PRELIMINARY EXAMINATION. Graduates from recognized academies, colleges, colleges of pharmacy, scientific schools or like institutions, and students presenting regents' or teachers' certificates or certificates of competency from the president or censors of the medical society of the county from which they come, will not be required to pass the preliminary examination on entering the school.

All others will be required to pass an examination by a page written at the time, of which the orthography, grammatical construction and penmanship will be considered, and in arithmetic, grammar, geography, and the elements of natural philosophy.

Monthly Written Examinations of the candidates for primary or final examination are held during the term. A printed schedule of these examinations is furnished the class.

Examination in Primary Studies. Students who have attended two full courses of lectures in the departments of Anatomy, Physiology, Materia Medica and Chemistry may be examined on these subjects at the close of the term, and if the examinations are passed satisfactorily, they are examined only in the other three departments (Surgery, Practice and Obstetrics) at the end of their third course (see graded course, page 7).

Union University includes the ALBANY MEDICAL COLLEGE, Albany College of Pharmacy, Albany Law School, and the Dudley Observatory, all at Albany, and Union College and the School of Civil Engineering at Schenectady.

The faculty are gratified in seeing that the changes made in the course of study, and the higher requirements demanded for graduation, continue to meet with the approval of the Alumni and the profession generally.

The college building, situated on Eagle street, is well appointed in its lecture rooms, laboratories, dissecting rooms, library and museums. Extensive improvements have been made to the building during the last few years, a large and perfectly arranged dissecting room having been built in the upper story, furnished with every convenience for the use of the classes in practical anatomy, together with a private dissecting room and a physiological laboratory. Special arrangements have been made by which an abundant supply of material is secured. The chemical laboratory was rebuilt in 1884, and a two story building erected, fitted with every requisite for the illustration of the lectures, and the use of the students in practical chemistry, while "Alumni Hall," constituting the south wing of the college building, was greatly improved and refurnished throughout at about the same time, and is used for the classes in histology and pathological anatomy, and for other college exercises.

During the summer of 1887, the anatomical amphitheatre, in which most of the lectures are delivered, was entirely remodelled and furnished with roomy, comfortable chairs which proved a great improvement upon the benches which they replaced. The entire building is now heated by steam and the ventilation made perfect, so that all halls, lecture-rooms and ante-rooms are at all times equably warmed and amply supplied with fresh air. These improvements were completed before the opening of the last session.

The location of the college at Albany is such as to afford superior advantages to the student. The hospitals and dispensaries furnish always an abundant supply of material for the illustration of clinical medicine and surgery, while the museums are especially rich in anatomical and pathological preparations, unequaled in their variety and rarity. They contain the valuable morbid specimens accumulated by the late Drs. March, Armsby and McNaughton, and the pathological specimens, the Sydenham Society plates on diseases of the skin, and Böck's anatomical models recently

added by Dr. Vander Veer. The library of the college contains nearly 5,000 volumes, and additions to it are being constantly made.

The aim of the faculty is to make the course practical and scientific. It combines didactic lectures, recitations, practical work in the laboratories and dissecting room, and clinical instruction.

The Albany Hospital, St. Peter's Hospital, Child's Hospital, County Hospital, together with the Eye and Ear Infirmary and the Dispensaries connected with each, are, by the regulations of their governing boards, made available for clinical purposes to the students.

The appointments to positions in the Albany Hospital and St. Peter's Hospital as resident physician and surgeon, and first and second assistants, are annually made, and are competed for by members of the graduating class.

COURSE OF INSTRUCTION.

Six or more lectures or clinics are given each week day except upon Saturday, when the forenoon only is occupied. Laboratory and dissecting classes, quizzes, etc., are arranged to meet at hours which do not conflict with the lectures. The order of lectures and clinics for the last session is given below, and that for 1888-89 will be essentially the same.

THREE YEARS' GRADED COURSE—DIVISION OF SUBJECTS.

The three years' course now required in this college (save as stated in the requirements for graduation at page 11) includes two full courses of lectures upon each subject, as follows: The first year the primary branches, anatomy, materia medica, physiology and chemistry shall be attended, and practical anatomy studied in the dissecting room, while the laboratory courses in chemistry and histology may be most advantageously pursued during this course. The second year the full course of lectures shall be attended, and at its conclusion the student may present himself for examination in the primary branches, and if these be passed satisfactorily, the third year the lectures upon theory and practice, surgery, obstetrics and the allied branches, only, need be attended. Students have the privilege of attending any or all other lectures if they deem it advisable, and if they fail to pass one or more of the primary branches, are examined upon such branch or branches at the end of the third year.

OUTLINES OF COURSES.

PRACTICE OF MEDICINE.—Profs. Ward, Curtis and Hun. The studies in pathology and practice are devoted to diagnosis, pathology, clinical study and treatment of diseases. Hygiene is considered with reference to its practical use by the practitioner. Study in some standard work on practice is recommended, and daily reviews of previous lectures are a part of the course. A systematic course of lectures on diseases of the nervous system is given, and a clinic of nervous diseases held each week. Clinics on insanity will be held each week at the asylum connected with the Albany Alms House. Diseases of the skin are taught by weekly didactic and clinical lectures.

Surgery.—Profs. Vander Veer, Merrill and Morrow. In the lectures on surgical pathology, the method by which the tissues are nourished in health having been first discussed, the subjects of hypertrophy and atrophy are taken up, and then full consideration is bestowed upon the pathology of the methods by which wounds heal, and upon the processes of inflammation, suppuration, ulceration, gangrene, necrosis, septicæmia, pyæmia, poisoned wounds, etc., etc. A considerable portion of the surgical course is devoted to pathology, for the reason that if students do not become well grounded in it during their college course, they are very unlikely to take it up after becoming occupied with the details of practice. course on operative surgery includes all the usual operations. In the department of principles and practice of surgery, particular attention is paid to the subject of diagnosis, and all didactic teaching upon the various branches of surgery is richly illustrated in the clinical material furnished by the several well-regulated hospitals of the city. As in the past, it will be the aim to make the surgical clinics of the greatest value to the student.

All the departments of the surgical chair make free use of the diagrams and specimens found in the excellent and complete museums of the college.

Ophthalmology and otology are taught by both didactic and clinical lectures; the students being required to examine and diagnose the cases. Practical exercises are held in the use of the ophthalmoscope, the determination of glasses and the performance of the various operations. The eye and ear clinics are held every Friday at noon during the year.

Obstetrics, Gynecology and Diseases of Children.—Prof. Boyd. This course will comprise a series of lectures on the science and art of midwifery; on gynecology, and also on the diseases of children. The lectures will be didactic and clinical. Recitations will be held once a week during the term.

In addition to the regular clinical lectures on gynecology, practical instruction in this department will be given the members of the senior class at the dispensary of the Albany Hospital.

CHEMISTRY.—Profs. Perkins and Tucker. The course in this department includes lectures upon certain branches of physics—more especially light, heat and electricity—the principles of chemistry with its nomenclature and notation, the non-metals, and metals, with their more important medical compounds, and organic chemistry, including the analysis of urine, toxicology, etc. These lecture are abundantly illustrated throughout. Recitations form a prominent feature in the course.

ANATOMY.—Profs. Balch, Hailes and Morrow. The course in anatomy will consist of didactic lectures and recitations, with illustrations and demonstrations from the subject and preparations. Students are required to dissect under the direction of the demonstrator of anatomy before they can present themselves for final examination.

The course in histology, embryology and pathology consists of didactic lectures and recitations, with screen demonstrations, the exhibition of specimens, charts, etc.

MATERIA MEDICA.—Prof. Bigelow. The lectures on materia medica and therapeutics are illustrated by the exhibition of officinal plants and prints, together with specimens of the various officinal compounds and preparations, and by the presentation of the different means and methods of medication resorted to in the treatment of disease. Special attention is given to the demonstration of the action of therapeutic agents, and to the manner of their administration. Recitations are frequently held; dissertations on remedies are prepared and read by members of the class, and the aim is to furnish a course not only didactic, but also thoroughly practical.

On diseases of the throat and nose, clinics are held each week by the same professor, and the student becomes familiar, not only with the diseases of these parts, but is also made acquainted with the various

methods in use for the examination and treatment of laryngeal and nasal disorders.

Physiology.—Prof. Townsend. This branch is taught by means of didactic lectures, weekly recitations and frequent demonstrations upon the lower animals, the study being naturally divided into various departments, as physiological chemistry, physiological anatomy and histology, nutrition—comprising the subjects of digestion, absorption, secretion, the blood and its circulation—the nervous system, etc. The student thus can study the body "as a machine, learning the construction of its parts, the mechanism of their action, the materials with which it is supplied, the chemical transformation of its internal nutrition, as well as the phenomena which it exhibits in every department of the vital operations."

LABORATORIES.

PRACTICAL CHEMISTRY. During the summer of 1884, the chemical laboratory was entirely rebuilt and refurnished throughout. A second story was added, giving abundance of room for the classes in practical chemistry, and furnishing every facility for the illustration of the lectures in the chemical department. The laboratory is open during the entire year, students being received singly or in classes, for instruction in chemical analysis and medical chemistry. The instruction given is in harmony with the lectures on chemistry delivered during the term, and is so conducted as to secure to the student a practical familiarity with the apparatus, materials, processes and reactions, which are the subjects of his professional study and which are to be employed in his subsequent practice. With this practical instruction is combined a study of the principles of theoretical chemistry, chemical notation, nomenclature, etc.

The laboratory is well lighted and conveniently arranged. Each student has a desk and chemicals for his own use, and is supplied with all necessary apparatus. During the lecture course the laboratory classes are so arranged as not to interfere with the lectures and other college exercises. Students are urged to avail themselves of the privileges thus afforded if possible during their first course of lectures.

PATHOLOGICAL ANATOMY AND HISTOLOGY. The study of minute anatomy, in the first instance by microscopes, is aided by illustrations before the class by means of the oxyhydrogen lantern.

Classes in embryology, normal and pathological histology (including the diagnosis of tumors, etc.,) and the examination of the urine, will be formed immediately after the beginning of the session. The fee is \$10, including the use of the microscope, reagents and material.

The laboratory facilities of this college are unsurpassed, and special attention is given to these important branches. The laboratory is open daily for work in histology and pathology. Each student is furnished

with reagents, working table and a separate compartment for instruments, etc. The material for use in the various courses is abundant and in available form for study. While each student is required to make freehand sections for examination, thousands of sections are cut upon a new freezing microtome devised by Prof. Wm. Hailes, who is in charge of this department. The sections of the various representative tissues and organs are cut from 1-1000 to 1-1600 of an inch in thickness, and furnished to each student, during the course in both normal and pathological histology, who is also supplied with a series of outline plates or charts (according to the plan suggested by Prof. Sterling, of Aberdeen, Scotland), in which the main features of the part to be examined are indicated, and he is required to fill out the necessary details. At the end of the course, therefore, each student will be in possession of a full set of microscopic preparations, and of an atlas representing the structure of the more important points. Thus the student at once begins to acquire the art of representing on paper what he sees through the microscope.

FEES AND EXPENSES.

All fees are payable in advance, and are as follows: For matriculation, five dollars, payable each year; for the year's lectures, one hundred dollars; perpetual lecture ticket, entitling to attendance upon two or more courses, one hundred and fifty dollars. Students who have attended two full courses of lectures at this college will be required to pay only the matriculation fee. Students who have attended two full courses of lectures at other accredited medical colleges will be required to pay twenty-five dollars and the matriculation fee. Graduates of this institution have perpetual free admission. Graduates of other medical schools will be admitted upon paying the matriculation fee. Dissection, ten dollars, which is required the first year and optional during the other years of the course; dissecting material is free, and there are no incidentals in this department. The graduation fee is twenty-five dollars, which must be paid to the registrar before the candidate can be admitted to an examination. Courses in the chemical laboratory and in histology, ten dollars each.

The cost of living in Albany is less than in most other cities of its size. The janitor of the college keeps a list of boarding houses at which good rooms and board can be obtained at from four to five dollars a week, and by clubbing together and boarding themselves students can live comfortably and pleasantly at still lower rates. This plan has been adopted by many students, and several mess clubs are organized annually.

INCENTIVES.

SURGICAL PRIZES. Professor Vander Veer offers a prize for the best report of the surgical clinics held during the session, and Professors Hailes and Morrow offer a prize for the second best report of these clinics.

Professor Merrill offers a prize for the best report of the eye and ear clinics, and Professor Townsend offers a prize to the student of the junior class presenting the best report of the lectures upon physiology at the close of the term.

To the senior student passing the best final examination, Dr. T. W. Nellis offers a prize consisting of a case of surgical instruments.

HOSPITAL APPOINTMENTS. At or about the close of each session, vacancies occur in the house staffs of the Albany and St. Peter's Hospitals, and these are filled by competitive examinations, open to the members of the graduating class.

REQUIREMENTS FOR GRADUATION.

The candidate must be twenty-one years of age, and exhibit a certificate from a physician or surgeon, duly authorized by law to practice his profession, that he has studied medicine and surgery under his instruction, after the age of eighteen, during a term of three years.

He must have attended a three years' graded course of lectures in this college, or the equivalent of the first course thereof elsewhere, and the last two courses in this college, or the equivalent of the first two courses thereof elsewhere, and the last course in this college, provided: (1) that graduates of recognized literary colleges, scientific schools or colleges of pharmacy will be allowed to present themselves for graduation at the end of their second full course if all other requirements for graduation are fulfilled; (2) that students desiring to enter the second year class, may do so if they successfully pass an examination in anatomy, materia medica, chemistry and physiology, and are deemed competent so to enter, and (3) that students who have attended a full course of lectures in this college or elsewhere, may enter the senior class on passing a satisfactory entrance examination in all the departments. Students entering the second year class in either instance, as above provided, must attend the full course of lectures each year, and are examined in all the branches at the end of the second course. Students entering the senior class as above provided. must attend the full course of lectures, and are examined in all the branches at its close.

He must be of good moral character.

He must deliver to the registrar, six weeks before the end of the term, a thesis written by himself on some medical subject, and be prepared to defend it at his examination. Theses must be written upon paper ten inches by eight inches in size, with a wide margin on the inside of each page.

He must pass a satisfactory examination in the several branches of medicine and surgery, final examinations being conducted chiefly in writing.

Regular and punctual attendance is required, and certificates of actual attendance given at the end of the term.

ALBANY COLLEGE OF PHARMACY.

DEPARTMENT OF PHARMACY, UNION UNIVERSITY.

Session of 1888-89.

This department was created by act of the Board of Governors of Union University, June 21, 1881, and incorporated August 27, 1881. The eighth course of lectures will open on Monday, October 1, 1888, and close March 5, 1889. The exercises of the college are held in the Albany Medical College building on Eagle street.

The following constitute the faculty:

WILLIS G. TUCKER, M. D., Ph. D., President, Professor of Chemistry.

Alfred B. Huested, M. D., Ph. G., Secretary, Professor of Botany and Materia Medica.

Gustavus Michaelis, Ph. G., Professor of Pharmacy.

The course extends over two years, divided into junior and senior classes, composed of first and second year students respectively. Three or more lectures are delivered to each class each week besides laboratory classes and other exercises. Senior lectures on Monday, Wednesday and Friday evenings, and junior lectures on Tuesday and Thursday evenings and Saturday afternoons. Candidates for the degree of Graduate in Pharmacy (Ph. G.) must attend two full courses of lectures, be at least twenty-one years of age, submit a thesis and pass the required examinations. They must also have served at least four years with some reputable pharmacist. Fees: Matriculation fee (paid but once), \$3.00; lecture tickets for full course (with no charge for courses after the second), per session, \$30.00; laboratory fee, \$15.00; graduation fee, \$10.00. Various prizes are awarded to meritorious students at the close of the term.

DUDLEY OBSERVATORY, ALBANY.

Union College.

The College offers to students the usual classical course, a scientific course (embracing more of mathematical and English studies; also modern languages or Latin), an engineering, a chemical and an eclectic course; also post-graduate courses. PRELIMINARY EXAMINATION. Graduates from recognized academies, colleges, colleges of pharmacy, scientific schools or like institutions, and students presenting regents' or teachers' certificates or certificates of competency from the president or censors of the medical society of the county from which they come, will not be required to pass the preliminary examination on entering the school.

All others will be required to pass an examination by a page written at the time, of which the orthography, grammatical construction and penmanship will be considered, and in arithmetic, grammar, geography, and

the elements of natural philosophy.

MONTHLY WRITTEN EXAMINATIONS of the candidates for primary or final examination are held during the term. A printed schedule of these examinations is furnished the class.

Examination in Primary Studies. Students who have attended two full courses of lectures in the departments of Anatomy, Physiology, Materia Medica and Chemistry may be examined on these subjects at the close of the term, and if the examinations are passed satisfactorily, they are examined only in the other three departments (Surgery, Practice and Obstetrics) at the end of their third course (see graded course, page 6).

