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## GRANT OF ARMS TO JOHN HARINGTON OF KELSTON, 1568.

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**T**O ALL and Singuler as well nobles and gentlemen as others to whome these presentes shall come be seene, heard, read or understande Sir Gilbert Dethick Knight alias Garter principall Kinge of Armes, Robert Cooke Esquire alias Claren-cieulx Kinge of Armes of the South partes and William Floure Esquire alias Norroy Kinge of Armes of the North Partes of Englande sendith greetinge in our Lorde God everlastenge For asmuch as aunciently from the beginninge the Gallaunt and Virtuouse actes of excellent personnes have been commendid to the worlde and posteryte with sondrey monumentes and remembrances of their goode descartes, Amongst the which the chieffest and most usuall hath ben the bearinge of signes in shildes called Armes beinge none other thinge then demonstracions and tokens of prowesse and valoir, diversely destributed accordinge to the qualytes and descartes of the personnes meritinge the same. To the entent that such as by their Vertues do shew fourth to the advauncement of the common weale the shyne of their goode lyfe and conversation in daily practyse of things worthy and commendable, beinge the very true and perfect tokens of a right noble disposition, may therefore receyve due honor in their lyves and also deryve and contynew the same successively in their posteryte for ever And Whereas John Harington of Kelston in the Countie of Somerset sonne of Alexander Harington descended of a younger brother of the Haringtons of Brierley in the Countie of Yorke, by right (as one abstract from such a Stock and descended of such Auncestors) ought to be in the number of the bearers of those tokens of honor: and yet not knowinge in what maner he ought to beare his Armes, the tyme beinge now so longe since his Auncesters first descended from out of the sayd house of Brierley: hath required us the said Kinges of Armes to assigne unto him his Armes and Creast with such difference of bearinge as may not be prejudiciall or offensive to any of his blood or name. In Consideration whereof

and for a perpetuall declaration of the Worthynesse of the sayde John Harington, and at his instant request We the Kinges of Armes aforesayde by power and authoryte to be committed by letters patentes under the greate Seale of England have assigned unto the said John Harington his Armes and Crest to be boren in maner followinge : That is to say, the fielde Sable a fretted humette argent ; a bordure checque of the second and first. Upon the haulme on a torce argent and sable a lyon's hedde golde langet guelues with a coller checque argent and sable mantelid guelues doubled argent : as more plainly appeerith depicted in this margent. Which Armes and Crest and every part and parcell thereof We the sayd Kinges of Armes do by these presents assigne unto the sayd John Harington and his posteritye for ever to be by him in such maner boren and shewed at all tymes and for ever heerafter at his liberty and pleasure without the impediment lett or interruption of eny parson or parsons. In Witnesse whereof we the sayd Garter, Clarenceulx, and Norroy Kinges of Armes have signed these presentes with our handes and sett thereunto our severall seales of Arms xij<sup>th</sup> day of ffebruary in the yere of our Lord God a thousande fyve hundred sixty-eight.

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A MEMOIR OR NOTICE OF JOHN HARINGTON, ESQ.,

THE FOUNDER OF THE BRANCH OF THE HARINGTONS OF KELSTON IN SOMERSET.

The gentleman in whose favour this grant of arms was made in 1568, and who is described in it as of Kelston, co. Somerset, was not we think at that date generally resident at Kelston, but in London. Kelston, which had pertained to Shaftesbury Abbey up to the time of the Dissolution of the Religious Houses, was without a mansion suitable for a resident owner ; so until this defect could be remedied, Harington, though owner of the manor, did not reside on it, but in his town house, near the Bishop's Palace at Lambeth. The branch of the family to which he belonged had been sadly impoverished by the attainder, as well of Sir Robert Harington as of Sir James Harington of Brierley, after the fall of the House of York, and victory of Hen. VII. at Bosworth (1485). The subject of this notice was probably born in Stepney, in which district there is some evidence that persons of the name had wharfage property, and to which neighbourhood the sons of Thomas Harington, Rector of Kelston, returned after the decease of their father. London was in those days, it would seem, as now, the field or scene of enterprise in which families of broken fortune sought to repair their losses. And one of the first points which strikes us as worthy of remark in noting the history of John Harington of Stepney is the singular recovery he achieved of something like the old family position, but in a totally different sphere from that of his northern ancestors. Taking into consideration the fall of Sir James Harington from the pinnacle of fortune after Towton (where Hen. VI. fell into his hands) to the depth of distress and ruin at Bosworth, after which battle Hen. VII. wreaked his vengeance on the adherents of Richard, how is it that a descendant of Sir James should be found in favour with Hen. VIII., and afterwards a trusted servant of his daughter Queen Elizabeth ? Through what influence did this change of feeling of the same Royal family towards the Yorkist Haringtons come to pass ? There seems no evidence that the Rutland branch of Haringtons, with Lord Harington of Exton at their head—now most flourishing when the northern Haringtons were most depressed in condition—did anything to help them regain their lost lands from Lord Monteagle, or to restore the fortune of their broken relatives in any other way. The ultimate union of the Roses may, it is true, to some extent have softened the asperity of the early days of Hen. VII., and thus the Haringtons, with their old name and known fidelity to whatever King they professed to serve, have moved back again to Court and courtly favour. But, after all, we cannot but think that the incident in John Harington's career to which we are about to allude, in his alliance with Hen. VIII.'s natural daughter, gave the chief impulse to his fortune. This would probably have been more obvious had his first marriage taken place during the lifetime of King Hen. VIII. But although this marriage did not so take place, it may have been already pre-arranged and known as a coming event before the King's death. Ethelred or Awdrey Malte, the natural daughter of Henry, whom Harington married, was a special favourite with her Royal parent, who placed her for protection and education with a wealthy citizen and merchant tailor of London, named John Malte or Mawlte. This man, in return for acting confidentially in these private matters, received from the King a valuable reward in the shape of a grant, dated 38th Hen. VIII. (1546) of church lands, being part of the spoils of Bath Priory and Shaftesbury Abbey. We must not allude, I suppose, to the irony which is patent in this act of reformation, but simply go on and add that these confiscated lands were to remain to the use of Malte himself for his life, then to pass to the use of his adopted daughter Ethelred and her heirs, if she had any, and if not, to revert to the heirs of Malte. These points in the Memoir will be assured by documents bearing upon them, given in brief. Malte, the reputed father of Ethelred, did not long survive the King, indeed he died a few months after. He died rich, and bequeathed to Ethelred by Will (over and above the

Manors of Kelston, Easton, and St. Catherine, all near Bath, which, as shewn above, would now fall to her fortune by the King's provision for her) another manor in Somerset, situate near Glastonbury,—the Manor of Andersey, otherwise Nyland, and now included in the parish of Rodney Stoke. The will of Malte is dated Sept. 10, 1546, and was proved June 7th, 1547, and in the year following we would place as probable the marriage of John Harington and Ethelred Malte in London or its suburbs. The wealthy endowment of his wife would be of prime importance to a man like Harington,—a man of fallen fortune but of lofty aspirations,—a man of decided talent and taste, who could write good sonnets, and (being more or less a friend of the famous composer Tallis) could write a Sanctus too; though, be it confessed, the only music of this kind handed down to us is the extraordinary Black Sanctus to Satan.\* He was a man, too, of historic name and family, and now in his present fortune he could fill a place at Court in any capacity in which he might be called upon to serve the Queen.

But let us pursue his domestic career. The union with Ethelred, if happy, was of short duration. The issue of the marriage was an only child, a daughter Hester or Æsther, whose birth about 1549 was probably the cause of her mother's early death. Where she was born or baptized is at present unknown. She survived her mother some years, and is spoken of in a deed affecting the Harington property 10th Elizabeth (1568). This is all that we can glean about her history: she would seem to have died unmarried, and thus, ultimately, all her mother's endowments passed to her father, and then from him to his heirs by a second wife. During the minority of his daughter Hester, certainly before 1554, and probably about 1550 (as *vide* the 'Nugæ' and Harington's sonnets to "sweet Isabella Markham") John Harington married Isabella, daughter of Sir John Markham, Lieutenant of the Tower of London. She was a Lady-in-Waiting on the Princess Elizabeth, and both husband and wife suffered imprisonment in the reign of Queen Mary for their fidelity to Elizabeth.

The date of his death was 1st July, 24th Eliz., at his house in Lambeth. His place of burial (as stated in the 'Mis. Gen. et Her.,' New Series, Vol. II., p. 361) was in the Church of St. Gregory by St. Paul's, London. There is an Inquisition post mortem of his property extant at Wells Diocesan Court under date 18th March, 25th Eliz., the details of which will be given, his son John (afterwards Sir John) being then twenty-one years and upwards.

There seems only to remark further, in concluding this memoir, that the Monumental Inscriptions, Registers, and other data of this branch of the Haringtons, descending from John of Stepney, commence from 1582 in Somerset; all evidences previous to this must be looked for in London and its precincts.

EXTRACT FROM THE WILL OF JOHN MALTE, CITIZEN AND MERCHANT TAILOR OF LONDON.  
(A confidant of King Henry VIII.)

Will dated Sept. 10, 1546. (Aren 39.)

"William Horner son of my daughter Horner shall have the Manors of Greenhall, Bramfield, and Ewell, Herts, and in default of issue *Anthony Skutt*, son of my daughter Bridget Skutt, shall have the parsonage of Wholstone, etc. etc. Mary the wife of Richard Egleston, and Elizabeth wife of Bradyssey, my first wife's daughters, £20 each. To Joane Dyngley, otherwise Joane Dobson, £20. £5 to the *foundling child*, that was laid at my gate. To Awdrey Malte, MY BASTARD DAUGHTER,† begotten on the body of Joane Dingley now wife of one Dobson, *the Manor of Andersey otherwise Nyland in Somerset*, etc. To my sister Margaret Fuller 20 marks per an'm," etc. etc.

GALWAY, EARL OF.—The arms borne by Henry de Massue de Ruvigny, the worthy son of a noble sire, were—Quarterly: 1st, arg. a fess gu., in chief three martlets sa. on a canton or, a battle-axe of the 3rd; 2nd, gu. a chaplet of laurel or, a chief chequé arg. and az.; 3rd, arg. three mallets gu. On his advancement to the Earldom in 1697, he was granted for supporters "two savages, crowned and girt with laurel, each holding in his hand a club, and on the same arm a shield with the arms of Ireland, all ppr." At his death, æt. 72, 3 Sept. 1720, Lady Russell, at the age of 84, succeeded to his property. Although deprived by Act of Parliament of the Portarlington estate, the leases he had granted to some of the Huguenot exiles for lives, renewable for ever, were not interfered with, but still continue in force. I Charles Staynings of Holnycote in the County of Somerset Esq<sup>re</sup> being of perfect mind and memory (I blesse my God for the same) and not knowing the certaine time of my departure I doe make and appoint this my last Will and Testament revoking and annulling all former Wills and Testaments by me heretofore made. Impr's. I committ my body to the dust to be decently buried by my Executor hereafter named in my Great Grandfather's Grave next my wife as my Trustees and Executor shall direct and my Soule I give to the Great God that gave him. Item. I give and bequeath unto Robert Siderfin of Croydon in the County of Somerset Esq<sup>re</sup> and Richard Troyte of Streame in the same County Clerke and to the survivor of them and to the Executor and Administrator of such survivor All my messuages lands tenem<sup>ts</sup> mills and hereditam<sup>ts</sup> with the appurten'nces lyeing within the severall p'ishes villages or tythings of Nether Stowey and Over Stowey in the aforesaid County of Som'sett. To have and to hold the aforesaid messuages lands tenements mills and hereditaments whatsoever with the appurten'nces unto the aforesaid Robert Siderfin and Richard Troyte their executors and assigns and to the Executor and Admin<sup>r</sup> of the survivor of them for and during the whole terme and time of ninety nine years fully to be complete and ended. If Lewis Staynings my brother and Grace Oram of Sellworthy in the County of Somerset Widdow they or either of them shall soe long happen to live nevertheless to be only lyable to the trusts and for the uses hereafter mens'oned (that is to say) to lease out the said pr'mises att an yearly rent and to pay the sume of Eighty Pounds in manner and forme following (that is to say) forty pounds p'te of the said Eighty Pounds, I doe appointe the said Robert Siderfin and Richard Troyte and the survivor of them and the Executor and Admin<sup>r</sup> of such survivor to pay annually unto my brother Lewis Staynings by quarterly paym<sup>ts</sup> during his natural life and twenty pounds other p'te of the said Eighty Pounds, I doe appointe the said Robert Siderfin and Richard Troyte and the survivor of them and the Executor of such survivor to pay annually to M<sup>rs</sup> Grace Oram before named during her naturall life and twenty pounds residue of the said Eighty Pounds I doe appoint the said Robert Siderfin and Richard Troyte and the survivor of them and the Executor of such survivor to pay annually unto my nephew Joseph Braford of the City of London during the naturall lives of my brother Lewis Staynings and Grace Oram and the survivor of them and likewise to pay all rates taxes and other outgoinges as shall become justly due and payable out of the aforesaid pr'm'sses during the said trust. And it is my Will and pleasure. that the said Robert Siderfin and Richard Troyte and the survivor of them and the Executor and Admin<sup>r</sup> of such survivor doe annually account to my Executor hereafter named for all such sume and sumes of money as they shall receive and take out of the aforesaid messuages lands tenements mills hereditam<sup>ts</sup> over and above the said sume of Eighty Pounds or the annuities paid which said overplus I doe give and bequeath unto my said Executor. Item. I doe give and bequeath unto my brother Lewis Staynings the house he now lives in called the West House being parte of my Mansion House in the p'ish of Sellworthy aforesaid for the terme of his naturall life and after his decease I give and devise the said house unto my nephew William Martin of the City and County of Exeter Esq<sup>r</sup> his heirs and assigns for ever. Item. I give and devise unto my said nephew William Martin and his heirs All that my Mansion House Messuages Lands Tenem<sup>ts</sup> Barton Farme Mill and hereditam<sup>ts</sup> whatsoever with their and every of their appurten'nces lyeing and being within the severall p'ishes tythings hamletts and villages of Sellworthy and Succombe in the County of Somerset. To have and to hold the said Mansion House and all and singular the said messuages lands

Item, I give and devise unto my said nephew William Martin and his heirs my Mannor of Hollincote with all the Royaltys and priveledges belonging to the same and all and singular my messuages lands tenements and hereditaments whatsoever with their and every of their appurten'nces lyeing and being in the severall p'shes tythings hamletts and villages of Sellworthy, Succombe, Winsford, Exford, Porlocke and Dulverton in the aforesaid County of Somerset. To have and to hold the aforesaid mannor messuages lands tenements and hereditam<sup>ts</sup> whatsoever with their and every of their appurten'nces unto the said William Martin his heirs and assigns for ever. Item, I give and devise unto the aforementioned Robert Siderfin and Richard Troyte and their heires and to the heir Executor and Admin<sup>r</sup> of the survivor of them All my Mannor Messuages Mills Lands Tement<sup>ts</sup> and Hereditaments whatsoever with their and every of their appurten'nces lyeing and being in the severall p'ishes villages tythings and hamletts of Nether Stowey and Over Stowey in the said County of Somerset upon this further trust (that is to say) after the death of my brother Lewis Staynings and Grace Oram and the survivor of them to and for the use of my nephew Joseph Braford for the terme of ninety nine years if he shall soe long happen to live. And after his decease or expiration of the said terme then in trust for such child and children as shall lawfully be begotten by the body of the said Joseph Braford such child or children liveing to the age of one and twenty yeares then to such child or children and the heirs of their body lawfully begotten and for default of issue lawfully begotten by the said Joseph Braford or for default of issue liveing to the age of one and twenty yeares or for default of issue by such child or children as shall be lawfully begotten by the said Joseph Braford then I give and demise unto my said nephew William Martin and his heire All my said Mannor Mills Messuages Lands Tenem<sup>ts</sup> and hereditam<sup>ts</sup> whatsoever with their and every of their appurten'nces lyeing and being in the aforesaid p'ishes tythings hamletts and villages of Nether Stowey and Over Stowey To have and to hold all the said Mannor Mills Messuages Lands tenements and hereditam<sup>ts</sup> whatsoever with their and every of their appurten'nces unto the said William Martin his heirs and assigns for ever. And I hereby will and authorize the said Robert Siderfin and Richard Troyte and the survivor of them and the Executor and Admin<sup>r</sup> of such survivor to allow and pay them and himself for such care cost and trouble as they or either of them shall reasonably deserve or be at in managing the said trusts. Item. I give and bequeath unto the aforementioned Grace Oram now living with me the sume of One hundred pounds to be paid within one yeare after my decease. Item. I give and bequeath unto my trustees Robert Siderfin and Richard Troyte the sum of Tenn Pounds each to be paid within three months after my decease. Item. I give unto my servant Edward Stoaate the sum of Twenty Pounds. Item. I give unto Joane Mitchell, Widdow, one other of my servants the sume of Five Pounds. Item. I give unto every other of my servants as shall be liveing with me at the time of my death the sum of forty shillings each. Item. I give to the poore of Sellworthy Twenty Pounds to be put in Stocke and the use thereof to be distributed yearly and to the poore of Succombe Five Pounds to be put into Stocke and the use thereof to be distributed yearly, and to the poore of Dulverton five pounds to be put into stocke and the interest yearly to be distributed and fifty shillings to the poore of Winsford and fifty shillings more to the poore of Exford to be distributed at my death. Item. I give and devise unto my nephew William Martin and his heirs All my Mannors Messuages Lands Tenan<sup>ts</sup> and Hereditam<sup>ts</sup> whatsoever (not by me already devised within the County of Som'sett and elsewhere). To have and to hold the said Mannors Messuages Lands Tenan<sup>ts</sup> and hereditam<sup>ts</sup> with their appurten'nces unto the said William Martin his heirs and assigns for ever. Item. After my legacies paid and funerall expenses borne I give and bequeath all the rest of my goods and chattles whatsoever unto my aforementioned nephew William Martin whom I doe constitute appoint and make my whole and sole Executor of this my last Will

and Testament. In Witness whereof I the said Charles Staynings have published and declared this my last Will and Testament this fourteenth day of February Annoq. D'ni 1693 and in the sixth yeare of the Raigne of King William and Queen Mary.

Extract from the Will of "William Martyn of Netherex in ye County of Devon, Esquire," date, 28 Dec. 1661.

"Item. I give unto my daughter Susanna Martyn, ye summe of five hundred pounds to be payd unto her by my executor hereafter mentioned, when she attains to the age of twenty and one, and shall further leave her to be better provided for at ye good pleasure of her dear Aunt, my sister Stennings."

From the Will, dated 29th Dec. 1663, of Dame Elizabeth Martyn of Oxton in "the County of Devon, Widow, late Wife and Relict of S<sup>r</sup> Nicholas Martyn of the same, Knight."

"To my cozin Thomas Gorges of Heavytree in ye countye aforesaid Esq<sup>re</sup> I give one hundred pounds of currant money of England, under the Trust and use followinge, that is to say to buy with the said one hundred pounds two jewells with what convenience may be and then to deliver, or cause to be delivered, unto my daughter Susanna Staynings for her use during her life, and after her death, to her eldest son or daughter, and in case she dyes without any issue, then the sayd jewells to be delivered unto my Grandchild Nicholas Martyn of Heavytree afores<sup>d</sup> Esq<sup>r</sup>."

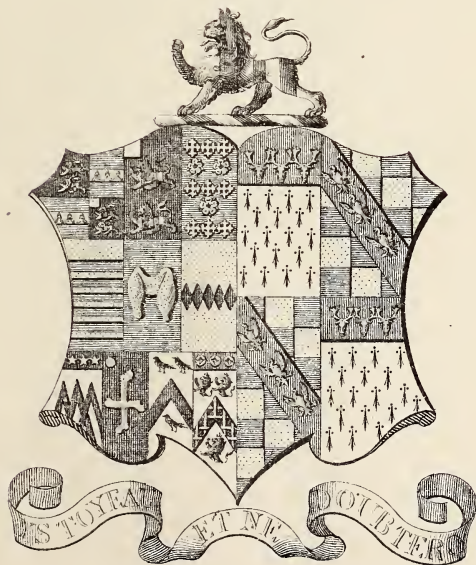

## EXTRACTS FROM THE REGISTERS OF BURIALS IN THE PARISH OF CHELTENHAM, GLOUCESTERSHIRE.\*

[These extracts, arranged chronologically, are illustrative of names and dates in the "Monumental Inscriptions in the Parish Church, Cheltenham, Gloucestershire," which have been published in the last volume. In a few cases, as may be perceived, there are slight discrepancies between the Inscriptions and the Registers; and (not to refer to those persons who were buried elsewhere) the names of some which appear in the former, are not to be found in the latter. This, and the fact that there is not any register forthcoming for a period of nearly twenty-three years (from July 15, 1653, to June 4, 1676), will account for the non-appearance of some names and dates in the following list. 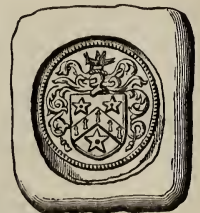

## RIDGWAY.\*

This book-plate has been used by three, if not four, generations. It was probably first engraved for JOHN RIDGWAY, of Ollerton, co. Chester, and of Audenshaw, co. Lanc. gent. [sixth in descent, of the same Christian name, from John R. of Ollerton, yeoman, living 1612], who died 9 Feb. 1802, leaving by his wife, *Elizabeth Priestner*, who died 11 Dec. 1810, four sons: 1. *John*. 2. *Thomas*. 3. *Joseph R.* of Duddon, co. Chester, an officer in the army who fought in the Peninsula, o.s.p. 1831. 4. *Samuel R.*, an officer in the Army, and Lieut. 2nd Royal Lancashire Militia, o.s.p.

The eldest son, JOHN RIDGWAY, of Ollerton, Audenshaw, and Manchester, Esq. was born 30 January, and bapt. at St. Anne's Church, Manchester, 9 March, 1769. Appointed Captain 2nd Royal Lancashire Militia 28 June, 1803. Sold the Ollerton property. Died at Dunkirk, s.p. (having been twice married) 25 March, 1833.

The second son, THOMAS RIDGWAY, of Liverpool, merchant, died at Duddon, co. Chester, where he had an estate, 27 April, 1827, having had, by his wife, *Mary Waine*, of Stapleford, co. Chester, 3 sons and 3 daughters; the eldest son

JOHN WITENSHAW RIDGWAY, of Manchester, Esq.,† was born 28 May, 1803, and died 25 January, 1851. He married at Warrington, 13 Feb. 1834, *Dinah*, daughter of *John Clare*, of Warrington, merchant, Captain Loyal Warrington Volunteers, and Local Militia, and left issue with a daughter, *Mary Elizabeth*, who died unmarried 1868, a son

JOHN CLARE RIDGWAY, of Sankey and Warrington, merchant, born 23 April, 1840; married at Eccleston, 14 June, 1871, *Annie Maria*, daughter of the late *John Houghton*, of Barrowfield, in Eccleston, co. ## NOTES.

(1) In the time of Queen Elizabeth a considerable estate in the parish of Stapleford was held by John Brodbent, who obtained a grant of arms from William Camden, Clarencieux, in 1601. He had, however, no male issue, and his only daughter and heiress was married to one Gervase Jackson. (Thoroton's 'Antiq. of Notts,' p. 212.)

(2) An inscription upon a monument in the south aisle (in which part of the church she is presumably interred) refers to this lady as "ex veteri prosapia Ashbyorum de Quenby in agro Leicestrensi oriunda." She was daughter of George Ashby, Esquire, and widow of Gervase Teverey, Esquire, a Justice of the Peace for the county of Nottingham, whose ancestor John Teverey, of Long Eaton in Derbyshire, had acquired an estate in this parish, about the time of King Richard the Second, by marriage with the heiress of the Stapleford family. This Gervase Teverey died August the 31st, 1639, and was buried with his ancestors in the south aisle of Stapleford Church, beneath a large monument adorned with the effigies of himself and his lady, now in a sadly mutilated condition. By his above-named wife he had an only son, John, who died an infant, and three daughters, namely Mary, married to Sir Brian Palmes, of Ashwell, in the county of Rutland, and of Lindley, in the county of York; Elizabeth, who died unmarried in her father's lifetime; and Anne, married to Ralph Huband, of Ipsley in the county of Warwick, Esquire, and died March the 23rd, 1672, in her 59th year. The earlier portions of the registers of this parish have been lost, and the above is the only entry relative to the Teverey family that remains.

(3) A family named Jaques, *alias* Gamboul, residing at Toton in the adjoining parish of Attenborough, possessed some interest in Stapleford. Richard, one of the younger sons of George Jaques, *alias* Gamboul, of Toton, gentleman, and Sarah his wife, was baptised at Attenborough March the 30th, 1627, and is probably identical with the above.

(4) This Andrew Palmes is usually described as of Sherborne, in Hampshire. He was a younger brother of Sir Guy Palmes, of Ashwell and Linley, and was uncle of Sir Brian Palmes, who married the coheirress of Gervase Teverey, Esq., as above noted. By Elizabeth, his wife, he had seven sons and three daughters, of whom Thomas, William, and John were all killed fighting for their King at the battle of Worcester; Edward, another son, settled in New England, where he married and had issue; whilst Brian, who appears to have been the youngest son, was an apothecary at Melton Mowbray, in Leicestershire, and was living at that place in 1681, being then married and having three sons and a daughter. This Andrew Palmes appears to have been

in his seventy-first year at the time of his decease, and was presumably interred in the Teverey vault. (Nichols' 'Hist. and Antiq. of Leicestershire,' vol. ii., p. 295.)

(5) William Palmes, Esquire (the father), was the third and youngest son of Sir Brian Palmes of Ashwell and Lindley by Mary his wife, eldest daughter and coheir of Gervase Teverey, Esq. "The Lady Mary," his wife, was a daughter and coheir of William, sixth Lord Euers, of Wilton in the county of Durham. This William Palmes had succeeded to the Stapleford estates upon the decease of his elder brother, Francis, but in 1668 he obtained a special Act of Parliament, under which he disposed of his Nottinghamshire estates and settled in Yorkshire.

(6) George Jackson was the son of George Jackson of Stapleford, gentleman, sometime Chief Constable for the southern division of the Broxtow Hundred, and was grandson of Gervase Jackson, who married Mary, sole daughter and heiress of John Brodbent, as already mentioned. The registers contain many entries relative to the family of Jackson, which became extinct in the main line upon the decease of John Jackson of Stapleford, gentleman, in 1853.

(7) See his burial in 1727.

(8) Married to Charles, fourth Viscount Cullen. See her burial in 1714.

(9) He was the fifth son of Arthur Warren, Esquire, and resided at Little Marlow, in Buckinghamshire, where he died in 1774. His remains were interred in the south aisle of the parish church of Little Marlow, and the following inscription was placed above his grave:—

"Under this stone are deposited the remains of James Warren, Esq., the last and only surviving son of Arthur Warren, Esq., of Stapleford, in the County of Nottingham, by Anne, his Wife, Daughter of Sir John Borlase, Bart., who departed this life March y<sup>e</sup> 29<sup>th</sup>, 1774, ætatis 89."

(10) He died unmarried February the 3rd, 1733, and was buried at Little Marlow.

(11) Arthur Warren, Esquire, purchased Stapleford Hall and a portion of the estate from William Palmes, Esquire, about the year 1670, and settled at Stapleford. According to Playfair ('Family Antiquities,' vol. vii. p. 138, Ap.), Ormerod ('Hist. and Antiq. of Cheshire,' vol. iii. p. 343), and other authorities, this Arthur Warren was descended from William Warren of Caunton, in the county of Nottingham,—a younger son of Sir Lawrence Warren of Poynton, in the county of Chester. There are, however, reasonable grounds for disputing this assertion. Arthur Warren of Stapleford was the grandson of Sir Arnold Waring, of Thorpe Arnold in the county of Leicester, who was knighted March the 4th, 1632. He was son of William Waring, buried at Thorpe Arnold in 1592, son of another William Waring, buried there in 1583, who was nephew of William Waring, merchant of the staple of Calais, whose inq. post. mort. is mentioned by Thoroton. In his will, which is sealed with a merchant's mark, he states that he was born at Tanworth in Warwickshire, and mentions his cousin William Waring, of Berry Hall in the parish of Solihull in the county of Warwick. The Warings of Tanworth bore—Azure, a chevron between three lions passant or,—a coat widely differing from that borne by the Warrens of Poynton, and there is no reason to suppose that there was any connection between the two families. There is no record of any arms in the Stapleford family until those of Poynton were used to a release, dated 1676, by the above-named Arthur Warren. The arms used at the funeral of this Arthur in 1697 were—Checquy or and azure within a bordure sable and over all a canton gules charged with a lion rampant azure. No arms were, however, recognized to the family until 1802, when they were established to Sir John Borlase Warren, Bart., and to the descendants of his father ('Herald and Genealogist,' vol. vii. p. 208). This Arthur Warren, who was a Captain in the Nottinghamshire Militia, and also executed the office of High Sheriff for the county, was buried in a small vault at the east end of the nave, above which the following inscription yet remains:

"Here  
Lies the Body of  
Arthur Warren, Esq<sup>r</sup>,  
who departed this Life 2<sup>nd</sup>  
November, A. Domini 1697."

(12) Only daughter and heiress of Sir John Borlase, of Little Marlow in the county of Buckingham, Bart., who died in August, 1688, having survived his only son, John, who had died without issue (Lipscombe's 'Hist. and Antiq. of the County of Buckingham,' vol. i. p. 310; vol. iii. p. 607). She married Arthur Warren, Esquire, in 1676, and had issue seven sons and one daughter. Her remains were interred in the same vault with those of her husband.

(13) See his burial in 1770.

(14) See his burial in 1767.

(15) He was educated at Emmanuel College, Cambridge, and graduated as B.A. in 1729 and M.A. in 1734. He was presented to the rectory of Ludgershall, in Buckinghamshire, by his father, Borlase Warren, Esquire, and was inducted into that benefice May the 9th, 1747. He died unmarried in the following year.

(16) See her burial in 1784.

(17) Only daughter of Arthur Warren, Esquire, by Anne his wife, and married Charles, fourth Viscount Cullen, by whom she had, with other issue, a son who succeeded to his father's title and estates.

(18) See her burial in 1794.

(19) See her burial in 1783.

(20) Charles, fifth Viscount Cullen, was the son and successor of Charles, fourth Viscount Cullen, whose wife was the only daughter of Arthur Warren, Esquire (as above mentioned). His

wife, who was thus his first cousin, was the eldest daughter of Borlase Warren, Esquire, and Anne his wife. Her baptism is not recorded in the Stapleford registers, and has not been found.

(21) She was the only daughter of Sir John Harpur, of Calke Abbey in the county of Derby, Baronet, by Anne his wife, second daughter of William, Lord Willoughby of Parham, and was married to Borlase Warren, Esq., in 1702, and had issue five sons and six daughters. Her husband, who died in 1747, was buried at Little Marlow.

(22) John Borlase Warren, Esquire, was the eldest son and heir of Borlase Warren, Esquire, by Anne his wife. His baptism has not been found. Bridget Rossell was the youngest daughter and coheir of Gervase Rossell, Esquire (the last male heir of the ancient family of Rossell, of Radcliffe-upon-Trent), by Frances his wife, daughter of William Green, of Thundercliffe Grange in the county of York, Esquire. Gervase Rossell dissipated the greater portion of his estates, and after his decease his widow kept a boarding house at Wirksworth, in Derbyshire. Mrs. Warren survived her husband (see his burial in 1763), and afterwards married the Reverend Graham Chapell, LL.B. She died May the 1st, 1785, and was buried in the chancel at Orston, in Nottinghamshire.

(23) John Borlase Warren, elder son of John Borlase Warren, Esquire, and Bridget, his wife, succeeded to his father's estates in 1763. In 1774, a few months after attaining his majority, he was elected M.P. for Great Marlow, and was created a Baronet May the 20th, 1775. He was subsequently elected for Nottingham, and became a member of the Privy Council, and was likewise Groom of the Bedchamber to H.R.H. the Duke of Clarence. His eminent services as a naval officer are well known. He attained the rank of Admiral of the Red, and was rewarded for his valour with the Grand Cross of the Bath, and with other orders of knighthood. He was married December the 13th, 1780, to Caroline, third daughter of General Sir John Clavering, by the Lady Diana his wife, daughter of John, first Earl de la Warr, and by her he had two sons, both of whom died in the lifetime of their parents, and three daughters. Admiral Sir John Borlase Warren died at Greenwich Hospital February the 27th, 1822, and his remains were interred at Stretton Audley, in Oxfordshire. Lady Warren survived her husband for some years, and died at Stapleford Hall December the 21st, 1839, in the seventy-ninth year of her age.

(24) Only daughter of John Borlase Warren, Esq., and Bridget his wife. She married Augustus Parkyns, Esquire, by whom she had several children, and dying June the 21st, 1821, was buried in the south aisle of St. Peter's Church, Derby, where there is a mural tablet to her memory.

(25) See his burial in 1829.

(26) Benjamin Price Withers, of Westbury in the county of Buckingham, Esquire, by his will, dated in 1771, recites several deeds between himself, the said Benjamin Price Withers, and Anne his wife, John Borlase Warren, Esquire, the Honourable Borlase Cockayne, Arnold Warren, Esquire, and the Reverend James Warren, under which the manor or royalty of Westbury was settled upon his descendants for ever. (Lipscombe's 'Hist. and Antiq. of the County of Buckingham,' vol. iii. p. 142.)

(27) Edward Tutin was an apothecary residing in Bridlesmith Gate, in the town of Nottingham. Catherine Rossell, who was baptised at Wirksworth April the 9th, 1725, was one of the daughters and coheiresses of Gervase Rossell, Esquire, and sister of Bridget, the wife of John Borlase Warren, Esquire. The issue of this marriage was an only daughter.

(28) Eldest son and heir of Borlase Warren, Esquire, upon whose decease, in 1747, he succeeded to the Stapleford estates. He was for some years a Justice of the Peace for the county of Nottingham, and was High Sheriff in 1751. His remains were interred in a vault at the east end of the south aisle in Stapleford Church.

(29) Third son of Borlase Warren, Esquire, and Anne, his wife. He died unmarried.

(20) Second son of Borlase Warren, Esquire, and Anne his wife. Also died unmarried.

(31) Youngest son of Borlase Warren, Esquire, and Anne his wife. He was educated at Emmanuel College, Cambridge, and took his degree as LL.B. in 1738, and was Rector of Stretton Audley, in Oxfordshire. In 1748, upon the decease of his elder brother, Charles, he was presented to the Rectory of Ludgershall, in Buckinghamshire. He died a bachelor.

(32) See her marriage in 1802.

(33) Second son and fourth child of Sir John Borlase Warren, Bart., and Dame Caroline his wife. He died young.

(34) Third daughter and youngest child of Sir John Borlase Warren, Bart., and Dame Caroline his wife. She also died in the lifetime of her parents.

(35) These three ladies, the unmarried daughters of Borlase Warren, Esquire, and Anne his wife, are buried in a vault at the north-east end of the nave, near to where the pulpit now stands. A large oval tablet, inscribed to their memory, is placed on the north wall of the nave, above the vault.

(36) George Charles Sedley, Esquire, was the eldest son of Henry, third Lord Vernon,—then the Hon. Henry Sedley—who had assumed the name and arms of Sedley in 1779, upon his marriage with Elizabeth Rebecca Anne Sedley, heiress of Sir Charles Sedley, of Nuthall Temple in the county of Nottingham, Bart. In 1813, upon his father's accession to the title, he assumed the family names of Venables-Vernon, and succeeded as fourth Lord Vernon in 1829. He died November the 18th, 1835. Frances Maria, his wife, was the eldest daughter and eventually sole heiress of Sir John Borlase Warren, Baronet. In 1826 she assumed the name of Warren, and after her decease (which occurred on the 17th of September, 1837) her only son, George John, fifth Lord Vernon, assumed for himself (but not for his issue) the name and arms of Warren only,—both of them so doing in compliance with the will of Elizabeth Harriott, Lady Bulkley, the sole

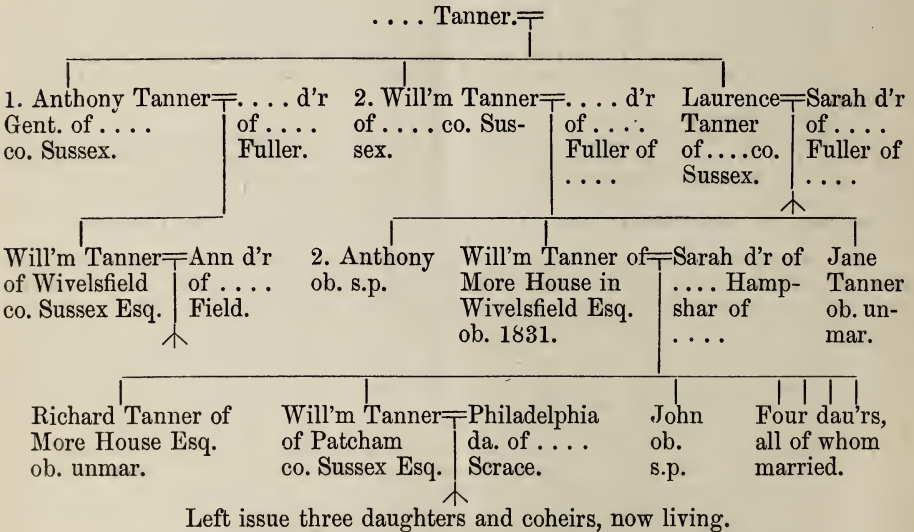
daughter and heiress of Sir George Warren, of Poynton, in the county of Chester, the last male heir of his line. The presumed relationship between the families, already referred to, was thus recognized. The present Lord Vernon does not bear the name of Warren, but his younger brother, having succeeded to the estates of his great-grandfather in Nottinghamshire and Oxfordshire, took, in compliance with his will, the names of Borlase-Warren before those of Venables-Vernon, by royal license dated June the 4th, 1856. (Burke's 'Peerage and Baronetage'; 'Herald and Genealogist,' vol. vii. p. 208.)

(37) Younger son of John Borlase Warren, Esquire, and Bridget his wife, and the last surviving male representative of his family. He died a bachelor, and was buried in the vault at the east end of the south aisle in Stapleford Church.

TANNER.—I should be much obliged to any correspondent who would give me information concerning the early part of the Tanner pedigree. It appears that the three brothers, Anthony, William, and Laurence Tanner, married three sisters (query whether daughters of a John Fuller, who left More House to Will'm Tanner?). In Berry's 'Sussex Genealogies' the Fuller pedigree is given, but I cannot find a John Fuller mentioned with three daughters, one being Sarah. More House was left (see Horsfield's 'Sussex,' p. 227) to a Mr. John Fuller by Frances, the sole heiress of John Middleton, Esq., of More House. She married Robert Day, Esq., and died s.p. in 1764.

I am very desirous to find out the arms and descent of the above *John Crabb*; probably he came of the family of that name at Castlewich, near Callington. (Harl. Pub., Cornwall Visit., 1620.)

*Alice Crabbe*, in 1682, married Saml. Cory, of Holsworthy, Devon, Esq. Was she of the same family or related to *William Crabbe* Mayor of Bristol in 1676?

EXEMPLIFICATION OF A CREST  
 BY WILLIAM CAMDEN CLARENCEUX TO GEORGE HYDE  
 OF SOUTH DENCHWORTH, NOVEMBER 22, 1600.

To all and singular to whom this presents shall come to be sene read or heard William Camden Esquire *alias* Clarenceux Principall Herald and King of Armes of the East West and South partes of England from the river of Trent Southward sendeth due comendac'ons in Our Lord god everlasting. Forasmuche as it evidently and plainely appeareth by divers and sundry auncient evidence dated the fift yeare of King Edward the third That the Ancestors of George Hyde of South Denchworth in the county of Berks Esquier have heretofore in thier seales vsed for their devise or Cognizaunce a Lance or Horseman's Staff with a flagge or Cornet thereat &c. 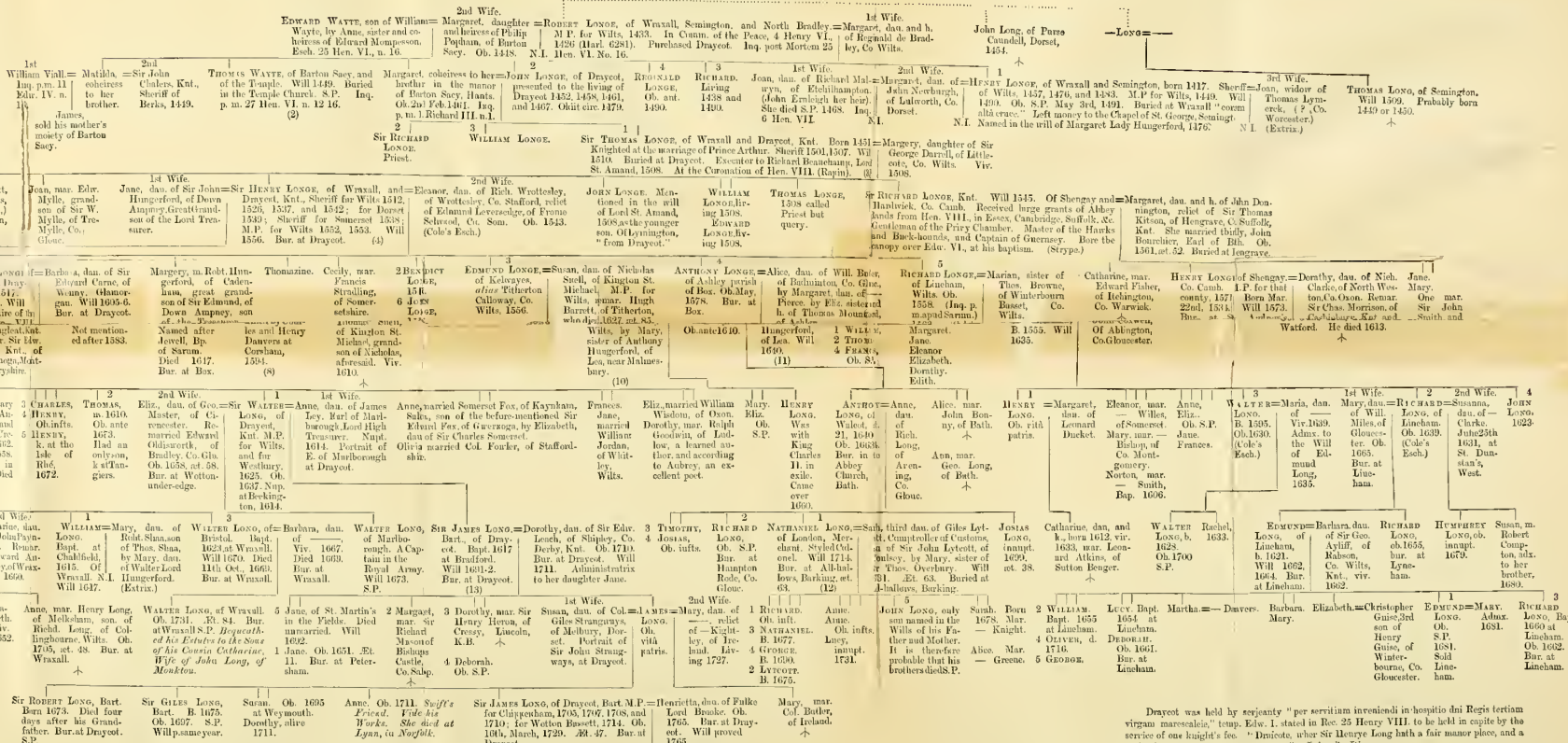

[*Note*.—It appears from the above that Mary, the daughter of John Harington, Esq., of Kelston (the Parliamentarian M.P. for Bath), only survived her husband six years. I have learned from family memoranda that this marriage was without issue. She was baptized at Corston, Somerset, 1628, where her father resided till after the death of his mother, the Lady Mary, in 1634. John Gostlett, being in the 67th year of his age when he died in 1692, must have been born 1625-6; and his wife Mary, being bapt. 1628 and dying in 1698, attained the age of 70. From observation of these dates, it would seem that *Benjamin* Gostlett, whose wife's surname is not known, but whose dau'r Helena married John Harington, Esq., of Kelston, son of John, the Parliamentarian, in 1678, was brother and probably younger brother of the above John Gostlet, and not his son. This family is mentioned in Fosbrooke's 'Gloucestershire' as having purchased the lands in Marshfield once held by the Abbey of Keynsham, Somerset.]

[*Note*.—He was Calthrop Parker at the time of their marriage. They both executed a lease of property at Instow (in Devon), in the name of Parker, 27th July, 1709 (to which Elizabeth Gibbes was also a party); but on 20th May, 1716, they executed as C. and D. Long. Calthrop Parker (Long) was her 2d husband. She was previously the wife of Henry Long, Esq. of Stanton Prior, co. Somerset (married at Kelston, 1682). Her mother was Mary Specot (Harington).]

The Table of Benefactions records the following bequests of Mrs. Dyonesse Long to the church and parish of Marshfield :—

“Imprimis To the Vicar of this place for the time being an estate lying in the parish of Mangotsfield called Cleave Hill of the yearly value of one hundred pounds or thereabouts—provided he preaches or causes to be preached two sermons on every Lord's day in this Church, and reads or causes to be read on Wednesday and Friday in every week Prayers in the said Church.” (This estate was purchased in the year 1731.)

\* It should be seventy years.—F. J. P.

- “ Item Towards the maintenance of six poor Widows an estate lying in the parish of Iron Acton in this County (Glos'ter) of the yearly value of 20 pounds or thereabouts, purchased in the year 1731.
- “ Item To a Charity School towards teaching and Clothing twenty Boys, if so many can be had, an estate lying at Frampton in this County, of the yearly value of twenty-five pounds or thereabouts, purchased in the year 1731.
- “ Item The interest of nine hundred pounds lying in New South Sea Annuities for the use of the two last mentioned charities.”

There was also given to this Church (Marshfield) by Colthrope Long, Esq., and Dyonisia his wife a set of communion plate, consisting of two large flagons, one large cup with a cover, and two large plates.

#### KELSTON MONUMENTS RESUMED.

*An Inscription which would seem to have been upon a flat stone in Kelston Church in the time of Collinson, the historian of Somerset, but is now (1877) no longer extant, and has never been seen by the present Rector :—*

Here lyeth the Body of Dorothy  
Wife of John Harington Esq<sup>r</sup>  
and Daughter of William  
White of Little Somerford  
in the County of Wilts, who died  
July 4<sup>th</sup> A.D. 1726  
Aged 42.  
“ We shall rise again.”

