

THE GOVERNOR GENERAL.

(Appointed September 26, 1904, £10,000.)

His Excellency the Right Honorable Sir Albert Henry George, Earl Grey, United Kingdom, (1806), Viscount Howick, Baron Grey of Howick in the County of Northumberland, (1801), and a baronet, (1746), Knight Grand Cross Most Distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George, (1904); is the son of the late General Hon. Charles Grey and his wife, Caroline, daughter of Sir Thomas Henry Farquhar, Bart. He was born November 28, 1851, and was educated at Harrow and Trinity College, Cambridge, being graduated a senior in law and history tripos in 1873. He represented South Northumberland in the British House of Commons from 1880-1885 and Northumberland (Tyneside) in 1885-6. He was Administrator of Rhodesia in 1896-7 and has been a Director of the British South Africa Company since 1898. He was appointed Lord Lieutenant of Northumberland in 1899 and continued in that office until he was appointed Governor General. On Jan. 25, 1905, the honorary degree of LL.D. was conferred on him by McGill University, Montreal. Earl Grey comes of a distinguished family which has been prominent in the history of Northumberland for several centuries. The first earl was a general in the American Revolutionary war and the second was the celebrated Charles, Earl Grey, one of the distinguished statesmen of the early part of the last century. His Excellency succeeded his uncle, the third earl, on October 9, 1894. He married on June 9, 1877, Alice, third daughter of Robert Stayner Holford, M.P., of Westonbirt, County of Gloucester, and Dorchester House, Park Lane, and has one son and three daughters living:—Lady Victoria Sybil Mary, born 1878, married 1901 to Arthur Morton Grenfell, Great Northumberland Place W., and has issue a son and a daughter; Charles Robert, Viscount Howick, (heir), born December 15, 1879, educated at Eton and Trinity College, Cambridge, formerly a Lieutenant in the First Life Guards; Lady Sybil, born 1882; and Lady Evelyn Alice, born 1886. The family seat is Howick House, Lesbury, Northumberland, the London residence being 22 South Street, Park Lane W. He was appointed Governor General of Canada September 26, 1904, landed at Halifax on December 10, 1904, and was sworn in on the same day.

HIGH COMMISSIONER IN LONDON FOR CANADA.

(Appointed April 24, 1896, \$10,000.)

The Rt. Hon. Sir Donald Alexander Smith, G.C.M.G., Baron Strathcona and Mount Royal, 1st B. (cr. 1897). Born in Morayshire, Scotland, 1821; Ed. there. Came to Canada in the service of the Hudson Bay Company, and was elected Governor of that Corporation in 1888; is President of the Bank of Montreal, and a director of the Canadian Pacific and the Great Northern Railways; is an Hon. LL.D. Cambridge and Yale Universities; has been High Commissioner for Canada in London since 1896; previously sat in the Canadian Commons for Selkirk, 1871-1878, and for Montreal W., 1887-1896; was knighted in 1896; is Chancellor of McGill University, and was elected Chancellor of Aberdeen University on November 4, 1903.

ADMINISTRATOR OF THE GOVERNMENT.

A dormant commission passed under the Royal Sign Manual and Signet, dated May 7, 1901, appoints the Chief Justice for the time being of the Supreme Court of Canada,

or in case of the death, incapacity, removal or absence from Canada of the Chief Justice, the Senior Judge of the Supreme Court of Canada, to administer the Government of the Dominion in the event of the death, incapacity, removal or absence of the Governor General. The Administrator is vested with all the powers and authorities granted to the Governor General by letters patent or otherwise.

DEPUTY GOVERNOR GENERAL.

By Order-in-Council, dated January 5, 1905, Charles J. Jones, I.S.O., B.A., Chief Clerk in the Governor General's Office, is appointed the Deputy of the Governor General for the purpose of signing Warrants of Election, Proclamations, Writs for the Election of Members of the House of Commons, and Letters Patent of the Dominion and other lands, whether the Governor General be absent or not.

IMPERIAL SERVICE ORDER.

Instituted by King Edward, August 8, 1902, for faithful and meritorious service in the Civil Service. Consists of the Sovereign, Prince of Wales, and 425 companions, 175 being for the colonies. Companions of the Order add the letters I.S.O. after their names. The badge of the Order is a medallion of gold and enamel, worn on the left breast, suspended by a ribbon of one inch in width.

TRANSPORTATION COMMISSION.

By Order in Council, dated August 26, 1903, John Bertram, of the City of Toronto; Robert Reford, of the City of Montreal, and Edward C. Fry, of the City of Quebec were appointed Commissioners to enquire into and report upon questions affecting the transportation of Canadian products to the markets of the world through and by Canadian ports, of whom Mr. Bertram was named as Chairman.

Mr. Bertram died in November, 1904, and the vacancy in the Commission was filled by the appointment of J. H. Ashdown, of Winnipeg. Mr. Reford is now Chairman.

ALASKAN BOUNDARY COMMISSION.

The International Commission to arbitrate the question of the boundary line between the United States territory, known as Alaska, and the territory of the Dominion of Canada, met in London, England, September, 1903. The Right Hon. Lord Alverstone, Lord Chief Justice of England, His Honor Sir Louis Jette, K.C.M.G., and A.B. Aylesworth, Esq., K.C., represented His Britannic Majesty

on the tribunal, while Hon. Clifford Sifton, K.C., Minister of the Interior for Canada, acted as the British Agent and prepared the case. The United States representatives were the Hon. Elihu Root, Secretary of War in the Roosevelt Administration, Senator Turner and Senator Lodge.

A majority of the Commissioners reached an agreement on Saturday, Oct. 17, 1903, but the Canadian Commissioners refused to sign the award, which sustained all the contentions of the United States except regarding the Portland Canal. They drew up and filed a reasoned protest embodying their objections to the award. On their return to Canada, Sir Louis Jette and Mr. Aylesworth were tendered public banquets, that to Mr Aylesworth taking place at Toronto on Nov. 22, 1903.

HUDSON BAY EXPEDITIONS.

By Order-in-Council of August 13, 1903, A. P. Low, of Ottawa, was appointed to be officer in charge of an expedition to Hudson Bay and northward thereof, in the steamship "Neptune," which sailed from Halifax August 23, 1903. They first touched at Nachbak, on the Labrador coast, thence to Cumberland Guif and Baffin's Land. They spent the winter north of Chesterfield Inlet, and made a number of sledge expeditions of investigation. The expedition returned to Halifax Oct. 11, 1904, having been absent a year and 51 days.

On her return voyage the "Neptune" met the "Arctic," with a second expedition, under Major John D. Moodie, of the N.W.M.P., who was appointed in charge of the "Arctic" on Sept. 15, 1904. Major Moodie was on the same date appointed a Fishery Officer under the Fisheries Act, and under An Act respecting Fishing by Foreign Vessels.

THE BOWELL RECONSTRUCTION.

On the 4th January, 1896, seven members of the Cabinet resigned, and on the 15th January the Cabinet was filled up, Hon. Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper remaining out and the following being sworn in: Hon. Sir Charles Tupper, Bart.; Hon. George E. Foster, Hon. J. G. Haggart, Hon. W. B. Ives, Hon. A. R. Dickey, Hon. W. H. Montague, Hon. A. Desjardins, Hon. J. F. Wood. Mr. Dickey took Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper's place as Minister of Justice; Mr. Montague became Minister of Agriculture, and Sir Charles Tupper, Bart., Secretary of State and leader of the House of Commons. The Hon. A. Desjardins was sworn of the Privy Council and appointed Minister of Militia. Hon. Messrs. Foster, Haggart, Ives and Wood were re-appointed to the portfolios they held prior to January 4th.

The Hon. John F. Wood, as Controller of Customs, and the Hon. E. G. Prior, as Controller of Inland Revenue were sworn of the Privy Council and called to the Cabinet December, 1895.

THE TUPPER MINISTRY (Seventh).

Mr. Mills having accepted a seat on the bench of the Supreme Court of Canada, Mr. Fitzpatrick, the Solicitor-General, was appointed Minister of Justice, Mr. Carroll becoming Solicitor-General.

THE PARLIAMENT OF CANADA.

(1905.)

The Parliament of Canada consists of the Sovereign, the Senate and the House of Commons.

THE SOVEREIGN.

His Most Excellent Majesty, Edward VII., by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, KING, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India; born Nov. 9, 1841; succeeded to the Throne Jan. 22, 1901, on the death of his mother, Victoria.

THE SENATE.

The Senate, as at present constituted, consists of 83 members, 24 each from Ontario and Quebec, 10 each from Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, 4 each from Prince Edward Island and Manitoba, 3 from British Columbia and 4 from the North-West Territories.

THE HOUSE OF COMMONS.

The House of Commons, which is elected by the people for a maximum term of five years, consists of 214 members.

The number is fixed under the provisions of the Act of Confederation, and the representation is arranged after each decennial census, by Act of Parliament, the basis being that the Province of Quebec is always to have 65 representatives, and each of the other Provinces such a number as will give the same proportion of representatives to its population as the number 65 bears to the population of Quebec, as ascertained by the census. British Columbia, by the terms of the agreement made between the Dominion and Province prior to the union, is to have at least six members.

A Redistribution Bill, introduced by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, March 31, 1903, provided for an increase in the membership of the House of Commons from 213 to 214, divided as follows:—

THE SENATE OF CANADA.

The Senate of Canada is the creation of the B.N.A. Act, and consists of 83 members, divided as follows: Ontario, 24; Quebec, 24; Nova Scotia, 10; New Brunswick, 10; Prince Edward Island, 4; Manitoba, 4; North-West, 4; British Columbia, 3. The North-West formerly had only two representatives in the Senate, but this number was increased by two in the session of 1903 (3 Edward VII., Chap. 42). The qualifications for appointment by the Crown are a minimum age of 30 years and a property qualification of \$4,000 over and above all liabilities. Sessional indemnity, \$1,500.

Is a Fellow of the Royal Colonial Inst. and of the Royal Agric. Soc. Resides most of the time at Duck's. El. to Ho. of Commons at g.e., 1896. M.,

June 12, 1891, Lizzie Jean McCombie, youngest d. of Hugh Cowie, Esq., Q.C., of Ithandale, Wimbledon, Eng., and Chancellor of Durham. Apptd. to the Senate June 6, 1904. Church of England. A Liberal.

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BOUCHER DE BOUCHERVILLE, HON. CHARLES EUGENE, M.D., C.M.G. (Montarville). Des. from Lt.-Gen. Pierre Boucher, Sieur de Grosbois who became Gov. of Three Rivers, 1653. S. of late Hon. P. V. Boucher, M.L.C., and Emelie de Bleury, B. at Boucherville, Que., May, 4, 1822. Ed. at St. Sulpice Coll., Montreal, and was graduated M.D. at Paris, 1843. El. to Canadian Assembly for Chambly, 1861, and sat in Assembly until Confederation, when called to Legis. Council, and entered Chauveau Admn. as Speaker of Council. Retired with M. Chauveau, 1873. Became Premier of Quebec, Sept., 1874. Dismissed with his colleagues, by the Lt.-Gov., March, 1878. Called to Senate of Canada, 1879. Was made a C.M.G., May, 1894. Called on by Lt.-Gov. Angers, he formed a Ministry after the dismissal of Premier Mercier, Dec. 21, 1891. Resigned Dec. 16, 1892. Continues to sit in Legis. Council as well as in Senate. M., (1st), Susanna, d. of the late R. M. Morrough, Montreal, (she died), and (2nd), d. of the late Felix Lussier, Seigneur of Varennes (she died Jan., 1892). A Conservative.

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BOWELL, LT.-COL. HON. SIR MACKENZIE, K.C. M.G., P.C. (Hastings). S. of the late John Bowell, carpenter and builder. B. at Rickinghall, Suffolk, Eng., Dec. 27, 1823. Came to Canada with his parents when nine years of age. Entered a printing office as apprentice in 1834, and in 1896 resumed his connection with the newspaper press as editor and proprietor of the Belleville *Intelligencer*. Assisted in 1857 in raising a rifle Co. Served on the frontier during the American war in 1864-5, and during the Fenian troubles in 1866. Was Capt. of No. 1 Co., 15th Argyle Light Infantry, and subsequently Major in the 49th Rifles, finally retiring with the rank of Lt.-Col. Has been Chairman Bd. of Sch. Trustees, Belleville; Grand Master, Orange Grand Lodge of Ontario East; Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of British America, and President of the Tri-Annual Council of Orangeism. An unsuccessful candidate in N. Hastings for Can. Assembly, g.e., 1863. El. to Ho. of Commons for N. Hastings, g.e., 1867, and sat continuously until called to the Senate of Canada Dec. 5, 1892. Entered the Macdonald Admn. as Minister of Customs Oct. 19, 1878. Was Minister of

Militia in the Abbott Admn., Jan. 25, 1892, and Minister of Trade and Commerce in the Thompson Admn., Dec. 5, 1893, until the death of Sir John Thompson, Dec. 12, 1894, when called upon by Gov.-Gen. to form a Ministry, which he succeeded in doing Dec. 21, 1894. Took office of Pres. of the Council. Reconstructed Ministry Jan. 15, 1896. Resigned April 27, 1896. Was Leader of the Senate from 1893 to 1896. Now Leader of the Opposition in the Senate. As Minister of Trade and Commerce, went to Australia, 1893, for purpose of developing trade between the two countries, and in support of the Pacific cable. Submitted a report on his return. Was Chairman of the Ottawa Colonial Conference, June, 1894. Created a Knight Commander of the Order of St. Michael and St. George, Jan. 1, 1895. Was one of the delegates to England on behalf of Canada to attend the meeting called to consider the Pacific cable project. Is Pres. of the Imperial Life Assn. of Canada, and Pres. of the Belleville Hardware Mfg. Co. M., Dec. 1847, Harriet Louisa, d. of the late Jacob G. Moore, of Belleville (she died 1884). A Conservative. P.O. address, Belleville, Ont. Clubs—Rideau, Ottawa; Albany, Toronto.

CARLING, HON. SIR JOHN, K.C.M.G., P.C. (London) S. of the late Thos. Carling, a native of Yorkshire, Eng., who came to Canada in 1818, and settled in Middlesex, Ont. B. in Tp. of London, Middlesex, Ont., Jan. 23, 1828. Ed. there. El. to the Pub. Sch. Bd. in Jan., 1850, and sat there for four yrs., when el. to City Council in 1854, where he served four yrs. El. Dir. Great Western Ry., 1868, and later a Dir. of the Port Stanley Ry. and of the London, Huron and Bruce Ry. Was Pres. of Bd. of Water Commrs. of London in 1878, when the present system of water works was constructed. Sat in the old Can. Legis. from 1857 to 1867. Was Receiver-General in the Cartier-Macdonald Govt., 1862. At Confederation was el. for London to Ho. of Commons, and also to Ont. Legis. Was Commr. of Agric. and Public Works in Sandfield Macdonald Govt., from July, 1867, until Dec., 1871. Again el. at g.e., 1872, to Ho. of Commons, but defeated at g.e., 1874. Again el. for London at g.e., 1878. Entered Sir John Macdonald's Admn. as Postmaster-General, May 23, 1882. Became Min. of Agric. in the Macdonald Admn., Sept. 25, 1885. An unsuccessful candidate for London at g.e., 1891. Apptd. to the Senate April 27, 1891. Resigned in Feb., 1892, to contest bye-election in London for the Ho. of Commons, and was declared elected. Ceased to be Min.