Clinics in Orthopædic Surgery at Child's Hospital during session.

Union University includes the ALBANY MEDICAL COLLEGE, Albany College of Pharmacy, Albany Law School, and the Dudley Observatory, all at Albany, and Union College and the School of Civil Engineering at Schenectady.

The faculty are gratified in seeing that the changes made in the course of study, and the high requirements demanded for graduation, continue to meet with the approval of the Alumni and the profession generally.

The college building, situated on Eagle street, is well appointed in its lecture rooms, laboratories, dissecting rooms, library and museums. Extensive improvements have been made to the building during the last few years, a large and perfectly arranged dissecting room having been built in the upper story, furnished with every convenience for the use of the classes in practical anatomy, together with a private dissecting room and a physiological laboratory. Special arrangements have been made by which an abundant supply of material is secured. The chemical laboratory was rebuilt in 1884, and a two story building erected, fitted with every requisite for the illustration of the lectures, and the use of the students in practical chemistry, while "Alumni Hall," constituting the south wing of the college building, was greatly improved and refurnished throughout at about the same time, and is used for the classes in histology and pathological anatomy, and for other college exercises.

During the summer of 1887, the anatomical amphitheatre, in which most of the lectures are delivered, was entirely remodelled and furnished with roomy, comfortable chairs, and the entire building is now heated by steam, and all halls, lecture-rooms and ante-rooms equably warmed and amply supplied with fresh air.

The location of the college at Albany is such as to afford superior advantages to the student. The hospitals and dispensaries furnish always an abundant supply of material for the illustration of clinical medicine and surgery, while the museums are especially rich in anatomical and pathological preparations, unequaled in their variety and rarity. They contain the valuable morbid specimens accumulated by the late Drs. March, Armsby and McNaughton, and the pathological specimens, the Sydenham Society plates on diseases of the skin, and Böck's anatomical models recently added by Dr. Vander Veer. The library of the college contains nearly 5,000 volumes, and additions to it are being constantly made.

The aim of the faculty is to make the course practical and scientific. It combines didactic lectures, recitations, practical work in the laboratories and dissecting room, and clinical instruction.

The Albany Hospital, St. Peter's Hospital, Child's Hospital, County Hospital, together with the Eye and Ear Infirmary and the Dispensaries connected with each, are, by the regulations of their governing boards, made available for clinical purposes to the students.

The appointments to positions in the Albany Hospital and St. Peter's Hospital as resident physician and surgeon, and first and second assistants, are annually made and competed for by members of the graduating class.

COURSE OF INSTRUCTION.

'Six or more lectures or clinics are given each week day except upon Saturday, when the forenoon only is occupied. Laboratory and dissecting classes, quizzes, etc., are arranged to meet at hours which do not conflict with the lectures. Regular recitations on primary branches will hereafter be held during the term, which first course students will be required to attend. The order of lectures and clinics for the last session is given below, and that for 1889-90 will be essentially the same.

THREE YEARS' GRADED COURSE—DIVISION OF SUBJECTS.

The three years' course now required in this college (save as stated in the requirements for graduation at page 11) includes two full courses of lectures upon each subject, as follows: The first year the primary branches, anatomy, materia medica, physiology and chemistry shall be attended, with recitations upon these subjects, and practical anatomy studied in the dissecting room, while the laboratory courses in chemistry and histology may be most advantageously pursued during this course. The second year the full course of lectures, with clinics and recitations, shall be attended, and at its conclusion the student may present himself for exam-

ination in the primary branches, and if these be passed satisfactorily, the third year the lectures, clinics and recitations upon theory and practice, surgery, obstetrics and the allied branches, only, need be attended. Students have the privilege of attending any or all other lectures if they deem it advisable, and if they fail to pass one or more of the primary branches, are examined upon such branch or branches at the end of the third year.

OUTLINES OF COURSES.

PRACTICE OF MEDICINE.—Profs. Ward, Curtis and Hun.
Theory and Practice. Prof. Ward delivers a systematic course of lectures, profusely illustrated with pathological specimens. These lectures are supplemented by study in some standard text-book, and each week the students are examined by Dr. Russell, his clinical assistant, on the subject matter of the lectures of that week.

Hygiene is taught by Prof. Ward in lectures which have special refer-

ence to the needs of the general practitioner.

Diseases of the Heart and Lungs. Prof. Hun delivers two lectures each week on this subject. These lectures are illustrated with pathological specimens, and each lecture is preceded by a short recitation on the pre-

ceding lecture.

Clinical Medicine. Prof. Ward holds a medical clinic each week, in the amphitheatre of the Albany Hospital, before the junior and senior classes; and Prof. Hun holds a medical clinic each week, in St. Peter's or the Child's Hospital, before the senior class. In these clinics the students have opportunities for the personal examination of patients; their examination and diagnosis being criticised by the professor.

Ausculation and Percussion and Physical Examination is taught practically by Dr. Russell to the senior class, which for this purpose is divided

up into small groups.

Diseases of the Nervous System. Prof. Hun delivers a didactic lecture and also holds a clinic on this subject each week. (During the first month of each term both hours are devoted to a short course on the anatomy and physiology of the nervous system.) At the clinic the students are trained practically in the examination of patients and in the method of arriving at a diagnosis.

Insanity. In the early part of the term, Prof. Hun delivers a short course of lectures on this subject and holds clinics at the asylum connected

with the alms house.

Diseases of the Skin. Prof. Curtis delivers each week on this subject a lecture which is illustrated with plates and with a large number of

patients.

SURGERY.—Profs. Vander Veer, Hailes, Merrill and Morrow. In the lectures on surgical pathology, the method by which the tissues are nourished in health having been first discussed, the subjects of hypertrophy and atrophy are taken up, and then full consideration is bestowed upon the pathology of the methods by which wounds heal, and upon the processes of inflammation, suppuration, ulceration, gangrene, necrosis, septicæmia, pyæmia, poisoned wounds, etc. A considerable portion of the surgical course is devoted to pathology, for the reason that if students do not become well grounded in it during their college course, they are very unlikely to take it up after becoming occupied with the details of practice. The course on operative surgery includes all the usual operations. In the department of principles and practice of surgery, particular attention is paid to the subject of diagnosis, and all didactic teaching upon the various branches of surgery is richly illustrated in the clinical material furnished by the several well-regulated hospitals of the city. As in the past, it will be the aim to make the surgical clinics of the greatest value to the student. All the departments of the surgical chair make free use of the diagrams and specimens found in the excellent and complete museums of the college.

Fractures and Dislocations. This subject will be treated in a practical manner, a thorough course of lectures being given, in which the various fractures and dislocations will be illustrated by a specially prepared skeleton. The employment of the various means for the reduction of dislocations and the preparation of splints and other surgical appliances, will be taught in the lecture-room, and followed by clinical instruction at the hospital, senior students being required to examine and diagnose injuries, and to select, prepare and apply the proper dressings for reduction and

for the retention of the appliances used.

Ophthalmology and Otology are taught by both didactic and clinical lectures; the students being required to examine and diagnosis the cases. Practical exercises are held in the use of the ophthalmoscope, the determination of glasses and the performance of the various operations. The eye and ear clinics are held every Friday at noon during the year.

Orthopædic Surgery will be taught by lectures combined with clinical instruction, the various hospitals furnishing an abundance of material for

the illustration of this important subject.

OBSTETRICS, GYNECOLOGY AND DISEASES OF CHILDREN.—Prof. Boyd. This course will comprise a series of lectures on the science and art of midwifery; on gynecology, and also on the diseases of children. The lectures will be didactic and clinical. Recitations will be held once a week during the term.

In addition to the regular clinical lectures on gynecology, practical instruction in this department will be given the members of the senior

class at the dispensary of the Albany Hospital.

CHEMISTRY.—Profs. Perkins and Tucker. The course in this department includes lectures upon certain branches of physics—more especially light, heat and electricity—the principles of chemistry with its nomenclature and notation, the non-metals, and metals, with their more important medical compounds, and organic chemistry, including the analysis of urine, toxicology, etc. These lectures are abundantly illustrated throughout. Recitations form a prominent feature in the course.

ANATOMY.—Profs. Balch, Hailes and Morrow. The course in anatomy will consist of didactic lectures and recitations, with illustrations and demonstrations from the subject and preparations. Students are required to dissect under the direction of the demonstrator of anatomy before they

can present themselves for final examination.

The course in histology, embryology and pathology consists of didactic lectures and recitations, with screen demonstrations, the exhibition of

specimens, charts, etc.

MATERIA MEDICA.—Prof. Bigelow. The lectures on materia medica and therapeutics are illustrated by the exhibition of officinal plants and prints, together with specimens of the various officinal compounds and

preparations, and by the presentation of the different means and methods of medication resorted to in the treatment of disease. Special attention is given to the demonstration of the action of therapeutic agents, and to the manner of their administration. Recitations are frequently held; dissertations on remedies are prepared and read by members of the class, and the aim is to furnish a course not only didactic, but also thoroughly practical.

Diseases of the Throat and Nose. Clinics are held each week by the same professor, and the student familiarized with the diseases of these parts, and made acquainted with the various methods in use for the

examination and treatment of laryngeal and nasal disorders.

Physiology.—Prof. Townsend. This branch is taught by means of didactic lectures, weekly recitations and frequent demonstrations upon the lower animals, the study being naturally divided into several departments, as physiological chemistry, physiological anatomy and histology, nutrition—comprising the subjects of digestion, absorption, secretion, the blood and its circulation—the nervous system, etc. The student thus can study the body "as a machine, learning the construction of its parts, the mechanism of their action, the materials with which it is supplied, the chemical transformation of its internal nutrition, as well as the phenomena which it exhibits in every department of the vital operations."

LABORATORIES.

PRACTICAL CHEMISTRY. During the summer of 1884, the chemical laboratory was entirely rebuilt and refurnished throughout. A second story was added, giving abundance of room for the classes in practical chemistry, and furnishing every facility for the illustration of the lectures in the chemical department. The laboratory is open during the entire year, students being received singly or in classes, for instruction in chemical analysis and medical chemistry. The instruction given is in harmony with the lectures on chemistry delivered during the term, and is so conducted as to secure to the student a practical familiarity with the apparatus, materials, processes and reactions, which are the subjects of his professional study and which are to be employed in his subsequent practice. With this practical instruction is combined a study of the principles of theoretical chemistry, chemical notation, nomenclature, etc.

The laboratory is well lighted and conveniently arranged. Each student has a desk and chemicals for his own use, and is supplied with all necessary apparatus. During the lecture course the laboratory classes are so arranged as not to interfere with the lectures or other college exercises. Students are urged to avail themselves of the privileges thus

afforded, if possible, during their first course of lectures.

PATHOLOGICAL ANATOMY AND HISTOLOGY. The study of minute anatomy, in the first instance by microscopes, is aided by illustrations

before the class by means of the oxyhydrogen lantern.

Classes in embryology, normal and pathological histology (including the diagnosis of tumors, etc.,) and the examination of the urine, will be formed immediately after the beginning of the session. The fee is \$10, including the use of the microscope, reagents and material.

The laboratory facilities of this college are unsurpassed, and special attention is given to these important branches. The laboratory is open daily for work in histology and pathology. Each student is furnished

with reagents, working table and a separate compartment for instruments. etc. The material for use in the various courses is abundant and in available form for study. While each student is required to make freehand sections for examination, thousands of sections are cut upon a new freezing microtome devised by Prof. Wm. Hailes, who is in charge of this department. The sections of the various representative tissues and organs are cut from 1-1000 to 1-1600 of an inch in thickness, and furnished to each student, during the course in both normal and pathological histology, who is also supplied with a series of outline plates or charts (according to the plan suggested by Prof. Sterling, of Aberdeen, Scotland), in which the main features of the part to be examined are indicated, and he is required to fill out the necessary details. At the end of the course, therefore, each student will be in possession of a full set of microscopic preparations, and of an atlas representing the structure of the more important points. Thus the student at once begins to acquire the art of representing on paper what he sees through the microscope.

FEES AND EXPENSES.

All fees are payable in advance, and are as follows: For matriculation, five dollars, payable each year; for the year's lectures, one hundred dollars; perpetual lecture ticket, entitling to attendance upon two or more courses, one hundred and fifty dollars. Students who have attended two full courses of lectures at this college will be required to pay only the matriculation fee. Students who have attended two full courses of lectures at other accredited medical colleges will be required to pay twenty-five dollars and the matriculation fee. Graduates of this institution have perpetual free admission. Graduates of other medical schools will be admitted upon paying the matriculation fee. Dissection, ten dollars, which is required the first year and optional during the other years of the course; dissecting material is free, and there are no incidentals in this department. The graduation fee is twenty-five dollars, which must be paid to the registrar before the candidate can be admitted to an examination. Courses in the chemical laboratory and in histology, ten dollars each.

The cost of living in Albany is less than in most other cities of its size. The janitor of the college keeps a list of boarding houses at which good rooms and board can be obtained at from four to five dollars a week, and by clubbing together and boarding themselves students can live comfortably and pleasantly at still lower rates. This plan has been adopted by

many students, and several mess clubs are organized annually.

INCENTIVES.

SURGICAL PRIZES. Professor Vander Veer offers a prize for the best report of the surgical clinics held during the session, and Professors Hailes and Morrow offer a prize for the second best report of these clinics. Professor Merrill offers a prize for the best report of the eye and ear clinics, and Professor Townsend offers a prize to the student of the junior class presenting the best report of the lectures upon physiology at the close of the term.

HOSPITAL APPOINTMENTS. At or about the close of each session, vacancies occur in the house staffs of the Albany and St. Peter's Hospitals, and these are filled by competitive examinations, open to the members of the graduating class.

REQUIREMENTS FOR GRADUATION.

The candidate must be twenty-one years of age, and exhibit a certificate from a physician or surgeon, duly authorized by law to practice his profession, that he has studied medicine and surgery under his instruction, after the age of eighteen, during a term of three years.

He must have attended a three years' graded course of lectures in this college, or the equivalent of the first course thereof elsewhere, and the last two courses in this college, or the equivalent of the first two courses thereof elsewhere, and the last (full) course in this college, provided: (1) that graduates of recognized literary colleges, scientific schools or colleges of pharmacy will be allowed to present themselves for graduation at the end of their second full course if all other requirements for graduation are fulfilled; (2) that students desiring to enter the second year class, may do so if they successfully pass an examination in anatomy, materia medica, chemistry and physiology, and are deemed competent so to enter, and (3) that students who have attended a full course of lectures in this college or elsewhere, may enter the senior class on passing a satisfactory entrance examination in all the departments. Students entering the second year class in either instance, as above provided, must attend the full course of lectures each year, and are examined in all the branches at the end of the second course. Students entering the senior class as above provided, must attend the full course of lectures, and are examined in all the branches at its close.

He must must be of good moral character.

He must deliver to the registrar, six weeks before the end of the term,

a thesis written by himself on some medical subject, and be prepared to defend it at his examination. Theses must be written upon paper ten inches by eight inches in size, with a wide margin on the inside of each page.

He must pass a satisfactory examination in the several branches of medicine and surgery, final examinations being conducted chiefly in

writing.

Regular and punctual attendance is required, and certificates of actual attendance given at the end of the term.

ALBANY COLLEGE OF PHARMACY.

DEPARTMENT OF PHARMACY, UNION UNIVERSITY.

Session of 1889-90.

This department was created by act of the Board of Governors of Union University, June 21, 1881, and incorporated August 27, 1881. The ninth course of lectures will open on Monday, October 7, 1889, and close March 11, 1890. The exercises of the college are held in the Albany Medical College building on Eagle street.

The following constitute the faculty:

The course extends over two years, divided into junior and senior classes, composed of first and second year students respectively. Three or more lectures are delivered to each class each week besides laboratory classes and other exercises. Senior lectures on Monday, Wednesday and Friday evenings, and junior lectures on Tuesday and Thursday evenings and Saturday afternoons. Candidates for the degree of *Graduate in Pharmacy* (*Ph. G.*) must attend two full courses of lectures, be at least twenty-one years of age, submit a thesis and pass the required examinations. They must also have served at least four years with some reputable pharmacist. Fees: Matriculation fee (paid but once), \$3.00; lecture tickets for full course (with no charge for courses after the second), per session, \$30.00; laboratory fee, \$15.00; graduation fee, \$10.00. Various prizes are awarded to meritorious students at close of the term.

Union College.

The College offers to students the usual classical course; a scientific course (embracing more of mathematical and English studies; also modern languages or Latin), an engineering, a chemical and an eclectic course; also post-graduate courses. There is also a department of physical training and one of military instruction.

Union College students have the privilege of attending the medical lectures of the Albany Medical College without expense, and matriculation is granted to Union College graduates without examination.