*A monument on record as having once been in Kelston Churchyard, but no longer extant, nor remembered in situ by the oldest inhabitant (1877). A marble table supporting a Bible :—*

Near this place lyeth the body of Dr Edward Harington a faithful and diligent servant of his God, who entrusted him with Five Talents, the improvement of which was his constant care, for, so far as human nature would permit, he followed the Pattern of our Blessed Lord and Master, instructing the ignorant, comforting the afflicted, and healing the diseased. Indeed he had the virtues both of Head and Heart, which made him highly esteemed and beloved, and as greatly lamented at his Death, which was the first of August 1757.

His unhappy widow, sensible of his merits and her own great loss, has ordered this emblem (The Holy Bible) of his daily study to be erected.

*On a tablet in the porch over the north door, Kelston :—*

[*Note.*—This lady was previously married to Mr. Edward (? Coward, the writing of marr. entry is indistinct) Chetwynd. The Rev. Thos. Fecknam succeeded Mr. Wm. Wallis as Vicar of Marshfield in 1686, and himself died in 1704.—*Vide* Atkyns's 'Gloucestershire,' p. 286, as to Fecknam.]

Memorand. that the Births and buryalls of the sonn<sup>s</sup> of John and Marg<sup>t</sup> Chaytor are all entered in the Record of Richmond Meeting, yet for further satisfaction are thought fitt to be entered here allso :

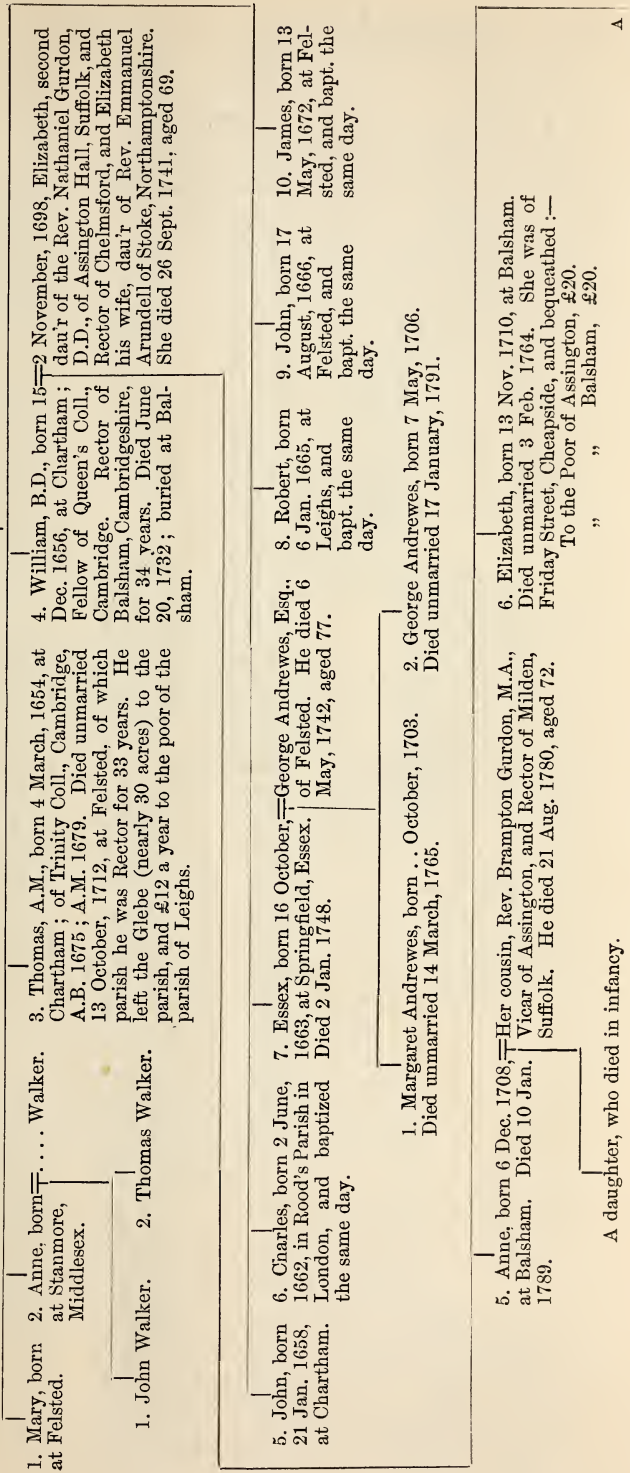

for having taken the *Cavalier's Protestation*, and for exhorting others to it." . . . . . "He also had a temporal estate of £80 a year in London, which was likewise seized and put under sequestration." (*Vide* Walker's 'Sufferings of the Clergy,' part ii. p. 327.) Walker details the outrages from which George Pierce and his family suffered, and the privations they underwent. How long he survived the Restoration was unknown to Walker, but is above recorded. He returned to Tiverton, and became a D.D. He was an especial benefactor to the poor, and a man of singular diligence and industry in the ministry, and of great temperance and sobriety. (*Vide* also Harwood's 'Alumni Etonenses,' 1797).

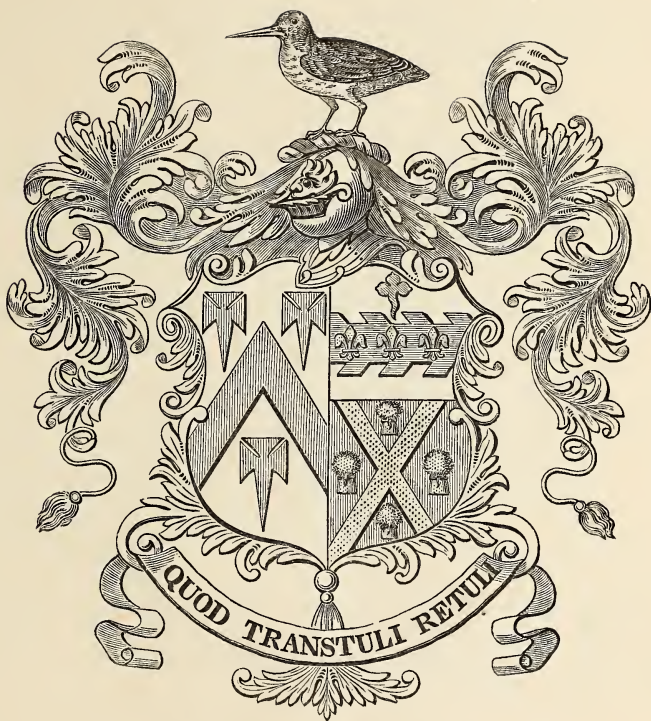

§ The Rev. John Weston, M.A., Oxon., was the only son of Dr. John

Weston, D.C.L., Canon and Treasurer of Christ Church, Oxford; grandson of Dr. Robert Weston of Weeford, co. Stafford, D.C.L., Fellow of All Souls, Oxon, and the renowned Lord Chancellor of Ireland temp. Eliz., and great grandson of John Weston of Lichfield [who was descended through the family long seated at Hagley, near Rugeley, from the ancient and knightly house of Weston of Weston-under-Lizard, co. Stafford], by Cecilia Nevill, daughter of Ralph, Lord Nevill of Baby, and sister of Ralph Nevill, who succeeded his grandfather as 4th Earl of Westmoreland. At the commencement of the Great Civil War, John Weston was the Rector of All Hallows, Lombard Street, London, and, as Newcourt records, "was for his loyalty sequestered by the rebels." He is mentioned by Walker in his 'Sufferings of the Clergy,' and Lloyd in his 'Loyal Sufferers' tells us that "because he (Weston) walked uprightly and would not creep or crouch using no Arts to gain them but pious Living and painful Labouring and because his smart Preaching made some galled back wince, they persecuted and imprisoned him." He did not survive to benefit by the restoration of the living of which he had been deprived, but died A.D. 1660. By his wife Marthæ, above named, he had, with other children, John, who died unmarried, and Henry, 2nd son, who married Mary, daughter of John Buckler of Radpole, in Dorsetshire, and who acquired Lane House and other property in that County, which have been retained by the family, and are now held by William Henry Purcell Weston, his direct descendant.

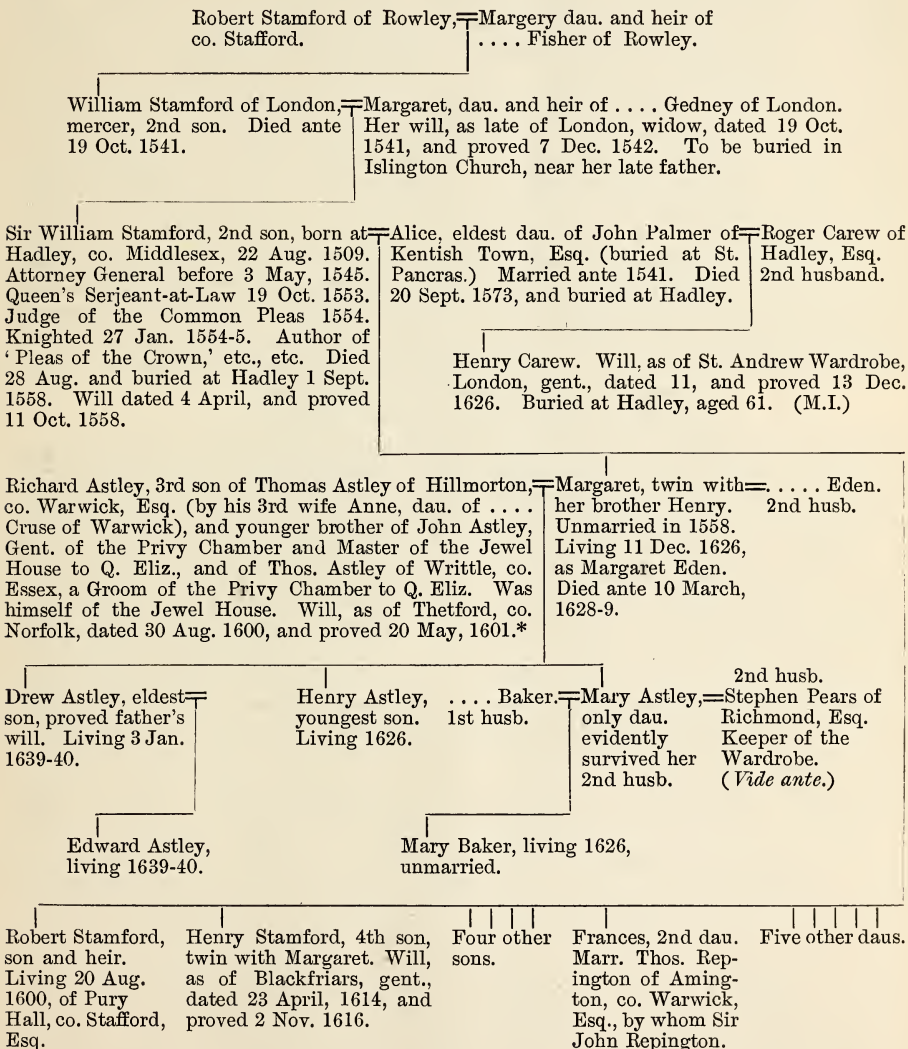

## THE DENNYS,

EARLS OF NORWICH, BARONS DENNY OF WALTHAM, AND  
BARONETS OF IRELAND.

THE lineage of this very ancient family is given at length in Archdall's revised edition of 'Lodge's Peerage of Ireland' (vol. i., p. 298, ed. 1789), and by Sir Bernard Burke in his 'Peerage and Baronetage of Great Britain and Ireland.' Traditionally it claims for a founder a knight who rendered good service to Charlemagne, but Lodge begins the pedigree with John Denny, who served Henry the Fifth in the French wars, and who, with his son John, was slain in battle and buried in France. Fourth in descent from the elder brother of this last-mentioned John was Edmund Denny of Cheshunt, Baron of the Exchequer and Knight, who died in 1520, leaving with other issue a daughter Joice Denny, who marrying William Walsingham, was by him mother of Sir Francis Walsingham, Secretary of State *temp.* Elizabeth, and Anthony born in 1500, the well-known favourite of Henry the Eighth. He was knighted and made a Privy Councillor and Groom of the Stole to that king. Fuller tells us in his quaint language that "alone of all the courtiers Sir Anthony Denny was bold and faithful enough to acquaint King Henry truly with his dying condition, to dispose his soul for another world." The learning and virtues of Sir Anthony Denny have been commemorated in the verse of Surrey and in the Latin prose of Roger Ascham. He married, says Lodge in his Biographies of Royal and Illustrious personages, "a lady of ancient lineage and great piety," Joan daughter of Sir Philip Champernoun, of Modbury, Devonshire, the aunt of Sir Walter Raleigh and Sir Humphrey Gilbert, the hero of Longfellow's ballad. In a curious and beautiful epitaph on Sir Anthony Denny amongst the Harleian MSS. in the British Museum he is described as a—

"Mæcenas to the learned, an anchor to relygion,  
To these an open haven that were for Christe opprest;"

and from the narration of Anne Askew, it appears that Joan Lady Denny was one of the friends and helpers of that noble-minded martyr during her imprisonment. The Champernoun sisters appear to have been amongst the first who ventured to protect the persecuted in Devonshire under Henry the Eighth (*v.* Edwards' Life of Raleigh). Joan Lady Denny left by Sir Anthony, with other issue, two daughters, Mary, who married Thomas Astley, Groom of the Chamber, and Honora, who married Thomas Wingfield, grandson of Sir Richard Wingfield, Kt. Mareschal of Calais, Privy Councillor and Ambassador and Knight of the Garter, who by his marriage with Catherine, dowager Duchess of Buckingham and Bedford, was great uncle to Henry the Eighth. In 1522 that king granted to Sir Richard the castle and manor of Kimbolton with other manors and several priories, all of which were inherited by his grandson Thomas above mentioned. He had issue, by Honora Denny, a son, Sir Edward Wingfield of Kimbolton, whose grandson, Sir Edward Maria Wingfield, sold that ancient mansion to the ancestor of the Duke of Manchester. Sir Anthony Denny, besides these daughters, had also two sons, of whom it is only here necessary to mention two, *viz.*:—I. HENRY, who married first the daughter of John Lord Grey of Pirgo, coheir to Henry Duke of Suffolk, and by her had no issue, and secondly Honora daughter of William Lord Grey of Wilton, and had with other issue a son and heir Edward, created Baron Denny of Waltham in 1605, and Earl of Norwich 24th August, 1616. Edward Denny Earl of Norwich married Lady Anne Cecil, daughter of the Earl of Exeter, by whom he had an only child and heiress Lady Honora Denny, who married James Hay, Earl of Carlisle, and left an only son, James, Earl of Carlisle, who married the daughter of the Earl of Bedford, and died *s.p.* II. EDWARD, fifth and youngest son of Sir Anthony Denny by Joan, dau. of Sir Philip Champernoun, went to Ireland with his connexion Lord Grey and his cousins Raleigh and Gilbert, and served gallantly against the Irish and their Spanish and Italian allies. To quote again from Fuller, "Sir Edward Denny was dubbed a knight banneret on the field of battle, and by God's favour, Queen Elizabeth's bounty, and his own valour, achieved a fair estate in the

county of Kerry in Ireland, at this day enjoyed by his descendants." This estate of about seven thousand acres was portion of the immense forfeited Palatinate of Gerald, 16th Earl of Desmond, and contained the Earl's chief castle of Tralee, and several smaller castles in the west of Kerry. Sir Edward Denny married, like his father, a lady of old west of England stock, Margaret daughter of Piers Edgcumbe, Esq. of Mount Edgcumbe, ancestor of the Earls Mount Edgcumbe. Margaret Edgcumbe had been Maid of Honour to Queen Elizabeth, and soon after her marriage she accompanied her husband to Ireland, where a fierce rebellion raged. She was, with her two young children and a small garrison of the Queen's troops, at Tralee on the west coast of Kerry, when in September, 1588, the ships of the Spanish Armada were driven thither. Sir Edward Denny was absent in Dublin, and the position of his wife amidst the half-subdued wild Irish, all devoted to Spain and Catholicism, was far more perilous than that of her father in the "Edgcumbe's lofty hall" of Macaulay's fine ballad. She was however equal to the occasion, and the few Spaniards who were able to effect a landing in Dingle and Tralee were made prisoners, and at once hung by her orders at the latter town. Lady Denny and her husband appear to have remained in Kerry until 1589, and to have then, with their young children, returned to England in the ship of the famous sea rover, George Clifford, Earl of Cumberland, which had put into Dingle for water and provision on her perilous voyage homeward from the Azores (*v.* Hakluyt). Sir Edward Denny died on the 13th of February, 1599, and was buried in Waltham Abbey, Essex, under a fine altar tomb erected by his widow. In a recess above the tomb is a slab bearing a long and quaint inscription, to the remory of the knight, and, according to old histories of the county, a small stone tablet was formerly attached to the marble pillars of this recess, on which these lines were inscribed:—

"Learn curious reader, ere you pass,  
What once Sir Edward Denny was,  
A Courtier in the Chamber—a Soldier in the field,  
Whose tongue could never flatter,  
Whose heart could never yield."

Two marble effigies, a knight and lady, lie on the tomb itself, and on the stone pillow beneath the lady's head are carved these lines from the Book of Job:—

"All the daies of my appointed time will I wait untill my change come."

From this it is evident that the widowed Margaret Lady Denny intended that she should be buried with her husband, but this intention was frustrated, probably by the disturbed state of the country when she died in the midst of the great Civil War of the seventeenth century. The "days of her appointed time on earth" were long and changeful, and she was probably the sole survivor of that brilliant ring of fair women and brave men which encircled the throne of the last of the Tudors. Of Sir Edward Denny's distinguished kindred, Gilbert had perished at sea in a manner befitting his mother's pious and noble race, Grey and Raleigh on the scaffold, through the malice of Spain and the perfidy of James the First, that king had passed away to his account, and his son was a prisoner to fall under the axe in less than a twelvemonth; when Margaret Lady Denny, the ex-maid of honour to Elizabeth, died at the age of eighty-eight years, and was buried *not* with her husband at Waltham, but in the church of Bishop's Stortford, in Hertfordshire. The brass which marks her resting place, near the altar, is still in good preservation, and bears the following inscription:—

"Here Lyeth interred the truelie honor'd The Ladye Margaret Denny descended of the ancient familie of Edgcumbe of Mount Edgcumbe in Cornwall,—a Mayd of Honor in Ordinarie to Queen Elizabeth of blessed memorie, then marry'd to Sir Edward Denny, Kt. Groom of her Majesty's Privy Chamber; She departed this lyfe April 24, 1648, Aged 88 yeares, and in the 48th yeare of her widowhood."

Several monuments to her younger children, and their Hertfordshire connexions, are to be seen in the church.

Her eldest son Sir Arthur Denny, Kt. seems to have returned to Ireland at the beginning of the seventeenth century. He married Elizabeth daughter of Miles



Forest, Esq. of Huntingdon, and sister of Sir Anthony Forest, and, dying at his mansion house of Carrignafeely, near Tralee, in the county of Kerry, on the 4th of July, 1619, left an only son and heir, aged fourteen years and three months, as appears by an inquisition taken at Tralee, 18th April, 1622, and preserved in the Public Record Office, Dublin. The wardship of Edward Denny, during his minority, was granted to Sir Robert Loftus, eldest son of Lord Loftus of Ely, Lord Justice of Ireland in 1636-40, and ancestor of the Lennard Barretts of Bell House, Essex, and the Lords Dacre. Edward Denny attained his majority in the year 1626, and the family genealogy for a hundred and twenty years after is preserved with tolerable fulness (and perfect accuracy as far as it goes), in an old MS. volume, half diary, half register, in the possession of his lineal descendant the present Sir Edward Denny, Baronet, supplemented by various entries on the fly-leaves and margin of a yet more curious family relic, a black-letter Bible of the early part of the seventeenth century, which by a well-nigh miraculous succession of Providences escaped destruction in the great Irish civil wars of 1641 and 1689, when Tralee Castle was in the hands of the Irish, and innumerable churches and Bibles were burnt all over the island. The original Desmond Castle, which was granted to Sir Edward in 1587, had been so dilapidated in the wars of that time that it was uninhabitable, hence the family resided for nearly fifty years at the manor house of Carrignafeely before mentioned. But when Sir Edward Denny, the ward of Loftus, attained his majority, he rebuilt or restored the old Castle of Tralee, as appears by the old diary. It begins with the following entries, written by him in a very clear, fine hand for the time:—

“I was married in Roper’s Rest House to Ruth Roper in Lent being the (*illegible*) 1625.

“I finished this great Castell and came with my mother to live in itt upon y<sup>e</sup> 22<sup>d</sup> of December 1627.

“Margarett Denny my daughter was born y<sup>e</sup> 25<sup>th</sup> of March 1627, being Wensday and dyed thursday sennight after Whit Sunday being early in y<sup>e</sup> morning, her Godmother were y<sup>e</sup> Ladye Honora Fitz Maurice and my mother the Ladye harris,\* Sir Valentine Browne her Godfather.

“Monday y<sup>e</sup> 21<sup>st</sup> of September 1629 between 11 and 12 o’clock in the day Arthur Denny was borne, his Godfather was Donough O’brian deputy of the Lord Presydent S<sup>r</sup> W. S<sup>t</sup> Leger and David Earle of Barrymore who was here, his God mother was my mother.

“The 20<sup>th</sup> of November 1629 my wyfe and I began housekeeping in this greate Castell.”

Roper’s Rest House (which seems to be an Anglicised version of Rast Haus) was, in 1625, the residence of Sir Thomas Roper, Lord Baltinglass, father of Lady Denny and collateral ancestor of Lord Teynham. Part of it, with a high antique roof and massive chimney stacks, still stands in the suburbs of Dublin, amidst a crowd of warehouses, tanyards, and other vulgar companions unknown to the knightly mansion in its better days. There are some very curious legends connected with it. Honora Fitz Maurice, the Godmother of the short-lived child Margaret Denny, was the wife of the nineteenth Lord Kerry, who was buried in the church of St. Giles’s in the Fields, London, on the 31st of January, 1660. His wife was the daughter of Sir John Fitz Gerald of Cloyne, said by Archdall to have been “the richest commoner of his time.” Honora Lady Kerry had, with other issue, a daughter Margaret married to Christopher Roper, Lord Teynham, and a son whose son and successor the twenty-first Lord Kerry, created Earl of Kerry in 1722, married Lady Anne Petty, sister of the Earl of Shelburne, and the friend of Swift, and was by her ancestor of the present Marquis of Lansdowne. Honora Lady Kerry and Anne Countess of Kerry (*née* Petty) are both buried in Ardferit Cathedral, in Kerry (*v.* ‘Journal of the Royal Historical and Archæological Association of Ireland,’ July, 1876.) Sir Valentine Browne, mentioned in the above entry, was the ancestor of the present Earl of Kenmare.

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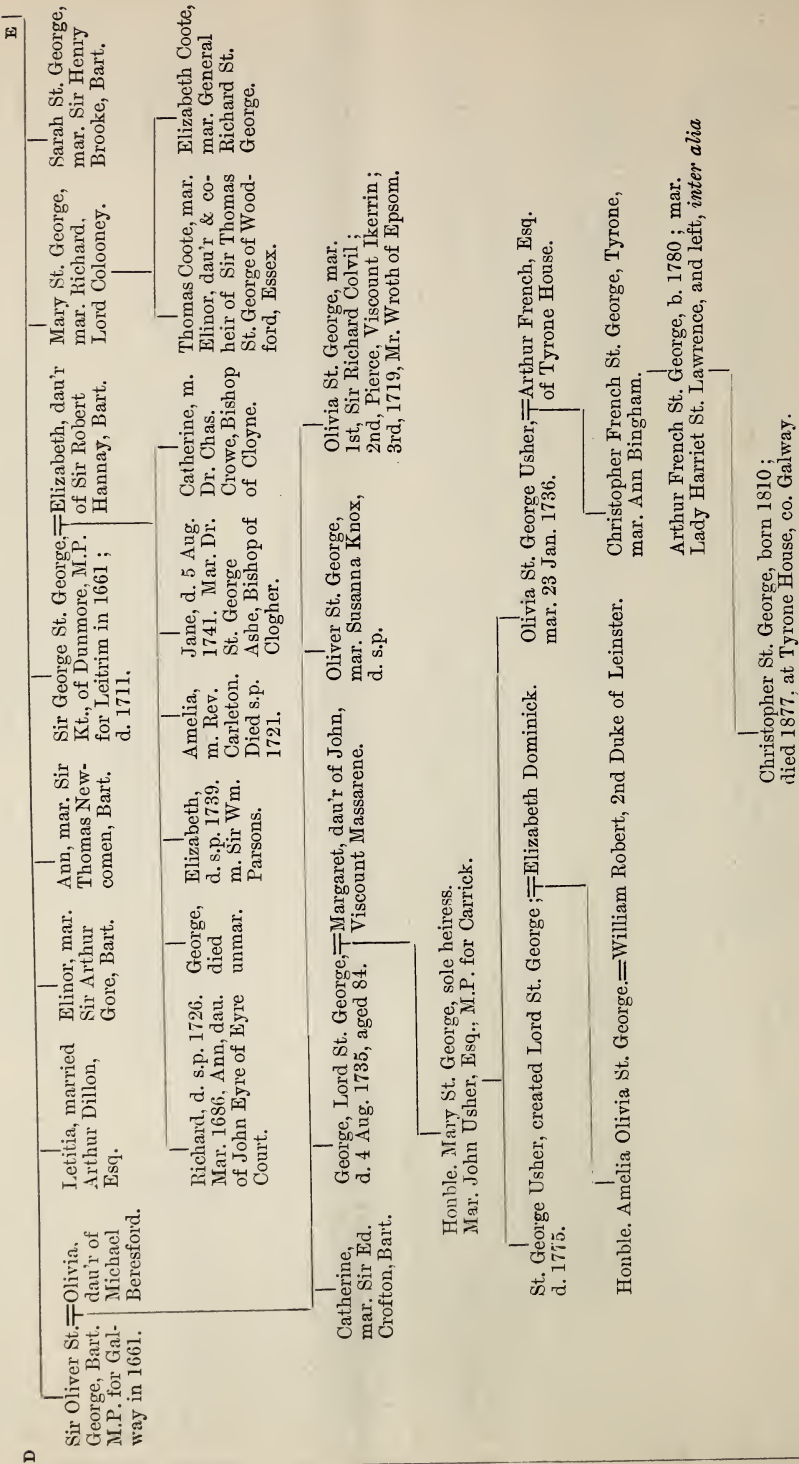

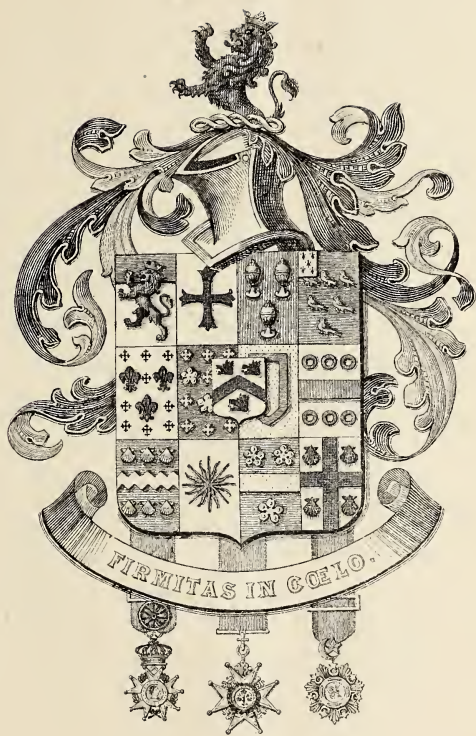

Whereas Frances Adams of the City of Gloucester Widow, Relict of the Reverend Henry-Cay Adams, Clerk, deceased, on behalf of her eldest Son William Henry Hyett (late Adams) now of Painswick in the County of Gloucester a Minor, hath represented unto the Most Noble Charles Duke of Norfolk Earl Marshal and Hereditary Marshal of England that His Royal Highness the Prince Regent by Warrant under His Majesty's Royal Signet and the Sign Manual of His Royal Highness in the Name & on the Behalf of his Majesty bearing date the first day of June last hath been pleased to give and grant unto Her, on behalf of her aforesaid Son, William-Henry Adams, His Majesty's Royal Licence and Authority that He may from grateful respect and affectionate Regard to the memory of Benjamin Hyett late of Painswick aforesaid Esquire deceased, take and use the Surname and Arms of Hyett only, such Arms being first duly exemplified according to the Laws of Arms and recorded in the Heralds' Office otherwise the said Royal Licence and Permission to be void and of none effect: That upon an examination of the Records of the College of Arms it appears that the Armorial Ensigns borne by the said Benjamin Hyett have not been duly registered to his family so as to authorize the Exemplification thereof in obedience to the said Royal Warrant, She therefore requested the favour of his Grace's Warrant for our granting and assigning such Armorial Ensigns for Hyett as may be proper to be borne by her said Son William-Henry Hyett according to the Tenor of the said Royal Warrant and the Laws of Arms: And forasmuch as the said Earl Marshall did by Warrant under his Hand and Seal bearing date the eighteenth day of June last authorize and direct Us to grant and exemplify such Armorial Ensigns accordingly Know Ye therefore that We the said Garter and Clarenceux in obedience to the Royal Command, in pursuance of his Grace's Warrant and by virtue of the Letters Patent of our several Offices to each of Us respectively granted do by these Presents grant and exemplify the Arms following for Hyett that is to say Argent a Lion rampant Azure: on a chief indented Sable two Roses of the Field barbed and seeded proper And for Crest on a Wreath of the Colours A Castle proper, charged with four Pellets in Cross, issuant therefrom a Lion's Head in the Mouth a Rose Gules slipped also proper as the same are in the Margin hereof more plainly depicted to be borne and used for ever hereafter by him the said William-Henry Adams now William-Henry Hyett and his descendants according to the Tenor of the said Royal Warrant and the Laws of Arms In Witness whereof We the said Garter and Clarenceux Kings of Arms have to these Presents subscribed our Names and affixed the Seals of our several Offices the fifth day of August in the Fifty-third year of the Reign of our Sovereign Lord George the Third by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland King Defender of the Faith &c. and in the Year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirteen.

He was baptized at Corston 1673, and after his marriage went to reside at Knighton Sutton, his wife's father's home. For the Lydes are an old family of Somerset, having considerable property at Chelwood, Stanton Wick, and Sutton in the parish of Chew Magna about this date (1693). A direct descendant of William Lyde of Sutton (who was born 1576, and died 1620), viz. Lionel Lyde, was created Baronet Oct. 13th, 1772, but died s.p. 2nd July, 1791. John, died vitâ patris, and is buried at Kelston. (M.I. has been given before). After his marriage with Miss Bailey, Benjamin purchased Corston Manor of his father, and residing there, transferred the eldest male line to Corston, whilst the eldest son of the father's fourth marriage, and his heirs, succeeded to the original family seat at Kelston. This is curious, and worthy of note in the history of the family.

The old manor house, the residence of the Haringtons at Corston, is now used as a farmhouse. It has a spacious entrance hall, with garden court in front. In the rear is an old gateway leading to the church, and it is reported traditionally that on a stone removed from that gateway was once the date 1627. The house is in substantial repair, but denuded of any Harington traces, such as arms or stained glass, or ornamental work of any sort. The rooms are large, have stone floors down stairs, and are half wainscoted. It is said (I know not with what truth) that a sketch of this manor house was given in the 'Illustrated London News' some years ago. It seems to be later than the time of Elizabeth ; is, perhaps, of the time of Charles I. It was used as a boarding school at the close of the last century, to which the Poet Southey was sent at the age of six years ; and he alludes to it at some length in his 'Recollections.' Of the features impressed on his memory a few still remain ; for instance, the balls on the pillars of the entrance gates, and some of the trees of the avenue. It was purchased from the Haringtons by Joseph Langton, Esq., of Newton Park, whose daughter and sole heir (Bridget) married Colonel William Gore, of Barron Gurney, who subsequently took the additional name of Langton, and in his representatives it still remains.

PARKINSON, R.N.—William Hammond, of St. Alban's Court, co. Kent, married 1692, Elizabeth, daughter of John Kingsford, of Oxney, co. Kent. His sister Anne Hammond married Dr. Wotton, whose daughter Anne married William Clarke, of Haghmon Abbey, co. Salop, Chancellor of Chichester Cathedral, 1770: their son, Edward Clarke, afterwards Rector of Buxted, married 1763, Anne Grenfield, of Guildford, co. Surrey, by whom he had four children,—J. S. Clarke, D.D., Chaplain to King William y<sup>e</sup> 4<sup>th</sup>; E. D. Clarke, the traveller, afterwards Rector of Yeldham, co. Essex, died 1822; George Clarke, Capt. R.N., drowned in the Thames in 1805; and one daughter, Anne, who married Captain Parkinson, R.N., one of Admiral Lord Nelson's officers. Can any of your readers inform me to what family this Captain Parkinson belonged?

We believe this Benjamin Harington was a younger son of *Francis* Harington (son of John Harington, Esq., of Stepney and Kelston), and was therefore a nephew of Sir John Harington, Knt., and not a direct descendant, although the arms, as described by Collinson, have no mark of difference for a second son. Sir John had no son named Benjamin, and any lower descendant from his line would be out of date with the M.I.

Elizabeth Morwent daughter of Joseph Morwent of Tetbury was borne at Tetbury the — of Aprill, 1653, being Good Friday. She dyed Nov<sup>r</sup> 21, 1708.

Benjamin Hyett and Elizabeth Morwent were married at Oldbury super Montem the 10<sup>th</sup> day of August, 1674.

Charles son of Benjamin & Elizabeth Hyett was borne in the parishe of S<sup>t</sup> Trinity in the City of Glocester the 10<sup>th</sup> of Aprill A<sup>o</sup> D<sup>m</sup> 1676.

John Hyett their second Son was borne in the parishe of S<sup>t</sup> Mary de Grace September 14<sup>th</sup> 1677 ; he dyed May 1<sup>st</sup> 1682.

W<sup>m</sup> Hyett their 3<sup>rd</sup> Son was borne the 11<sup>th</sup> of Aprill, 1680 ; he dyed 29<sup>th</sup> Sep<sup>r</sup> 1705.

Elizabeth their daughter was borne the 12<sup>th</sup> April, 1681 ; she dyed July 19<sup>th</sup> 1683.

Mary their second Daughter was borne the 13<sup>th</sup> of April, 1682, shee dyed May the 3<sup>rd</sup> 1682, and was buried with her brother John in one coffin.

Robert their fourth Son was borne in the parishe of S<sup>t</sup> Michael the 8<sup>th</sup> day June 1683, and dyed 25<sup>th</sup> July, 1683.

Joseph their fifth Son was borne there July 18<sup>th</sup> 1684 ; he died April 5<sup>th</sup> 1686.

Sarah their third daughter was borne there Sep<sup>tr</sup> 16, 1685 ; she dyed Jan<sup>ry</sup> 16, 1692 aged 7 y<sup>rs</sup> 4 months.

Benjamin their sixth son was borne in the parishe of S<sup>t</sup> Nicholas 21<sup>st</sup> day of Nov<sup>r</sup> 1686 ; he married Jane Nedham of Gadsby, Lincolnshire ; dyed in London 1725, left one son who dyed about 1760.

Elizabeth their fourth daughter was borne Dec. 21, 1687 ; marryed Edward James of Gloster ; dyed April, 1739, and is buryed in the family vault ; had one son who dyed before her.

Mary their fifth daughter was borne there April 23, 1689 ; she dyed Fe<sup>b</sup> 14, 1712.

W<sup>m</sup> the above mentioned third Son Marryed with Elizabeth Oldisworth of Hackney near London, the 1<sup>st</sup> Jan<sup>y</sup>, 1705, And dyed without Issue the 29<sup>th</sup> Sep<sup>t</sup> following, and was brought from Hackney & buryed in the Cathedrall of Gloster with the rest of his brothers and sisters.

Charles the eldest son of Benjamin & Elizabeth was marryed to Anna Webb of Glocester at the Cath<sup>l</sup> of Gloster March 11<sup>th</sup> 1707.

Elizabeth the wife of the said Benjamin the father, dyed Nov<sup>r</sup> 21<sup>st</sup> 1708, and was buryed the 24<sup>th</sup> November, 1708.

Benjamin the first son of Charles & Anna was Born in the Parish of S<sup>t</sup> Nicholas Dec<sup>r</sup> 17<sup>th</sup> 1708, and christened at Church, S<sup>t</sup> John's day after, and dyed Dec. 15, 1762, and was buryed in the family vault.

Nicholas their second son was Born there Dec<sup>r</sup> 6, 1709, and christened at home on the morrow.

Benjamin Hyett the father dyed March 12, 1711, and was buryed March 21, 1711, in a vault then made for the family in the Cathedrall of Glo'ster.

Charles the 3<sup>rd</sup> Son of Charles & Anna was Born Saturday, 28<sup>th</sup> Nov<sup>r</sup> 1713, and dyed Aug<sup>st</sup> 20 following.

William Henry Hyett of Painswick House, Stroud, co. Gloucester, formerly M.P. for Stroud. Born 2 September, 1795. He married 25 October, 1821, Anne Jane, daughter of Joseph Seymour Biscoe, Esq.

Mr. Hyett, on succeeding to the estates of Benjamin Hyett of Painswick, assumed in 1813 the surname of Hyett, in lieu of that of Adams. He died 10 March, 1877, and was buried at Painswick.

He was succeeded by his only surviving son, Francis Adams Hyett, born 18 November, 1844, who married 12 July, 1870, Ellen Maria, daughter of Charles Carpenter, Esq. of Brighton, and has issue three daughters.

COLLIER FAMILY (Vol. II., p. 187).—I am endeavouring to work up a pedigree of Sir George Collier, Knight, born 11 May, 1732 (? 1730), Knighted 27 January, 1775, and was then described as of Froyle, co. Hants.; Vice-Admiral of the Blue; M.P. for Honiton, 1784. Sir George Collier married, and had issue. He died 6 April, 1795, and was buried at St. Marylebone Parish Church 16 April, 1795. Lysons speaks of the tablet to his memory in St. Marylebone Church, from which it appears he was aged 65. He had a brother, Theodosius Benjamin Collier, who married, and died 1803 at Bath, leaving issue. Sir George Collier had an uncle, Benjamin Collier, of Red Lion Square, London, who married Lætitia, youngest daughter of Mark Weyland. Benjamin Collier had property in Suffolk, which he left to his great nephew, George Collier, son of Sir George Collier. Benjamin Collier died 12 March, 1791, and was buried 21 March, 1791, at Groton, Suffolk. I cannot discover the names of the brothers and sisters of Benjamin Collier, or the names of his parents, neither do I know which of Benjamin Collier's brothers was Sir George Collier's father.

## GRANT OF CREST AND CONFIRMATION OF ARMS TO NICHOLAS MOSLEY, ALDERMAN OF LONDON, 1592.\*

To all and singler as well Nobles, as others, to whome these Presents shall come, Robert Cooke Esquire, alias Clarencieux Principal Herald and King of Armes of the South, East, and West Partes of this Realme of England from the Ryver of Trent Southwardes sendeth Greetinge in our Lord God everlasting. Whereas aunciently from the begininge the valiant and vertuous Actes of excellent Persons have been commended to the World with sundry Monumentes and remembrances of their good desertes, emongest the which the cheyest and most usuall hath been the bearinge of Signes in Shildes called Armes, which are evident demonstracions of prowes and valour diversly distributed according to the quallities and deseartes of the persons meritinge y<sup>e</sup> same; which order as it was prudently devised in the begininge to stirre and kindell the heartes of men to the imytacion of vertue and nobleness, even so hath the same bene and yett is continually observed, to the Intent that such as have done commendable Service to their Prince or Country in Warre or Peace might thereby receive due honor in their lyves, and also leave the same in Succession to their Posteritie for ever. And being required by Nicholas Mosley of the City of London Esquire and Alderman of the same, the Sonne of Edward Mosley of Hough'send in ye county of Lancaster Gentillman, which Edward was son of James Mosley gentilman, which James was sonne of Jenkyn Mosley of the same place and County gentilman, to make Searche in the Registers and Recordes of myne Office for the auncient Armes of that name and Family whereof he is descended, Whereupon I have made Search accordingly, and doe find that he may lawfully bear, as his Ancestors heretofore have borne, these Armes hereafter followinge, that is to saye, the first for Mosley, Sables, a Cheveron between three Battle axes silver, the Second for . . . . ., Gold, a Fess between three Egllets displayed Sables, and so quarterley. And for that I find no Creast or Cognoyance to the same Armes belonginge, as to many auncient Armes there is none, therefore, at the Request of y<sup>e</sup> said Nicholas Mosley, I y<sup>e</sup> said Clarencieux Kinge of Armes have added and assigned unto his auncient Armes this Creast or Cognoyance hereafter specified, that is to saye, Upon the Healme, on a Wreathe Silver and Sables, an Eagle display'd Ermynes, Mantiled Gules, doubled Silver, as more plainly appeareth depicted in the Margent hereof; which Creast or Cognoyance I the said Clarencieux King of Armes, by virtue of myne Office, and by power and auctoritie to me commytted by Letters Patentes under the Great Seale of England, doe give, graunte, ratyfie, and conferme unto the said Nicholas Mosley Esquire, and to his posteritie for ever, so that he and they the same with all Furnitures and Ornaments thereunto belonginge shall and may use, beare and shewforthe in all places and at all times hereafter, according to the auncient Lawes of Armes, without lett, impediment, or interruption of any person or persons whatsoever. In Witnesse whereof I the said Clarencieux King of Armes have hereunto subscribed my name, and likewise putt the Seale of myne Office, the xvij<sup>th</sup> daye of Februarye, in the yere of our Lord God 1592, and in the xxx<sup>th</sup> yere of the Reigne of our most gracious Soueraigne Lady Queene Elizabeth.

‡ He was the fourth son, and Robert the third son, of Henry Long of Whaddon; both of them being brothers of Sir Walter Long of Whaddon, Bart.

As to the age and state of the Register, it goes back to 1572 with the entries of Baptisms, Marriages, and Burials entered in different parts. There are no Weddings entered between 1642 and 1653, nor between 1656 and 1662. Under the Weddings 1653, is the following appointment of John Long to be Marriage Registrar.

“I doe approve of John Long for Register of the Parish of Stanton Prior, chosen by the Inhabitants thereof for this Parish, and he was accordingly sworn the 10<sup>th</sup> day of Jan : 1653 by me

In 1670 there is entry of a “Briefe for captived seamen by the Turks.” Coll. Thomas Long gave 5<sup>s</sup>, and Long Esq. 1<sup>s</sup>, and Matthew Long 3<sup>d</sup>.

In 1672, 1673, 1680, Matthew Long was Churchwarden.

In 1680, to a Collection made “for the redemption of Captives out of Turkey,” Thomas Long Esq. gave £1, Robert Long Esq. 5<sup>s</sup>, Matthew Long 6<sup>d</sup>, and John Long 2<sup>d</sup>.

In 1689, “A Brief was got at for the Swiss Protestants,” to which Robert Long gave £4 and Matthew Long 1<sup>s</sup>.

(The whole Parochial Collection was £5 12<sup>s</sup> 10<sup>d</sup>.)

In 1695, Robert Long Esq. gave “y<sup>e</sup> sum of four pounds towards y<sup>e</sup> Briefe for y<sup>e</sup> fire of Warwick.”

I Robert Long\* of Staunton Prior in the County of Somerset Esquire being of a sound and good memory for which I render to Almighty God the praise and honour yett minding my age and mortality doe this eight and twentyeth day of January in the yeare of our Lord God one thousand six hundred ninety and six make and declare this my last Will and Testament in manner following hereby revokeing all former Wills by me made ffirst and principally I bequeath my soule to God my Creator with hopes of eternal life by his infinite free grace and mercy thro the meritts and mediation of my alsufficient and alone Saviour Jesus Christ And my body I comitt to the earth to be buryed in such manner and place as my Executrix herein after named shall thinke fitt Alsoe I give unto the Poore of Staunton aforesaid Ten pounds And Ten pounds to the poore of Priston to be disposed of at the discretion of my executrix And whereas I have by deed dated the eleaventh day of November last past granted and assigned unto my son in law Thomas Bere† of Huntsham in the County of Devon, Joseph Langton‡ of Newton Park in the said County of Somerset and Colthrop Parker§ of London Esq<sup>s</sup> and to William Webb of the City of Bath Gentleman All that my yearly rent or sum of ffoure score pounds granted by Sr Robert Vyner|| Baronett unto my brother Thomas Long¶ Esq<sup>t</sup> since deceased and to his Heires and Assignes for ever and issueing and payable out of the hereditary Revenues of Excise to and for the severall uses in the said Deed menc'oned and expressed I doe hereby confirme the

Robert's wife is set down in Burke and other printed works as Alice Coward, daughter of Thomas Coward of Wilton. (?) Any information upon this family of Coward, if published in 'Miscellanea Genealogica et Heraldica,' would oblige and interest several of its supporters, as also would an answer to the question, if this Robert Long be not the same with the M.P. for Somerset, 1654, 1656?

† Thomas Bere, the second husband of Mary, Robert's daughter; she married firstly Geo. Stedman of Midsummer Norton, Esq., co. Somerset.