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of Agric. on the dissolution of the Abbott Ministry, Dec. 5, 1892. Became member of Sir John Thompson's Cabinet without portfolio, Dec. 5, 1892. Again apptd to the Senate, April 23, 1896. In 1892 was offered the position of Lieut.-Gov. of Ontario, but declined the honor, and in the following year declined the proffered appointment of Honorary Commissionership for Canada at the World's Fair at Chicago. Created a Knight Commander of the Order of St. Michael and St. George, June 3, 1893. In March, 1893, the Standing Committee on Agric. of the Ho. of Commons adopted a resolution recording its appreciation of the services rendered by him to the agric. interests of the Dominion. Is Pres. of the Carling Brewing and Malting Co. M. Hannah, d. of the late Henry Dalton, London, Ont. A Conservative.

CARTWRIGHT, RT. HON. SIR RICHARD JOHN, G.C.M.G., P.C. (Home). S. of the late R. D. Cartwright, Chaplain to the Forces, Kingston, Ont., and his wife, Harriet, d. of Conway Edward Dobbs, of Dublin, Irel., and is the grandson of Hon. Richard Cartwright, formerly a Judge of Common Pleas in U.C., and afterwards a member of the Legis. Council of that Province. B. at Kingston, Ont., Dec. 14, 1835. Ed. at Trinity Coll., Dublin. Became Pres. of the Commercial Bank of Canada. Is Pres., Dir. or Trustee of several commercial and financial corporations. During its existence was Pres. of the Reform Club, Toronto. El. to Parliament of Old Canada for Lennox and Addington, 1863, and continued to sit for that constituency until 1867. From Confederation down to 1878, represented Lennox in Ho. of Commons. Defeated in Lennox at g.e., 1878. Was returned for Centre Huron at bye-election on resignation of H. Horton. An unsuccessful candidate for Centre Wellington at g.e., 1882. Again el. at bye-election, Dec., 1883, for S. Huron on resignation of sitting member, J. McMillan. El. at g.e., 1887, for S. Oxford; re-el. 1891, 1896 and 1900. Was Finance Minister in the Mackenzie Admn. from Nov. 7, 1873, until Oct. 16, 1878, when Ministry resigned. Created K.C.M.G., 1879. Was chief financial critic, and one of the leaders of the Opposition in Parlt. until g.e., 1896, when his party was returned to power and he became Minister of Trade and Commerce in the Admn. of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, July 13, 1896. Was the recipient of one of the honors of Her Majesty's Diamond Jubilee, June 20, 1897, when he received the Grand Cross of the Order of St. Michael and St. George. During the

summer of 1897, when Sir Wilfrid Laurier represented Canada at the celebration of the Queen's Jubilee, was acting Premier and Leader in the Ho. of Commons. Went to Washington in 1897 to promote better relations between Canada and the U.S. Proposed a joint commission and represented Canada on that commission when it sat at Quebec in the summer of 1898. Made a member of the Imperial Privy Council. M., 1859, Frances, d. of Col. Alex. Lawe, of Cork, Irel. Apptd. to Senate, Sept. 30, 1904. A Liberal.

CASGRAIN, HON. CHARLES EUSEBE, C.M., M.D., (Windsor). Des. from old and distinguished French ancestry. S. of late Hon. Chas. E. Casgrain and his wife, Anne Elizabeth, d. of late Hon. Jas. Baby. Ed. at Coll. of Ste. Anne's, Que., afterwards taking medical course at McGill Univ., Montreal, where he was graduated in 1851 as Master of Surgery and Doctor of Medicine. Practised in Detroit until 1856, when he removed to Windsor. Shortly afterwards was appointed Coroner and Jail Surgeon for Co. of Essex. Capt. of the Sandwich Co. of Essex Batt. and subsequently surgeon to troops at Windsor during Fenian Raids of 1861-1864. Was three yrs. mem. of the Mun. Council, and 18 yrs. mem. of the Bd. of Ed. Called to the Senate, 1887. In 1883 was created a Knight of the Order of the Holy Sepulchre. M. (1st) in 1851, Charlotte Mary Chase, d. of Thomas Chase, of Detroit, Mich., formerly of Quebec (she died); (2nd) Mary Ann Dougall, d. of R. P. Street, formerly of Hamilton, Ont. (she died Oct. 21, 1904). A Conservative.

CASGRAIN, HON. JOSEPH PHILIPPE BABY (de Lanaudiere). A mem. of one of the oldest French families in Can. His paternal ancestors belonged to an ancient family at Ervault, in Poitou, France. The first to come to Can. was Jean Baptiste Casgrain, an officer in the French army, who landed about 1750. His s. Pierre was Lord of the Seigniories of Riviere Ouelle and L'Islet. Descended from Jacques Babie, an officer of the regt. of Carignan-Saliers, who landed in Quebec in 1665, and whose descendants of that name have occupied high and responsible positions in the country. He is a grandson of the late Charles Eusebe Casgrain, Lt.-Col., unattached, who sat for Cornwallis in the L. C. Assembly from 1830 to 1834; was a mem. of the Special Council of L. C. from 1838 to 1840, and at his death held the office of Asst. Commr. of Pub. Works for Canada. He is a great-grand-

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 son of Hon. James Baby, at one time Speaker of the L. C. of U. C. Is the s. of P. B. Casgrain, K.C., ex.-M.P., and Matilde Parent, his wife. B. at Quebec, March 1, 1856. Ed. at Seminary of Quebec. M., May 27, 1885, Ella, d. of the late James William Cook, M.P., Dundas, Ont. Founder and first Pres. of English Liberal Club of Montreal. Pres. of Montreal Reform Club and Montreal Club. A Civil Engineer and Dominion, Quebec, Ontario and Manitoba Land Surveyor. A member of the Ottawa Improvement Commission, Second Vice-Pres. of the Cook Bros. Lumber Co. Called to Senate, Jan. 29, 1900. A Roman Catholic. A Liberal. Clubs—St. James and Montreal, Montreal; Rideau Club, Ottawa.

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 CHOQUETTE, HON. PHILIPPE AUGUSTE, I.L.D. (Grandville). Ancestors came from Amiens, Picardie, France, in 1643, and settled in Varennes, Co. of Vercheres. S. of Joseph Choquette, farmer, and Marie T. Audet, his wife. B. at Beloeil, Co. of Vercheres, Jan. 6, 1854, Ed. at St. Hyacinthe Coll. and at Laval Univ., where he was graduated B.C.L. in 1880, having previously taken the Silver Medal given by Lord Lorne, former Gov.-Gen. M., Aug. 29, 1883, Marie, d. of A. Bender, Prothonotary, and a grand-d. of the late Sir E. P. Tache. Was a commercial traveller for three yrs. An Advocate. Has been for some years a contributor to the newspaper press, and published the *Courrier de Montmagny* newspaper. Was an unsuccessful candidate for Montmagny at g.e., 1882. First el. to Ho. of Commons at g.e., 1887, and re-el. at g.e., 1891 and 1896. Apptd. to the Bench of the Superior Court of Quebec, July, 1898. Resigned Sept. 30, 1904, and was apptd. to the Senate. A Liberal.

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 CHURCH, HON. CHARLES EDWARD (Lunenburg). Of English and German origin. B. at Tancock Island, N.S., Jan. 3, 1835. Ed. at Chester and at Truro Normal Sch. Was a Sch. Teacher and afterwards a Merchant. Held important offices in the various temperance organizations. M., June, 1884, Miss Henrietta Pugsley, of Halifax. El. to Ho. of Commons for Lunenburg at g.e., 1872; defeated at g.e., 1878. El. to Legis. at g.e., 1882, for Lunenburg, and re-el. at each succeeding election. Was Prov. Sec. in the Pipes Admn.; Commr. of Works and Mines in the Fielding Admn., July 28, 1884; re-apptd. to same position in the Murray Admn., July, 1896. Called to the Senate, Feb. 8, 1902. A Liberal.

CLORAN, HON. HENRY JOSEPH, B.C.L., K.C., (Victoria). S. of Joseph Cloran and Ann Kennedy, his wife, both natives of Irel. B., May 8, 1855, at Montreal. Ed. at Montreal Coll., St. Sulpice Seminary in Paris, and McGill and Laval Univ. in Montreal. (B.C.L., K.C.) M., Oct. 9, 1882, to Agnes M. Donovan, who died Aug. 9, 1896. A Barrister. An unsuccessful candidate for the Ho. of Commons for Montreal Centre in 1887, and in Prescott Co., Ont., in 1896 and 1900. Was Crown Prosecutor from 1890 to 1892; Attorney of Prov. Revenue, 1897-1903; Reeve and Mayor of Hawkesbury from 1894 to 1901. Called to the Senate June 30, 1903. A Roman Catholic. A Liberal.

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COFFEY, HON. THOMAS (London). S. of Patrick Coffey and Ellen O'Keefe, his wife. B. Aug. 12, 1843, in Castleconnell, Co. Limerick, Irel. Ed. at Christian Brothers' Sch., Montreal. A Printer and Publisher. Publishes the *Catholic Record*, of London, Ont., where he resides. M. May 23, 1869. Called to the Senate of Canada, March 12, 1903. A Roman Catholic. A Liberal.

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COX, HON. GEORGE ALBERTUS (Toronto). Eng. parentage. S. of Edward W. Cox and his second wife, Jane Tanner. B. in Colborne, Northumberland Co., Ont., May 7, 1840. Ed. at Pub. and Gram. Schs. there. In 1856 was apptd. operator for the Montreal Telegraph Co., at Colborne, and in 1858 removed to Peterborough to take a similar position with that Co. M., May, 1862, second d. of late Daniel Hopkins, of Peterborough. From 1858 until 1871 he was actively engaged in life and fire insurance and real estate business in Peterborough, and in the latter year was apptd. Pres. and Gen. Man. of Midland Ry. which position he retained until the road became part of the G.T.R. in 1884. Is at present time Pres. of the following institutions: Can. Bank of Commerce, Central Can. Loan and Savings Co., Western Ass. Co., British American Ass. Co., Canada Life Ass. Co., Crow's Nest Pass Coal Co. and the Toronto Savings & Loan Co., and is also a Dir. of the National Trust Co., Can. General Electric Co., The Dominion Iron and Steel Co., and the Toronto Railway Co. Is also Bursar of Victoria Univ., Toronto, and a member of the Senate of the Univ. of Toronto. Was Mayor of Peterborough several years. In 1871 was el. for West Peterborough to Ho. of Commons, but el. being declared void, a new one was held and he was

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defeated by a majority of one. Ran unsuccessfully for same riding at g.e., 1887. Called to Senate, Nov. 13, 1896. A Methodist. A Liberal.

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DANDURAND, HON. RAOUL, B.C.L., K.C. (De Lorimier). S. of late Edipe Dandurand, merchant, Montreal. B. in Montreal, Nov. 4, 1861. Ed. at Montreal Coll. and Laval Univ. Received legal training in office of his cousin, late Joseph Doutre, Q.C. Is head of the law firm of Dandurand, Brodeur & Boyer. Has been Pres. of the Club National, and in 1891, for services rendered France, was created a Knight of the Legion of Honor. In conjunction with Charles Lanctot, is author of a "Treatise on Criminal Law" and a "Manual for Justices of the Peace." M., 1886, Josephine Marchand, d. of the late Premier of Quebec. Created K.C., 1898. Called to the Senate, Jan. 21, 1898. Apptd. Speaker of the Senate, Jan. 9, 1905. Madame Dandurand is an authoress of some repute, a laureate of the Royal Society, and Vice-Pres. of the National Council of Women. She was apptd. in May, 1898, by the French Govt., for her literary attainments, "Officier d'Academie," being the first Canadian woman thus honored. The De Lorimier division was called after one of the leaders of the rebellion of 1837-1838, who was executed at the same time as Duquette, who came from that division, and Mr. Dandurand's family is closely allied to both. A Liberal.

DAVID, HON. LAURENT OLIVIER (Mille Iles). S. of the late Major Stanislas David, Sault-au-Recollet, Que., and Elizabeth Tremblay, his wife. B. at Sault-au-Recollet, March 24, 1840. Ed. at the Coll. of St. Therese. Called to the Bar, 1864. Was law partner of Mr. Mousseau who afterwards became Premier of Quebec and subsequently a Judge. Assisted to establish and was chief editor of illustrated weekly called *L'Opinion Publique*, 1870. In 1874 joined Mr. Beausoleil, M.P., in founding *Le Bien Public*. Was a translator and asst. clerk of the votes and deliberations of the Ho. of Commons during the Mackenzie regime. Unsuccessfully contested Hochelaga for Local Legis. at g.e., 1867 and 1875, and for the Commons at g.e., 1878. Again an unsuccessful candidate for the Commons in Montreal East, g.e. 1891. El. to Local Legis. at g.e., 1886, for Montreal East, defeating Attorney-General Taillon. Delegate to the French-Canadian National Convention at Nashua, N.H., in 1888. Apptd. City Clerk of Montreal in May, 1892. Was Pres. St. Jean

Baptiste Soc., Montreal, 1887-8. Author of several works, including: "Biographies et Portraits," "Le Heros de Chateauguay," "Les Patriotes de 1837-38," "Mes Contemporains," "Les Deux Papineau," "L'Union des Deux Canadas (1841-1867)," "Le Clerge Canadien; Sa Mission et Son Oeuvre." The last named book was condemned at Rome, and Mr. David withdrew it from circulation. Fellow of the Royal Soc. of Canada. M., (1st) 1868, Miss Albina Chenet (she died July, 1887); (2nd) 1892, Miss Ludivine Garceau. Apptd. to the Senate, June 19, 1903. A Liberal.

DAVIS, HON. THOMAS OSBORNE (Saskatchewan). Of Irish des. S. of Samuel and Ann Davis. B. in Sherrington, Que., Aug. 16, 1856. Ed. at home by his father, a Trinity Coll. (Dublin), Man. Councillor and Mayor of Prince Albert. Pres. Bd. of Trade and Chairman of Pub. Sch. Bd. A General Storekeeper. El. to Ho. of Commons for Saskatchewan, Dec. 19, 1896, in place of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who was returned at the g.e., but vacated the seat by acceptance of office and was re-el. for Quebec East. Re-el. at g.e. 1900. Elected Liberal Whip of Ho. of Commons for the West, Feb., 1901. M., Sept., 1885, Rebecca Jennings, of P.E.I.; Apptd. to Senate, Sept. 30, 1904. A Liberal.

DOBSON, HON. JOHN (Lindsay). S. of John Dobson and Mary Henry, his wife. B. in Co. Fermanagh, Irel., Sept. 8, 1824. Ed. at Pub. Schs. After residing at Toronto for a few yrs. removed to Lindsay. El. Mayor of Lindsay by accl., 1873, and also Pres. of the Bd. of Trade. Has been Pres. of the S. Victoria Agric. Soc., and Chairman of the Sch. Bd. several yrs. Was also Pres. of the S. Victoria Conservative Assn. for over 25 yrs. Called to Senate, Feb. 23, 1892. A Conservative.