Candidates must be at least sixteen years old. Those from other colleges must bring letters of honorable dismission and pass satisfactory examination.

The fee for tuition and room is \$30 a term, payable ia advance, with \$5 for Freshman entrance, \$7 for Sophomore, \$9 for Junior, \$12 for Senior, unless the student comes from another college. Board costs \$3.75 a week. Scholarships exist, yielding some remission on term bill. Commencement occurs always on the fourth Wednesday of June. Fall term of 1889 begins September 18th. Entrance examinations are held on the two days following commencement, and the two preceding any term.

Preliminary Examination.— Since September 1, 1876, all students entering this college have been required to pass an examination in the ordinary English branches and in the elements of natural philosophy, unless evidence has been presented of a satisfactory preliminary education. The faculty are now relieved of this duty, and heartily approve the existing law applying to all medical colleges in the State, by which the preliminary examination of medical students is placed under the control of the Board of Regents of the University of the State of New York. Those contemplating the study of medicine are advised to apply to the Examinations Department, University State New York, Albany, by letter or otherwise, for information concerning this examination. One of the examinations will be held in Albany September 23–25, 1890, in order that students may be put to no unnecessary inconvenience or delay. (For copy of law, with credentials and qualifications accepted by the Regents in place of examination and times and places at which examinations are held, see pages 27 and 28.)

Union University includes the ALBANY MEDICAL COLLEGE, Albany College of Pharmacy, Albany Law School, and the Dudley Observatory, all at Albany, and Union College and the School of Civil Engineering at

Schenectady.

During the last ten years the faculty of the ALBANY MEDICAL COL-LEGE have required attendance upon three courses of lectures prior to graduation, with a few exceptions, which have been stated in the catalogue. They have also required evidence of preliminary education by entrance examination, and in many other ways have endeavored to render their instruction more thorough, and to raise the standard of medical education in this State. They believe that their course has met the approval, not alone of the alumni of the college, but of the profession generally, and they now take pleasure in announcing the adoption of a strictly graded course, and call attention to the fact, that three courses of lectures will hereafter be an essential prerequisite for graduation. The new curriculum embraces lectures by professors and lecturers; recitations conducted mainly by instructors and practical demonstrations, clinical teaching and laboratory work, in which the professors in the different departments will be assisted by clinical assistants and demonstrators. The faculty hope to receive the continued encouragement and support of the profession, and particularly of their own alumni in their earnest endeavor to render their instruction more practical and more thorough.

The college building, situated on Eagle street, is well appointed in its lecture-rooms, laboratories, dissecting-rooms, library and museums. Extensive improvements have been made to the building during the last few years, a large and perfectly arranged dissecting-room having been built in the upper story, furnished with every convenience for the use of the classes in practical anatomy, together with a private dissecting-room and a physiological laboratory. Special arrangements have been made by which an abundant supply of material is secured. The chemical laboratory was rebuilt in 1884, and a two-story building erected, fitted with every requisite for the illustration of the lectures, and the use of the students in practical chemistry, while "Alumni Hall," constituting the south wing of the college building, was greatly improved and re-furnished throughout at about the same time, and is used for the classes in histology and pathological anatomy, and for other college exer-

cises.

During the summer of 1887, the anatomical amphitheatre, in which most of the lectures are delivered, was entirely remodeled and furnished with roomy, comfortable chairs, and the entire building is now heated by steam, and all halls, lecture-rooms and ante-rooms equably warmed and amply supplied with fresh air.

The location of the college at Albany is such as to afford superior advantages to the student. The hospitals and dispensaries furnish always an abundant supply of material for the illustration of clinical medicine and surgery, while the museums are especially rich in anatomical and pathological prepara-

tions, unequaled in their variety and rarity. They contain the valuable morbid specimens accumulated by the late Drs. March, Armsby and McNaughton, and the pathological specimens, the Sydenham Society plates on diseases of the skin, and Böck's anatomical models recently added by Dr. Vander Veer. The library of the college contains nearly 5,000 volumes, and additions to it are being constantly made.

The Albany Hospital, St. Peter's Hospital, Child's Hospital, County Hospital, together with the Eye and Ear Infirmary and the dispensaries connected with each, are, by the regulations of their governing boards, made available

for clinical purposes to the students.

The appointments to positions in the Albany Hospital and St. Peter's Hospital as resident physician and surgeon, and first and second assistants, are annually made and competed for by members of the graduating class.

COURSE OF INSTRUCTION.

The three years' graded course now required in this college is arranged as follows: The studies of the first year are anatomy and histology, physics, inorganic and organic chemistry, physiology and materia medica, with laboratory work in chemistry and histology, dissection and attendance upon the general medical and surgical clinic. The final examination in inorganic chemistry, histology and materia medica, and an annual examination in organic chemistry, anatomy and physiology are held at the close of the term.

The studies of the second year are anatomy, including topographical anatomy and anatomy of the nervous system; pathological anatomy, physiology, organic chemistry, therapeutics, surgery, practice of medicine, obstetrics and gynecology, with laboratory work in pathological anatomy and clinics. At the end of this year final examinations are held in organic chemistry, anatomy,

pathological anatomy, physiology and therapeutics.

The studies of the third year are practice of medicine, surgery, obstetrics, diseases of children, gynecology, diseases of the nervous system and of the eye, ear, skin, nose and throat, insanity and medical jurisprudence, with clinics and conferences. At the end of this year final examinations are held

in practice, surgery and obstetrics.

Believing that instruction by recitation is as essential in medical as in literary colleges, the faculty have greatly enlarged and extended this department of the teaching in this college. The recitations, which have hitherto been held during unoccupied hours in the evening, are now made part of the regular curriculum. Every study taught in the college by lectures is also made the subject of recitations, the ratio of the number of lectures to that of recitations being in general two to one. By thus making the recitations a part of the regular course of instruction, it is possible to make sure not only that they are properly conducted, and that the students thoroughly understand the lectures, but also to save the students from a considerable expenditure of money, and to do away with all outside quiz-classes and with the objectionable system of cramming which such classes encourage.

OUTLINES OF COURSES.

PRACTICE OF MEDICINE.—Profs. Ward, Curtis and Hun.

Theory and Practice. Prof. Ward delivers a systematic course of lectures, profusely illustrated with pathological specimens. These lectures are supplemented by study in some standard text-book, and each week the students are examined by Dr. Brennan, on the subject-matter of the lectures of that week.

Hygiene is taught by Prof. Ward in lectures which have special reference

to the needs of the general practitioner.

Diseases of the Heart and Lungs. Prof. Hun delivers two lectures, illustrated with pathological specimens, each week on this subject, and Dr. Van Rensselaer conducts a recitation each week on the subject-matter of the lectures.

Clinical Medicine. Prof. Ward holds a medical clinic each week, in the amphitheatre of the Albany Hospital, and Prof. Hun holds a medical clinic each week, in St. Peter's or the Child's Hospital, before the senior class. In these clinics the students have opportunities for the personal examination of patients; their examination and diagnosis being criticised by the professor.

Ausculation and Percussion and Physical Examination is taught practically by Dr. Gordinier to the junior class, which for this purpose is divided up

into small groups.

Diseases of Nervous System. Prof. Hun delivers a didactic lecture, and also holds a clinic on this subject each week. At the clinic the students are trained practically in the examination of patients and in the method of arriving at a diagnosis. As a preparation to this course Dr. Gordinier delivers to the junior class a lecture each week on the anatomy of the nervous system. These lectures are profusely illustrated by dissections of the central nervous organs, and by charts and plates.

Insanity. Prof. Hun delivers a short course of lectures on this subject and holds clinics at the asylum connected with the alms-house, and at the

Marshall Infirmary, Troy.

Diseases of the Skin. Prof. Curtis delivers each week on this subject a lecture which is illustrated with plates and with a large number of patients.

Surgery.—Profs. Vander Veer, Hailes, Merrill and Morrow. In the lectures on surgical pathology, the method by which the tissues are nourished in health having been first discussed, the subjects of hypertrophy and atrophy are taken up, and then full consideration is bestowed upon the pathology of the methods by which wounds heal, and upon the processes of inflammation, suppuration, ulceration, gangrene, necrosis, septicæmia, pyæmia, poisoned wounds, etc. A considerable portion of the surgical course is devoted to pathology, for the reason that if students do not become well grounded in it during their college course, they are very unlikely to take it up after becoming occupied with the details of practice. The course on operative surgery includes all the usual operations. In the department of principles and practice of surgery, particular attention is paid to the subject of diagnosis, and all didactic teaching upon the various branches of surgery is richly illustrated in the clinical material furnished by the several well-regulated hospitals of the city. As in the past, it will be the aim to make the surgical clinics of the greatest value to the student. All the departments of the surgical chair make free use of the diagrams and specimens found in the excellent and complete museums of the college.

The subject of antiseptic surgery in all that pertains to the knowledge and direct application of the same will be presented in the various operations. During the term the students have an excellent opportunity of seeing a number of cases of abdominal surgery for the relief of various forms of obstruc-

tion of the bowels and the removal of abdominal tumors.

Fractures and Dislocations. This subject will be treated in a practical manner, a thorough course of lectures being given, in which the various fractures and dislocations will be illustrated by a specially prepared skeleton. The employment of the various means for the reduction of dislocations and the preparation of splints and other surgical appliances, will be taught in the lecture-room, and followed by clinical instruction at the hospital, senior students being required to examine and diagnose injuries, and to select, prepare and apply the proper dressings for reduction and for the retention of the appliances used.

Ophthalmology and Otology are taught by both didactic and clinical lectures; the students being required to examine and diagnose the cases. Practical exercises are held in the use of the ophthalmoscope, the determination of glasses and the performance of the various operations. The eye and ear

clinics are held every Friday at noon during the year.

Orthopedic Surgery will be taught by lectures combined with clinical instruction, the various hospitals furnishing an abundance of material for the

illustration of this important subject.

OBSTETRICS, GYNECOLOGY AND DISEASES OF CHILDREN. — Prof. Boyd. This course will comprise a series of lectures on the science and art of midwifery; on gynecology, and also on the diseases of children. The lectures will be didactic and clinical. Recitations will be held once a week during the term.

In addition to the regular clinical lectures on gynecology, practical instruction in this department will be given the members of the senior class at the Albany Hospital, the class being divided into sections in order to witness the operations. Provision will be made to enable members of the senior

class to attend one or more cases of obstetrics during the term.

CHEMISTRY.—Profs. Perkins and Tucker. The course in this department includes lectures upon certain branches of physics—more especially light, heat and electricity—the principles of chemistry with its nomenclature and notation, the non-metals, and metals, with their more important medical compounds, and organic chemistry, including the analysis of urine, toxicology, etc. These lectures are abundantly illustrated throughout. Recitations are held in each department, and more time than heretofore will be devoted to practical work in the chemical laboratory, which is now required during the first year.

ANATOMY.— Prof. Morrow and Drs. Craig and Gordinier. The course in anatomy will consist of didactic lectures and recitations, with illustrations and demonstrations from the subject and preparations. Students are required to dissect during the first year under the direction of the demonstrator and

assistant demonstrator of anatomy.

Histology. The course in histology, embryology and pathology, by Prof. Hailes, consists of didactic lectures and recitations, with screen demonstrations, the exhibition of specimens, charts, etc., and practical work in the histological laboratory two hours each week, which is now required during the first year, and in pathological anatomy during the second year.

MATERIA MEDICA. - Prof. Bigelow and Dr. Van Rensselaer. The

lectures on materia medica and therapeutics are illustrated by the exhibition of officinal plants and prints, together with specimens of the various officinal compounds and preparations, and by the presentation of the different means and methods of medication resorted to in the treatment of disease. Special attention is given to the demonstration of the action of therapeutic agents, and to the manner of their administration. Recitations are frequently held; dissertations on remedies are prepared and read by members of the class, and the aim is to furnish a course not only didactic, but also thoroughly practical.

Diseases of the Throat and Nose.—Prof. Bigelow. Clinics are held each week by the professor, and the student familiarized with the diseases of these parts, and made acquainted with the various methods in use for the examina-

tion and treatment of laryngeal and nasal disorders.

Physiology.— *Prof. Townsend*. This branch is taught by means of didactic lectures, weekly recitations as well as frequent demonstrations upon the lower animals, the study being naturally divided into several departments, as physiological chemistry, physiological anatomy and histology, nutrition—comprising the subjects of digestion, absorption, secretion, the blood and its circulation—the nervous system, etc. The student thus can study the body "as a machine, learning the construction of its parts, the mechanism of their action, the materials with which it is supplied, the chemical transformation of its internal nutrition, as well as the phenomena which it exhibits in every department of the vital operations."

LABORATORIES.

Practical Chemistry. The chemical laboratory was recently entirely rebuilt and refurnished throughout. A second story was added, giving abundance of room for the classes in practical chemistry, and furnishing every facility for the illustration of the lectures in the chemical department. The laboratory is open during the entire year. The instruction given is in harmony with the lectures on chemistry delivered during the term, and is so conducted as to secure to the student a practical familiarity with the apparatus, materials, processes and reactions, which are the subjects of his professional study and which are to be employed in his subsequent practice. With this practical instruction is combined a study of the principles of theoretical chemistry, chemical notation, nomenclature, etc.

The laboratory is well lighted and conveniently arranged. Each student has a desk and chemicals for his own use, and is supplied with all necessary

apparatus.

PATHOLOGICAL ANATOMY AND HISTOLOGY. The study of minute anatomy, in the first instance by microscopes, is aided by illustrations before the class by means of the oxyhydrogen lantern.

Classes in embryology, normal and pathological histology (including the diagnosis of tumors, etc.), and the examination of the urine, will be formed

immediately after the beginning of the session.

The laboratory facilities of this college are unsurpassed, and special attention is given to these important branches. The laboratory is open daily for work in histology and pathology. Each student is furnished with reagents, working table and a separate compartment for instruments, etc. The material for use in the various courses is abundant and in available form for study. While each student is required to make freehand sections for examination,

thousands of sections are cut upon a new freezing microtome devised by Prof. Wm. Hailes, who is in charge of this department. The sections of the various representative tissues and organs are cut from 1-1000 to 1-1600 of an inch in thickness, and furnished to each student, during the course in both normal and pathological histology, who is also supplied with a series of outline plates or charts (according to the plan suggested by Prof. Sterling, of Aberdeen, Scotland), in which the main features of the part to be examined are indicated, and he is required to fill out the necessary details. At the end of the course, therefore, each student will be in possession of a full set of microscopic preparations, and of an atlas representing the structure of the more important points. Thus the student at once begins to acquire the art of representing on paper what he sees through the microscope.

FEES AND EXPENSES.

All fees are payable in advance, and are as follows: For matriculation, five dollars, payable each year; for the year's lectures, one hundred dollars; perpetual lecture ticket, entitling to attendance upon two or more courses, one hundred and fifty dollars. Students who have attended two courses of lectures at this college will be required to pay only the matriculation fee. Students who have attended one course of lectures at some other accredited medical colleges will be required to pay seventy-five dollars for their first (junior) and fifty dollars for their last (senior) course, and those who have attended two courses elsewhere will be required to pay seventy-five dollars for their senior course in the college. Graduates of this institution have perpetual free admission. Graduates of other medical schools will be admitted upon payment of fifty dollars and the matriculation fee. Dissection, ten dollars, which is required the first year and optional during the other years of the course; dissecting material is free, and there are no incidentals in this department. Courses in the chemical laboratory, and in histology and pathology, ten dollars each. The graduation fee is twenty-five dollars, which must be paid to the registrar before the candidate can be admitted to an examination.

The cost of living in Albany is less than in most other cities of its size. The janitor of the college keeps a list of boarding-houses at which good rooms and board can be obtained at from four to five dollars a week, and by clubbing together and boarding themselves students can live comfortably and pleasantly at still lower rates. This plan has been adopted by many students, and several mess clubs are organized annually.

PRIZES AND HOSPITAL APPOINTMENTS.

Mrs. Gertrude W. Vander Poel has endowed a prize in memory of her husband, the late S. Oakley Vander Poel, M. D., for many years a professor in this college. It consists of a practical working microscope and will be awarded to the senior student passing the best bedside examination in general medicine.

Professor Vander Veer offers a prize for the best report of the surgical clinics held during the session, and Professors Hailes and Morrow offer a prize for the second best report of these clinics.

Professor Merrill offers a prize for the best report of the eye and ear clinics. Professor Townsend offers a prize to the student passing the best examination in physiology at the expiration of his first year of study in that branch.

Professor Boyd offers a case of instruments to the student passing the best final examination in obstetrics.

Professor Bigelow offers prizes for the best dry preparation of the pharynx, larynx and œsophagus, and for the best dry preparation of the nose and nasopharynx.

To the senior student passing the best final examination, Dr. T. W. Nellis (A. M. C. '81) of Albany, offers a prize consisting of a case of surgical instruments.