‡ The line of this Joseph Langton ran out in daughters and coheirs; we believe they were two only surviving at the time of his death, March 17th, 1719. He was then in the 82nd year of his age, and was buried at Newton St. Lo in the Church. His sons (of whom Henry is mentioned further on in this Will), and all his daughters, except Ann, and (perhaps) one other, died in the lifetime of their father. Ann married, *firstly*, Sir Geo. Cobb of Adderbury, Oxon; *secondly*, her cousin, Joseph Langton, Esq., of Brislington, son of Sir Thomas Langton, Knight. From this marriage came Joseph Langton of Brislington and Newton St. Lo, who dying 10th February, 1779, ætat. 72, left a daughter and sole heir, Bridget, by his second wife. Bridget married Col. 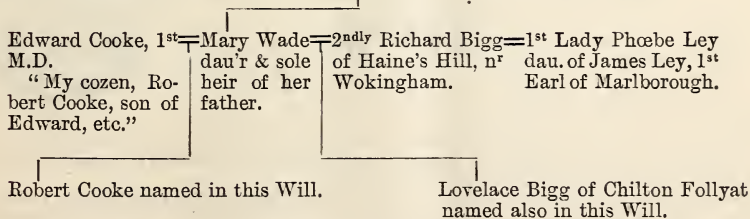

To my daughter in law M<sup>rs</sup> Dyonesse Parker wife of my said cozen Colthrop Parker for the great respect love and kindness she hath alwayes shewne me for which I leave her my thanks and I give her twenty guineas which I desire her to accept as a token of my love and respect to her to buy a ring to weare in remembrance of me. To my cozen ffrances Richmond Widow I give five pounds. To my Godson M<sup>r</sup> Henry Langton\* I give Ten guineas to buy him a ring. And to my Godsons Robert Harrington† and Henry Long Gibbs‡ I give Ten pounds apeece or to each of them a peice of plate of Ten pounds value. To my servant Tobit Reed I give all my wearing apparell both Lynnen and Woollen And one Hundred and Twenty pounds of Lawfull money of England And to whatever other servants I may have at my death that have lived with me twelve moneths or upwards before either Men or Maides I give to each of them twenty shillings But if any or either of them shall have lived with me for the space of two yeares or more next before my death Then to each such servant I give twenty shillings over and above for each yeare he she or they hath or have soe lived in my service next before my death (except Mary Charles to whom I give ffive pounds only) To the said William Webb of Bath I give Ten pounds And I desire that he'el assist my Executrix in getting in the debts oweing me for which I leave her to reward him. Alsoe I give to my saide deare Daughter Bere as a particuler token of my love that little old gold I shall leave behind me at my deacease To whom alsoe I give the rest residue and remainder of my estate reall and personall not herein before otherwise disposed of But I desire that notwithstanding her coverture that she may be at liberty at any time during her life or by her last Will and Testam<sup>t</sup> to dispose of one thousand pounds of my estate to such uses as she shall thinke fitt And I desire my son in law the said M<sup>r</sup> Thomas Bere to consent thereto and not to obstruct the true meaning of this Will And I doe hereby make and constitute my said Daughter Bere sole Executrix of this my last Will and Testament In witness whereof I have to this my last Will and Testament written in one whole sheet of paper to which I have put my name and parte of this to which I have put my hand and seale dated the day and yeare first above written ROB. LONG.

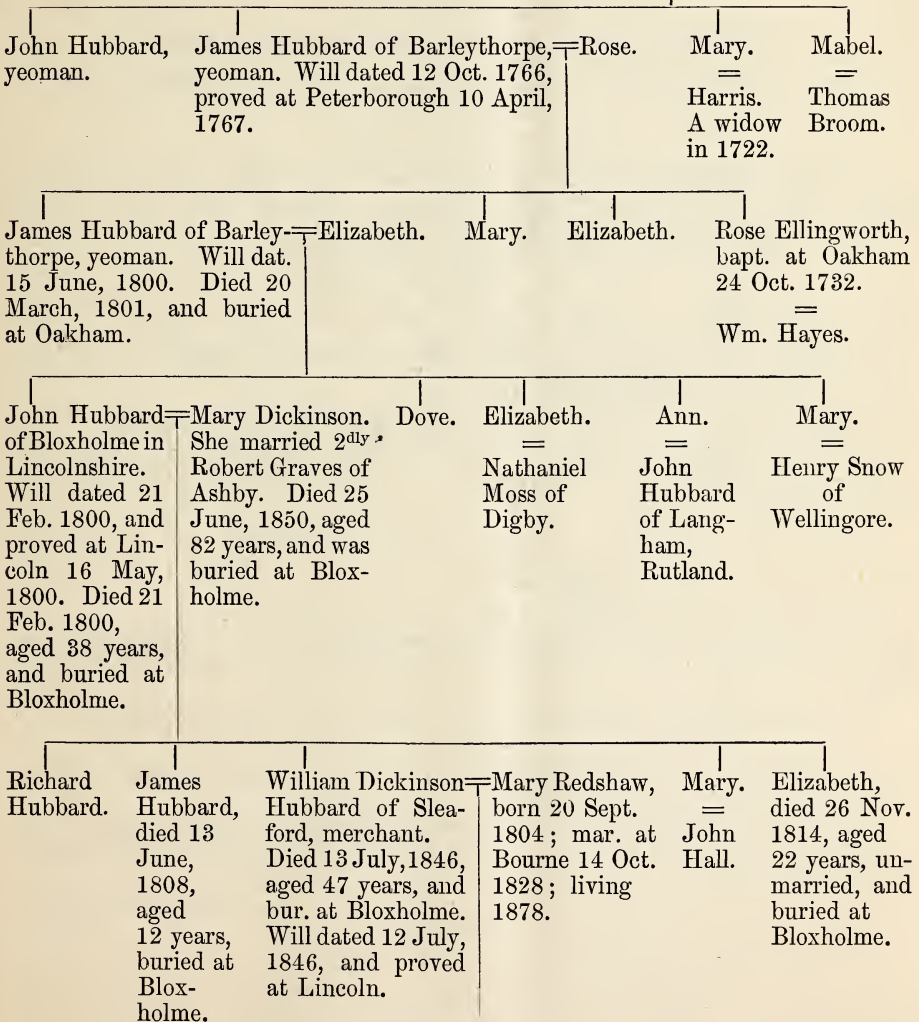

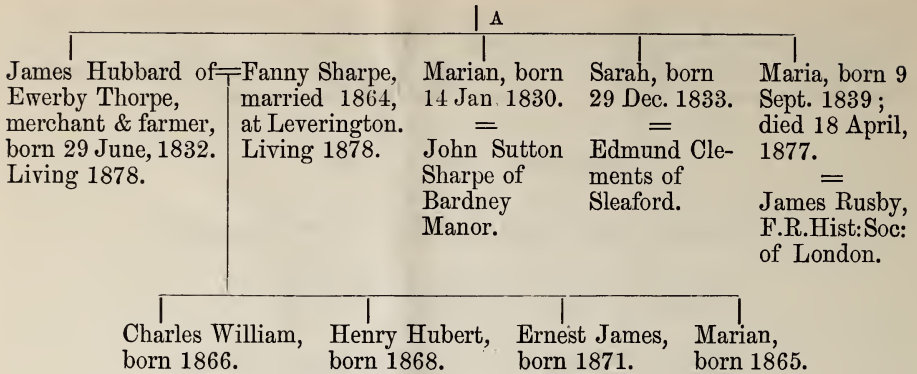

Inquisition taken at Norwich in 'Le Sherehowse' 7 June 29 Eliz. (1558) upon the death of Edmund Gresham late of Thorpmarket, co. Norf., Esq. deceased. The Jurors say that upon the day of his death he was seised in his demesne as of fee of the manors of Thorpmarket and Bruserds in Thorpe with the right of one fold course\* for 360 sheep on Oldfield Heath, co. Norf. And of divers other lands and tenements in Thorpemarket lately bought of Robert Cotrell, and of the fee farm of Coxford Priors in Thorp, and of 30 acres lately bought of Martin Burney Esq., of a tenement called Cottons and of a close called Parrowe Close in Hunworth and Thorp lately bought of Edmund Windham Gent., and of the Manor of Kidlams and divers lands and tenements in Roughton, Hunworthe, Felbrigg, Systronde, Cromer, Antingham, and Bradfield co. Norf. and of a tenement with divers lands in Holt; of the Manor and Rectory of Warlingham and divers lands there, of the Manor of Sanderstead and of the Advowson of the Church, and of the Boro' of Langhurst co. Surrey, and of a messuage in Milk Street in the City of London. (Here the will is set out). The Manor of Coxford was held in fee farm by rent of 40 shillings. The tenements called Cottons and Parrow Close were held of the Queen in chief by the service of the hundreth part of a Knight's fee and were worth 10s. Kydlams and the other lands were late held of the Duke of Norfolk now of the Earl of Arundel by the service of one Knight's fee, and were worth 13s. 4d. The lands in Holt were held of Sir William Heydon Knt. as of his Manor of Holt, in socage, and were worth five marks. The Manor and Rectory of Warlingham were held of the Queen in chief by the service of the twentieth part of a Knight's fee and were worth £10. The Manor of Sanderstead with the Advowson, and the Boro' of Langhurst were held of the Queen by the service of one Knight's fee and were worth £10. The Messuage in Milk Street was held of the Lord Mayor in free burgage and was worth five marks. That the said Edmund Gresham died on the last day of August last past and that Richard Gresham was his son and heir and of the age of twenty-one years and one month.

Inquisition taken at Folkingham, co. Lincoln, 9 Jan., 18 Jac. I., upon the death of Thomas Gresham, Esq. The Jurors say that he was seised in his demesne as of fee in two parts of 2 messuages, 1 toft, 1 dovehouse, 4 gardens, 40 acres of land, 200 of meadow, 100 of pasture, 10 of wood, 200 of furze and heath, and 30 of salt marsh, and of common of pasture for all beasts in Tetney and Tetney Grange, co. Lincoln, and of the tithes of corn and hay in Tetney and of a close there called Holme alias Skerneholme. (Here part of his will is set out).† That said Thomas Gresham died on 6 July last—that the 2 parts of the said lands were held of the King in chief by Knight's service and were worth £6. That the tithes were held of the King as of his Manor of East Greenwich, co. Kent, in free socage by fealty only and were worth 20 shillings, that the close called Skerneholme was worth 20 shillings. That Judith his wife survived him and was then living, and that John Gresham was his son and heir and was of the age of nine years and nine months at the time of his father's death.

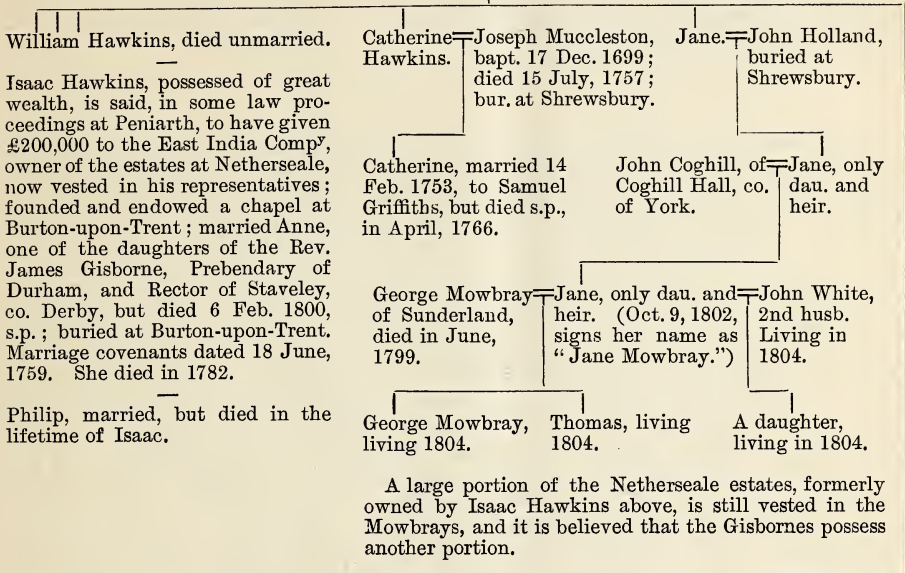

## THE DENNYs,

EARLS OF NORWICH, BARONS DENNY OF WALTHAM, AND  
BARONETS OF IRELAND.

(Continued from p. 76.)

DONOGH O'BRIAN, the godfather of Arthur Denny born in Tralee Castle 21st of September, 1629, was grandson of the first Earl of Thonond. He married Honora, daughter of Richard Wingfield, ancestor of Lord Powerscourt, and from this marriage descends the present Lord Inchiquin. The Wingfields of Kimbolton, as we have seen, were nearly related to the Denny's. Donogh O'Brian and Sir Valentine Browne (who was sponsor to Margaret Denny, born in 1627) were both Roman Catholics. Their intimacy and connection with the Wingfields and Denny's are a few out of many proofs to be found in the bye-ways of history, family records, and genealogies, which "distinguished" writers over-mindful sometimes of the "dignity of history," as the phrase goes, are too apt to ignore, shewing that the Irish and Anglo-Irish of different creeds lived on excellent terms with one another in the early part of the seventeenth century, before the "thorough" policy of Strafford and continental influences revived racial and religious strifes. The next entries in the old diary or register kept by Sir Edward Denny are as follows:—

"Y<sup>e</sup> 25<sup>th</sup> March, 1630, I began chapters\* after dinner and suppers.

"Monday, y<sup>e</sup> 15<sup>th</sup> of November, 1630, Edward(*a*) Denny was borne between six and seven at night; his godfathers were William Steere, Lorde Bishop of Kerrye, and Sir Charles Harrys, Knt., his godmother M<sup>rs</sup> Joane Crosbye.

"Y<sup>e</sup> 20<sup>th</sup> of April, 1632, being fryday betweene six and seven of the clock in the morning, Anthony Denny(*b*) was borne, his godfathers were M<sup>r</sup> Robert Blennerhassett and Ensign John Wyse, his godmother M<sup>rs</sup> Anne Baden.

"Anne Denny(*c*) was borne uppon Sunday night att one of y<sup>e</sup> clocke y<sup>e</sup> 28<sup>th</sup> of April, 1633, her godmother M<sup>rs</sup> 'Hassett for the Lady Baltinglas, and M<sup>rs</sup> Steere y<sup>e</sup> Bishop of Kerry's wife, her godfather S<sup>r</sup> Walter Crosbie.

"Thomas Denny(*d*) my sonne was borne upon Wensday morning, betweene nine and tenn o'clock, y<sup>e</sup> 16<sup>th</sup> of July, 1634, att Roper's Rest House neare Dublin, his godfathers the Lord Viscount Baltinglas and Sir Charles Coote, y<sup>e</sup> Ladye tresham his godmother.

"Y<sup>e</sup> 23<sup>d</sup> of July, 1633, y<sup>e</sup> Lord Viscount Wentworth came to Ireland to governe y<sup>e</sup> Kingdom as Deputie. Many men feare.

"Elizabeth Denny(*e*) was borne uppon thursday early in the morning, about six o'clock, y<sup>e</sup> 25<sup>th</sup> of Februarie 1635, her godmother my mother and my cosen Martha 'Hassett, her godfather M<sup>r</sup> Edmond Harrys.

"Lucius Denny(*f*) was born uppon Wensday at break of day being y<sup>e</sup> 21<sup>st</sup> of June 1637, his godfathers were y<sup>e</sup> Deane Gray and M<sup>r</sup> Thomas Denny his godmother M<sup>rs</sup> Vauclier.

"William Denny(*g*) was borne on teusday morning y<sup>e</sup> 11<sup>th</sup> of September 1638 his godfathers William S<sup>t</sup> Leger and Anthony Stoughton Esquires; the Deane's wyfe M<sup>rs</sup> Gray his godmother.

"Ruth Denny(*h*) was borne on Monday ye 13<sup>th</sup> of September (between six and seven o'clock in the morning) 1641 her godmother my sister in law Mary Roper and M<sup>rs</sup> Barbara (illegible) and Philip Percivall."

This record of his youngest child's birth in September, 1641, was the last entry made in the old MS. volume by Sir Edward Denny, the great-grandson of Sir Anthony. The three words "many men feare," following the note of Wentworth's arrival, have a sad significance read by the light of subsequent events in this, as in many another family history. In 1634 Sir Edward Denny was High Sheriff of Kerry, and from that year until 1641 he and Sir Valentine Browne, before men-

tioned, represented the county in parliament. In 1639 Wentworth, in order to raise money for the King, compelled Sir Edward, and several other Kerry land-owners, to take out new letters patent, confirming them in the possession of their estates, and to pay heavy fines. A clause in Denny's letters (and a similar one, I believe, appears in the rest) bound him to bring in on his estate within a twelve month, under pain of forfeiture, eight free tenants of the "British race and blood," in addition to those already planted there. The carrying out of this clause would, of course, involve the eviction of great numbers of the Irish of the native blood, who had been for several years living peacefully as tenants on the estate. It revived, in fact, the old odious distinctions (which were gradually dying out, and which a statute of James the First had ostensibly abolished) between the Anglo-Irish, that is, the Irish descended from English colonists of Ireland, and the Irish descended from the Celtic inhabitants before 1172, or the "mere Irish," as they were contemptuously styled in legal and common parlance, until the beginning of the seventeenth century. Sir Edward paid the fine for his new letters patent, but it is very doubtful that he ever carried out the clause respecting the new tenants. The twelve months allotted to him in which to do so were hardly over before the island was filled with rumours of coming trouble, and in six weeks after he had made the above entry of his daughter's birth it was once more in open rebellion.

Sir Edward Denny and Sir Valentine Browne, the Protestant and the Catholic members for the county of Kerry, were both of the King's party in Ireland, but that party was divided against itself. Sir Valentine was a loyal Catholic, while Sir Edward Denny belonged to that section of the Cavaliers who are described by Macaulay as fighting "not for an intolerant Church and a tyrannical King, but for the old English banner which waved over their ranks, and for the altars at which they had received the hands of their brides." He sent his wife and young children to England, and leaving his Castle of Tralee to be defended by his stepfather, Sir Thomas Harris, and a chosen band of two hundred Irish and English tenants, he joined Sir William St. Leger, Lord President of Munster, who was maintaining the royal cause in Waterford county. A letter in one of the pamphlets of the year 1642 in the King's Library, British Museum, mentions Sir Edward Denny as a Captain commanding four hundred soldiers in a skirmish near Dublin. The letter is said to have been written by the Earl of Antrim to his connexion the Earl of Rutland. We have no further account of Sir Edward Denny's movements, nor any record of the time of his death. Meantime his Castle of Tralee was closely besieged by the Irish Catholic forces. A number of Protestants from the town of Tralee and the country around it, amongst them two clergymen of the Reformed Church, the Reverend Nathaniel Harrison and the Reverend William Fell, and a surgeon named Elkanah Knight, crowded for shelter into the old fortress, which was badly provisioned. The food and water ran short, while the besiegers received fresh reinforcements, and laid the country under contribution. Dr. Elkanah Knight, with his hands full, assisting in the defence and attending the daily increasing number of sick, found time to keep a journal of events within and outside the walls of the castle from day to day; and this very curious and interesting record, which threw much light on one or two points in the history of the rebellion of 1641, about which there has been much disputing, was amongst the Denny family papers until the last dozen years, when it appears to have been borrowed by some one who "*forgot*" to return it. If recovered, it would be well worth the attention of the Historical Manuscript Commission, but I fear the chances are small of its being returned to its lawful owner. The siege lasted nearly two years, and might have lasted longer, but that the brave commander of the little garrison, Sir Thomas Harris, died, worn out with fatigue and ceaseless anxiety, and poisoned by the corrupt water. When the besieged found themselves quite destitute of ammunition and food, they surrendered upon quarter, and on delivering up their arms were allowed to pass to the north side of the county, where they were protected, for a time at least, by Colonel David Crosbie in a little island fortress near the mouth of the Shannon. The Castle of Tralee was partly destroyed, and the church and

town ruined and plundered. Two memorials of the church, however, were spared by the insurgents, the old grey marble font, presented to it in 1623 by the Provost of Tralee, John Curlestone, which remains to this day as perfect as when it was first placed within the sacred building, and the old black-letter Bible already alluded to (*v. ante*, p. 76). The steel plaques remain with holes pierced in them, through which a chain was passed to fasten the volume to the reading desk in the aisle. It is probable that this is the only one of the English Bibles printed before 1641, and used in the country churches of Munster, which escaped destruction in that calamitous year. Both font and Bible were destined, however, to pass unscathed through another great civil war, as we shall hereafter see.

Barry Denny, eldest son, M.P. for Tralee in 1697, married Catherine, dau. of Sir Boyle Maynard, Knt., of Curryglass county Cork, and had issue Edward, M.P. for Doneraile in 1695, died s. p., and Anne, married the Rev. Maurice O'Connor, and had issue Barry, Catherine, and Jane, who married, as we shall hereafter see, her cousin, the Reverend Barry Denny. William Steere, the godfather of Edward Denny, was Bishop of Kerry, or rather of Ardfert and Aghadoc, from 1628 to 1637. The following is from the Book of Funeral Entries in the Record Tower of Dublin Castle:—"The Right Reverend Father in God William Steere, late Lord Bishop of Ardfert and Aghadoc in y<sup>e</sup> County Kerrye, was second sonne of William Steere, Parson of Barmesby (*sic*) by London in Kent, in y<sup>e</sup> Kingdom of Englande. He tooke to wyfe Elinor, daughter of Randall Maynwaring, second sonne of Sir Randall Maynwaring of Peever in Cheshire, in y<sup>e</sup> said Kingdom of England, Knt., and relict of William Gunn of Lymerrick, parson, by whom the said Lorde Bishop had no issue. The s<sup>d</sup> Lorde Bishop departed this mortall lyfe at Ardfert, y<sup>e</sup> 21st of January, 1637, and was interred in y<sup>e</sup> Cathedrall Church of Ardfert aforesaid. The truth of these premises is testified by the subscription of the said Ellinor, relict and executrix of y<sup>e</sup> said Bishop, who hath returned this Certificate into my office to be there recorded. Thomas Preston, Ulcester King of Arms, 23<sup>d</sup> May 1638." Sir Charles Harris, the second sponsor of Edward Denny, was the grandson of Sir Thomas Harris of Corworthen, Devon, who had married Elizabeth, widow of Arthur Denny and daughter of Miles Forest, Esq. (*v. ante*, p. 76). Joan Crosbie, the child's godmother, was the younger daughter of Colonel David Crosbie of Ardfert, second son of John Crosbie, Bishop of Ardfert from 1600 to 1621, ancestor of the Earls of Glandore (extinct), of Sir John Crosbie, Bart., of William Talbot Crosbie, D.L. of Ardfert Abbey, and in the female line of Lord Dacre. Joan Crosbie married Gerard Ryeves, son of James Ryeves by Alice daughter of Captain Thomas Spring (ancestor of Lord Montague), and had a son Thomas Ryeves (who went to France with the Irish regiments after the surrender of Limerick in 1691, and died in exile), and three daughters. Alice married William Carrig of Coolmines in Clare, and had a son, whose daughter married . . . Finucane of Ailrue in Clare; Catherine married Francis Brudenell of Limerick, and died without issue; and Elizabeth married Walter Langdon, son of Walter Langdon by Catherine Hickson. This last mentioned Walter was son of Nathaniel Langdon, Dean of Ardfert before 1641." (*MS. Genealogies by Captain John Blennerhassett, written between 1688 and 1736.*)

(b) Anthony Denny died unmarried. His godfather, Robert Blennerhassett, was the first settler of his name at Ballyseedy in Kerry, and the ancestor of Arthur Blennerhassett, now of Ballyseedy, High Sheriff of that county; of Rowland Ponsonby Blennerhassett, at present M.P. for the same; and of the Blennerhassetts of Riddelstown in Limerick county. Robert Blennerhassett was M.P. for the then newly-created borough of Tralee in 1613. Mrs. Anne Baden, the godmother of Anthony Denny, was the wife of the Dean of Ardfert. (*MS. 1688, Diocesan Records, 1633. State Papers.*)

(c) Anne Denny died unmarried. Her godmother, Mrs. Hassett, was the wife of Robert the Blennerhassett mentioned in the preceding note, and the daughter of Jenkin Conway, of Castle Conway, or Killorglin, County Kerry. Sir Walter Crosbie was the eldest son of Bishop Crosbie, and the ancestor of the Crosbie, Barts., of the Queen's County.

(d) Thomas Denny died unmarried. His godfather, Sir Charles Coote, was the first baronet of his name, ancestor of the Earls of Mountrath (extinct). Lady Tresham was, I believe, a niece or sister of the Lord Baltinglas.

(e) Elizabeth Denny married John Blennerhassett of Ballyseedy (marriage settlements dated 1654), grandson of Robert Blennerhassett, mentioned in note (b), and son of John Blennerhassett by Martha Lyn. John Blennerhassett left issue by his wife, Elizabeth Denny, two sons and a daughter, viz. :—

1. Arthur, married Anne, daughter of Sir Boyle Maynard, and died s. p.
2. John, married Margaret Crosbie, and was by her ancestor of Arthur Blennerhassett, Esq., present owner of Ballyseedy and High Sheriff of Kerry (son of Charles Blennerhassett, Esq., by Mary Anne, daughter of John Hickson, Esq., D. L. of the Grove, county Kerry), of Lord Headley, and

of Jemmett Browne, Esq., of Riverston, county Cork, and Cornwall Gardens, London. This last-mentioned gentleman is the representative in the female line of the elder branch of the Blennerhassetts of Ballyseedy, descended from John Blennerhassett, eldest son of John by Margaret Crosbie above mentioned, who married his cousin, Jane Denny, as hereafter mentioned.

3. Ruth, only daughter of John Blennerhassett and Elizabeth Denny, married first (before 1677) Thomas Browne of Gurteendrohid, county Cork; and secondly, her cousin, Thomas Blennerhassett, son of Arthur Blennerhassett by Mary Fitzgerald of Ballynard, county Limerick, and had two daughters; Sarah, married Richard Hall, son of Rev. John Hall, Prebendary of St. Finbarr's, and Mary, married George Rowan, and had with other issue two sons, 1. John Rowan, married Sarah, daughter of James Leslie of Tarbert House, county Kerry, and sister of James Leslie, Bishop of Limerick and Ardfert from 1756 to 1770, and had a son George, married Jane Usher, of Mount Usher, county Wicklow (*v. Mrs. Delany's 'Letters and Memoirs'*), and a daughter Mary, married Rev. Edward Day, Rector of Tralee in 1758, and had a son, Rev. James Day, Rector of Tralee in 1809, and Vicar-General of Ardfert, who by Margaret, daughter of the MacGillcuddy of the Reeks, hath with other issue three sons, Reverend Edward Day, Rector of Kilgobbin, married and had a numerous issue: James Leslie Day, Major in the Bengal Army, died s. p.; John Sealy Day, Captain in the 87th Regt., served throughout the Peninsular and Burmese Wars, and died s. p.; and Sarah, married John James Hickson, and had surviving issue; James married his cousin, Deborah Godfrey Day, and had issue; John died unmarried; and Mary Agnes Hickson. 2. George Rowan, second son of George Rowan and Mary Blennerhassett before mentioned, married Margaret, daughter of Richard Chute of Chute Hall, and had with other issue a son George, who married . . . Gorham, and had with other issue a son William, who married his cousin Letitia, daughter of Sir Barry Denny, Bart., as hereafter mentioned, and had a son Rev. Arthur Blennerhassett Rowan, D.D., Archdeacon of Ardfert, who by his wife Alicia, daughter of Peter Thompson, Esq., had a son William, now of Belmont, county Kerry, married twice, and has issue, and two daughters, Anne and Ora. Martha Hassett, the godmother of Elizabeth Denny, was the wife of John Blennerhassett, eldest son of Robert, the first settler at Ballyseedy; Martha Hassett was the niece of the mother of Mary Forrest, the mother of Sir Edward Denny. (*MS. Pedigrees of the Seventeenth Century, Marriage Settlements, and Diocesan Records.*)

(f) Lucius Denny died unmarried. His godmother, Mrs. Vauclier, was the wife of a Captain Edward Vauclier, an officer of Huguenot descent, serving in the English army in Ireland, who had settled in Kerry. His deposition, detailing his sufferings and losses in 1641-2 at the hands of "Walter Hussey of Castle Gregory, O'Sullivan More of Dunkerron, Florence MacCarthy, Esquires, Daniel MacMoriarty, Garret Fitz James Gerald, Christopher Hickson of Knockglass, gentlemen," and other "Papists and rebels" (as he styles them), is in Trinity College Library, Dublin.

(g) William Denny. According to Archdall, in his revised edition of 'Lodge's Peerage,' vol. i., p. 300, *note*, William Denny married in 1664 Elizabeth, daughter of Richard Clarke, Esq., and died in 1665, and his widow remarried in 1671 the Rev. Richard Syngue of Cork. Sir William St. Leger, godfather of William Denny, was the son of Sir Warham St. Leger, the brother officer of Raleigh, Gilbert, and Sir Edward Denny (the elder) in the Elizabethan wars, and the grandfather of the first Viscount Doneraile. Anthony Stoughton was the ancestor of the family of his name, now of Owlpen, Gloucestershire, and Ballyhorgan, county Kerry.

(h) Ruth Denny died unmarried. Her godfather, Philip Percival, was the ancestor of the Earl of Egmont. (*v. Archdall's 'Lodge,' vol. ii., p. 238.*)

## EXTRACTS FROM THE PARISH REGISTER OF ILKLEY, IN THE COUNTY OF YORKSHIRE, AND DEANERY OF CRAVEN.\*

The register commences in 1597. The following extracts relate chiefly to the family of Langfellow, sometimes written Langfellely, and once or twice Longfellow, one of whom emigrated to America towards the close of the seventeenth century, and became the ancestor of the poet, Mr. Henry Wadsworth Longfellow.

The late Vicar of Ilkley, the Rev. John Snowdon, by whose permission I made these extracts, and my grateful sense of whose kindness I wish here to record, had in his possession a letter from Mr. Somerby, a friend of the poet, written in April, 1858.

I gather from it that William Longfellow, the American settler, emigrated to Newbury, Massachusetts; that he there married Anne Sewell, 10th of November, 1676; that he became an officer in the Essex regiment; and that he was drowned at Cape Breton in 1690, being upon an expedition against the French and Indians.

His children were William, Stephen, Anne, Elizabeth, and Matthew. I venture to hope that some American genealogist will send you the descent from them down to the present time.

I hoped that I had found the baptismal entry of the settler in William, son of Francis Longfellow, who was baptized the 10th of November, 1650; but on turning to the burials, I find William, son of Francis Longfellow, was buried the first of September, 1654. The register from 1650 to 1656 is miserably defective, and there is an absolute cessation of entries from 1656 to 1674.

I give also a few extracts relating to a branch of the Hebers of Marton, settled at Hollinghall in the parish of Ilkley—*vide* Whitaker's 'Craven,' p. 71. It will be seen from a glance at the pedigree that either the wife of Reginald Heber did not die in 1615, or that he married a second time subsequently to that date.

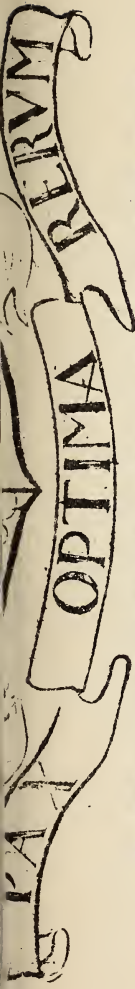

GEORGE AND ROGER HARRINGTON, ALDERMEN OF BRISTOL.  
WERE THEY MEMBERS OF THE KELSTON FAMILY ?

HAVING already given the monumental inscriptions of all undoubted Harringtons of Kelston which may be found in Bristol and the neighbourhood, it becomes necessary now to speak of a monument to Harrington extant in the city of Bristol which has not been included in the Kelston category, and to discuss the grounds on which it has been rejected from the good company of the others. The monument referred to is set up in St. Peter's Church, Bristol, at the east end of the north aisle, where the organ is now fitted in (1878). It is a mural one, of somewhat costly character, on which are represented an alderman and his lady, both kneeling at a desk in prayer beneath an arched canopy, with this inscription:—

“To the Memory of the Worshipfull Mr. George Harrington, Sometime Mayor and Alderman of this Citie, who departed this life the Second of Janvarie 1639.”

This gentleman was Mayor of Bristol in 1617; and it is recorded of him, during his mayoralty, that he went through the city trying the weights and measures, and removed all that were faulty. Moreover, he tried all the colliers' sacks, cutting to pieces those that did not hold their measure. Again, that when butter had been dear, he bought it out of the ships that were outward bound, and had it sold in the market at a reasonable price to the poor. We learn from his Will that his wife (the lady who kneels with him as above described), was named Thomazine, and was left his executrix; and from a legacy being left in it to his brother's children, and no mention made of any of his own children, we safely conclude he died without issue.

But to pass on to the *real* point under discussion. Was he a Harrington of Kelston by extraction or not? Has any wrong been done to his memory in rejecting him from being a member of that house; and that more especially when we may see from the notes of the family, collected by Dr. Henry Harrington of Bath some eighty years ago, that the Doctor was disposed to admit the Mayor to his family connection? We say, then, that George Harrington, Mayor of Bristol, was *not* a Harrington of Kelston. Firstly, because his monument is surmounted by arms, or something akin to arms, which are not the arms of Harrington of Kelston; indeed, they no nearer resemble them than a barrel is like a true-lover's knot; and few persons, I presume, would contend for the closeness of that resemblance. George Harrington was a wealthy brewer by trade (and so was his brother Roger Harrington, in the parish of Temple, Bristol). The Arms on his monument look like a chevron between three tuns. This is scarcely Harrington of Kelston, 1568!

Again, if a Harrington of Kelston, he must by his date (a mayor of Bristol in 1617) be descended from John of Stepney. And *à fortiori* his brother Roger, who died in 1600 (a married man), must have been, at latest, of the same generation as Sir John Harrington, Knt. (*i.e.*, the son of John of Stepney), who died in 1612. But who has ever heard of such brothers of Sir John Harrington as Roger and George? And what is more, this George Harrington leaves his “*brother John*” \* by his will (1638) £20, when Sir John of Kelston had long been dead. This altogether militates against his family connection with Sir John. But some may inquire, How did Dr. Henry Harrington treat the possibility of some family connection existing with him? Well! he supposed that *George* Harrington, the Mayor of Bristol, might have been the son of Francis Harrington, younger brother of Sir John. But the Doctor does not appear to have had any knowledge of the perplexing “*Roger*” of this case, the other brother, who, dying a married merchant in 1600, could never have been the son of Francis younger brother of Sir John, who died in 1612. Now that Roger and George *were* brothers is clear from their Baldwin relationship, † and other points disclosed in their wills. On *these* grounds then we have excluded the Bristol Harringtons from the Kelston stock, but shall heartily appreciate the gift of any new data on the point, whichever way it may lead. As a general confirmation of

our argument and case, the wills of Roger and George Harrington are subjoined in brief.

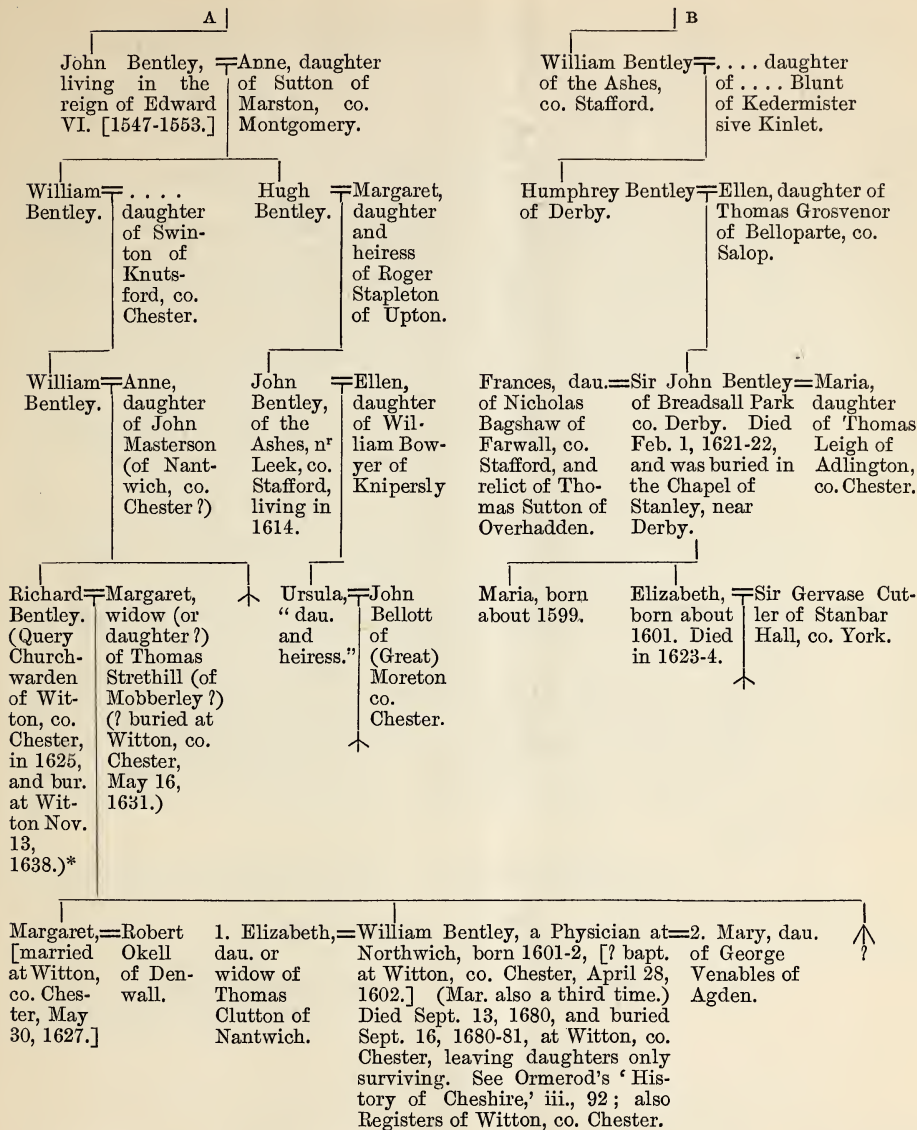

He died Aug. 14, 1778, aged 54. The shield of arms above the inscription may be thus described: Quarterly—1 and 4. Argent on a bend sable three roses of the field. 2 and 3. Or on a chevron gules three bezants. I should be glad to know whether there are any representatives of this family.

**To All and Singular** to whom these presents shall come Sir RALPH BIGLAND Knight GARTER Principal King of Arms and Sir WILLIAM WOODS Knight CLARENCEUX King of Arms of the South East and West parts of England from the River Trent Southwards send greeting: **Whereas** EDWARD BENTLEY of Ely Place in the parish of St. Andrew Holborn in the County of Middlesex Gentleman hath represented unto the most noble Bernard Edward Duke of Norfolk Earl Marshal and Hereditary Marshal of England one of his Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council that being uncertain of Armorial Ensigns pertaining to his family: He therefore requested the favor of His Grace's warrant for our granting and assigning such as may be proper to be borne by him and his descendants according to the laws of Arms **And Forasmuch** as the said Earl Marshal did by Warrant under his hand and seal bearing date the fifteenth day of July instant authorize and direct Us to grant and assign such armorial Ensigns accordingly: Know ye therefore that We the said GARTER and CLARENCEUX in pursuance of His Grace's Warrant and by virtue of the Letters Patent of our several offices to each of Us respectively granted do by these presents grant and assign unto him the said EDWARD BENTLEY the arms following that is to say OR A BEND VAIR BETWEEN TWO BENDLETS ENGRAILED SABLE and for Crest On a wreath of the colours A TALBOT PASSANT ARGENT THE DEXTER FORE-FOOT RESTING UPON AN ANCIENT SHIELD VAIR CHARGED WITH AN ANNULET OR as the same are in the margin hereof more plainly depicted to be borne and used for ever hereafter by him the said EDWARD BENTLEY and his descendants with due and proper differences according to the Laws of Arms: In Witness whereof We the said GARTER and CLARENCEUX Kings of Arms have to these presents subscribed our names and affixed the seals of our several offices this eighteenth day of July in the Fifth year of the reign of Our Sovereign Lord William the Fourth by the grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland King Defender of the Faith &c. And in the year of our Lord one Thousand eight hundred and thirty four.

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GYBBON QUERY.—I should be much obliged if any correspondent would give me information concerning the pedigree of Gibbon or Gybbon. They seem to have held lands in Rolvenden, co. Kent, as early as 1340. The Hole estate in Rolvenden temp. Henry VIII. became the property of this family, in which it continued until about the end of the last century, when it passed into the Monypenny family. (Hasted, vol. iii., pp. 86, 87, 88). There was also a branch of this family at Pump-house in Benenden (an adjoining parish), the representatives of which are now living at Cheriton, Lucas County, United States, who trace their descent to Edmond Gibbon of Benenden, co. Kent, England. I wish to find how the Gybbons of Pump-house were connected with those of the Hole.—There were two other branches of this family, one of Frid in Bethersden (which, according to the same authority, was a younger branch of those of the Hole), and the other of Westcliffe (which was also a younger branch of those of the Hole; Berry's 'Kentish Genealogies,' 410). Berry gives at length the pedigrees of both of these branches, but altogether leaves out the family from which they are admitted originally to have sprung.

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BEANLANDS OF MORTON, CO. YORK.—Since the beginning of the sixteenth century there has been settled a family of the above name in and around the village of Morton in Skyrack, co. York. In the York Registers is the will of John Beanlande of Morton 154—, Allan Beanlandes of Morton 1564, his wife Isabelle Beanlande 1570, his son Christopher 1589, etc. Prior to John, no mention whatever of the name in any Yorkshire papers have I been able to find. From Christopher the registers of the parish church of Bingley contain a complete descent, with several branches settled in the same parish, of the Beanlands of Morton down to the beginning of the present century. Now the only trace of any family of this somewhat singular name that I have been able to find is in connection with Herefordshire, Gloucestershire, and the Welsh Marches. In 'Plac. de quo Warr.,' p. 250, Rot. 8—"et *Johannes Bentlonde* et alii undecim jur' in recordo nominati," etc. This is with reference to the rights of Abbot de Hayes to some land at Wynchcombe, co. Gloucester (temp. Ed. I.). Again, from 'Rot. Originales,' temp. Edw. III.—"*Johannes de Banlande de Botelsford capellanus.*" And in 'Calendarium Inq. post mort.,' pp. 145-8, among the list of tenants of "*Johannes de Mowbray dux Norfolk dominus de Mowbray,*" I find, under "Hereford et March, Wall"—"*Perschenet et Herkerdeston i. feod. milit' per Matheum Beenland.*"

Is there any trace of the name existing now in these counties? Can any of your subscribers give me further, or rather earlier, notice of the Yorkshire family? I believe two of the name are in the list of Craven men who fought at Flodden. What were their names? It is quite within the bounds of possibility that during the Wars of the Roses some individual of that name may have been stranded in Yorkshire after one of the great battles (*e.g.* Towton) and settled in that county.

That all of the name now existing in Yorkshire have originally come from the Morton stock is, I think, from the registers, pretty evident. The members of this family were of that class of yeomen and small landowners so common in the West Riding of Yorkshire. Any information will be very acceptable to

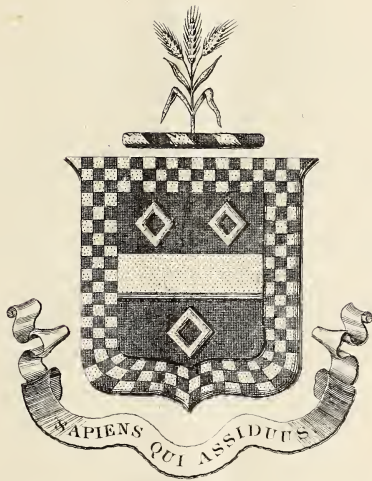

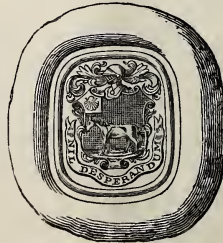

## A CRITICAL EXAMINATION OF THE GENEALOGY OF MASTERTON OF THAT ILK, PARKMILL, ETC.

*Published in Douglas's 'Baronage of Scotland,' and Crawford's 'Memorials of Alloa.'*

THIS pedigree is a good instance of the way in which fact and fiction are interwoven, and notices of several different families thrown into one so as to compose a long pedigree.

Crawford begins by the statement that the Mastertons of Parkmill "were probably the most ancient landed proprietors in Clackmannanshire, the traditional account of their origin being that one of the chief architects at the building of the Abbey of Dunfermline obtained from Malcolm Canmore the lands of Masterton, in Fifeshire, from which he and his posterity assumed their surname."

The church of the Holy Trinity and St. Margaret, at Dunfermline is believed to have been founded soon after the marriage of Malcolm and Margaret; the Abbey probably dates from the reign of their son David.

Malcolm IV. (1153-65), granted the lands of Ledmacdunegil, afterwards called Masterton, as formerly held by *Magister Ailricus cementarius*, to the Abbey church of Dunfermline. Ailric's designation has perhaps formed the ground of the fable of the architect, and it is evident that the lands not being then called Masterton could not have given a name to their owner.

The first we find is

I. Hugo de Villa Magistri, who about 1250 witnesses a charter of Petrus de Rupe; there is nothing to suggest a descent from the *cementarius*.

II. William de Maystertun, son and heir of Hugh, in 1272 enters into an agreement with Symon Abbot of Dunfermline as to the multures of his lands of Maystertun, he being a vassal of the Abbey; in 1278 and later, he is a witness to several charters, and in 1296 as "William de Meistreton del Comté de Feyf," he swears fealty to Edward I.

III. Duncan de Maystertun in 1316 witnessed the homage of Duncan, Earl of Fife, to the Abbot of Dunfermline, for lands held of the Abbey.

IV. Symon de Maystertun, in the reign of David II. (1329-71), witnesses the resignation of the lands of Wythker to the Abbey by Alan de Lybirton.

V. John de Maisterton was dead 23 March, 1419, when his son and heir

VI. William de Maisterton has sasine of the Villa de Maisterton, as formerly held of the Abbots of Dunfermline by his ancestors. In 1540 James II. granted to the Abbot and Convent of Dunfermline a Charter of Confirmation of all their possessions, including Mastirtone, the gift of King Malcolm. 1455, William Maistertoun was a Canon of Cambuskenneth; in 1471, Thomas Mastertoun was a member of that chapter, and at an earlier period John Mastertoun was a monk there.

VII. William Maistertoun was on an assize at Dunfermline, 1491.

Of these seven successive owners of Masterton, the only one mentioned in the published pedigree is (II.) William, and his homage to King Edward; there is, however, a statement which seems to be quite groundless, that William Masterton of that Ilk in 1442 "made a donation to the Abbey of Dunfermline out of his lands of Masterton *pro salute anime sue*;" this is not to be found in the chartulary. He is stated in the Baronage to have been father of Alexander Masterton of that Ilk, whose son and heir John Masterton had a crown charter in 1528 of the Mains of Bothkennar in Stirlingshire, to him and Grizel Mure his spouse.

The charter is merely to John "filio et filio et haeredi Alexandri Masterton" not of that Ilk. Crawford calls his wife "Dame Grisel Mure of Glenderston," but she could not be a daughter of that family, the first of which was at this time a youth.

There is not only nothing to connect these Mastertons of Bothkennar with the family of that Ilk, but their succession can be traced, and it differs from the alleged pedigree making them ancestors of the Parkmill branch. Thus,

*Robert Mitford*† was son & heir to Cuthbert, & lived all the Reign of Queen Eliz. & K. James, and dyed in y<sup>e</sup> first year of K. Charles y<sup>e</sup> first, he being then a very old man of about 88 y<sup>rs</sup> of age, & dyed at Gillingwood & was buried in Gilling Church. This Rob<sup>t</sup> had issue Cuthbert, who dyed in y<sup>e</sup> lifetime of his said Father Rob<sup>t</sup>. Cuthbert left his only son Robert, now alive.

