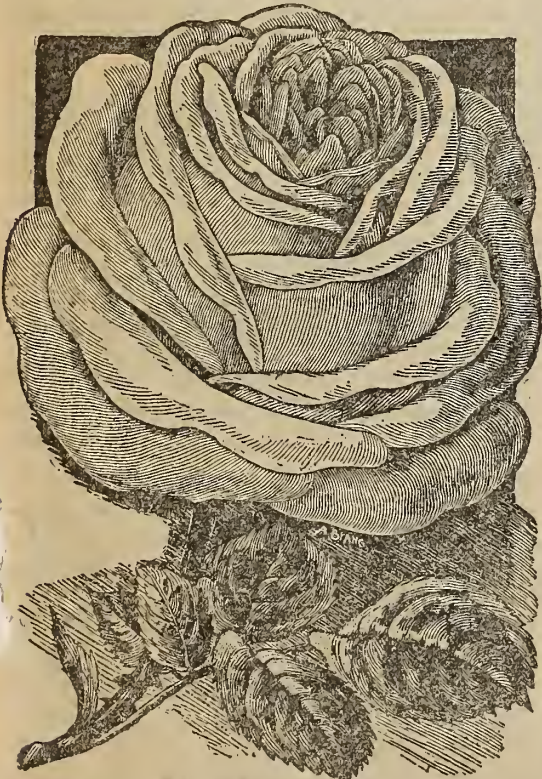

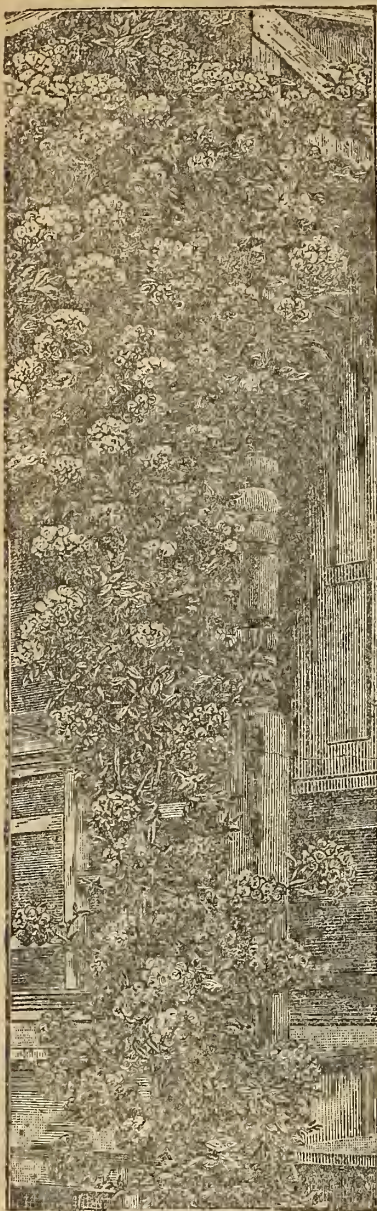

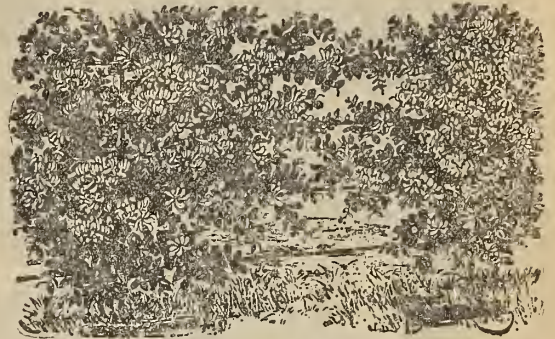

SOME of our friends have conceived the idea of planting Honeysuckles along the division fences, and it is wonderful what

