- (2) Provide adequate holding facilities where required at embarkation points and air strips utilized for terminal evacuation and make available such personnel as are required to load casualties aboard ships or aircraft.
 - (3) Provide the necessary arrangements for transportation for evacuation from occupied areas of United States forces under his control.
- g. The commanding generals, corps and bases will:
- (1) Limit evacuation from their respective areas to the minimum consistent with existing policies and available facilities for required medical care and treatment.
 - (2) Provide adequate holding facilities at air strips and make available such personnel as are required to load casualties upon aircraft and hospital cars.
 - (3) Provide rail evacuation within their respective areas to hospitals under Army control including adequate medical supplies, equipment and personnel to care for casualties while enroute.
6. Construction:
- See Annex 4, Administrative Order 21, Engineer Plan.
7. Medical Supply:
- a. For supply levels see paragraph 5 Administrative Order 21.
 - b. Resupply will be as prescribed in paragraph 6, Administrative Order 21.
 - c. The commanding generals of corps will be responsible for procurement, storage and distribution of medical supplies at their respective corps medical supply points.
 - d. The Commanding General EIGHTH United States Army will:
 - (1) Assume responsibility for the procurement, storage and distribution of medical supplies.
 - (2) Be responsible for transportation of medical supplies to corps medical supply points.

- (3) Assume responsibility for the procurement and distribution of medical supplies for the civilian population if, as and when directed by higher headquarters. United States produced medical supplies and equipment will be used only when it has been determined that Japanese supplies cannot be made available. Should it be necessary to utilize United States produced medical supplies, requisitions will be submitted by Military Government Medical Officers in accordance with existing instructions.

e. The commanding generals of bases will be responsible for the storage of medical supplies in their assigned depots.

f. In order to implement the requirements of paragraph 5d, Administrative Order 21, the Commanding Officer, 5th Medical Depot will assure that regular station visitations are made by depot liaison personnel on a six (6) month cycle. Visitations of Liaison Officer will include:

- (1) Review of station control levels.
- (2) Adjustment of ordering-shipping-time factors, dependent upon the proximity of station to sources of supply, to assure the maintenance of authorized physical stockages.
- (3) Review of station stock record cards for the purpose of eliminating those items not authorized for station stocks and adding authorized items not currently stocked.
- (4) Inspection of station supply records and supply activities to assure compliance with the basic principles of efficient stock control.
- (5) Spot checks of station issues to insure that requests in excess of authorized allowances have been submitted through command channels for prior approval except in emergencies.
- (6) Assurance that stations make maximum utilization of substitute items on hand prior to requisitioning standard items from supplying depots.
- (7) Assurance that station excess stocks, including unauthorized and obsolete items, are properly and promptly processed, for return to depots or, as surplus, in accordance with existing instructions of this headquarters.
- (8) Interpretation, where necessary, of existing supply policies, procedures and instructions.

- (9) Reviewing "nonstandard" or similar term stock record cards, assigning a standard medical stock number when applicable.

8. Captured Enemy materials:

a. Disposition of Japanese medical supplies and equipment will be in accordance with existing directives.

b. Reference:

Operation Directive No. 25, 9 April 1948.

9. Salvage Equipment and Material:

a. Salvageable United States Army Medical equipment and materials will not be evacuated from the occupied areas.

b. The commanding generals, all corps and bases will recondition repairable United States Army medical materials in their respective areas for return to using troops or replacement in depot stocks as appropriate in so far as available facilities will permit. Repairable materials for which adequate facilities are not available will be forwarded to the 5th Medical Depot for repair and disposition.

10. Sanitation, Hygiene and Control of Communicable Diseases:

11. Reports to be Submitted:

a. Medical Department reports will be submitted as prescribed in the current List of EIGHTH United States Army External Recurring Reports.

SANITATION, HYGIENE AND CONTROL OF COMMUNICABLE DISEASE

1. Responsibility for Sanitation:

a. Commanding Officers. Commanders are responsible for sanitation, personal hygiene and the prevention of communicable diseases within their organizations and within the civilian population of occupied areas, in so far as they affect the health of their command. Training of troops in basic sanitation, personal hygiene and prevention of disease will be emphasized, and the provisions of Army Regulations 40-205, 40-210 and of this directive will be enforced.

b. Medical Officers. Surgeons of units, assisted by medical inspectors, are responsible for the supervision and prevention of disease within the command. They are technical advisors of their commanding officers and are responsible for detecting and investigating insanitary conditions and making proper recommendations for their correction.

