**OUR PLANTS**— Are in most splendid health and vigor, of the best size and shape for packing, and put up in the most approved style for safe transit. They are usually sent by express— for which there are excellent facilities at this point.

**DIRECTIONS**— Don't fail to give name and Post Office address with every order and on every letter or postal card. As a rule, we prefer expressing, where available; therefore, please give us the name of your regular express office, in case you expect the plants by express.

**PRICES**— Named herein, are, when cash in full accompanies order, to be to the amount of \$1 or over, for parcels of plants by mail or express **PREPAID TO THE PURCHASER**.

**TERMS**— Net cash here to amount of Bill— with order, or (if customer prefers not to send cash with order, and if not too distant) by Express with Bill "C. O. D.," *i.e.*, "Collect on Delivery" of goods, with express charges and return charges on the money added. Of course it is much cheaper, and better every way, to send cash with order. After delivering at Express, Post-Office, or Depot, our responsibility ceases. Errors and mistakes of ours cheerfully corrected. We want to hear from every purchaser, and every lot sent out.

**REMITTANCES**— In registered letters or bank notes by mail at sender's risk, though generally safe. By postal orders, New York, Chicago or St. Louis exchange (NOT private checks), or prepaid by express, are the surest modes.

**PURCHASERS' SELECTIONS**— Gladly allowed, and the choice new varieties, usually included in sets or tens, as far as practicable, without extra charge; but at wholesale, as per ten, the selection must be ours, to preserve the assortment.

**DESCRIPTIONS OF NEW PLANTS**— We give our own as far as we have had time to test— otherwise we must give such as we get with the plants.

**TIME OF PLANTING**— From time Spring frosts cease up to June 15th. A most admirable feature of pot grown plants, is the perfect safety and facility of using to advantage up to a very late period, say July 10th, for instance, where new places cannot be got ready in the usual Spring season for planting, or where seeds, etc., have failed. The only prerequisite is to choose, if possible, a moist, cloudy time for planting out, or use shade and water temporarily till rain comes. For very late planting, the Monthly Roses are best for bloom; next the quick growers and perpetual bloomers, as Ageratum, Zonale and H. P. Geraniums, Lantanas, Petunias, Verbenas, Salvias, Vincas, also the beautiful Achyranthus and Coleus— all good but C. Vershaeffelt especially.

Some Noisettes and a few Bourbons are ordinarily indifferent bloomers, needing old wood, hence more room and age. But, as a class, for those wishing roses and the most exquisite rose-buds at all seasons, for all purposes, these Monthlies are incomparably the most useful of all. Many kinds—we believe most of the good growers—will endure over Winter here, and still farther north, by covering in Fall a good mound of earth or leaves over the crowns, laying boards and litter over the mound to keep off wet. We have thus wintered perfectly Appoline, Malmaison, Rosamene, Joseph Gourdon and many others. Though the tops die down, the crowns in Spring throw up strong new flower shoots. But suppose they die because tender—why reject them? Why such excessive economy in the matter of roses—flowers—alone? A dollar for a dinner, or "show" of a few hours, \$50 or \$100 for a new suit, is not deemed extravagant now. Then the ceaseless expense for eating, drinking, and display of jewelry, confectionery, ale, tobacco, etc. WHY NOT LOVE AND ADORN OUR HOMES as well—laying out EACH SPRING a few dollars, it may be, to bedeck them with new, smiling, summer dresses, to give us at each outgoing and incoming a glad welcome?

Patronized as are tobacco, confectionery and other fancy stores, saloons, etc., who doubts either their high rank and importance or our most exalted civilization? But are Nurseries and Floral Establishments (including Monthly Roses) any less essential and worthy? Monthly Roses we think the most deserving and neglected of all Flowering Plants—neglected because esteemed tender, when, to a genuine Rose lover, they are a perpetual feast, succeeding admirably in open ground, and paying for themselves every day while in bloom.

Persons acquainted only with the old Sword Lily Gladiolus can scarcely imagine the improvements recently made upon them. For purity and brilliancy of color, from white to dazzling crimson, combined with soft, rich salmon and velvet shades, the New Hybrid Gladiolus are unrivaled among Summer flowering bulbs. A single bulb sometimes produces several stems of bloom, and a succession of flowers for two months. The cultivation is of the simplest description. Plant the bulbs for early bloom the second week in April, following up your planting every two weeks till the second week in June. They delight in rich soil, and should be planted from two to three inches deep, and six to nine inches apart, according to the size of the bulb. Those who purchase by the hundred, and plant in rows, may place them two feet or more apart from row to row—others plant in flower beds *singly*. Growing, as they will, above Geraniums, Verbenas, and most bedding plants, they not only have a very pretty effect, but you make the most of the small space allotted to you. This beautiful tribe of plants should be planted everywhere. When cut and placed in water, the flower buds expand and last a long time. Planted by hundreds in the borders among evergreens or foliage plants, they brighten and enliven the beds during the Summer and Autumn months; cheaper varieties can be supplied for this purpose. In the Fall, when the bloom is over, take up the bulbs, allowing them to dry out of doors a few days; take off the tops, and put away in a place free from frost and moisture. Examine them occasionally, to see that they are not too dry, or suffering from dampness. I offer them in collections.

## LILIES.

The Lily always has been and always will be a favorite. There are no plants more suitable for out-door culture. None of the new varieties have displaced the old White Garden Lily. None surpasses the snowy beauty of *L. Longiflorum*, with flowers nearly six inches across, and very fragrant; while for intrinsic beauty, the varieties of *Lilium Lancifolium* are not excelled by any other flower.

Plant in the Spring, as soon as the ground is workable, four inches deep, and allow them to remain in the ground for years.

Lilies are moderately well adapted for pot culture. A mixture of fibrous loam and leaf-mould, equal parts, with a little sand, makes the best compost for them. Six-inch pots are the best size, the Fall the best season to pot, though it can be done through Winter and early Spring with very satisfactory results. If potted in Fall, they should be wintered in a cold frame, cool cellar, or on the floor of the greenhouse. Water should be freely given during growth. When in bloom, they should have a cool, airy place, such as a shaded porch, or well aired sitting room, where they will bloom in perfection.

#### RANUNCULUS.

Neglected, but very beautiful in brightness of color and symmetry of form. They flower late in May or June, and when massed in a bed, are very effective. The voluminous directions often given for their culture bewilder the reader. Plant in a good, friable loam, with decayed cow-dung thoroughly incorporated; and when planting, let the sod be well trodden down, so that the roots will be firmly fixed to the depth of one inch, and six to nine inches apart. Water sparingly till well established. It is not considered hardy. The spring would be the best time to plant. The root, like the Anemone, is not particularly attractive. It is surprising so small a root can produce such beautiful flowers. After blooming, take up and treat as directed for the Anemone. For house and green-house culture, they are moderately well adapted.
