By the schooner La Grange, Bebee, from Havana, we learn that a U. S. sloop of war had captured a Pirate boat with 10 men, 9 of which had made their escape.

EUROPE.—The accounts from the seat of war in Europe are so contradictory that we deem it unnessary to add to our short extracts in the Postcript of resterday, from Paris papers of the 2nd of March.

A bulletin from Count Langeron Commander inchief of the Russian troops in Wallachia, dated Bucharest, the 26th ult contains the details af an attack on Kali, it was scaled and taken in less than an hour. Thirty canon, five standards, and a great quantity of ammunition, fell into the hands of the conquerors; and a Pacha, with 60 officers, and 350 soldiers, are said to have been aken prisoners. The number of the killed on the Turkish side is stated at 250, while according to the same version of the matter, the Russians had only two officers and 80 men killed, and 250 wounded. The Turks performed such prodigies of valour, as have not been realised since the days of chivalry. They were all put to the sword.

The affairs of Europe appear to be in an unsettled state. The repeated journevs of M. de Polignac to &from Lon don, and his defeat in an attempt to be introduced into the French ministry, induce us to believe, that the King of France is not very well pleased with the constitutional spirit of his people. In reference to M. de Villele we are igainst him for treason, is merely postpined, and believe M. Le Abhe de Pompiere will yet carry it on. In relation to the Departments and the towns. the government has passed into the hands of the people, except that the Mayors, Prefects, and subprefects will be appointed by the King. It is well known that the Russians, notwithstanding their new constitution are not satisfied with the existing state of things, and we shall not be suprised to find a second Holy Alliance brought about, embracing Russia, Austria, and England, in defence of legitimicy, against the revolutionary spirit, as that of France is by some denominated. It is easy to foresee in such event, that the prediction of the late or mier of England (Mr. Canning) will be verified, that a war of opinion will nsue, of the most bloody and destructive character.

The arms of republican France were triumphant before the rise Napoleon to supreme powers, and if the spirit of liberty is to be roused, against that of fanaticism of home, and despotism abroad, the contest cannot but be long and fearful. We look with interest for further accounts.—N. Y. Morning Herald.

From my own experience I am convinced of the contrary, I have ascertained that the shorter the movement is the better provided in all cases that it be greater than the length of two teeth of the Saws. I would request the Judges and other magnitrates of the different parishes and counties of the United-States, to observe the Saw-Mills established in their parish, or county, and to remark the length of the movement of the Saws. I shall consider all persons as making use of my invention who make use of Saws having less than 16 inches of movement.