Dr. Horace R. Powell (A. M. C. '82) of Poughkeepsie, N. Y., offers a prize consisting of a general operating case to the senior student presenting the best thesis.

Dr. A. B. Huested (A. M. C. '63) of Albany, offers a prize consisting of Gross' complete pocket case of instruments to the junior student passing the best final examination.

At or about the close of each session, vacancies occur in the house staffs of the Albany and St. Peter's Hospitals, and these are filled by competitive examinations, open to the members of the graduating class.

REQUIREMENTS FOR GRADUATION.

The candidate must be twenty-one years of age, and exhibit a certificate from a physician or surgeon, duly authorized by law to practice his profession, that he has studied medicine and surgery under his instruction, after the age of eighteen, during a term of three years, including time spent in attending lectures, and he must present evidence of having complied with the law concerning preliminary examination.

He must have attended not less than three regular courses of lectures, the last of which must have been at this college. Students who have taken two or more courses of lectures at other accredited medical colleges, desiring to enter the third year (senior) class in this college, must pass an examination in the departments of anatomy, materia medica and therapeutics, physiology and chemistry, unless a satisfactory certificate of having passed a final examination in these branches is presented. Students who have attended one or more courses elsewhere may enter the second year (junior) class on passing an examination in inorganic chemistry, histology and materia medica, or on furnishing evidence that such final examinations have been passed at some other accredited medical college. Such entrance examinations will be equivalent to those held at the end of the second, and of the first year, respectively, in this college.

He must be of good moral character.

He must deliver to the registrar, six weeks before the end of the term, a thesis written by himself on some medical subject, and be prepared to defend it at his examination. Theses must be written upon paper ten inches by eight inches in size, with a wide margin on the inside of each page.

He must pass a satisfactory examination in the several branches of medicine and surgery, final examinations being conducted chiefly in writing and

in the order previously stated (see page 6).

Regular and punctual attendance is required, and certificates of actual attendance given at the end of the term.

LAWS OF INTEREST TO MEDICAL STUDENTS AND THE MEDICAL PROFESSION.

Medical students' examinations.

Laws of 1889, ch. 468, as amended by Laws of 1890, ch. 499.

To provide for the preliminary education of medical students.

- § 1. Before the regents of the University of the State of New York or the trustees of any medical school or college within this state shall confer the degree of doctor of medicine on any person, they shall require him to file with the secretary or recording officer of their university or college a certificate signed by the secretary of the University of the State of New York showing either that he possesses the degree of bachelor or master of arts, of bachelor or master of science, or of bachelor or doctor of philosophy received by him from a college or university duly authorized to confer the same, or that during or prior to the first year of his medical study within this state, he passed an examination conducted under the authority of the regents of the University of the State of New York or by the faculty of a medical school or college entitled to confer the degree of doctor of medicine, in accordance with the standard and rules of the said regents in arithmetic, grammar, geography, orthography, American history, English composition, and the elements of natural philosophy; or in their substantial equivalents approved by the said regents, or that he possessed qualifications which the regents considered and accepted as fully equivalent to the above-named qualifications.
- § 2. This act shall not apply to persons who have already entered upon the prescribed three years' study of medicine, nor shall it alter the time of study or the courses of medical instruction required to be pursued in the medical colleges of this state by existing statutes.

Equivalents allowed under the preceding law and other information concerning the Regents' examination.

A certificate of having successfully completed a full year's course of study in any college or university under the supervision of the Regents of the University, or registered

by the regents as maintaining a satisfactory standard; a certificate of having satisfactorily completed a three years' course in any institution subject to the visitation of the regents, or registered by the regents as maintaining a satisfactory academic standard; a regents' diploma; pass-cards issued in the regular regents' examination for eight studies, two of which have been taken from each of the four preceding groups or a regents' certificate for any ten studies.

. Certificates without examinations. — Candidates for a medical students' certificate having the degree of bachelor or master of arts, of bachelor or master of sciences, or of bachelor or doctor of philosophy, received from a college or university duly authorized to confer the same; or having credentials which can be accepted in place of an examination under the foregoing rules, shall send their credentials to "University of the State of New York Examinations Department, Albany, N. Y." They will be examined and returned at once, and if accepted, a medical students' certificate will be sent with them. If the certificate be delayed for verification of the credentials, when issued it will be dated from receipt of credentials, so that the candidate will lose no time.

CANDIDATES should notify the regents' office, at Albany, at least ten days in advance, stating at what time and in what studies they wish to be examined. They will at once be assigned the most convenient time and place.

Times, places and subjects.

Sept. 23–25, 1890.—New York, Albany, Syracuse and other places where there are at least 10 candidates. Examinations in reading, writing, spelling, arithmetic, English language, geography, elementary physics, English history, United States history, rhetoric.

Nov. 17-21, 1890.—New York, and about 200 academies and high schools. Examinations in reading and writing, spelling, arithmetic, English language, geography, elementary physics, physiology, English history, United States history, rhetoric.

Jan. 19-23, 1891.—New York, and about 160 academies and high schools not holding examinations in March. Examinations in all subjects in groups below, except conic sections, analytical geometry, surveying, mineralogy, biology, history of art, art criticism, logic, history of philosophy, pedagogy, general history, German literature, French literature.

March 2-6, 1891.—New York and about 160 academies and high schools not holding examinations in January. Examinations same as in January.

June 8-12, 1891.—New York, and 320 academies and high schools. Examinations in all subjects in groups below.

- 1. Mathematics.—Arithmetic, algebra, elementary, algebra, advanced, plane geometry, conic sections, solid geometry, plane trigonometry, analytical geometry, surveying.
- 2. Science.—Geography, astronomy, physics, elementary, physics, advanced, chemistry, mineralogy, geology, physical geography, biology, botany, zoölogy, physiology.
- 3. Language.—English, elementary, rhetoric, English, advanced, English literature, German, elementary, German, advanced, German literature, French, elementary, French, advanced, French literature, Latin, elementary, Latin composition, Cæsar's Commentaries, Sallust's Catiline, Ovid's Metamorphosis, Virgil's Æneid, Virgil's Eclogues, Cicero's Orations, Greek, elementary, Greek composition, Xenophon's Anabasis, Homer's Iliad.
- 4. Miscellaneous.—Spelling, book-keeping, drawing, history of art, art criticism, psychology, logic, ethics, history of philosophy, civil government, political economy, pedagogy, general history, Grecian history, Roman history, English history, U. S. history.

License to practice medicine.

Laws of 1887, ch. 647, § 2, as amended by the Laws of 1890, ch. 500.

To regulate the licensing and registration of physicians and surgeons, and to codify the medical laws of the state of New York.

§ 2. From and after the date of the taking effect of this act, no person not theretofore licensed or authorized to practice physic or surgery in this state shall be deemed so

licensed or authorized except one of the three following classes:

First. All who shall have been graduated from an incorporated medical school or college in this state with the degree of doctor of medicine, after substantial compliance with all the requirements of the general laws and of the charter of said corporation regulating the term and amount of study, attendance and attainment requisite to obtain said degree: provided that no person shall receive the degree of doctor of medicine, or be licensed to practice physic or surgery in this state unless, after the age of eighteen, he shall have pursued the study of medical science for at least three years in a chartered medical school, or with some physician and surgeon duly authorized by law to practice physic or surgery, and shall have attended two complete courses of lectures in some legally incorporated medical school or college in good standing at the time of such attendance, prior to the granting to him or her a diploma or license. Provided, further, that two courses of lectures, both of which shall be either begun or completed within the same calendar year, shall not satisfy the above requirement.

Second. All who have received said degree from the regents of the University of the State of New York after substantial compliance with the legal requisites preliminary to its attainment, and after examination by a legally constituted board of medical examiners

of this state.

Third. All who, having been graduated from incorporated medical schools or colleges without the state as doctors of medicine, or licensed to practice physic or surgery under the laws of those European countries in which said degree does not confer the right so to practice, shall procure their diplomas from said corporations, or their licenses from such countries, to be indorsed by the regents of the University on the recommendation of a legally constituted board of medical examiners of this state. Every such indorsement shall be in the form of schedule A or of schedule B, provided by the tenth section of this act. The regents shall keep a record of such indorsements, and may require applicants to verify their statements under oath; any indorsement made with fraudulent intent, or gross carelessness or ignorance, shall be deemed a misdemeanor, and shall subject the indorser or indorsers, upon conviction thereof, to a fine of two hundred and fifty dollars; provided, however, that no such indorsement as is above specified shall be made until the applicant thereof shall file with the person, officer or body above named as authorized to make such indorsement, a certificate, signed by the secretary of the University of the State of New York, showing that such applicant has received the degree of bachelor or master of arts, of bachelor or master of science, or of bachelor or doctor of philosophy, from a college or university duly authorized to confer the same; or that he has passed an examination conducted under the authority and in accordance with the rules of the regents of the University of the State of New York, in arithmetic, grammar, geography, spelling, American history, English composition and elementary physics; or that he possesses qualifications which the regents have considered and accepted as fully equivalent to the above-named qualifications; as such degrees and certificate are more particularly defined in an act of the legislature of the state of New York, by chapter 468 of the Laws of 1889, entitled "An act to provide for the preliminary education of medical students," and as the same may be hereafter amended.

ALBANY COLLEGE OF PHARMACY.

DEPARTMENT OF PHARMACY, UNION UNIVERSITY.

SESSION OF 1890-91.

This department was created by act of the Board of Governors of Union University, June 21, 1881, and incorporated August 27, 1881. The tenth course of lectures will open on Monday, October 6, 1890, and close March 10, 1891. The exercises of the college are held in the Albany Medical College building on Eagle street.

The course extends over two years, divided into junior and senior classes, composed of first and second year students respectively. Three or more lectures are delivered to each class each week besides laboratory classes and other exercises. Senior lectures on Monday, Wednesday and Friday evenings, and junior lectures on Tuesday and Thursday evenings and Saturday afternoons. Candidates for the degree of Graduate in Pharmacy (Ph. G.) must attend two full courses of lectures, be at least twenty-one years of age, submit a thesis and pass the required examinations. They must also have served at least four years with some reputable pharmacist. Fees: Matriculation fee (paid but once), \$3.00; lecture tickets for full course (with no charge for courses after the second), per session, \$30.00; laboratory fee, \$15.00; graduation fee, \$10.00. Various prizes are awarded to meritorious students at close of the term.

UNION COLLEGE.

The college offers to students the usual classical course; a scientific course (embracing more of mathematical and English studies; also modern languages or Latin), an engineering, a chemical and an eclectic course; also postgraduate courses. There is also a department of physical training.

Union College students have the privilege of attending the medical lectures of the Albany Medical College without expense, and matriculation is granted

to Union College graduates without examination.

Preliminary Examination.— Since September 1, 1876, all students entering this college have been required to pass an examination in the ordinary English branches and in the elements of natural philosophy, unless evidence has been presented of a satisfactory preliminary education. The faculty are now relieved of this duty, and heartily approve the existing law applying to all medical colleges in the State, by which the preliminary examination of medical students is placed under the control of the Board of Regents of the University of the State of New York. Those contemplating the study of medicine are advised to apply to the Examinations Department, University State New York, Albany, by letter or otherwise, for information concerning this examination. One of the examinations will be held in Albany September 22–24, 1891. (For copy of law, with credentials and qualifications accepted by the Regents in place of examination, see pages 19 and 20.)

Union University includes the ALBANY MEDICAL COLLEGE, Albany College of Pharmacy, Albany Law School and the Dudley Observatory, all at Albany, and Union College and the School of Civil Engineering at Schenectady.

Beginning with the session of 1890-91, the faculty of the Albany Medical College adopted a strictly graded three years' course, though for ten years previous attendance upon three courses of lectures prior to graduation had been required with a few exceptions, as stated in previous catalogues. Henceforth no exception will be made, and three courses of lectures now constitute an essential prerequisite for graduation. The new curriculum, which went into operation last year, embraces lectures by professors and lecturers; recitations conducted mainly by instructors, and practical demonstrations, clinical teaching and laboratory work, in which the professors in the different departments will be assisted by clinical assistants and demonstrators. The faculty hope to receive the continued encouragement and support of the profession, and particularly of their own alumni in their earnest endeavor to render their in-

struction more practical and more thorough.

The college building, situated on Eagle street, is well appointed in its lecture-rooms, laboratories, dissecting-rooms, library and museums. Extensive improvements have been made to the building during the last few years, a large and perfectly arranged dissecting-room having been built in the upper story, furnished with every convenience for the use of the classes in practical anatomy, together with a private dissecting-room and a physiological laboratory. Special arrangements have been made by which an abundant supply of material is secured. The chemical laboratory was rebuilt in 1884, and a two-story building erected, fitted with every requisite for the illustration of the lectures, and the use of the students in practical chemistry, while "Alumni Hall," constituting the south wing of the college building, was greatly improved and re-furnished throughout at about the same time, and is used for the classes in histology and pathological anatomy, and for other college exercises.

During the summer of 1887, the anatomical amphitheatre, in which most of the lectures are delivered, was entirely remodeled and furnished with roomy, comfortable chairs, and the entire building is now heated by steam, and all halls, lecture-rooms and ante-rooms equably warmed and amply supplied with fresh air.

The location of the college at Albany is such as to afford superior advantages to the student. The hospitals and dispensaries furnish always an abundant supply of material for the illustration of clinical medicine and surgery, while the museums are especially rich in anatomical and pathological preparations, unequaled in their variety and rarity. They contain the valuable morbid specimens accumulated by the late Drs. March, Armsby and McNaughton, and the pathological specimens, the Sydenham Society plates on diseases of the skin, and Böck's anatomical models recently added by Dr. Vander Veer.

The Albany Hospital, St. Peter's Hospital, Child's Hospital, County Hospital, together with the Eye and Ear Infirmary and the dispensaries connected with each, are, by the regulations of their governing boards, made available for clinical purposes to the students.

The appointments to positions in the Albany Hospital and St. Peter's Hospital as resident physician and surgeon, and first and second assistants, are annually made and competed for by members of the graduating class.

COURSE OF INSTRUCTION.

The three years' graded course now required in this college is arranged as follows: The studies of the first year are anatomy and histology, physics, inorganic and organic chemistry, physiology and materia medica, with laboratory work in chemistry and histology, dissection and attendance upon the general medical and surgical clinic. The final examination in inorganic chemistry, histology and materia medica, and an annual examination in organic chemistry, anatomy and physiology are held at the close of this year.

The studies of the second year are anatomy, including topographical anatomy and anatomy of the nervous system, pathological anatomy, physiology, organic chemistry, therapeutics, surgery, practice of medicine, obstetrics and gynecology, with laboratory work in pathological anatomy and clinics. At the end of this year final examinations are held in organic chemistry, anatomy, pathological anatomy, physiology and therapeutics, and annual examinations

in the practice of medicine, surgery and obstetrics.

The studies of the third year are practice of medicine, surgery, obstetrics, diseases of children, gynecology, diseases of the nervous system and of the eye, ear, skin, nose and throat, insanity and medical jurisprudence, with clinics and conferences. At the end of this year final examinations are held

in practice, surgery, obstetrics and specialties.

Believing that instruction by recitation is as essential in medical as in literary colleges, the faculty have greatly enlarged and extended this department of the teaching in this college. The recitations, which previous to the adoption of the new curriculum had been held during unoccupied hours in the evening, are now made part of the regular curriculum. Every study taught in the college by lectures is also made the subject of recitations, the ratio of the number of lectures to that of recitations being in general two to one. By thus making the recitations a part of the regular course of instruction, it is possible to make sure not only that they are properly conducted, and that the students thoroughly understand the lectures, but also to save the students from a considerable expenditure of money, and to do away with all outside quiz-classes and with the objectionable system of cramming which such classes encourage.

The arrangement is fully shown in the order of instruction following.

OUTLINES OF COURSES.

PRACTICE OF MEDICINE.—Profs. Ward, Curtis and Hun.

Theory and Practice. Prof. Ward delivers a systematic course of lectures, profusely illustrated with pathological specimens. These lectures are supplemented by study in some standard text-book, and each week the students are examined by Dr. Brennan, on the subject-matter of the lectures of that week.

Hygiene is taught by Prof. Ward in lectures which have special reference

to the needs of the general practitioner.

Diseases of the Heart and Lungs. Prof. Hun delivers two lectures, illustrated with pathological specimens, each week on this subject, and Dr. Van Rensselaer conducts a recitation each week on the subject-matter of the lectures.

Clinical Medicine. Prof. Ward holds a medical clinic each week, in the amphitheatre of the Albany Hospital, and Prof. Hun holds a medical clinic each week, in St. Peter's or the Child's Hospital, before the senior class. In these clinics the students have opportunities for the personal examination of patients; their examination and diagnosis being criticised by the professor.