DOMVILLE, LT.-COL. HON. JAMES, F.R.C.I., F.I.I. (Rothsay). S. of the late Lt.-Gen. James W. Domville, Royal Regt. of Artillery, and his wife Frances, d. of the late Hon. Wm. Usher. B. Nov. 29, 1842. Ed. in England. Hon. Col. of the 8th Princess Louise New Brunswick Hussars, which Regt. he commanded for 20 yrs. (decoration). The Regt. volunteered for service in the Soudan in 1884 and 1896 and received the thanks of the Imperial Govt. and Viscount Lord Wolseley; was one of the officers who accompanied Rt. Hon. Sir Wilfrid Laurier to England at the late Queen's Jubilee (Medal); his Regt. was pre-

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sented with a silver trumpet by Gen. Herbert for efficiency, the only one given to cavalry in Canada. Was Chairman of the delegation from the St. John Bd. of Trade to Ottawa in 1871; sat as Ald. for City of St. John; founded the free Pub. Library; was Pres. of the King's Co. Bd. of Trade. El. to the Ho. of Commons, 1873-1874; defeated at g.e. 1882, by Hon. G. E. Foster; election was declared void by the courts; was unsuccessful candidate at bye-election, as also at bye-election made necessary by Mr. Foster accepting office in Dec., 1885; defeated at g.e., 1887 and 1891; el. at g.e., 1896; defeated at g.e., 1900. Was for four years Chairman of the Select Standing Committee of the House on Banking and Commerce. Was a Conservative up to 1882, but was returned in 1896 as a supporter of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Apptd. to the Senate, April 20, 1903. In 1897-8 he built and sailed the Str. "James Domville," the first British str. on the Yukon, and flew the first Union Jack. M., 1867, Isabella, d. of the late William Henry Scovil, of St. John. An unsuccessful candidate for the City of St. John, to carry Confederation when the Prov. rejected the proposed union. Church of England. A Liberal.

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 DRUMMOND, HON. SIR GEORGE A., K.C.M.G. (Kennebec). B. at Edinburgh, Scot., 1829. Ed. at famous High Sch. and equally famous Univ. of that City. Came to Montreal, 1854. M. (1st), d. of late John Redpath, (she died); (2nd), Grace Julia Hamilton, d. of late A. Davidson Parker. Is not at present in business, but is extensively interested in a large number of important financial and commercial institutions and manufacturing and mining Cos. Vice-Pres. Bank of Montreal; is also an ex-Pres. of the Bd. of Trade. Apptd. K.C.M.G., June 23, 1903. Called to Senate Dec. 1, 1888. A Conservative.

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 EDWARDS, HON. WILLIAM CAMERON (Russell). S. of the late William Edwards, a native of Portsmouth, Eng., who came to Canada about 1820, settling in Tp. of Clarence, Co. Russell, Ont., and his wife, Ann Cameron, a native of Fort William, Scot. B. in Clarence, May 7, 1844. Ed. at Ottawa Gram. Sch. An extensive Lumber Manufacturer. Has taken a practical interest in agric., and is a successful stock raiser. Has been for many yrs. Pres. Russell Agric. Soc. Is a Dir. of the Trusts Corporation, Toronto, and other Cos. Established lumber firm of W. C. Edwards & Co., 1868. An unsuccessful candidate for Ho. of Commons in Russell at g.e., 1882. El. at g.e., 1887.
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Seat declared void on petition, but was re-el., and again at g.e., 1891, 1896 and 1900. M., Jan., 1885, Catherine M., eldest d. of the late Wm. Wilson, Cumberland, Ont. Called to Senate, March 17, 1903. A Liberal.

ELLIS, HON. JOHN VALENTINE, LL.D., (St. John). S. of Michael and Margaret Ellis, both natives of Irel. B. in Halifax, N.S., 1835. Ed. at Pub. Sch. and entered the newspaper business. Has been proprietor and editor of the St. John Globe since 1862. El. to the N.B. Assembly for St. John, 1882, and re-el. in 1886. El. to the Ho. of Commons at g.e., 1887, for St. John City. M., 1873, Elizabeth, d. of John Scott, of Charlottetown. A J. P. since 1871. Was Collector of Inland Revenue for Charlottetown, 1873. El. to Legis. of P. E. I., 1878, and again in 1879, when he became Commr. of Pub. Works. Became Commr. of Pub. Lands and Prov. Secy. in 1880, and held these offices till 1890. Resigned from Prov. Legis. and Govt., and was unsuccessful candidate for Ho. of Commons 1891. Called to the Senate, 1893. Accepted seat without portfolio in Bowell Govt., Dec., 1894; also in the Tupper Ministry, May 1, 1896. Resigned with the Ministry, July 8, 1896. A Conservative.

FISET, HON. JOHN. BAPTISTE ROMUALD, M.D. (Gulf). S. of late Henri Fiset, of St. Cuthbert. B. at St. Cuthbert, Feb. 7, 1843. Ed. at Montreal Coll. and Laval Univ., Quebec (M.D., 1868). M. Aimée, d. of late Honore Plamondon, of Quebec. Is a Gov. of the Coll. of Physicians and Surgeons of Quebec, and has been Councillor, and subsequently Mayor, of Rimouski. Obtained his certificates as Capt. at the Military Sch. in Quebec, in 1865. Was apptd. Surgeon of the 89th Batt., Rimouski, in 1871, and in Sept., 1895, was elevated to the rank of Surgeon-Major. Retired with the rank of Lt.-Col., and received the medal for long service. In 1872, el. to Ho. of Commons for

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Rimouski, and sat until 1882, when defeated. El. again in 1887, but was defeated in g.e. of 1891. El. again in g.e., 1896. Called to the Senate, Oct 20, 1897. A Liberal.

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FORGET, HON. LOUIS J. (Sorel). Ancestors originally came to Canada from Normandie, France, about 1600. B. at Terrebonne, March, 11, 1853. Ed. at Masson Coll. M., May 2, 1876, Marie Raymond, Montreal. A Banker and Stockbroker. Is also Pres. of the Montreal Street Ry. Co., and Pres. of the Dominion Cotton Mills Co., and holds office of Pres. of Bd. of Governors of Laval Univ. Called to Senate, June, 1896. A Conservative. Clubs—Mount Royal, St. James and Hunt, Montreal.

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FROST, HON. FRANCIS THEODORE (Leeds and Grenville). Parents came from Vermont, settling in Canada, 1834, first at Hawkesbury, moving in 1838 to Smith's Falls. B. at Smith's Falls, Ont., Dec. 21, 1843. Ed. there and at Coventry, Vt., Acad. and St. Lawrence Acad., Potsdam, N.Y. M., June 3, 1868, Maria E. Powell, Madrid, N. Y. Was seven yrs. Reeve of Smith's Falls, 1876-1883, and first Mayor of that town, 1883. Warden of Co. Lanark, 1879-1880. An unsuccessful candidate for Ho. of Commons in South Lanark, 1878. Re-distribution Act, 1882, added Smith's Falls to North Leeds and Grenville. Contested North Leeds and Grenville at g.e., 1882, unsuccessfully. A candidate for Ont. Legis. in S. Lanark, 1886, but unsuccessful. A candidate for Ho. of Commons in N. Leeds and Grenville at g.e., 1891, but again defeated. First returned to Ho. of Commons at g.e., 1896. An unsuccessful candidate at g.e., 1900. Called to the Senate, March 12, 1903. Is head of the mfg. firm of the Frost & Wood Co., agricultural implements, established 1846. A mem. of the General Reform Assn. of Ontario. A Presbyterian. A Liberal.

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FULFORD, HON. GEORGE TAYLOR (Brockville). B. in Brockville, Ont., Aug. 8, 1852. S. of Hiram and Martha Harris Fulford; his ancestors were originally of Great Fulford, Devonshire, England, and U. E. Loyalist stock. Ed. at Brockville, Ont. M., Jan. 20, 1880, Mary Wilder White, d. of Dr. Henry Orne White, of Fort Atkinson, Wisconsin. A Methodist. A mem. of Brockville Town Council for 12 yrs. Chairman of the Finance Committee ten yrs. Was also a Water Commr. A mfg. Chemist, with depots at Brockville, Ont.; Schenectady, N.Y.; London, Eng.; Paris, France; Capetown, S.A.; Sydney,

N.S.W.; Wellington, N.Z.; Singapore, Straits Settlements; Rio Janiero, Brazil; Buenos Ayres, Argentine. A Dir. of the Toronto General Trusts Co., Ogilvie Flour Mills Co., Frost & Wood Co., The James Smart Mfg. Co. Called to the Senate of Canada, Jan. 29, 1900. A Liberal.

GIBSON, HON. WILLIAM (Lincoln). Eldest s. of the late William Gibson, Peterhead, Scotland. B. at Peterhead, Aug. 7, 1849, and ed. at Peterhead Acad. Came to Canada in April, 1870, and was engaged in the Engineering Department of the Great Western Ry., now a part of the Grand Trunk System, until Oct., 1878. Is an associate mem. of the Can. Soc. of Civil Engineers and a railway contractor, and has built during the last 25 yrs. many of the principal bridges on the Grand Trunk Ry., including the masonry of the St. Clair Tunnel in Canada and the United States, and the new Victoria Bridge at Montreal. El. Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Can., A.F. & A.M., which position he held from July, 1896, to July, 1898. He also held the position of first Grand Principal of the Grand Royal Arch Chapter of Can. for two yrs., and is at present Supreme Grand Master of the Sovereign Great Priory of Can., and Deputy for the Prov. of Ontario of the Supreme Council for the Dom. of Can., 33rd Degree, A. & A., Scottish Rite Masonry, and Foreign Representative of Grand Lodge of Quebec, and also Representative of each of the several Grades near the several Grand Bodies in Can. Is Pres. of the Bank of Hamilton, a Dir. of the Canada Life Ass. Co., of the Hamilton Provident & Loan Soc., the Hamilton Gaslight Co., the Keewatin Mfg. and Lumber Co., and the Keewatin Power Co. Clubs—Rideau Club, Ottawa, and Hamilton Club, Hamilton. A Presbyterian. A Liberal.

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GODBOUT, HON. JOSEPH, M.D. (La Salle). B. at St. Vital de Lambton, Co. of Beauce. Ed. at Laval Univ. and the Quebec Seminary. Was graduated at Laval Univ., March, 1877, in medicine, and subsequently removed to St. Francois, where he has followed his profession for 21 yrs. Has been married twice: (1st), Oct. 8, 1878, at Quebec, to Rachael Audet (she died Jan. 21, 1881); (2nd), to Mrs. G. N. Fauteux, née St. Pierre. El. Gov. of the Bureau of Physicians for Prov. of Quebec, July, 1895. Mayor of St. Francois, Beauce, Jan., 1898. First el. to Ho. of Commons at g.e., 1887, and re-el., 1891, 1896 and 1900. Called to the Senate, April 4, 1901. A Liberal.

GOWAN, HON. JAMES ROBERT, LL.D., K.C., C.M.G. (Barrie). S. of the late Henry Hatton Gowan and Elizabeth Burkett, his wife. B., at Cahore, Wexford Co., Irel., Dec. 22, 1815. Came to Canada 1832, and served as a volunteer in the rebellion of 1837. Apptd. Lieut. 4th North York Regt. of Militia, 1838. Called to the Bar 1839. Co. Judge of Simcoe, 1843-1883, when retired. In 1844 was apptd. by the Crown, Chairman of the Bd. of Pub. Instruction of Simcoe Co., which position he held until 1871, when the system was changed. El. Chairman of Barrie High Sch. Bd., 1871. Held this office until 1881, when el. Chairman of Coll. Inst. Bd., holding the position by yearly election until his resignation in 1892. Called to the Senate, Jan., 1885. Has acted as referee and investigating commr. in many important matters, and has been several times commr. for the consolidation of the statutes. Was Chairman of the Bd. of Judges in Ontario, 1869-1888. In 1855 he founded the first law periodical in U. C. Called to the Irish Bar, 1893, and made C.M.G. the same year. Is an LL.D. of Queen's Univ., a Fellow of the Imperial Inst., and a Dir. of several Cos. One of the oldest Free Masons in Canada. M., 1853, Anna, d. of Rev. S. B. Ardagh, formerly Rector of Barrie. A Liberal-Conservative.

HINGSTON, HON. SIR WILLIAM HALES, M.D., D.C.L., LL.D., F.R.C.S., Kt. (Rougemont). S. of the late Lt.-Col. Hingston, formerly of H.M. 100th Regt., who afterwards commanded the Militia of the Dist. of Beauharnois. B. in Huntingdon Co., June 29, 1829. Ed. at Montreal Coll., and studied medicine at McGill Univ., being graduated at latter in 1851; then studied in Edinburgh, where he took his surgeon's diploma as L.R.C.S.E. He subsequently received diplomas from the highest scientific bodies in

Austria, Prussia, Bavaria, France, England and the United States. Is D.C.L. of Lennoxville Univ., and LL.D. of Victoria Univ. Began practice in Montreal in 1853, devoting his time chiefly to surgery. Has held offices of Pres. of the Can. Med. Assn., the Coll. of Physicians and Surgeons of Quebec, several times of Medico-Chirurgical Soc. of Montreal, and has been Vice-Pres. of the British Assn. for the Advancement of Science. Was Mayor of Montreal during 1876 and 1877. During his mayoralty organized Local and Provincial Bds. of Health. Has long been Dir., now Pres. of Montreal City and District Savings Bank. M., in 1875, Margaret Josephine, d. of late Hon. D. A. Macdonald, then Lt.-Gov. of Ontario, and has five children. Was knighted May, 1895, for distinguished services to medical science. An unsuccessful candidate in bye-election, 1895, Montreal Centre. Called to Senate, Jan. 2, 1896. Apptd. a member of the Ottawa Improvement Commission, 1902. A Liberal-Conservative.

JONES, HON. LYMAN MELVIN (Toronto). B. in York Co., Ont., Sept. 21, 1843. In 1868 entered into mercantile business, but in 1873 gave up business and went to Brantford to take position with Messrs. A. Harris, Son & Co., Mfrs. Four yrs. later was admitted to partnership, and in 1879 moved to Winnipeg as Mgr. of Co.'s business in Manitoba and North-West Territories. In 1881 firm of A. Harris, Son & Co. became joint stock Co., under name of A. Harris, Son & Co. (Ltd.), and he was elected a Dir. In 1886 was elected Ald. of City of Winnipeg and apptd. Chairman of Finance Committee. El. Mayor of Winnipeg and Vice-Pres. Bd. of Trade, 1887. Re-el. Mayor, 1888. In Jan., 1888, upon defeat of Prov. Govt., accepted portfolio in Greenway Govt., as Prov. Treas., and represented division of Shoal Lake. During the year negotiated in London, Eng., first Prov. loan of \$1,500,000 to build competing line of railway to Winnipeg, Brandon and Portage la Prairie. Re-el. at g.e., 1888, to represent North Winnipeg. Resigned office of Prov. Treas. in 1889, though retaining seat in Legis. until end of term, and returned to Brantford to accept position of Gen. Man. of his Co., made vacant by death of Mr. John Harris. Upon formation of Massey-Harris Co., in 1891, moved to Toronto; was elected Dir. and apptd. Gen. Mgr. of consolidated Cos. In 1902 was el. Pres. and Gen. Mgr. and still occupies that position. Became mem. of Toronto Bd. of Trade, 1893. Is Dir. Verity Plow Co. (Ltd.), Brantford; Pres. Bain Waggon Co., (Ltd.),

Woodstock, in both which associate Cos. he takes an active interest. Is Dir. Canadian Bank of Commerce, Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Co. (Ltd.) and shareholder in several other manufacturing Cos. M., 1873, Louise Irwin. Called to Senate, Jan. 21, 1901. A Presbyterian. - A Liberal.

