Extracto de una carta particular recibida en esta ciudad.

TAMAULIPAS, 10 de octubre. El día 11 de Setiembre fué feliz para la famosa República, por haberse rendido a discrecion los famosos reconquistadores que componian la vanguardia del ejército real. Se efectuó la rendicion porque nuestros valientes batieron a la bayoneta el fuerte que tenían en la Barra; el valor y heroísmo que acreditaron a el ataque han confundido los enemigos, entre otros el coronel Vaquez, que mandaba el puesto...

Cuando los Mejicanos saltaban al fuerte, despues de haber sufrido un horrible fuego de cañon y asperado dos grandes fogos y una fuerte estacada se rindió Barradas a discrecion sin disparar un tiro a Tamaulipas, comprendiendo en ella la guarnicion del fuerte, que ya consistia en muy pocas, con el coronel Vaquez, gravemente herido.

Puedo asegurar a Vd. que cuando Barradas mande los buques que deben conducir a la Havana los restos de sus tropas, apenas se embarcarán 500 hombres, por que las acciones de guerra y la fiebre amarilla han acabado con estas tropas que pueden llamarse matanzas, por su perseverancia en querer que los libros sean tan su misos como ellos en la esclavitud de su adorado Fernando.

COMISARIA GENERAL DE VERACRUZ.

El Ecsmo. Sr. secretario de estado y del despacho de hacienda ha dirigido a esta comisaria general el decreto siguiente: Secretaria de hacienda. —Departamento de gobierno. —Sección 1.ª

El Ecsmo. Sr. presidente de los Estados Unidos mejicanos, penetrado de la necesidad de procurar auxilios para sostener la causa santa de la independencia, y persuadido de que debe primero, usar de los arbitrios que atacan las propiedades de los enemigos, y de las personas ó corporaciones en que no afecte el interes individual, ha decretado lo siguiente:

1.ª Se ocuparán por la federacion las propiedades de cualquiera naturaleza que sean, de todas las personas que las tienen en la república y residen en pais enemigo. 2.ª Se ocuparán en una mitad las rentas de los españoles que se hallen fuera de república durante la guerra.

3.ª Se ocuparán por el gobierno general todas las fincas de azucre, y salinas que hayan sido adjudicadas a los Estados por sus legislaturas, conforme al artículo 1.º párrafo 9 de la ley de clasificación de rentas. 4.ª Se ocuparán en la tercera parte las rentas del duque de Monteleone, con calidad de reintegro.

Dado en el palacio federal de Méjico a 2 de setiembre de 1829. —Vicente Guerrero. —A D. Lorenzo de Zavala. Y de orden de S. E. lo traslado a V. E. para su cumplimiento, previniendo que para que lo tenga en todas sus partes se han de observar las providencias que expresan el siguiente.

REGLAMENTO.

Los comisarios ocuparán a los gobernadores de los Estados para que éstos los flamquen las noticias y los auxilios en casos necesarios para llevar a efecto los artículos de este reglamento.

Se nombrarán tres comisionados, uno por los gobernadores de los Estados, otro por el comisario general, otro por el comandante militar, para que organicen y verifiquen la recaudacion, llevando al efecto un libro en que firmarán las entradas. Todos los recibos que se libren serán firmados por los tres comisionados, con el visto bueno del comisario general.

Los comisionados propondrán a los comisarios, y éstos pasarán al gobierno su premo con su informe, las personas que se encargarán de las fincas que se ocupen por los artículos de este decreto.

Todas las cantidades que ingresaren, se pasarán inmediatamente a las comisarias respectivas, en las que se llevará en libros separados la cuenta y razon de estos ramos. Los comisarios darán cuenta cada correo con los resultados de estas disposiciones, sin excepcion de los lugares en que no haya los bienes de que habla el decreto preinserto, manifestándolo así al gobierno.

The report of the Spanish invasion on the South Sea, near Apaculco, which we have published some time ago, proved to be entirely false. General Santa-Anna has been raised to the rank of general of division of the Mexican army.

Four transports, chartered by General Barradas, will sail to-morrow for Tampico, to take the troops to Havana.

By capt. Bateman, of the schooner Correo, we learn that there had been no news of the U. States' ship Hornet, and that the report of her having lost her masts was without foundation. It was the opinion in Tampico, that she had gone to Pensacola: On board her were Mr. Thomas B. Harrison, of Baltimore, and Mr. G. Prague, vice consul for that port. The Hornet left on the 9th September, the day before the gale, since when nothing has been heard of her.

The brig Caroline, of Nantz, was upset and sunk in the gale of the 10th Sept: while lying in the river Panuco, 40 miles from Tampico, with a cargo said to be worth \$200,000 dollars, and the books of several mercantile houses, together with the vessel and cargo, were totally lost.

The Correo, lying at the same place, received but trifling damage. Capt. B. left Tampico Oct. 9, at which time the fever and dysentery were making great ravages among the Spanish troops.

The Hornet had also a considerable sum of money on board. Adv.

The President of the United States has recognised Mr. Durant De St. André, as Consul General of his Majesty, the King of France, to reside at New-York. And Mr. Jean Germain Sa-nuel Adams Dannery, as Consul for the same government, for the port of Philadelphia. Also, Mr. Forcy Picquet, as Vice-Consul, from the same, or the port of Boston.