Ausculation and Percussion and Physical Examination are taught practically by Dr. Gordinier to the junior class, which for this purpose is divided up

into small groups.

Diseases of Nervous System. Prof. Hun delivers a didactic lecture, and also holds a clinic on this subject each week. At the clinic the students are trained practically in the examination of patients and in the method of arriving at a diagnosis. As a preparation to this course Dr. Gordinier delivers to the junior class a lecture each week on the anatomy of the nervous system. These lectures are profusely illustrated by dissections of the central nervous organs, and by charts and plates.

Insanity. Dr. C. F. MacDonald delivers a course of lectures on this subject and holds clinics at the asylum connected with the alms-house, and at the

Marshall Infirmary, Troy.

Diseases of the Skin. Prof. Curtis delivers each week on this subject a

lecture which is illustrated by clinical material and the use of plates.

Surgery.—Profs. Vander Veer, Hailes, Merrill and Morrow. In the lectures on surgical pathology, the method by which the tissues are nourished in health having been first discussed, the subjects of hypertrophy and atrophy are taken up, and then full consideration is bestowed upon the pathology of the methods by which wounds heal, and upon the processes of inflammation, suppuration, ulceration, gangrene, necrosis, septicæmia, pyæmia, poisoned wounds, etc. A considerable portion of the surgical course is devoted to pathology, for the reason that if students do not become well grounded in it during their college course, they are very unlikely to take it up after becoming occupied with the details of practice. The course on operative surgery includes all the usual operations. In the department of principles and practice of surgery, particular attention is paid to the subject of diagnosis, and all didactic teaching upon the various branches of surgery is richly illustrated in the clinical material furnished by the several well-regulated hospitals of the city. As in the past, it will be the aim to make the surgical clinics of the greatest value to the student. All the departments of the surgical chair make free use of the diagrams and specimens found in the excellent and complete museums of the college.

The subject of antiseptic surgery in all that pertains to the knowledge and direct application of the same will be presented in the various operations. During the term the students have an excellent opportunity of seeing a number of cases of abdominal surgery for the relief of various forms of obstruc-

tion of the bowels and the removal of abdominal tumors.

Fractures and Dislocations. This subject will be treated in a practical manner, a thorough course of lectures being given, in which the various fractures and dislocations will be illustrated by a specially prepared skeleton. The employment of the various means for the reduction of dislocations and the preparation of splints and other surgical appliances, will be taught in the lecture-room, and followed by clinical instruction at the hospital, senior students being required to examine and diagnose injuries, and to select, prepare and apply the proper dressings for reduction and for the retention of the appliances used.

Ophthalmology and Otology are taught by both didactic and clinical lectures and recitations, the students being required to examine and diagnose the cases. Practical exercises are held in the use of the ophthalmoscope, the determination of glasses and the performance of the various operations. The

eye and ear clinics are held every Friday at noon during the year.

Orthopedic Surgery will be taught by lectures combined with clinical instruction, the various hospitals furnishing an abundance of material for the

illustration of this important subject.

OBSTETRICS, GYNECOLOGY AND DISEASES OF CHILDREN. — Prof. Boyd. This course will comprise a series of lectures on the science and art of midwifery; on gynecology, and also on the diseases of children. The lectures will be didactic and clinical. Recitations will be held once a week during the term.

In addition to the regular clinical lectures on gynecology, practical instruction in this department will be given the members of the senior class at the Albany Hospital, the class being divided into sections in order to witness the operations. Provision will be made to enable members of the senior

class to attend one or more cases of obstetrics during the term.

CHEMISTRY.—Profs. Perkins and Tucker. The course in this department includes lectures upon certain branches of physics—more especially light, heat and electricity—the principles of chemistry with its nomenclature and notation, the non-metals, and metals, with their more important medical compounds, and organic chemistry, including the analysis of urine, toxicology, etc. These lectures are abundantly illustrated throughout. Recitations are held in each department, and more time than heretofore will be devoted to practical work in the chemical laboratory, which is now required during the first year.

ANATOMY.— Prof. Morrow and Drs. Craig and Gordinier. The course in anatomy will consist of didactic lectures and recitations, with illustrations and demonstrations from the subject and preparations. Students are required to dissect during the first year under the direction of the demonstrator and

assistant demonstrator of anatomy.

Histology. The course in histology, embryology and pathology, by Prof. Hailes, consists of didactic lectures and recitations, with screen demonstrations, the exhibition of specimens, charts, etc., and practical work in the histological laboratory two hours each week, which is now required during the first year, and in pathological anatomy during the second year.

MATERIA MEDICA. - Prof. Bigelow and Dr. Van Rensselaer. The

lectures on materia medica and therapeutics are illustrated by the exhibition of officinal plants and prints, together with specimens of the various officinal compounds and preparations, and by the presentation of the different means and methods of medication resorted to in the treatment of disease. Special attention is given to the demonstration of the action of therapeutic agents, and to the manner of their administration. Recitations are frequently held; dissertations on remedies are prepared and read by members of the class, and the aim is to furnish a course not only didactic, but also thoroughly practical.

Diseases of the Throat and Nose.—Prof. Bigelow. Clinics are held each week by the professor, and the student familiarized with the diseases of these parts, and made acquainted with the various methods in use for the examina-

tion and treatment of laryngeal and nasal disorders.

Physiology.— *Prof. Townsend.* This branch is taught by means of didactic lectures, weekly recitations as well as frequent demonstrations upon the lower animals, the study being naturally divided into several departments, as physiological chemistry, physiological anatomy and histology, nutrition—comprising the subjects of digestion, absorption, secretion, the blood and its circulation—the nervous system, etc. The student thus can study the body "as a machine, learning the construction of its parts, the mechanism of their action, the materials with which it is supplied, the chemical transformation of its internal nutrition, as well as the phenomena which it exhibits in every department of the vital operations."

LABORATORIES.

PRACTICAL CHEMISTRY. The chemical laboratory is well fitted and conveniently arranged for the use of the classes in practical chemistry, and for the illustration of the lectures in the chemical department. The laboratory is open during the entire year. The instruction given is in harmony with the lectures on chemistry delivered during the term, and is so conducted as to secure to the student a practical familiarity with the apparatus, materials, processes and reactions, which are the subjects of his professional study and which are to be employed in his subsequent practice. Each student has a desk and chemicals for his own use, and is supplied with all necessary apparatus. With this practical instruction is combined a study of the principles of theoretical chemistry, chemical notation, nomenclature, etc.

HISTOLOGY AND PATHOLOGICAL ANATOMY. Important changes and additions have been made in this department, several thousand dollars having been expended in the purchase of new microscopes and auxiliaries, in order that every facility may be furnished for successful work in these branches. The laboratory has been refitted and newly equipped throughout, and fur-

nishes ample accommodations for fifty or more students.

Each student is taught the technique of the microscope, and is instructed in the preparation, cutting, staining and mounting of specimens, and in the

structure of the several tissues and organs of the body.

Instruction in pathological histology, including the diagnosis of tumors, examination of the urine, etc., is given each term, and students are instructed in the methods of preparing for microscopical examination the morbid material furnished by the surgical clinics and the autopsies made during the term. Each student will be required to make numerous practical examinations, both microscopical and chemical, of albuminous, diabetic and

other abnormal specimens of urine, and will be required to stain and examine numbers of specimens containing bacteria, until perfectly familiar with the methods employed in staining and demonstrating them.

Special laboratory courses in bacteriology are also provided.

FEES AND EXPENSES.

All fees are payable in advance, and are as follows: For matriculation, five dollars, payable each year; for the year's lectures, one hundred dollars. Students who have attended two courses of lectures at this college will be charged fifty dollars for their third course, but a perpetual ticket entitling to attendance upon three or more courses may be obtained on payment of two hundred dollars in advance. Students who have attended one course of lectures at this or some other accredited medical college will be charged one hundred dollars for their second and fifty dollars for their third course, and those who have attended two courses of lectures elsewhere will be charged seventy-five dollars for their third course in this college. Graduates of this institution have perpetual free admission. Graduates of other medical schools will be admitted upon payment of fifty dollars and the matriculation fee. Dissection, ten dollars, which is required the first year and optional during the other years of the course; dissecting material is free, and there are no incidentals in this department. Courses in the chemical laboratory, in histology and in pathology, ten dollars each. The graduation fee is twentyfive dollars, which must be paid to the registrar before the candidate can be admitted to an examination.

The cost of living in Albany is less than in most other cities of its size. The janitor of the college keeps a list of boarding-houses at which good rooms and board can be obtained at from four to five dollars a week, and by clubbing together and boarding themselves students can live comfortably and pleasantly at still lower rates. This plan has been adopted by many students,

and several mess clubs are organized annually.

PRIZES AND HOSPITAL APPOINTMENTS.

Mrs. Gertrude W. Vander Poel has endowed a prize in memory of her husband, the late S. Oakley Vander Poel, M. D., for many years a professor in this college. It consists of a practical working microscope and will be awarded to the senior student passing the best bedside examination in general medicine.

Professor Vander Veer offers a prize for the best report of the surgical clinics held during the session, and Professors Hailes and Morrow offer a

prize for the second best report of these clinics.

Professor Merrill offers a prize for the best report of the eye and ear clinics. Professor Townsend offers a prize to the student passing the best examination in physiology at the expiration of his first year of study in that branch.

Professor Boyd offers a case of instruments to the student passing the best

final examination in obstetrics.

Professor Bigelow offers prizes for the best dry preparation of the pharynx, larynx and œsophagus, and for the best dry preparation of the nose and nasopharynx.

To the senior student passing the best final examination, Dr. T. W. Nellis (A. M. C. '81) of Albany, offers a prize consisting of a case of surgical instru-

ments.

Dr. Horace R. Powell (A. M. C. '82) of Poughkeepsie, N. Y., offers a prize

consisting of a general operating case to the second year student passing the best final examination.

A. B. Huested (A. M. C. '63) & Co., of Albany, offer a prize consisting of Gross' complete pocket case of instruments to the first year student passing the best final examination.

At or about the close of each session, vacancies occur in the house staffs of the Albany and St. Peter's Hospitals, and these are filled by competitive examinations, open to the members of the graduating class.

REQUIREMENTS FOR GRADUATION.

The candidate must be twenty-one years of age, and exhibit a certificate from a physician or surgeon, duly authorized by law to practice his profession, that he has studied medicine and surgery under his instruction, after the age of eighteen, during a term of three years, including time spent in attending lectures, and he must present evidence of having complied with the law concerning preliminary examination.

He must have attended not less than three regular courses of lectures, the last of which must have been at this college. Students who have taken two or more courses of lectures at other accredited medical colleges, desiring to enter the third year (senior) class in this college, must pass an examination in the departments of anatomy, materia medica and therapeutics, physiology and chemistry, unless a satisfactory certificate of having passed a final examination in these branches is presented. Students who have attended one or

more courses elsewhere may enter the second year class on passing an examination in inorganic chemistry, histology and materia medica, or on furnishing evidence that such final examinations have been passed at some other accredited medical college. Such entrance examinations will be equivalent to those held at the end of the second and of the first year, respectively, in this college.

He must be of good moral character.

He must pass a satisfactory examination in the several branches of medicine and surgery, final examinations being conducted chiefly in writing and in the order previously stated (see page 6).

Regular and punctual attendance is required, and certificates of actual

attendance given at the end of the term.

FIRST YEAR.

MEDICAL STUDENTS' EXAMINATIONS.

Laws of 1889, ch. 468, as amended by Laws of 1890, ch. 499.

To provide for the preliminary education of medical students.

- § 1. Before the regents of the University of the State of New York or the trustees of any medical school or college within this state shall confer the degree of doctor of medicine on any person, they shall require him to file with the secretary or recording officer of their university or college a certificate signed by the secretary of the University of the State of New York showing either that he possesses the degree of bachelor or master of arts, of bachelor or master of science, or of bachelor or doctor of philosophy received by him from a college or university duly authorized to confer the same, or that during or prior to the first year of his medical study within this state, he passed an examination conducted under the authority of the regents of the University of the State of New York or by the faculty of a medical school or college entitled to confer the degree of doctor of medicine, in accordance with the standard and rules of the said regents in arithmetic, grammar, geography, orthography, American history, English composition, and the elements of natural philosophy; or in their substantial equivalents approved by the said regents, or that he possessed qualifications which the regents considered and accepted as fully equivalent to the above-named qualifications.
- § 2. This act shall not apply to persons who have already entered upon the prescribed three years' study of medicine;* nor shall it alter the time of study or the courses of medical instruction required to be pursued in the medical colleges of this state by existing statutes.

Notes on the Law.

- 1. The medical student certificate must be obtained during or prior to the first year of medical study in this state.
 - 2. The regents will accept as "substantial equivalents" the following:
- (a) A certificate of having successfully completed a full year's course of study in any college or university under the supervision of the regents of the University, or registered by the regents as maintaining a satisfactory standard.
- (b) A certificate of having satisfactorily completed a three years' course in any institution subject to the visitation of the regents, or registered by the regents as maintaining a satisfactory academic standard.
- (c) A certificate of having passed the examinations preliminary to the study of medicine, required by the present medical act of Canada.
- (d) A certificate of having passed the matriculation examinations of any university in Great Britain or Ireland.
 - (e) A regents' diploma.
 - (f) Regents' pass cards for any 20 counts not including reading and writing.

Extracts from Rules.

Printed question papers will be issued from the regents' office for each examination. Answers must be written in ink on both sides of letter paper, and arranged and numbered in the same order as the questions. Candidates should bring pen and ink. Paper and blotters will be supplied.

Seventy-five per cent of correct answers is required in all subjects.

Answer papers will be reviewed in the regents' office, and all papers below standard will be returned to the candidates. For those accepted, pass cards will be issued.

Pass cards.—A regents' pass card is not limited in time; therefore it is not necessary to pass any regents' examination a second time.

To insure success, candidates should have a thorough knowledge of the whole of a standard school text book on each required subject, including the metric system, but not cube root in elementary arithmetic.

Medical student certificate.—When all requirements are fulfilled, the regents grant a medical student certificate.

On receiving this certificate, the candidate must send it to the secretary or recording officer of the university or college at which he intends to study medicine.

Candidates for the law or medical student examinations should send notice at least 10 days in advance, stating at what time and in what studies they wish to be examined, that required desk room may be provided at the most convenient place.

Candidates who fail to send this advance notice will be admitted only so far as there are unoccupied seats.

Certificates without examinations.—Candidates having the degree of B. A., M. A., B. S., M. S., Ph. B. or Ph. D., or having other credentials which can be accepted in place of an examination, should send them to the Examinations department. They will be returned as soon as verified, and if accepted, a law or medical student certificate will be sent with them. The certificate will be dated from receipt of credentials, so that the candidate will lose no time.

ALBANY COLLEGE OF PHARMACY.

DEPARTMENT OF PHARMACY, UNION UNIVERSITY.

SESSION OF 1891-2.

This department was created by act of the Board of Governors of Union University, June 21, 1881, and incorporated August 27, 1881. The eleventh course of lectures will open on Monday, October 5, 1891, and close March 8, 1892. The exercises of the college are held in the Albany Medical College building on Eagle street.

The following constitute the faculty:

WILLIS G. TUCKER, Ph. D., F. C. S., President, Professor of Chemistry.

Alfred B. Huested, M. D., Ph. G., Secretary, Professor of Botany and Materia Medica.

GUSTAVUS MICHAELIS, Ph. G. Professor of Pharmacy.

The course extends over two years, divided into junior and senior classes, composed of first and second year students respectively. Three or more lectures are delivered to each class each week besides laboratory classes and other exercises. Senior lectures on Monday, Wednesday and Friday evenings, and junior lectures on Tuesday and Thursday evenings and Saturday afternoons. Candidates for the degree of Graduate in Pharmacy (Ph. G.) must attend two full courses of lectures, be at least twenty-one years of age, submit a thesis and pass the required examinations. They must also have served at least four years with some reputable pharmacist. Fees: Matriculation fee (paid but once), \$3.00; lecture tickets for full course (with no charge for courses after the second), per session, \$30.00; chemical and pharmaceutical laboratory fees, each \$15.00; graduation fee, \$10.00. Various prizes are awarded to meritorious students at the close of the term.

UNION COLLEGE.

The college offers to students the usual classical course; a scientific course (embracing more of mathematical and English studies; also modern languages or Latin), an engineering, a chemical and an eclectic course; also postgraduate courses. There is also a department of physical training.


DUDLEY OBSERVATORY, ALBANY.



