hadham, and younger brother of Arthur, 1st Earl of Essex, baptised 6 March, 1637-8, married Dorothy, daughter and coheir of Richard Bennett, of Kew Green, Surrey, brother to Sir Thomas Bennett, Bart, of Babraham. He died without issue, at Dublin Castle, 30 May, 1696, and was buried at Hadham, when his title became extinct. He was uncle to the wife of Charles, 3rd Earl of Carlisle. Face three-quarter to the left, slight dark moustache, and brown hair or wig, and wearing a white collar and brown drapery over his shoulder. On canvass 30 × 25 in.

SOUTH WALL.

163. Queen Henrietta Maria. Head and shoulders; green silk gown, with jewelled stone in front. On canvass.
164. Lady Anne Cecil, daughter of William, 2nd Earl of Salisbury, by Catherine, daughter of Thomas Howard, 1st Earl of Suffolk, and 1st wife to Algernon, 10th Earl of Northumberland. She died of small-pox, 6 December, 1637. Head and shoulders; face three-quarter to the left, light hair in curls, low blue satin gown. On canvass.

165. Algernon Percy, 10th Earl of Northumberland, Lord High Admiral to King Charles I., and General of his land forces. Born in London, October, 1602, died 15 October, 1668, ætat 66. He married (1) before 1630, Lady Anne Cecil, above mentioned (No. 164), and (2) 1 October, 1642, Elizabeth, 2nd daughter of Theophilus Howard, 2nd Earl of Suffolk, by Elizabeth, daughter of George Hume, Earl of Dunbar. Head and shoulders, three-quarter face to the right, white collar and black cloak. On canvass.

He was the eldest son and heir of Arthur, 1st Lord Capel, of Hadham, by Elizabeth, daughter and heir of Sir Charles Moryson, Bart., of Cassiobury Park, co. Herts., and he was baptized 28 January, 1631-2, was created 20 April, 1661, Viscount Malden, co. Essex, and Earl of Essex. He married, 19 May, 1653, Lady Elizabeth Percy (*see* No. 169), and he died in the Tower 13 July, 1683, buried in the chapel of St. Peter ad Vincula, in the Tower. His daughter, Anne, became the wife of Charles, 3rd Earl of Carlisle. Three-quarter face to left, long brown hair, brown drapery. On canvass.

169. Elizabeth, Countess of Essex, with her son and daughter. The latter was afterwards wife of Charles, 3rd Earl of Carlisle. Lady Essex was born 1 December, 1636, and was the 5th daughter of Algernon Percy, 10th Earl of Northumberland, by his first wife, Anne, daughter of William Cecil, 2nd Earl of Salisbury. She was married at Petworth, 19 May, 1653, and she died 5 February, 1717-18, aged 81, and was buried at Watford, Herts. Small full lengths. On the right Lady Essex in widow's weeds rests her head on her right hand, and her left on her daughter's shoulder, who holds a basket of flowers on her mother's lap. On the left her son in fancy dress with brown full bottomed wig and red drapery. Replica of picture at Castle Howard. On canvass  $29 \times 21\frac{3}{4}$  in.
170. A man in armour. Full face, black hair and moustache, high white collar. On canvass,  $29 \times 24$  in.