Latest from Buenos Ayres.—The schr. Virginia, Southcomb, has arrived at Baltimore from Buenos Ayres, whence she sailed on the 14th August. The editors of the Baltimore American have a regular file of papers to the 13th August inclusive. When the Virginia sailed, affairs were perfectly tranquil, and it was believed that quiet and order were permanently established.

The British Packet of the 8th. Adg. says:—“The week has passed away without any of the bustle which was so confidently anticipated. The recurrence of civil war is no longer dreaded; the disputes that may have occurred among the ruling authorities are positively said to be in a fair way of accommodation, or rather, that they are entirely settled.”

The same paper, contradicts the exaggerated reports of the occurrences of murders in the city and environs. Two Germans had been killed, but under what circumstance was not known.

An entire change in the ministry of the Buenos Ayres Government had taken place. On the 20th, Governor Lavalle officially announced the following appointments; Manuel J. Garcia to be Secretary of the Treasury; Thomas Guido, to be Secretary of State and Foreign Relations; Manuel Escalada, to be Secretary of War and Marine; and J. A. Gelli, to be minister of police.

The Gaceta Mercantile of the 8th of August, states that General Rosas had disbanded his army. Previous to doing so, he summoned the caciques who commanded the different bodies of Indians under him, and announced to them the conclusion of Peace, thanked them for their assistance, told them that he no longer had need of their services and desired them to return to their rural employments. This they promised to do, and assured him of their readiness to return to arms when he might think proper to call them. They requested that one of his officers should accompany each detachment of Indians, in order that their conduct, in passing out of the province, might not be misrepresented.

Extract of a letter received in Salem, from a respectable American in Guayaquil, August 4.—This city is now again in possession of Colombia, and general Bolivar's head-quarters are here. An armistice has been agreed upon for two months, and in the mean time negotiations for peace with Peru are making. I am of opinion that war will be recommenced unless Peru confirms the treaty made with General Sucre at Girón, which was so unjustly violated by General Lamar; or what appears quite probable, that the n...

will call in General Bolivar to prevent a civil war.

The Washington Correspondent of the New-York Courier, states, that the rumour of the failure of Mr. Rush, in his attempt to negotiate a loan of a million of dollars for the Corporation of Washington, is unfounded. Mr. Rush will be able to negotiate the loan, at six per cent interest, with English capitalists, but is waiting to ascertain whether the money cannot be obtained, on better terms, in Holland. REFINED SUGAR.—A writer in the New York Enquirer, has undertaken to show that the American refiners can supersede the British in the supply of foreign markets—and that fifty more refineries can be supported in the United States, to the benefit of our import and export trade. The writer appears to be an Englishman.

Extract of a letter from Rio de Janeiro, dated August 1:

The Marquis of Palma, who went to Europe on the 20th June, in the Brazilian frigate Maria Izabel, has been charged by the Emperor to settle the affairs of Portugal. There is a report here, which is generally credited, that the Emperor has at length given up the idea and waved his right to grant a Constitutional Charter to Portugal; and that on this condition both Spain and England will compel Don Miguel to leave Portugal and restore that kingdom to its legitimate sovereign; and that these Powers will guarantee to the Infant Don Miguel the enjoyment of the revenue of the Casa de Brantado.”

Progress of Liberty.—The following notice will testify that Prussia is beginning to assume a conspicuous place among the free nations of Europe:

“BERLIN, Aug. 11.

“In accordance with the earlier measures of the Government, having for object to accustom the people to take part in public affairs, a Cabinet order has been issued some time since, granting permission to all towns having a population of 10,000 souls, and to several church communities, to call public meetings of their citizens or members, to take counsel upon their public interests, and to publish their resolutions in the journals, or from the pulpit.”

SWEDEN.—The letters from Stockholm say, that in consequence of the abundant and salutary rains, the fears entertained for the crops had been removed, and the prohibition against distilling from grain would cease in Sept.

INDIA.—Letters from Bengal, to the 2d April, state that the trade of Calcutta, in goods and yarn, had materially improved. The whole amount of the Indigo crop, last year, was 9,522 maduds, of which 80,000 were shipped to Europe. The papers contain an official intimation that a resolution had passed the Supreme Council, granting to Europeans permission to hold lands in India, for agricultural purposes—which gave general satisfaction to the inhabitants.

The proprietors of the New York news papers have adopted the following plan:

“To guard against the impositions which are constantly practised upon the daily papers by persons who are in the habit of subscribing for papers, refusing to pay, and when discontinued by the proprietors, subscribing to other papers, and thus constantly receiving many of the daily papers, without paying for any—it was agreed that the secretary of the Association shall keep a book, in which shall be registered, monthly the names of all such as refuse or neglect to pay their subscription and advertising accounts, and while the name of any individual remains upon such book as a delinquent, neither of the other daily papers will advertise for such delinquent, or receive him as a subscriber, unless he pays half-yearly in advance.”

Letters from Madrid announce, as nearly certain, that the intention of the Spanish Government with respect to Mexico, is to introduce that which Iur-bide proposed in 1821, by which one of the Princes of the royal family of Spain was to be placed upon the Throne.