Preliminary Examination.—Since September 1, 1876, all students entering this college have been required to pass an examination in the ordinary English branches and in the elements of natural philosophy, unless evidence had been presented of a satisfactory preliminary education. The faculty are now relieved of this duty, and heartily approve the existing law applying to all medical colleges in the state, by which the preliminary examination of medical students is placed under the control of the Board of Regents of the University of the State of New York. Those contemplating the study of medicine are advised to apply to the Examinations Department, University State New York, Albany, by letter or otherwise, for information concerning this examination. One of the examinations will be held in Albany, September 27–29, 1892. (For copy of law, with credentials and qualifications accepted by the Regents in place of examination, see pages 22 and 23.)

NION University includes the ALBANY MEDICAL COLLEGE, Albany College of Pharmacy, Albany Law School and the Dudley Observatory, all at Albany, and Union College and the School of Civil Engineering at Schenectady.

Beginning with the session of 1890–91, the faculty of the Albany Medical College adopted a strictly graded three years' course, though, for ten years previous, attendance upon three courses of lectures prior to graduation had been required with a few exceptions, as stated in previous catalogues. No exception to the rule is now made, and three courses of lectures constitute an essential prerequisite for graduation. The new curriculum, which went into operation with the session of 1890–91, embraces lectures by professors and lecturers; recitations conducted mainly by instructors, and practical demonstrations, clinical teaching and laboratory work, in which the professors in the different departments are assisted by clinical assistants and demonstrators. The faculty hope to receive the continued encouragement and support of the profession, and particularly of their own alumni in their earnest endeavor to render their instruction each year more practical and more thorough.

The college building, situated on Eagle street, is well appointed in its lecture-rooms, laboratories, dissecting-rooms, library and museums. Extensive improvements have been made to the building during the last few years, a large and perfectly arranged dissecting-room having been built in the upper story, furnished with every convenience for the use of the classes in practical anatomy, together with a private dissecting-room and a physiological laboratory. Special arrangements have been made by which an abundant supply of material is secured. The chemical laboratory, rebuilt

in 1884, is fitted with every requisite for the illustration of the lectures and the use of the students in practical chemistry, while, "Alumni Hall," constituting the south wing of the college building, was greatly improved and refurnished throughout at about the same time, and is used for the classes in histology and pathological anatomy, and for other college exercises. The anatomical amphitheatre, in which most of the lectures are delivered, is furnished with roomy, comfortable chairs, and the entire building is heated by steam and well ventilated throughout.

The location of the college at Albany is such as to afford superior advantages to the student. The hospitals and dispensaries furnish always an abundant supply of material for the illustration of clinical medicine and surgery, while the museums are especially rich in anatomical and pathological preparations, unequaled in their variety and rarity. They contain the valuable morbid specimens accumulated by the late Drs. March, Armsby and McNaughton, and the pathological specimens, the Sydenham Society plates on diseases of the skin, and Böck's anatomical models recently added by Dr. Vander Veer.

The Albany Hospital, St. Peter's Hospital, Child's Hospital, County Hospital, together with the Eye and Ear Infirmary and the dispensaries connected with each, are, by the regulations of their governing boards, made available for clinical purposes to the students.

The appointments to positions in the Albany Hospital and St. Peter's Hospital as resident physician and surgeon, and first and second assistants, are annually made and competed for by members of the graduating class.

COURSE OF INSTRUCTION.

The three years' graded course now required in this college is arranged as follows: The studies of the first year are anatomy and histology, physics, inorganic and organic chemistry, physiology and materia medica, with laboratory work in chemistry and histology, dissection and attendance upon the general medical and surgical clinics. The final examination in inorganic chemistry, histology and materia medica, and an annual examination in organic chemistry, anatomy and physiology are held at the close of this year.

The studies of the second year are anatomy, including topographical anatomy and anatomy of the nervous system, pathological anatomy, physiology, organic chemistry, therapeutics, surgery, practice of medicine, obstetrics and gynecology, with laboratory work in pathological anatomy, practical courses in physical examination, bandaging, etc., and clinics. At the end of this year final examinations are held in organic chemistry, anatomy, pathological anatomy, physiology and therapeutics, and annual examinations in the practice of medicine, surgery and obstetrics.

The studies of the third year are practice of medicine, surgery, obstetrics, diseases of children, gynecology, diseases of the nervous system and of the eye, ear, skin, nose and throat, insanity and medical jurisprudence, with practical courses in operative surgery, ophthalmoscopy, etc., clinics and medical and surgical conferences. At the end of this year final examinations are held in practice, surgery, obstetrics and specialties.

Believing that instruction by recitation is as essential in medical as in literary colleges, the faculty have greatly enlarged and extended this department of the teaching in this college. The recitations, which previous to the adoption of the new curriculum had been held during unoccupied hours in the evening, are now made part of the regular curriculum. Every study taught in the college by lectures is also made the subject of recitations, these constituting a part of the regular course of instruction. Outside quiz-classes, with the objectionable system of cramming which such classes encourage, are thus done away with and students saved considerable expense, while the faculty are assured that the recitations are properly conducted and the lectures thoroughly understood.

The order of instruction for the last session was as follows, and that for 1892-3 will be essentially the same.

OUTLINES OF COURSES.

PRACTICE OF MEDICINE.

PROFS. WARD, CURTIS AND HUN.

Theory and Practice. Prof. Ward delivers a systematic course of lectures, profusely illustrated with pathological specimens. These lectures are supplemented by study in some standard text-book, and each week the students are examined by Dr. Brennan, on the subject-matter of the lectures of that week.

Hygiene is taught by Prof. Ward in lectures which have special reference to the needs of the general practitioner.

Diseases of the Heart and Lungs. Dr. Van Rensselaer delivers a course of lectures, illustrated with pathological specimens, on this subject, with a recitation each week on the subject-matter of the lectures.

Clinical Medicine. Prof. Ward holds a medical clinic each week, in the amphitheatre of the Albany Hospital, and Prof. Hun holds a medical clinic each week, in St. Peter's or the Child's Hospital, before the senior class. In these clinics the students have opportunities for the personal examination of patients; their examination and diagnosis being criticised by the professor.

Ausculation and Percussion and Physical Examination are taught practically by Dr. Gordinier to the junior class, which for this purpose is divided up into small groups.

Diseases of the Nervous System. Prof. Hun delivers a didactic lecture, and also holds a clinic on this subject each week. At the clinic the students are trained practically in the examination of patients and in the method of arriving at a diagnosis. As a preparation to this course Dr. Gordinier delivers to the junior class a lecture each week on the anatomy of the nervous system. These lectures are profusely illustrated by dissections of the central nervous organs, and by charts and plates.

Insanity. Dr. Kempster delivers a course of lectures on this subject and holds clinics at the asylum connected with the alms-house, and at the Marshall Infirmary, Troy.

Diseases of the Skin. Prof. Curtis delivers each week on this subject a lecture which is illustrated by clinical material and the use of plates.

SURGERY.

PROFS. VANDER VEER, HAILES, MERRILL AND MORROW.

In the lectures on surgical pathology, the method by which the tissues are nourished in health having been first discussed, the subjects of hypertrophy and atrophy are taken up, and then full consideration is bestowed upon the pathology of the methods by which wounds heal, and upon the processes

of inflammation, suppuration, ulceration, gangrene, necrosis, septicæmia, pyæmia, poisoned wounds, etc. A considerable portion of the surgical course is devoted to pathology, for the reason that if students do not become well grounded in it during their college course, they are very unlikely to take it up after becoming occupied with the details of practice. The course on operative surgery includes all the usual operations. In the department of principles and practice of surgery, particular attention is paid to the subject of diagnosis, and all didactic teaching upon the various branches of surgery is richly illustrated in the clinical material furnished by the several well-regulated hospitals of the city. As in the past, it will be the aim to make the surgical clinics of the greatest value to the student. All the departments of the surgical chair make free use of the diagrams and specimens found in the excellent and complete museums of the college.

The subject of antiseptic surgery in all that pertains to the knowledge and direct application of the same will be presented in the various operations. During the term the students have an excellent opportunity of seeing a number of cases of abdominal surgery for the relief of various forms of obstruction of the bowels and the removal of abdominal tumors.

Fractures and Dislocations. This subject will be treated in a practical manner, a thorough course of lectures being given, in which the various fractures and dislocations will be illustrated by a specially prepared skeleton. The employment of the various means for the reduction of dislocations and the preparation of splints and other surgical appliances, will be taught in the lecture-room, and followed by clinical instruction at the hospital, senior students being required to examine and diagnose injuries, and to select, prepare and apply the proper dressings for reduction and for the retention of the appliances used.

Ophthalmology and Otology are taught by both didactic and clinical lectures and recitations, the students being required to examine and diagnose the cases. Practical exercises are held in the use of the ophthalmoscope, the determination of glasses and the performance of the various operations. The eye and ear clinics are held every Friday at noon during the year.

Orthopedic Surgery will be taught by lectures combined with clinical instruction, the various hospitals furnishing an abundance of material for the illustration of this important subject.

OBSTETRICS, GYNECOLOGY AND DISEASES OF CHILDREN.

PROF. BOYD.

This course will comprise a series of lectures on the science and art of midwifery; on gynecology, and also on the diseases of children. The lectures will be didactic and clinical. Recitations will be held once a week during the term.

In addition to the regular clinical lectures on gynecology, practical instruction in this department will be given the members of the senior class at the Albany Hospital, the class being divided into sections in order to witness the operations. Provision will be made to enable members of the senior class to attend one or more cases of obstetrics during the term.

CHEMISTRY.

PROFS. PERKINS AND TUCKER.

The course in this department includes lectures upon certain branches of physics — more especially light, heat and electricity — the principles of chemistry with its nomenclature and notation, the non-metals, and metals, with their more important medical compounds, and organic chemistry, including the analysis of urine, toxicology, etc. These lectures are abundantly illustrated throughout. Recitations are held in each department. Practical work in the chemical laboratory is now obligatory and required during the first year.

ANATOMY.

PROF. MORROW AND DRS. CRAIG AND GORDINIER.

The course in anatomy will consist of didactic lectures and recitations, with illustrations and demonstrations from the subject and preparations. Students are required to dissect during the first year under the direction of the demonstrator and assistant demonstrator of anatomy.

Histology. The course in histology, embryology and pathology, by Prof. Hailes, consists of didactic lectures and recitations, with screen demonstrations, the exhibition of specimens, charts, etc., and practical work in the histological laboratory two hours each week, which is now required during the first year, and in pathological anatomy during the second year.

MATERIA MEDICA.

Prof. Bigelow and Dr. Van Rensselaer.

The lectures on materia medica and therapeutics are illustrated by the exhibition of officinal plants and prints, together with specimens of the various officinal compounds and preparations, and by the presentation of the different means and methods of medication resorted to in the treatment of disease. Special attention is given to the demonstration of the action of therapeutic agents, and to the manner of their administration. Recitations are frequently held; dissertations on remedies are prepared and read by members of the class, and the aim is to furnish a course not only didactic, but also thoroughly practical.

Diseases of the Throat and Nose.—Prof. Bigelow. Clinics are held each week by the professor, and the student familiarized with the diseases of these parts, and made acquainted with the various methods in use for the examination and treatment of laryngeal and nasal disorders.

PHYSIOLOGY.

This branch is taught by means of didactic lectures, weekly recitations and experiments, the study being naturally divided into several departments, as physiological chemistry and anatomy, histology, nutrition, comprising digestion, absorption, secretion, the blood and its circulation, the nervous system, etc.

LABORATORIES.

PRACTICAL CHEMISTRY.

The chemical laboratory is well fitted and conveniently arranged for the use of the classes in practical chemistry, and for the illustration of the lectures in the chemical department. The laboratory is open during the entire year. The instruction given is in harmony with the lectures on chemistry delivered during the term, and is so conducted as to secure to the student a practical familiarity with the apparatus, materials, processes and reactions, which are the subjects of his professional study and which are to be employed in his subsequent practice. Each student has a desk and chemicals for his own use, and is supplied with all necessary apparatus. With this practical instruction is combined a study of the principles of theoretical chemistry, chemical notation, nomenclature, etc.

HISTOLOGY AND PATHOLOGICAL ANATOMY.

Important changes and additions have been made in this department, several thousand dollars having been expended in the purchase of new microscopes and auxiliaries, in order that every facility may be furnished for successful work in these branches. The laboratory has been refitted and newly equipped throughout, and furnishes ample accommodations for fifty or more students.

Each student is taught the technique of the microscope, and is instructed in the preparation, cutting, staining and mounting of specimens, and in the structure of the several tissues and organs of the body.

Instruction in pathological histology, including the diagnosis of tumors, examination of the urine, etc., is given each term, and students are instructed in the methods of preparing for microscopical examination the morbid

material furnished by the surgical clinics and the autopsies made during the term. Each student will be required to make numerous practical examinations, both microscopical and chemical, of albuminous, diabetic and other abnormal specimens of urine, and will be required to stain and examine numbers of specimens containing bacteria, until perfectly familiar with the methods employed in staining and demonstrating them.

Special laboratory courses in bacteriology are also provided.

FEES AND EXPENSES.

All fees are payable in advance, and are as follows: For matriculation, five dollars, payable each year; for the year's lectures, one hundred dollars. Students who have attended two courses of lectures at this college will be charged fifty dollars for their third course, but a perpetual ticket entitling to attendance upon three or more courses may be obtained on payment of two hundred dollars in advance. Students who have attended one course of lectures at this or some other accredited medical college will be charged one hundred dollars for their second and fifty dollars for their third course, and those who have attended two courses of lectures elsewhere will be charged seventy-five dollars for their third course in this college. Graduates of this institution have perpetual free admission. Graduates of other medical schools will be admitted upon payment of fifty dollars and the matriculation fee. Dissection, ten dollars, which is required the first year and optional during the other years of the course; dissecting material is free, and there are no incidentals in this department. Courses in the chemical laboratory, in histology and in pathology, ten dollars each. The graduation fee is twentyfive dollars, which must be paid to the registrar before the candidate can be admitted to an examination.

The cost of living in Albany is less than in most other cities of its size. The janitor of the college keeps a list of boarding-houses at which good rooms and board can be obtained at from four to five dollars a week, and by clubbing together and boarding themselves students can live comfortably and pleasantly at still lower rates.

PRIZES AND HOSPITAL APPOINTMENTS.

Mrs. Gertrude W. Vander Poel has endowed a prize in memory of her husband, the late S. Oakley Vander Poel, M.D., for many years a professor in this college. It consists of a practical working microscope and will be awarded to the senior student passing the best bedside examination in general medicine.

Professor Vander Veer offers a prize for the best report of the surgical clinics held during the session, and Professors Hailes and Morrow offer a prize for the second best report of these clinics.

Professor Merrill offers a prize for the best report of the eye and ear clinics. Professor Townsend offers a prize to the student passing the best examination in physiology at the expiration of his first year of study in that branch.

Professor Boyd offers a case of instruments to the student passing the best final examination in obstetrics.

Professor Bigelow offers prizes for the best dry preparation of the pharynx, larynx and esophagus, and for the best dry preparation of the nose and nasopharynx.

To the senior student passing the best final examination, Dr. T. W. Nellis (A. M. C., '81), of Albany, offers a prize consisting of a case of surgical instruments.

Dr. Horace R. Powell (A. M. C., '82), of Poughkeepsie, N. Y., offers a prize consisting of a general operating case to the second year student passing the best final examination.

REQUIREMENTS FOR GRADUATION.

The candidate must be twenty-one years of age, and exhibit a certificate from a physician or surgeon, duly authorized by law to practice his profession, that he has studied medicine and surgery under his instruction, after the age of eighteen, during a period of not less than three years (36 months), including time spent in attending lectures, and he must present evidence of having complied with the law concerning preliminary examination.

He must have attended not less than three regular courses of lectures, the last of which must have been at this college. Students who have taken two or more courses of lectures at other accredited medical colleges, desiring to enter the third year (senior) class in this college, must pass an examination in the departments of anatomy, materia medica and therapeutics, physiology and chemistry, unless a satisfactory certificate of having passed a final examination in these branches is presented. Students who have attended one or more courses elsewhere may enter the second year class on passing an examination in inorganic chemistry, histology and materia medica, or on furnishing evidence that such final examinations have been passed at some other accredited medical college. Such entrance examinations will be equivalent to those held at the end of the second and of the first year, respectively, in this college.

He must be of good moral character.

He must pass a satisfactory examination in the several branches of medicine and surgery, final examinations being conducted chiefly in writing and in the order previously stated. (See pages 6 and 7.)

Regular and punctual attendance is required, and certificates of actual attendance given at the end of the term.

MEDICAL STUDENTS' EXAMINATIONS.

LAWS OF 1889, CH. 468, AS AMENDED BY LAWS OF 1890, CH. 499.

