Oct. 9.—The commonwealth tariff bill, introduced in the federal house of representatives yesterday by Mr. Kingston, minister of trade and commerce, provides for the following duties: Sparkling wines, 12s, per gallon; other wines, bottled, 8s.; in bulk, 6s.; manufactured tobacco, 3s. 6d, per pound; luported leaf tobacco, 1s. 6d, per pound; excise; 1s.; cigars, 5s. 6d., plus 15 per cent. ad valorem; cigarettes, 6s. 6d.; sugar, imported, f6 per ton, excise £3, with a rebate of £2 if grown by white labor only; cottons and linens 10 and 15 per cent.; furniture, 20 per cent.

While waiting at the Ladysmith station for the Victoria express, Mr. Dunsmuir was asked by a Leader reporter if the interview which appeared in the Victoria Daily Thies a few days ago, to the effect that he would not resign, but would meet the House with twenty-two supporters, was correct. "Yes," replied Mr. Dunssauir, "that's about right, I'll have twenty-one or twenty-two supporters when the House meets."

"But what about the alarming reports "But what about the alarming reports in the opposition papers that you must resign at once, that you are tired of politics, and wanted to retire?"
"I am not responsible for what the opposition papers say," said Mr. Dunsmuir, laughing. "I suppose they must have something to say,"
"Then those statements of theirs are not correct?"

"Thea those statements of theirs are not correct?"

"No, they are absolute nonsense. Why should I resign, just because Mr. Brown was defeated? That makes no difference; we have the support of the majority of the House, and I have not the least intention of resigning, until the opening of the House is tested. He was also president of the Triesmial Council of the Orangemen of the World, He was controller of customs under Sir John Thompson's administration, and held that office until 1895, when he retired from the ministry owing to his difference of opinion with the cabinet on the Manitoba school question.

The following is the report of the San Francisco coal market for the week ending October 3rd, issued by J. W. Harrison, the coal and metal broker:

Since the steamer Venturia left there have been but two arrivals of coal from Australia, viz.; S. P. Hitchcock, 3.270 tons; Enterpe, 1,678 tons; total, 4,957 tons. There is only one vessel due here from Newcastle during October, so that the colonial fuel here in yard will amount to very little for the next sixty days. There are named on the coal chartered list 28 vessels carrying over 80,000 tons. At this time last year there were 37 vessels carrying 10,000 tons. Latest freight quotations from Newcastle are higher, caused by a weakening here in outward grain freights and the detention in loading vessels at this end. The asking price for Australian coal cargoes for future loading do not leave much margin for profit, as competition is very keen from our coast collicries.

Besides, feel oil is gaining new advocates monthly, and, as a steam producer is acquiring supremacy over coal in all branches. Its general use may eventually cause an advance in price, and may check its consumption somewhat. Many of these districts, particularly Victoria West, Rock Bay, and James Bay, could not be adequately sewered under the ordinary system, The rentals which were collected from the system would be utilized in still further extending it. The charge on the city for interest and sinking fund would be \$4.800, but it must be taken into consideration that the scavenger fees would be less and the charges for majntenance of the isolation hospital should be materially reduced.

The system had been adopted by the council after a visit to Vancouver and an examination of the system there. Mayor Garden and the engineer of Vancouver had gone East and had selected the septic system as the one best adapted for their needs there, and in turn Victoria had come to a similar conclusion. The cost of bringing the sewerage of Victoria West and the low lying district of Rock Bay out by Henley Point would be so large as to be practically prohibitive. BURIED IN THE SAND.

Vast Wealth That Lies Scattered

There is a popular belief that vast wealth lies buried deep between the sand and rocks of our coasts. Ship after ship laden with ingots and coinage has struck on the British beaches and gone to pieces during the last five hundred years. From time to time hundreds of pounds worth of gold has been showered on the seashore and picked up and used; yet there still remain something like eighty millions sterling in gold and silver under the sea.

When the Jonkheer Meester Van de Wall, a Dutch East indiaman, struck the iron-bound sea-front of the Lizard many years ago, she went to pieces before anything could be done to save her. Some fishermen from Penberth Cove, while engaged in fishing up blocks of tin, which formed part of the vessel's cargo, found a tin box lying in sixfathom water. Being opened, it was found to contain coins to the value of £13,000. It is said that there are other boxes of gold, silver, and banknoves lying among the rocks and sands where the ship sank.

In 1874 a Spanish galleon went ashore near the Lizard, having on board many thousands of pounds' worth of bar gold and money, which were being carried to London for safety during the unsettled state of affairs in Spain. The greater part of this vast wealth still lies awaiting recovery between the rocks, which have, even at low water, six feet of water over them.

E. C. HAWKINS WILL BUILD A STEAM LINE

Thirty Miles of Road to Be Constructed From Klondike City to Grand Forks -A Local Project.

To-day Beanmont Boggs, secretary of the British Columbia Agriculture Association, with his staff, moved from the offices at the exhibition grounds-to the market building. A complete financial report of the result of the exhibition has not as yet been made out. The total receipts of money taken in at the gafe, however, has been ascertained to be \$5,775.25. a figure very encouraging. 

Comparatively few people realize what remarkable speed dogs are capable. Some remarkable statistics in regard to this have been gathered by M. Dusolier

a French scientist.

After pointing out the marvellous endurance shown by little fox terriers who follow their masters patiently for hours, while the latter are riding on bisceles or in carriages, he says that even greater endurance is shown, by certain wild animals that are akin to dogs.

Thus the wolf can run between fifty and sixty miles in one night, and an arctic fox can do quite as well, if not better.

Nansen met one of these foxes on the ice at a point more than sexenty miles northwest of the Sannikow Territory, which is 480 miles from the Asiaticonst. Esquimau and Siberian dogs can travel forty-five miles on the ice in five hours, and there is one case on record in which a team of Esquimau dogs travelled six and a half miles in twenty-eight minutes.

According to M. Dusolier, the speed of the shepherd dogs and those used to bunting ranges from ten to fifteen yards a second. English setters and pointers

a second. English setters and pointers hunt at the rate of eighteen to nineteen riles an hour, and they can maintain this speed for at least two hours.

Festhouds are extraordinarily swift, as is proved by the fact that a dog of this breed once beat a thoroughbred horse, covering four miles in six and one-half minutes, which was at the rate of nearly sighteen variety a second.

covering four miles in six and ope-half minutes, which was at the rate of nearly eighteen yards a second.

Greyhounds are the swiftest of all four-footed creatures, and their speed may be regarded as equal to that of carrier pigeons. English greyhounds, which are carefully selected, and which are used for coursing, are able to cover at full gallop a space between eighteen and twenty-three yards every second.

How great an achievement this is may be judged from the fact that a thorough-hred horse rarely, if ever, exceeds nine-teen yards. Moreover, it is said that a hare, at its greatest speed, never goes faster than at the rate of eighteen yards. These interesting statistics are exciting much comment among sportsmen and other lovers of dogs, and the opinion is unanimous that M. Dusolier has fully proved the right of the greyhound to rank as the swiftest of quadrupeds. Express engines only surpass them.—London Mail
