The vintage has now progressed so far as to permit of an estimate of the production being made at from 30,000,000 to 40,000,000 gallons of both dry and sweet classes. The yield of grapes for pany such communications, not necessarily for both raisins and wine is one of the largest, if not the largest, known in the history of this state. Several vineyards which produced only 200 tons of grapes last year have yielded 400 tons this season. Instances of enormous production are furnished in the cases of some exceptionally rich

> In spite of this wonderful yield and partly because of miscalculation as to the size of the crop, the price of grapes has been the highest in twenty-five years, when once \$30 a ton was paid. Dry wine grapes have brought under contract from \$20 up, and in the instances of exceptional varieties as much as \$35 a ton. The general average, however, has been about \$25 a ton. The result of this has been the putting into the pockets of the vineyardists of several million dollars, which will enable them to increase their vineyard acreage and beautify their homes or build new houses. In fact, several cases are known in which persons who bought vineyards last year have received sufficient money from their grapes this season to pay the entire price of their land.

Considerable injury has been caused to grapes, especially in the lowlands. by the heavy rains of the past week, and many thousands of tons of grapes are yet unpicked, but a fortnight of dry weather would offset the damage to a considerable extent, and in any event the loss from this cause will not effect the general result of the vintage as heretofore set forth.-Press Demo-