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KERR, HON. JAMES KIRKPATRICK, K.C. (Toronto). S. of Robt. Warren Kerr and Jane Hamilton, his wife, who was a d. of James Kirkpatrick. B. near Guelph, Ont., Aug. 1, 1841. Ed. at the Galt Gram. Sch. Called to the Bar, 1862. Elected a Bencher of the Law Soc., 1879. Created a Q.C., 1881, by Ontario Govt., and in 1896 by the Dom. Govt. Grand Master of the Masonic Grand Lodge of Canada, 1874-1877. Is a mem. of the Supreme Council, 33rd Deg. of A.A. & S. Rite. Has held other high offices in the Masonic body. In 1883 received from the Prince of Wales, Grand Master of Knights Templar, the distinguished order of the Grand Cross of the Temple. Unsuccessfully contested Centre Toronto for the Ho. of Commons in the Liberal interest, g.e., 1891. M., (1st), 1864, Ann Margaret, d. of the late Hon. W. H. Blake (she died, 1882); (2nd), Dec., 1883, Adelaide Cecil Stanley-Pinhorne, niece of the Rt. Hon. A. Staveley Hill, K.C. Called to the Senate, March 12, 1903. An Anglican. A Liberal.

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KERR, HON. WILLIAM, M.A., LL.D., K.C. (Northumberland). S. of Francis W. Kerr, of Enniskillen, Fermanagh, Irel., and his wife, Olive Shelley, Dexter, N.Y., of Welsh descent. B. at Ameliasburg, Co. of Prince Edward, Ont., Feb. 27, 1836. Ed. at Victoria Univ., Cobourg. Town Councillor five yrs., and Mayor of Cobourg six yrs. Vice-Chancellor of Victoria Univ.; Bencher of the Law Soc.; at one time mem. of the Senate of Toronto Univ.; formerly Commissioner of Cobourg Town Trust; represented West Northumberland in Ho. of Commons, 1874-1878. An unsuccessful candidate for the Ho. of Commons at g.e., 1878 and 1882, for West Northumberland. M., Nov. 12, 1858, Myra J. Field, d. of the late John Field, of Cobourg, and sister of John C. Field, ex-M.L.A., and the late C. C. Field, M.L.A. Called to the Bar, U.C., 1859. Called to the Senate, March 15, 1899. A Methodist. A Liberal.

KING, HON. GEORGE GERALD (Queen's). S. of Malcolm King, of Fintry, Scot., and Elizabeth Hickson,

of Miltown, Irel., his wife. Ed. at Springfield. M., Oct. 23, 1860, Esther, d. of Ebenezer Briggs; a Lumber Merchant. Was Warden of Queen's Co. in 1877. Sat in Ho. of Commons, 1878-1886. At last el. mentioned he received a majority of the votes, but lost his seat through the action of the returning officer. Re-el. at g.e., 1891 and 1896. Resigned in same year and was called to Senate, Dec., 1896. A Liberal.

KIRCHHOFFER, HON. JOHN NESBITT (Selkirk). S. of Rev. Richard B. Kirchhoffer, Rector of Ballyromney Parish, Co. Cork, Irel. B. at Ballyromney, Irel., May 5, 1848. Ed. at Marlborough Coll., and came to Can., 1854. Took part in Fenian Raid troubles, 1866, being ensign and subsequently Capt. in Port Hope (46th) Batt. Called to the Bar, Oct., 1871, and practised law in Port Hope. M. (1st), Ada, d. of late Dr. Wm. Smith, of Port Hope, and (2nd), Clara, d. of late Rev. J. B. Howard. Moved to Manitoba, 1883, and was called to the Bar there, 1884. Founded and successfully completed the Plum Creek settlement. Was successively Reeve and Mayor of Souris, and a mem. of the Western Judicial Bd. of which he subsequently became Chairman. Sat in Legis. Assembly of Man., 1886-1888. Called to Senate, Dec. 16, 1892. A Conservative.

LANDRY, HON. LT.-COL. AUGUSTE CHARLES PHILIPPE, B.A. (Stadacona). S. of the late Dr. J. E. Landry, of Quebec, and Caroline Lelievre, his wife. Ed. at Seminary of Quebec (B.A.), and St. Anne's Agric. Coll. M., Oct. 6, 1868, Wilhelmina, d. of late Etienne Couture, of St. Gervais. A Gentleman Farmer. Is Lt.-Col. and Brigade Commander of the 10th Infantry Brigade; has been during 17 yrs. in command of the 61st Regt. of Montmagny; was A.D.C. to Lord Stanley of Preston and Lord Aberdeen. Has the long service decoration and the Fenian Raid Medal. Was Pres. of the Council of Agric. of Quebec. A Knight Commander of the Order of St. Gregory the Great, and Knight Commander of the Military Order of the Holy Sepulchre; a member of the Bibliographical Soc. of Paris. Was one of the commrs. of the Prov. of Quebec to the Chicago Exhibition. First el. to the Quebec Legis. Assembly for Montmagny at g.e., 1875. El. to Ho. of Commons, g.e., 1878 and 1882. Called to Senate, Feb. 23, 1892. A Conservative.

LEGRIS HON. JOSEPH HORMIDAS (Repentigny

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B. at Riviere du Loup (*en haut*), May 7, 1850. Ed. by private tuition and at the Model Sch., Parish of Louiseville. A Farmer. M., June, 1879, Emma, d. of George Champagne, of Berthier. Has been a Capt. in the 86th Batt. Volunteer Militia. Organized a County Mutual Fire Insurance Co. in 1881, of which he was Secy. for many yrs. Occupied a seat in the Legis. Assembly of Quebec, April, 1888-1890. Was Sec.-Treas. of the Parish for about 20 yrs., resigning the position in 1902. El. to Ho. of Commons at g.e., 1891, 1896 and 1900. Apptd. to Senate, Feb. 10, 1903. A Liberal.

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LOUGHEED, HON. JAMES A., K.C. (Calgary). B. in Brampton, Ont., Sept. 1, 1854, but resided in Toronto until 1882. M., Sept., 1884, eldest d. of late William Hardisty, Chief Factor of the Hudson's Bay Co. Practised law first in Toronto, and later in Calgary, N.W.T. Called to Senate, 1889. A Liberal Conservative.

LOVITT, HON. JOHN (Yarmouth). Parents both b. Yarmouth. Eldest s. of late John W. Lovitt. B., Yarmouth, Oct. 9, 1832. Ed. at Yarmouth. M., Jan. 26, 1860, Elizabeth, second d. of late Robert Guest. Is a Dir. of the Bank of Yarmouth. Sat in N.S. Ho. of Assembly for Yarmouth from g.e., 1874-1878, when was not a candidate. El. to Ho. of Commons at g.e., 1887. Unseated Nov., 1887, but re-el. same year and sat until g.e., 1891, when he was not a candidate. Called to Senate, Dec., 1896. A Liberal.

McDONALD, HON. WILLIAM (Cape Breton). Scottish descent. S. of Allan McDonald, who emigrated from South Uist, Invernessshire, Scot., in the early part of the century, and his wife, Mary, d. of William McDonald, of Vatersa, Barra, Scot., Ed. at St. Francois-Xavier Coll., Antigonish, N.S. Has held several Municipal, Prov. and Federal Offices. First el. to Ho. of Commons, 1872; re-el. 1874, 1878 and 1882. Was for several yrs. Chairman of the Committee on Immigration and Colonization. Called to Senate, 1884. M., 1865, Catherine, d. of late Donald McDonald, Sydney Forks. A Conservative.

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McGREGOR, HON. JAMES DRUMMOND. S. of Roderick McGregor and Janet Chisholm, his wife. Grandson of Rev. James McGregor, D.D., who came to Pictou in 1786, and was the pioneer minister of Eastern Nova Scotia. B. at New Glasgow, N.S., Sept. 1, 1838. Twice married:

(1st), to Elizabeth McColl, of Guysboro, Dec. 12, 1867 (she died April 2, 1891); (2nd), to Roberta Ridley, of Peterborough, Oct. 11, 1894. A Merchant and Shipowner. Is senior partner in firms of R. McGregor & Sons and J. D. & P. A. McGregor. Twice el. to the Local Legis. and once defeated. Unsuccessful at g.e., 1900, for Ho. of Commons. Was twice Mayor of New Glasgow. Is a Dir. of the Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Co., Ltd. Apptd. to the Senate, April 24, 1903, in the place of the late Mr. Carmichael, who resigned. A Presbyterian. A Liberal.

McHUGH, HON. GEORGE (Victoria, O.) S. of the late Patrick McHugh and Ann Walker, his wife, both natives of Irel. A Farmer. B. in the Tp. of Ops, Victoria Co., Ont., July 7, 1845. M., Feb. 25, 1873, Margaret, only d. of the late James O'Neill, of Peterborough. El. to Ho. of Commons at g.e., 1896. Unsuccessful candidate at g.e., 1900. Called to Senate, Jan. 21, 1901. A Liberal. 64

McKAY, HON. THOMAS (Truro). Scotch descent. S. of late Wm. McKay, who emigrated from Sutherlandshire to Pictou Co., N.S. B. Jan. 8, 1839. Ed. in Pictou. M., 1868, Jessie, d. of the late John Blair, of Truro. A Merchant. El. to Ho. of Commons at g.e., 1874. Unseated on petition, but re-el., and sat from Dec., 1874, to May, 1881. Called to Senate, Dec., 1881. A Liberal-Conservative. 67

McLAREN, HON. PETER (Perth). Of British stock. S. of Jas. McLaren, who came from Perthshire, Scot., in 1820, and settled in Lanark, Ont. McMILLAN, HON. DONALD, M.D. (Alexandria). B. in Glengarry, Ont., March 5, 1835. Ed. there and also by private tuition. Received degree of M.D. at Victoria Univ., Toronto, M., Nov. 17, 1857, Amy Ann, d. of Amasa Lewis, J.P., of Aylmer, Ont. Has held various public offices, such as Vice-Pres. of the Med. Assn. of Ontario, and for several yrs. was a mem. of the Co. Council. Is now a J.P. and an Associate Coroner for Glengarry, and is also an hon. mem. of the Celtic Soc. of Montreal. Apptd. to Senate, Jan. 11, 1884. A Conservative. 199

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 McMULLEN, HON. JAMES (Wellington). B. in Co. Monaghan, Irel., Nov. 29, 1833. Was Ald. for two terms, and Chairman of Committee of Finance. Also Pub. Sch. Trustee, Chairman of the Alms House Comm., mem. Bd. of Health, Vice-Pres. for Westmoreland Prov. Liberal Assn., and mem. of Executive Maritime Liberal Assn. Called to Senate, March 15, 1899. A Roman Catholic. A Liberal.

 MACDONALD, HON. ANDREW ARCHIBALD (Charlottetown). Eldest s. of Hugh and Catherine Macdonald, who came from Arisaig, Scot., in 1806, to P.E.I. B. at Three Rivers, P.E.I., Feb. 14, 1829. Ed. at the Co. High Sch. and by private tutor. M., 1863, Elizabeth, d. of Thos. Owen. In early life carried on a general business at Georgetown, P.E.I., and later was engaged in ship-building. Sat in Local Ho. of Assembly, 1853-1860. On the Legis. Council becoming elective, he was chosen for King's South, which he represented 1863-1873, when chosen provincial Postmaster-General. Was a member of the Ex. Council from 1867 till a change of govt. in 1871, and again, when the party returned to power, from 1872 till the following year, when the Island joined the Do-

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minion. For several years leader of his party in the Legis. Council. A delegate to the Charlottetown Conference which first discussed the question of Confederation. Later he was a delegate to the Quebec Conference which formulated the scheme of Confederation. Was a delegate to the International Conference at Portland, U.S., 1868; mem. of the Prov. Bd. of Ed., 1867-1870, and of the City Sch. Bd. for several years subsequently. Public trustee under the Prov. Land Purchase Act. Was Postmaster at Charlottetown and acting P.O. Inspector for the Prov. from 1873 to 1884, when he was appointed Lt.-Gov. of P.E.I., which office he held till Sept. 2, 1889. Called to the Senate, May 11, 1891. A Liberal-Conservative.

MACDONALD, HON. WILLIAM JOHN (Victoria, B.C.) B. in Invernessshire, Scot., Nov. 29, 1832, and ed. there. M., Catherine Balfour, d. of Capt. Jas. Murray Reid, of London, Eng. El. Mayor of Victoria, B.C., on two occasions. El. to Legis. Assembly of Vancouver Island. Called to the Legis. Council on the union of British Columbia and Vancouver Island. Called to Senate on British Columbia entering the federation of the North American provinces. He helped organize and inaugurate the non-sectarian Pub. Sch. system. A Liberal-Conservative.

MACKAY, HON. ROBERT (Alma). B. in Caithness, Scotland, 1840, and came to Canada at the age of 12. Ed. in Montreal. Commenced business career with Henry Morgan & Co., and later joined firm of Mackay Bros., established by his uncles, with which he remained until firm went out of business in 1893. Connected with many Co's and institutions. Besides being a large shareholder in the Montreal Rolling Mills, and the Edwardsburg Starch Co., is a Dir. of the Montreal Gas Co., the Shedden Co., the Merchants' Mfg. Co., the Dominion Transportation Co., and the Royal Victoria Life Ins. Co., and Vice-Pres. of the Bell Telephone Co.; Governor of Notre Dame Hospital; Pres. of "Herald" Publishing Co., and Chairman of the Bd. of Harbor Commrs. For two yrs. he was Pres. of St. Andrew's Soc. M. Miss Baptist, of Three Rivers. Unsuccessfully contested Montreal West for Ho. of Commons at g.e., 1896 and 1900. Called to Senate, Jan. 21, 1901. A Presbyterian. A Liberal.

MACKEEN, HON. DAVID (Cape Breton). Ancestors emigrated to Canada from Irel. and Scot. S. of late Hon.

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Wm. MacKeen, M.L.C., N.S. B. at Makon, N.S., Sept. 20, 1839. Was Treas. and Agent of the Caledonia Coal and Ry. Co., also Resident Man. of Dominion Coal Co. during the first yrs. of its operations at Cape Breton. M. (1st), Isabel, d. of late Henry Poole, of Derby, Eng., (she died); (2nd), in 1877, Frances M., d. of late Wm. Lawson, of Halifax, (she died); (3rd), in 1888, Janie K., d. of late John Crerar, of Halifax. Has held several public offices such as U.S. Consular Agent, Sub-Collector of Customs, Municipal Councillor and Warden of Cape Breton. El. to Ho. of Commons, 1887, and 1891, and held his seat until his resignation in Jan., 1896. Called to Senate, Feb. 21 1896. A Conservative.

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MERNER, HON. SAMUEL (New Hamburg). Of Swiss parentage. B. at Reichenboch, Switzerland, Jan. 18, 1823. Ed. there and removed to Can., 1837. M., (1st) Mary A. Grasser, (she died); (2nd) Ellen Sararus. Has been Warden of Waterloo Co. Was 18 yrs. Reeve of New Hamburg. Represented South Waterloo in Ho. of Commons, 1877-1882. Called to Senate, Jan.. 1887. A Conservative.

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MILLER, HON. WILLIAM, K.C., P.C. (Richmond). Of Irish descent. B. at Antigonish, N.S., Feb. 12, 1834. Called to the Bar of Nova Scotia, May, 1860. Apptd. Q.C., 1872. Sat in N.S. Assembly from g.e. 1863, until the Union, and while in that House rendered important assistance to the Union cause. Being in favour of Confederation, but opposed to the financial conditions and other details of the Quebec scheme, it was on his initiative that the delegation to England was appointed in 1866, in order to secure, under the auspices of the Imperial authorities, such modifications of that scheme as would make it more satisfactory to N.S. Was nominated a delegate to the London Colonial Conference, 1866-67, but declined the appointment. Has been Chairman of all the leading standing Committees of the Senate, and of many important special Committees. Was Chairman of the Joint Committee of both Houses of Parliament that reported the existing Criminal Code. Has twice declined a seat on the Bench—once when offered by Hon. Alex. Mackenzie, and afterwards by Sir John A. Macdonald. Apptd. a mem. of the Privy Council for Canada, May 30, 1891. Was called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation in 1867, and is now the senior Senator of the Dominion. A Liberal-Conservative.