Robert Mitford of Mitford, Esq. married Philadelphia, one of y<sup>e</sup> daughters of Humphrey Wharton of Gillingwood in the county of York, Esq., and had issue six sons & five daughters (viz<sup>t</sup>) Humphrey, Cuthbert, John, Edward, W<sup>m</sup> & Michael; Barbara, Marg<sup>t</sup>, Ann, Elinor & Elizabeth. Cuthbert y<sup>e</sup> 2<sup>d</sup> son was senior ffellow of Caius College in Cambridge, and afterwards Rector of y<sup>e</sup> parsonage of Ingram, where he dyed and was buried in the Chancel there 1662. Jno. y<sup>e</sup> 3<sup>d</sup> son is now a merch<sup>t</sup> in Newcastle, Edward y<sup>e</sup> 4<sup>th</sup> son is now a Batchelor of physick & at p'sent studyes y<sup>e</sup> same at London, W<sup>m</sup> y<sup>e</sup> 5<sup>th</sup> son is now a student in y<sup>e</sup> College of Glascow in Scotland, and Michael y<sup>e</sup> 6<sup>th</sup> son is not as yet disposed on. Barbara y<sup>e</sup> eldest daughter married to George Reeveley of Throple, now both dead, & lye buried in the Chancel of Mitford Church, and left four children, two boys and two girls; Mary y<sup>e</sup> 2<sup>d</sup> daughter married to Geo. Rob<sup>t</sup>, Eliz<sup>th</sup>, Philadelphia, Ann, Marg<sup>t</sup>, George, John, Barbara, ffrances, Mary & Sarah.

*Robert Mitford*, eldest son of y<sup>e</sup> s<sup>d</sup> Humphrey, married Ann eldest daughter of John Ashton of Burne, Esq<sup>r</sup>, second son of S<sup>r</sup> Ralph Ashton of Middleton in Lancashire, Bart., upon the 19<sup>th</sup> Dec<sup>r</sup> 1681, and had issue five sons and one daughter (viz<sup>t</sup>) Robert, John, Edward, Humphrey, Elizabeth and William.

LASCELLES FAMILY.—In the Pontefract Registers there is an entry of the marriage in 1715 of the Rev. Francis Lascelles to Hannah, fourth daughter of the Rev. Samuel Drake, Vicar of Pontefract. By this marriage there were several children, Thomas, Francis, Hannah (subsequently married to the Rev. John Sturdy), and two other children. The Rev. Francis was buried at Pontefract 19 April, 1753, and the Hon. (?) Col. Thomas Lascelles was buried 4 Nov. 1751. I am wishful to ascertain to what branch of the Lascelles family these persons belonged. On referring to the Lascelles Pedigrees, to which I have access, I find first in Jones' 'Harewood,' Daniel Lascelles of Stank was born in 1655. By his first wife he had George (born 1681), Henry (born 1690), Francis, said to have died young (born 1674, *i.e.*, when his father was 19!), Thomas, also said to have died young (born 1688). In Foster's 'Yorkshire Pedigrees,' Francis is said to be born in 1664, or when his father was 9 years old. A similar mistake occurs in Whitaker's 'Leeds.' I suppose that these two entries really mean that Francis was born in 1684. Can it be that these are the two gentlemen whose deaths we have recorded in the Pontefract registers?

## A CRITICAL EXAMINATION OF THE GENEALOGY OF MASTERTON OF THAT ILK, PARKMILL, ETC.

*Published in Douglas's 'Baronage of Scotland,' and Crawford's 'Memorials of Alloa.'*

(Continued from p. 136.)

Alexander Masterton and Catherine his wife obtained a feu charter of their lands of Beath, called Masterton-Beath, and of four-sevenths of the lands of Grange; Alexander seems to have been son of Robert of Beath, and father of Andrew of Beath, living in 1593. Adam Maistertoune, probably of this family, is a witness 1568.

Before 1669 Masterton-Beath had been acquired by Wardlaw of Wester Luscar, but Easter Grange was retained by Adam Masterton, probably son of the above-named Andrew. In 1662 John Masterton was served heir of his father Adam in the lands of Easter Grange, and about 1673 Adam Masterton of Grange (? son of John) registered arms, Argent, a chevron between two crescents in chief, and a mullet in base gules, on a chief azure an eagle displayed or; crest, a dexter hand holding a scymetar proper; motto, *Pro Deo et rege*. In 1690 he appears as tutor of John Philp, nephew and heir of Mr. John Philp, minister of Queensferry, who had died in 1688 a prisoner in the Bass, having been deprived of his benefice and fined in 1681.

We now come to the modern family of Masterton of Parkmill, which has been set up as representative of Masterton. 1646 is the first appearance of them in the Acts of Parliament.

I. Alexander and Janet Couston his wife had in 1547 a charter of the lands of Millerwood and Cumlybank, afterwards called Parkmill, in the county of Clackmannan, from John Lord Erskine; they are also stated to have been infest in the lands of Bad in Perthshire, in 1544.

II. Ronald Masterton of Parkmill had a charter from John, Earl of Mar, 1570; married Marjory Bruce, of the Clackmannan family, daughter of Robert of Lintmill. Gilbert Masterton, who figures 1595-96 as a dependant of the Earl of Mar, was probably of this family. Mr. John Colville writes to Robert Bowes that he is to be there one of these days with Highland men from Mar; and later David Foulis advises Lord Burleigh that Gilbert is not presently in England.

III. Robert Masterton of Parkmill 1599, a member of the Committee of War, 1646, married Agnes, daughter of John Douglas of Renniaston in Fife.

IV. John Masterton of Parkmill was Sheriff Depute of Clackmannanshire, and a member of the Committee of War 1648; Robert, bailie of Clackmannan, is at the time on the Committee, and may have been his brother. John, who had a charter of Parkmill in 1632, married Mary, daughter of Mr. William Lindsay.

V. Francis Masterton of Parkmill, a graduate of Edinburgh University 1663, also Sheriff Depute of the county, appears as a Commissioner of Supply 1667-1704; married Christian, daughter of John Keirie of Gogar, in the parish of Blairlogie, and county of Perth, of a family originally belonging to Alloa, who had a grant of Arms 20th June, 1673: Argent, a fess counter-embattled between two cinquefoils in chief, and a cross crosslet fitchée in base gules. Crest, a hand holding a rose slipped proper; motto, *Virtute Viget*.

John Keirie, then designed "Servant to the Earl of Mar," married Isobel, daughter of Mr. John Craigingelt, minister of Alloa. Francis Masterton also registered arms about the same time; Argent, a chevron gules and a chief azure; crest, A stag courant, bearing on his attyre an oakslip fructed proper; motto, *Per ardua*.

The history of the variations of the arms of the family is nearly as singular as the construction of their pedigree.

The seal of William appended to his Deed of Homage, 1296, bears a lion ram-

pant; the next authority is an illuminated MS. of the middle of the sixteenth century, which gives, Argent, a chevron gules, on a chief of the second a crescent or.

The seal of Robert Masterton of Bad, appended to a resignation of the lands of Keir in favour of Edward Brown, 1588, has an eagle displayed, impaling a chevron with a crescent in chief, or on a chief. This Robert of Bad does not fit into Sir Robert Douglas' pedigree at all, as it is stated that Alexander of Bad, 1544, had one son Ronald, and one daughter.

A later MS. has, Mastertoune of that Ilk, Per fess azure and argent, in chief a crescent, or, and in base, a chevron gules, impaling or, an eagle displayed sable.

Sir James Balfour has, gules, a unicorn trippant argent armed and unguled, or; while Porteus 1661 gives, argent, a chevron, and on a chief gules three crescents of the first.

Francis and Christian had issue,

1. Charles.

2. John, Merchant in Edinburgh, father of Colonel James Masterton, M.P. for the Stirling Burghs. It is added in Burke's *Landed Gentry*, that James acted as Aide-de camp to H.R.H. the Duke of Cumberland at Culloden, and had a sister Katherine, who married James Laurie of Burngrange, and had issue.

VI. Charles Masterton of Parkmill graduated at the University of Edinburgh 1697, married his cousin Mary, daughter of John Keirie of Gogar and Catherine his wife, daughter of Mr. Robert Wright, minister of Clackmannan, by Mary Craingingelt, whose sister was wife of John Keirie of Gogar,

They had issue a daughter Katherine, who married James Christie, writer in Sterling, and one surviving son.

VII. Francis Masterton of Parkmill and Gogar who married Margaret, daughter of James Graeme, of Braco co. Perth, and Katherine his wife, daughter of Sir William Stirling of Ardoch, Bart., and had issue.

Thus far Douglas, who makes Francis the tenth in succession from William, living in 1422 inclusive. Crawford adds that the last of the family, John, died at Leyden at an advanced age and childless, about the end of last century, and that Parkmill became the property of the Mar family. Francis in 1720 was, along with his uncle Francis Keirie, served heir of provision general of his grandfather John Keirie, younger of Gogar; in 1747 he was served heir general of his father, Charles of Parkmill; in 1764 he was served heir of provision general of his cousin Edward Wright, of Kersie, co. Stirling, M.D., son of James Wright of Kersie and Janet, daughter of Mr. Robert Wright, minister of Clackmannan; finally, in 1766, being then styled of Gogar, he was heir of provision general of his cousin Mary, daughter of Mr. Robert Wright, minister of Culross, who was brother of Mrs. Wright, of Kersie, and of Mrs. Keirie of Gogar.

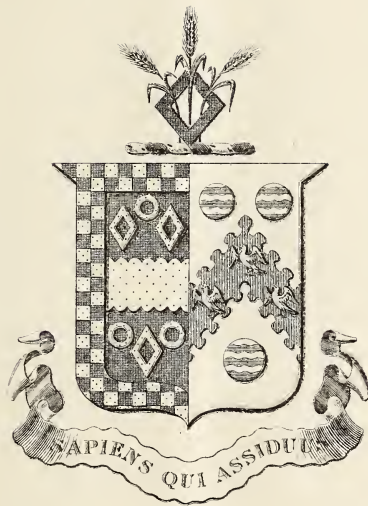
Francis had apparently succeeded to Gogar after the death of his uncles Charles Keirie of Gogar and Francis Keirie.

Francis Masterton, of Parkmill and Gogar, registered over again in his own name, 21 July, 1777, the arms recorded a hundred years before by his ancestor, and died 1795, in his 79th year; his widow died in 1806.

In 1791 James Masterton, Merchant in Madeira, was served heir of his brother Charles of Aucklandskeyes, in Perthshire, Captain 31st regiment of foot, who died in June, 1789; these might be the two sons of Francis.

John Masterton of Braco, Perth, who has been stated to be a son of Francis and Margaret Graeme, married Anne Amelia Murdoch, who died 1806.

James Masterton of Braco Castle (their son?) had an only daughter Margaret Seymour, who married in 1823 Captain Elliot, eldest son of the Right Hon. Hugh Elliot, Governor of Madras.

Other persons of the name were Dewar Masterton, Advocate, who married in 1789 Helen, only child of Sir John Gibson, of Pentland, Bart., and died without issue in 1797, aged 31.

John Masterton, glazier to the King, had an Act in his favour in 1681 declaring that he should be free from all taxes, stent, etc; the name appears a hundred years before this in Edinburgh, borne by merchant burgesses of good position.

There are also lands in the county of Edinburgh named Masterton, and it is possible that they may have given name to a family in that quarter, who, however, never were owners of the estate. Robert I. granted a charter of half Masterton, near Newbottle, to the Abbot and Convent of Newbottle, on the resignation of Nigel de Carrick and Marion his spouse, and of Gilbert de Aytoun and Ada de Rossine his spouse; a subsequent charter conveyed the patronage of the church of Masterton to the Abbey. David II. granted half of Masterton to Walter Dispensa; Masterton was included in the great estate which was acquired by Mark Ker, last Abbot of Newbottle, as a hereditary barony, and was held by his descendants the Earls of Lothian till the middle of the seventeenth century, when it belonged to Thomas Meggat and descended to his heirs.

CROMWELL DESBROW.—A boy bearing these very distinctive names was at Merchant Taylors' School in 1684. He might perhaps be the same as Cromwell Desborow (son of Benjamin, the 7th son of Colonel Desborow and Jane Cromwell), who died 4 March, 1717-18, in his 44th year, and was buried in the Abbey Church, Bath. More probably he may be identified with Cromwell Disbrowe of Bombay, administration to whose effects was granted in 1730 to Platt Disbrowe, his brother, and further administration in 1757 to Mary Desmadryl (wife of John Charles D.) sister of deceased, on behalf of Cornelia Disbrowe, widow, mother of deceased. I should be glad to learn more of Cromwell Desborow, and also of Thomas Desborow (born Aug. 1644), who entered M. T. School in 1652.

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## Family of Gresham.

SIR RICHARD GRESHAM, KT.

Inquisition taken at Norwich in 'Le Shierhowse' 8 March 4 Ed. VI. (1550)  
upon the death of Sir Richard Gresham K<sup>t</sup>. The Jurors say that he was seised in  
his demesne as of fee of the manors of Hardwike Swaynestrop Keswicke Intwood  
Swardeston and Mulberton with the appurtenances and of the advowsons of  
Swainestropp and Keswick. (Here his Will is set out). That the manor of Hard-  
wike was held of the King by the fourth part of a knight's fee and was of the clear  
annual value of £13 6s. 8d., that the manor of Swainestropp was held by the  
sixteenth part of a knight's fee and was worth £23 12s. 5d., that the manor of  
Keswick was held of the heirs of Hubert de Multon and was worth £25 2s. 10½d.,  
that the manor of Mulberton was held of Robert Benhale by the service of one  
knight's fee and was worth £39 14s. 4d., that the manors of Intwood and Sward-  
eston were held of the King as of the Duchy of Lancaster by the service of a fourth  
part and a twelfth part of a knight's fee and were worth £49. That the said Sir  
Richard Gresham died on 21 Feb. 3 Ed. VI., that Sir John Gresham the younger  
K<sup>t</sup> is his son and next heir and of the age of thirty years and upwards. They say  
further that he was seised of a Watermill in Tasbrough and Freton worth £5 a

year. That the Lady Isabella Gresham widow late the wife of the said Sir Richard takes the rents and profits of Mulberton for the term of her life.

Inquisition taken at Bungaye, co. Suffolk, 5 March 4 Ed. VI. (1550) upon the death of Sir Richard Gresham K<sup>t</sup>. The Jurors say that he was seised in his demesne as of fee of the manors of Rokells Rawlyns and Battisforde late of the Bishop of Norwich and of the manor or Comandry of St John of Battisforde and of the manor of Bavent Combes and of the advowsons of Ryngsell and of the Vicarage of Battisforde and of 60 messuages 500 acres of land 200 of meadow 400 of pasture 100 of wood 20 of moor furze and heath and of £20 14s. rent in Ryngsell Charles Rokelles Rawlyns Battisforde St John's of Battisforde Combes Wattesham Bavent-combes Barkyng Badleycombes Fynborowe Ryngsell parva Bryssett magna and Flocton in the County of Suffolk. (Here his Will is set out). That the manors of Ryngsell Charles Rokells Rawlyns and the premises in the same Battesforde Combes Waltesham and Barkyng were held of the King by the service of one knight's fee and the eighth part of a knight's fee and were worth £101 7s. 11½*d.* That the manor of Bavent Combes with the appurtenances was held by the service of the sixtieth part of a knight's fee and by the rent of 12 shillings yearly and was worth £13 12s. 10*d.* That the premises in Battisforde, Badley, Combes, Fynborowe, parva Ryngsell, Bryssett magna, Wattesham and Flocton were held of the King by the service of the sixtieth part of a knight's fee and by rent of 25s. 1½*d.* and were worth £18 0s. 10*d.* That the manor of Battesforde late of the Bishop of Norwich was held of the King by the service of the fortieth part of a knight's fee and by rent of 27s. 11½*d.* and was worth £35 and no more. Further that he bequeathed to his kinsman Richard Billingforde and to such wife as he should happen to marry for the term of their lives an annual rent of £10 issueing out of his manor of Battisforde and that the said Richard is still living at Bungaye. That the said Sir Richard Gresham died on 21 Feb. 3 Ed. VI., that Sir John Gresham K<sup>t</sup> is his son and heir and was at the time of the taking of this Inquisition thirty years old and upwards.

Inquisition taken at the Castle of York 7 April 5 Ed. VI. (1551) upon the death of Sir Richard Gresham K<sup>t</sup>. The Jurors say that he was seised of the manors of Brember *alias* Brembery Benley in Ellerdale and Eldborough Malham Lytton Kynsey Merkington *alias* Morker Lound upon the wold Sutton *alias* Sutton Grange Bordeley *alias* Bordeley baronye with the rights tithes and appurtenances in the County of York, and of a moiety of the Manor and Church of Nonkelyng and of the Rectors of Swyne with the chapel, and of one messuage and of the site of the late Monastery of Fountaynes and the Barkehowse, and of 500 messuages 8 water mills 4 dove houses 5000 acres of land 800 acres of meadow 4000 acres of pasture 2000 acres of wood 5000 acres of moor 10,000 acres of furze and heath and of £6 10s. rent with the appurtenances in Brembery Massam Kyrby Malsharte Tanfelde Malham Lound on the Wold Ryppen Stanley Beverley in Netherdale Arncliffe Horton in Rybblesdale Burnishale Kyrby in Mallam dale Nonkelyng Swyne and Spaldyngton. (Here the Will is set out). Recites a Fine made in Hilary Term 1 & 2 Ed. VI. whereby Sir Richard Gresham and Isabella his wife conveyed to Sir John Gresham K<sup>t</sup> his son the manor of Sutton and divers tenements in Ryppon, the Rectory of Swyne, a moiety of the Rectory and Manor of Nonkelyng, for the term of his life with divers remainders over. They further say that all the premises with the site of Fountaynes, the Manors of Brember Massam Kyrkbye Malshart Tanfeld Morker *alias* Merkyngton Beverley in Netherdale Aldburghe Malham Bordeley Kynsey Lytton Sutton the Rectory of Swyne and a moiety of the Manor and Rectory of Nonkelyng (the premises separately purchased of the Earl of Rutland Sir Ralph Ellerker K<sup>t</sup> and Edmund Wryght only

excepted) were held of the King in chief by knight's service by a Rent to the King and his successors of £57 19s. 0 $\frac{3}{4}$ d. annually at the feast of St. Michael and were of the annual value of £579 11s. 3 $\frac{1}{4}$ d. that the manor of Lound and tenements in Lound bought of Sir Ralph Ellerker K<sup>t</sup> were held of the King as of his Manor of Topclyf by knight's service and were worth £16 14s. 4d. That the tenements in Lounde bought of the Earl of Rutland of Thomas Johnson and of Edmund Wright were held of the King as of his manor of Topclyf by knight's service and were worth £6. That said Sir Richard Gresham K<sup>t</sup> died on 21 Feb. 3 Ed. VI., that Sir John Gresham K<sup>t</sup> is his son and heir and was of the age of thirty-four years at the time of the taking of this Inquisition.

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BENTLEY OF STAFFORDSHIRE.—The following facts may assist any inquirer into the early history of this family:—Shaw ('Hist. of Staffordshire,' ii., 93) says, "The first we meet with is Gervase de Bentley, *who had issue* Roger de Bentley, who by a deed without date grants to Roger his son and his heirs all Bentley, etc." No authority is given for the statement that Gervase was father of Roger. He might have been *predecessor of some other family*, and some genealogists, after the manner of compiling pedigrees formerly, have set him down as father. The pedigree of Bentley is unbroken and authoritatively made out from the first Roger. Wm. de Bentley, who died 4 Edw. I., leaving William, a son and heir, æt. 21, mentions "Roger avus suus temp. John" (Testa de Nevill). To all this must be added the important fact that Robert de Broc, Marshal of the King, gave to Roger Helias alias de Bentley, temp. Ric. I., his lands in Nether Shugborough, co. Warwick (Shaw, ii., 93). In the Heraldic Dictionaries three bends are given as the coat of Helias. One of the coats of Bentley was *Azure, a mermaid Or* (Dugdale's 'Warwickshire,' p. 351), and existed in Kineton Church, co. Warwick. Now in connection with this coat these facts are remarkable:—Byron, who early bore three bends, had for crest a mermaid. The mermaid was the ancient coat of Prestwick of Prestwick, co. Lancashire. In 1301 we find Adam de P., John de P., Sir John Byron and others witnesses to a charter granted by Thomas de Grelley (which family also bore three bends). Furthermore, 1322, Richard Fitz Elias was manucaptor of Robert Byron, Knight for Rutlandshire. And 20 Edw. I. Sir John Elyas, with Sir John Byron and other knights, were named in a commission of inquiry (Hundred Rolls).

Sir Roger Alis, temp. John, descended from Sir Wm. Alis, who in Domesday is mentioned as the tenant *in capite* of Ellatune olim Auditon hodie Allington, co. Hants, in South Stoneham parish, it is probable is the same person as "Roger Helias alias de Bentley;" for Alis was often spelt Elias and fitz-Elias, and his benefactor or grantor De Broc was connected with the Hampshire families of Croc, Bendinges, etc. Now the mermaid was the coat of the Hampshire family of Wallop. Mathew de W. was witness to a charter of Wm. Alis temp. Hen. II. (Record Office Augmentation Deeds, C 33). Roger Alis, 1217, had seisin of lands in Welhope. Again, the mermaid is on a seal of Wm. Brewer, temp. John, and is figured in Mr. Moule's 'Heraldry of Fish.' This was a Hampshire family.

This interesting badge, device, or crest of the mermaid was also borne as a coat of arms by the Shropshire family of Giros at an early period, and is quartered by Corbet (Harl. MSS. 1396, and Add. MSS. 21,017). Two mermaids appear as supporters on the seal of Thomas de Berkley, who died 1361, and on the seal of James de B., who died 1463. The mermaid, as crest or as a charge, was also borne by a dozen other families, and more than once in both senses by families of the name of Elys and Ellys. And the unique crest of a naked female was very early borne by the ancient family of Elys, of Kiddall Hall, near Leeds, supposed to be derived from Alis of Hampshire, and early written fitz-Elias, Eliz, etc.

Robert Clement buried in Mitford Church. Two boys twins buried within the first two days of their Birth at Aix la Chapelle. He had by the above mentioned Anna Lewis his wife Nineteen children. She died May 6<sup>th</sup> 1763, aged 38 years, and was buried in the Chancel of Brayton Church in Yorkshire, the Burying place of this family since Rob<sup>t</sup> married Miss Ashton, by whom he got the Burn estate.

Her mortal remains are deposited in the burial ground of this parish. Through life she was much beloved and respected by her numerous relatives and friends. Her affectionate mother, in remembrance of her filial piety, hath caused this tablet to be erected.

To the memory of Mrs Lætitia Pritchard, late of Croft Lodge in the township of Loughrigg, in this parish, who died on the 18<sup>th</sup> day of January A.D. 1827, in the 71<sup>st</sup> year of her age. Her life was devoted to the offices of Charity, the claims of Friendship, and the duties of Religion.

The poor box bears the the date of 1648. Two old oak chairs within the rails : on one, I.L. 1677 ; and the other M.B. 1703.

The first page of the oldest register is illegible, but it appears to commence in or about 1570.

There are no inscriptions on the floor of the church, which up to 1840 consisted merely of the bare earth, and this it was the custom to strew with rushes immediately after the hay-harvest in each year. From this practice arose the village festival of the “Rush-Bearing,” which takes place annually on the last Saturday but one in July.

The Church, which is of great antiquity, is dedicated to St Oswald, and the present rector is the Rev. Henry M. Fletcher.

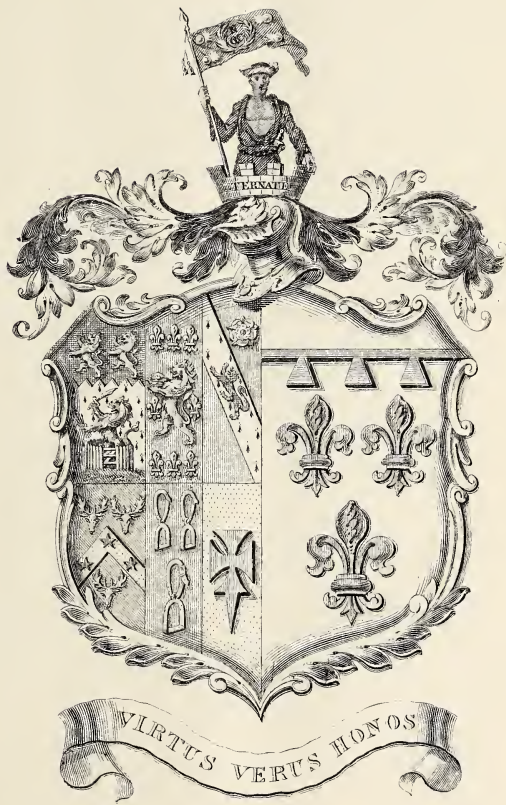

at the Heralds Visitation of London made in the Year 1633 but being at present unable to shew his Descent from the said Family owing to the emigration of his Ancestors to Holland And finding also that the Arms of Davall hitherto used by the Family of his late honoured Mother have not been duly established He therefore requested the favour of his Lordship's Warrant for Our granting and assigning such Armorial Ensigns for Burr and Davall as may be proper to be borne by him and his Descendants and that the Arms of Burr may bear allusion to the Services rendered by him in the East Indies more especially to the Capture of the Island of Ternate on the 21st of June 1801 by the Forces under his Command after an arduous Blockade by Sea and Land of fifty-two Days, And the Memorialist having intermarried with Mary youngest Daughter and Coheir of James Davis late of Chepstow in the County of Monmouth Esquire deceased who was the son of Francis Davis of the same Place by Anne his Wife Daughter of James Higford of Alvington in the County of Gloucester Esquire who was the Great Grandson of John Higford of Dixon in the same County by Frances his Wife sister of John the first Lord Viscount Scudamore, He further requested the favour of His Lordship's Warrant for Our granting and assigning in the same Patent Arms for Davis to be borne by his said Wife and her Descendants according to the Laws of Arms And forasmuch as His Lordship did by Warrant under his Hand and Seal bearing date the Eleventh day of June Instant authorize and direct Us to grant and exemplify such Armorial Ensigns accordingly Know ye therefore that We the said Garter and Clarenceux in pursuance of His Lordship's Warrant and by virtue of the Letters Patent of Our several Offices to each of Us respectively granted do by these Presents grant and exemplify unto the said Daniel Burr the Arms following that is to say Quarterly First and Fourth Ermine on a Mount Vert within a park paling and a Gate of three Bars proper a Lion rampant Or holding in the Dexter paw a Scymetar, and in the Sinister a Sheaf of seven Arrows points upwards also proper, a chief indented Sable thereon two Lions rampant Argent for Burr. Second and Third Gules a Lion rampant within an Orle of eight Fleurs de lis Argent supporting in the forepaws a ducal Crown Or for Davall And for the Crest Out of a Mural Crown Argent inscribed with the Word TERNATE Sable a Demi-Malay Soldier habited and armed with a Kreesse the dexter Arm supporting a Standard intended to represent that taken at the Capture of the aforesaid Island of Ternate by the said Lieutenant General Burr, all proper, the sinister hand resting on the Mural Crown as the same are in the Margin hereof more plainly depicted to be borne and used for ever hereafter by him the said Daniel Burr and by his Descendants with due and proper differences according to the Laws of Arms And we do hereby further grant and assign the Arms following for Davis viz<sup>t</sup> Gules on a bend Ermine a Lion passant Sable, in the sinister Canton a Rose Argent barbed and seeded proper as the same are on the Escoccheon of Pretence in the Margin hereof also depicted to be borne and used for ever hereafter by the said Mary Burr and her Descendants according to the Laws of Arms. In Witness whereof We the said Garter and Clarenceux Kings of Arms have to these Presents subscribed Our Names and affixed the Seals of Our several Offices this thirteenth day of June in the third Year of the Reign of Our Sovereign Lord George the Fourth by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland King Defender of the Faith etc. and in the Year of Our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twenty-two.

## THE DENNYs,

EARLS OF NORWICH, BARONS DENNY OF WALTHAM, AND  
BARONETS OF IRELAND.

(Continued from page 116.)

The County of Kerry, after the taking of Sir Edward Denny's Castle in 1642, continued entirely in the hands of the Irish Catholics until 1650, when it was reduced for the parliament by Ludlow, Sir Hardress Waller, and Colonels Le Hunte and Sadlier. Sir Edward Denny seems to have died before the latter year, and his son and heir, Arthur, born in 1629 (*v. ante* pp. 76 and 113), submitted outwardly at least to the Cromwellian Government. He was just twenty-two years of age when he married the Lady Ellen Barry, daughter of David, first Earl of Barrymore, by the Lady Alice Boyle, daughter of the first Earl of Cork, and began another page of the old diary (which his father had left off keeping in the memorable autumn of 1641), with the following entries:—

“Y<sup>e</sup> Ende of one Generation and y<sup>e</sup> Beginning of another.”

“I was marry'd upon y<sup>e</sup> 9<sup>th</sup> of September, 1651, to the Lady Ellen Barry daughter to y<sup>e</sup> Earle of Barrymore.

(Signed)

“ARTHUR DENNY.”

“Edward Denny, my heire, was born att Castle Lyons uponn y<sup>e</sup> 10<sup>th</sup> of Februarie 1652, between cleaven and twelve o'Clock in y<sup>e</sup> Morning, his godmother y<sup>e</sup> Lady Broghil,<sup>(a)</sup> his godfather y<sup>e</sup> Earle of Cork<sup>(b)</sup> and M<sup>r</sup> Percy Smith.<sup>(c)</sup>

“I began to keep howse in this greate Castell of Tralye, November (illegible) 1653.

“Arthur Denny<sup>(d)</sup> was born att Castle Lyons y<sup>e</sup> 2<sup>d</sup> of January att 2 of the Clock on Wensdaye morning, 1660, his grandmother was Martha Countess of Barrymore, his godfathers Francis Lord Viscount Shannon and John Jephson of Moyalloe Esq.

“William Denny<sup>(e)</sup> was born att Tralye January 16<sup>th</sup>, 1663, his godfather was William Lord Baron of Kerry and John Blennerhassett Esq. y<sup>e</sup> son of Robert Blennerhassett and M<sup>rs</sup> Honora Stoughton, my sister Elizabeth 'Hassett his godmother.

“Ellen Denny<sup>(f)</sup> was born att Tralye, Aprill 3<sup>d</sup> 1665, her godfathers were my brother Lucius Denny and my cosen Francis Lynn, her godmothers M<sup>rs</sup> Isabella Vaukler and M<sup>rs</sup> Joane Comyns.”

This is the last entry made by Arthur Denny. He was High Sheriff of Kerry in 1656, and was returned M.P. for the county in the year after the Restoration. On the death of his first wife, Lady Ellen Denny, he married in or about 1670, Frances, daughter of Sir Richard Kerle or Kyrle, by whom he had no issue. He died in March, 1672, and was buried with his first wife in the family vault in Tralee Church. His eldest son Edward made no entries in the old MS. diary, so that I cannot fix the dates of his marriage and of the births of his numerous children. In the fly-leaf of the old Bible mentioned at page 115, there is the following entry made, apparently, by the Rev. William Stanford, the then Rector or Curate of Tralee.

“1686. The 7<sup>th</sup> of January died in Traly, that worthy and ingenuous Gentleman, Arthur Blennerhassett, Esq. of Ballyseedy, one of his Majesty's Justices of the Peace, and was buried in Ballycarthy, being the Parish Church where his family are interred, to the great Griefe of all that knew him being a Gentleman of exquisite parts.”

This Arthur Blennerhassett was the eldest son of John Blennerhassett, who had married in 1654, Elizabeth Denny (*v. ante*, p. 115, note *e*), and therefore the first cousin of Edward Denny, eldest son of Arthur and Lady Ellen. Edward Denny in his father's lifetime, or soon after his death, married Mary daughter of Sir Boyle Maynard, Knt. of Curryglass, in the county Cork. One of the sisters of Mary Maynard had married the above mentioned Arthur Blennerhassett, who died s. p. probably at the castle of his cousin and brother-in-law, while another sister married Barry Denny, son of Edward of Castle Lyons, mentioned at p. 115, note *a*. Within

little more than two years after the rector of Tralee had made the above record of Arthur Blennerhassett's untimely death, and while Edward Denny's children were still young, another great civil war broke out all over Ireland, and at once, as in 1642, the Roman Catholic party became dominant in Kerry. A great number of Protestants, as Macaulay and Froude have told us, fled from the country to England, dreading a repetition of the miseries of 1641-2; but a few, Edward Denny amongst the rest, remained, seemingly reluctant to desert the cause of James the Second, although they had good reason to fear that its success would prove their ruin. The name of Edward Denny is not mentioned in the black list of thirty-two Kerry estate owners who were marked down for attainder by the Irish Convention of 1689, unless they submitted by the 10th of August or 1st of October in that year to the Stuart king, but that of Barry Denny appears in it. Edward Rice and John Hussey were the M.P.s for Tralee in 1689, while Nicholas Browne, ancestor of Lord Kenmare, represented the County. The Jacobites continued in possession of Kerry until 1691, when Brigadier Levison with seven hundred Williamite horse entered it, and was opposed by the troops under Lord Brittas and Sir James Cotter. The latter was a neighbour and old acquaintance of the Maynard family in Cork, and it appears that Edward and Mrs. Denny (*née* Maynard) opened a negotiation with Sir James, giving him a sum of money on his promising not to destroy Tralee Castle. There was nothing strictly speaking dishonourable to either party in the proposal or acceptance of such an offer, as Edward Denny had remained neutral in the civil strife, and had not been attainted by the Convention, which would have gained nothing by the destruction of his castle. He appears to have left it, probably to place his wife and children in safety at Cork or Dublin, and the Reverend William Stanford remained in rather a perilous position, watching over his Church and the few Protestant parishioners who had not been able to leave the little town. The following entries in the fly-leaves of the old Bible tell the state of affairs in Tralee in 1689-1691 graphically enough:—

“Traly Church Bible, 20<sup>th</sup> May, 1689, being then put into my custody.—W. S.

“Ye 2<sup>d</sup> of September, 1691, the Castle of Traly, the seat of that worthy, constant, and loyall gentleman, Edward Denny, Esq., was burnte by Colonel Rutte, by order of Sir James Cotter, who was then Governor of the County Kerrye, after he had received a good sum from Madam Denny to save it, and engaged his Hand and Faith to the performance thereof, but he not like a Gentleman broke his engagement.”

“The Destroyer is destroyed and we are preserved, so they that sow in Tears shall reape in Joye.

(Signed)

“WILLIAM STANFORD.”

The last entry was probably written in October, 1691, when Brigadier Levison's troops, having been reinforced by a detachment sent by Ginkel from Limerick, and some volunteers from that county, headed by the Hon. William Fitz Maurice, ancestor of Lord Muskerry, and second son of the 20th Lord Kerry (by Constance dau. of William Long of York), reduced Kerry for King William. Smith, in his ‘History of Kerry,’ published in 1758, a work to which Macaulay expressed himself indebted, says that Tralee Castle and town were burned by Captains Navarre and Houlahan, serving under Sir James Cotter, (g) and that Ginkel ordered them to be hung, but that they were pardoned at the intercession of Edward Denny. The following entry was made in the old Bible by him on his return to Tralee:—

“This Bible was preserved by the care of William Stanford all the tyme of the War, more especially when this Town was burnte in August and September, 1691. Given under my hand this 10th of October, 1691. Tralye. County Kerrye.”

(a) Lady Broghill was the Lady Margaret Howard, daughter of the 2nd Earl of Suffolk, (grandson of the 4th Duke of Norfolk) who had married Roger Boyle (fifth son of the 1st Earl of Cork), created Lord Broghill at the age of six years and Earl of Orrery by Charles the Second. He was the grand-uncle of the infant heir of Arthur and Lady Ellen Denny, for whom his wife stood sponsor.

(b) Richard, 2nd Earl of Cork. He was brother of the Earl of Orrery, Lord Broghill of the



preceding note, and therefore his godson's grand-uncle. He married Lady Elizabeth Clifford, daughter and eventually heiress of Henry, Earl of Cumberland, and granddaughter maternally of Robert Cecil, Earl of Salisbury, whose niece Lady Mary Cecil had married Edward Denny, Earl of Norwich (*v. ante*, p. 74). Richard, Earl of Cork, was created Earl of Burlington in 1663. His great grandson Richard, 4th Earl of Cork and 3rd Earl of Burlington, claimed and was allowed the Barony of Clifford, but dying without male issue, the English Earldom expired, while the Barony devolved on his daughter Charlotte, who married the 4th Duke of Devonshire, for whose third son by her the Earldom of Burlington was revived, while the Irish Earldom of Cork passed to the great-grandson of Roger, Earl of Orrery, Baron Broghill above mentioned.

(c) Percy Smith of Ballyntray, in the County Waterford, was the nephew maternally of the first Earl of Cork. (*v. Burke's 'Landed Gentry.'*)

(d) Arthur Denny died unmarried. Castle Lyons, where he and his elder brother were born, was the mansion of the Earls of Barrymore. In 1789, Archdall describes it as still "a stately fabric in the county of Cork;" but the ruinous prodigality of the two last Earls caused it and most of the ancient possessions of this long-descended family to pass away to strangers. Hooker's translation of Cambrensis, dedicated to Sir Walter Raleigh, describes the Barrys as then, in the seventeenth century, "in nothing degenerate from their first ancestor (Philip De Barry of 1172), noble and valiant gentlemen who for their fidelity and good sense were advanced to honour, and made Viscounts; but would to God," he adds, "they were not so misled, rooted, and altogether seized in Irishrie, their name and honours onlie beinge Englishe, alle the reste for the most parte Irishe!" Martha, Countess of Barrymore (the 2nd wife of Richard, 2nd Earl), the child's godmother, was however an Englishwoman, the daughter of Henry Lawrence, Esq., an English Roman Catholic, who seems to have been an agent of Glamorgan's, and who played a curious part at the siege of Tralee Castle in 1642, of which I shall have more to say hereafter when giving some papers found on him at the time he was made prisoner by the garrison. Lord Shannon, the child's godfather, was the 6th son of the 1st Earl of Cork, and John Jephson of Moyalloe (Mallow) was his son-in-law, and the ancestor of the present Sir Denham Jephson Norreys, Baronet, of Mallow Castle.

(e) William Denny died unmarried. His godfather William, 20th Lord Kerry, was father of Thomas, created Earl of Kerry, ancestor of Lords Lansdowne and Orkney. John Blennerhassett (who died unmarried) was the son of Robert Blennerhassett of Littur, county Kerry (younger brother of the owner of Ballyseedy), by Honora Stoughton, grand-daughter maternally of Dermot O'Brien, fifth Baron of Inchiquin. From this Robert and Honora descends in the female line Rowland Ponsonby Blennerhassett, Esq., M.P. for Kerry. The wife of the fifth Baron of Inchiquin, Dame Ellen Fitz Gerald of Cloyne, was the great-great-granddaughter of James Fitz Gerald, 14th Earl of Desmond; thus the present M.P. for Kerry above mentioned descends from the extinct Earls of Desmond and the O'Briens, Lords Inchiquin. Elizabeth 'Hassett or Blennerhassett was the wife of John of Ballyseedy, mentioned at p. 115, note e.

(f) Ellen Denny married John Carrique, Esq., of Glandine, county Kerry. Francis Lynn seems to have been a relative of William Lynn, who married Mary Forest, sister of the wife of Arthur Denny (*v. ante*, p. 76) and Mrs. Vauklier, or Vauclier, was probably the daughter of the Huguenot officer mentioned at p. 116, note f.

(g) It is but fair to Sir James Cotter to observe that he was very probably unable to restrain his troops from burning the Castle of Tralee. The two Captains whom Smith mentions as its destroyers were strangers, one a Frenchman. Sir James was included in the Articles of Limerick, and the Parliament paid for the rebuilding of the castle.

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HUBBARD PEDIGREE, Vol. III., pp. 107, 108.—In Castor Church, Northants, is a flat stone thus inscribed:—Here lieth the body of Mary, wife of William Hubbard, of Langham in the county of Rutland, daughter of William and Mary Serjeant of Castor. She died Nov. 19, 1742, aged 22. Adjoining is a marble tablet to her father and mother: he ob. 22 July, 1744, aged 53; and she 31 Jan. 1765, aged 68. Near to is another to Mary, wife of Mr. Wright Serjeant, dau. of Henry Dove, esq. died 24 Aug. 1750, aged 25, and her husband, 14 Feb. 1787, aged 59. She was the eldest dau. of Henry Dove, esq. (bur. at Tinwell, Rutland, 3 Oct. 1766), descended from Tho. Dove, Bishop of Peterborough, d. 30 Aug. 1630. She was b. 26, bapt. 28 Dec. 1724, at Castor, and was mar. 26 May, 1750, to Wright Serjeant. I may add that Langham and Barleythorpe are but a short mile apart.

Near this Pillar lyeth the body of William Spearing, Gent., four times Mayor of this Town, who died in the Year of our Lord 1690 and in the 74<sup>th</sup> year of his age.

Also near this Monument lieth the Body of John Andrews, Gent., three times Mayor of this Town, who departed this life y<sup>e</sup> last day of December in the year of our Lord 1720, in the 83<sup>rd</sup> year of his age. He was Nephew, Heir, and Executor of the above-said W<sup>m</sup> Spearing.

Likewise near this place (under the same stone) are deposited the remains of John Andrews, Gent. (son of the above-named John Andrews), who died 16<sup>th</sup> October 1728 aged 55. And of Sarah his Wife (daughter of William Boulting of Theale Esq<sup>re</sup>), who departed this life 19<sup>th</sup> January 1740 aged 52.

ARMS.—*Argent, a bend cottised sable.*

[NOTE.—I cannot vouch for the correctness of the grammar in these two Latin inscriptions, but they are copied *verbatim* from the originals. The first contains the figure of a woman (in wood) kneeling before a desk in prayer. The second is the half-length figure of a man habited in the dress of the period.]

In hopes of a blessed resurrection here lyes the body of John Prowse, late of this Town of Axbridge Esq<sup>r</sup>. His father was John Prowse Esq<sup>re</sup>, who died in June 1688, and lies buried in the Parish Church of Compton Bishop, Nephew and Heir of William Prowse Esq<sup>re</sup>, whose Monument is seen in this Church; and his mother was Anne eldest daughter and coheirress of Roger Newborough of Barkley in this County Esq<sup>re</sup>. He had two wives, his first was Margaret daughter of William Bragge of Sadborough in the County of Devon Esq<sup>re</sup>, who died in Child-bed in December 1702, and was buried at Compton Bishop. And his second was Abigail daughter of George Lord Bishop of this Diocese, by whom he had Thomas, yet living, his only child. He had the Honour to serve the Queen in his County as Justice of the Peace and Colonel of the Bath Regiment, and to be unanimously elected Knight of the Shire for the Parliament called in the year 1708. And in

the diligent and faithful attendance on that Service he died of the Small Pox at Westminster on the 4th day of April 1710, and in the 34th year of his age, much lamented. To the Memory of her very affectionate and dearly beloved Husband, Abigail, his sorrowful Widow and Executrix, erected this Monument in the year 1712.

ARMS.—*Quarterly, sable, three lions rampant argent, PROWSE; or, three bends azure within a bordure engrailed gules, NEWBOROUGH; impaling on the dexter side arg., a chevron vert, between three bulls passant gules, BRAGGE; On the sinister side, gyronny of eight, or and ermine, a castle triple towered sable, HOOPER.\**

Sacred to the Memory of Abigail Prowse, widow of John Prowse Esq<sup>re</sup> and daughter of the Rev<sup>d</sup> Dr George Hooper, who was Bishop of this Diocese. She was one of the most accomplished Women of her time, admired for her excellent Understanding, extensive Knowledge and agreeable Manners, and beloved for her eminent and exemplary Piety. The early part of her life was dedicated to the care and education of her Son, and she lived to see the happy effects of that care in him and in his Children. She died 15<sup>th</sup> Nov<sup>r</sup> 1763, in the 80<sup>th</sup> year of her age.

ARMS.—PROWSE AND NEWBOROUGH, *quarterly, on an escutcheon of pretence, HOOPER.*

Upon a large mural monument on the north wall of the chancel (now concealed behind the organ) :—

Near this Place  
Lieth interred the Body of  
The Rev<sup>d</sup> John Woods,<sup>(a)</sup> M.A.  
Late Rector of this Parish and  
of Cortlingstock, in this County.  
He married Catherine the Daughter of  
John Bridges, Esq<sup>r</sup>, of Barton,  
In the County of Northampton,  
By whom He left two Daughters.  
He died Feby 29<sup>th</sup>, 1752. Aged 73.  
She died Jan<sup>ry</sup> 29<sup>th</sup>, 1732.  
Aged LIII.

ARMS.—*Quarterly, 1 and 4. Argent, an eagle with wings expanded sable, preying upon an infant swaddled of the last, banded or, face proper. 2 and 3. Gules, three ancient drinking-cups argent—for RISLEY. CREST.—Upon an oak tree vert, fructed or, a raven sable. MOTTO.—Fato prudentia Major.<sup>(b)</sup>*

Upon another mural monument on the opposite side of the chancel :—

Near this place  
Lies y<sup>e</sup> Body of y<sup>e</sup> Rev<sup>d</sup> Henry Woods,<sup>(c)</sup> M.A.  
late Rector of Lambley & of Stanford,  
In this County, who died March y<sup>e</sup> 24<sup>th</sup>, 1755  
In the 66<sup>th</sup> year of his age.

\* Bedford, in his 'Blazon of Episcopacy,' gives these arms to Bishop Hooper; but Cassan, in his 'Lives of the Bishops of Bath and Wells,' says Hooper had "no right to arms, none being recorded at the Herald's College, London, at Ulster's, or Lord Lyon's offices." As he fulfilled his Ministerial Charge  
with great Sufficiency and Credit,  
so was he in other important Relations of Life  
not less eminent.

He was a kind Master, an obliging Neighbour,  
an affectionate Friend and an agreeable Companion.

But above all He adorned the Married State,  
in which he lived near Twenty Years,  
in the most perfect Union and Harmony  
with Her

who, in memory of One so dear to herself  
and so much esteemed by others,  
caused this Monument to be erected A.D. 1755.  
By his side lies his Infant Son.

Also the Remains of  
Sarah Woods  
Relict of the Rev<sup>d</sup> Henry Woods.