2. Water Supply:

a. Responsibility. Commanders of all echelons are responsible for investigating the source of drinking water obtained by their units and will take every precaution to assure that only potable water is being used for drinking and mess purposes.

b. Sources. Particular care will be exercised in selecting a source of water supply. The high incidence of intestinal disease in JAPAN and uncontrolled disposition of body waste increase the danger of contaminating water supply sources. Of the intestinal infections, amoebic dysentery is particularly hazardous to water supply safety. Ordinary water treatment is not sufficient to insure safety against the amoebic cyst. Selection of source and water treatment employed should be in accordance with TB Med 190, August 1945.

c. Treatment. All water regardless of source, and including municipal water supplies, will be considered nonpotable until specifically declared potable by the commanding officer with jurisdiction over using units. All water, other than approved municipal supplies, if turbid, colored, or unsatisfactory in bacteriological and chemical content, will be treated by the application of coagulating chemicals, followed by settling, filtration and chlorination. If clear, and otherwise satisfactory chlorination may provide sufficient treatment. In either case, chlorination will provide at least 2.0 ppm residual chlorine to remain in contact with the water for at least 30 minutes before dispensing and at least 1.0 ppm residual chlorine will be maintained at the dispensing point at all times.

Municipal water supplies authorized chlorination to U.S. ARMY standards under Army supervision and control will provide 2.0 ppm residual chlorine after 30 minutes contact time at the treatment plant and not less than 0.4 ppm residual chlorine will be maintained at all times in the extreme ends of the distribution system. Particular consideration will be given to back siphonage, cross connections and any other condition favorable to introducing contamination into the system, and if dangers appear serious the water will be retreated after delivery in accordance with prescribed unit treatment methods before consumption. In accordance with TB Med 190, August 1945, Medical Department personnel will make frequent routine tests to determine chlorine residual and such bacteriological tests as are deemed necessary to insure potability of water dispensed.

3. Food and Messes:

a. Food Sources. All food will be procured from Quartermaster or other approved sources. Local foodstuffs will not be used unless approved by a veterinary or medical officer. All civilian eating and/or drinking establishments will be placed OFF LIMITS to troops, except those indicated by a sign APPROVED FOR ALLIED OCCUPATION FORCES.

(1) Beverages. Unit commanders will frequently warn all troops against consumption of local beverages of unknown origin or safety. A list of unsafe beverages will be prominently posted as information becomes available.

(2) Baking Products. Bread and other bakery products will be handled in accordance with paragraph 12b (1) AR 40-205, 31 December 1942.

b. Operation of the Mess. Operation will be in accordance with paragraphs 12, 13, 14 and 15, AR 40-205, and changes thereto. The high incidence of intestinal disease in JAPAN demands strict compliance with high standards in mess sanitation.

c. Employment of Food Handlers. All commanders will provide for stringent medical and unit supervisory control of both military and Japanese mess personnel. Particular care and supervision will be given to the cleanliness of hands and fingernails. No one will be employed as a food handler until found free from all evidence of communicable disease. Initial and monthly physical examinations will be carried out according to the provisions of Circular 179, this headquarters, dated 28 October 1947 and Operational Directive 41, this headquarters, dated 6 May 1947.

4. Waste Disposal. Reference paragraphs 16, 17 and 19, AR 40-205 and changes thereto, and FM 21-10, July 1945.

a. Human Excreta. Principles of latrine location, construction and maintenance as described in FM 21-10 will be rigidly enforced. Particular attention will be given to prevent fly breeding in latrines. Removal of latrine contents by civilians will be permitted only when strictly supervised and accomplished in a sanitary manner. Latrines should be sprayed inside and outside twice weekly with 5% DDT solution in kerosene or diesel oil for fly control.

b. Garbage and Trash will be disposed of according to the provisions of Section II, Circular 35, Headquarters Eighth Army, 11 March 1947. Collection by authorized Japanese collectors is the prescribed method. Incineration is method second in sequence of preference. Disposition of garbage and trash will be carefully supervised to minimize fly and rat hazards.