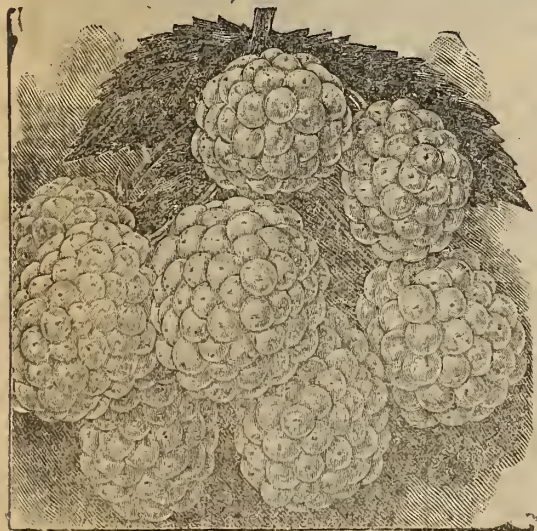

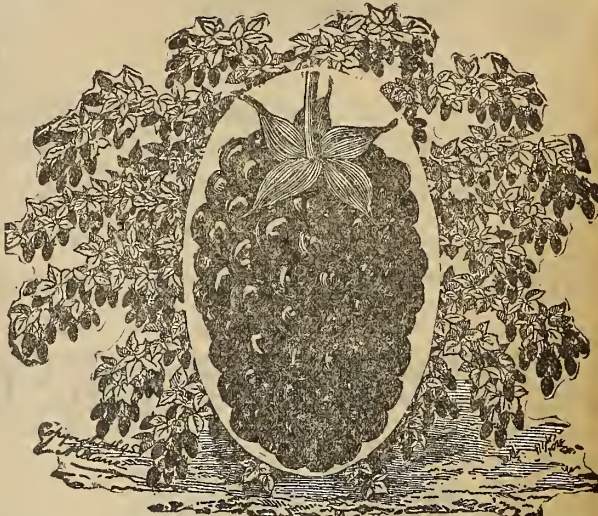

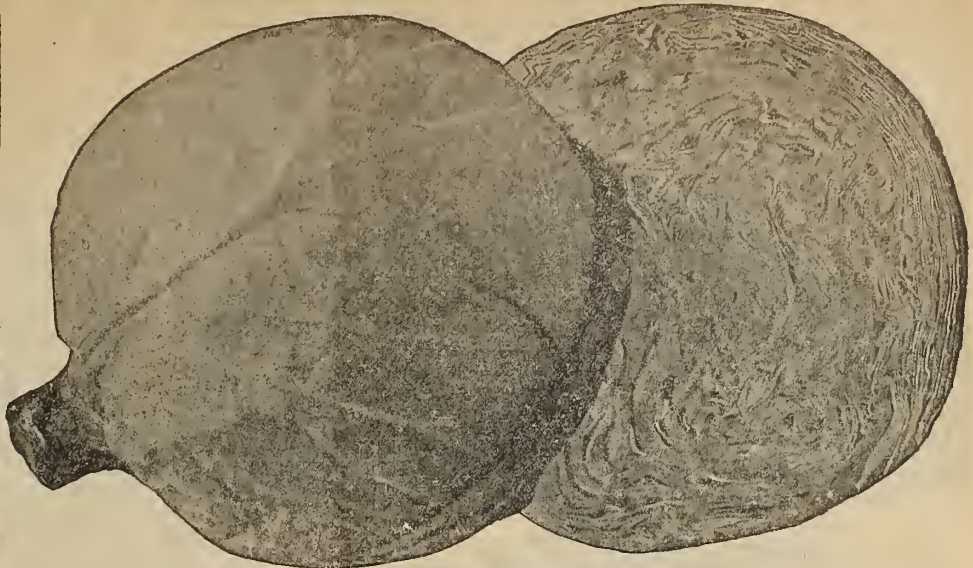