(\*) "Mr. John Woods, Clerk, Rector of this Parish, buried March 5th, 1752."—*Parish Register*. He was the eldest son of Hamlet Woods of West Leigh, and afterwards of Risley, co. Lancaster, Esq., by his marriage (at Winwick, May the 23rd, 1678) with Elizabeth, only daughter of John Risley of Risley, Esq. In 1702, he inherited the Risley and Broseley estates under the will of his cousin, John Risley, Esq., who died that year, and was buried at Winwick (*vide* 'Misc. Gen. et Heraldica,' Vol. II., p. 275). In 1732, the rectory of Wilford having become vacant by the death of the Rev. Benjamin Carter, he was presented to that benefice by Sir Robert Clifton, Bart., and he also held the rectory of Cortlingstock, now called Costock. There are entries in the Wilford registers of the marriages of his daughters and coheiresses; namely, "Mr. Richard Arnold, Clerk, Rect<sup>r</sup> of Thurkinson (*Thurcaston*) in the County of Leicester and Mrs. Catherine Woods of this Parish married Nov. 6, 1735," and "Mr. Joseph Milner, Clerk, Rector of Barton, and Mrs. Elizabeth Woods, of this Parish, married by License May 30, 1750." His wife appears to have been interred elsewhere, as no entry of her burial is to be found in the Wilford registers.

(b) These arms are those of the Risley family, which appear to have been assumed by the children of Hamlet Woods, Esq., and Elizabeth his wife. In the Visitation of Lancashire made in 1665, the arms of the Risleys of Risley, in that county, are described by Sir William Dugdale as—Argent, a tree sable with a raven perched thereon. It is, however, doubtful if such arms were ever borne by the family, though their crest was a raven perching upon an oak tree. In the second and third quarters, birds seem to have been not unfrequently substituted by the Risleys themselves for the peculiar charges which appear upon the arms on the monuments at Wilford. The seal of John Risley, Esq., who died in 1682 (an engraving of which is given in the 'Misc. Gen. et Heraldica,' Vol. II., p. 274), furnishes an example of this.

(c) "Mr. Henry Woods, Rector of Lambley, buried 29th March, 1755."—*Parish Register*. He was a younger brother of the above-named John Woods, and the fifth son of Hamlet Woods, Esq., and Elizabeth his wife. Besides Lambley, he was also rector of Stanford, near Loughborough, to which benefice he was presented by Charles Lewis, Esq., in 1722. His widow survived him for upwards of thirteen years, and her interment is thus recorded in the Wilford registers: "Sarah, Widow of the late Rev<sup>d</sup> Henry Woods, Rector of Lamley in this County, buried in the Chancel June 29th, 1768."

(d) "Henry, son of Henry Woods, Clerk, and Sarah his wife, buried Dec. 30th, 1736."—*Parish Register*.

NOTES ON THE FAMILY OF PROWSE, OF COMPTON BISHOP,  
CO. SOMERSET.\**(Continued from page 163.)*

FROM AXBRIDGE CHURCH.

Sacred to the Memory of Thomas Prowse Esq<sup>re</sup>, the only son of John Prowse and Abigail his Wife. He was five times unanimously chosen Knight of the Shire for the County of Somerset, and discharged his duty in Parliament with ability, integrity and honour. Though frequently solicited he never could be prevailed on to accept any office in the State. He loved his Country, and thought he could better serve it in his private independent Station. He was perfectly from Vanity or Ambition, not conscious himself of those accomplishments and that distinguished merit which acquired for him the Esteem of all who knew him. And ever attentive rather to promote the Interest and Happiness of others than his own, He knew how to suffer Adversity or to enjoy Prosperity with the same truly Christian Spirit and to make the proper use of both. He was blessed with many opportunities of doing good, and met with uncommon returns of Gratitude from those of all ranks who experienced his generous Friendship and extensive Charity. No Flattery shall stain his Monument, but it would be unpardonable to lay down in Silence one who was an Ornament and a Blessing not only to his Family, but to his Country. After a long series of ill-health and patient suffering, in sure and certain hope of a blessed Resurrection, he calmly resigned his Soul into the Hands of God on the 1<sup>st</sup> of Jan<sup>y</sup> 1767, aged 59. Few have lived so greatly beloved or died so universally lamented. He married Elizabeth daughter of John Sharp Esq<sup>re</sup> of Grafton Park in Northamptonshire, and by her had Eight Children, six of whom lie buried near him:—Eliz<sup>th</sup>, born Oct. 30<sup>th</sup> 1736, died Jan<sup>y</sup> 21<sup>st</sup> 1742; Elizabeth, born March 10<sup>th</sup> 1744, died March 19<sup>th</sup> 1746; Charles, born Jan<sup>y</sup> 21<sup>st</sup> 1747, died June 15<sup>th</sup> 1756; Susan, born May 29<sup>th</sup> 1742, died Feb<sup>y</sup> 17<sup>th</sup> 1758. John, who inherited his Father's Virtues, soon followed his beloved Sister. He died Feb<sup>y</sup> 27<sup>th</sup> 1758, in the 24<sup>th</sup> year of his age. George, the only surviving son of Thomas Prowse, died Aug<sup>t</sup> 25<sup>th</sup> 1767. After a blameless life of Thirty years, he married Elizabeth<sup>†</sup> daughter of the Rev<sup>d</sup> D<sup>r</sup> Thomas Sharp, Archdeacon of Northumberland, but had no child. Elizabeth, relict of Thomas Prowse, died June 18<sup>th</sup> 1780, aged 68. Her praise is anticipated by the above Memorial, composed by herself to the merits of her Family. She left this small space to be filled by her surviving Children, who complying with her desire forbear any other Tribute to the Piety and Virtue of which her Life and death exhibited the most shining example.

CREST.—PROWSE, *as before.*

[Thomas Prowse was Recorder of Wells from 1745 to 1752, when he resigned; also Recorder of Axbridge.]

In memory of Mary, the eldest sister of Dame Elizabeth Mordaunt, and co-heiress with her of the property of their family. She was married in 1783 to the Rev<sup>d</sup> John Methuen Rogers (afterwards Rector of Berkley), and was buried there in the year 1800. Considerable estates in that place and its vicinity belonged to her, to which also Lady Mordaunt's grandson, now a minor, is heir. In these two sisters (whose paternal and maternal ancestors were D<sup>r</sup> George Hooper, Bishop of this Diocese, and D<sup>r</sup> John Sharp, Archbishop of York) their own family name of Prowse became extinct, but the Christian virtues that adorned the lives and characters of each, and the use they made of the ample means they inherited for being "rich in

good works," bespoke them worthy of so respectable an ancestry, and will embalm their memories in general esteem.

In memory of Dame Elizabeth Mordaunt, Widow of Sir John Mordaunt of Walton in the county of Warwick, Bart., whom she survived 20 years. She was the youngest daughter of Thomas Prowse, Esq<sup>re</sup>, and Elizabeth his wife, and dying at Hampstead on the 6<sup>th</sup> October, 1826, was buried at Walton on the 14<sup>th</sup> of the same month, aged 77. This lady, in whom terminated a long line of highly respected ancestry, possessed within herself a character far superior to all that names or titles on monumental tablets can bestow. It was that of a sincere Christian, acting on genuine Christian principles in all the relations of life. Her peculiar characteristic indeed was that of unbounded liberality without ostentation, to such of the poor as were most proper and deserving objects of her bounty. On her decease a fair inheritance in this vicinity and in Northamptonshire devolved to her grandson Sir John Mordaunt, Bart.

COMPTON BISHOP.

On a flat stone in the chancel is a partially obliterated inscription to the memory of William Prowse, who died in June (or July) 1677.

*On another.*

Here lyeth the body of Mary daughter of John Prowse of this parish Esq<sup>re</sup> who dyed the Fovrth day of April in the eighth Moneth of her age Anno Dom. MDCLXXXI. And also the body of Thomas Prowse, son of the said John, who dyed the Fovrtenth day of September in the yeare aforesaid and in the Third yeare of his age.

Here lies the body of John Prowse Esq<sup>re</sup> of this parish, who died in the year 1688, as also of Anne\* his wife, daughter and co-heiress of Roger Newborough of Berkley in this county, Esq<sup>re</sup>. She died in the year 1740. They had seven children, Newborough, Thomas, William, and Mary, died young, Elizabeth in 1725, and Ann in 1729, and are all buried in this church. John, their second son, who succeeded his father, lies buried at Axbridge. Margaret, his first wife (daughter of William Bragg of Sadborough in the county of Devon, Esq<sup>re</sup>), was buried here with a still-born daughter in the year 1702. Thomas Prowse, Esq<sup>re</sup>, only son of the aforesaid John Prowse, erected this monument to their memory in the year 1751.

WELLS CATHEDRAL (IN CLOISTERS).

In hope of a blessed resurrection near this place rests the body of Abigail, daughter of Richard Guilford, Gent., and wife of D<sup>r</sup> George Hooper, late Lord Bishop of this Diocese. She lived 46 years and had 9 children, of which two sons and five daughters dying young, were buried in the Church of Lambeth, Surrey. She died Sept<sup>r</sup> 24<sup>th</sup>, 1726, in the 71<sup>st</sup> year of her age. Near her lyeth the remains of Rebecca, her youngest daughter, who died June 4, 1716, in the 21<sup>st</sup> year of her age. As does also the body of Charles Guilford, Gent., her brother, who died in April, 1707, in the 42<sup>nd</sup> year of his age. Erected 1728 by Abigail Prowse, their fourth and only surviving daughter.

WELLS CATHEDRAL.

Here lyeth the body of M<sup>rs</sup> Mary Prowse, wife of Charles Prowse† of Croydon in this county, Esq<sup>re</sup>, and daughter of Thomas Carew, late of Cannington, Esq., who departed this life 3<sup>rd</sup> day of May 1733, in the 30<sup>th</sup> year of her age.

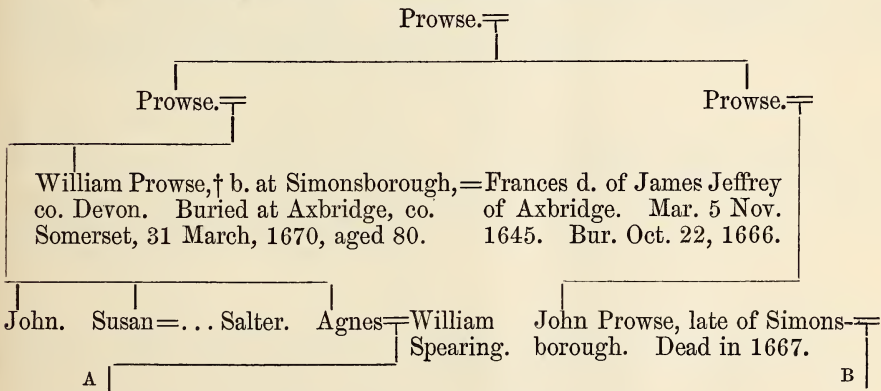

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NOTES ON THE FAMILY OF ANDREWS.\*

(Continued from p. 161.)

The following genealogical memoranda relating to the Andrews family are copied from a Book of Common Prayer, printed at Cambridge by John Hayes, Printer to the University, 1683.

I.

On the outside of the cover are stamped in gold the initials J.A. within a wreath. Inside is written,—

“This Book was Given me by my Dear mother M<sup>rs</sup> Eliz<sup>th</sup> Andrews.  
Rob<sup>t</sup> Andrews.”

And by the side of the armorial bookplate of Robert Andrews (a facsimile of which is here given), is written this further memorandum marking the devolution of the Book of Prayer to the hands of William Long, Esq., of Wrington, co. Somerset, through Elizabeth Hare Joliffe, his late wife, who received it from her aunt, *i.e.* from Elizabeth Nott, sister to Diana Joliffe. The last named were both of them granddaughters of the above Robert Andrews.

II.

Then secondly upon the fly-leaves of the same book are entries made as follow :—

“September 3<sup>d</sup> 1726. I Robert Andrews was married at Eccleston church near Eaton in the County of Chester (by the Rev<sup>d</sup> M<sup>r</sup> Aurbury) to Marg<sup>t</sup> Pigot second Daughter of Robt. Pigot of Eaton aforesaid Esq<sup>r</sup>.; I being this day 23 years of age, & my wife Marg<sup>t</sup> 23 years of age the 30<sup>th</sup> of August last past.

“(1<sup>st</sup>) Diana Andrews daughter of Robert and Margaret Andrews was born on the 10<sup>th</sup> day of June 1727 being Saturday at  $\frac{1}{4}$  after three in the Afternoon in Great Russell Street Bloomsbury. She was Baptized 15th of the same month by the Rev<sup>nd</sup> M<sup>r</sup> Saunders Curate of the Parish of S<sup>t</sup> Giles’ in the Fields. Sir Richard Grosvenor being Godfather & his Lady Diana Grosvenor & M<sup>rs</sup> Anne Grosvenor his Sister being Godmothers (who were represented).

“(2.) Thomas Andrews Son of the abovesaid Robert & Margaret Andrews was born on the 7<sup>th</sup> day of february 172 $\frac{2}{3}$  being fryday at Nine in the morning, in Great Russell Street Bloomsbury. Was baptized privately by the Reverend M<sup>r</sup> Saunders (Curate of the Parish of S<sup>t</sup> Giles’ in the fields) on Thursday the 20<sup>th</sup> of the same month, & afterwards viz. on Monday 3<sup>d</sup> of March 1728 publickly. Thos. Grosvenor Esq<sup>r</sup> & Rob<sup>t</sup> Grosvenor Esq<sup>r</sup> being Godfathers & M<sup>rs</sup> Grizel Manwayring Godmother (who stood in person).

“(3.) Elizabeth Andrews Daughter of Rob<sup>t</sup> & Margaret Andrews was born on the fifth day of february 17 $\frac{2}{3}$  being thursday about  $\frac{1}{4}$  after 7 in the morning in Great Russell Street Bloomsbury & was baptized on Thursday the 19<sup>th</sup> of the same month by M<sup>r</sup> Burnett Curate of S<sup>t</sup> Giles’ my mother Elizabeth Andrews & my sister Elizabeth Pigot standing Godmothers in person with my Good friend M<sup>r</sup> Partington for Godfather.†

“(4.) Margaret Andrews daughter of Robert & Margaret Andrews was born on the Monday 19<sup>th</sup> July 1731 about a quarter before 10 at night in Grosvenor Street in the P<sup>sh</sup> of St George Hanover Square and was baptized on Tuesday the 27<sup>th</sup> day of the same July by the Rev<sup>nd</sup> M<sup>r</sup> Newton afternoon Preacher at Grosvenor Chappell, my sister Harleston & my sister Molly Andrews being Godmothers & my Bro<sup>r</sup> Tom Pigot Godfather, M<sup>rs</sup> Harleston was represented by my sister Betty Pigot, & Tom Pigot by my Father Andrews.

“(5.) Robert Andrews, Son of the aforesaid Robert and Margaret Andrews was born on Friday the 1<sup>st</sup> day of September 1732 about a q<sup>r</sup> before Six in the Morning in Grosvenor Street in the Parish of St. George’s Hanover Square & was baptized on Monday the 24<sup>th</sup> day of the same September by the Reverend M<sup>r</sup> Trebeck Rector of the s<sup>d</sup> Parish of St George’s Hanover Square, Robert Myddelton of Chirk Castle in the County of Denbigh Esq<sup>r</sup> & Charles Harleston of Newton in the County of Chester being Godfathers & M<sup>rs</sup> Jane Grosvenor wife of Rob<sup>t</sup> Grosvenor Esq<sup>r</sup> Godmother who were represented *i.e.* M<sup>r</sup> Mydd<sup>tm</sup> by Thos. Waire Esq<sup>r</sup> M<sup>r</sup> Harleston by myself, & M<sup>rs</sup> Grosvenor by M<sup>rs</sup> Waire.

“(6.) Margaret Andrews Daughter of the aforesaid Rob<sup>t</sup> & Marg<sup>t</sup> Andrews was born on Friday the 28<sup>th</sup> Day of December 1733 about five minutes before 8 o’clock in the morning in Grosvenor Street in the Parish of St. George Hanover Square, & was Baptized on Thursday the 17<sup>th</sup> day of January following by the Rev<sup>d</sup> M<sup>r</sup> Trebeck Rector of the said Parish. My sister Molly Andrews & M<sup>rs</sup> Gertrude Partington wife of M<sup>r</sup> Edward Partington of the City of Chester (who was represented by my mother) being Godmother, & my brother Charles Pigot (who was represented by myself) being Godfather.

“(7 & 8.) Richard Andrews son of the aforesaid Rob<sup>t</sup> & Marg<sup>t</sup> Andrews and Mary Andrews daughter of the aforesaid Rob<sup>t</sup> & Marg<sup>t</sup> Andrews were both born on Tuesday 28<sup>th</sup> Jan<sup>y</sup> 1734. Richard about a quarter before 7 in the morning; and Mary about an hour & a half afterwards in Grosvenor Street in the parish of St. George Hanover Sq<sup>r</sup>. They were both privately baptized on Friday 31<sup>st</sup> of same Jan<sup>y</sup> by the Rev<sup>d</sup> M<sup>r</sup> Trebeck Rector of the s<sup>d</sup> parish. Richard died on the same Friday 31<sup>st</sup> Jan<sup>y</sup> 1734 about 9 in the morning. Mary was afterwards baptized publicly by s<sup>d</sup> M<sup>r</sup> Trebeck on Sunday 16<sup>th</sup> feb<sup>y</sup> 1734. M<sup>rs</sup> Manwayring standing Godmother in person, & M<sup>rs</sup> Harleston (by my sister Molly) and my Father Pigot Godfather (by me).

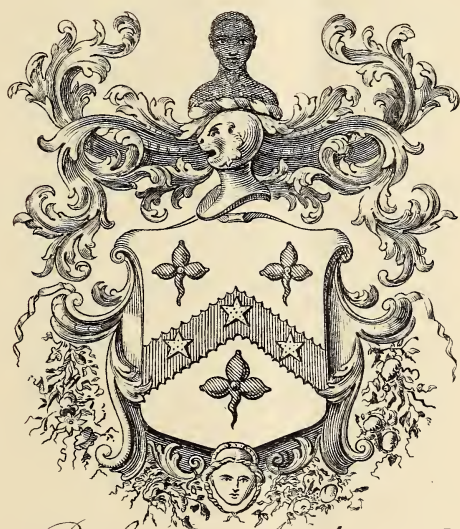
“(9.) Catherine Andrews, Daughter of the aforesaid Rob<sup>t</sup> & Marg<sup>t</sup> Andrews was born on Tuesday the 1<sup>st</sup> day of June 1736 a  $\frac{1}{4}$  before 10 in y<sup>e</sup> Morning in Grosvenor Street in y<sup>e</sup> p<sup>sh</sup> of St George Hanover Square, & was baptized on Friday y<sup>e</sup> 11<sup>th</sup> day of June following by the Rev<sup>nd</sup> M<sup>r</sup> Trebeck Rector of the s<sup>d</sup> parish, M<sup>rs</sup> Catherine Walker of Whitehall & my sister Molly Andrews being Godmothers, & my good friend M<sup>r</sup> Isaac Hormor Godfather.

“(10.) Jane Andrews Daughter of the aforesaid Robert & Margaret Andrews was born on Tuesday July the 19<sup>th</sup> 1737 ab<sup>t</sup>  $\frac{1}{4}$  before 5 in the morning in Grosvenor St. in the Parish of St. George Hanover Sq. & was baptized on Friday the 12<sup>th</sup> day of August following by the Rev<sup>d</sup> M<sup>r</sup> Palmer one of the Curates of the s<sup>d</sup> parish, M<sup>rs</sup> Jane Marten, Wife of the Rev<sup>d</sup> Edmund Marten D.D. being Godmother (represented by M<sup>rs</sup> Manwayring) & my own Mother (represented by my sister) being Godmothers, and my Father Rob<sup>t</sup> Pigot Esq. (represented by myself) Godfather.

“(11.) Maria Charlotta Andrews Daughter of the aforesaid Robert & Margaret Andrews was born on Monday the 31<sup>st</sup> day of Jan<sup>y</sup> 1742 about  $\frac{1}{4}$  before 7 in the evening in Grosvenor Street in the parish of Saint George Hanover Square, and was baptized on Friday the 18<sup>th</sup> Day of Feb<sup>ry</sup> following By the Rev. D<sup>r</sup> Andrew Trebeck Rector of the said Parish The Hon<sup>ble</sup> M<sup>rs</sup> Anna Maria Egerton being one of her Godmothers (represented by Miss Jane Trebeck) and Miss Charlotte Addison being her other Godmother (represented by Miss Margaret Lloyd) and my Bro<sup>r</sup> in Law M<sup>r</sup> Charles Mytton (represented by myself) being her Godfather.”

### III.

Thirdly, on the plain leaves at the end of the same Book of Common Prayer the entries made are:—

"My son Thomas dyed July 2<sup>d</sup> 1729 aged 5 Months & 4 days of the Small Pox & was buried the 3<sup>d</sup> of July at night in St. Giles' Churchyard under a Window on the South Side.

"My Daughter Margaret died Nov<sup>r</sup> 18<sup>th</sup> 1731 of Convulsions at Putney about nine in the Morning and was buried in the Churchyard at Putney on Saturday the 20<sup>th</sup> of the same month. Aged 4 mo<sup>s</sup> wanting 1 day.

"My son Richard died Jan<sup>y</sup> 31<sup>st</sup> 1734 in Grosvenor Street aged 3 days, & was buried in the best burying Ground belonging to the Parish of St. George Hanover Square Feb<sup>y</sup> 1<sup>st</sup> 1734.

"My Daughter Mary died July 23<sup>d</sup> 1735 at Nurse in Market Street Westminster & was buried in the new burying ground belonging to the parish of St. John the Evangelist Westm<sup>r</sup> July 25<sup>th</sup> 1735 aged six months wanting 5 days.

"My daughter Jane died at Nurse at Putney in the county of Surry Sept. 6<sup>th</sup> 1737 aged 7 weeks & was buried in the Churchyard at Putney near her sister Margaret on Thursday the 8<sup>th</sup> of the same month.

"My Daughter Maria Charlotta dyed Feb<sup>y</sup> 24<sup>th</sup> 1742 in Grosvenor street aged 3 weeks & 4 days & was buried in the best burying ground belonging to the parish of St. George Hanover Sq<sup>r</sup> on 26<sup>th</sup> of same month.

"My Dear Dear Dau<sup>r</sup> Eliz: was married to M<sup>r</sup> Tho<sup>s</sup> Partington eldest son of my late worthy friend & her Godfather Edward Partington of the City of Chester Gent: July 10<sup>th</sup> 1754 to whom she brought a son in July 1755, who died in the month, as did its dear Mother on the 2<sup>d</sup> day of August following to the unspeakable Grief of her Parents. She was buried in my vault in Hanwell Churchyard the 9<sup>th</sup> Day of the same August, & her little infant removed from the place where it was interred & put into the same vault with her."

Here follow in a different hand six entries (doubtless the writing of Catharine Andrews afterwards Nott):—

"(1.) My dear Father died at his house at East Acton in the County of Middlesex on Saturday y<sup>e</sup> 27<sup>th</sup> Day of August 1763 and was interred on Friday the second of September in his own Vault at Hanwell.

"(2.) My dear Mother died May y<sup>e</sup> 23<sup>d</sup> 1779 in Grosvenor st. & was buried on the 28<sup>th</sup> Day of same month in my Father's vault in Hanwell Churchyard.

"(3.) My dear Sister Margaret Ashcroft died April 10<sup>th</sup> 1782.

"(4.) My *Sister-in-law Sarah Andrews*, wife of my Brother the Rev<sup>d</sup> Robert Andrews died in April 1785 at St. Omer\* in France and was buried there.

"(5.) My dear Brother Robert Andrews died of a Paralytic stroke on Monday March y<sup>e</sup> 25<sup>th</sup> 1793 at 12 o'clock at night, at his house at Great Ealing Middx. & was buried on Tuesday April 2<sup>d</sup> in the Vault at Grosvenor Chapel.

"(6.) My sister Diana Andrews died of a long & painful illness on Thursday May 8<sup>th</sup> 1800 at half-past nine in the morning at her house at Great Ealing Middx. and was buried on Friday May 16<sup>th</sup> in the Family Vault at Hanwell."

Here is again a change of handwriting, and the family obituary is continued by Elizabeth Nott (dau<sup>r</sup> of the preceding writer) as follows:—

"My dear Mother Catherine Nott late Andrews died after a long & painful illness on Friday Aug<sup>st</sup> 8<sup>th</sup> 1817 at 4 o'clock in the morning at Bathford near Bath where she went for change of air and was buried on Friday Aug. 15<sup>th</sup> in Bathford churchyard, near the south side of the Chancel. The last survivor of the Family."

In the same hand is stated: "Omitted to be entered—Catherine Andrews married June 29<sup>th</sup> 1766 to Capt<sup>n</sup> John Neale Pleydell Nott, R.N. of Braydon, Cricklade, Co. Wilts who was killed in action while Commanding the Centaur off Martinique, West Indies Ap<sup>l</sup> 1791."

\* The Rev. Robert Andrews, as I have been informed, was previously Rector of Great Ealing, Midx.; but about this time either resigned the living, or retired from the active discharge of its duties, adjourning to St. Omer, where his two youngest children were born, and where, as we see from this entry, his wife (*née* Sarah Hawkins, dau<sup>r</sup> of the 1st Bart. of Kelston) died.

Upon another tablet on the north wall of the chancel:—

Upon a plain marble slab on the south side of the chancel:—

in the County of York.  
He departed this life  
November 5<sup>th</sup> 1818, aged 78,  
having been Rector of this Parish  
upwards of 37 years.

The east window of the chancel is filled with modern stained glass, representing the Resurrection, and along the bottom of the window runs the following inscription:—

hujus ecclesiæ Rectoris qui obiit die xxv<sup>o</sup> Februarii MDCCLXIV. æt.

Tutbury Vicarius.”

A window on the south side of the chancel has been filled with stained glass as a memorial of the poet Henry Kirke White, who resided for a time at Wilford, and expressed a wish that his burial-place should be in this churchyard. At the west end of the chancel, near the chancel-arch, is a good medallion bust by Halle, simply inscribed:—

Henry Kirke White  
Born 1785 + Died 1806.

On the pavement, near the reading-desk, is a large slab (now partly hidden beneath the pews), which bears the following inscription:—

Here lie y<sup>e</sup> Bodies of Gervase Handley, Gent<sup>n</sup>(<sup>g</sup>), and Katherine his Wife. Also y<sup>e</sup> Bodies of their Son Gervase and two Daughters, Katherine and Dorothy. Y<sup>e</sup> last departed this Life November y<sup>e</sup> 12<sup>th</sup>, 1724. Aged 74 Yeares.

In the south aisle, upon a small lozenge-shaped tablet :—

Near  
this Place lie  
the Remains of  
Ann Cradock,  
Relict of Joseph Cradock, Esq<sup>r</sup>(<sup>h</sup>)  
of Leicester,  
who died the 18<sup>th</sup> day of Sep<sup>r</sup>

Upon a large marble tablet in the same aisle :—

“Near this Place lies the Body of William Lee, Gent., who departed this Life February 8<sup>th</sup>, 1792, in the 84<sup>th</sup> year of his Age. Also the Body of Elizabeth Catherine Lee, Daughter of the above by Ann his Wife, who died February 26<sup>th</sup>, 1792, in the 48<sup>th</sup> year of her Age. In the same Vault are deposited the Remains of Sarah Lee, Relict of the above Will<sup>m</sup> Lee. She died May 4<sup>th</sup>, 1793, in the 73<sup>rd</sup> year of her Age.

Upon a floor-stone :—

To the Memory of Richard Handley, Gent.,(<sup>l</sup>) of Wilford, who died 23<sup>rd</sup> Jan<sup>ry</sup>, 1740. Aged 48. Also Tho<sup>s</sup> Hodgkin(<sup>i</sup>), of Nottingham, who died May 9<sup>th</sup>, 1805. Aged 68 Years. Likewise Three Sons(<sup>k</sup>) and One Daughter of Tho<sup>s</sup> and Mary Hodgkin. Also Richard Son of Tho<sup>s</sup> and Mary Hodgkin who died June 25<sup>th</sup>, 1807, in the 29<sup>th</sup> Year of his Age. And Dorothy Daughter of Tho<sup>s</sup> and Mary Hodgkin who died Feb. 19<sup>th</sup>, 1810. Aged 33 Years.

Upon a large brass plate, at the west end of the south aisle :—

To the endeared memory of Henry Smith, Esq<sup>re</sup>, of Wilford House, 3<sup>rd</sup> son of Samuel Smith, Esq<sup>re</sup>, M.P. of Woodhall Park, Herts. Born December 12, 1794. Died February 7, 1874. Also of his beloved wife the Lady Lucy Smith eldest daughter of Alexander, 8<sup>th</sup> Earl of Leven and Melville. Born January 26, 1794. Died December 23, 1865. One in the Lord they lived for the Glory of God and the welfare of His Church. While renouncing all merit of their own and having a deep and abiding sense of their sinfulness by the blessed teaching of the Holy Ghost, they enjoyed through His anointing the most firm confidence in the Sovereign Grace and Love of God in Christ toward them. And having perfect peace through the cleansing of the blood of Jesus they died resting on the Covenant Faithfulness of the Triune Jehovah.

Also to the memory of their children. Robert Melville. Born May 3, 1827. Died April 15, 1828. Lucy Jane. Born July 6, 1828, who fell asleep in Jesus May 14, 1842. Marianne. Born July 30, 1829. Died May 6, 1830. Their bodies lie in the family vault beneath the centre of the nave.

Upon a tablet in the north aisle :

In affectionate remembrance of  
George Barnard  
who departed this life September 28<sup>th</sup>, 1849  
in the 43<sup>rd</sup> year of his age.  
Also of Elizabeth Ann  
wife of John Cox, of Wilford  
and sister of the above George Barnard  
who departed this life January 6<sup>th</sup>, 1852  
Aged 67 years.

In this aisle is an ancient sepulchral slab, apparently of the fifteenth century, bearing an incised cross entwined with a scroll. There are also two old alabaster slabs near the north door, exhibiting traces of incised effigies with marginal



inscriptions. Upon one of these slabs the date—"vij<sup>th</sup> day of December, 1582"—alone is legible; whilst upon the other—"iii day of October"—is all that remains.

In the churchyard, at the east end of the chancel, upon the upper slab of a large square monument :—

On the outside of the chancel, beneath the east window, are two slate slabs thus inscribed :—

(°) The Rev. Owen Dinsdale was of Trinity College, Cambridge, where he graduated as B.A. in 1762, and M.A. in 1782. In 1767, he was presented to the rectory of Eastwood, in Nottinghamshire, by John Plumtre, Esq., and in 1781, he became rector of Wilford on the presentation of Sir Gervase Clifton, Bart., holding both benefices until his decease.

(°) Richard Handley, the first of this family who settled at Wilford, is stated in the pedigree given in the Visitation of Nottinghamshire, made in 1614, to have been descended from a Somersetshire family. By his will, dated September the 9th, 1592, and proved in the Prerogative Court of York, that same year, he desired to be buried at Wilford, "without the chauncell dore and soe nere therunto as conveniently may be." He left four daughters and two sons, of whom Henry, the elder, settled at Bramcote, in Nottinghamshire, at which place he was married, April the 6th, 1592, to Elizabeth, daughter of Thomas Bray, of Sheffield, in Yorkshire, and sister of Francis Bray, Alderman of Nottingham. His wife was buried at Bramcote, February the 20th, 1596, and he himself was buried there November the 12th, 1608. The issue of this marriage was a son Henry, who obtained a Patent of Armorial Bearings from Sir William Segar, Garter, June the 21st, 1612, and died without surviving issue, and was buried at Bramcote, June the 11th, 1650, and a daughter Alice, who was married at Sandiacre, in Derbyshire, October the 28th, 1611, to Nicholas Charlton, Esq., of that place, but died without issue, and was buried at Sandiacre, June the 25th, 1615. Gervase Handley, of Wilford, the younger son of Richard Handley, married Anne, daughter of Jerome Brand, of Staunton, in Nottinghamshire (by Bridget, his wife, the daughter of Anthony Staunton, of Staunton, Esq.), and by her he had five sons and three daughters. His second son, Gervase, had a son of his own name, whose place of interment is marked by the above-mentioned slab. This last-named Gervase was married at Radford, July the 12th, 1641, to Katherine, daughter of Thomas Wartey, otherwise Wharton, rector of Wilford, by whom he had a son and two daughters. He died intestate and was buried at Wilford, July the 28th, 1659, and his widow was buried there July the 8th, 1664. The earlier portion of the Wilford Registers has been lost, and as the burials of Gervase, the son of Gervase and Katherine Handley, and of Katherine, their daughter, are not found in the existing Registers, which only date from the year 1659, it is presumable that their deaths occurred before that time. The burial of the other daughter is thus recorded: "M<sup>rs</sup> Dorothy Handley buried Nov<sup>r</sup> 15<sup>th</sup>, 1724."

(°) "Anne Craddock buried September 14<sup>th</sup>, 1774."—*Parish Register*. This lady was the only daughter of Richard Ludlam, M.B., and was the second wife of Joseph Craddock, of Leicester, and of Gumley, in that county, Esq., by whom she had four sons and one daughter, all of whom died in their infancy, and a son Joseph, who inherited the Gumley property. Her husband, Joseph Craddock, Esq., was the third son of Edmund Craddock, Mayor of Leicester in 1702, and grandson of another Edmund Craddock, who was Mayor of Leicester in 1645 and 1657. He died April the 20th, 1759, and was buried in St. Martin's Church, Leicester. (Nichols' 'Hist. and Antiq. of Leicestershire,' vol. iii., p. 1149.)

(°) "Mr Richard Handley buried Jan<sup>y</sup> 23<sup>rd</sup>, 1740."—*Parish Register*. This Richard Handley was the eldest son of Huntingdon Handley, of Wilford, by his marriage (at Bilborough, October the 20th, 1691) with Margaret Bainbridge. His father was the only son of Huntingdon Handley, who (according to the pedigree in the Visitation of 1614) was the youngest son of Gervase Handley, of Wilford, by Anne, his wife, daughter of Jerome Brand, of Staunton. Richard Handley was baptised at Wilford, October the 18th, 1692. He was first married (at Wilford, by license, April the 14th, 1727) to Mrs. Hannah Parkes, who was buried at Wilford, June the 4th, 1728. By his second wife, Sarah Jackson (to whom he was married at Wilford, August the 15th, 1739), he had a son of his own name and a daughter, Mary, married to Thomas Hodgskin, of Nottingham. His widow was afterwards married to John Jackson, of Nottingham.

(j) "Yesterday afternoon, aged 67, died M<sup>r</sup> Hodgskin, breeches-maker, of Swine's Green in this town."—*Nottingham Journal*, May 10th, 1805.

(k) "Monday, died M<sup>r</sup> Thomas Hodgkin, son of M<sup>r</sup> Hodgkin, Breeches-maker, on Swine's Green in this town. On Thursday his remains were deposited in a vault belonging to the ancient family of the Handleys, from whom he was lineally descended by his mother's side."—*Nottingham Journal*, April 24<sup>th</sup>, 1784.

(l) "M<sup>r</sup> Thomas Wybert buried Dec<sup>r</sup> 10<sup>th</sup>, 1735."—*Parish Register*.

(o) According to 'Notes and Queries,' 1st s., vol. xii., pp. 491, 492; 2nd s., vol. i., pp. 81, 170, this Mr. Charles Robinson was maternally descended from John Bunyan, and had a Bible and other relics of the great allegorist in his possession.

MITFORD AND ASHTON.—The statement made by the compiler of the old Mitford Pedigree with respect to the marriage of Robert Mitford and Anne Ashton has been repeated by Sir B. Burke in his 'Landed Gentry,' and accepted as the fact. There can, however, be no doubt that the compiler was in error, though it is certainly strange that such should have been the case. The father of Anne Ashton was brother, not son, of Sir Ralph Ashton or Assheton, as will be best seen by the accompanying extract from Collins's 'Baronetage' (1741), which agrees with the Visitation Pedigree, and is confirmed by the Mitford notes, wherein mention is made of "great-uncle, Edward Fleetwood."

COLBY.—I shall be pleased if any heraldic reader can correctly appropriate the following arms:—Party per bend sinister gules and azure a lion rampant arg. They appear upon a tombstone in Benacre Church, Suffolk, impaled with the arms of Edward North, Esq., who died 16 Dec. 1701, whose wife was Ann, relict of John Colby of Banham in Norfolk, Esq. Now the wife of John Colby was Ann, daughter and heir of John Arthur of Wigenhall St. Mary, in Norfolk, which John Arthur was buried at Wigenhall 1 Dec. 1655. Mary, one of the daughters and coheirs of this John Colby and Ann his wife, married Thomas Carthew, Esq., Serjeant-at-law, and on a silver cup still in the possession of the Carthew family is engraved a shield with the arms of Carthew impaling Colby and his quarterings, and in the place where the quartering of Arthur would properly come is the same coat as that I have mentioned. It must therefore have been adopted for the coat of Arthur; but I cannot find it so attributed in any ordinary of arms or heralds' visitation that I have been able to consult, or indeed to any other family whatever. A branch of the family of Arthur of Somersetshire did settle at Wisbech, on the borders of Norfolk, and near Wigenhall, a century earlier, but I have not been able to affiliate John Arthur of Wigenhall to it, or any other family of the name. Had he any right to that coat? If not, who had?

### Armorial Bookplate.

#### ARMS OF WAGGETT OF CORK.

William Waggett, Esq., Q.C., and Recorder of Cork, was born in 1771, being the eldest son of Christopher Waggett, Esq., Sheriff of the City of Cork in 1786. He was elected to the Recordership of the City of Cork in 1808, and died unmarried at his seat, Kitsborough, near Cork, in Nov. 1840. His brother Captain Waggett having died without issue in July, 1848, with him ended the direct male line of the elder branch of this family, which is now jointly represented by Nicholas Dunscombe of King William's Town, co. Cork, Esq., J.P., and the Rev. Thomas W. Carson, M.A., of Beaumont, Terenure, co. Dublin. (See accompanying pedigree of Waggett, and that of Carson of Shanroe in 'M. G. et H., Vol. III., p. 156.)

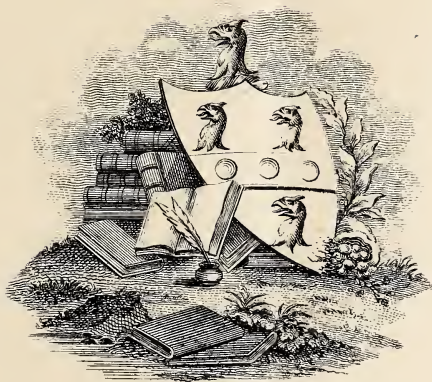
*A marble tablet with the following inscription stands affixed to the wall of the Court House, Cork :—*

“The Mayor, Sheriffs, and Commonalty of the City of Cork have erected this Tablet to perpetuate the memory of William Waggett, Esq., Q.C., their late Recorder.

“Eminently gifted with Eloquence and Genius, possessed of sound knowledge and Experience, the high and ennobling qualities of his Mind commanded the respect and the benevolent affections of his Heart secured the esteem of all within the sphere of their influence. Purity and Integrity shone conspicuous in his Judicial character. Fondly beloved as a friend, devotedly revered as a Public Functionary, he for thirty-two years ardently devoted himself to the duties of his station, and died amidst the regrets of his friends and fellow citizens 23<sup>rd</sup> November 1840.”

#### NOTE ON THE NAME OF LEADAM.

This name is a corruption, probably of very old date, of the name Leatham or Leatham. The following appear to have been variations of the same name, the soft sounds of dh and d belonging probably to the South, the harder th (but pronounced soft, as in “though” or “fathom”) to the North: Letham (Scotland and Lancashire), Lethem, Lethom, Leatham, Lathom, Latham, Leadham, Leedham, Ledham, Ledhenham, Ledenham, Ledeham, Lideham, etc. The following are examples of some of these variations of spelling:—In the Rolls of Parliament 6 Ed. I., Isabella de Hautencote presents a petition for compensation for the manor of Lideham or Ledeham, which has been taken from her. This manor of Lideham is perhaps the manor of Leadenham in Lincolnshire, mentioned in the *Abbreviatio Placitorum* temp. Ric. I., in which Alan de Bosco appears as Plaintiff in respect of land in this manor. So Browne Willis's ‘History of Cathedrals,’ vol. iii. p. 213, “Thomas Ledham or Ledhenham or Leedham held the Prebend of Louth in Lincoln Cathedral 1446–1454, and was buried in the Cathedral with this Inscription: ‘Hic jacet Thomas de Ledenham quondam Canonicus huius ecclesie.’” The Southern dh appears in the Domesday of 1282, “Robertus de Leedham tenet in Pampesworth dimid. Feodi et valet per annum et debet sect.” (Pampsford, co. Cambridge.) And in a certain Chancery suit temp. Elizabeth, Thomas Ledham and others are plaintiffs in respect of a tennis court and premises devised to them by a testator who held them by lease from the Dean and Chapter of Saint Paul's, the tennis court being near Paul's chain. On the other hand, we have in Yorkshire, 30° Elizth. (vol. iii. of the Calendar to the Pleadings in the Duchy of Lancaster), Richard Lathom, otherwise Lethom or Ledam, plaintiff, against Anthony Leathom, defendant, as to lands in Carleton, Tanshelf, and Pomfret. There was a border manor of

Letham, the Escheat Rolls of Edwd. III. mentioning Edwardus de Letham as lord of the manor of Letham and other lands in Berwick-on-Tweed. A religious house called Letham, but qu. whether in the same place, is also mentioned in vol. ii. of the Calendar to the Pleadings of the Duchy of Lancaster (22 Hen. VIII.) as a cell to the Priory of Durham. It may be added as an illustration that the names of Leatham and Latham have at some time been recognised as identical, that Mr. Leatham, the present M.P. for Huddersfield, bears the Latham and Stanley crest, the eagle and child.

The name of which, as has been said, Leatham is perhaps the oldest form is of very ancient origin. The glossary at the end of vol. ii. of Thorpe's 'Ancient Laws and Institutes of England,' under the word "Laet," which forms the first syllable of the name, is as follows:—

"Laet—Litus, Lidus, Letus. One of a class between servile and free. According to Legg. Langobard. Car. Magn. 83, equivalent with 'fiscalinus':—'Aldiones eâ lege vivant in Italiâ, in servitute dominorum suorum quâ *fiscalini vel liti* vivunt in Franciâ.' The following passages will serve to shew the distinction between litus and servus:—'Si quis servum suum tributarium aut litum fecerit.'—Lex Rip: 62. 'Inter cxx. homines, nobiles et ingenuos, similiter et litos, servam et aucillam eidem ecclesiâ tributant.'—Cap. de part. Sax. 15. 'Qui hominem ingenuum occiderit solidos cc., qui lidum solidos c., qui servum solidos l. componat.'—Cap. Car. an. 813. By the Frisic law cap. 15, the composition for a noble was eleven pounds, for a freeman five pounds six ounces; for a litus two pounds nine ounces; for a slave one pound four and a half ounces. These particulars are noticed because, according to some traditions, Kent was settled in part by Frisians. These Læti or Leti were Germans who voluntarily placed themselves under the Roman Government, and received lands (*terræ leticæ*) to cultivate, for which they probably paid rent, and were obligated to perform military service. If the enactment of Ethb. 26 be genuine, and not servilely copied from some Germanic code by the compiler of these laws, the question presents itself, at what period came this class of persons into Kent? The most obvious solution seems to be that they must have been foreigners, or their descendants settled here under the Roman Government, and that the high value set upon their lives was in consequence of their consanguinity with the Germanic conquerors of the country. See Grimm's D.R.A., pp. 305–9; Graff's Sprachschatz, vol. ii. p. 190; Eichhorn, vol. i. p. 319 (edit. 1834); Palgrave, i. p. 354."

The word "Leet" in the phrase "Court-Leet" is probably the same; and Thorpe also notices the word Læd or Lathe as a name of divisions or districts peculiar to the County of Kent. Leatham, therefore, is almost equivalent to Frankland.\*

The form of spelling the name in use by the writer and his family is, he believes, exclusively confined to them. The family of Leadam were for many generations before the close of the last century owners of land in and in the neighbourhood of Walkington, East Yorks. They probably belonged to the class of substantial yeomen, though usually described in wills and deeds as "gentlemen," and occasionally even in contrast with other parties who are described as "yeomen;" and though they seem to have retained the use of a crest, a demi-griffin proper with a feather in its beak, it was perhaps scarcely customary among yeomen proper. It happens unfortunately that the Parish Registers of Walkington were carried up to London about the year 1754 as evidence in a law suit between the Rev. Randle Hancock, then Rector of Walkington, and the Corporation of Beverley, and never returned. The present Rector, the Rev. Douglas Ferguson, to whose courtesy I am much indebted, informs me that "the books are reported to have been seen by Poulson, who was searching when busy writing his History of Beverley." I have however succeeded by the means of tombstones, wills, the transcripts (very imperfect) of the Walkington Registers, preserved in the Diocesan Registry at York, the Registers of

Land Transfers, etc., in reconstructing the pedigree as far back as one Emma Leadam, who was buried at Walkington Nov. 22, 1661. The name therefore appears not to have varied in spelling for more than two hundred years. About the beginning of the last century, one John Leadam the younger, gentleman, of Walkington, owned freeholds and copyholds in the parishes of Walkington, Heddon, Conington, Bishop Burton, Willerby, Swanland, Ebberston, and Snainton, besides land and houses in Hull. A younger branch of the paternal generation had settled in Beverley, but also owned land in Walkington. This branch, however, became extinct on the death of William Leadam "of Hull and Beverley, merchant," without issue in 1752. All present bearers of the name are, therefore, descended from John Leadam the younger, "of Walkington and Willerby, gentleman," born 1699, died 1752, and buried at Walkington. He was the father of ten children, and not long after his death the family possessions were sold, and the family dispersed. His eldest son appears to have settled at Beverley, and to have fallen into comparatively poor circumstances. His male descendants are believed to have become extinct before 1815. The last female descendant of this son married in 1815, George Fielding, Esq., Surgeon, of Hull. The second and third sons of John Leadam the younger, William and Robert Leadam, emigrated to Virginia. It is believed that some of their descendants are still existing in America, and that one of them is a surgeon or physician, and the writer would be glad to be brought into communication with them. The fourth son died young. The fifth son and tenth child, Christopher Leadam, great grandfather of the writer, came to London, and practised as a surgeon. He was the last male of the family buried at Walkington (1793). His male descendants down to and including the present eldest son, William Ward Leadam, M.D., have all been surgeons or physicians.

