### STATEMENT

I, Arthur D. Cunningham, Captain, Infantry, O-299179, have known Miss Ida E. Jackson for an approximate period of some four months. During that time I was the Assistant Billeting Officer in charge of the Kyoto Hotel where Miss Jackson lived. Upon my taking over this position 1 August 1948, it would have been rather hard not to know Miss Jackson as she was pressing an investigation on the former billeting officer by the I Corps Inspectors General Section. Full report may be referred to including recommendations and findings by the I. G. I Corp. Instructions were forthcoming from my immediate superiors to extend Miss Jackson every courtesy. At this time Miss Jackson was just completing her original contract time in this theater and was about to return to the Z. I. It was so recommended by the I. G. that she did not return for another tour, as it was not conducive of her good health. In March of this year Miss Jackson returned to Japan and from the minute she stepped in the Kyoto Hotel she became a problem. She was treated with respect but at the same time was firmly held to the obedience of the hotel regulations. Miss Jackson became sick some weeks later and was finally ordered back to the Z. I. by the 49th General Hospital in Tokyo. The hotel's checked property book was cleared by Capt. Glismann who accepted Miss Jackson's luggage and packed her belongings for shipment to the Z. I. All of Miss Jackson's property was cleared from her room at this time. That is all her property that was there. I have heard from many of her friends that she had the habit of giving her things away during times that was having a lapse of memory or coma. This was exemplified by the fact that she gave her portable typewriter to a Japanese doctor working on the team. Upon her arrival back in the U. S. she was very put out that this item was not returned to her. Meanwhile this doctor came forward with the item and it was packed and forwarded to her.

It is this officer's opinion that Miss Jackson should realize her condition to the extent of some much needed treatment. Foreign tours of duty do not lend proper living conditions to many people that are in the best of health, let alone those that inwardly ill.

I can only say thru my personal observations that Miss Jackson's attitude toward many of the people she came in contact with, was one of seclusion, in addition to being morbid. There were many days at the billet when I would pass by Miss Jackson and would bid her good-bay of



which I would get no answer or recognition. This to me is not the normal action of a normal person. To the best of my knowledge and belief, Miss Jackson's trouble is all in her mind.
