SUBJECT: Japanese Capital Levy Tax

TO: See Distribution

1. Information received from higher headquarters concerning the application of the capital levy tax law to non-Japanese nationals residing in Japan brought out the fact that nationals of the United Nations are exempt from the Japanese capital levy tax, but that all other non-Japanese nationals residing in Japan are subject to this tax.

2. Only the nations which were signatories to the United Nations Declaration dated 1 January 1942, and nations associated with them during the war, are included in the term "United Nations", as used above. These are:

SUBJECT: Deletion of Plants Subject to Reparations.

TO : See Distribution

1. It has come to the attention of this headquarters that numerous applications of Japanese firms for removal from the reparations list have been delayed by Military Government teams for a considerable period of time. These applications consist of petitions from individual companies, as well as letters from the Central Liaison Office, Imperial Japanese Government.

2. It is mandatory that all such applications be submitted to higher headquarters for review and necessary action. The final authority for approval or disapproval of such applications rests with the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers. Military Government regions and teams operating under the jurisdiction of this headquarters are directed to conduct required investigations immediately upon receipt of petitions, and to forward the applications to this headquarters as rapidly as possible.

1. Reference is made to the following memoranda for the Imperial Japanese Government from General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers:

a. File AG 387.6 (13 Aug 46) ESS/IN, (SCAPIN 1129), subject: Repairs Selections within the Soda and Caustic Soda Industries, dated 13 August 1946.

b. File AG 387.6 (13 Aug 46) ESS/IN, (SCAPIN 1130), subject: Repairs Selections within the Iron and Steel Industry, dated 13 August 1946.

2. a. Electric power plants that have been taken into custody as a part of one of the following industries, namely, aircraft, arsenals, private-munitions and laboratories, should not be inventoried as individual items of equipment but should be treated as an integrated facility. Inventorying of these plants should be held in abeyance pending the receipt of further instructions.

b. Electric power plants that are a part of an integrated facility, such as; soda ash, sulphuric acid, iron and steel plants, or ship-yards should be treated as an integral part of such an establishment. Instructions for inventories of machinery and equipment will be issued at a later date.

3. The attached list of plants (Inclosure No. 1) is included for information and guidance.

2. In compliance with instructions set forth in paragraph 2, reference 1d above, you are directed to conduct monthly inspections of oil refineries in your area of jurisdiction to assure that the following provisions are adhered to:

a. All petroleum refineries outside the crude oil producing areas have completely deactivated petroleum refining operations. This is required by reference 1b, above.

b. No major repairs, rehabilitation or conversion of oil refineries is accomplished without the specific approval of SCAP.

3. Any irregularities noted will be immediately reported to this headquarters.

4. Grease factories, cutting oil plants, and waste oil refineries indicated in inclosure 1 to 1d above, will be permitted to continue operation.

1. Reference is memorandum for the Imperial Japanese Government from General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, file AG 387.6 (13 Aug 46) FSS/IN, (SCAPIN 1134), dated 13 August 1946, subject: Reparations Selections within Privately-Owned Munitions Plants.

2. There has been some misunderstanding as to what portions of chemical plants which have been taken into custody as military explosive plants under the subject directive should be held in custody. For the purposes of this directive, the following definitions are used:

a. A plant is an establishment composed of one or more production units, operating as an entity under one management and confined to one geographical location. It may utilize several buildings which need not be physically connected or located within a single enclosure.

b. An integrated production unit is a part of a plant capable of independently producing an end product or component and susceptible of being removed as a unit without destroying the balance of the plant.

c. A chemical plant is an establishment producing basic chemicals, or an establishment manufacturing products by predominantly chemical processes.

3. The criteria assumed for these selections for reparations include the interpretation of the terminology "military explosives" to mean "military explosives and closely allied intermediate products used to manufacture such explosives." The selection of units producing such intermediates was based on the determination that the units were built to produce the listed intermediate chemicals specifically for use in military explosives; thus the fact that some of the chemicals in question may have peacetime uses did not affect the selection.

4. The plants listed on Inclosure number 1 which have been taken into custody as explosive plants under the subject directive should be released from this custody except for the listed units which should remain in custody. The remainder of the units in these plants do not meet the criteria of privately-owned munitions plants to be listed for reparations as referred to in paragraph 3 above.

SUBJECT: Clarification of Directives Selecting Chemical Plants for Repairs.

TO: See Distribution.

To assist commanders in making decisions on petitions by the Japanese for the release of machinery or equipment from reparation installations, the following extract of an indorsement from the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers is quoted:

"1. When a plant designated for repairs is composed of two or more parts, only that portion of the plant should be taken which qualifies under the established criteria for the type of plant indicated.