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MITCHELL, HON. WILLIAM (Wellington). S. of Thomas Mitchell and Margaret Patrick, his wife, both of whom came from the north of Ireland in 1841. B., Mar. 14, 1851, at the Tp. of Durham. Ed. at the Pub. Schs. there. When a youth went to Maine in employ of a railway Co.; returned to Durham and engaged in the lumber business. Went to Drummondville, Que., where he became interested in the same business. M., Nov. 1, 1876, Dora A., d. of George H. Goddard of Danville, Que. Is General Man. and Dir. of the Drummond Co. Ry.; Pres. Drummond Lumber Co.; Pres. Drummondville Bridge Co.; Dir. Richmond, Drummond, Yamaska Fire Ins. Co. Is Chairman of Protestant Bd. of Sch. Commrs., and a J.P. Apptd. to the Senate, March 5, 1904. A Liberal.

MONTPLAISIR, HON. HYPOLITE (Shawinigan). French-Can. parentage. S. of Paschal Montplaisir and Victoria Crevier, his wife. B. at Cap de Madeleine, May 7, 1840. Ed. at the Three Rivers Acad. M. to E. M. Aylr. Has been Mayor of his native parish 25 yrs. consecutively and Warden of Champlain Co. six yrs. Has been 38 yrs. Sec.-Treas. of the Sch. Commrs. A Farmer. Apptd. to Senate, Feb. 9, 1891. A Liberal-Conservative.

OWENS, HON. WILLIAM, J.P. (Inkerman). S. of Owen Owens, of Denbeigh, Wales, and Charlotte Lindley, Brantford, Eng., his wife. B. in Argenteuil Co., May 15, 1840. Lt. in Active Militia, and has been Mayor, Councillor and Postmaster of Chatham. M., Sept., 1890, Margaret, second d. of J. Martin, of Chicago. Held a seat in Legis. Assembly of Quebec from g.e., 1881-1891, when resigned. Called to Senate, Jan. 2, 1896. Church of England. A Conservative.

PERLEY, HON. WILLIAM DELL (Wolseley). A native of N.B. Resides in Wolseley, N.W.T. A Farmer, Represented East Assiniboia in Ho. of Commons during the Sixth Parl. Called to the Senate in 1888. A Conservative.

POIRIER, HON. PASCAL, B.A. (Acadie). B. at Shediac, N.B., Feb. 15, 1852. Ed. at St. Joseph Coll., Memramcook, N.B., M., 1879, Anna Lusignan. Was Postmaster of Senate 1872-1885. Was Pres. of a section of the French Canadian Inst., Ottawa, 1882 and 1883, and also Pres. of the Mineralogical Soc. of Ottawa Univ. Is a Barrister of both N.B. and Quebec, and author of "L'Orig-

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ine des Acadiens," "Le Pere Lefebvre et l'Acadie," and of various contributions in newspapers and reviews. A Knight of the Legion of Honor. Called to Senate, March 9, 1885. A Liberal-Conservative.

POWER, HON. LAWRENCE GEOFFREY, LL.B. P.C. (Halifax). B. at Halifax, N.S., Aug. 9, 1841. Ed. St. Mary's Coll., Halifax, Carlow Coll., the Catholic Univ., Irel., and Harvard Law Sch., Cambridge, Mass. (LL.B., 1866). M., June 23, 1880, Susan, d. of M. O'Leary, of West Quoddy. Admitted to the Bar 1866. Was an Ald. of Halifax for six yrs., and was a mem. of the Bd. of Sch. Commrs. for 13 yrs. Is a mem. of the Senate of the Univ. of Halifax. The author of a pamphlet, "The Manitoba School Question from the Point of View of a Catholic Member," also author of "Richard John Uniacke: a Sketch," "The Irish Discovery of America." Called to Senate, Feb. 2, 1877. Apptd. Speaker of the Senate, Jan., 1901. Sworn of the Privy Council Jan., 1905. A Liberal.

ROBERTSON, HON. JAMES EDWIN, M.D. (P.E. Island). S. of Peter Robertson and Annie McFarlane, his wife, d. of John McFarlane, Esq., of Montague, P.E.I. B. at New Perth, King's Co., P.E.I., Oct. 8, 1840. Ed. at McGill Univ., Montreal, where he was graduated M.D. M. at Charlottetown, 1879, Elizabeth, d. of James McFarlane, Esq. Was el. to the Ho. of Assembly, P.E.I., in 1870, by accl., and again by accl. in 1872, and was a mem. of the Haythorn-Palmer Admn. until 1873. Re-el. 1876, and was a mem. of Davies Admn. for a few months in 1878-9. An unsuccessful candidate at g.e., 1879. Re-el. at g.e., 1882, but resigned to run for the Ho. of Commons at g.e., 1882, and was el.; re-el. to Ho. of Commons at g.e., 1887. An unsuccessful candidate at g.e., 1891. Apptd. to Senate, Feb. 8, 1902. A Liberal.

ROSS, HON. JAMES HAMILTON (Yukon). B. of Scotch parents at London, Ont., May 12, 1856. Ed. at London Gram. and High Sch. M., Nov. 23, 1886, Barbara E. McKay (she died Aug., 1901). A Rancher. An unsuccessful candidate for Ho. of Commons in West Assiniboia, g.e., 1887. El. to the North-West Assembly in 1883, and retained a seat in that body until 1901. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council, being Treas., Commr. of Pub. Works and Territorial Secy. A delegate to the Liberal Convention held at Ottawa in 1893. Apptd. Commr. of Yukon Terri-

tory, 1901, and continued to hold that position until he became a candidate for the Ho. of Commons. Nomination was held Nov. 4, 1902. Polling took place Dec. 2. The result was Ross, 2,971 votes; Joseph A. Clark, 2,079; a maj. of 829 for Mr. Ross. The return of this, the first federal election ever held for the Yukon, was received in Ottawa, Feb. 16, 1903. Apptd. to Senate, Sept. 30, 1904. A Presbyterian. A Liberal.

SCOTT, HON. RICHARD WILLIAM, K.C., LL.D., P.C. (Ottawa). S. of late W. J. Scott, M.D., who served under Wellington in the army in the Med. Dep., who came to Canada, and was apptd. Registrar of the Co. of Grenville, Ont., and his wife, d. of the late Capt. Allen McDonnell, formerly an officer in the "King's Royal Yorkers." B. at Prescott, Ont., Feb. 24, 1825. Ed. there under a private tutor. Studied law in the office of Crooks & Smith, Toronto, and was called to the Bar, 1848. Apptd. Q.C., 1867. Practised in Ottawa, where he was el. Mayor in 1852. Returned to Legis. for Ottawa at g.e., 1857. An unsuccessful candidate in 1863. Returned to first Ontario Legis. for Ottawa, 1867. In 1871 el. Speaker of the Assembly, and subsequently became Commr. of Crown Lands in the Blake Admn., and continued in that office under the Premiership of Oliver Mowat. Became a mem. of the Mackenzie Admn., Nov., 1873, and in Jan., 1874, apptd. Secy. of State and Registrar-General of Canada. Called to the Senate, March 13, 1874, for Ottawa. Retired from Govt. on defeat of Mr. Mackenzie, Oct. 16, 1878. Again apptd. Sec. of State in the Admn. of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, July, 1896. Author of the Canada Temperance Act, 1875, commonly known as "The Scott Act," which is still in force. Prepared and carried through Parl. in 1863, the Separate School Law of Ontario. Apptd. a mem. of the sub-committee of Privy Council of Canada to deal with the Manitoba School Question. M., Mary, d. of the late John Heron, Ottawa, formerly of Dublin. Their eldest s., W. L. Scott, LL.D., is Master in Chancery at Ottawa, and D'Arcy Scott, another son, is a practising barrister of the same city. Became Leader of the Senate of Canada, 1902. A Roman Catholic. A Liberal.

SHEHYN, HON. JOSEPH (Laurentides). B. at Quebec, of Irish and Canadian parents, Nov. 10, 1829. Ed. at Quebec Seminary and by private tuition. Sole proprietor of the firm McColl, Shehyn & Co., wholesale dry goods merchants. For several yrs. Pres. of the Quebec

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Bd. of Trade and a mem. of the Harbor Commission. M. (1st), Aug. 16, 1858, Marie Zoé Virginie, eldest d. of Ambrose Verret, of Quebec, now deceased; (2nd), Sep. 1892, to Mrs. Josephine Leduc, née Beliveau. Was Prov. Treas. in the Mercier Govt. from Jan., 1887, to Dec., 1891. Apptd. May 26, 1897, Minister without portfolio in the Marchand Admn. El. to Legis. at g.e., 1875, and was re-el. at each succeeding election up to the time of his being called to the Senate, Feb. 5, 1900. A Roman Catholic. A Liberal.

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SULLIVAN, HON. MICHAEL, M.D. (Kingston). S. of late Daniel O'Sullivan, formerly of Killarney, Co. Kerry, Irel. B. in Killarney, Feb. 13, 1838. Emigrated with his father to Canada, 1842. Family took up their residence in Kingston, 1845, where Michael was ed. in Regiopolis Coll. and Queen's Univ. Was graduated M.D., 1858. Apptd. Prof. of Surgery and Anatomy, Royal Coll. of Physicians and Surgeons, Kingston, 1870. Pres. Dom. Med. Assn., 1883. - Has wide-spread reputation as a surgeon. Was Purveyor-General during the N.-W. Rebellion, 1885. Mayor of Kingston, 1874. An unsuccessful candidate for the Ho. of Commons in Kingston, g.e., 1882. Called to the Senate of Canada, Jan. 29, 1884. M., June, 1867, Mary Brown, Kingston. A Roman Catholic. A Conservative.

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TEMPLEMAN, HON. WILLIAM, P.C. (New Westminster). Scotch parents. B. in Pakenham village, Ont., Sept. 28, 1844. Ed. at the Pub. Sch. there, and has since been engaged in newspaper work. M., Eva Bond, at Almonte, Ont., 1869. Established the Almonte *Gazette* in 1867, and moving out to Victoria, B.C., in 1884, established the *Victoria Times*, which he has since published. An unsuccessful candidate for Ho. of Commons at g.e., 1891, at bye-election in 1896, and at g.e., 1896. Called to the Senate, Nov. 18, 1897. Sworn of the Privy Council and entered the Admn. of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Feb. 25, 1902, without portfolio. A Liberal.

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TESSIER, HON. JULES (La Durantaye). S. of the late Hon. U. T. Tessier, Judge of the Court of Queen's Bench. B. at Quebec, April 16, 1852. Ed. at Quebec Seminary and the Jesuit Coll., Montreal, and studied law at Laval Univ., receiving the degree of B.C.L. Called to the Bar, 1874; apptd. K.C., 1900. For several yrs. editor of the "Quebec Law Reports." Secy. of the

National Convention, 1880, of the St. Jean Baptiste Soc. of Quebec, and Pres. of that Soc. A Dir. of the Lake St. John Co. Pres. of the Quebec Colonization Soc. A member of the Quebec City Council. M., in 1882, Françoise Mathilde Barnard. El. to Legis. at g.e., 1886, 1890, 1892, 1897 and 1900. Was Speaker of the Legis. Assembly of Quebec, 1897-1900. Was one of the founders and editors of a daily Liberal paper, *Le Clarion*. Apptd. to Senate, March 12, 1903. A Liberal.

THIBAudeau, HON. ALFRED A. (De la Valliere). French-Canadian parentage. S. of Hon. Isidore Thibaud-eau, M.P. for Quebec, 1873-1878. B. Dec. 1, 1860. Ed. at Quebec High Sch. M., Eva, d. of late Senator Rodier, of Montreal. A wholesale dry goods merchant. Has been Pres. of Wholesale Dry Goods Assn. Is Dir. of Notre Dame Hospital, Gov. of Laval Univ., a Dir. of the Park and Island Ry. Co., of Montreal, and of the Great-West Life Ass. Co. Apptd. to Senate, Aug. 22, 1896. A Liberal. 46

THIBAudeau, HON. JOSEPH ROSAIRE (Rigaud). Desc. from a French family which existed in the reign of Louis XV., and upon the breaking out of the French Revolution in 1789, removed to Acadia, and subsequently to Lower Canada. M., Dec., 9, 1873, Marguerite, eldest d. of Guillaume LaMothe, formerly Postmaster of Montreal. Holds the offices of Pres. of the Royal Electric Co., Pres. of the Atlantic and Lake Superior Ry. Co., Chairman of the Alliance Ass. Co., of London, Eng., Vice-Pres. of the Montreal Park and Island Ry. Co., Dir. of Notre Dame Hospital, etc. Was apptd Sheriff of Montreal, May 9, 1890. Called to the Senate, Jan., 1878. A Liberal.

THOMPSON, HON. FREDERICK PEMBERTON, (Fredericton, N.B.). B. at Douglas, York County, N.B. S. of Alexander Thompson, mill owner, and at one time a mem. of the Prov. Legis. of N.B. His mother, Hannah Pickard, was a sister of John Pickard, who represented York in the Ho. of Commons continuously from 1869 until his death in 1883. Ed. at Fredericton and the Sackville institutions. M., 1876, Eliza Snowball, d. of the Rev. John Snowball, Methodist clergyman. Was a mem. of the firm of Thompson & Anderson, (Founders and Iron-workers) established in 1871 and lately reorganized as a joint-stock co. under the name of the McFarlane-Thompson Mfg. Co.; also interested in lumbering and milling. Was a member of the York Council for six yrs. and Warden

three yrs. El. to Prov. Legis., 1878. Sat until 1885. Apptd. to Legis. Council that year. Resigned 1891 to contest York for Ho. of Commons at g.e. in Liberal interest. Again el. to Prov. Legis. in 1899. Was a mem. of the Legis. at the time of his apptm't to the Senate, Feb. 8, 1902. Is Vice-Pres People's Bank of N.B., Man. Dir. and Treas. N.B. Telephone Co., Pres. Fredericton Gaslight Co., and Pres. Victoria Hospital, (founded by Lady Tilley) A Methodist. A Liberal.

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 VIDAL, HON. ALEXANDER (Sarnia) S. of Capt. R. E. Vidal, R.N., who came to Canada in 1834. B Aug. 4, 1819. Ed. in Royal Mathematical Sch., Christ's Hospital, London, Eng. M., Dec. 8, 1847, Catherine L., d. of Capt. W. E. Wright, R.N., (she died April 19, 1882). Was 38 yrs. Treas. of Lambton Co. Is nominally Lt.-Col. of Lambton Reserve Militia, having risen from the ranks in which he served in the rebellion of 1837. Practised for many years as a Land Surveyor. Was for 12 yrs. Man. of the Sarnia Branch of the Bank of Upper Canada, then for eight yrs. Man. of the Sarnia Branch of the Bank of Montreal, which latter position he resigned when apptd. a Senator of the Dominion. El. to represent St. Clair Division in the Legis. Council of Canada in 1863. Sat until 1867. Called to Senate, Jan., 1873. A Conservative.

