We use only the short piece root graft for apples which makes the best trees for Iowa planters.

LEIVLAND.—The finest early variety we have ever seen. Ripens with Yellow Transparent, but is a better apple to handle. Apples sold on this market at \$1.00 per bushel when other summer apples were sold at thirty or forty cents.

WINDSOR APPLE:— Originated in Wisconsin and grown in Iowa County for 18 years. You must try it to appreciate its value. Apple large, red, sub acid, season December to March. Am. Pom. Society reported it favorable where tried. Recommended for trial by Prof. H. C. Price, of Ames. One of the varieties that took the first prize at the Paris Exposition in 1900. Another year's fruiting of this splendid variety only strengthens our claims for it.

WINTER BANANA:—The name is most appropriate as it has a delightful banana perfume. Fruit keeps well until spring; the color is a striking red blush on a deep yellow ground; it is of large size and very showy in appearance, roundish inclining to be conical, stalk $\frac{3}{4}$ of an inch long, cavity moderate, apex shallow. Originated in Indiana. Tree a very early fruiter.

McINTOSH:—The original tree was discovered and saved with several other seedlings of about 10 or 15 years old, by John McIntosh, in clearing a building place in the present village of Dundale, Ontario, Canada, about 1798. The original tree, over one hundred years old, is still fruiting. It did not reach the United States until after 1870.

Chas. Downing described it as "a good annual bearer of fair handsome fruit of excellent quality and valuable for home use and market." It belongs to the Fameuse group and does well wherever tried. Season, six to eight weeks later than Fameuse.
