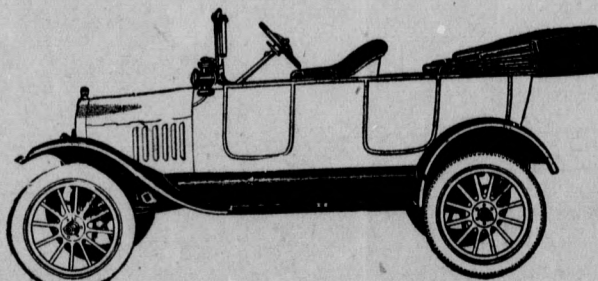

**LINEBERGER FOR CONGRESS**

No moral principle that has been championed by the best citizenry of the district will suffer at the hands of this candidate, for I can personally vouch for his dry record and his Christian affiliations.

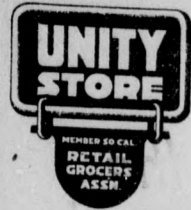

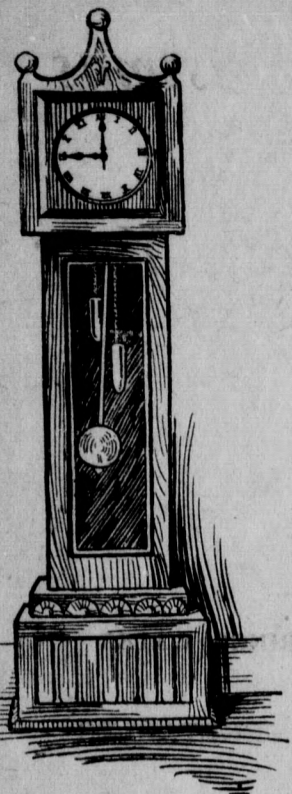