WARK, HON. DAVID (Fredericton). Scotch descent. B. in Londonderry, Irel., Feb. 19, 1804. Came to N.B. in 1825. M., Annie Elizabeth, d. of Isaac Burpee, of Sudbury, N.B. Is said to be the oldest member of any Legis. in the Empire, and to have served longer in Legis. bodies than any other man. From 1858-1862 was a mem. of the Ex. Council of N.B., also Receiver-Gen. Sat in all eight yrs. in the Legis. Assembly of N.B., and 16 yrs in the Legis. Council. Was called to the Senate in 1867 at Confederation, and has sat 38 yrs. in that body. In 1847 introduced legislation in N.B. Legis. which authorized the Lt.-Gov. by proclamation to admit the products of any other colony duty free on such colony reciprocating. All the provinces agreeing to this, the natural products were exchanged among the provinces up to the time of Confederation as freely as they have been since. Is strongly in favor of extending this free trade policy to the whole Empire. During the Session of 1904, on the occasion of the hundredth anniversary of his birth, the venerable Senator was presented by his fellow members of the Upper House with a portrait in oils of himself. Being seated on

the dais, he was publicly congratulated by the Senate through the Speaker, Hon. Mr. Power, and by Hon. R. W. Scott, leader of the Govt. in the Senate, and Hon. Sir Mackenzie Bowell, Leader of the Opposition. The felicitations of the Ho. of Commons were presented by Rt. Hon. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Prime Minister, and Mr. R. L. Borden, K.C., Leader of the Opposition. The portrait of Senator Wark was given a place of honor on the walls of the Senate. A Liberal.

WATSON, HON. ROBERT (Portage la Prairie). S. of the late George Watson, of Edinburgh, Scot., who came to Canada in 1847, and his wife, Elizabeth McDonald, of Invernessshire, Scot. B. at Elora, Ont., April 29, 1853. A Millwright by trade. Moved to Manitoba in 1876, and built mills at Portage la Prairie and Stonewall. Was Municipal Councillor. El. to Ho. of Commons for Marquette at g.e., 1882 and 1887, and was the only Liberal member from west of Lake Superior in those Parlt. Re-el. at g.e., 1891, but resigned to accept portfolio of Minister of Pub. Works in the Greenway Admn., May 26, 1892, an office he held till the resignation of that Admn., on Jan. 6, 1900. El. to Legis. for Portage la Prairie at g.e., 1892, and g.e., 1896, but defeated at g.e., 1899. Called to the Senate, Jan. 29, 1900. M., July, 1880, Isabella, d. of Duncan Brown, of Lobo, Ont. A Presbyterian. A Liberal.

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WILSON, HON. JAMES HENRY, M.D. (St. Thomas). Grandfather a U.E. Loyalist, a veteran of the Revolutionary War. S. of Mr. Jeremiah Wilson. B. near Ottawa, Ont., Feb. 14, 1883. Ed. at the Gram. Sch., St. Thomas, and at Univ. Coll., N.Y. Was graduated M.D. at Victoria Univ., Cobourg, Ont., 1858. M., 1869, at Toledo, Ohio, to Amelia A., d. of George Ryerson Williams, of U.E. Loyalist descent. Has been Prof. of Anatomy in Victoria Univ. Sat in Legis. Assembly of Ont. from g.e., 1871, until g.e., 1879. First el. to Ho. of Commons at g.e., 1882; re-el. at g.e., 1887. Apptd. to Senate, March 8, 1904. A Liberal.

WOOD, HON. JOSIAH, M.A. (Westmoreland). S. of Mariner Wood, merchant, of Sackville, N.B. B. April 18, 1843, in Sackville, N.B. Ed. at Mt. COSTIGAN, HON. JOHN, P.C. (Victoria, N.B.). B. of Irish parents at St. Nicholas, Que., Feb. 1, 1835. Ed. at St. Anne's Coll. Was Registrar of Deeds for Co. Victoria, N.B., and a Judge of Inferior Court of Common Pleas. Returned to the Legis. for Victoria, N.B., in 1861, where he sat up to 1866. El. to Ho. of Commons for Victoria, N.B., 1867, and re-el. at each election since. Became a member of Sir John Macdonald's Government, May 23, 1882, accepting the portfolio of Inland Revenue, which he held until Dec., 1892, when he entered the Admn. of Sir John Thompson as Secretary of State. On the death of Sir John Thompson he became Minister of Marine and Fisheries in the Bowell Admn., and continued to hold the same position in the Tupper Admn., retiring with the other members of the Govt. in July, 1896, as a consequence of the accession of the Liberals to power. Mr. Costigan has always been a strong advocate in parliament of the rights of Roman Catholics in reference to Separate Schools, and took a prominent part in opposing the New Brunswick School Act. Resigned and entered the Laurier Admn. at Ottawa, July, 1896, as Minister of Finance. El. to Ho. of Commons for Shelburne and Queen's, Aug. 5, 1896, by accl.; re-el. at g.e., 1900 and 1904. Introduced new preferential tariff in Ho. of Commons, Session of 1897, and moved resolutions during session of 1898, amending it so as to make it an Imperial British preference. Visited England in 1897 to float a new Canadian loan, which was obtained on terms better than any ever before secured by Canada. Was one of the Canadian delegates to the Colonial Conference held in London, June and July, 1902, and attended the coronation of the King. Visited Great Britain, Germany, Austria, France and Italy during the winter of 1904-5. Was received in audience at Rome by Pope Pius X. Received the honor of a public banquet in London, Eng. A governor of Dalhousie Univ., Halifax, N.S. For some yrs. was Pres. of St. George's Soc. of Halifax. A Baptist. A Liberal.

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FINLAY, JOHN (Peterborough E.) S. of John Finlay and his wife, Mary Mulholland, both Irish. B., April 22, 1837, at Tp. Dummer, Co. Peterborough, Ont. Ed. in Pub. Sch. of Dummer. M., (1st), Mary A. Wilson, Jan. 10, 1856 (she died); (2nd), Mrs. Scott, of Newmarket, Ont. During early married life was engaged at trade of carriage building, but in 1866 commenced the manufacturing of carriage bent goods, etc., and is at present owner of a large and prosperous business in Norwood and Tweed, Ont. Was Councillor and Reeve of Village of Norwood, and a Co. Councillor, holding same office continuously for 31 yrs. Candidate for first time for Ho. of Commons, and el. at g.e., 1904. A Presbyterian. A Liberal.

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FINLAYSON, DUNCAN, B.A., LL.B. (Richmond, N.S.) S. of Donald Finlayson and Annabella Murchison, his wife. B., Sept. 12, 1867, at Grand River, N.S. Ed. at Sydney Acad. and Dalhousie Univ., Halifax. A Barrister. A mem. of the Legis. Assembly of Nova Scotia,

1897-1904. El. to Ho. of Commons at g.e., 1904. A Presbyterian. A Liberal.

FISHER, HON. SYDNEY, B.A., P.C. (Brome) S. of Arthur Fisher, M.D., L.R.C.S., Edin., of Montreal, and his wife, Susanna Corse. B., in Montreal, June 12, 1850. Ed. in High Sch. and McGill Univ., Montreal, and Trinity Coll., Cambridge. (B.A., 1871). Devoted much of his time to agriculture and the study of the scientific principles applicable to farming, dairying and stock raising. Was one of the founders of the Provincial Fruit Growers Assn., and Vice-Pres. of that body; Pres. of the Ensilage and Stock Feeding Assn., Montreal; Vice-Pres. of the Provincial Dairy Assn., and a Dir. of the Brome Agric. Soc. An unsuccessful candidate for the Ho. of Commons in Brome, 1880. Elected to Ho. of Commons for Brome at g.e., 1882 and 1887. At g.e., 1891, was defeated by a majority of one. Took an active part in the political campaign throughout Canada, which led to the Liberal victory at the polls, 1896. Was returned for Brome, and on the formation of the Liberal Ministry, July 13, 1896, was entrusted by Sir Wilfrid Laurier with the portfolio of Agric., and sworn of the Privy Council. Re-el. by acl. and again returned for Brome, g.e., 1900 and 1904. Mr. Fisher has for many years been considered a leader in the temperance movement, and was Vice-Pres. of the Quebec branch of the Dominion Alliance. Introduced the Govt. measure providing for a popular vote on the question of total prohibition, in the Ho. of Commons, Session of 1898, and carried the measure through. In December, 1896, secured from the U.S. Govt. the removal of quarantine restrictions to the trade in cattle. In the spring of 1897 introduced the system of mechanical and chemical refrigeration on ocean steamships, and has since pursued a vigorous policy providing for the marketing abroad of Canada's perishable products in good condition by means of a complete chain of cold storage and other transportation facilities. In 1897 also secured the passage of an Act for the "Registration of Cheese Factories and Creameries, and Branding of Dairy Products, and to prevent misrepresentation as to date of manufacture of such products." In 1898 introduced and secured the passage of an Act to protect Canada against the introduction of the insect pest known as the "San Jose Scale. In 1899, introduced the innovation of appointing a Dominion Live Stock Commissioner, and of an Agriculturist at the Experimental Farm, to run a portion of it as a stock farm. In 1900, was re-

sponsible for an Act respecting the incorporation of live Stock Record Assns. under Federal authority; and started on the work of establishing Farmers Institute work and meetings all over Canada. The same year passed an Act amending Canadian copyright law, providing for granting of licenses by English authors to Canadian publishers and for the prohibition of books imported in violation of such licenses, and during Session of 1901, Act for "Marking and Inspection of Packages containing Fruit for Sale," either abroad or in this country. Mr. Fisher instituted during his first term of office, and is still prosecuting, experiments in the curing of cheese, of treating and curing tobacco, in the proper feeding and treatment of the bacon hog, in the fattening and preparation of poultry for English market, in eradicating and treating tuberculosis in cattle and, incidentally, in human beings; introduced the test at Govt. expense for the detection of this disease in cattle, and created a bureau of Public Health for the Dominion at Ottawa. Organized and directed the management of the Canadian section of the Paris Exposition of 1900. Visited Japan March and April, 1903, to enquire into openings for Canadian trade. An Anglican. Unmarried. A Liberal.

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 FITZPATRICK, HON. CHARLES, B.A., B.C.L. K.C., (Quebec County). S. of late John Fitzpatrick, Quebec, lumber merchant. B., at Quebec, Dec. 19, 1853. Ed. at Ste. Anne's Coll., Quebec Sem. and Laval Univ. (B.A., 1873). Called to the Bar, 1876. (Q.C., 1893). Called to Ont. Bar, 1896. Was Crown Prosecutor in Quebec District at different periods, but best known as counsel for defence in many celebrated trials. Was chief counsel for Louis Riel, tried at Regina for high treason, 1885. Defended late Hon. Honore Mercier in the prosecution by Govt. following the fall of Mercier Admn. Was counsel for Hon. Thomas McGreevy before Standing Committee on Privileges and Elections, Ho. of Commons, 1891. Represented Dominion before Judicial Committee of Privy Council, Eng., in the case involving jurisdiction of Federal and Provincial authorities over ownership of beds of rivers, lakes and harbors, and the fisheries. Visited England, June, 1898, as representing Canada in proposed arbitration between Govts. of United Kingdom and Russia with reference to compensation for seizure of Canadian sealing schooners. Was Pres. of the Quebec branch Irish National League, and has held other positions in connection with Irish associations. A del. to Irish National Convention at

Dublin, 1896. Sat for Quebec Co. in Legis. Assembly, 1890-1896, when he resigned and was el. to Ho. of Commons for present seat. Apptd. Solicitor-General in the Laurier Admn., July 13, 1896. Re-el. by accl., July 30, 1896; re-el. at g.e., 1900. Sworn of the Privy Council and called to the Cabinet as Minister of Justice, Feb. 11, 1902. Re-el. by accl. Re-el. at g.e., 1904. M., May, 1879, Corinne, d. of the late Hon. R. E. Caron, Q.C., who was Lt.-Gov. of Quebec Province, 1873-1876. A Roman Catholic. A Liberal.

First el. to Ho. of Commons at g.e., 1904. This was the second election to the Ho. of Commons held in the Yukon and Dr. Thompson was opposed by F. Congdon, K.C. THE CONSERVATIVE PLATFORM.

Previous to the Elections to the House of Commons held on Nov. 3, 1904, Mr. R. L. Borden, Leader of the Opposition, issued the following address to electors; as reported in the press:—

HALIFAX, N.S., October 24, 1904.

To the People of Canada:

Parliament is now dissolved, and political parties must submit themselves, their actions and their policy to the judgment of the people.

Since my election to the leadership of the Liberal-Conservative party, it has been my privilege to address audiences in every province and territory of the Dominion, the Yukon excepted, and with my colleagues to discuss in Parliament many subjects affecting the public weal. Our policy has been clear, defined and consistent, the same in every quarter, alike to every class.

TRANSPORTATION.

The records of Parliament show where we stand on the public questions which have been before the country since the last elections. These cannot all be discussed in this message, but in regard to some of the principal issues involved in this contest I submit in a few words from the platform on which we appeal for your judgment.

The subject of most immediate concern is transportation. Having regard to the enormous obligations which would be imposed upon the people by the Government's rash trans-continental projects, to the certainty that its adoption by you would shut out for a century Government ownership of railways, to the vital importance of controlling our own traffic and commerce, this question is the most momentous and far reaching that has ever been submitted to the electorate of Canada. The immense territory and ever increasing products of Canada demand the best and most economical transportation. We know that the people are willing to provide generously whatever money may be necessary for the development of the Dominion, and our policy is to extend and improve its transportation facilities by land and by water. But we insist that what the people pay for, the people should own and control; that public money should be used for Canada, for its people, and not to promote the trade and wealth of foreign ports.

We fully realize the country's need for increased facilities of transportation. Efficient service and reasonable rates must be assured. In utilizing the public credit for these purposes we must be thoroughly guard against the diversion of our trade into the hands of foreign competitors.

The Government seeks to impose upon the people liabilities amounting to at least \$150,000,000, for the construction of a transcontinental railway under conditions which absolutely fail to safeguard our national interests. The important and immediately profitable western division is to be owned and the whole is to be absolutely controlled by a corporation interested in diverting our trade away from our own ports. We oppose to this our declared policy of constructing the new transcontinental railway as a public work to be owned and controlled by the people, and to remain a national highway in the truest sense. I beg you clearly to understand that it is still open to you to decide whether this shall be done. Do not be misled by any assertions to the contrary.

We affirm that the management of the Intercolonial Railway and of other railways operated by the Government should be freed from partisan interference and from party political control.

We also confirm the necessity of thoroughly equipping our national ports and of developing and extending our system of canals and inland waterways.

THE FISCAL ISSUE.

The principles upon which Sir John A. Macdonald based his fiscal policy in 1878 guide us today. We maintain and we will develop that policy for the advancement of the whole Dominion. It is a stable policy avowed openly without reserve. It is a practical business policy, adjustable to the needs of the time. Our aim is so to apply it for the common good of the people and for the conservation of the Canadian market for the Canadian producer, that honest industry in every legitimate calling may receive a just reward, that the toiler may enjoy in his own land full employment under conditions which ensure a just wage, that capital may be attracted to and may be safely invested in our industries, that articles and commodities required for the use of our people may be produced as far as is reasonably possible in this country.

We believe that any extension of our markets by means of reciprocal trade arrangements should be sought among

those within the Empire who are our chief customers, rather than in foreign countries. A preference for our products in British markets would lead to an immediate enormous development of our resources. Such a preference the Conservative party will endeavor to obtain on favorable terms.

