OFFICE BOARD OF REGISTRATION FOR WARRIED MEN NOT YET EXEMPTED

Washington, June 4.-The war deparment authorizes the following: Provost Marshal General Enoch

H. Crowder denies the rum r which had gained great currency that it had been decided to discharge all narried men from the selective draft. The story grew from the remark of Secretary Baker of the war department that he hoped it would be possible to exclude from the draft all married men whose dependents were "solely dependent," It was found that a number of married mer. not only were under the impression that marriage itself provided exemption from draft, but that it obviated even registration itself. In order to correct this misunderstanding General Crowder issued the following statement:

"The act establishing the selective draft authorizes the President to exclude or discharge from the draft those in a status with respect to persons dependent upon them for support which renders their exclusion or discharge advisable.' The census estimate shows that almost naif the men available for draft, under the act of Congress are married and any sweeping exclusion of mardied men would, therefore, he inadvisable. Only those whose dependents must rely solely on them for support should claim exemption and, of course, all married men between the ages of 21 and 30, inclusive, must register whether or not they purpose to claim exemption."