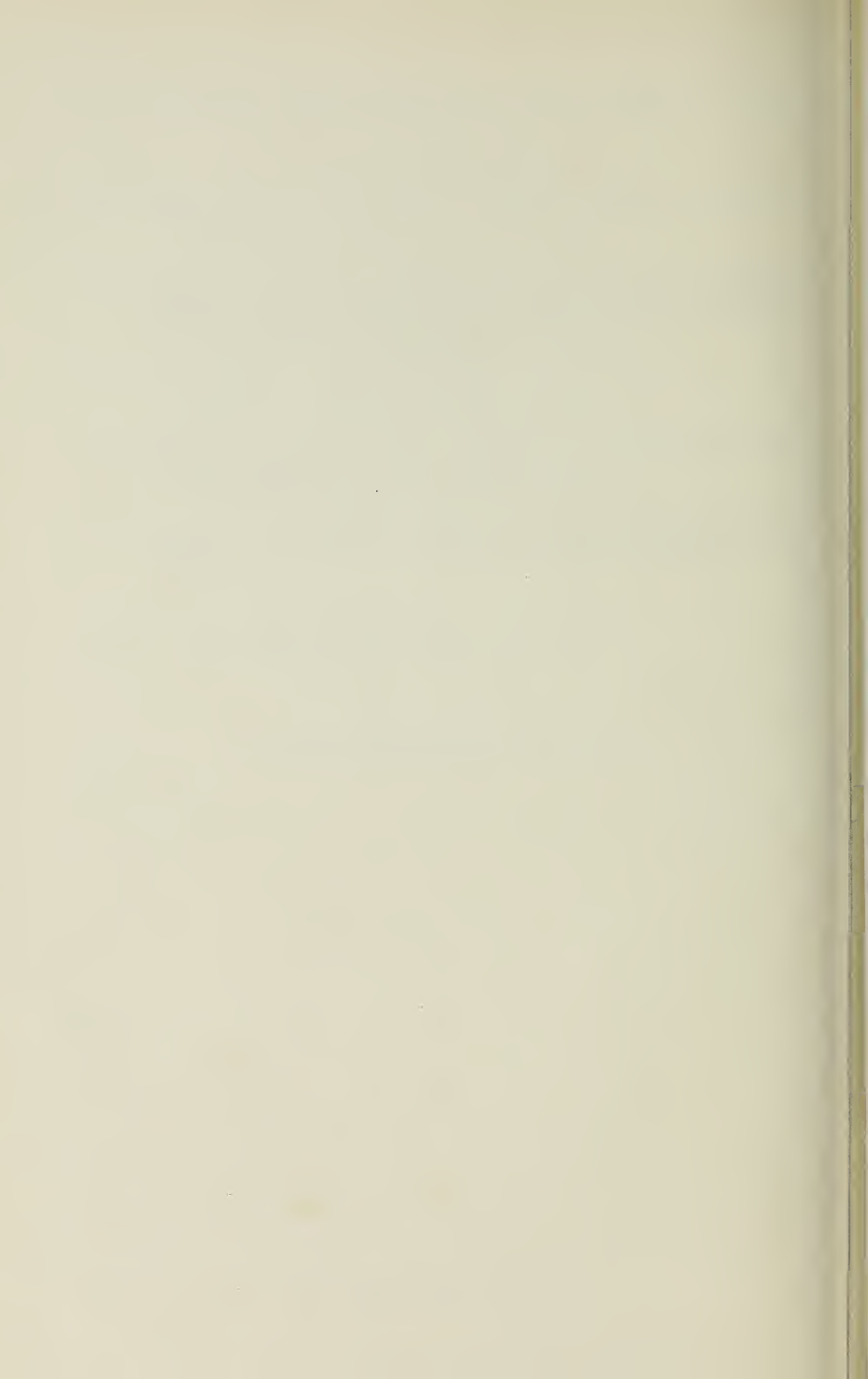

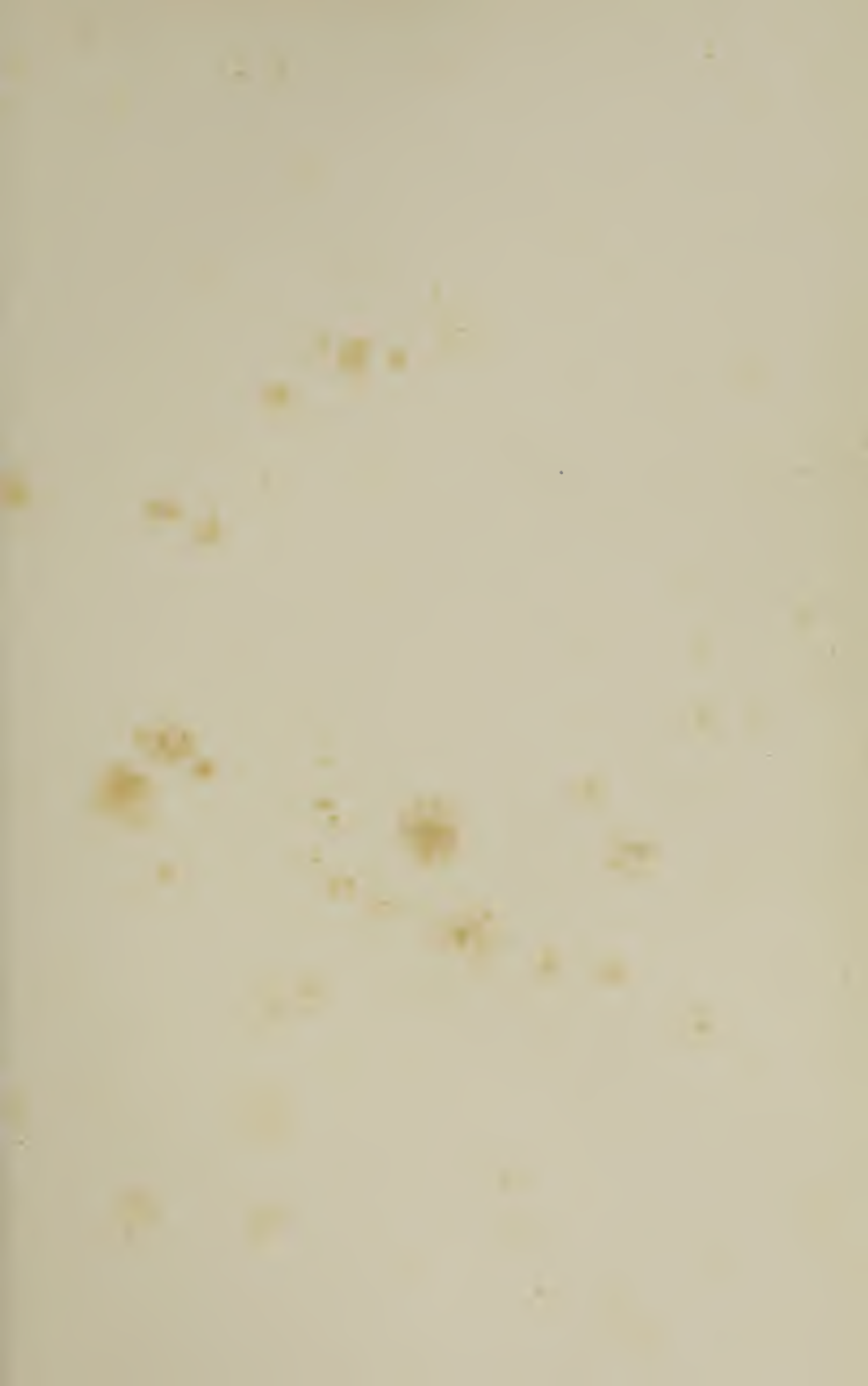