In making appointments to public offices we shall place personal character and capacity above considerations of party service, and such additional safeguards will be provided as may be found necessary for the full protection of the public treasury.

More efficient means will be devised to guard against corrupt practices at elections and to protect the electorate from fraudulent devices by which the will of the people has been so often thwarted, and the name of Canada degraded.

Inspired with an abiding faith in the justice and wisdom of our policy, and with an earnest confidence that it will prevail, we now submit it for your consideration, believing that it merits and that it will receive your approval.

Completed his cabinet Oct. 21, taking the office of Prov. Treas. After the defeat of the Liberal party at the g.e., 1905, Mr. Ross and his ministry resigned, Feb. 7, 1905, and he advised the Lieut.-Gov. to call on Mr. J. P. Whitney, K.C., Leader of the Opposition, to form a government. Mr. Ross continues to lead the Liberal party in the Legis. Prominently identified with the cause of temperance. Was Pres. for some years of Dominion Educational Assn. El. a Fellow Royal Soc. of Canada, 1896. Is a mem. of the Council of Toronto Astron. and Phys. Soc. Was hon. commr. to Indian and Colonial Exhbn., London, 1886. Is regarded by many as the best platform speaker in Canada. Is author of the life of the late Hon. Alex. THE PARTY PLATFORMS.

THE CONSERVATIVE PLATFORM.

The following resolutions, as reported in the *Mail and Empire*, Toronto, were adopted at a Conference of the Conservative party of Ontario, which met at the Provincial Capital on November 24 and 25, 1904:—

That this Conference expresses its high appreciation of J. P. Whitney in the interests of good government, popular rights and administrative reforms. That it pledges itself to uphold him in his patriotic fight for a better condition of things and that it undertakes to urge upon the people the necessity of aiding him in his endeavors, and of thus rescuing Ontario from a situation that is both intolerable and dangerous.

That this Conference declares its hearty approval of the policy and principles of Mr. J. P. Whitney and the Liberal-Conservative opposition as enunciated in Mr. Whitney's address to the Conference, and as shown and set forth by the journals of the House and the public records of the Province.

That, in the opinion of this Conference, a local mining office should be established in each mining district, where all information in regard to the mining lands in such districts may be obtained free of charge, and where a location map shall be kept on which each application, when made, shall be marked, and such application shall be granted in the order in which they are received at such office.

That this Conference feels that the sphere of usefulness of the Ontario Agricultural College should be improved and extended and that, inasmuch as not more than two per cent. of the farming community enjoy the advantages of training at the College, an earnest effort should be made to disseminate more widely the valuable information available at that institution; that the schools of the Province should be utilized for these purposes and bulletins on timely agricultural topics be circulated among the schools for the instruction of the pupils, and with a view of keeping before the boys in the rural sections the advantages of a thorough agricultural training.

That in the opinion of this Conference, the respective funds created to encourage and assist the tile and municipal drainage, be enlarged from time to time as necessity may require. That henceforth the interest on the monies already loaned, as well as those to be loaned, shall not exceed the actual cost thereof to the Province.

That in the opinion of this Conference as to lands now or hereafter opened for settlement, the bona-fide settler should have the free grant of the lands and all timber and minerals thereon, subject to proper restrictions and regulations to prevent the location of lands unfit for settlement for agricultural purposes. That actual settlement in Ontario should be encouraged, and nothing be permitted to prevent or retard bona-fide settlement or the development of mineral properties; providing that where timber licenses cover lands required for settlement or mineral development, equitable arrangements be made protecting the just rights of licensees.

That this Conference endorses the attitude of the Conservative representatives, as shown by the records of the Legislature, on the principle of the public ownership of public utilities and heartily approves of the following words of our leader in calling the Conference:—

“In the presence of great public peril, party designation
“and differences are of secondary importance.

“The first great necessity of the situation is clean, honest and decent government. The policy of the Opposition in the Legislature is familiar to the people, and has received their endorsement and ratification by a majority of six or seven thousand voters. To this record we point with pride.

“The question of increasing the means of obtaining agricultural instruction by adding it to the curriculum in the High Schools and Collegiate Institutes and providing parcels of land for practical work, and also the question of the encouragement of systems of sewerage in towns and villages are among the questions advocated by us.

“Legislation should be had to facilitate the acquirement by municipalities on proper and reasonable terms of all public utilities, and also to provide machinery for the prompt settlement of disputes between capital and labor.

“At the last session of the Legislature, the Opposition proposed that the Temiskaming Railway, constructed and owned by the Government, should be operated by the Province for a term of years. This opportunity for a practical test of government operation of railways was voted down by the Government.

“The attitude of the Opposition on the question of the proper assessment of railway property was made clear by their efforts to pass the Pettypiece bill as a basis for action—efforts which failed when the promoter of the bill abandoned it and joined the Government in killing it. These are some of the questions on which the people are interested.

“But, I repeat, the first great necessity of the situation is clean, honest and decent government. We are all familiar with the humiliating story of the iniquities which have been perpetrated, and by means of which a minority Premier has been enabled—and, alas! has also been willing—to defy public decency and flaunt before the people his enjoyment of a position which he notoriously holds by virtue of such iniquities.

“By what the Government has done in the past we may reasonably forecast what it may attempt to do in this, its last effort to avoid public condemnation.

“In the face of the public danger, and in order to afford an opportunity to avert it, I have called this meeting.”

That this meeting heartily endorses and commends the action of Mr. Whitney in declining the proposals of coalition made to him.

That this Conference is in favor of the better inspection of factories and of the labelling of prison made goods as prison made goods and the proposal of Mr. Whitney for the enactment of legislation for the settlement of labor disputes.

That this Conference, in recognizing that abuses exist in connection with the liquor traffic, places itself on record as being in full sympathy with all well directed efforts to promote temperance and moral reform.

THE LIBERAL PLATFORM.

Adopted at a Convention held in Toronto, November 23 and 24, 1904, as published for distribution by the party executive.

1. EDUCATION AND AGRICULTURE.

That this Convention affirms its confidence in the instruction of the youth of Ontario in all the courses of study directed by the Educational Department, to which have recently been added those practical courses of study which specially fit them for agricultural and industrial pursuits, and in this connection desires to express its approval of the introduction of manual training and domestic science into the Normal, Public, High and Separate Schools and the establishment of Technical Schools in several of the leading cities of the Province. Technical education might well be further assisted, and the Dominion Government should lend substantial aid in this branch of study, affecting as it does the interests of trade and commerce. This Convention further expresses its approval of the educational work of the Department of Agriculture through the Agricultural College, Farmers Institutes, Dairy Schools, Fruit Growers Associations and other similar associations, feeling confident that, judging by the past record of the Liberal party, Ontario will continue to hold a pre-eminent position among the Provinces of the Dominion for educational enterprise and efficiency, under a Liberal administration.

That the Provincial University in all its departments should continue to receive such support from the Legislature as its growing needs may require, and as the interests of higher education imperatively demand.

2. PURITY OF ELECTIONS.

That this Convention, representing the Liberal Party of the Province of Ontario, repudiates and condemns in the most unqualified terms every form of bribery, by which electors are illegally or corruptly influenced at elections to the Legislative Assembly, and all fraudulent schemes to defeat the honest purpose of the electorate, as being a violation of the fundamental principles of responsible government and contrary to the spirit and traditions of the Liberal Party.

And this Convention would also call upon the Liberal members of the Parliament to devise the most ample means whereby election trials shall be continued until every offender is duly convicted and punished, and that no political or other considerations be permitted to stand in the way of the fullest vindication of the sanctity of the ballot, and the protection of public morals even to the extent of disfranchising constituencies reported by the courts to be wantonly and criminally corrupt.

That any candidate bearing the Liberal colors should try to complete his organization out of reputable men residing or having business connections in his own riding, and that it is an active duty of every Liberal candidate to see that no person who has been judicially noted for corrupt practices is included in his electoral organization or brought into political contact with his constituents.

3. RAILWAY ASSESSMENT AND TAXATION.

This Convention would approve of any legislation whereby the property of railways should contribute to the revenues of municipalities and the Province on a basis of assessment and taxation in every respect equal to the assessment and taxation of the property of private citizens or other corporations, and that in the framing of such legislation the recommendations of the railway taxation commission appointed at the last session of the Legislature should be carried out so far as may be found suitable to the conditions existing in the Province of Ontario.

4. EXTENSION OF TEMISKAMING RAILWAY.

That this Convention approves of the construction of the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway by a Commission appointed for that purpose by the Govern-

ment as a practical demonstration of Government Ownership by the Province, and that the extension of the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway to the intersection of the Grand Trunk Pacific, near Lake Abittibi, should be pressed forward with the greatest diligence, and that surveys should be made at an early day between the said point of intersection and Moose Factory, in order to ascertain the practicability of extending the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway to Hudson's Bay, and thus connecting the fisheries of that great island system of waters with the business centres of the Province of Ontario.

That it shall be the duty of the Minister having charge of the colonization and settlement of the new districts, after conference, if necessary, with the Commissioners for the construction of the Grand Trunk Pacific, to determine at what points, having regard to the advantages of settlement and the availability of water power and other proper considerations, sites for towns along the said railway could be most advantageously situated, and having selected such sites, to cause the same to be surveyed, laid out and sold under the direction of the proper department of the Government, the proceeds of such sale to form part of the public revenues of the Province.

5. TIMBER AND MINERALS FOR THE SETTLERS.

That all lands suitable for agriculture in the unorganized districts be thrown open for settlement as soon as possible and that every *bona-fide* purchaser or locatee of such lands shall on taking possession thereof have the right to cut for his own use or for sale, every description of timber thereon, pine only excepted.

That pending the issue of his patent, the settler shall have the right to cut and take, free of charge, so much of the pine as he may require for building and fencing or other uses, and that on completion of his settlement duties, the purchaser or locatee shall receive a patent from the Crown without reservation of pine, mines or minerals.

That the most liberal terms should be offered to prospectors for minerals, providing that the minerals discovered are developed within a reasonable time and not held purely for speculative purposes.

6. PROVINCIAL CHARTERS.

That we desire to reaffirm our adherence to the principles of Provincial rights, and express our opinion that steps should be taken to prevent the incorporation of companies by act of the Dominion Parliament, which are purely local in character and operation, and which only obtain incorporation by the declaration that they are for the general advantage of Canada.

7. PINE AND PULP WOOD LANDS.

That before the pine and pulp wood on any of the lands now in the Crown are offered for public sale, a careful enquiry should be made by the Government to ascertain whether some method might not be adopted whereby the matured timber could be disposed of by open competition to be cut under the direction of forest rangers, leaving the remainder of the pine timber and pulp wood to be cut when sufficiently matured for the market, and that all lands on which pine has been cut should be reserved for re-forestation, with a view to preserve for the future needs of the Province a source of revenue which has yielded since Confederation \$40,000,000 to the Provincial treasury.

That while this Convention approves of the concessions already made for the establishment of pulp industries, as being the only practicable method of securing the necessary capital for their early development, the Convention is of the opinion that in all future concessions north of the height of land where large areas of pulp wood timber, not interfering with pine timber limits, and numerous water powers exist, and where a water power and a pulp concession are both in the Crown and tributary the one to the other that both should be submitted to public auction jointly, one of the conditions of sale being that the purchaser should pay a bonus for the right of occupation and an annual rental for the water power as well as reasonable dues for the pulp wood required for the industry.

8. PROVINCIAL COMMISSION FOR PROTECTION OF MUNICIPALITIES.

That in the opinion of this Convention many public interests would be greatly protected by the appointment of a Provincial Commission having authority to deal with such questions as the bonding powers and capitalization of companies concerned in the operation of public utilities,

the application of municipalities for consolidating debenture debts, and by-laws of municipalities purporting to confer monopolistic rights in public utilities, such Commission to have power to advise upon the terms of such by-laws and generally upon other matters similar to certain State Commissions in the United States or Local Improvement Boards in the Mother Country.

9. LABOR QUESTION.

That this Convention is pleased to notice the progressive character of the labor legislation of the Province of Ontario during the last twenty-five years, by which wages are secured by liens and preferences over ordinary creditors or by simple processes at law, by which the safety of the working classes has been protected on railways and in factories, by which the hours of labor have been restricted, and facilities afforded for voting at municipal and parliamentary elections; by which the inspection of factories, bakeries and mines has been provided and a Labour Bureau established for collecting information with regard to the condition of labor in Canada and other countries.

That this Convention is of the opinion that those branches of the public service affecting labor should be consolidated with a view to the fullest consideration of the various matters with which they are concerned in order if possible to establish better relations between capital and labor, the avoidance of strikes by the best methods of conciliation and the prevention of unskilled aliens and prison labour from interfering with the opportunities of the working classes of the Province.

10. MINISTER OF COLONIZATION AND LABOR.

That in the development of New Ontario it is of primary importance that active measures should be adopted for the settlement of its agricultural lands by a judicious selection of the best class of immigrants from the old world, and by directing from the older counties of the Province those who might otherwise settle in other provinces or in the United States, and as all movements of population either within the Province or from abroad to the Province, unless carefully controlled, may injuriously affect the laboring classes and disturb the balance between the supply and demand for labor, skilled or unskilled, this Convention would recommend the appointment of a

Minister to be known as "Minister of Colonization and Labor," to whose department should be attached the immigration and colonization branches of the Government and also the Bureau of Labor, Factory Inspection, and any other branches of a kindred character that may hereafter be established.

11. TEMPERANCE REFORM.

(1) That this Convention desires to place on record its unqualified conviction that intemperance is an evil with which there should be no compromise; that the temperance sentiment of the community, as evidenced by votes taken from time to time, has shown that the people are prepared for advanced legislation, and without reciting numerous amendments to the license act, on which there should be no difference of opinion, this Convention declares that any legislation which affords a well-grounded hope of being effective in curtailing and restraining the treating habit, in reducing the consumption of intoxicating liquors, in closing drinking resorts, and in preventing the sale of liquors on Sundays, and during prohibited hours, and the most vigorous enforcement of the license law in every particular, would meet with its approval as in the interests of public morals, the domestic comfort and the material wealth of the people of Ontario.

(2) That this Convention further believes that the power given to municipalities to close bars and shops under what is known as local option, if generally exercised, would greatly tend to remove the evils of intemperance, and this Convention would approve of legislation whereby the vote of a municipality must be taken under local option on the petition of twenty-five per cent. of the rate-payers, without reference to the Municipal Council; and further, that in any case of submission under the local option system, there be provision made for offering the alternative of Government control, or for the acceptance by the people of restrictions such as further shortening of hours, reduction of licenses, or Government control of business now carried on under shop licenses or otherwise.

(3) That no new licenses should be issued in unorganized New Ontario for all time to come; the Government should take charge of the necessary sales for medicinal purposes, etc. In granting land for hotel sites it should be stipulated that no liquor is to be sold in them.

(4) That no new licenses shall be granted in licensed municipalities, except on a petition of 50 per cent. of the municipal electors of the polling sub-division where it is desired.

(5) That any license-holder convicted of violating the law twice shall thereby forfeit his license.

12. PUBLIC UTILITIES.

That it has been the policy of the Legislative Assembly under the direction of the Liberal party to give the greatest liberty consistent with safety to municipalities in regard to all matters of a local or municipal character.

That for over half a century the municipalities of Ontario have had the right of ownership in toll roads and bridges constructed for the use of the municipalities, and during recent years, under Liberal legislation, a similar right has been conferred with regard to such public utilities as water, heat, gas, electric light and power, telephone, street railways, public parks, libraries, etc.

