

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INTRODUCTION

Over the past several years, the use of occupational health films as an aid in protecting and improving the health of the worker has increased greatly. This listing has been compiled to provide interested persons with a current ready reference to selected occupational health films and filmstrips and their sources.

This listing presents only those films that have come to our attention and that are directly related to occupational health. Film descriptions are based on available information rather than on staff evaluation. Each film is listed alphabetically by title and the address for each source appears at the end of the listing. A subject index appears at the end.

1. Aircraft Accident Investigation

Motion Picture Sound Black and White 37 min. (1957)

Explains that simple, human errors are the cause of most aircraft accidents, many of which are triggered by the personal problems of the pilot. Shows that the medical investigator must seek out and determine the mental and emotional aspects behind these human errors and make recommendations which will prevent such accidents from happening again. Demonstrates in detective-story fashion the techniques of medical investigation in two cases of deaths resulting from preventable accidents.

2. Air Force Industrial Medicine in Action—Physical Hazards Motion Picture Sound Color 33 min. (1961)

Describes physical hazards incidental to industrial operations at an Air Force base. Shows how the industrial physician and the industrial hygiene engineer indoctrinate personnel in the undesirable effects of noise, keep noise hazards under surveillance, recommend use of protective equipment, and monitor the effects of noise exposure by audiometry. Explains the various types of radiation hazards. Charts illustrate how ionizing radiation enters the bloodstream and affects the body cells. Shows how abnormalities in temperature, humidity, and pressure affect workers.

3. Air Force Industrial Medicine in Action—Toxic Chemical Agents

Motion Picture Sound Color 29 min. (1960)

Emphasizes need to evaluate working conditions in shops and on flight lines and stresses importance of protecting workers from toxic chemical agents. Shows parts of hazardous environment affecting respiratory tract, gastro-intestinal tract, skin and lung irritations, and exposure to strong solvents, acids, gases, radiation, noise, burns, etc.

4. Air We Breathe, The

Motion Picture Sound Black and White 26 min.

Tells why respirator protection against dust, gas, and other air contaminants is necessary and how it is accomplished. Demonstrates proper use of respirators. Intended for the worker.

Filmstrip Sound (Tape) Color 35 min.

Presents alcoholism as a disease and depicts the problem of the alcoholic worker. Discusses industry's role in an effective rehabilitation program.

Motion Picture Sound Black and White 131/2 min. (1953)

Shows how persons with a physical disability can be successfully employed in white collar jobs—in this case, the headquarters of an insurance company.

Motion Picture Sound Black and White (Also filmstrip) (1952)

Shows an industrial nurse explaining to a plant worker that accidents do not just happen. Discusses practical safety measures, and emphasizes the importance of prompt first aid for injuries.

8. An Approved Technique for Pure Tone, Air Conduction Audiometry

Motion Picture

Presents an accepted technique for doing air conduction threshold audiometry. May be used for demonstrating to industrial nurses how pre-employment and periodic audiograms should be done.

Shows how a heart attack victim is returned to useful employment with the aid of a Heart Association-sponsored Cardiac Work Evaluation Unit.

Motion Picture Sound Black and White 15 min.

Stresses economic importance of colds in loss of wages and manpower, cost of drugs, etc. Presents what is known about colds and suggests methods for their cure and prevention. (Also available in Spanish.)

Motion Picture Sound Color 18 min.

Shows and explains health precautions to be observed and protective gear to be used on shipboard to avoid ill effects from noxious gases and oxygen deficiency when welding, painting, using solvents, working with internal combustion engines, and entering and working in void spaces and tanks.

14. Caution—Eyes at Work

Motion Picture Sound Color 23 min. (1954)

Illustrates the importance of having specialist personnel plan a suitable eye protection program in industry. Shows the benefit to be derived by both management and workers from such a program and demonstrates how to set it up.

Motion Picture Sound Color 261/2 min. (1946)

Shows processes of vocational rehabilitation: surgery, medical care, physical therapy, vocational guidance, training, and employment. Demonstrates that properly prepared and properly placed handicapped workers make good employees. Highlighted by shots of handicapped celebrities.

Filmstrip Sound Black and White 15 min. (1950)

Demonstrates proper handling of hazardous liquids at work and at home. Covers fire and explosion hazards as well as poisoning and dermatitis.

20. Ear Protection in Noise

Motion Picture Sound Color 14 min. (1959)

Emphasizes to employer and employee the need for protecting hearing in noise and how to go about it.

21. Easy on the Eyes

Motion Picture (Also Filmstrip) Sound Black and White 20 min. (1949)

Encourages the worker to guard his eyes on the job. Contrasts old-fashioned safety glasses and their modern counterpart. Presents case histories of injured workers and three rules for safety on the job: wear the right safety glasses; make sure they fit; keep them clean.

