## Hats Off to Senator Rigdon—It's Up to the Governor Now

"It will now have to take its chance through this defense committee."

State Senator E. S. Rigdon, in his letter, published in last week's Pine Cone, concerning his bill to appropriate \$400,000 to complete the coast highway from Carmel-by-the-Sea to San Simeon, in San Luis Obispo county, made the foregoing significant and, as it proves, prophetic, statement.

J. F. Davis, of Sacramento, in a telegram to the publisher of the Pine Cone, says:

"Senator E. S. Rigdon has won the most important battle of the session, so far as the coast is concerned, when the Assembly passed the so called Military Highway Bill. This measure provides for six roads or highways recommended by the State Council of Defense as military necessities, and they include the Carmel-San Simeon highway and the Jolon Interl."

"Under the act, the State will co-operate with counties joining in highway construction, and also with the federal government in the construction of highways considered to be of importance for preparedness or for defense in the event the State is invaded by a foreign foe."

It appears from this telegram that the measure is dependent on county, state and national aid. In that event, the Carmel road will be likely get first consideration, as there are several individuals and semi-public organizations willing to give substantial support to the proposition.

The State Automobile Association and William Randolph Hearst are among those who will give aid and encouragement to the project.

Our Supervisor, Dr. J. L. D. Roberts, who has worked hard for the measure, will succeed in obtaining county aid for the matter. It will also have the support of the federal government, for two reasons, viz: the road will pass directly through a national forest, and second, military necessity requires the completed highway.

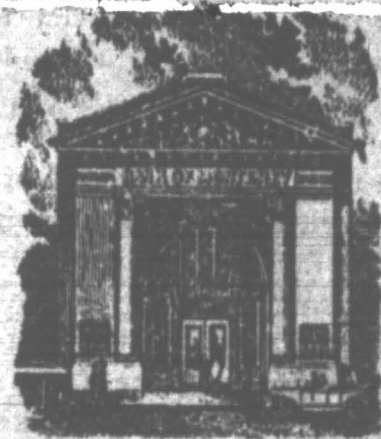

## It's Up to the Consumer

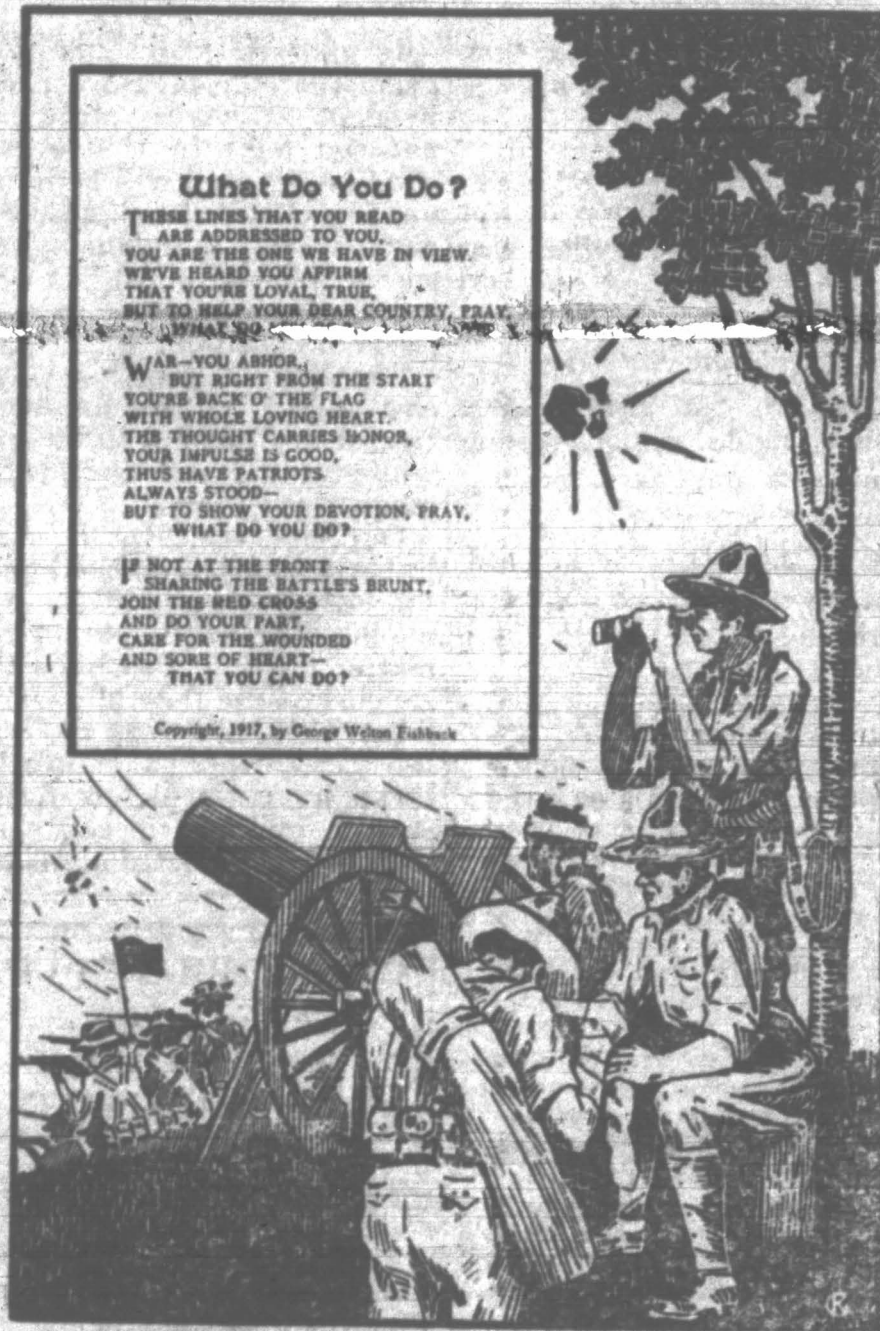
It seems that the consumer always gets the worst of the deal when food speculators corner the market and drive prices upward. The producer may sell at or below the cost of production, but this may not benefit the consumer, who is often at the mercy of market manipulators for his necessities. It is surprising the way speculators raise prices and the pretext they offer for it. The European war has been blamed for raises in prices; lack of transportation; short crops, and many other things. Some commodities have been affected by these things and others as a direct result of manipulation of the market. The consumer is easily fleeced. He will generally accept any kind of a story as to why prices are high, pay the bill and complain afterwards. With the food stocks we have in this country there is no good reason for food riots and hungry people. Lack of transportation, poor business in distribution, speculation and other things are at fault. The consumer must act before there will be any considerable relief in the high cost of living. The producer and honest dealers are anxious to meet consumers and help them save marketing cost. How long will the consumer submit to extortion?