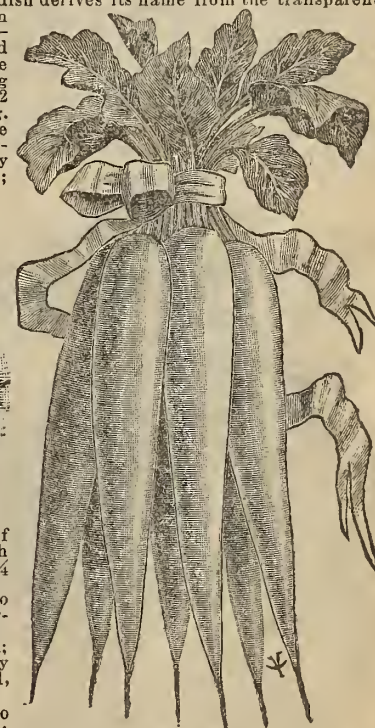

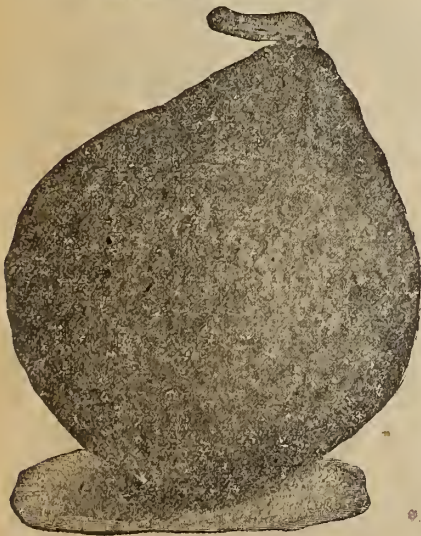

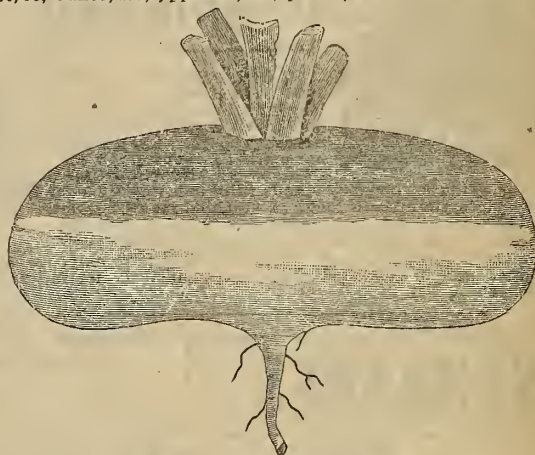

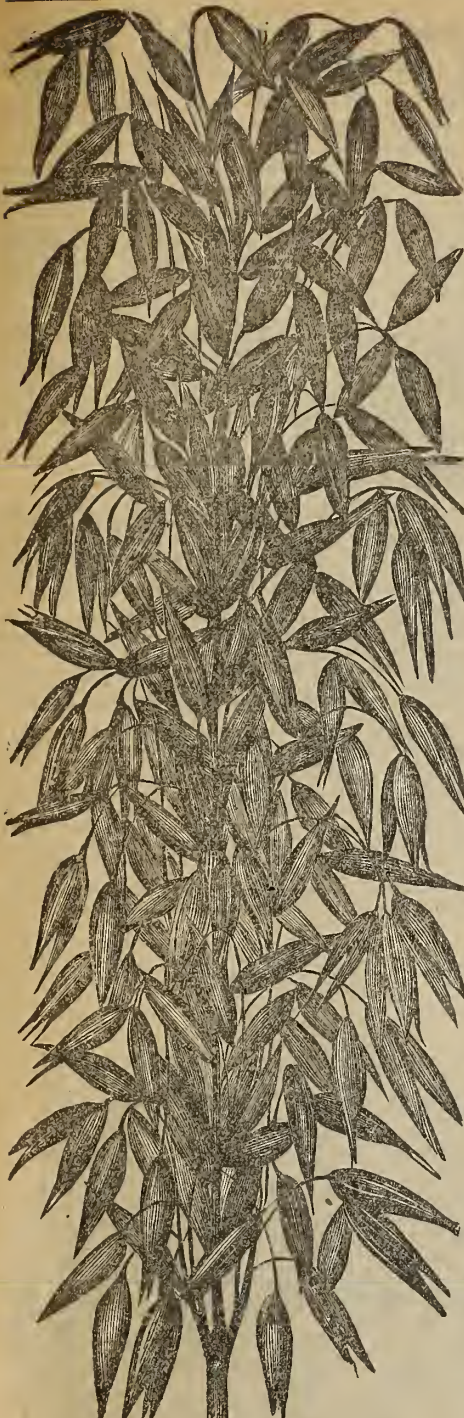