22. Emotional Stress

Motion Picture Sound Black and White 30 min. (1957)

Gives a brief case history of an individual's responses to emotional stresses and strains, his adverse reactions to wife, family, and colleagues, manifesting themselves in psychosomatic symptoms of arthritis. Shows that with proper therapy he readjusts favorably and assumes proper place of authority on job and normal behavior patterns.

24. Factory Safety

Motion Picture Sound Black and White 10 min. (1938)

Points out how good factory safety records are achieved by such precautionary measures as rule booklets, safety meetings for foremen, stop



switches and guards for machines, goggles and respirators for workers, and attention to even minor injuries.

25. Fragile, Handle Feelings With Care

Motion Picture Sound Black and White 10 min. (1953)

Stresses that people's feelings are fragile and easily hurt. O'Grady, a typical plant foreman, can't understand why his workers are suddenly giving him the "cold shoulder." He learns that each was hurt by a thoughtless action or word.

Motion Picture Sound

Illustrates what takes place in arteriosclerosis and coronary thrombosis and briefly discusses other heart diseases. Shows how a busy executive resolves to adjust his pace to protect his heart.

Motion Picture Sound Color 13 min.

Illustrates the elementary physical principles involved in dental radiography and the actual methods of radiography used by dentists. Emphasizes the radiation hazards to which the dentist and his staff are exposed. Gives recommendations to protect dental workers from dangerous levels of radiation.

Motion Picture Sound Color 11 min.

Shows brain operation as result of head injury. Used to promote wear of hard hat in any industry.

29. Health Hazards of Pesticides

Motion Picture Sound Color 14 min.

Emphasizes the potential public health hazards resulting from widespread use of pesticides, explains the work of the Communicable Disease Center's toxicology laboratories in measuring this hazard, and makes recommendations for the safe use of pesticides.

30. How to Avoid Muscle Strain

Motion Picture Sound Black and White 15 min. (1949)

Employs views of a living model in action and animated drawings to illustrate the mechanics of muscular activity, especially in the lifting of heavy loads. Diagrams show the analogy between the three types of levers studied in physics and certain familiar arrangements of bones and muscles in the human body. Also shows the correct and incorrect ways of lifting objects and illustrates the effects of overstrain on the cerebral column. A concluding section deals with hernias. (Also produced in Spanish, French, and other languages.)

31. Industrial Absence and the General Practitioner

Filmstrip Sound (tape) Color 30 min. (1961)

Discusses problem of excessive or unnecessary absences and the role the industrial physician can play in helping to reduce these absences.

32. Industrial Exhaust Systems

Motion Picture Sound Black and White 11 min. (1950)

Demonstrates with miniature models types of hoods, baffles, elbows, and fans used in modern industrial exhaust systems and shows their operation in manufacturing plants. Comparative effectiveness is illustrated with an artificial smoke produced by titanium tetrachloride, which shows the amount of air control afforded by each hood and baffle. Importance is placed upon selection of the proper type of exhaust unit for the specific functions it must perform.

33. Inner Man Steps Out, The

Motion Picture Sound Black and White 34 min. (1951)

Shows Jerry Allen, a nervous, irritable fellow both to his family and on the job. The family doctor helps him to see his inner conflict. Jerry realizes the poor manner in which he handled many problems at the shop and he determines to practice being more tolerant, less antagonistic, and endeavors to win back the respect and loyalty of his subordinates. Directed toward improving personnel relations—especially applicable to supervisory level.

Motion Picture Sound Color 22 min. (1951)

Demonstrates the contributions rehabilitated workers can make to the Nation's economy despite their handicaps. A variety of occupations



performed by handicapped men and women and industrial equipment they use are shown. Also shows some of the rehabilitation processes through which the disabled are prepared for useful work.

Motion Picture Sound Color 33 min.

Portrays risks and health hazards in a bakery. Emphasizes the importance of adequate ventilation, correct methods of lifting, and cleaning of equipment.

Motion Picture Sound Color 11½ min. (1959)

Stresses the use of proper safety eyewear as the foundation of any successful program to prevent loss of sight due to industrial eye accidents. Shows many typical work situations which could produce eye injuries and explains the various types of safety eyewear available for specific working conditions. Includes narrative case history of an eye injury that occurred while a worker was not wearing his safety glasses and shows a surgeon removing a metal fragment from the victim's eye.

Slides Color 30 min.

Outlines basic principles of light and vision, research basis for current recommended levels of illumination, and typical applications of good lighting practice.

Motion Picture Sound Color 10 min.

Motion Picture Sound Black and White (1956)

Points out the hazards associated with high noise levels produced by jet aircraft and other noisy equipment found ashore and aboard ship. Describes the nature of noise, its effect on hearing, and various devices that are used for the protection of hearing.