"2. The list of Synthetic Rubber Plants accompanying SCAPIN 1277 refers only to such portions of the listed companies as were engaged in the production of synthetic rubber. In the example cited, the synthetic rubber plant alone is to be taken into custody; the fertilizer and benzene plants, though located within the main grounds, are not to be placed under custody and control by SCAPIN 1277. It is pointed out, however, that several synthetic rubber plants, because of war-time equipment shortages, utilized items of equipment in their synthetic rubber system which were originally designed for, or located in, other portions of their plant. When production of synthetic rubber ceased, this equipment was incorporated in its original place in the plant scheme. Such equipment, once used in the synthetic rubber system, must be placed under custody.

"3. Similarly, a sulfuric acid plant is defined as that equipment regularly used in the manufacture of the one principal product, sulfuric acid. This includes any auxiliary equipment, such as cranes for unloading pyrite ore, conveyor belts for movement of ore, crushers, water circulation pumps serving the plant, electrical equipment (transformers, etc.), bottling plant, etc. Some contact plants also make chemically pure acid; the equipment used for this process is also construed to be part of the plant. However, the equipment used to make sulfuric acid derivatives is not part of the sulfuric acid plant. For example, equipment to make dyes, chloro-sulfonic acid, etc., does not fall under the definition of a sulfuric acid plant.

4. A caustic soda plant includes not only the electrical equipment, cell equipment (which includes the mercury in mercury-type cells), and caustic soda evaporators, but also all equipment used to recover chlorine. Chlorine recovery equipment consists of liquid chlorine bottling plants, bleaching powder and solution plants, hydrochloric acid plants, and auxiliary equipment servicing such plants. Hydrogen blowers and their accessory equipment servicing the caustic soda plants are also included."

It has been brought to the attention of this headquarters that many Japanese and foreign nationals either employed by or performing unofficial functions for the Occupation Forces have in their possession letters of introduction, certificates or some sort of credentials which have been issued by Occupation Forces personnel.

2. Although such credentials are assumed to have been issued in good faith and after mature reflection, it has happened that such documents have come into the possession of unscrupulous persons, who have employed them for purposes quite unintended by the signer. Such instances are embarrassing to the Occupation Forces as a whole.

3. Appropriate action will be taken to prevent further issuance by officers and men of your command of any such credentials. You will also declare invalid and void all passes, letters of introduction and special informal documents that may at present be in the hands of such personnel. This does not include proper identification certificates or other documents authorized by appropriate directives or instructions of this or higher headquarters.

1. It was contemplated that chemical plants scheduled for reparations would be required to cease operations gradually, and to this end tentative shutdown schedules were developed, beginning with caustic soda plants. It has since been decided that the Imperial Japanese Government will not be required to suspend operations in chemical plants at this time, and the tentative schedule will not be implemented.

INFO: The following radio, Hq 8th Army, cite DZ 99607 is quoted for your information and compliance: "Subject is, Japanese Land Reform Program. The following instructions and information from SCAP are furnished for your guidance:

Part 1. The election for city, town and village land commissioners will be held between 20 and 31 December 1946.

Part 2. The Ministry of Agriculture and Forestry sent a telegram on 12 December to all Prefectural Governors directing them to utilize all means at their disposal to publicize the local land commissioner elections. They were also instructed to call meetings immediately with the heads of their respective district offices, informing them on their responsibility in seeing that farmers under their jurisdiction were informed of the elections and the implications of the elections. The Prefectural Governors were instructed also to see that the district officers held meetings immediately with the masters of towns and villages and the presidents of village Agriculture Cooperative Associations in order that they could be informed of their responsibilities regarding the elections.

Part 3. The registration of voters for the local land commission elections is supposed to have taken place in each village in Japan on or before 10 November 1946, and the records of the results of this registration are supposed to be on file in each village office at the present time.

Part 4. It is requested that Military Government Teams in each Prefecture do the following:

A. Verify the fact that the Prefectural Governors call meeting with their respective district heads, and if possible that Military Government Officers in each Prefecture attend these meetings to give added impetus to the publicity program.

B. Require and verify that the Prefectural Governors give prominent press publicity to the elections and carry out such other publicity measure as are feasible.

C. Verify the fact that the district heads hold meetings with their respective towns and village masters.

D. Insofar as possible make spot checks of villages to see that election posters are displayed in prominent places, and that registered voter lists are in the village office."

Instruction with regard to submission of reports on this program will be communicated later.