To provide for the preliminary education of medical students:

§ 1. Before the regents of the University of the State of New York or the trustees of any medical school or college within this state shall confer the degree of doctor of medicine on any person, they shall require him to file with the secretary or recording officer of their university or college a certificate signed by the secretary of the University of the State of New York showing either that he possesses the degree of bachelor or master of arts, of bachelor or master of science, or of bachelor or doctor of philosophy received by him from a college or university duly authorized to confer the same, or that during or prior to the first year of his medical study within this state, he passed an examination conducted under the authority of the regents of the University of the State of New York or by the faculty of a medical school or college entitled to confer the degree of doctor of medicine, in accordance with the standard and rules of the said regents in arithmetic, grammar, geography, orthography, American history, English composition, and the elements of natural philosophy; or in their substantial equivalents approved by the said regents, or that he possessed qualifications, which the regents considered and accepted as fully equivalent to the above-named qualifications, which the regents considered and accepted as fully equivalent to the above-named qualifications, state by existing statutes.

NOTES ON THE LAW.

I. The medical student certificate must be obtained during or prior to the first year of medical study in this state.

2. The regents will accept as "substantial equivalents" the following:

(a) A certificate of having successfully completed a full year's course of study in any college or university under the supervision of the regents of the University, or registered by

the regents as maintaining a satisfactory standard.

(b) A certificate of having satisfactorily completed a three years' course in any institution subject to the visitation of the regents, or registered by the regents as maintaining a satis-

factory academic standard.

(c) A certificate of having passed in a registered institution examinations equivalent to the first year in college or to the three years' academic course.

(d) A certificate of having passed the examinations preliminary to the study of medicine,

required by the present medical act of Canada.

(e) A certificate of having passed the matriculation examinations of any university in Great Britain or Ireland. (f) A regents' diploma.

(g) Regents' pass cards for any 20 counts not including reading and writing. To secure exemption from examination the candidate must be a graduate of a college or university "registered by the regents as maintaining a satisfactory standard." This register includes schools and colleges in other states and countries as well as those in New York, but excludes institutions, wherever situated, which take the name college or university when the real grade of work done is lower.

EXTRACTS FROM RULES.

Printed question papers will be issued from the regents' office for each examination. Answers must be written in ink on both sides of letter paper, and arranged and numbered in the same order as the questions. Candidates should bring pen and ink. Paper and blotters will be supplied.

Seventy-five per cent of correct answers is required in all subjects.

Answer papers will be reviewed in the regents' office, and all papers below standard will

pe returned to the candidates. For those accepted, pass cards will be issued.

Pass cards.—A regents' pass card is not limited in time; therefore it is not necessary

to pass any regents' examination a second time.

To insure success, candidates should have a thorough knowledge of the whole of a standard school text-book on each required subject, including the metric system, but not cube root in elementary arithmetic.

Medical student certificate.—When all requirements are fulfilled, the regents grant a

medical student certificate.

On receiving this certificate, the candidate must send it to the secretary or recording officer of the university or college at which he intends to study medicine.

^{*} Prior to June 13, 1889.

Candidates for the law or medical student examinations should send notice at least 10 days in advance, stating at what time and in what studies they wish to be examined, that required desk room may be provided at the most convenient place.

Candidates who fail to send this advance notice will be admitted only so far as there are

unoccupied seats.

Certificates without examinations.—Candidates having the degree of B. A., M. A., B. S., M. S., Ph.B. or Ph.D., or having other credentials which can be accepted in place of an examination, should send them to the Examinations department. They will be returned as soon as verified, and if accepted, a law or medical student certificate will be sent with them. The certificate will be dated from receipt of credentials, so that the candidate will lose no time.

NOTE — September examinations will be held at the Albany Medical College for medical and law students only, and also in New York. Brooklyn, Syracuse and Buffalo. Other examinations will be held at different points throughout the state. Particulars concerning these examinations may be obtained by addressing Examinations Department, University of the State of New York, Albany, N. Y.

STATE MEDICAL EXAMINATIONS FOR LICENSE TO PRACTICE MEDICINE IN THE STATE OF NEW YORK.

By the laws of New York, 1890, chapter 507, section 9: — "On and after the first day of September, 1891, no person not theretofore a legally authorized practitioner of medicine and surgery, under the laws of this state then in force, shall practice medicine or surgery in this state, unless that person shall have received from the regents of the University, after examination and approval, as herein provided, a license to practice as a physician and surgeon, and unless said license shall have been registered as required under the provisions of chapter 647 of the laws of 1887."

The following are the requirements for license to practice medicine in this state, by

authority of the statute quoted above:

The regents' medical student certificate as evidence of proper preliminary education.
 Evidence that the applicant is over twenty-one years of age.

3. Certificates of moral character from two legally licensed physicians.

4. A diploma conferring the degree M. D. from some legally incorporated medical college in the United States, or a diploma or license conferring the right to practice medicine and surgery in the country in which it was granted.

5. Evidence that the applicant has studied medicine three years, including three courses of lectures in different years, in some legally incorporated medical college or colleges. No two of the above three courses of lectures may begin or end in the same calendar year.

6. The candidate must pass examinations in anatomy, physiology and hygiene, chemistry, surgery, obstetrics, pathology and diagnosis, and therapeutics, practice and materia medica. "In the department of therapeutics, practice and materia medica, the questions shall be in harmony with the tenets of the school selected by the candidate."

7. A fee of \$25, payable in advance.

Notes on The Law.

1. Seventy-five per cent of correct answers is required in all subjects.

2. All subjects must be passed at the same examination.

3. All examinations must be conducted in the English language.

. Medical preparatory courses, as such courses are now taught in various scientific schools and colleges, cannot be accepted for one year of the three years' medical study required by the law.

Powers and Duties of County Clerks in Registering Licenses to PRACTICE MEDICINE IN NEW YORK STATE.

For convenience of county clerks the following summary of the laws has been made:

I. The University of the State of New York is the only organization having authority to issue licenses to practice medicine in this state after September 1, 1891.

These licenses must be registered by county clerks, on application. (Laws of New York

These licenses must be registered by county clerks, on application. (Laws of New York 1890, ch. 507, §§ 8, 9.)

2. Licenses issued before September 1, 1891, can be registered only as follows:
(a) A diploma granting the degree M. D. issued before September 1, 1891, by an incorporated medical college in this state is a license to practice medicine and must be registered on application. (Laws of New York 1889, ch. 647, § 2.)
(b) A diploma granting the degree M. D. from a medical college out of the state, or a license to practice medicine in some foreign country, can be registered only if it was endorsed between June 18, 1880, and June 24, 1890, by an incorporated medical college of the state of New York or by the University of the State of New York, or if between June 24, 1890, and September 1, 1891, it was endorsed by the University of the State of New York. (Laws of New York 1880, ch. 513, § 4; 1887, ch. 647, § 2; 1890, ch. 500.)
3, Students who had matriculated in a New York state medical college prior to June 5, 1890, and had not received the degree M. D. prior to September 1, 1891, to be exempt, must have filed a certificate with the University of the State of New York before August 4, 1891. (Laws of New York 1891, ch. 311.)

(Laws of New York 1891, ch. 311.)
Licenses of such candidates may be registered as follows:

(a) A diploma granting the degree M. D. from a New York state medical college issued after September 1, 1891, can be registered on presentation of a certificate from the secretary of the University of the State of New York that the applicant had matriculated in some medical college of the state prior to June 5, 1890. (Laws of New York 1891, ch. 311.)

(b) A diploma granting the degree M. D. from a medical college not in the state or license to practice in a foreign country, if endorsed by the University of the State of New York, can be registered on presentation of a certified copy of a certificate filed with the secretary of the University of the State of New York that the applicant had matriculated in some medical college of the state prior to June 5, 1890. (Laws of New York 1891, ch. 311.)

All diplomas issued by medical colleges in this state prior to January 1, 1830, which are presented for registration after this date, should be referred to the University of the State

of New York for examination before being registered.

ALBANY COLLEGE OF PHARMACY. DEPARTMENT OF PHARMACY, UNION UNIVERSITY.

Session of 1892-93.

THIS department was created by act of the Board of Governors of Union University, June 21, 1881, and incorporated August 27, 1881. NION University includes the ALBANY MEDICAL COLLEGE, Albany College of Pharmacy, Albany Law School and the Dudley Observatory, all at Albany, and Union College, and the School of Civil Engineering at Schenectady.

Beginning with the session of 1890–91, the faculty of the Albany Medical College adopted a strictly graded three years' course, though, for ten years previous, attendance upon three courses of lectures prior to graduation had been required with a few exceptions, as stated in previous catalogues. No exception to the rule is now made, and three courses of lectures constitute an essential prerequisite for graduation. The new curriculum, which went into operation with the session of 1890–91, embraces lectures by professors and lecturers; recitations conducted mainly by instructors, and practical demonstrations, clinical teaching and laboratory work, in which the professors in the different departments are assisted by clinical assistants and demonstrators. The faculty hope to receive the continued encouragement and support of the profession, and particularly of their own alumni, in their earnest endeavor to render their instruction each year more practical and more thorough.

The college building, situated on Eagle street, is well appointed in its lecture-rooms, laboratories, dissecting-rooms and museums. Extensive improvements have been made to the building during the last few years, a large and perfectly arranged dissecting-room having been built in the upper story, furnished with every convenience for the use of the classes in practical anatomy, together with a private dissecting-room and a physiological laboratory. Special arrangements have been made by which an abundant supply of material is secured. The chemical laboratory, rebuilt

in 1884, is fitted with every requisite for the illustration of the lectures and the use of the students in practical chemistry, while "Alumni Hall," constituting the south wing of the college building, was greatly improved and refurnished throughout at about the same time, and is used for the classes in histology and pathological anatomy, and for other college exercises. The anatomical amphitheatre, in which most of the lectures are delivered, is furnished with roomy, comfortable chairs, and the entire building is heated by steam and well ventilated throughout.

The location of the college at Albany is such as to afford superior advantages to the student. The hospitals and dispensaries furnish always an abundant supply of material for the illustration of clinical medicine and surgery, while the museums are especially rich in anatomical and pathological preparations, unequaled in their variety and rarity. They contain the valuable morbid specimens accumulated by the late Drs. March, Armsby and McNaughton, and the pathological specimens, the Sydenham Society plates on diseases of the skin, and Böck's anatomical models added by Dr. Vander Veer. Also the anatomical preparations and pathological specimens prepared by the late Dr. Haskins.

The Albany Hospital, St. Peter's Hospital, Child's Hospital, County Hospital, together with the Eye and Ear Infirmary and the dispensaries connected with each, are, by the regulations of their governing boards, made available for clinical purposes to the students.

The appointments to positions in the Albany Hospital and St. Peter's Hospital as resident physician and surgeon, and first and second assistants, and in the new Ellis Hospital at Schenectady, are annually made and competed for by members of the graduating class.

COURSE OF INSTRUCTION.

The three years' graded course now required in this college is arranged as follows: The studies of the first year are anatomy and histology, physics, inorganic and organic chemistry, physiology and materia medica, with laboratory work in chemistry and histology, dissection and attendance upon the general medical and surgical clinics. The final examination in inorganic chemistry, histology and materia medica, and an annual examination in organic chemistry, anatomy and physiology are held at the close of this year.

The studies of the second year are anatomy, including topographical anatomy and anatomy of the nervous system, pathological anatomy, physiology, organic chemistry, therapeutics, surgery, practice of medicine, obstetrics and gynecology, with laboratory work in pathological anatomy, practical courses in physical examination, bandaging, etc., and clinics. At the end of this year final examinations are held in organic chemistry, anatomy, pathologi-

cal anatomy, physiology and therapeutics, and annual examinations in the practice of medicine, surgery and obstetrics.

The studies of the third year are practice of medicine, surgery, obstetrics, diseases of children, gynecology, diseases of the nervous system and of the eye, ear, skin, nose and throat, insanity and medical jurisprudence, with practical courses in operative surgery, ophthalmoscopy, etc., clinics and medical and surgical conferences. At the end of this year final examinations are held in practice, surgery, obstetrics and specialties.

Believing that instruction by recitation is as essential in medical as in literary colleges, the faculty have greatly enlarged and extended this department of the teaching in this college. The recitations, which previous to the adoption of the new curriculum had been held during unoccupied hours in the evening, are now made part of the regular curriculum. Every study taught in the college by lectures is also made the subject of recitations, these constituting a part of the regular course of instruction. Outside quiz-classes, with the objectionable system of cramming which such classes encourage, are thus done away with and students saved considerable expense, while the faculty are assured that the recitations are properly conducted and the lectures thoroughly understood.

The order of instruction for the last session was as follows, and that for 1893-4 will be essentially the same.

OUTLINES OF COURSES.

PRACTICE OF MEDICINE AND HYGIENE.

PROFS. WARD, CURTIS AND HUN.

Theory and Practice. Prof. Ward delivers a systematic course of lectures, profusely illustrated with pathological specimens. These lectures are supplemented by study in some standard text-book, and each week the students are examined by Dr. Neuman, on the subject-matter of the lectures of that week.

Hygiene is taught by Prof. Ward in lectures which have special reference to the needs of the general practitioner.

Diseases of the Heart and Lungs. Dr. Van Rensselaer delivers a course of lectures, illustrated with pathological specimens, on this subject, with a recitation each week on the subject-matter of the lectures.

Clinical Medicine. Prof. Ward holds a medical clinic each week, in the amphitheatre of the Albany Hospital, and Prof. Hun holds a medical clinic each week, in St. Peter's or the Child's Hospital, before the senior class. In these clinics the students have opportunities for the personal examination of patients, their examination and diagnosis being criticised by the professor.

Ausculation and Percussion and Physical Examination are taught practically by Dr. Gordinier to the junior class, which for this purpose is divided up into small groups.

Diseases of the Nervous System. Prof. Hun delivers a didactic lecture, and also holds a clinic on this subject each week. At the clinic the senior students are trained practically in the examination of patients and in the method of arriving at a diagnosis. As a preparation to this course Dr. Gordinier delivers to the junior class a lecture each week on the anatomy of the nervous system. These lectures are profusely illustrated by dissections of the central nervous organs, and by charts and plates.

Insanity. Dr. Blumer delivers a course of lectures on this subject and holds clinics at the asylum connected with the alms-house, and at the Marshall Infirmary, Troy.

Diseases of the Skin. Prof. Curtis delivers each week on this subject a lecture which is illustrated by clinical material and the use of plates.

SURGERY.

PROFS. VANDER VEER, HAILES, MERRILL AND MORROW.

In the lectures on surgical pathology, the method by which the tissues are nourished in health having been first discussed, the subjects of hypertrophy and atrophy are taken up, and then full consideration is bestowed upon the pathology of the methods by which wounds heal, and upon the processes of inflammation, suppuration, ulceration, gangrene, necrosis, septicæmia,

pyæmia, sapræmia, poisoned wounds, etc. A considerable portion of the surgical course is devoted to pathology, for the reason that if students do not become well grounded in it during their college course, they are very unlikely to take it up after becoming occupied with the details of practice. The course on operative surgery, by Dr. MacDonald, is very thorough and includes all the usual operations. Material for the illustration of this course is abundant, and students are given opportunities to operate upon the cadaver. In the department of principles and practice of surgery, particular attention is paid to the subject of diagnosis, and all didactic teaching upon the various branches of surgery is richly illustrated in the clinical material furnished by the several well-regulated hospitals of the city. As in the past, it will be the aim to make the surgical clinics of the greatest value to the student. All the departments of the surgical chair make free use of the diagrams and specimens found in the excellent and complete museums of the college.

The subject of antiseptic surgery in all that pertains to the knowledge and direct application of the same will be presented in the various operations. During the term the students have an excellent opportunity of seeing a number of cases of abdominal surgery for the relief of various forms of obstruction of the bowels and the removal of abdominal tumors.

Fractures and Dislocations. This subject will be treated in a practical manner, a thorough course of lectures being given, in which the various fractures and dislocations will be illustrated by a specially prepared skeleton. The employment of the various means for the reduction of dislocations and the preparation of splints and other surgical appliances, will be taught in the lecture-room, and followed by clinical instruction at the hospital, senior students being required to examine and diagnose injuries, and to select, prepare and apply the proper dressings for reduction and for the retention of the appliances used.

Ophthalmology and Otology are taught by both didactic and clinical lectures and recitations, the students being required to examine and diagnose the cases. Practical exercises are held in the use of the ophthalmoscope, the determination of glasses and the performance of the various operations. The eye and ear clinics are held every Friday at noon during the year.

Orthopedic Surgery will be taught by lectures combined with clinical instruction, the various hospitals furnishing an abundance of material for the illustration of this important subject.

OBSTETRICS, GYNECOLOGY AND DISEASES OF CHILDREN.

PROF. BOYD.

This course will comprise a series of lectures on the science and art of midwifery; on gynecology, and also on the diseases of children. The lectures

will be didactic and clinical. Recitations will be held once a week during the term.

In addition to the regular clinical lectures on gynecology, practical instruction in this department will be given the members of the senior class at the Albany Hospital, the class being divided into sections in order to witness the operations. Provision will be made to enable members of the senior class to attend one or more cases of obstetrics during the term.