The family politics appear to have been Whig, if one may judge from the fact that the two brothers, John Leadam the younger of Walkington and Robert Leadam of Walkington and Beverley, both supported Fox, the first Lord Holland, in 1741.

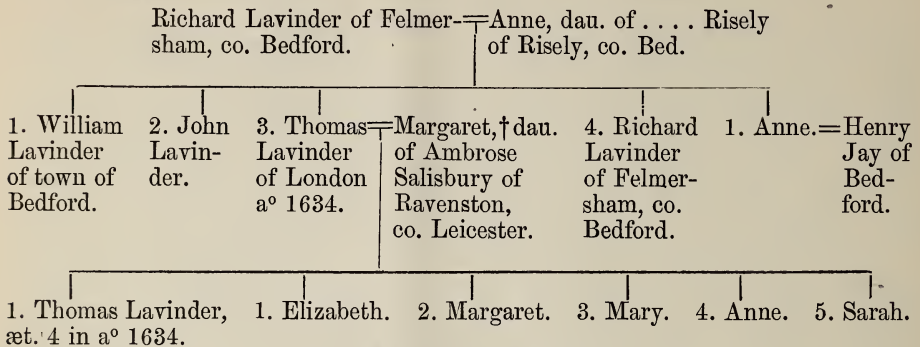

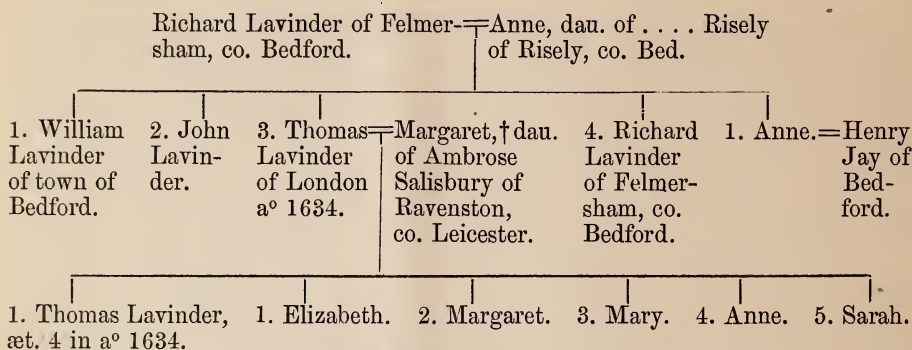

## WORDSWORTHIANA: GRASMERE CHURCHYARD.

Permit me to rescue from the mere summary of names of those to whose memory tombstones are erected in Grasmere Churchyard, four whose holders, I think, merit that their monumental inscriptions should be recorded with others, many of whom are much less worthy of the honour conferred upon them in your number for January. There are three plain slate upright stones standing side by side: on the one we read, "Gathered to the side of kindred whom in their declining years she faithfully and affectionately tended, here lies the Body of Elizabeth Satterthwaite, late of Loughrigg Holme. She died at Stanwix, near Carlisle, the 11th day of March, 1849, aged 35 years. This stone is erected in grateful remembrance of her and Elizabeth Youdell, who died at Rydal 12th Jan<sup>y</sup> 1834, aged 67 years; and of Jonathan Youdell, who died at Rydal 28th Nov. 1841, aged 79 years." This is the pair of whom Wordsworth says in 'The Excursion':—

"High in the mountain where they long have dwelt  
A wedded pair in childless solitude."

It was poor old Betty who

"Drawn from her cottage on that æry height,  
Bearing a lantern in her hand, she stood  
Or paced the ground to guide her husband home."

She was also the heroine of Southey's story of "The Terrible Knitters of Dent," given in 'The Doctor.'

The central slab is "In memory of John Carter of Loughrigg Holme, Ambleside, who died 28th January, 1863, aged 67 years. He was the confidential clerk and much valued friend of the late William Wordsworth, Esq., P.L., of Rydal Mount, with whose family he was connected by mutual ties of gratitude and sincere affection for a period of fifty years." Of him it is said in 'Wordsworth's Life,' vol. ii. p. 5, "Justice would not be done, and Wordsworth's feelings would be wronged, if his own name went down to posterity unaccompanied by that of one who served him faithfully, zealously, and efficiently for thirty-seven years, and by thus serving him as he did, conferred a benefit on the world."

How profound was the admiration inspired by the great poet in the breast of his friend is evidenced by a letter before me, dated Stanwix, April 23rd, 1850, in which he informs a correspondent of the death of Wordsworth, "The glory is departed from Israel! the good old man, our dear friend, expired at a quarter to twelve to-day."

The third slab is "In affectionate remembrance of James Dixon, born 19th July, 1797, died 4th April, 1873. He was for thirty-three years the faithful servant of Mr. and Mrs. Wordsworth of Rydal Mount, and for upwards of half a century the much valued friend of their family."

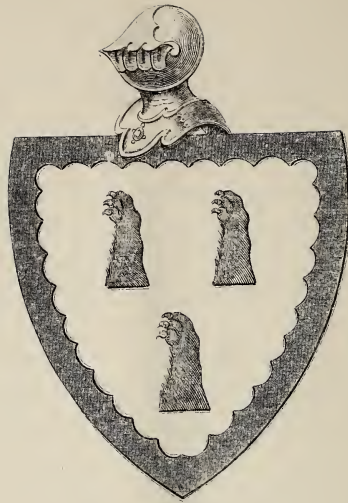
A fourth plain upright slate is "Sacred to the memory of James Greenwood of The Wyke, who died 2nd May, 1845, aged 57 years; also of Ann Greenwood, who died 12th May, 1852, aged 62 years; also of Richard Jones Greenwood, son of the above, who died in Liverpool 10th Sept. 1842, aged 17 years. Vita ut herba." James Greenwood was the friend of Wordsworth, Hartley Coleridge, and Professor Wilson. He assisted Wordsworth and Mr. Barber in planting the yew trees which flourish near their respective graves. (Works, ed. 1857, vol. vi. p. 7.) He it was for whom "The Westmoreland Girl" (Sarah Mackereth),

"fulfilling her sire's office,  
Rang alone the far-heard knell,  
Tribute, by her hand in sorrow,  
Paid to one who loved her well.

"When his spirit was departed,  
On that service she went forth;  
Nor did fail the like to render  
When his corse was laid in earth."

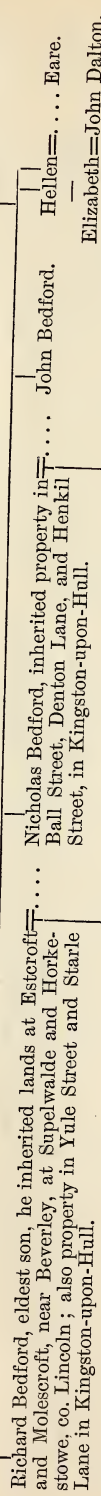
ANCIENT HERALDIC BEARINGS OF BEDFORD.—*Argent, three lions' paws couped within a bordure engrailed sable.* These arms were granted probably to one of the Bedfords of Hull previous to the establishment of the Herald's College. They have frequently been borne by later generations of the family.

ARMS OF BEDFORD OF OUGHTIBRIDGE.—*Per chevron argent and sable, four bears' paws erased, three in chief and one in base, within a bordure engrailed, all counterchanged. Quartering, 2. GRAYSON. 3. HALL. CREST.—In front of a bear's paw erased sable, holding a terrestrial globe proper, an annulet argent.*  
MOTTO.—GARE LE PIED FORT.  
(Granted Nov. 19th, 1878, to John Bedford of Birley House and Oughtibridge, and his descendants.)

John de Bedford, Sheriff of Hull in 1332 and 1333. King Edward III. passed through Hull in 1332, when he created William de la Pole a knight banneret and first Mayor of Hull, and made Stephen de Begholm and John de Bedford Sheriffs or "Bayliffs."

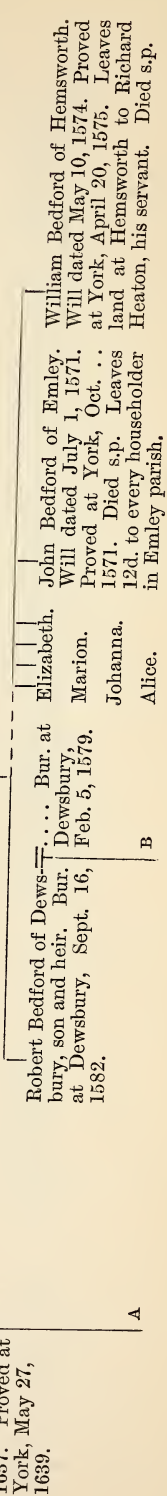


John Bedford, Mayor of Hull in 1412, 1414, 1420, 1428, 1435, and 1443. Alderman for White Fryers Ward. Possessed property in Hull. Agnes, dau. of Beverley, etc. [*vide* Ex. Reg. Prop. Bev. 1. 2, p. 78b.] Will dated Dec. 23, 1450. Proved at York, May 14, 1451. On the 18th March, Will dated Sept. 14, 1414, the King wrote to him from Kenilworth, demanding assistance from him and the principal burgesses of Hull in procuring shipping and stores to aid him in his wars with France, Scotland, and other powers. This was unanimously granted by them. Proved at York, Oct. 18, 1459.



Richard Bedford, eldest son, he inherited lands at Estcroft and Molecroft, near Beverley, at Supelwalde and Horke-stowe, co. Lincoln; also property in Yule Street and Starle Lane in Kingston-upon-Hull.

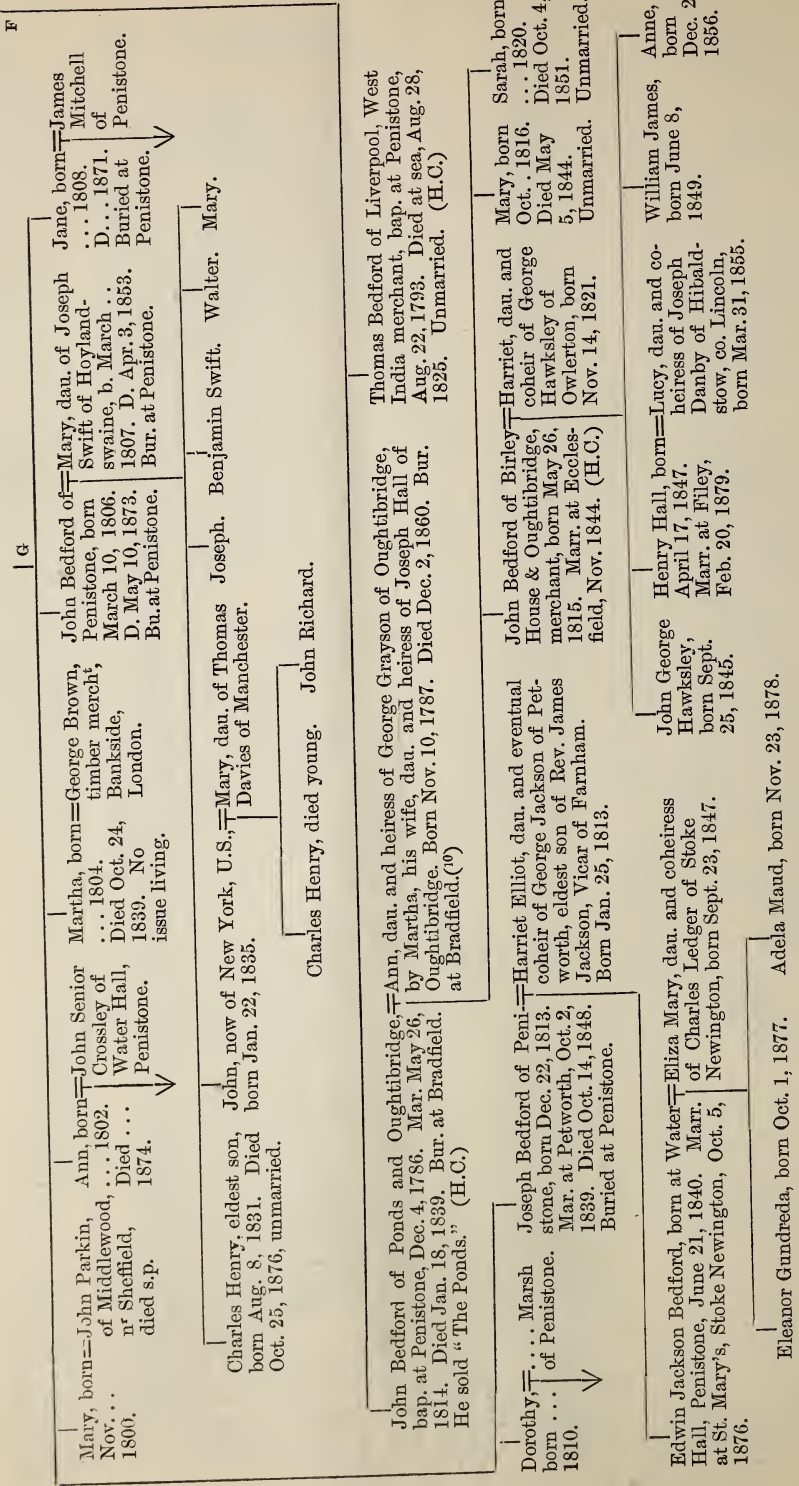

## NOTES.

(1) The above pedigree has been carefully compiled from wills, court rolls, records in the College of Arms, parish registers, family documents, and local histories. Where the letters H.C. are affixed, they denote that the names of those persons are entered at the Herald's College, though all the information here given may not be found there.

(2) There appears to be no further record of the Bedfords of Hull. Whether one of the family settled in Dewsbury or not, we have no proof. If, as is surmised, this was the case, the first John Bedford recorded as living at Dewsbury between 1480-1527 might have been the son of John Bedford of Hull, here named. The perpetuation of the name John suggests a relationship.

(3) The following is extracted from the will of William Bedford of Cridlingstubs, in com. Ebor., gent. :—" My manor and lordship of Cridlingstubs and my land at Norton to Mary Bedford, my wife, and William Savile, gent. on trust that my wife have one-third as her portion for life, the rest to my children," viz., Joshua, his eldest son, and William, his second son. He also leaves "to my younger children Thomas Bedford and Ann Bedford, each £150, to be raised out of the property above on their attaining twenty-one years of age." The seal affixed to the signature of William Bedford bears for a crest "an owl," probably the seal of William Savile, named in the will.

(4) The following are extracts from the will of John Bedford the elder, of Crownest, in the par. of Dewsbury, in com. Ebor., yeoman :—" To Alice Bedford, my wife, my house at Crownest, and a house at Dewsbury, wherein Samuel Pearson, minister, now dwelleth." "To Robert Bedford and John Bedford, my grandchildren, those two iron ranges standing in the hall and kitchen at Crownest, provided Alice my wife shall have them for her life. To Robert Bedford my son all the glasse and wainscott about Crownest and one corslett with the pike hereto belonging." "Fifty pounds to be payd to Sir John Savile, of Lupsett, knight, in truste for the use and maintenance of John Bedford, my younger son." Leaves Alice Bedford, his wife, ex'trix.

(5) Thomas Savile was great-great-grandson of Henry Savile of Thornhill and his wife Elizabeth, dau. and heiress of Sir Simon Thornhill of Thornhill, whose mother Joan was dau. of John Fitzwilliam of Emley, descended from Sir William Fitzwilliam of Emley, and his wife Ella, dau. of William, Earl of Warren and Surrey, great-grandson of William the Conqueror.

(6) There is much evidence in favour of this identity, though legal proof is as yet wanting. We find no record of John Bedford in Dewsbury after his father's death in 1636, and the first of the Bedfords of Smythey Brook, mentioned in the Thornhill Registers, bears this name. Sir John Savile, being left his trustee, it seems very probable he would place him in some farm on his estate, Smythey Brook, which is about two and half miles from Dewsbury, being then the property of the Saviles, as it is at the present time. We also find his nephew, Robert Bedford of Crownest, married one of the Riches of Bull House, in par. of Penistone, and Robert, grandson of John, of Smythey Brook, places his son John in the "Ponds Farm," near Penistone, previously in the possession of Josias Rich, a descendant of the Bull House family. This would suggest a family connection, and account for the settlement of John Bedford, last named, in the bleak district of "the Ponds." It is also worthy of notice that the family names of John and Robert were still retained almost exclusively for several generations, the name of John being still common in the family.

(7) For a complete account of these charities, see Greenwood's 'History of Dewsbury.' They were for building a schoolhouse and educating fifty poor children.

(8) A deed signed by Robert Bedford, dated April 23, 1702, and in the possession of the compiler of this pedigree, gives full particulars of the property comprised in the Crownest estate.

(9) The communion plate in the Parish Church at Dewsbury was presented by John Bedford of Thornhill Briggs. He probably died about 1730, when his elder brother Thomas became the last of the family living at Dewsbury.

(10) There is a pedigree of the family of Hall of Oughtibridge recorded in the Herald's College, commencing in the sixteenth century.

VINCENT.—Thomas Vincent, J.P. for co. Surrey, Alderman of London, married Joanna, dau. of Thomas Burgess. She died 1654, and was buried at Camberwell, having been married twenty years. They had five sons and nine daughters. The sons appear to have died young; of the daughters, Elizabeth married Richard, Lord Blayney, Sarah married George Blount, another married Jeffrey Paul.

In Playfair's 'Irish Baronetage,' Barbara, wife of Thomas Esmonde, is said to be a daughter of the above-named Thomas Vincent, and a sister of Alderman Vincent of Limerick. I think there is a mistake here.

Thomas Vincent was High Sheriff of Meath 1656; M.P. for Monaghan 1661; died 1666. After the death of his wife Joanna, he appears to have married secondly Elizabeth? He mentions in his will an only son Nathaniel, who I suppose was grandfather to Richard Vincent of New Abbey, M.P. for Clogher, 1733.

I want to find out the connection of these Vincents and Alderman John Vincent, Sheriff of Limerick 1696, and Mayor 1703 and 1727.—W. C. VINCENT.

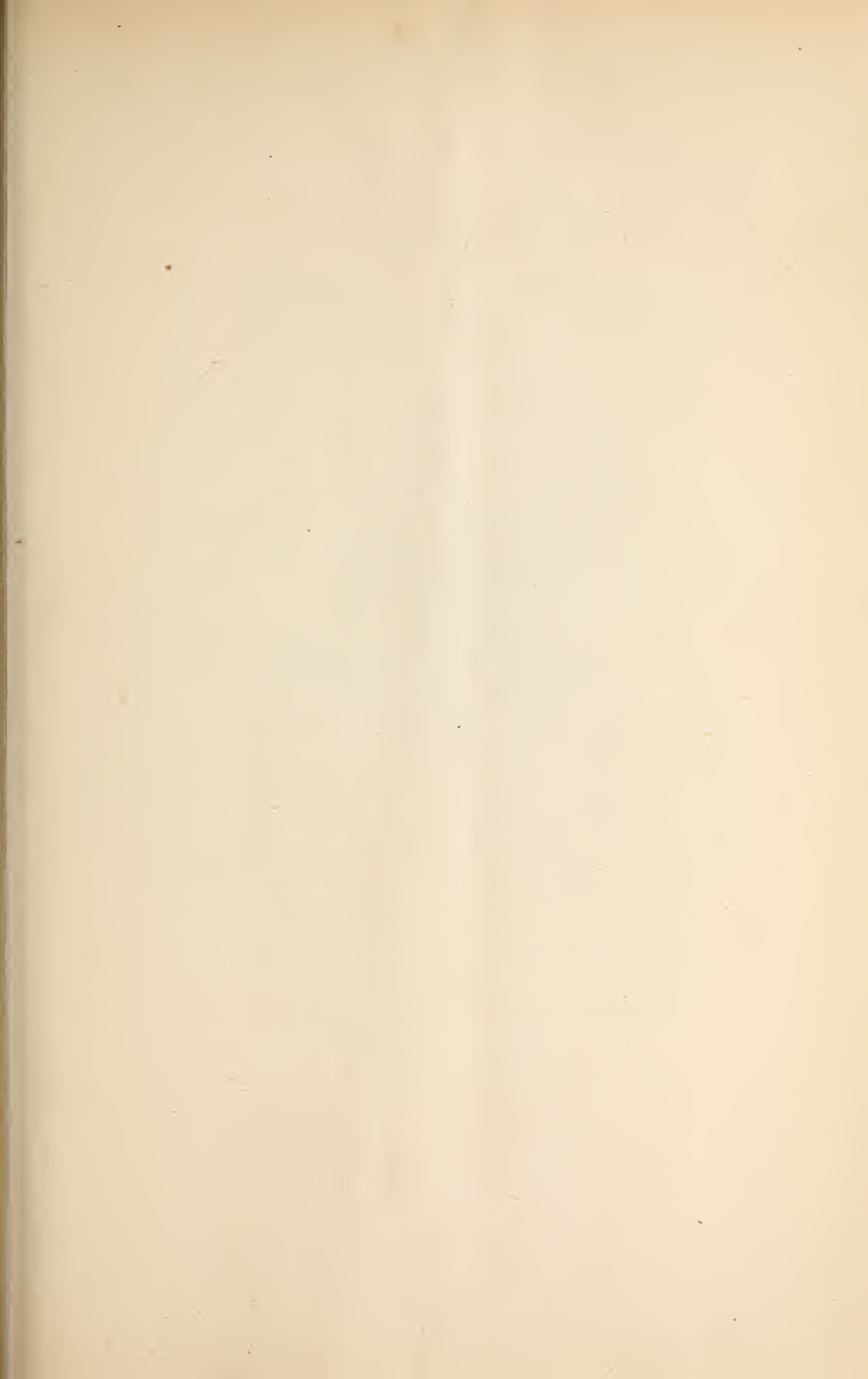

## THE DENNYs,

EARLS OF NORWICH, BARONS DENNY OF WALTHAM, AND  
BARONETS OF IRELAND.*(Continued from page 160.)*

Edward Denny was returned M.P. for Kerry in 1692 and in 1695 (his cousin Barry being High Sheriff of the County in the latter year) and died in 1712, leaving issue one son, Edward, and eight daughters, *viz.*, Anne, Ellen, and Alice, died young; Angel and Anne, died unmarried; Catherine, married William Sprigg, Esq., of Clenvoe, King's County, M.P. for Tralee in 1723; Mary, married Thomas Crosbie, Esq.; and Jane, married in 1713 her cousin John Blennerhassett, Esq., of Ballyseedy, heir by survival to his brother Arthur, who died as before mentioned in 1686.

Edward Denny, the brother of these eight sisters, had married in 1699 Lady Letitia Coningsby, daughter of Thomas, Earl Coningsby. The following entries, the next in order on the fly-leaves of the old Bible, are in the writing of the Rev. W. Stanford:—

“October 3<sup>d</sup> 1700. Madam Letitia Denny y<sup>e</sup> daughter of y<sup>e</sup> Right Honble. Thomas, Lord Coningsby, made her entry here with divers Gentlemenn of Quality, and about three hundred Horsemenn of y<sup>e</sup> Tenants, and she and her Husband were received with much Joye in y<sup>e</sup> Castell of Tralye by their father, Colonel Edward Denny and their mother Madam Denny, and by all y<sup>e</sup> noble Relations.”

“8<sup>th</sup> June, 1701. Y<sup>e</sup> younge Ladye Letitia Denny was brought to bed of a Daughter, about one of y<sup>e</sup> Clocke in y<sup>e</sup> Morning, being Sundaye, who that Afternoon was Christened by Dean John Richards and named Frances Lucia. Godfathers Thomas Lord Coningsby (presented by M<sup>r</sup> Barry Denny) and Colonel Edward Denny, Godmothers y<sup>e</sup> Ladye Wharton (presented by M<sup>rs</sup> Mary Denny) and y<sup>e</sup> Lady Coningsby by Miss Ursula Coningsby.”

Edward Denny represented the county of Kerry in Parliament from 1703 until 1713, and in 1715 was returned for the borough of Askeaton. He died in 1727, leaving issue by his wife Lady Letitia, with the daughter Lucia Frances above-mentioned (who married Arthur, younger son of John Blennerhassett, Esq., of Ballyseedy, and had no issue), seven sons and three daughters, *viz.*: 1. Edward, High Sheriff of Kerry in 1723, died unmarried *vitâ patris*; 2. Arthur, heir by survival; 3. Thomas, died young; 4. Thomas, who succeeded his brother Arthur;

5. Barry, in Holy Orders, Treasurer of the Cathedral Church of Ardfert (married his cousin Jane, daughter of the Reverend Maurice O'Connor, *v. ante* page 115), and died in September, 1751, leaving two daughters and four sons, viz., Arthur and Barry, of whom hereafter, as successors to their cousins; Edward (*a*) and Maynard (*b*); Ursula (*c*) and Arabella (*d*); 6. William, died young; 7. George, died young; 8. Lucia Frances above-mentioned; 9. Mary, died young; 10. Barbara, died young. On the death of Edward Denny in 1727, he was succeeded by his son Arthur above-mentioned, who was chosen M.P. for Kerry in the same year. He married, in August, 1725, the Lady Arabella Fitz-Maurice, second dau. of the Earl of Kerry by Lady Anne Petty, sister of the Earl of Shelburne, and died *s. p.* in 1742. His widow, Lady Arabella Denny, survived him a half-century, and then passed away, honoured and lamented by thousands, on the 18th of March, 1792, at the great age of eighty-four, preserving her clear intellect to the last. Like her husband's ancestress, Joan Champernoun, the protectress of the martyred Anne Askew (*v. ante*, p. 74), Lady Arabella Denny was no less distinguished by her ancient lineage than by her deep piety and Christian benevolence. She founded the Magdalen Asylum in Leeson Street, Dublin, and an almshouse in Tralee, and was throughout her long life the supporter and patroness of innumerable good works in different parts of Ireland. The Corporations of Dublin and Cork presented her with the freedom of their cities for her exertions on behalf of their workhouses, hospitals, and schools. Her husband, who freely supported all her generous plans, and provided her with the large sums necessary for carrying them out, was succeeded in the estates by his next brother Thomas Denny, before mentioned, who was knighted by the Duke of Devonshire, the Viceroy of Ireland, in 1743. Sir Thomas Denny took up again the broken thread of the family history in the old diary, and wrote as follows:—

“I was marry'd the 13th of 9ber, 1740, to my Cousin Agnes Blennerhassett, daughter of John Blennerhassett of Ballyshedee. (*e*)

“THOMAS DENNY.

“I had a son born y<sup>e</sup> 10th of 7ber, 1741, called Thomas Coningsby, he died at about six weekes old.

“My second son Anthony Arthur, was born y<sup>e</sup> 16th of 7ber, 1742, at three o'clock in the afternoon; his godfathers, William, Earl of Kerry, (*f*) and my cousin Thomas, Lord Southwell, (*g*) his godmother the Lady Arabella Denny my sister-in-law.

“My daughter Letitia Denny was born y<sup>e</sup> 6th of October, 1743.

“My third son William Denny was born y<sup>e</sup> 23rd of January, 1744-5, at Prospect Hall. (*h*)

“My fourth son Thomas was born y<sup>e</sup> 25th of June, 1746, at Prospect Hall.

“My fifth son Thomas was born at Prospect Hall, y<sup>e</sup> 6th of July, at one o'clock in y<sup>e</sup> morning, 1747, his godfathers the Lord Kenmare, and Rowland Bateman, Esq<sup>r</sup>, his godmothers my cousin Helena Hedges Eyre, (*i*) and my Aunt Maynard.

“My daughter Jane Denny was born y<sup>e</sup> 28th of August on Sunday morning at 8 o'clock, 1748, her godfathers Sir Maurice Crosbie, and my father-in-law, her godmothers my sisters Denny and Ponsonby.

“My daughter Mary Denny was born at eight o'clock on Thursday morning y<sup>e</sup> 20th of July, 1749.

“My sixth son Robert Maynard Denny was born in Aungier Street, Dublin, the 2nd of January, 1750-1, in the morning, his godfather my cousin Robert Maynard, Esq<sup>r</sup> of Hammersmith, and Arthur Crosbie, Esq<sup>r</sup>, his godmother my Aunt Catherine Sprigg, he dyed in Dublin the fourth of March, 1752 (new stile), and was buried in St. Peter's Churchyard. God preserve y<sup>e</sup> rest to me.

“My daughter Frances was born y<sup>e</sup> 28th of March, 1752, and dyed at nine days old.

“My seventh son Edward Denny was born y<sup>e</sup> 9th of May, new stile, 1753.”

This is the last entry in the old diary begun in 1625. Sir Thomas Denny died in 1761. Two only of his seven sons, William and Thomas, and two daughters, Letitia (*j*) and Jane, survived him.

(a) Edward Denny, third son of the Reverend Barry Denny, by his wife Jane O'Connor, married Mary, daughter of . . . Rind, Esq., of Fermanagh, and had issue Edward, died unmarried; Anthony, married his cousin Frances Blennerhassett, and had issue two sons and one daughter, viz.: 1. Edward, an officer in the 3rd Buffs, married his first cousin Georgina, daughter of Arthur Blennerhassett, Esq., of Ballyseedy, and had issue, Anthony, an officer in the 71st regiment, who married Sarah, daughter of Rev. J. Lockwood and had issue, living in 1868, three sons, Edward, Anthony, and Arthur. 2. William, Colonel in the 71st regiment, married Everetta, dau. of the Hon. J. Richardson, of Montreal. 3. Mary, married Charles O'Malley, Q.C., of Hawthorn Lodge, co. Mayo, and had issue.

(b) Maynard Denny was in Holy Orders and Rector of Church Hill, near Tralee. He married Penelope, daughter of Anthony Stoughton, Esq., of Rattoo, co. Kerry, high sheriff of that county in 1747, great grandson of Anthony Stoughton and Honora O'Brien, daughter of Lord Inchiquin (*v. ante* p. 160), and had issue five sons and four daughters, viz.: 1. Barry, in Holy Orders, Rector of Church Hill, married Helen, daughter of Richard Townshend Herbert, Esq., of Cahirane, and had four sons and two daughters, viz.: Maynard; Richard, major in the 58th regiment, died unmarried; Barry, in Holy Orders, died unmarried; Arthur, married, and has no issue; Penelope, married . . . Delmege, Esq.; and Helena, died unmarried. 2. Thomas, died unmarried. 3. Anthony, married Patience Mary, daughter and co-heiress of Admiral Lord Collingwood, and had issue two sons and one daughter, viz.: Collingwood, of Barham Wood, Herts, married and has issue a son and daughter: Arthur, married his first cousin Penelope Herbert of Cahirane, and has issue a daughter, and two sons officers in the army: Sarah Blackett, only daughter of Anthony Denny, and his wife the Hon. Sarah Collingwood, married Sir John Stephen Robinson, Bart., of Rokeby Hall, co. Louth, and has issue. 4. Edward Maynard, in Holy Orders, Rector of Listowel, married first Millicent Blennerhassett, and had issue an only daughter Penelope (married Richard, younger son of Sir Richard O'Donnell Bart.); secondly, Jane, daughter of Townsend Gun, Esq., of Rattoo, co. Kerry, and had issue two sons, Maynard, now in Australia; William, an officer in the Royal Artillery; and a daughter. 5. Arthur, an officer in the army, died unmarried. 6. Elizabeth, married Captain Robert Steers, of Yorkshire, and had issue. 7. Jane, married Rev. Arthur Herbert, of Cahirane, and had issue several sons and a daughter, married her cousin Arthur Denny as above mentioned. 8. Arabella, married Francis Chute, Esq., of Chute Hall, co. Kerry, and had issue two sons, Francis, died unmarried; Arthur; Penelope, died unmarried, and Arabella. 9. Penelope, youngest daughter of the Rev. Maynard Denny and his wife Penelope Stoughton, died unmarried.

(c) Ursula Denny married Samuel Morris, Esq., of Ballybeggan, co. Kerry, great grandson of Samuel Morris, of same place, by his wife Elizabeth Southwell, daughter of Richard Southwell of Callow (son of Sir Richard Southwell, Bart., of Barham Hall, Suffolk, and Court Mattrass, co. Limerick), M.P. for Askeaton in 1661, by his wife Lady Elizabeth O'Brien, dau. of the Earl of Inchiquin. Ursula Denny and Samuel Morris had issue, with an elder son Samuel, who married Sarah dau. of Townsend Gun, Esq. (and had issue two sons, Maynard and Townsend, an officer in the army, who both died *s. p.*), and four daughters, Georgina, married Capt. De Ruvigny, Sarah and Jane, died unmarried, and Elizabeth, married Rev. . . . Davis), a younger son George, Colonel in the 3rd Regiment, K.C.B., Usher of the Black Rod, Dublin Castle, who married and left an only child, Theodosia.

(d) Arabella Denny married George Gun, Esq., and had, with a son Barry, whose only son George died *s. p.*, two daughters, Jane, married Capt. Cashel, and secondly, William Hickman, Esq., and Arabella, married John Watts, Esq., and had issue.

(e) This is the true Irish pronunciation of the name of the Blennerhassett's estate and residence in Kerry. The meaning of the word is the place or abode of the fairies, *sidhe* (sheedy) being the Irish name for those imaginary creatures. The Blennerhassetts came hither from Flimby, in Cumberland, in 1587, and one of the old divisions or farms of their Irish estate bears the name of Flimby in remembrance of their English home before that date.

(f) William Earl of Kerry, the brother of Lady Arabella Denny.

(g) Thomas third Baron and first Viscount Southwell, son of the second Baron by Mary dau. of Thomas Coke, Esq., of Melbourne, co. Derby, and grandson of the first Baron, who had married Lady Meliora Coningsby, dau. of Thomas Lord Coningsby and sister of Lady Letitia Denny.

(h) Prospect Hall, of which no trace now remains, stood on the shore of the lower Lake of Killarney. Dr. Smith, writing in 1759, notices the exquisite view of the lake from this Hall, then occupied by a Mr. Supple.

(i) Helena, dau. of Edward Herbert of Kilcow, Esq., and his wife Frances, dau. of Nicholas Brown, Viscount Kenmare, married Richard Hedges Eyre, Esq., of Macroom Castle (grandson maternally of Edward Eyre, Esq., of Galway, by Jane, dau. of Sir William Maynard, Bart.), and had with other issue two daughters, Frances, who married Simon White, Esq., and by him was mother of the first Earl of Bantry, and Helena, married the Rev. George Maunsell, D.D., Dean of Leighlin. The last-mentioned lady must have been the godmother of the son of Sir Thomas Denny, who was her cousin through his Maynard ancestors.

(j) Letitia Denny married Rowland Bateman, Esq., of Oak Park, co. Kerry, High Sheriff of same county in 1759, and had by him an elder son, who married his first cousin, Arabella dau. of Sir Barry Denny, Bart., as hereafter mentioned.

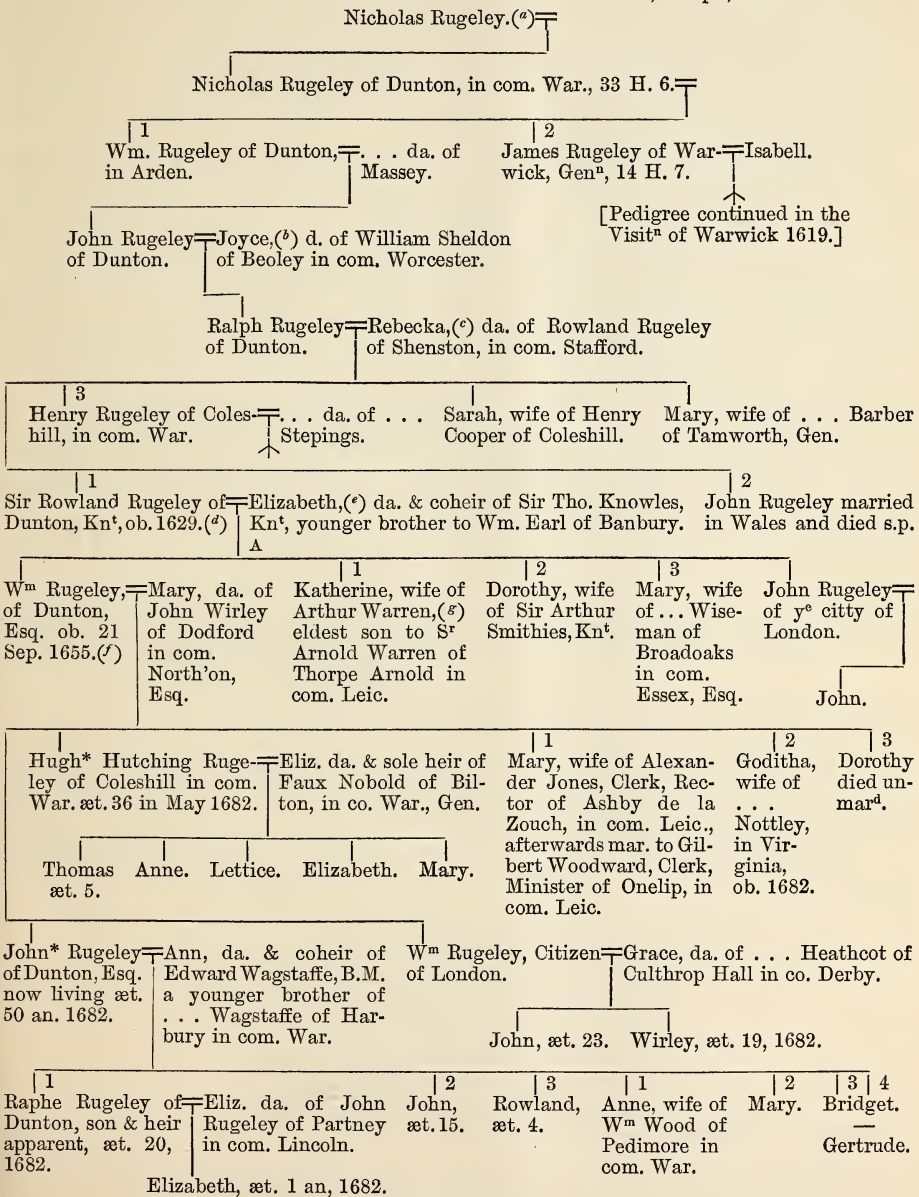

(<sup>c</sup>) He was of Hawkesheard, co. Stafford, 10 Hen. V., and married Edith, da. of . . . Waldief, by whom he had three sons—(1) Nicholas, who continued the line, (2) William, living 20 Ed. IV. and (3) Thomas, whose only da. and heir Edith married Richard Thickness of Sutton Cheney (see note, page 318, to Harwood's edition of Erdeswick's 'Survey of Staffordshire,' 1820). According to Erdeswick (page 171 *ibidem*), Humphrey Rugeley was owner of Hawkesharde, temp. Ed. III. who has issue Thomas, who had issue Nicholas, who lived 7 Hen. VI., etc.

(<sup>b</sup>) She was the da. of Ralph (not of *William*) Sheldon of Beoley and Aberton, co. Worcester, by Philippa, da. and coheir of Baldwin Heath of Foordhall in Wootton. She married 30 Nov., 1542, at Beoley, and is mentioned in her father's will, proved 1646, together with her husband. After his death she married Thomas Baskerville of Curdworth. These facts are correctly recorded in the pedigree of Sheldon, entered at the College of Arms in "Norfolk vj."

(<sup>c</sup>) Her mother was Ellen, da. and heir of James Thirkald of Smallwood, co. Stafford, by Jane, da. of Sir Lewis Bagot, Knt. Her brother, William Rugeley of Shenston, entered his pedigree in the Heralds' Visitation of the County of Stafford in 1583, being then the father of ten children. Shenstone Hall was built by the Rugeleys, from whom it passed to the Brandreths, who, temp. Queen Anne, sold it to Samuel Hill.

(<sup>d</sup>) He was knighted in Ireland by the Lord Deputy (Arthur Chichester, Lord Belfast) on 5 Nov., 1614. Admon. of his goods in C.P.C., wherein he is described as Sir Rowland Ridgeley, late of Clongham, co. Carmarthen, was granted 7 Oct., 1629, to Humphrey Bracebridge, "consanguineo." during the minority of his children, Lettice, Odiley, Catherine, Isabel, George, Penelope, Devereux, Dorothy, John, and Mary.

(<sup>e</sup>) She was married 20 Dec., 1604, at St. Clement Danes, Westminster, and must have died before 1629, in her husband's lifetime. Of her father, Sir Thomas Knollys, little is known, excepting that he was a mourner at the funeral of his father in Aug. 1596, and that he married Odelia, da. and heir of John de Marada, Margrave of Bergen op Zoon (a scion of the house of Nassau, and uncle to the Prince of Orange), by Maria, da. and heir of Anthony, Margrave of Bergen op Zoon, in Brabant.

(<sup>f</sup>) He was probably twenty-four at his father's death, in 1629, at all events he was of full age, as he is not mentioned among the minor children of his father, in the admon. of 1629.

(<sup>g</sup>) Arthur Warren, or Waring, born 18 Jan. and bap. 3 Feb., 1617, at Thorpe Arnold, co. Leicester, died at St. James's, Clerkenwell, and was buried at St. Marylebone, 26 Nov., 1678. His wife had died before him. Their son, another Arthur Warren, was of Stapleford, Notts, and (by his wife, the coheir of the family of Borlase, Barts.) was great-grandfather of Admiral the Right Hon. Sir John Borlase Warren, Bart., K.B., etc.

### *On Monuments in the Church:—*

1. Near this place were interred the bodies of Mr John Tufhill Three times Mayor of this Corporation and Grace his Wife, He died 30<sup>th</sup> Dec<sup>r</sup> 1716 aged 63 years, She died y<sup>e</sup> 10<sup>th</sup> November 1712 aged 54 years.

2. M.S. Thomas Welsh Gent. interred Dec<sup>r</sup> 13<sup>th</sup> A.D. 1675 ætatis suæ 58. Also William Welsh Gent. his beloved son interred Oct<sup>r</sup> 30<sup>th</sup> A.D. 1691 ætatis suæ 22.

Who living was a true epitome,  
Of Virtue, candour, ingenuitie,  
Whose Generous soul to charitie inclined,  
Courteous he was and of a pious mind  
His body near this marble, *and*  
His pious soul resigned into God's hand  
Now with the quire of angels sings  
Sweet Hallelulias to the King of Kings.

ARMS.—Az., six mullets or, 3, 2, and 1.

3. To the memory of Richard Chapman of this parish Gentleman who departed this life the 29<sup>th</sup> day of April 1790 aged 49, Also of Elizabeth Chapman daughter of the said Richard Chapman who departed this life the 23<sup>rd</sup> day of September 1784 aged 16 years and of Mary Chapman Wife of the said Richard Chapman who departed this life the 20<sup>th</sup> March 1824 aged 83, Also of Adden son of the above

named Richard and Mary Chapman who died the 19<sup>th</sup> Jan<sup>y</sup> 1745 aged 79 and of Sarah his wife who died the 6<sup>th</sup> September 1814 aged 38 years.

ARMS.—*Party per chev. ar. and gules, a crescent counterchanged, on a canton of the second, three fleurs-de-lis or; all within a bordure gobonated ar. and az.*

4. Near this place in hopes of a blessed resurrection lie the remains of the Reverend Elias Robotier who was rector of this parish 42 years and died the 19<sup>th</sup> December 1765 aged 88 years. He was born at St John de Gardonenque in the Cevennes in the province of Languedock and during the great persecution of protestants in France fled from that place and left his family fortune and friends to seek after the most pure and reformed religion of the Church of England. He followed his studies for some time in Greece, Holland, and Germany, and after enduring many hardships and vicissitudes of fortune he came to England where he was by that great and good Prelate George Hooper Lord Bishop of Bath and Wells taken into his palace as chaplain and promoted to many favours in the Church by his Lordship. Here also lyeth the Remains of Elizabeth the Wife of the said Elias Robotier who died the 20<sup>th</sup> February 1766 aged 74 years.

5. In the Chancel of this Church are deposited the remains of Solomon Pain Gentleman Born 28<sup>th</sup> October 1761. Died 18<sup>th</sup> October 1836. Ursula his Wife born 26 July 1761 died 11<sup>th</sup> April 1840, and Amy Ann their daughter Born 16 January 1787 died 1<sup>st</sup> February 1818. This monument is erected to their beloved memory as a Tribute of affection by their surviving children.

ARMS.—*Gules, three crosses botonnée, on a chief ar. two escallops.*

6. To the Memory of Mary Tratham who lived 40 years a faithful servant in the family of Thomas Prowse Esq<sup>re</sup>. She had the care of Mr John Prowse in his infancy and by her own desire is buried near him, She died 20 March 1776 in the 74<sup>th</sup> year of her age.

7. In a vault near this place are deposited the remains of Levi West Gent. Attorney at Law who departed this life January 13<sup>th</sup> 1797 aged 36, Also of Sarah Wife of the above named Levi West who departed this life 2<sup>nd</sup> Feb<sup>y</sup> 1799 aged 48 years, This Tablet is erected by Sarah Matilda Coombe\* their daughter, as a Tribute of affection and respect to perpetuate the memory of her beloved parents.

ARMS.—*Erm. a bend indented sable.*

CREST.—*A lion rampant sable.*

8. Sacred to the memory of Peter Fry† of Compton House Esq<sup>re</sup> who departed this life on the 19<sup>th</sup> Dec<sup>r</sup> 1846 aged 78 Also of Joanna his Wife who died on the same day aged 79 Also of their children Frederick Yeatman Fry who died on the 15 October 1819 aged 21 years, Fanny Fry on the 22 June 1845 aged 43 years, James Henry Fry on the 26 Nov<sup>r</sup> 1825 aged 22 years, Charlotte Fry on the 14 January 1832 aged 27 years, Katherine Long Rosetta Fry on the 3<sup>rd</sup> Dec<sup>r</sup> 1822 aged 15 years.

ARMS.—*Vert, three horses courant.*

CREST.—*An arm embowed in armour, holding a dagger enfiled by a Moor's head.*

9. In Memory of Peter Wickens Fry Esq<sup>re</sup> of Montague Street, Russell Square, London‡ Eldest Son of Peter Fry Esq<sup>re</sup> of Compton House Axbridge died on the 29<sup>th</sup> August 1860 aged 65 years.

\* Of the family of Coombe of North Petherton, co. Somerset. Levi West was Town Clerk of Axbridge.

† In Winscombe Church, co. Somerset, there is a monument to his ancestor, John Fry and Ann his Wife. She died 20th August, 1745, in the 37th year of her age; he died the 13th August, 1774, in the 73rd year of his age. William, their eldest son, died Sept. 4th, 1775, in the 46th year of his age.