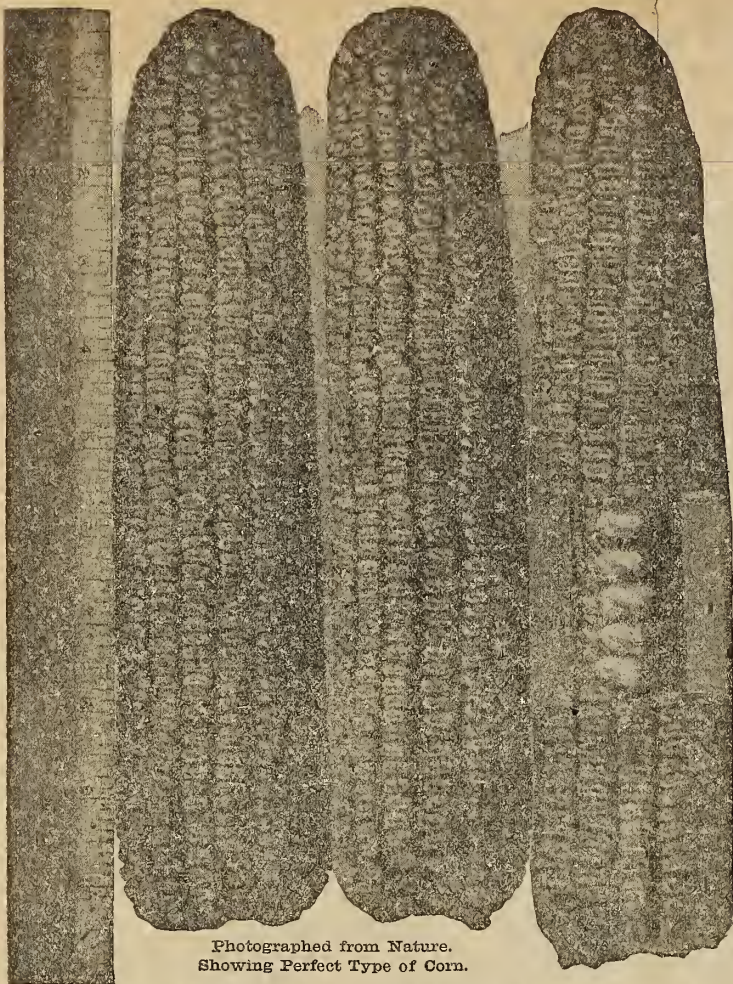

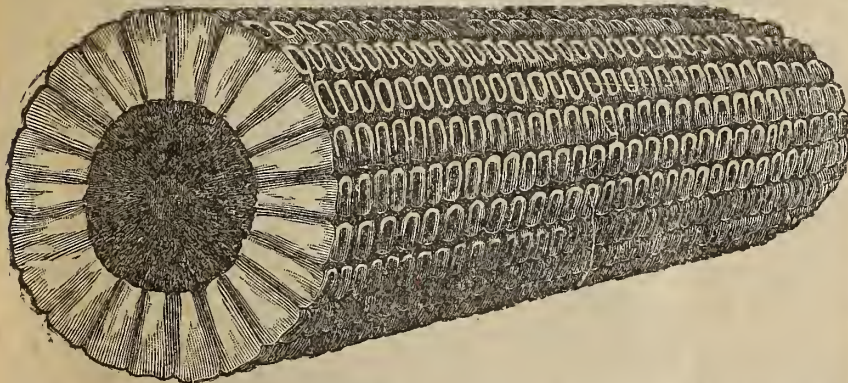

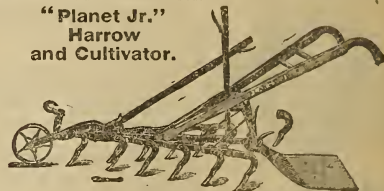