That where these utilities were in the hands of private companies or corporations power was given to municipalities to take them over and operate them for the municipalities and the ratepayers.

That in 1902 provision was made whereby any municipality, either by itself or in union with other municipalities, could lease or own franchises of water powers for generating and transmitting electricity, and a committee of several municipalities is now considering how this power may best be exercised in connection with the generation of electricity for transmission to business centres in Western Ontario in connection with Niagara Falls.

That the Government obtained authority from the Legislative Assembly to construct at the expense of the public treasury the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway for the purpose of opening up the northern districts of the Province, which railway is now owned by the Province.

That this Convention while approving of the course of the Liberal Party in promoting Public Ownership by the Government and by Municipalities, desires to express the opinion that any difficulty which experience has shown to stand in the way of ownership by municipalities of any

franchise which a majority of the qualified ratepayers in that behalf declare to be in the public interest should be removed (due regard being had to the private interests involved), and that all franchises for any public service of any kind whatsoever hereafter granted by a municipality shall be limited to a period not exceeding 30 years, with the right of purchase at any time within that period on such equitable terms as a properly constituted Board of Arbitrators might determine. This Convention would also approve of granting a Charter to Toronto and to other cities where geographical conditions or other circumstances would warrant such a course.

On Nov. 3, 1904, Messrs. Adélar Turgeon, Lomer Gouin and W. A. Weir resigned from the government because of differences with the Premier. The Premier called on other gentlemen to join his cabinet and when the House met, Feb. 2, 1905, the government was composed as follows:—

Hon. S. N. Parent, Premier and Minister of Lands, Mines and Fisheries.

Hon. Horace Archambault, Attorney-General.

Hon. Nemesse Garneau, Minister of Agriculture.

Hon. Dominique Monet, without portfolio, acting Minister of Colonization and Public Works.

Hon. J. C. J. S. McCorkill, Provincial Treasurer.

THE GOUIN MINISTRY.

On March 20, Mr. Parent resigned and Mr. Lomer Gouin, M.L.A., was called upon to form a government. He succeeded and the new cabinet was announced March 23, 1905, as follows:—

Hon. Lomer Gouin, Prime Minister and Attorney-General.

Hon. Adélard Turgeon, Minister of Lands, Mines and Fisheries.

Hon. John Charles McCorkill, Provincial Treasurer.

Hon. Auguste Tessier, Minister of Agriculture.

Hon. Louis Rodolphe Roy, Provincial Secretary and Registrar.

Hon. Louis Jules Allard, Minister of Colonization and Public Works.

Hon. W. A. Weir, minister without portfolio.

Mr. Weir was elected Speaker of the Legislative Assembly, April 25, 1905, and ceased to be a member of the Cabinet.

The Premier receives \$5,000 and other members of the Cabinet \$4,000 per annum in addition to the sessional indemnity.

QUEBEC LEGISLATURE.

The Legislature of the Province of Quebec consists of the Sovereign, the Legislative Council, 24 members, and the Legislative Assembly, 74 members, or 98 members in all. The Legislative Councillors are appointed by the Crown (the Government of the day), and the members of the Assembly are elected by popular vote. An additional seat in the Assembly was provided for the first time at the g.e., 1897, called Des Iles de la Madeleine.

The sessional indemnity of members of both Houses is \$800.

North Sydney High Sch., for some yrs. Recorder, Town Clerk, and Treas. of North Sydney; Secy. Bd. Sch. Commrs., Pres. C. B. Hist. Soc., and Pres. Lib. Assn. Cape Breton Co. Apptd. to Legis. Council, Feb. 20, 1899, as representing Cape Breton Co. Has reputation of being exceedingly well informed on public questions and an excellent platform speaker. A Liberal.

CAMERON, WILLIAM DUNCAN ROSS. S. of Duncan Cameron and Jean Ferries, his wife, both Scotch. B.,

March 20, 1837, at Durham, Pictou Co., N.S. Ed. at Durham Gram. Sch. and Theolog. Sem., which then existed at Durham. M., Sept. 27, 1872, to Rebecca J., d. of John S. F. In this reconstruction the office of Solicitor-General was not filled. Mr. Emmerson resigned, August 31, 1900, and on Sept. 1st, 1900, Hon. Mr. Tweedie formed a Cabinet, as follows:—

Mr. McKeown had resigned as Solicitor-General to contest a seat for the Ho. of Commons. In Feb., 1905, Mr. Wendell P. Jones was called to the Cabinet as Solicitor-General.

Mr. McDonald died Sept. 23, 1902.

Hon. Geo. Simpson was appointed a member of the Executive Council, on April 15, 1903.

Mr. Rogers resigned from the government before the general election as did Mr. Richards. Messrs. Read, McLeod and Forbes resigned January 23, 1905, and Messrs. Samuel E. Reid, George Godkin, Benjamin Gallant, and Francis L. Haszard were appointed to the Council on that date.

JOLY, DE LOTBINIERE, HON. SIR HENRI GUSTAVE, K.C.M.G., K.C., D.C.L., LL.D., P.C. S. of the late Gaspard Pierre Gustave Joly, a Huguenot native of France, and Jule Christine Chartier de Lotbiniere, grand-d. of the last Marquis de Lotbiniere. B. in France, Dec. 5, 1829, and ed. there. Coming to Canada, was called to the Quebec Bar, 1855; Q.C., 1878. El. to Canadian Assembly at g.e., 1861, for Lotbiniere. Took prominent part in debates on Confederation, acting with Dorion, Holton, Huntington and other Liberal leaders. In the first election to the Ho. of Commons, 1867, returned by accl. for Lotbiniere, and also to Quebec Assembly. Remained a member of both these bodies until 1874, when, dual representation abolished, he remained in the local Legis. Led the Opposition until March, 1878, when Lieut.-Gov. Letellier dismissed his ministers, and called on Mr. Joly to form a Govt., which he did. Resigned Premiership, 1879, and acted again as leader of Opposition until 1883. Remained in Assembly until Nov., 1885, when he resigned his seat in consequence of the Riel agitation, of which he disapproved. Reappeared in political life at the Dom. Lib. Convention, Ottawa, 1893, of which he was vice-chairman. Stood for Pontneuf at g.e., 1896, and was elected. Entered the new Laurier admn. at Ottawa, July 13, 1896, as Controller of Inland Revenue. Sworn of the Queen's Privy Council of Canada, June 30, 1897, and called to the Cabinet as Minister of Inland Revenue. Declined a seat in the Senate in 1874 and again in 1877. Was offered a portfolio in the latter year by the Prime Minister of Canada, but declined. Was made a Knight Commander of the Order of St. Michael and St. George, May, 1895. Is an Hon. D.C.L. of Lennoxville Univ., 1887, and an LL.D. of Queen's Univ., Kingston, 1894. Has always taken an active interest in Forestry, and in 1885 was el. V.P. of the American Forestry Congress at Boston. Is the author of much valuable literature on the subject. Has been a mem. of the Council of Agriculture, Prov. Que., and of various other agricultural

and fruit growing associations. Has been V.P. of the Imperial Federation League in Canada. In 1888 was authorized by Legis. to add his mother's name, de Lotbiniere, to that of Joly. In September, 1896, was entrusted with diplomatic mission of conducting Li Hung Chang, Viceroy of China, through Canada. Made a mem. of the Imperial Order of the Double Dragon in recognition of this service. M., 1856, Margaretta Josepha, d. of the late Hammond Gowan, Que. Church of England. Appointed Lieut.-Gov, June 21, 1900.

Messrs. Wells and Murphy were appointed Nov. 22, and Messrs. Eberts and McInnes, Nov. 25. Mr. Murphy relinquished office within a few days, and Mr. McInnes was appointed Provincial Secretary and Minister in Charge of Education, Dec. 1, 1902, having been President of the Council for one week.

On May 26, 1903, it was announced that Premier Prior had requested the resignation of Mr. Eberts and Mr. Wells. On May 27, Mr. McInnes resigned, in order, he explained, to facilitate an appeal to the country on party lines. The House reassembled, after an adjournment of some weeks, May 27. The adjournment took place in order to afford a special committee opportunity to take evidence in regard to the Columbia and Western railway land grants, and the position of officials of the C.P.R. in that affair. When the House re-assembled, Premier Prior stated that he had formed the opinion that it was impossible for the Government to be carried on effectively with acute differences of opinion existing between its members. He had acquainted the Lieutenant-Governor with the situation, and had been promised a dissolution as soon as the supplies had been voted. Subsequently the Premier moved the adjournment of House, and the motion was voted down by 14 to 17. After discussion, a motion, by the Opposition, to adjourn was also voted down, and subsequently a motion to adjourn, made by the Premier, was agreed to. On May 28, Col. Prior asked the House to vote the supplies necessary until the new House was elected. This request was refused by a vote of 19 to 16. Mr. Curtis moved for a committee to investigate a newspaper charge that Col. Prior had improperly secured a contract to his firm from a department of which he was at the time Acting Minister. He concurred in Mr. Curtis' motion. On the committee reporting the evidence, Col. Prior acknowledged that he had been indiscreet, but denied that he had been dishonest.

On June 1, the Lieutenant-Governor dismissed the

Prior Ministry, and called on the Hon. Richard McBride to form a government, which he succeeded in doing, as follows:—

INAUGURAL OF EARL GREY'S REGIME.

The following despatch from the Colonial Secretary reflects the devotion of the Canadian people to His Majesty the King. The reference to Canada as a nation is, perhaps, unique in official despatches.

From Mr. Lyttleton to Lord Grey.

DOWNING STREET,

24th February, 1905.

MY LORD,—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your despatch of the 6th instant, forwarding copies of Addresses presented to you by the Executive Council of Nova Scotia and various Corporations and Societies since your arrival in Canada, together with copies of your replies.

2. I have laid your despatches before His Majesty the King, who desires me to express his pleasure in gathering from these Addresses a vivid impression of the loyal feeling towards the Throne which inspired the people of all classes and races who are building up in Canada a great nation within the Empire.

3. I notice with particular pleasure the warmth of the personal welcome extended to you, and the felicity and animating spirit of the terms in which you have replied.

THE TEMISKAMING AND NORTHERN ONTARIO RAILWAY COMMISSION.

This Commission was created July 24, 1902, and in its charge was placed the building of the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway and the equipping and operation of the railway when built. The Commission was first composed of Messrs. A. E. Ames, Toronto; Edward Gurney, Toronto; M. J. O'Brien, Renfrew; B. W. Folger, Kingston; and F. E. Leonard, London. At the organization meeting, Mr. P. E. Ryan, of Toronto, was appointed Secretary-Treasurer; W. B. Russel, C. E., was appointed

Chief Engineer, and D. E. Thomson, K.C., Chief Counsel. The work of construction was at once pushed on and at the close of the year 1903, the total expenditure on the road amounted to \$2,020,092.

On the defeat of the Govt. of Mr. G. W. Ross, the Commissioners first appointed resigned. In their places were appointed C. B. Smith, C.E., Toronto; Mr. Denis Murphy, Ottawa; and J. L. Englehardt, of Petrolea. Previous to this Mr. Ryan had resigned to become Secretary to the Commissioners of the National Transcontinental Ry. and Mr. H. W. Pearson was appointed in his place. Mr. Russel also resigned as Chief Engineer.

The last report published showed 76 miles completed to Dec. 31, 1903, leaving 36 miles of the first section to be built in 1904.



THE ROYAL MILITARY COLLEGE

There are few national institutions of more value and interest to the country than the Royal Military College at Kingston. At the same time its object and the work it is accomplishing are not sufficiently understood by the general public.

The College is a Government Institution, designed primarily for the purpose of giving the highest technical instruction in all branches of military science to cadets and officers of the Canadian Militia. In fact, it is intended to take the place in Canada of the English Woolwich and Sandhurst and the American West Point.

The Commandant and military instructors are all officers on the active list of the Imperial army, lent for the purpose, and, in addition, there is a complete staff of professors for the civil subjects which form such a large proportion of the College course.

Whilst the College is organized on a strictly military basis the cadets receive in addition to their military studies a thoroughly practical, scientific and sound training in all subjects that are essential to a high and general modern education.

The course in mathematics is very complete and a thorough grounding is given in the subjects of Civil Engineering, Civil and Hydrographic Surveying, Physics, Chemistry, French and English.

The object of the College course is thus to give the cadets a training which shall thoroughly equip them for either a military or civil career.

The strict discipline maintained at the College is one of the most valuable features of the system. As a result of it young men acquire habits of obedience and self-control and consequently of self-reliance and command, as well as experience in controlling and handling their fellows.

In addition the constant practice of gymnastics, drills and outdoor exercises of all kinds, ensures good health and fine physical condition.

An experienced medical officer is in attendance at the College daily.

Five commissions in the Imperial regular army are annually awarded as prizes to the cadets.

The length of course is three years, in three terms of 9½ months' residence each.

The total cost of the three years' course, including board, uniforms, instructional material, and all extras, is from \$750 to \$800.

The annual competitive examination for admission to the College will take place at the headquarters of the several military districts in which candidates reside, in May of each year.

For full particulars of this examination or for any other information, application should be made as soon as possible, to the Adjutant-General of Militia, at Ottawa, Ont.

THE CANADIAN NORTH-WEST

HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the North-West Territories, excepting 8 and 26, which has not been homesteaded, or reserved to provide wood lots for settlers, or for other purposes, may be homesteaded upon by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

ENTRY.

Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the District in which the land to be taken is situate, or if the homesteader desires he may, on application to the Minister of the Interior, Ottawa, the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, or the Local Agent for the district in which the land is situate, receive authority or some one to make entry for him. A fee of \$10 is charged for a homestead entry.

HOMESTEAD DUTIES.

A settler who has been granted an entry for a homestead is required by the provisions of the Dominion Lands Act and the amendments thereto to perform the conditions connected therewith, under one of the following plans:—

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years.

(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of any person who is eligible to make a homestead entry under the provisions of this Act, resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for by such person as a homestead, the requirements of this Act as to residence prior to obtaining patent may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If a settler has obtained a patent for his homestead, or a certificate for the issue of such patent countersigned in the manner prescribed by this Act, and has obtained entry for a second homestead, the requirements of this Act as to residence prior to obtaining patent may be satisfied by residence upon the first homestead, if the second homestead is in the vicinity of the first homestead.

(4) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements of this Act as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

The term "vicinity" used above is meant to indicate the same township or an adjoining or cornering township.

A settler who avails himself of the provisions of Clauses (2), (3) or (4) must cultivate 30 acres of his homestead, or substitute 20 head of stock, with buildings for their accommodation, and have besides 80 acres substantially fenced.

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Every homesteader who fails to comply with the requirements of the homestead law is liable to have his entry cancelled, and the land may be again thrown open for entry.

APPLICATION FOR PATENT.

Should be made at the end of the three years, before the Local Agent, Sub-Agent or the Homestead Inspector. Before making application for patent the settler must give six months' notice in writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of his intention to do so.

INFORMATION.

Newly arrived immigrants will receive at the Immigration Office in Winnipeg, or at any Dominion Lands Office in Manitoba or the North-West Territories information as to the lands that are open for entry, and from the officers in charge free of expense, advice and assistance in securing lands to suit them. Full information respecting the land, timber, coal and mineral laws, as well as respecting Dominion Lands in the Railway Belt in British Columbia, may be obtained upon application to the Secretary of the Department of the Interior, Ottawa; the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, Manitoba; or to any of the Dominion Lands Agents in Manitoba or the North-West Territories.