What a difference. Hayes, an American, votes "No" on the Conscription Bill. Kahn, born in Germany, worked hard for the measure, and voted "Yes."

If you read it in the Pine Cone, you may safely repeat it.

## Our Weekly Recipe

### HUNGROISE POTATOES

Wash, pare and cut potatoes in one-third inch cubes; there should be three cupfuls. Parboil three minutes and drain. Add one-third cupful of butter and cook very slowly till potatoes are soft and slightly browned. In a small pan melt two tablespoonfuls of butter, add a few drops of onion juice, two tablespoonfuls of flour and pour on gradually one cupful of hot milk. Season with salt and paprika. Then add one egg yolk. Pour this sauce over potatoes and sprinkle with parsley chopped fine. Particularly good with steak.

## Notice to TAXPAYERS

All taxpayers are required by the constitution to annually make and deliver to the Assessor a statement, under oath, setting forth specifically ALL the real, personal, or other class of property, owned by such persons, or in their possession, or under their control, as the same stands of record at 12 o'clock Meridian on the first Monday of March.

The Political Code provides, that all property must be assessed at its "full cash value," and defines "full cash value" as being "the amount at which the property would be taken in payment of a just debt from a solvent debtor."

### Unsecured Personal Property

The taxes on all unsecured personal property are due and payable and must be paid at the time the assessment is made.

### Exemptions

Any person or association, claiming any property to be exempt from taxation, MUST make the claim and affidavit, for such exemption, every year, in the manner provided by law. This applies to the \$100 allowed on personal property of householders; the \$1000 allowed soldiers, sailors, marines, etc., and property used solely and exclusively for religious worship.

### Assessments

Any information desired relating to assessments will be gladly furnished on application, and all objections should be made before the Board of Equalization adjourns, instead of waiting until it is time to pay taxes.

Remember, that if you fail to make a statement you fail to comply with the law and you law yourself liable to arbitrary assessment, which is expensive to yourself and causes much trouble to others.

Entertainments may be held, and announcement made of the intent to donate the proceeds to the Red Cross, but not so announced as to convey the idea that the organization is formally connected with or responsible for its conduct. The Red Cross emblem may be used only for official Red Cross affairs.