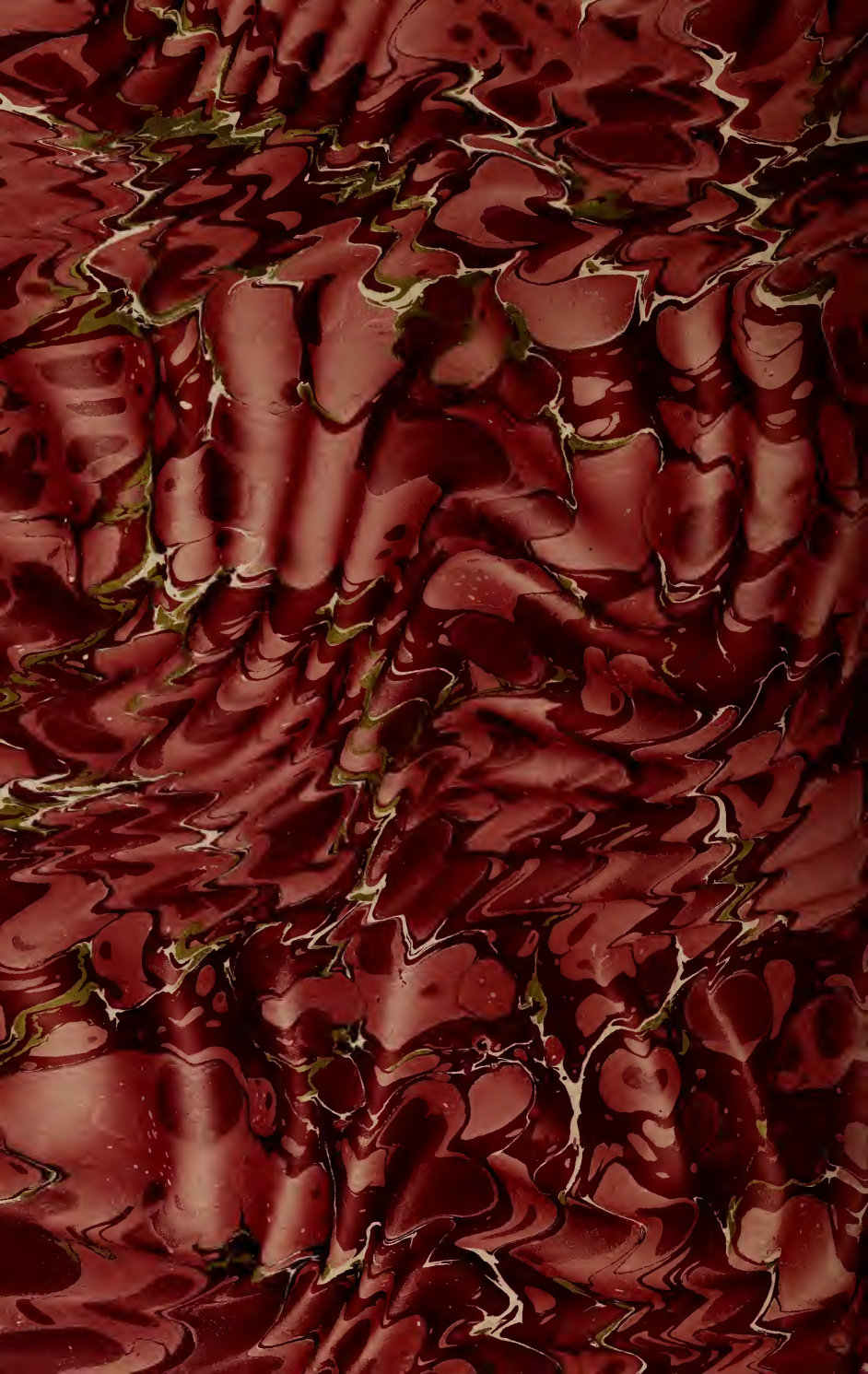














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