‡ In Compton Bishop Church, co. Somerset, there is a monument erected to the memory of another son, Charles Edward Fry of Compton House, Esq., who died 6 Nov., 1867. Mary Morris, his wife, died 2nd Feb., 1864. Peter William, their eldest son, died 23rd Aug., 1871. Arthur Robert, their youngest son, died March, 1867. Bruges Fry, another son of Peter Fry, died 23rd Sept., 1865, and buried in Axbridge Churchyard. Thomas Homfray Fry, last surviving son, died 20th Nov., 1878, aged 78, buried at Winscombe.

In memory of M<sup>r</sup> Thomas Ashburner of Lawrence Pountney Lane died 24<sup>th</sup> of Octo<sup>r</sup> 1747, aged 47 years. Also Dor<sup>y</sup> Ashburner of Cannon Street wife of the above said Tho<sup>s</sup> Ashburner died 8<sup>th</sup> of Sep<sup>r</sup> 1765, aged 57 years. Also John Butterworth who died 5 of Nov. 1772, aged 3 years & 4 months. He was born May 18, 1664, and was summoned to take the oath of allegiance to King George, June 15, 1722. This Rev. 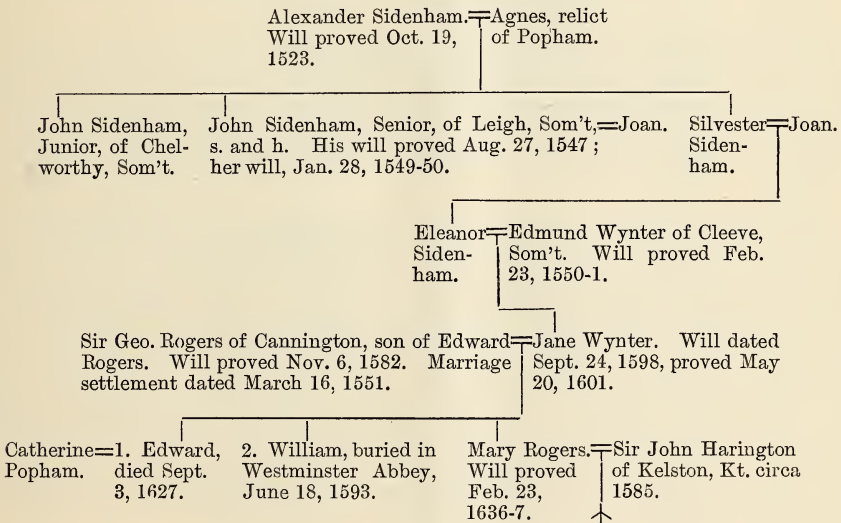

[N.B.—For much of the filling up in precise detail of the above illustrative pedigree, the writer on the Haringtons of Somerset acknowledges with sincere thanks his indebtedness to the Rev. Frederick Brown, F.S.A., whose stores of Somerset genealogy are very rich, and are often opened for the benefit of others with great liberality.]

\* Francis Harington received a bequest, under the will of his sister-in-law, Dame Mary Harington (proved 1636), widow of Sir John, K<sup>t</sup> (who died 1612), of all her "interest in a Lease of Fieldgrove in the Parish of Bitton." Though we do not know the date of this gentleman's birth, yet, since his eldest brother John was born 1561, as we gather from his entrance at College, we may fairly assume that he was born about 1563, and would therefore be about 70 years of age (not younger) when he received this bequest. We are not, therefore, surprised to find from the date of burial that he did not long enjoy it. His history has always been unknown, and hitherto no register of him discovered. I am glad to be able to set it now before the public.—F. J. P.

‡ This gentleman was son of Francis Harington, the brother of Sir John, K<sup>t</sup>, by Mary, daughter of Antony Stocker, Esq., of Chilcompton, and Margaret Capel his wife. He resided at Weymouth (Melcombe Regis), co. Dorset, and probably died there, though brought to rest with his wife and her relatives at Chilcompton. He left an only son John, matriculated at Trin. Coll. Oxford, 10th July, 1668, about whom more information is earnestly desired.

A letter (not before published) from Sir John Harington, Knt., to his mother-in-law, the Lady Jane Rogers, on presenting her with his "Orlando Furioso."

"To the Right Virtuous and kind Mother-in-law The Ladie Jane Rogers.

"Madam,—I have sent you my long promised Orlando, and that it may properly belonge to you and your heire female, I have added to it as many of the toyes I have formerly written to you and your daughter, as I could collect out of my scattered papers, supposing (though you have seene some of them long since) that now to review them againe and remember the kynde and sometimes unkynde occasions on which some of them were written will not be unpleasant: and because there was spare room I have added a few others that were showed to our Sovereigne Lady, and some that I durst never show any ladie,\* but you two. And so wishing you to lock me up as safe in your love, as I know you will lay up this booke safe in your chest, I commend me to you.

NATHANIEL MAXEY.—Can any of your readers afford me any information as to the direct ancestors of this gentleman? He was a merchant in London, and married the daughter of Sir Rowland Crispe, by whom he had issue two daughters, Martha, married to Elwes Robinson, and who died in 1726 without issue; and Mary, who died in 1770, having married James Pattison of Congleton and London, by whom she left issue. Nathaniel Maxey had a brother Joseph Maxey, and a sister Martha, married to John Bockett. Joseph Maxey had two sons, William Seele Maxey and Nathaniel Edward Maxey, and a daughter Mary, wife of Samuel Bridgeman. Nathaniel Maxey bore the same arms as the Maxeys of Salinghall, co. Essex, and is believed to have been an offshoot of that family. He died in 1708. Any information regarding the ancestors of Nathaniel Maxey, or of his son-in-law James Pattison, would be acceptable.

THE LEIGH PEERAGE.—In 'Notes and Queries,' vol. v., March 26, 1870, page 316, appeared the following query:—

"BARON LEIGH.—Can any of your readers furnish me with the date and place of the marriage of Thomas, second Baron Leigh, with the daughter of Lord Rockingham? It took place somewhere about the year 1680. Also any information respecting Thomas, eldest son of the said second Baron, who was baptized at Stoneleigh, March 10, 1682, and is usually stated to have died young, but of whom it was proved on the trial of the Leigh peerage case before the House of Lords in 1828, that no register of his burial could be found. It is strongly suspected that he survived many years, and even outlived his father."

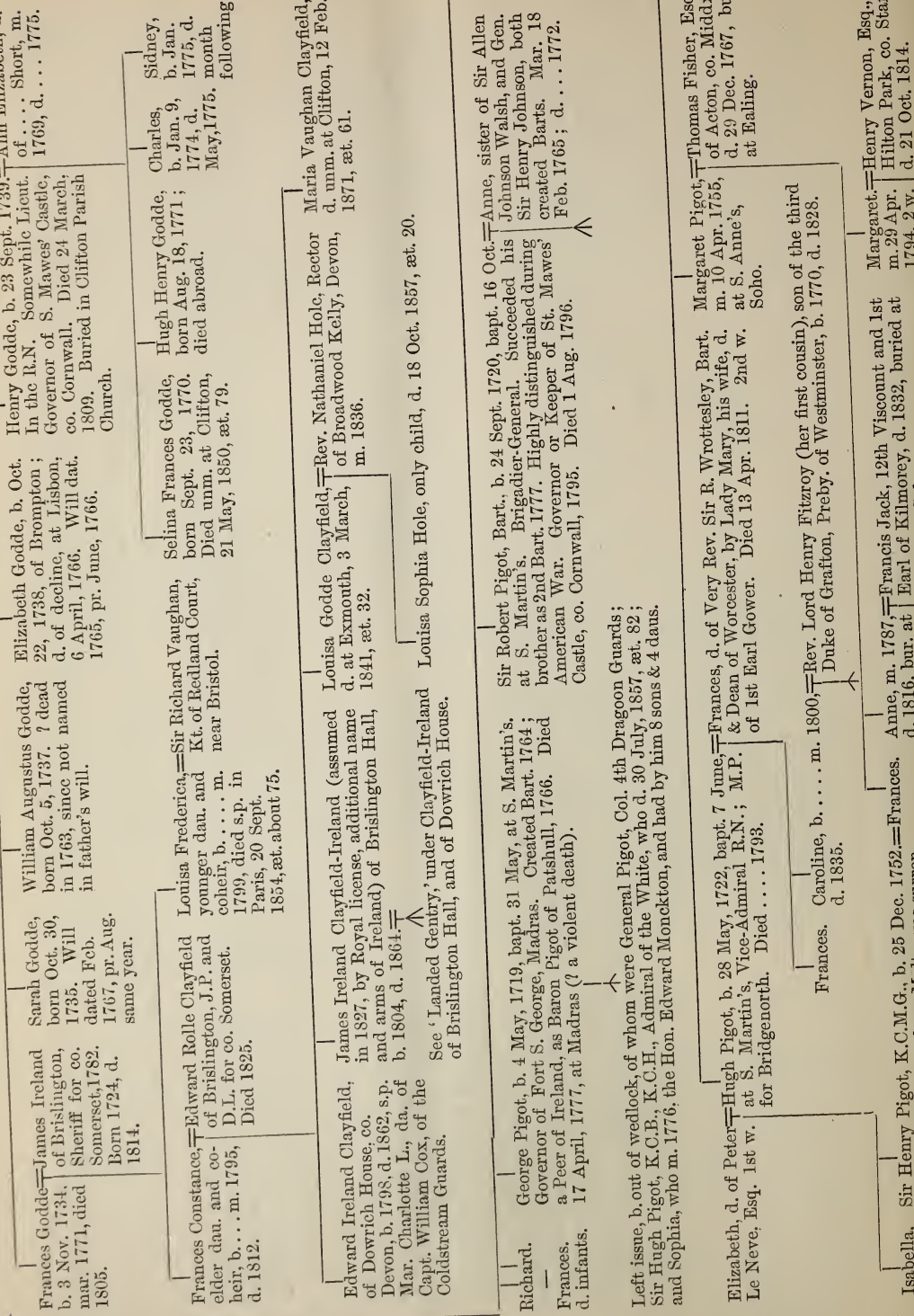

\* The said Catharine Ellis was bur. at Lamberhurst April 10, 1695. She had issue by her said husband 1 son and 2 dau'rs, bapt. at Goudhurst; but there is reason to believe she had other children previously bapt. elsewhere. She was not married at Lamberhurst. Tho. Cayley of Heathfield, co. Sussex, yeo. (brother of the aforesaid Edward Cayley), made his will 21 Feb. 1692 (Coker, 39), being "aged, weak, and infirm." 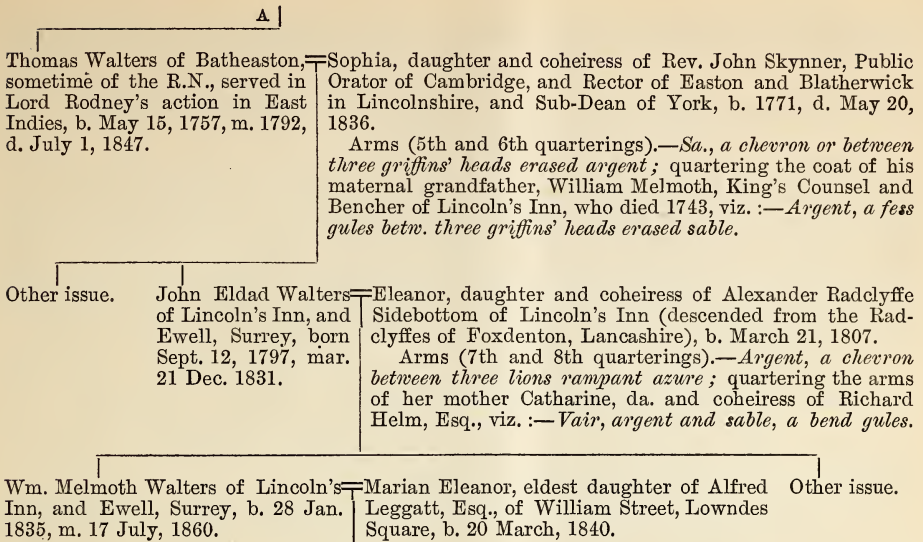

## ABSTRACT OF WILLS RELATING TO THE FAMILY OF HARINGTON.

*(Continued from page 220.)*

Summary of the Will of Lady Jane Rogers, of Cannington, Somerset.

Dated 24 Sept. 1598. G. C. P. (Montague 13).

Francis, son of Edward Rogers,\* Esq. to have the manor of Bodmin; he not to alienate it for more than three lives, etc.; if he do, or if he die without lawful issue, then the said manor to go to George Harington, son of John Harington, Esq., and his heirs male; and if he alienate, etc., then to James, another son of the said John Harington; if he should alienate, etc., then to George Rogers, another son of said Edward Rogers; and if he alienate, etc., or die issueless, then to testatrix heirs for ever. Said manor of Bodmin charged with £200 to each of the five daughters of said Edward Rogers.

To John Harington, my godson, son of John, Esq., the manor of Trebarveth, in parish of Tyndagell, and his heirs male, but not to alienate; otherwise to go to said Geo. Rogers. This manor, charged with "one hundred and three score pounds, to the Four Dau'rs of said John Harington—Fraunces, Jane, Ellen, Elizabeth—to be equally divided among them."

To James Harington, son of John Harington, Esq., the manors of Trembelthee, St. Jennes, Westmeadon, and Kilkhampton, in the counties of Cornwall and Devon. To him the Demaine and Barton of Allercombe, he not to alienate; if otherwise, then to George Rogers aforesaid and his heirs, etc. This property charged with £10 yearly to "my daughter Marie Harington; £10 to Jane Harington; Allercombe (in certain events) to go to James Harington, charged as above," etc.

Certain Cornish manors to Geo. Rogers; if he alienate, etc., then to Francis Rogers; Marie Harington, my dau'r, to be executor, and Francis Rogers another executor. To be buried, if I die at Cannynghon, "by my husband Sir Geo. Rogers;" to be buried, if at Bath, "by John and Robert Harington;" to be buried, if in London, "by Sir Edward Rogers and my sonne Wm. Rogers." Proved May 20, 1602. Francis Rogers was a minor at the time of his appointment to executorship.

ABSTRACT OF THE WILL OF DAME MARIE HARINGTON (*née* ROGERS) OF KELSTON, SOMERSET, WIDOW.

Will (Goare 33) made 1st June, 1634.

To be buried in Kelston Church by my mother. £5 to my son John Harington; my son George; my dau'r Lady Frances Egerton; † my dau'r Jane, wife of John Roberts; my chaplain George Ivey, Clerke, £20; to my brother-in-law Francis Harington £5, and my lease of Fillgrove, in parish of Bitton; my furniture, etc., at Kelston, all furniture in my house at Bath, lease of the (?) Tennis Court adjoining to the Crosse Bowe Inn, to my daughter Elizabeth. Proved Feb. 23, 1636.

A *sententia* follows on the Will, in which Elizabeth Harington, executrix, is called Digge. Lady Frances Egerton disputed the Will, not being satisfied with a mere pecuniary legacy she received. Decision is given for its validity.

Abstract of the Will of William Harington, ‡ of Kelston, co. Somerset.

(From the Court of Probate, Wells.) Will dated 9th Sept., 1701.

To be buried at Kelston. Gives to his son *John* certain plate; to his son *James* certain other plate; to daughter *Dionis* £100 and a silver tankard; to his daughter

\* In Calendar of State Papers, Domestic, vol. 1619-23 A.D., p. 566, mention is made of a Star Chamber Cause (Breviat), 1604, between Edw. Rogers and Sir John Harington. Francis Rogers accuses Sir John of conveying away plate, etc., from Cannington.

† Can any genealogist say who was Sir Raphe (*sic*) Egerton, the husband of this Lady Frances Egerton? Their marriage is entered in the Register of Richmond, in Surrey, Dec. 21, 1606; and they had a daughter, Helenar or Eleanor, bapt. at Kelston 1st Oct. 1615.

‡ This William Harington was the second surviving son of John Harington, Esq. (the Parliamentarian), and the Hon. Lady Dioness Ley. Can any clergyman or genealogist contribute to the knowledge of Harington history, by furnishing the Register of Marriage of William and *Ann* Harrington, whereby her maiden-name may be ascertained? (From the Court of Probate at Wells, Somerset.) Will dated 17th July, 1707.

After specifying as to burial, and after a religious clause in usual terms of that day, she adds, "To my son John 5s.; to my dau'r Diones, wife of William Hopper, one broad piece of gold; to my dau'r Phabe (Phœbe), wife of John Britton, best bed, etc.," and names "my grandchild *William Harington*,\* my grandchild Anne Harington,\* my grandchildren William Hopper and Mary Hopper, my grandchildren John and Mary Britton.† All residue to James my son, he to be sole executor." One of the witnesses, John Broad. Proved 8th Sept. 1707.

Abstract of the Will of Miss Phœbe Harington,‡ of Weston-near-Bath.

(From the Court of Probate, Wells, Somerset.) Will dated 1704, 25th Feb.

My sister Helena Harington 20s. for a ring. To Mary, Vertue, Arabella, Elizabeth, four daughters of my sister Vertue Higginson, of Marshfield, £10 each at 16 years. John and Amy, son and daughter of my sister Alice Fecknam, of Marshfield, £5 each at 16 years. Geo. Adams, my godson, 40s. Sarah Pexstone, wife of Thos. Pexstone,§ my sister Amy Macie|| to be sole executrix. Will proved 7th Nov., 1709, by Amy, her executrix. Was witnessed *inter alios testes* by Wm. Hall.

Abstract of the Will of Miss Rebecca Harington, of Corston, co. Somerset.

(From the Court of Probate at Wells.) Will dated 10th Dec., 1731.

"My nephew John Harington, of Corston, Esq." to have a certain estate for term of years in lands, etc., called "Babers," and a chief rent at Corston (spelt Coston) of 5s. 6d. per annum, on three messuages at Corston, to him, his heirs and assigns for ever. "My nephew Wm. Harington of the City of Bristol, Gent.," to have lands and tenements in Weston, in the possession of the proprietors of the Brass Batteries at Weston, his heirs and assigns for ever. "My sister *Elizabeth Harington*,¶ Widow, and *Mrs. Mary Harington*,¶ £1 1s. each in gold, to buy a ring. My sisters,\*\* Amy Hall and Alice Fecknam, £10 each. My three nieces,†† Mary Bennet, Vertue Osborne, Arabella Bryant, £5 each. To the poor of Corston, £5. My niece, Abigail Harington,‡‡ spinster, a diamond ring. Residue to my two nieces, Abigail and Elizabeth Harington,§§ to be equally divided, and they to be joint executors. Proved — day — 1749, by said Abigail and Elizabeth.

## ADAMS.

ARMS.—*Argent, on a cross gules five mullets or.* CREST.—*Out of a ducal coronet or a demi-lion affrontée gules.* MOTTO.—*Sub Cruce Salus.*

In the 'New England Historical and Genealogical Register,' (Boston, Mass.) vol. vii. (1853), p. 39, is found a very ancient and apparently well-authenticated pedigree of Adams, furnished by William Downing Bruce, Esq., F.S.A., of the Middle Temple, London, from the original "discovered among the papers of the late Edward Hamlin Adams, Esq., M.P. for the county of Carmarthen, and now (1853) in the possession of his son Edward Adams, Esq., of Middleton Hall, said county."

This pedigree traces seventeen generations from — Ap Adam, who "came out of the Marches of Wales," and had a son Sir John Ap Adam, Kt., Lord Ap Adam, who mar. Elizabeth, dau. of John Lord Gourney of Beverston, co. Gloucester, and was summoned to Parliament as a Baron of the Realm, from 1296 to 1307.

William, of the fifteenth generation, as appears, mar. — daughter of — "Boringston (?)," and had sons, George, Lieut. in the service of Charles I., who m. — dau. of Mr. Conrad Streetholt,\* merchant of London, and d. in Barbadoes in 1647, leaving sons Conrad, George, and John, "living in 1680."

"Henry, d. in Braintree in New England 1646," leaving sons Henry, Sam. . . Joseph, . . . omas, Peter, and Edward, all "living in 1680."

Ambrose, "m. and had issue."

John, m. and had issue.

As early as 1645, a George Adams, "a glover," with wife Frances, settled in Watertown, Mass., and had issue, at least, six children, as appears by Bond's 'Genealogies of Watertown,' Paige's 'History of Cambridge,' and Hudson's 'History of Lexington.' In 1664, he sold to John Chinery "my house in Watertown and land adjoining," and removed to "Cambridge Farms," then an adjoining town, now Lexington. He was killed in Watertown, Oct. 10, 1696, "by the fall of a rock."

John Adams, a settler in Cambridge, as early as 1650 then adjoining Watertown, has been supposed by some to have been a brother of George; but positive proof is wanting to establish such relationship.

Henry Adams is known to have been the ancestor of the second and sixth Presidents of the United States, John and John Quincy Adams, and several others of the name noted in American history.

An "Ambross" Adams was an inhabitant of St. Michael's, Barbadoes, in 1680. (See Hotten's Lists, p. 443.)

I trace my lineage through seven successive generations from George and Frances of Watertown. That they emigrated hither, and that they were married prior to their coming, there can be no doubt; and that they married but a short time before their arrival seems probable, as all of their children were born in Watertown (the eldest, John, b. 6 Aug. 1645) prior to removal to Lexington.

The presumptive evidence, considering dates, names, etc., is strangely in favour of George of Watertown having been a son of Lieut. George of Barbadoes, and a nephew of Henry of Braintree.

I have in preparation a genealogy of the Adams family of this line, and am very desirous of connecting with our English ancestry, and therefore invite the co-operation of all concerned.

BARNES.—Can any of your readers give me any information concerning the parents of Henry Barnes, who was filacer for London and Middlesex? A Letter from the ‘Nugæ Antiquæ’ of Harington,

In which Sir Robert Sydney writes to Sir John Harington, K<sup>nt</sup>, of Kelston, A.D. 1600, as follows:—

“I hear you have taken possession of Harington Park. Our Lawyers say your title is well grounded in conscience; But that strict law doth not countenance your Recovering those lands of your ancestors as the Queen's right is somewhat exstinguished by your Cosins Stephen,† & James‡ who left issue. And hereby it comyth not straight to the Queen, whose good will toward you is ever apparent.

“I have seen ancient records wherein it appeareth that Sir James Harington, slain in Bosworth Field, did give by will all these lands to his Brother Sir Robert.”

VIII. of Cheney's Court in Chart Sutton; a coh. of this family mar. — Barton (Hasted's Kent).

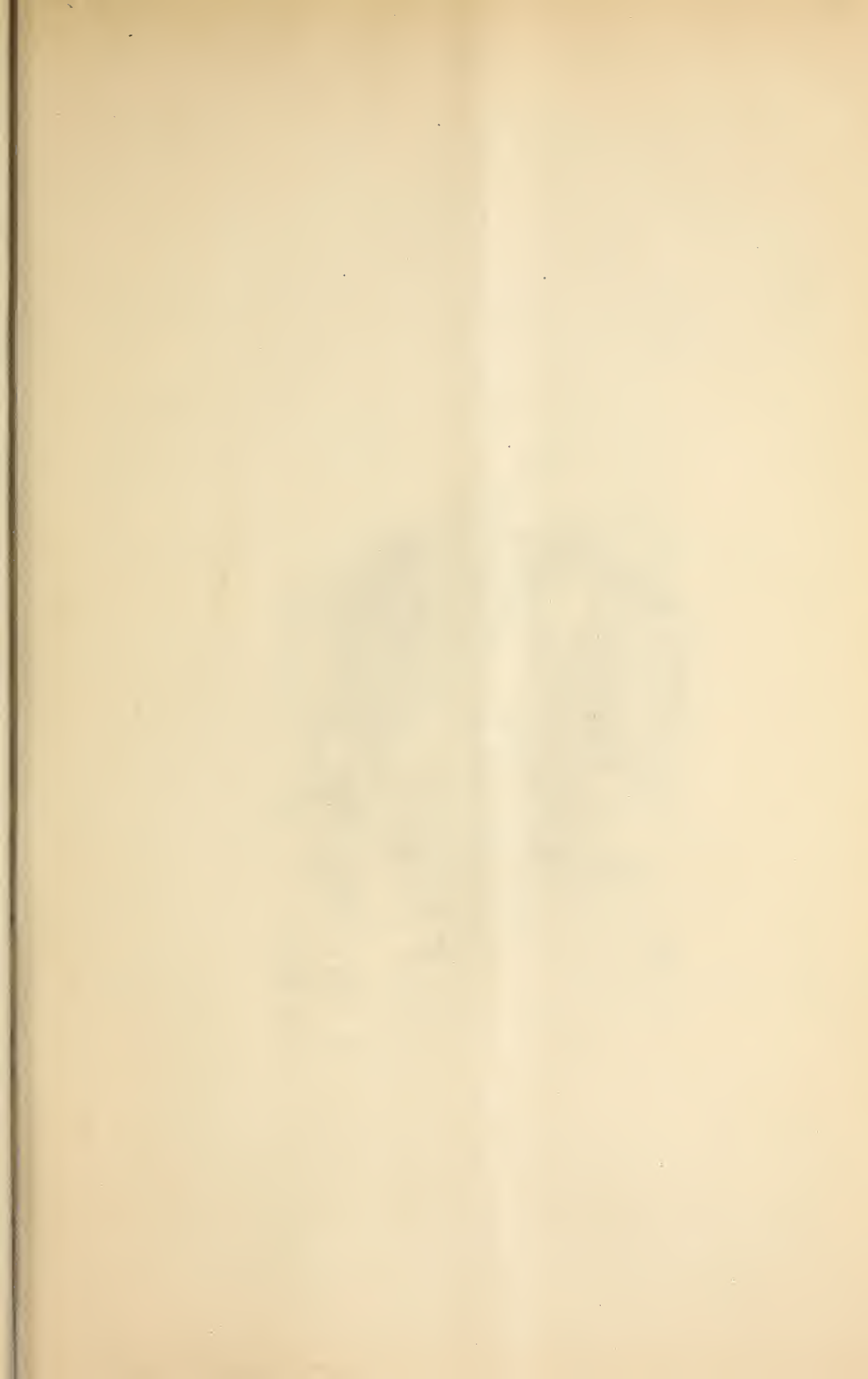

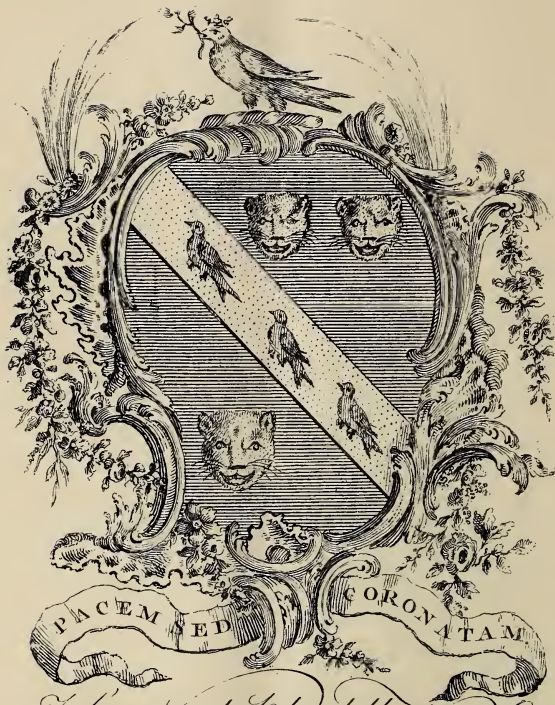

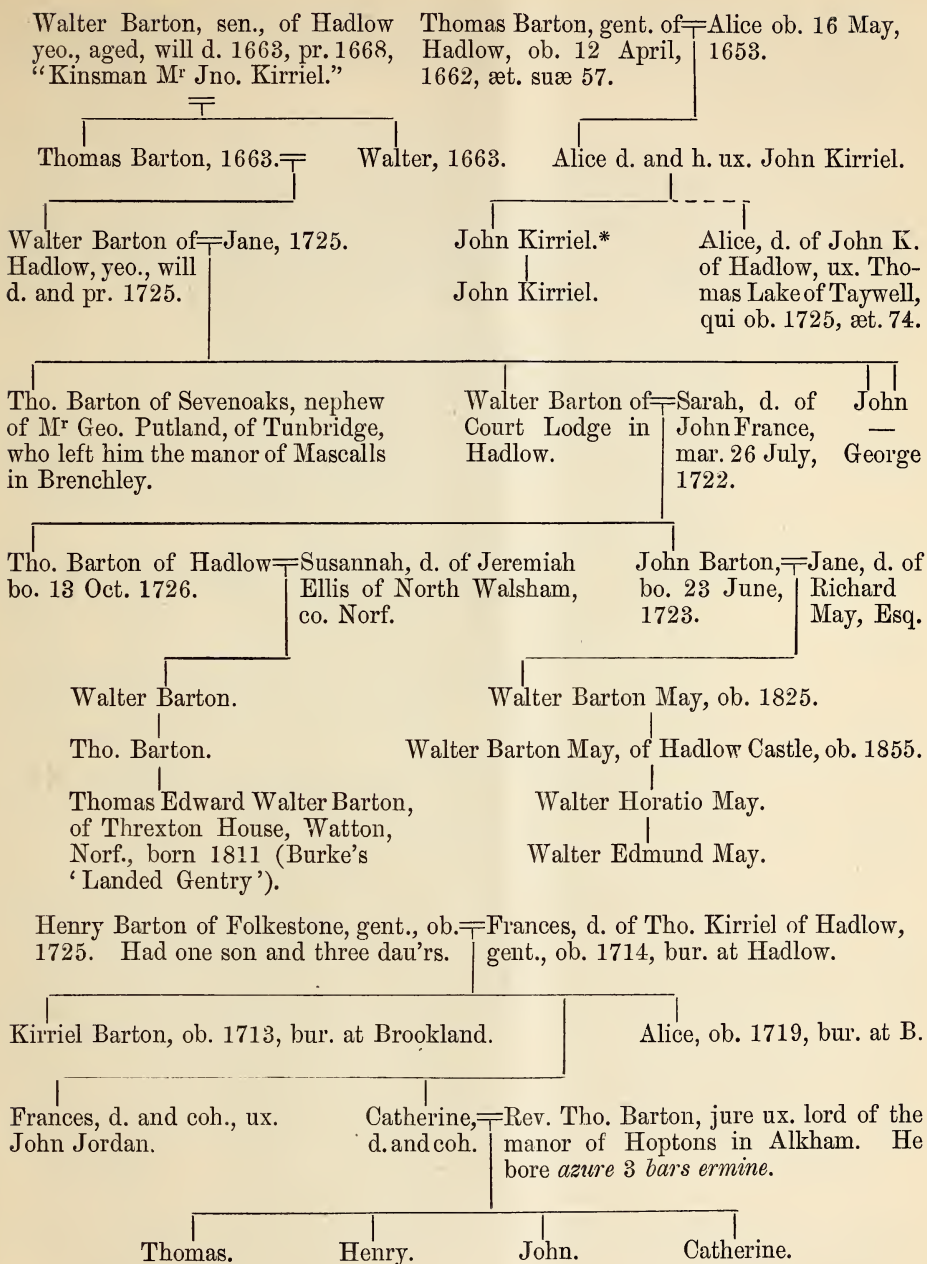

The arms of Kiriell are the same as those of the ancient baronial and knightly family of Criol of Kent, and are derived from the family of Albini, who early obtained them from a match with De Clare. Croxton-Criol, co. Leic. was held of D'Albini of Belvoir Castle. Sir Thomas Kiriell, descended from Bertram De Crioll living 1247, was the last male of the chief line, and was slain at the battle of St. Albans, leaving a daughter and heiress, married to John Fogg, Esq.

There is no pedigree of Barton in the Kentish Visitations; but they bore for arms *Ermine on a fess gules 3 annulets or*, the arms of the ancient family of Barton of Yorkshire.\*

It also contains some curious private notes, including mem. of names of women to whom alms were to be given, such as "Goody Brown, Goody Mawson, Goody Smythe, Goody Selbye," etc. Its last possessor at the latter end of last century was Richard Barnes, gentleman, of St. James's, Westminster, of an ancient Roman Catholic family (of large estate in Middlesex and Surrey), often mixed up in the "popish plots" of the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries.

The name (in Kent) seems to have been originally written *Berton* or *Burton*. Alex. De Bertona held one knight's fee in that county of Walter Maminot, 1166. He was the same person probably as Alex. De Berton, who occurs 22 Hen. II., in the Pipe Roll for Oxon, and in that reign gave, with his son and heir Sir Wm. de B., the church of Burton in that county to the monks of Eynsham. Odo de B. occurs 1166 in Oxon; his son Humphrey de B. held one knight's fee of Philip de Hampton, and he had a brother Elyas. In the first year of Richard the Second John Barton, son of Alexander Barton, proved his age (Prob. Ætatis, Kent, No. 107).

In memory of Harriott Annabella, wife of Lieut.-Colonel William Lloyd, Commandant of the Royal Artillery in this garrison, who departed this life on the 26th day of July, 1830, aged 52 years.

Also of the above Lieut.-Colonel William Lloyd, R.A., who departed this life on the 26th day of May, 1831, aged 52 years.

This tablet is erected by Hugh Morris Lang, William Lang, and Jane Montgomerie Lang, Largs, N.B., to the memory of their brother John Lang, a native of Largs, Scotland, who died on board the steamer Merlin, on a voyage from St. Thomas to Bermuda, on the 25th August, 1851. Interred in the vault of Mr. John Barr.

“Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord.” Farewell! Sacred to the memory of Mary, wife of Commodore Sir John Poer Beresford, Kt., on whom, during a short but highly exemplary life, Providence bestowed the greatest of its blessings, true benevolence of heart, a lively imagination governed by a sound judgment, correct and pleasing manners, an attractive person, the love of an affectionate husband, and friendship that survives the tomb; she died on the 1st of July, 1813, aged 23, and lies buried near this monument.

To the memory of Margery, the beloved wife of Dr. Joseph Stuart Hunter, and fourth daughter of Major Dunn, of Maskinongé, Canada East, who died of yellow fever at St. George's, on the 27th October, 1853, aged 25 years.

Also of Dr. Oscar Dunn, her brother, who died of pulmonary consumption, on the 15th of December, 1851, aged 28 years. This tablet is erected by a bereaved husband.

Sacred to the memory of Christopher Hyland, late a Lieutenant in H.M. 62nd Regiment of Foot, who departed this life on the 14th of November, 1817, aged 34 years and 4 months, who has left an affectionate wife and infant son to lament his loss.

To the memory of Thomas Burch Tucker, M.D., born June 4th, 1778, died May 5th, 1846. This tablet is erected as a mark of filial affection, by his son-in-law Charles H. Maréchaux, Captain in H.M.'s St. Helena Regiment, and his children Julia Maréchaux and St. George W. Tucker, M.D.

To the memory of John Van Norden, Esquire, late Deputy Grand-Master of the Provincial Grand Lodge, of Bermuda, and nineteen years Mayor of the town of St. George's, who departed this life, 30th September, 1823, aged 67 years. In testimony of their high regard and approbation of his conduct while acting as Master, this tablet is erected by the brethren of St. George's Lodge, No. 266.

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In the adjoining churchyard lie the remains of Frederick Arabin, Lieutenant Colonel Royal Artillery, sixth son of Henry Arabin, Esq., of Moyglare, co. Meath, Ireland, who while in command of H.M. Forces in these Islands died August 17th, 1843, in his 57th year.

Eliza Arabin died in January of the same year, and is interred in Stonehouse churchyard, Devon, England. This monument is erected in loving remembrance by their children. "He that believeth in me, though he were dead, yet shall he live, and whosoever believeth in me shall never die." St. John xi. 25, 26.

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Sacred to the memory of James H. Scott, first clerk, Ordnance Department, Æ: 33, who was drowned by the upsetting of his boat, in a terrific squall, 10th February, 1834. He was universally respected, and his melancholy fate most deeply deplored.

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At the east end near the last is a marble tablet in memory of Martha Bascome, wife of Archibald Shedden, Esq., who departed this life, January 25th, 1839, aged 66 years.

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In memory of Fanny Louisa, wife of Captain E. F. Hare, and daughter of Colonel W. H. Eden, 56th Regiment, who died at St. George's of yellow fever, on the 15th of September, 1853, aged 20 years.

Also of Captain E. F. Hare, 56th Regiment, son of Major Hare, of the Retreat, Plymouth, who died at St. George's, of yellow fever, on the 17th September, 1853, aged 30 years, having only survived his beloved wife 48 hours, and to whom he had been united scarcely one year. "Lovely and pleasant were they in their lives, and in their death they were not divided." This tablet is erected by their affectionate parents.

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Sacred to the memory of Lieut. I. M. T. Borton, of H.M. 30th Regiment, who departed this life at Bermuda, April 19th, 1838, leaving an affectionate wife to mourn his loss, and sincerely regretted by his brother officers, one of whom has erected this tablet, in testimony of a friendship which was interrupted only by death.

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A handsome white marble monument, thereon the figure of a woman weeping, a plant in a vase at her feet, beside her an urn inscribed W. C., and a sword, crown, etc.; in her left hand she holds a roll, on which is written, "I shall go to him, but he shall not return to me." J. Bacon, sculptor, London, 1798. Sacred to the memory of His Excellency William Campbell, Esquire, Governor of these Islands, and Lieut.-Colonel of the 24th Regiment of Foot, who was seized with a fever, and died a few days after his arrival, December 2nd, 1796, in his 46th year. Thus by one fatal stroke, the blessings of his public virtues, and the endearments of his private friendship, expired for ever, and his solitary relict, whose happiness was suspended on the tenderness of his heart, endeavours to soothe her sorrow by inscribing this marble with his much loved name.

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Juxta Conduntur Reliquiæ, Adelaidæ Louisæ, Arturi Gulielmi Twiss Conjugis, Unice Dilectæ quæ in spem resurrectionis ad vitam Æternam; obiit Junii Die Vigesimo Sexto, Anno Salutis MDCCCLII, Ætatis xxii.

Died at Bermuda, Nov. 17th, 1744, in the 46th year of his age, after nine days' illness of a bilious fever, The Good Governor, Alured Popple, Esq., during the course of his administrations, which, to the inconsolable grief of the inhabitants, continued but six years. Of the many strangers who resorted thither for their health, the observing easily discovered in him, under the graceful veil of modesty, an understanding and abilities equal to a more important trust. The gay and polite were charmed with the unaffected elegance and amiable simplicity of his manners; and all were char'd by his hospitality and diffusive benevolence, which steadily flowed, and undisturbed, from the heart. To praise according to his merit the deceased, would be but too sensible a reproach to the living, and to enumerate the many rare virtues which shone united in the Governor of that little spot, were to tell how many great talents and excellent endowments are wanting in some, whom the capriciousness of fortune exposes in a more elevated and conspicuous station.

This tablet is inscribed by his afflicted widow and parents. His remains are interred in the churchyard.

THE FOLLOWING ON YEO IS FROM THE OLD DIARY (see p. 334).

“Robt. Yeo of Heanton, in Devon, Esq., married Alfrida, the daughter of Sir Thos. Grenvile of Stow, in Cornwall, Kt., and had two sons, viz., Wm. the eldest and Robert y<sup>e</sup> youngest. Y<sup>e</sup> said Robert Yeo married Juliana [<sup>?</sup> Elizabeth],\* the daughter of Fulke Priddam [Prideaux] of Thuborrow, Devon, Esq., and had one son called William Yeo, who married Mary, the daughter of Humphry Battin of Dunsland, in Devon, Esq., by Jane Grenvile, sister to Parson Jo. Grenvile, and had one son, viz., Humphry Yeo, who married Agnes, y<sup>e</sup> daughter of Richard Wheeler of Buckland, in Devon, clerk, and Catharine Dennis of Prattcott (the above Richard Wheeler was son to Sir Robt. Wheeler, Lord Mayor of London), and had one son Robert Yeo. [Humphrey Yeo was born in January, the Saturday before Candlemas Day, 1557, and died Apr. 25, 1633, and was buried in y<sup>e</sup> South Isle of Shebbear Church, aged 76; his son Robert Yeo was born in 1595, and died April 26th, 1665, and was buried in y<sup>e</sup> South Isle of Shebbeare Church, aged 70 years.] Robert Yeo married Jane, y<sup>e</sup> daughter of Bartholomew Thorne of Upcott in the Parish of Sheepwash, Devon, Esq., and Mary Hillersdon of Memblaud, whose son *William Yeo* [William Yeo was born y<sup>e</sup> 7th March, 1640, and died about 1712, aged near 72 years, and was buried in y<sup>e</sup> South Isle of Shebbeare Church] of Worden in y<sup>e</sup> Parish of Shebbear, married Margaret y<sup>e</sup> youngest daughter of Mr. Wm. Marshal of Trevigge in y<sup>e</sup> parish of St. Gennis, in Cornwall, and had several children, of whom only two

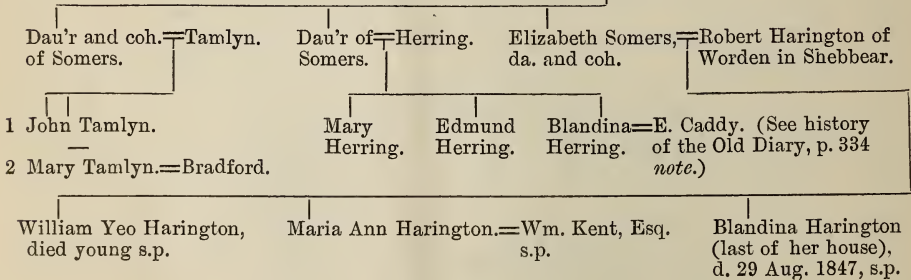

ABSTRACT OF THE LAST WILL OF LADY DOUGLAS SHEFFIELD,  
THE REPUDIATED WIFE OF ROBERT DUDLEY, EARL OF  
LEICESTER.\*

But few notices are recorded by heralds and historians of the eventful life of the Lady Douglas Sheffield—as she was commonly called—the repudiated wife of Robert Dudley, Earl of Leicester. Almost all that we know of her is contained in Camden's 'Annals of the Reign of Elizabeth,' Gervase Holles's 'Memoirs of the Holles Family,' and Dugdale's 'Abstracts (see his 'Warwickshire' and 'Baronage') of the Depositions and Judgment in the Court of Star Chamber in a suit commenced in February, 1603-4, by Lettice, widow of the Earl of Leicester, against Sir Robert Dudley, Kt., and Alice his wife, the Lady Douglas Sheffield (then wife of Sir Edward Stafford, Kt.), mother of the said Sir Robert Dudley, Sir Thomas Leigh (father of Alice Lady Dudley), and others.

After the close of those proceedings in Easter term, 3 Jac. 1605, the only further mention of her is made in a News letter of John Chamberlain to Dudley Carleton, under date of 16 December, 1608, wherein he remarks "that the old Lady Sheffield is dead."

The following is a summary of the information derived from these sources:—Lady Douglas Sheffield was born about the year 1545, eldest daughter of Lord William Howard, Lord Howard of Effingham, by his second wife, Margaret, second daughter of Sir Thomas Gamage, Kt., of Coity, co. Glamorgan. She married first, about 1562, when she was seventeen years old, John, second Baron Sheffield, by whom she had a son and daughter, viz., Edmund, third Baron, and Elizabeth, who became the second wife of Thomas Butler, Earl of Ormonde. The Earl of Leicester—attracted by Lady Sheffield's youth and beauty—had an intrigue with her in her husband's life-time; and after Lord Sheffield's death,—which occurred in December, 1568, not without suspicion of poison,—she entered into a contract of marriage with the Earl of Leicester, in Cannon Row, Westminster; and two years after they were

married at Esher, Surrey, according to the rite of the Church of England, about the year 1572, the Earl binding her to secrecy for fear of the Queen's displeasure. In 1573, she gave birth, at Shene, near Richmond, Surrey, to their only son, afterwards Sir Robert Dudley, Kt. Walter Devereux, Earl of Essex,—dying in September, 1576,—the Earl of Leicester, being captivated by the beauty of Lettice, the widowed Countess of Essex, tried to persuade Douglas, his wife, to disclaim her marriage with him, offering to settle £700 per annum upon her if she would do so, and to give her a further sum of £1000 if she would give up the custody of their son. The consequence of her refusal was that the Earl of Leicester repudiated his marriage with her, and married the Countess of Essex at Wanstead House, Essex, in September, 1578; and so terrified his repudiated wife that she, for protection, and the security of her life, contracted marriage with Sir Edward Stafford, Kt., of Chebsey, the Queen's Ambassador at the French Court. Of this marriage there does not appear to have been any issue; and she died in December, 1608.

To these particulars, I am able to add the following:—In ADDITIONAL MS. 15,506, in the Brit. Museum, are three letters, dated in October, 1594, from Lady Sheffield and her husband, Sir Edward Stafford, addressed to Sir Julius Cæsar, then Judge of the Court of Admiralty, which throw a ray of light on her life. No. 323, without date, is written from Richmond, (probably from her house at Shene, where her son Robert Dudley was born), by "*Dougless Sheffield*," inviting Dr. Cæsar to go down to have an interview with her own brother upon her affairs, and offering the use of her horses for the journey, and that he can obtain them at her house at Westminster.

No. 368, dated 16 October, 1594, is in the handwriting of Sir Edward Stafford, and signed by both himself and his wife, "*Dougless Sheffield*." Therein, Sir Edward asks—in the names of "*my wife and I*"—Sir Julius Cæsar to interest himself with his father-in-law, the Lord Mayor (Martin), to shew a favour to a prisoner in Newgate, one "*oolde*" (old) Captain Moffet, that his friends may be allowed to visit and speak with him.

No. 456, dated from Drury House, 22 October, 1594, is from Sir Edward Stafford, thanking Dr. Cæsar for his attention to Sir Edward's and his wife's request, and stating that his wife is at Highgate. The dating from Drury House is explained by the fact that his sister Elizabeth Stafford, one of the Ladies of the Queen's Bedchamber, was widow of Sir William Drury, Kt., of Hawsted, to whom she was married in the Royal Chapel at Greenwich.

Both Sir Edward Stafford and his wife, Lady Sheffield, were buried in the parish church of St. Margaret's, Westminster, as is shewn by the following extracts from the Burials Register of that Church:—

1604[-5]. February 5<sup>th</sup>. †*Sir Edward Stafford, Knight*. †

1608. December 11<sup>th</sup>. *The Lady Dugleys Sheaffeilde*.

Her last Will has never been published in type, and seems, hitherto, to have escaped the notice of genealogists. I discovered it among the Wills registered in the Court of the Commissary of the Dean and Chapter of Westminster. All its chief points of interest are contained in the following abstract.

