5.—The system of reduction in the Premiums  
affords immediate benefit to the Assured or enables

6.—Separate tables, both Civil and Military,  
have been adopted for the whole life, at reduced  
rates, for such persons as may prefer a lower rate  
of premium for participation in the general profits.