CHEMISTRY.

PROFS. PERKINS AND TUCKER.

The course in this department includes lectures upon certain branches of physics—more especially light, heat and electricity—the principles of chemistry with its nomenclature and notation, the non-metals, and metals, with their more important medical compounds, and organic chemistry, including the analysis of urine, toxicology, etc. These lectures are abundantly illustrated throughout. Recitations are held in each department. Practical work in the chemical laboratory is now obligatory and required during the first year.

ANATOMY.

PROF. MORROW AND DRS. CRAIG AND GORDINIER.

The course in anatomy will consist of didactic lectures and recitations, with illustrations and demonstrations from the subject and preparations. Students are required to dissect during the first year under the direction of the demonstrator and assistant demonstrator of anatomy.

Histology. The course in histology, embryology and pathology, by Prof. Hailes, consists of didactic lectures and recitations, with screen demonstrations, the exhibition of specimens, charts, etc., and practical work in the histological laboratory two hours each week, which is now required during the first year, and in pathological anatomy during the second year.

MATERIA MEDICA.

PROF. BIGELOW AND DR. VAN RENSSELAER.

The lectures on materia medica and therapeutics are illustrated by the exhibition of officinal plants and prints, together with specimens of the various officinal compounds and preparations, and by the presentation of the different means and methods of medication resorted to in the treatment of disease. Special attention is given to the demonstration of the action of therapeutic agents, and to the manner of their administration. Recitations are frequently held; dissertations on remedies are prepared and read by members of the class, and the aim is to furnish a course not only didactic, but also thoroughly practical.

Diseases of the Throat and Nose.— Prof. Bigelow. Clinics are held each week by the professor, and the student familiarized with the diseases of these parts, and made acquainted with the various methods in use for the examination and treatment of laryngeal and nasal disorders.

PHYSIOLOGY.

This branch is taught by means of didactic lectures, weekly recitations and experiments, the study being naturally divided into several departments, as physiological chemistry and anatomy, histology, nutrition, comprising digestion, absorption, secretion, the blood and its circulation, the nervous system, etc.

LABORATORIES.

PRACTICAL CHEMISTRY.

The chemical laboratory is well fitted and conveniently arranged for the use of the classes in practical chemistry, and for the illustration of the lectures in the chemical department. The laboratory is open during the entire year. The instruction given is in harmony with the lectures on chemistry delivered during the term, and is so conducted as to secure to the student a practical familiarity with the apparatus, materials, processes and reactions, which are the subjects of his professional study and which are to be employed in his subsequent practice. Each student has a desk and chemicals for his own use, and is supplied with all necessary apparatus. With this practical instruction is combined a study of the principles of theoretical ehemistry, chemical notation, nomenclature, etc.

HISTOLOGY AND PATHOLOGICAL ANATOMY.

Important changes and additions have been made in this department, several thousand dollars having been expended in the purchase of new microscopes and auxiliaries, in order that every facility may be furnished for successful work in these branches. The laboratory has been refitted and newly equipped throughout, and furnishes ample accommodations for fifty or more students.

Each student is taught the technique of the microscope, and is instructed in the preparation, cutting, staining and mounting of specimens, and in the structure of the several tissues and organs of the body.

Instruction in pathological histology, including the diagnosis of tumors, examination of the urine, etc., is given each term, and students are instructed in the methods of preparing for microscopical examination the morbid material furnished by the surgical clinics and the autopsies made during the term. Each student will be required to make numerous practical examinations, both microscopical and chemical, of albuminous, diabetic and other

abnormal specimens of urine, and will be required to stain and examine numbers of specimens containing bacteria, until perfectly familiar with the methods employed in staining and demonstrating them.

Special laboratory courses in bacteriology are also provided.

FEES AND EXPENSES.

All fees are payable in advance, and are as follows; For matriculation, five dollars, payable each year; for the year's lectures, one hundred dollars. Students who have attended two courses of lectures at this college will be charged fifty dollars for their third course, but a perpetual ticket entitling to attendance upon three or more courses may be obtained on payment of two hundred dollars in advance. Students who have attended one course of lectures at this or some other accredited medical college will be charged one hundred dollars for their second and fifty dollars for their third course, and those who have attended two courses of lectures elsewhere will be charged seventy-five dollars for their third course in this college. Graduates of this institution have perpetual free admission. Graduates of other medical schools will be admitted upon payment of fifty dollars and the matriculation fee. Dissection, ten dollars, which is required the first year and optional during the other years of the course; dissecting material is free, and there are no incidentals in this department. Courses in the chemical laboratory, in histology, and in pathology, ten dollars each. The graduation fee is twentyfive dollars, which must be paid to the registrar before the candidate can be admitted to an examination.

The cost of living in Albany is less than in most other cities of its size. The janitor of the college keeps a list of boarding houses at which good rooms and board can be obtained at from four to five dollars a week, and by clubbing together and boarding themselves students can live comfortably and pleasantly at still lower rates.

PRIZES AND HOSPITAL APPOINTMENTS.

Mrs. Gertrude W. Vander Poel has endowed a prize in memory of her husband, the late S. Oakley Vander Poel, M. D., for many years a professor in this college. It consists of a good clinical microscope and is awarded to the senior student passing the best bedside examination in general medicine.

Professor Vander Veer offers a prize for the best report of the surgical clinics held during the session, and Professors Hailes and Morrow offer a prize for the second best report of these clinics.

Professor Merrill offers a prize for the best report of the eye and ear clinics. Professor Townsend offers a prize to the student passing the best examination in physiology at the expiration of his first year of study in that branch. Professor Boyd offers a case of instruments to the student passing the best final examination in obstetrics.

Professor Bigelow offers prizes for the best dry preparation of the pharnyx, larynx and œsophagus, and for the best dry preparation of the nose and nasopharnyx.

To the senior student passing the best final examination, Dr. T. W. Nellis (A. M. C., '81), of Albany, offers a prize consisting of a case of surgical instruments.

Dr. Horace R. Powell (A. M. C., '82), of Poughkeepsie, N. Y., offers a prize consisting of a general operating case to the second year student passing the best final examination.

A. B. Huested (M. D., A. M. C., '63) & Co., of Albany, offer a prize consisting of Gross' complete pocket case of instruments to the first year student passing the best final examination.

At or about the close of each session, vacancies occur in the house staffs of the Albany and St. Peter's Hospitals and the Ellis Hospital, Schenectady, and these are filled by competitive examinations, open to the members of the graduating class.

FOR TEXT BOOKS.

REQUIREMENTS FOR GRADUATION.

The candidate must be twenty-one years of age, and exhibit a certificate from a physician or surgeon, duly authorized by law to practice his profession, that he has studied medicine and surgery under his instruction, after the age of eighteen, during a period of not less than three years (36 months), including time spent in attending lectures, and he must present evidence of having complied with the law concerning preliminary examination.

He must have attended not less than three regular courses of lectures, the last of which must have been at this college. Students who have taken two or more courses of lectures at other accredited medical colleges, desiring to enter the third year (senior) class in this college, must pass an examination in the departments of anatomy, materia medica and therapeutics, physiology and chemistry, unless a satisfactory certificate of having passed a final examination in these branches is presented. Students who have attended one or more courses elsewhere may enter the second year class on passing an examination in inorganic chemistry, histology and materia medica, or on furnishing evidence that such final examinations have been passed at some other accredited medical college. Such entrance examinations will be equivalent to those held at the end of the second and of the first year, respectively, in this college.

He must be of good moral character.

He must pass a satisfactory examination in the several branches of medicine and surgery, final examinations being conducted chiefly in writing and in the order previously stated. (See pages 6 and 7.)

Regular and punctual attendance is required, and certificates of actual attendance given at the end of the term.

MEDICAL STUDENT EXAMINATIONS.

FROM LAWS OF 1893, CH. 661.

To provide for the preliminary education of medical students:

The degree of bachelor or doctor of medicine shall not be conferred in this state before the candidate The degree of bachelor or doctor of medicine shall not be conferred in this state before the candidate has filed with the institution conferring it, the certificate of the regents that three years before the date of the degree, or before or during his first year of medical study in this state, he has either graduated from a registered college, or satisfactorily completed not less than a three years' academic course in a registered academy or high school; or had a preliminary education considered and accepted by the regents as fully equivalent; or had passed regents' examinations in arithmetic, elementary English, geography, spelling, United States history, English composition and physics. Students who had matriculated in a New York medical school before June 5, 1890, shall be exempt from this preliminary education requirement, provided the degree be conferred before August 1, 1895.

NOTES ON THE LAW.

I. The medical student certificate must be obtained during or prior to the first year of medical study in this state.

2. The regents will accept as fully equivalent to the required academic course any one

of the following:

(a) A certificate of having successfully completed at least one full year's course of study in the collegiate department of any college or university, registered by the regents as maintaining a satisfactory standard.

(b) A certificate of having passed in a registered institution examinations equivalent to the full collegiate course of the freshman year or to a completed three years' academic

course.

(c) Regents' pass cards for any 50 counts.

NOTE. — Students matriculated in a registered medical school before May 9, 1893, may offer regents' pass cards for any 20 counts, not including reading and writing.

(d) A certificate of having passed the matriculation examinations of any university in Great Britain or Ireland, or of having completed a course of study recognized as an equivalent therefor.

(e) A certificate of graduation from any registered gymnasium in Germany, Austria or

Russia.

(f) A certificate of successful completion of a course of five years in a registered Italian ginnasio and three years in a liceo.

(g) The bachelor's degree in arts or science, or substantial equivalents from any

registered institution in France or Spain.

(h) Any credential from a registered institution or from the government in any foreign state or country which represents the completion of a course of study equivalent to graduation from a registered New York high school or academy or from a registered Prussian gymnasium.

EXTRACTS FROM RULES.

Printed question papers will be issued from the regents' office for each examination. Answers must be written in ink on both sides of letter paper, and arranged and numbered in the same order as the questions. Candidates should bring pen and ink. Paper and blotters will be supplied.

Seventy-five per cent of correct answers is required in all subjects.

Answer papers will be reviewed in the regents' office, and all papers below standard will be returned to the candidates. For those accepted, pass cards will be issued.

Pass cards.—A regents' pass card is not limited in time; therefore it is not necessary

to pass any regents' examination a second time.

To insure success, candidates should have a thorough knowledge of the whole of a standard school text-book on each required subject, including the metric system, but not cube root in elementary arithmetic.

Medical student certificate.—When all requirements are fulfilled, the regents grant a

medical student certificate.

On receiving this certificate, the candidate must send it to the secretary or recording officer of the university or college at which he intends to study medicine.

Candidates for medical student examinations should send notice at least 10 days in advance, stating at what time and in what studies they wish to be examined, that required desk room may be provided at the most convenient place.

Candidates who fail to send this advance notice will be admitted only so far as there

are unoccupied seats.

Certificates without examinations.—Candidates having credentials which can be accepted in place of an examination, should send them to the Examinations department. They will be returned as soon as verified, and if accepted, a medical student certificate will be sent with them. The certificate will be dated from receipt of credentials, so that the candidate will lose no time.

REQUIREMENTS FOR LICENSE TO PRACTICE MEDICINE IN NEW YORK STATE.

All requirements for admission should be completed at least one week before exami-They are as follows:

1. Evidence that applicant is more than 21 years of age.

2. Certificates of moral character from not less than two physicians in good standing

3. Evidence that applicant has the general education required, preliminary to receiving the degree of bachelor or doctor of medicine in this state (medical student certificate).

First exemption: "Students who had matriculated in a New York medical school before June 5, 1890, shall be exempt from this preliminary education requirement, provided the degree be conferred before August 1, 1895." (Form for exemption certificate furnished on application.)

4. Evidence that applicant "has studied medicine not less than three full years, including three satisfactory courses, in three different academic years, in a medical school registered as maintaining at the time a satisfactory standard."

Second exemption: "The regents may in their discretion accept as the equivalent for

any part of the 3d and 4th requirement, evidence of five or more years' reputable practice of medicine, provided that such substitution be specified in the license."

5. Evidence that applicant "has received the degree of bachelor or doctor of medicine from some registered medical school, or a diploma or license conferring full right to practice medicine in some foreign country."

6. The candidate must pass examinations in anatomy, physiology and hygiene, chemistry, surgery, obstetrics, pathology and diagnosis, and therapeutics, practice and materia medica. The questions "shall be the same for all candidates, except that in therapeutics, practice and materia medica all the questions submitted to any candidate shall be chosen from those prepared by the board selected by that candidate and shall be in harmony with the tenets of that school as determined by its state board of medical examiners."

Third accordingly the policy of the property of the

Third exemption: "Applicants examined and licensed by other state examining boards registered by the regents as maintaining standards not lower than those provided by this article, and applicants who matriculated in a New York state medical school before June 5, 1890, and who receive the degree M.D. from a registered medical school before August

I, 1895, may without further examination, on payment of \$10 to the regents and on submitting such evidence as they may require, receive from them an indorsement of their licenses or diplomas conferring all rights and privileges of a regents' license issued after examination."

7. A fee of \$25, payable in advance.

NOTES ON THE LAW.

1. Seventy-five per cent of correct answers is required in all subjects.

2. All subjects must be passed at the same examination.

NOTE — When a candidate for license has been rejected in but *one* topic and his total average is above 80, at subsequent examinations he shall be examined only in the topic in which he originally failed to receive the required (75) percentage.

3. All examinations must be conducted in the English language.

4. Medical preparatory courses, as such courses are now taught in various scientific schools and colleges, cannot be accepted for one year of the three years' medical study required by the law.

Powers and Duties of County Clerks in Registering Licenses to Practice Medicine in New York State.

The laws relating to registration of physicians by county clerks were repealed May 9, 1893, when the new law took effect. This law forbids the registration of any authority to practice medicine except a license or diploma issued or indorsed as a license under seal by the University of the State of New York, or (in case of removal to another county of a physician already licensed) a certificate clearly showing that the original registration was of an authority issued or indorsed under seal by the regents.

To provide against penalties for illegal registration all other cases should be referred to the University of the State of New York, the only authority by which licenses can be

issued after September 1, 1891.

ALBANY COLLEGE OF PHARMACY. DEPARTMENT OF PHARMACY, UNION UNIVERSITY.

Session of 1893-4.

THIS department was created by act of the Board of Governors of Union University, June 21, 1881, and incorporated August 27, 1881. The thirteenth course of lectures will open on Monday, October 1, 1893, and close March 13, 1894. The exercises of the college are held in the Albany Medical College building on Eagle street.

The course extends over two years, divided into junior and senior classes, composed of first and second year students respectively. Three or more lectures are delivered to each class each week besides laboratory classes and other exercises. Senior lectures on Monday, Wednesday and Friday evenings, and junior lectures on Tuesday and Thursday evenings and Saturday afternoons. Candidates for the degree of *Graduate in Pharmacy (Ph.G.)* must attend two full courses of lectures, be at least twenty-one years of age, submit a thesis and pass the required examinations. They must also have served at least four years with some reputable pharmacist. Fees: Matriculation fee (paid but once), \$3; lecture tickets for full course (with no charge for courses after the second), per session, \$30; chemical and pharmaceutical laboratory fees, each \$15; quiz class fees, \$3; graduation fee, \$10. Various prizes are awarded to meritorious students at the close of the term.

A new and commodious pharmaceutical laboratory is to be fitted up this

summer, and will be ready for use in the fall.

The college is now better equipped than ever before to impart thorough instruction in pharmacy and its kindred branches.

DUDLEY OBSERVATORY, ALBANY.

The Dudley Observatory was founded in 1852 for the advancement of astronomical science. Since its incorporation it has received more than \$230,000 in donations, of which at the present time over \$100,000 is invested in interest-bearing securities for its support. It derives its name from Charles E. Dudley, whose widow Blandina Dudley gave in all about \$100,000 for its establishment. In 1873 the Dudley Observatory became a part of Union University, and since 1876 has been actively employed in important astronomical investigations. The original site of the Observatory proved unsuitable for the purpose, and under the stimulus, in 1892, of a gift of \$25,000 by Miss Catharine Wolfe Bruce, of New York city, for permanent endowment, nearly \$40,000 has been raised in Albany for removal of the observatory to a better location. The new constructions were begun in September, 1892, and are now nearly completed. A new telescope, adapted both for visual and photographic use, has been ordered. The object-glass of this telescope is to be twelve inches in clear aperture, and the instrument is to be up to the highest standard of modern skill and invention. The entire equipment of the observatory is undergoing renovation and improvement. Near the close of the present year it is expected that the scientific work of the observatory will be resumed with increased means, vigor and efficiency.

The observatory is occasionally open to visitors under regulations established by the Board of Trustees. For further information apply to Lewis Boss, A. M., *Director*.