DOWGLAS LADY SHEFFIELD, in health of body and mind, make this my Will. To be buried at Rigate (Reigate, Surrey) with my father and mother, or in the parish Church of Westminster (*sic*), by my sister Dudley,\* as shall seem good to my children and my executor. To the poor of Kenelworth £5, and to Timothy Delayne the preacher there £4. To my beloved son the right honorable Edmund, Lord Sheffield† (some great chairs of silk needle-

work, etc.). I give to my honorable and beloved son Sir Robert Dudley, Kt. (a black velvet bed, etc.). To my daughter-in-law Lady Ursula Sheffield\* (a velvet gown with buttons of pearl). To my daughter Lady Elizabeth Swift,† whom I brought up from infancy (chairs, etc.). To my daughter Mrs. Frances Fairfax,‡ (a great chair, etc.). To my daughter Mistress Marie Sheffield,|| a border of gold pearl and stone of seventeen pieces whereof eight be rubies and diamonds and pearl (etc.). To my beloved friend the Lady Waller, my hatband. To my friend Mr. Crawshawe, preacher of the Temple (a bed, etc.). To William Lenthall, my old servant, my silver candlestick. To Mrs. Salisbury.§ To Mary Morton my woman. I give my body linen to Mrs. Savile and Mrs. Salisbury and my two maids to be divided into four parts: one part to Marie Morton; one part to Mrs. Savile; and the other two parts equally between Mrs. Salisbury and my two maids. To Humfry Browne my servant £20 over his wages; and to my other servants half a year's wages extra. To my woman Saule a kirtle. To Mary Turner my ancient. Whereas I have certain Jewels mortgaged to Lenthall, my will is that my executors shall redeem the same. All Residue to William Crawshawe, preacher, and I make him executor of this my Will, and Edmund Lord Sheffield my son, and Sir Edward Swift, Kt.,¶ overseers of the same. Dated 14 September, 1608. I give to my beloved niece Mrs. Diana Drurie\*\* a carknet†† with rubies, diamonds and pearle, which is in Lenthall's hands. DOUGLAS SHEFFIELD. Register ELSAM, folio 575.

N.B.—In the Act Book, folio 135, the place for the Probate of this Will is left blank: the preceding Probate is dated 1 July, 1609, and that following, 30 June, 1609.

WILLIAMS.—In Prendergast's 'Cromwellian Settlement of Ireland,' p. 433, is given the name of "John Williams, ffeltmaker," recorded as No. 919 in the "List of Adventurers" who advanced money towards the War Fund, and were repaid in land. John Williams subscribed £50, and received therefor lands in Monaghan Co. called—either then or subsequently—"The Groves." This John Williams was from a family in Glamorganshire, Wales. I will be very grateful for any information as to his descent, or other particulars regarding his family in Wales.

# The Huguenot Refugee Family of Guillemard.

Communicated by HENRY WAGNER, Esq., F.S.A.

According to family tradition, John Guillemard was brought over to England as a child from the neighbourhood of Caudebec (probably Bolbec) in Normandy, in the care of a grandfather, his father having "shortly before the emigration dropped down dead in the market place." By his will he left £100, "if the Protestant subjects residing in Bollebec, in Upper Normandy, obtain leave to erect and build a church before or by the expiration of 1780," towards that object, and, failing this, to go in equal shares to the French Church in Thread-needle Street and the French Hospital of "La Providence," Old Street Road.\*

He was son of William Griffin of London, weaver (1729-1803), by his wife Elizabeth Bodenham of Ludlow (1728-97), and had a brother William (1759-1808), who married, but has no representatives now living.

John Guillemard, = Mr. Samuel Smiles ('The Huguenots,' 1870), alleges John Guillemard, refugee from Champdeniers, where he had been minister, who "ajura le Protestantisme, & fut depogé au Synode de Charenton en 1613," to have been ancestor of this family. This appears more than doubtful. But probably Marie Guillemard, "femme de Jacques Beuzeville de Bolbec, réfugiée en Angleterre, en 1711," by whom she left issue, belonged to it.

† John Guillemard was a remarkable man, and on terms of friendship with Louis Philippe, Talleyrand, Wallegrand, Washington, etc. He travelled much in his youth with the Duc de la Rochefoucauld-Liancourt, in whose volumes he is frequently mentioned, especially in America; and was appointed (about 1800) one of the Commissioners for settling disputed points between Great Britain and the United States of America.

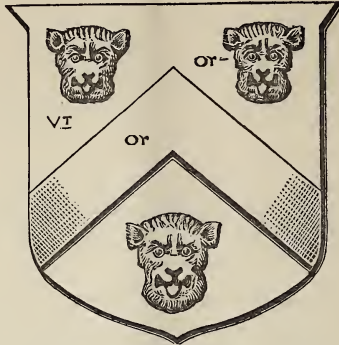

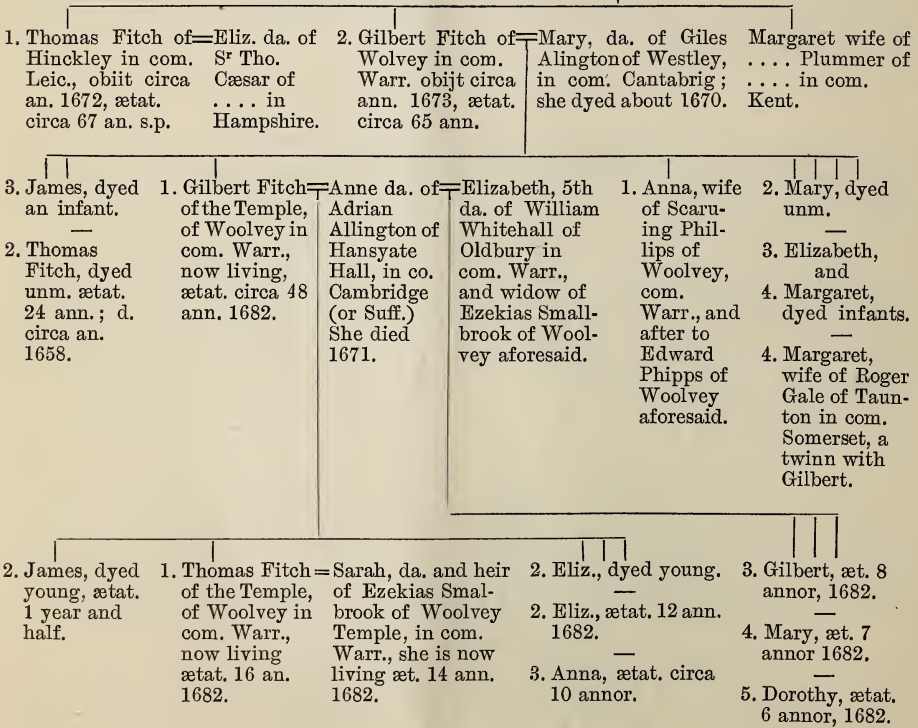

## HARINGTON OF SOMERSET.

*(Continued from p. 318.)*

In returning from Devon to the main line of Harington in Somerset, we give

A BRIEF MEMOIR AND SOME OTHER NOTES OF JOHN HARINGTON, ESQ.,  
OF KELSTON.

M.P. for Bath 1646-54-56.

John Harington, Esq., Member of Parliament for Bath, Justice of the Peace for the county of Somerset, son and heir of Sir John Harington, Knt., was born in 1589, and succeeded to the family estates in 1612. By some strange fatality—whether by the teaching of his tutor, as some allege, or by the force of his own inward promptings—he adopted Puritan principles, and to the great surprise of his father's friends and connection at large, remained a strong Parliamentary through life. His political bias enables us to attribute to him, for distinction among many John Haringtons in succession, the *sobriquet* of “the Parliamentary,” and henceforth we intend to particularize him by that designation, just as we distinguished the John Harington who was father of the Knight by calling him “John of Stepney.”\*

The future “Parliamentarian” matriculated at Oxford 7 Dec. 1604, from Trinity College (which was also the college of James Harington, the author of the ‘Republic of Oceana’), as a Knight's son, at the early age of thirteen. After taking his degree, he became a member of Lincoln's Inn, and spent much of his early life there engaged in literary pursuits. It is said that besides Law and Mathematics, he then took up the study of Hebrew, which special study would seem to point him out as the John Harington whose name is associated with some metrical translations of the Psalms from the original Hebrew.

The tone and character of this Son were in complete contrast with his father. The Knight had been everything by turns,—courtier, soldier, wit, poet, country squire, mechanic, satirist, church restorer,—nay more, it was by no means his own fault that he had not late in his life taken Holy Orders, like his ancestor the Dean of York, Sir James Harington of Brierley, and become *per saltum* Archbishop of Dublin and Governor of Ireland, for which, according to his own shewing in his ‘Treatise on the State of Ireland,’ he was in every way supremely qualified. John Harington, the son, was on the other hand careful, cautious, sober-minded in everything. If he retained the family taste for poetry and music, he took care to apply it to psalms and psalm-tunes. He never wrote such a stave as that from the Black Sanctus of John of Stepney, which we are told used to haunt King Henry, the Defender of the Faith, and move him to whistle or hum it as he reflected on Monks, Religion, and Reform. John the Parliamentary was the writer of ‘Essays and Dialogues in favour of the Presbyterian Doctrine.’ We cannot by any stretch of imagination suppose him to have been the author of the fugitive pieces printed in the ‘Nugæ,’ entitled Polindor and Flostella. Nor do we suppose that he ever wrote sonnets for ladies of the county when engaged at Quarter Sessions, which would have been quite “the thing” for his father to do. Much less could

\* To set up a clear distinction between the successive John Haringtons would seem to be the more needful, because some confusion in their biographies has been already created by various writers. For instance, the learned authoress of ‘The Queens of England,’ in treating of the reigns of the Queens Mary and Elizabeth, and the confidential doings of the Lord High Admiral Seymour, has usually spoken of John Harington the elder (who was in the household of the Lord Admiral) as SIR John Harington, thus leading many to think of the son, who was a Knight and courtier during the close of Queen Elizabeth's reign, and for a short time in that of King James. But that the elder Harington was not a Knight is indisputably proved by the wording of the grant of arms made to him in 1568, in which he is expressly described as John Harington, *Esquire*.

we conceive that any index-maker\* would give us a reference to *him* as Sir "Ajax" Harington. There was not a spark in him of such humour as the Ajax contained. The bent of his mind, after pursuit of studies, was sedulously to discharge his public and private duties.

Indeed it is said (and the tradition may be true?) that he had a rigid ruler in Dionysia his wife, one of the daughters of James Ley, first Earl of Marlborough. Moreover, he became connected by the alliance of his daughter with such families as Pym and Rous. He was certainly the only Harington of Kelston with so grave a temperament, but the Puritan was unmistakable in him. [His name may be seen recorded in Prestwich's 'Republic.'] There is a story on record about this John Harington, that he once sought an audience with King Charles at Carisbrooke Castle; and the audience having been granted, the King said of him after the interview, that he could "see that man's pride through the hole in a stocking!"

We will only say further that this is the John Harington named in the Herald's note at the end of the County Visit. 1613, under "Bath Forum Hundred"—"John Harington A<sup>r</sup> will be at London. He married the Lord Chief Justice's daughter" [Dionysia Ley]. His matrimonial connection is further testified to in State Papers (Domestic), Sept. 24, 1626, where the Lord Treasurer Ley desired that his "son-in-law M<sup>r</sup> Harington might serve as Deputy and give the Charge at the Sessions held at Bridgewater."

He died, we know, in April, 1654, but we can find no register of his burial, nor any tablet to his memory. We are guided to the date of his decease by the probate of his will in July of that year. He is supposed to have been buried at Kelston, but the registral entry is wanting, as already stated, and it seems most remarkable that with such county position there should be no tomb nor mural monument erected, either to *his* memory or to that of the witty Knight his father, either at Kelston or in Bath Abbey.†

Confirms the settlement of Kelston on his wife for life. And as to Corston Manor farm and parsonage—my meadow, etc., at Compton—my manor of Trebarveth, co. Cornwall—the Parsonage of Weston—Rents of £20 per An<sup>m</sup> out of Catherine's [near Bath]—I bequeath these all wholly to my eldest son John, on condition that he provide for my dau'r Phœbe's marriage\* portion £1500, and for my son William £1000, and to him I give the lands I purchased according to Parliamentary proposition in co. Waterford, Ireland, for £200. My wife to be Ex<sup>x</sup>.

Signed in the presence of Griffin Smith (*Minister of the Parish from 1653 to 1681*) and John Merewether. Proved 6th July, 1654, by Dionis Harington, relict.

MEMORANDUM IN JOHN HARINGTON'S PRIVATE PAPERS.

“Jan<sup>y</sup> 28<sup>th</sup>, 1650. Mr John Gostlet married my daughter Mary, he received of me £50. I had paid him £1150 before. I and my son John enter into 3 Bonds to pay £100 on 3<sup>d</sup> March, £200 25 July, £200 on 29<sup>th</sup> Sept. next.”†

— Laurence Torstenson Nyberg, born in Sweden 4 March, 1720; probably graduated at Upsala; went to Lancaster, Pa, as a Lutheran minister, but became a Moravian minister at Bethlehem in 1746 or 1748. In the course of his ministry visited London, Herrnhut, Dublin, Bristol, Leominster, and Fulneck. Returned to Sweden in 1774, and again became a Lutheran minister. Died in Sweden 30 May, 1792.

### Armorial Bookplate.

Seal of the Archdeaconry of Carlisle, and Arms of the Ven<sup>ble</sup> William Jackson, D.D., Archdeacon of that Diocese from 1856 to 1862. The seal is of great antiquity, representing the blessed Virgin and child, with St. Peter bearing the keys.

Arms.—Arg. on a fess between 3 cocks' heads erased sable a greyhound courant between 2 pheons or, all within a bordure azure platée (JACKSON); impaling, Gules, a chevron between 3 quatrefoils or (CRUMP).

Crest.—A cock's head erased sa., combed and wattled gules.

Motto.—Vertuti Vigila.

The Ven<sup>ble</sup> William Jackson, D.D., younger son of the Rev. Thomas Jackson, Rector of Grasmere, Westmorland, by Sarah, dau. and heiress of Thomas Partridge, Esq., was born at the Rectory, Grasmere, 17th Dec. 1792. In 1811 he took his degree of B.A. with honours (2nd class lit. hum.) at Queen's College, Oxford, of which he was a scholar, and subsequently fellow, tutor, and bursar. In 1827 he was Whitehall preacher. Domestic Chaplain to the Earl of Verulam and the Earl of Lonsdale; he was presented by the latter in 1828 to the living of Lowther, Westmorland, which he held up to the time of his death. At various times he also held the livings of Cliburn, St. John's, Whitehaven, and Penrith. From 1846–1855 he was Chancellor of the Diocese of Carlisle, Archdeacon from 1856–1862, and Canon of Carlisle 1858–1862, in which year he was elected Provost of Queen's College, Oxford. He was also a J.P. for the counties of Westmorland and Cumberland.

Dr. Jackson married 9th May, 1829, Julia Eliza, eldest dau. of John Gregory Crump of Allan Bank, Westmoreland, Esq., by his wife Mary, only dau. and eventually heiress of John Hamerton, Esq., by whom he had issue four daughters: (1) Julia-Marian, (2) Louisa-Lilias, both died young, (3) Georgiana-Isabella, and (4) Agnes-Beatrice, married 17 April, 1879, her cousin John Hamerton Crump, 2nd son of the late George Hamerton Crump of Chorlton, Cheshire, Esq., J.P. for co. Salop, by his 2nd wife Harriet-Fanny, dau. and heiress of Lieut.-Col. Thomas Maddock.

The Ven<sup>ble</sup> Archdeacon Jackson died 13th Sept. 1878, his wife having died 7th March, 1873. Both are buried at Lowther. Dr. Jackson quartered with his paternal coat the arms of Partridge, Dalton, and Braithwayte.

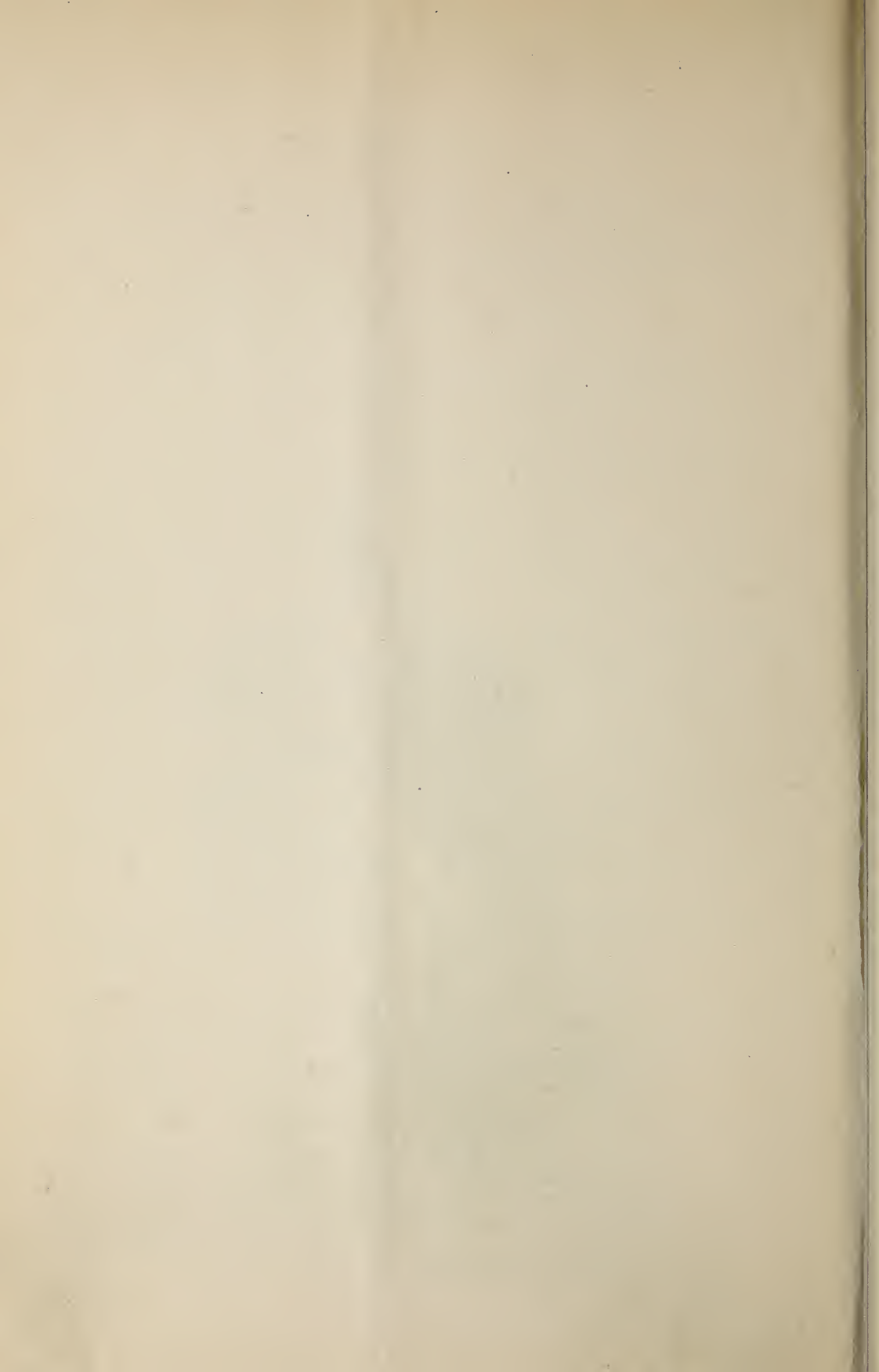

## SCOTT FAMILY.\*

SIGNATURE OF ELIZABETH SCOTT,

daughter of Richard Scott of Smeeth, Esq., to an Indenture dated 1 July, 1621, between Sir Thomas Derham of West Dereham, co. Norfolk, Kt., and Dame Anne his wife of the first part; and Thomas Derham, Esq., sone and heir apparent of the said Sir Thomas Derham, and Hugh Hamersley, Alderman of the City of London, of the second part; and Elizabeth Scott, da. of Richard Scott, late of Smeeth, co. Kent, Esq., deceased, Sir Richard Smyth of Leeds Castle, co. Kent, Kt., and Edward Scott of Scotts Hall in said county of Kent, Esq., of the third part: being settlement on marriage of Thomas Derham with Elizabeth Scott.

To make this extremely interesting instrument thoroughly intelligible, it is merely necessary to append the following genealogical table, which exhibits the relationship and family connection of the principal persons mentioned in the deed.

The family of Derham of West Dereham in the county of Norfolk were some three or four centuries ago people of county consideration, and one would judge from the tenor of the terms of the settlement that the Dame Anne mentioned as the wife of Sir Thomas Derham was either a daughter or sister of Sir Hugh Hammersley, Alderman of London,—doubtless of the same family as the Hammersleys recently, if not now, Bankers in London. The eldest branch of the Smythe family has come to an end, the Viscount Strangford, who died a few years ago, having been the last male heir of that branch. The importance of the family of Smythe of Ostenhanger and Leeds Castles in Kent is indicated below. Ostenhanger Castle, with its 126 rooms and 365 windows, now only exists as an interesting ruin,—the tower in which Rosamond Clifford (Fair Rosamond) is traditionally said to have been some time concealed by her Royal lover being still a portion of the embattled walls;—whilst Leeds Castle remains the most interesting moated and castellated mansion in Kent.

Sir John Scott of Nettlested, uncle of Elizabeth Scott, wife to Thomas Derham, was employed in high situations of trust in the military enterprizes of the unfortunate Earl of Essex, in Flanders, Spain, and Ireland, and was with that unhappy

nobleman confined in the Tower of London, and doomed to death for participation in the quixotic conspiracy of the favourite of Queen Elizabeth. Sir John Scott's life was however spared at the intercession of his first wife (granddaughter of Edward, last Duke of Buckingham of the Stafford line) with the Queen, Elizabeth Stafford being one of the Ladies of the Bedchamber to that monarch. Sir John Scott, as an expiation of his treasonable offence, served the Queen in Flanders for the remainder of that monarch's existence, and then returned to England.

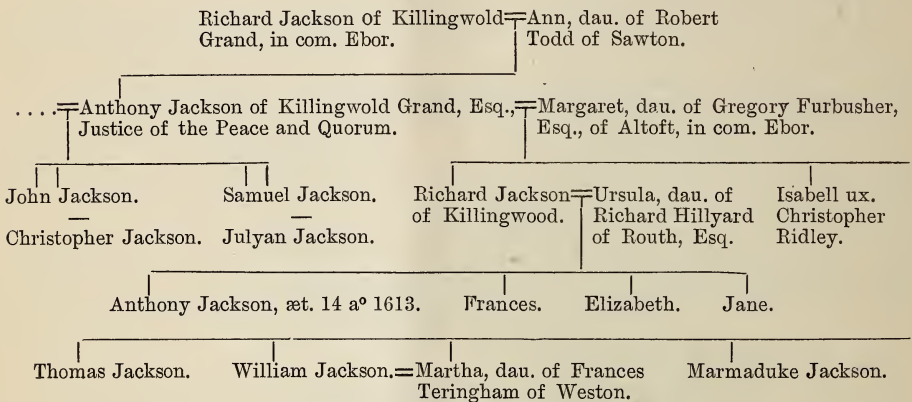

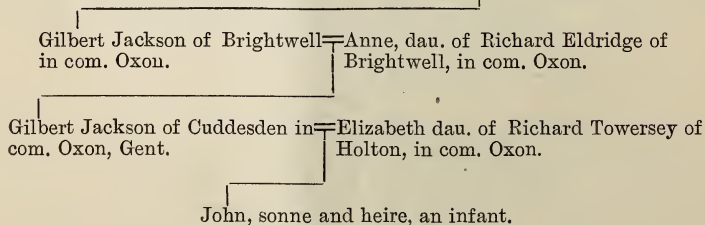

### THE WILL OF JOHN PENNE, 1651.

In the name of God, Amen. Upon the two and twentieth day of Aprill in the year of our Lord God One thousande sixe hundred fytie and one, I John Penne, sonne of William Penne, of Harberrow, in the parrishe of Hagley, and countye of Worcester, sicke in body but of a good and perfect memory, doe make and ordeine this my last will and testament in manner and forme followeing. First I comende my soule into the handes of Almighty God, my maker and creator, and my body to the earth from whence it came. Item I give and bequeath unto my brother Richard Penne and to his executors and assignes all my right, title, and interest to a lease of One thousand yeares made by Thomas Blount and George Tokey, Esq'rs, to my grandfather Thomas Cookes and his brother William Cookes deceased, beareing date the first day of May in the fowrth and fite yeares of the raigne of our late soueraigne Lord and Lady Kinge Phillip and Queene Mary, lately given unto me by the last will and testament of my uncle William Cookes : and alsoe all that my message or tenement with th'appurten'ces in Romsley in the parishe of Halesowen and county of Salop, com'only called and knowne by the name of Smythes Grounde, with all meadowes, leasowes, and pastures thereunto belongeing, and thirtye acres of lande lyeinge in the com'on feildes of Romsley aforesaid, with there and ev'rie of theire appurten'ces, for all the rest and residue of the said terme of One thousand yeares which shall be to come and unexpired at the tyme of my decease : which said message and landes with there appurten'ces are nowe in the teanure of Fortune Powell or of her assignes. Item I give and bequeath unto my brother Gervase Penne the so'me of five poundes to be paid to him by my execut'rs within the space of one yeare after my decease. In the name of God, Amen. The thirteenth day of Aprill, 1664, and in the 16th yeare of the raigne of our sou'raine Lord Charles the Second, by the grace of God King of England, Scotland, France, and Ireland, Defender of the Faith, etc. I William Penne, of Harborough, in the p'ish of Hagley, in the county of Worcester, gent., being weake in bodye but of sound and perfect memory, prayse be given to God for the same, and knowing the uncertainty of this life on earth, and being desirous to settle things in order, doe make this my last will and testam't in manner and forme following, that is to say. First and principally I commend my soule to Almighty God my creator, assuredly believing that I shall receive full pardon and free remission of my sins, and be saved by the precious death and meritts of my blessed Saviour and Redeemer Christ Jesus, and my body to the earth from whence it was taken to be buried in such decent and Christian manner as to my Executor hereafter named shall be thought meet and convenient. And as touching such worldly estate as the Lord in mercie hath lent me, my will and meaning is the same shalbe employed and bestowed as hereafter by this my will is expressed. And first I doe revoke, renounce, frustrate, and make void all wills by me formerly made, and declare and appoint this my last will and testam't. Item I give and bequeath unto my grandchild William Penne, son of my son Thomas Penne, one great brass pot and one two-yeared postnett, and my meaning is that they shall remaine as chieves to the house so long as there is an heire male of my name to make use of them. Item I give and bequeath to my son Gervase Penne the bed in the porch chamber and all its furniture w'tsoever, two coffers which now he maketh use of, one other bed in the buttry chamber and all its furniture whatsoever, one trunke in the said chamber now standing, and all my cattell after my heriots are discharged. Item I give and bequeath unto my beloved sonne Thomas Penne the bed in the great chamber and all furniture thereunto belonging, the bed over the parlour and all furniture thereunto belonging, the coffer at my son Gervase his bed's feet wherein my writings are, and all my sheep. All the rest of my goods, chattells, and debts undisposed of I doe give and bequeath unto my said son Thomas Penne, and I doe make him the said Thomas Penne my sole Execut'r to see this my last will and testament truly executed and performed. In witness whereof I have hereunto put my hand and seale the day and yeare first above written in the p'sence of Richard Amphlett, Thomas Nash.—WILLIAM PENN.

#### THE WILL OF WILLIAM PENN, 1729.

In the name of God, Amen. I William Penn the elder, of Harborow in the p'ish of Hagley and county of Worcester, being of sound and perfect mind and memory, thanks be to God therefore, and calling to mind the uncertainty of this mortal life, do make and ordain this my last will and testament in manner and form following, viz. Impr'is I give and bequeath my soul into the hands of Almighty God my Creator, and my body to be buried in a decent and Christian manner, hoping through the merits of Jesus Christ my blessed Saviour and Redeemer for a happy resurrection to eternal life. And as for that worldly estate with which it

has pleased God to bless me, my will is as followeth. Item I give and bequeath unto my only son William Penn, his exec'rs or assigns, all those my lands, tenem'ts, and p'misses with their appurtenances now in the possession of William Hornblower and the Widow Powell or their underten'ts, situate and being in Romsley, in the parish of Halesowen and county of Salop, granted by lease for the term of a thousand years save one to Thomas Cookes and William Cookes his brother jointly from Thomas Blount and George Tuckey, Esq'rs, Comm'rs appointed for that purpose; and also all assignm'ts thereof made and executed, and all the term of years which shall be to come and unexpired at my decease; and also all that messuage house called Adam's Hill now in the possession of William Hall or his underten'ts together with the barn, stables, buildings, gardens, orchards, and back-sides thereunto belonging, situate and being in the parish of Clent and county of Stafford, granted by lease for the term of ninety and nine years from Richard Amphlett Esq. to Thomas Penn my father deceased; both which aforesaid leases and all the lands, tenem'ts, and p'misses therein demised, with all and singular their appurten'ces, and all my right, title, or interest in the same or in any part thereof, I do freely give unto my said son William Penn, his exec'rs and assigns, on condition that he my said son shall pay all my debts, discharge all my legacies, and fulfill and perform faithfully all this my last will and testament as it is hereinafter specified and declared. Item my said son shall pay unto my sister Esther Penn the sum'e of one hundred pounds which I owe her upon bond. Item my said son shall pay unto my son-in-law Mr. Thomas Dolman\* the sum'e of one hundred pounds at such time as I have engaged it shall be paid in the marriage articles of the said Mr. Thomas Dolman. Item I give unto my eldest daughter Ann Shenston† the sum'e of one hundred pounds . . . on the day of the marriage of my said son William Penn, if he my said son shall happen to be unmarried at the time of my decease. Item I give unto my second daughter Mary Dolman that feather bed, blanketts, and all things belonging to it that stands in the buttery chamber. Item I give to my youngest daughter Sarah Penn the sum'e of three hundred and fifty pounds. Item I give to my said youngest daughter Sarah Penn, her exec'rs or assigns, all my right, title, and interest in certain lands, tenem'ts, and p'misses situate in the parish of Pedmore and county of Worcester now in the possession of Richard Lowe or his underten'ts held by a lease of one hundred ninety and nine years from the feoffees of the hospital of Thomas Foley Esq. deceased. Item I give unto my said youngest daughter Sarah one half of my household goods. All the rest of my goods, chattells, and credits whatsoever I give and bequeath unto my said son William Penn, whom I make and ordain sole execut'r of this my last will and testam't revoking all other wills by me heretofore made. In witness whereof I have hereunto put my hand and seal this 28th day of August Anno Dom. 1729.—

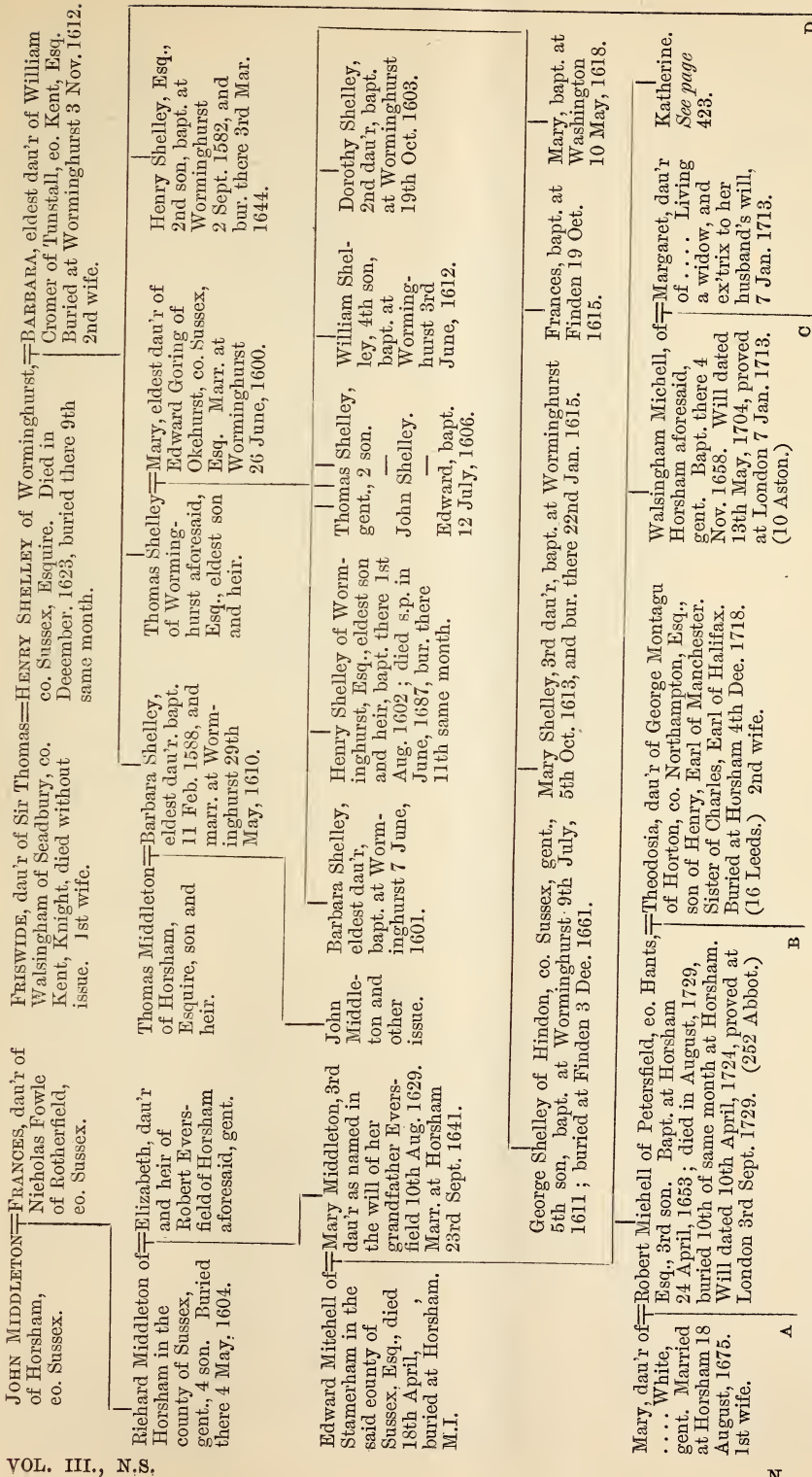

There is no record of his burial at Winkleigh, and it is probable that after making his will he returned to his house in London, and there he died. 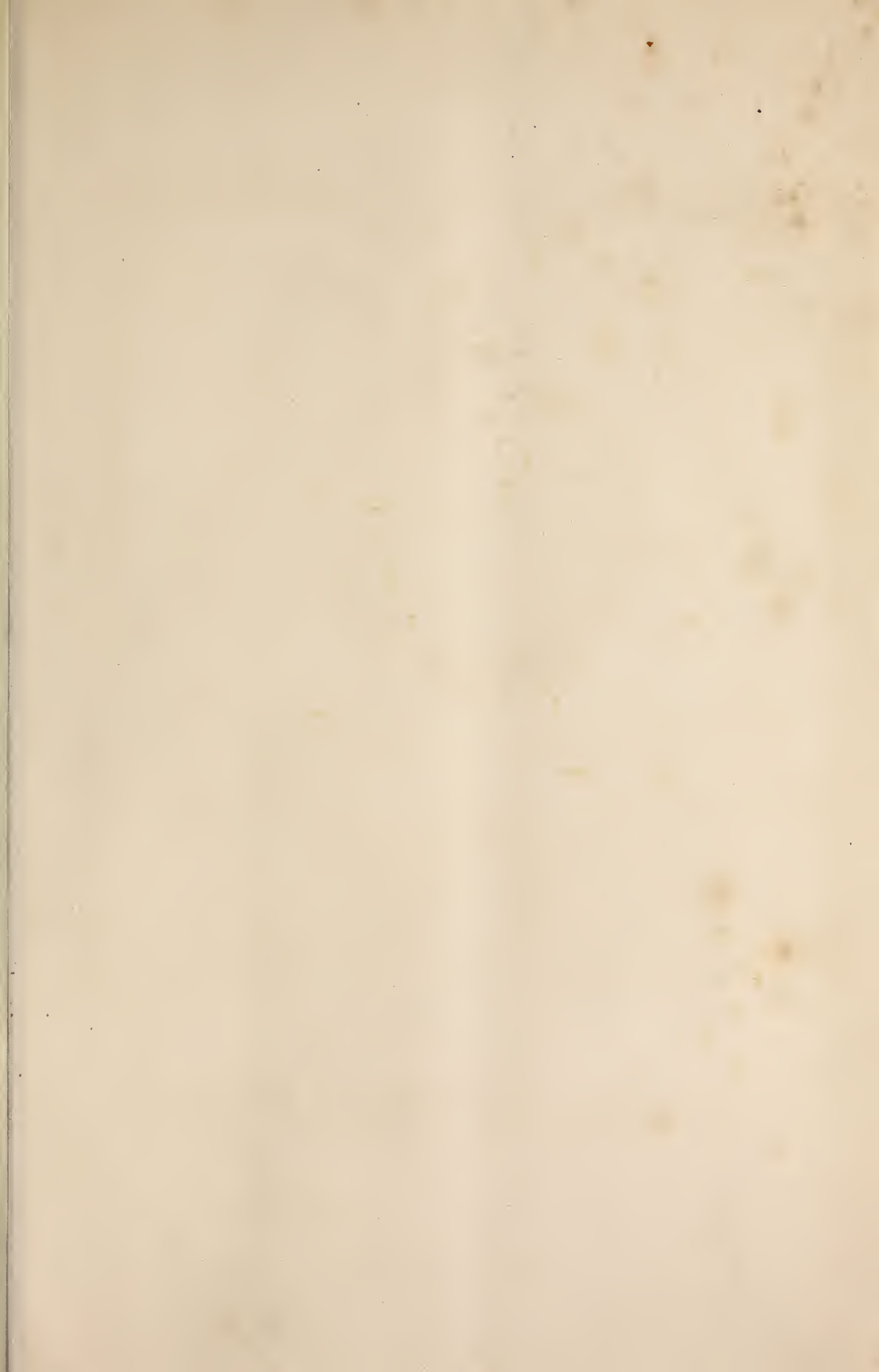

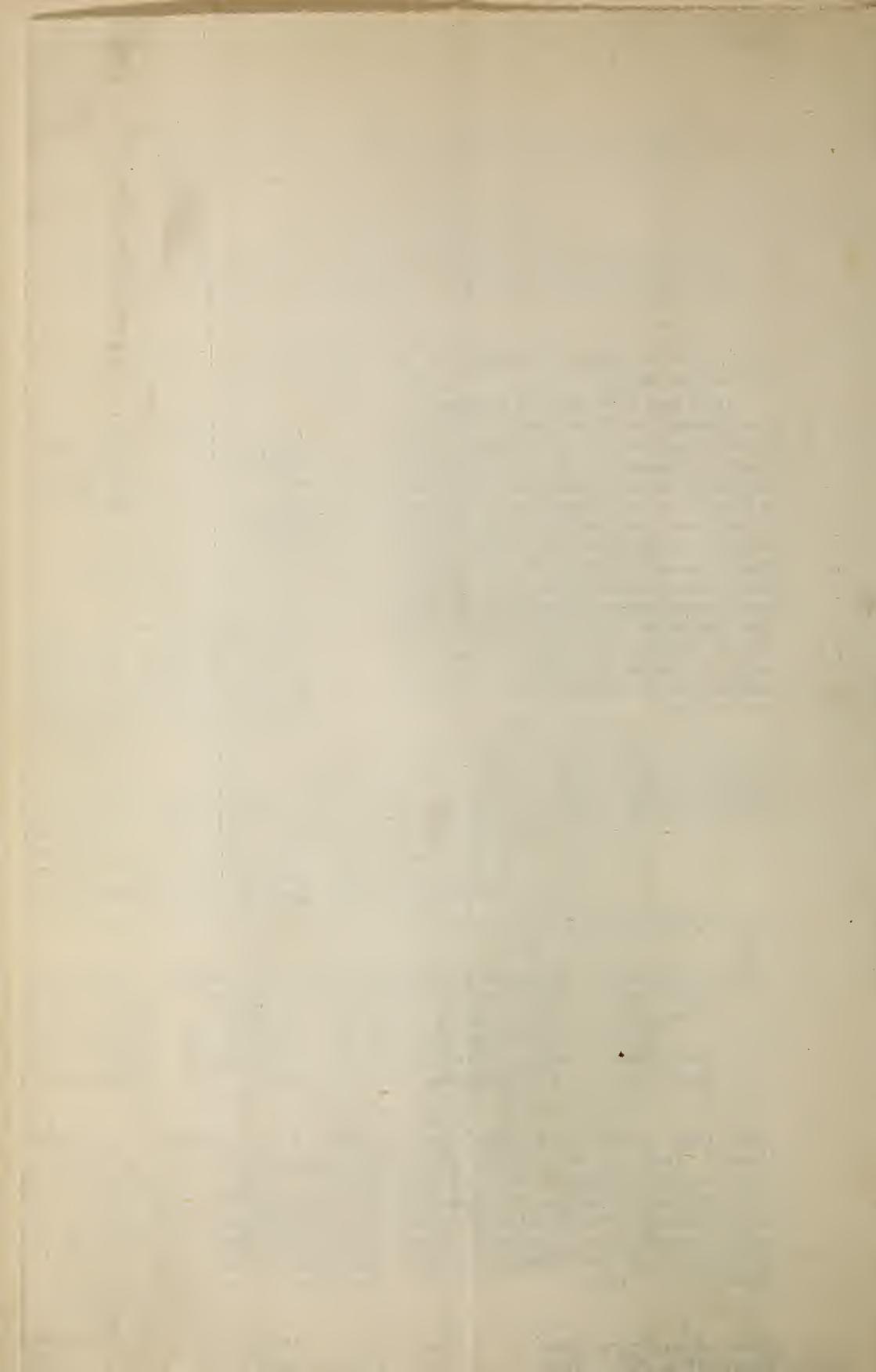

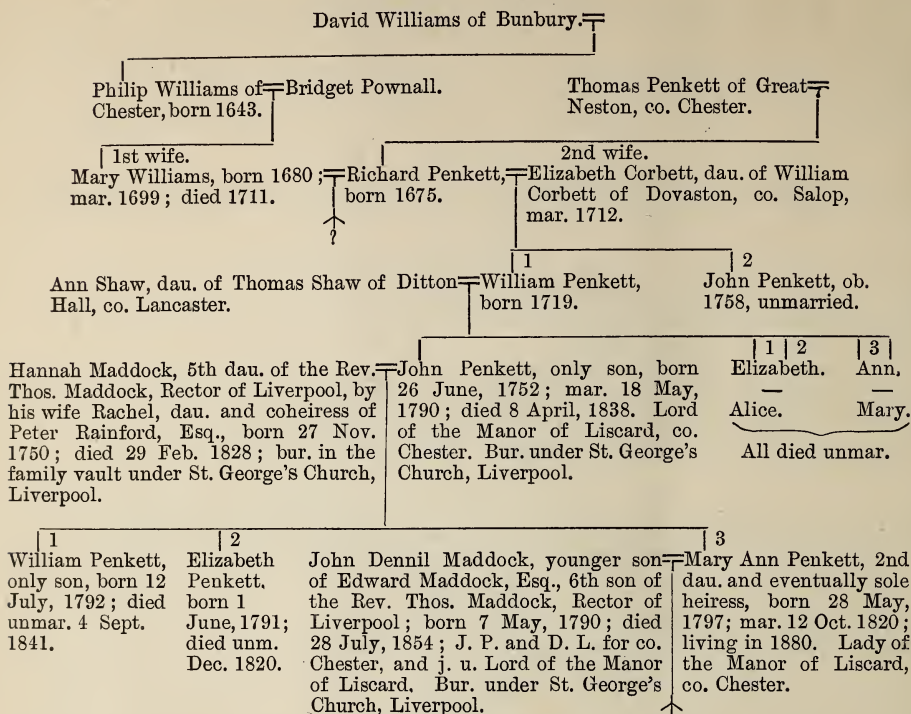

## PENKETT DESCENT.



The above short Pedigree is copied from a MS. in the handwriting of the late Robert Maddock of Chester, a son of the Rev. Thos. Maddock, M.A., Prebendary of Chester, and Rector of Northenden, and grandson of the Rev. Thos. Maddock, Rector of Liverpool, above-mentioned, and a zealous antiquary and genealogist, the later dates being filled in on the information of Mrs. J. D. Maddock of Liscard Manor.

The compiler of the above also writes:—"Dovaston is in the parish of Kinnerley, seven and a half miles S.E. of Oswestry. Peter Corbet, Baron 1295, died seized of the manor of Dinoreweston, a member of the Barony of Caus, 28th Edward I., A.D. 1300. Robert Corbet, Lord of Caus, etc., ob. 1221; his son and heir Thos. Corbet, ob. 1273; his son and heir Peter Corbet, ob. 1300; his son and heir Peter Corbet, ob. 1322, and his brother John ob. s.p."

Several pieces of plate bearing the Corbet Crest—the elephant and castle—were recently in possession of the descendants of Richard Penkett.

This family is supposed to be descended from the Penkeths, Lords of Penketh, co. Lancaster, and bears the same Arms:—"Argent, 3 Kingfishers pp<sup>r</sup>." "The Lord of Penketh, says the ancient Duchy Feodary, holds of Sir W<sup>m</sup> Boteler, the 5<sup>th</sup> part of a Knight's fee in Penketh, which Roger Penketh formerly held." This Lord was probably Jordan de Penket, who, in 1363, gave to his son Robert all his lands in Penket. Among the witnesses is Richard de Ashton.

Lucas says: "The Lordship of that name in the parish of Prescot was held by them till Margaret, dau. and heir of Richard Penketh of Penketh, mar. Richard Ashton, and became seized thereof."

In King's 'Vale Royal' (Ormerod, vol. i., 38), we find in the list of "Cheshire Knights and gentlemen who compounded with parliament for their Estates" the name of "Thomas Penkett of Sutton £66 : 5 : 0." Is not this the Thomas Penkett of Great Neston at the head of the above Pedigree, or his father?

Any information regarding the families above mentioned will be very acceptable to me.