5. Housing: Reference paragraph 10, AR 40-205, with changes thereto. All buildings to be used to house troops will be inspected and approved by the unit surgeon prior to occupancy. Particular consideration will be given to disinfection and proper screening.

6. Insect and Rodent Control:

a. Fly Control:

- (1) General. Flies have been responsible for numerous intestinal disease epidemics among troops. The uncontrolled disposition of human excreta in JAPAN and the high incidence of intestinal diseases among the civilian population demands an intensive fly control program by all units. Reference is made to paragraph 22, AR 40-205, and FM 21-10, July 1945.
- (2) Control Measures. Control and supervision of waste disposal as described in paragraph 4 above will be rigidly enforced. Fly breeding in civilian areas immediately adjacent to the camp will be investigated and adequate control measures instituted. DDT, 5% solution in kerosene or diesel oil will be routinely applied in the kitchen, mess hall, latrines, garbage rack, etc. Table tops, kitchen utensils and food supplies will be avoided or otherwise protected from the DDT solution, as per Section IV, Circular 233, Headquarters Eighth Army, 30 July 1946. As added precaution, the table tops and utensils should be thoroughly cleaned with a generous application of soap. DDT supplies will be requisitioned from the Quartermaster in quantities authorized by WD Memo 40-205-2, 13 December 1946.

b. Mosquito Control.

- (1) Malaria. It is not expected that the malaria hazard in JAPAN will be as great as in hyperendemic tropical areas. In northern latitudes the malaria incidence may be relatively low; however, in southern latitudes it may continue to be a health problem during the warm months. At present, troops are exempted from individual antimalaria measures from 1 November to 1 May. During the remaining period of the year, measures as prescribed in Section I, GHQ, FEC Circular 80, 30 July 1947, will be carried out.

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- (2) Japanese B Encephalitis has a seasonal incidence with the peak occurring in August or September. Prevention depends on strict mosquito control measures within and immediately adjacent to the unit. Reference is made to Circular no. 72, Headquarters Eighth Army, 3 May 1947, and TB MED 181 April 1947.
- (3) Filariasis and Dengue. The prevention of these diseases depends on enforcement of mosquito control measures. Reference TB MED 142, February 1945.

c. Mites. Scrub typhus fever, principal disease transmitted by mites, is present in many parts of JAPAN. Commanders are responsible that necessary orders regarding measures for the prevention of this disease are issued. In this connection, reference is made to TB MED 31, 11 April 1944.

d. Fleas. Plague and endemic typhus fever are transmitted to man by the bite of the rat flea. Prevention of these disease depends on the rodent control measures, such as poisoning and trapping rats and the protection of food against rodents. DDT powder (10% DDT in Pyrophyllite) dusted on rat runs is effective in the destruction of fleas on the rat.

e. Lice. Epidemic typhus and relapsing fever are transmitted to man by lice. Reference is made to TB MED 218, 17 April 1946. The following measures for the control of lice will be employed:

- (1) Strict personal hygiene.
- (2) Use of DDT insecticide, powder, louse, for individual use or in mass delousing. This powder should be dusted on inner surface of clothing and headgear and upon the hairy body surfaces.

f. Rodent Control. Rats are, widespread throughout JAPAN and constitute a major health hazard to troops. Commanding Officers of all units will initiate effective measures for the control of rodents. Regional post Engineer insect and rodent control crews will be utilized, reference Section I, GHQ, FEC, Circular 80, 30 July 1947; TM 5-632, October 1947; Section III, Circular 327, Headquarters Eighth Army, 23 December 1946.

7. Disease:

a. Intestinal Diseases.

- (1) General. The occurrence of intestinal diseases such as common diarrheas, bacillary and amoebic dysentery, have caused a high non-effective rate among military personnel.

A large percentage of the Japanese have one or more intestinal infections and therefore this group of diseases continues to be a major health hazard. Reference is made to AR 40-210 and FM 21-10., AR-40-205

- (2) Transmission. Intestinal diseases are transmitted by flies, contaminated water, food or utensils, and dirty hands of food handlers. Infected civilian food handlers are particularly hazardous.
- (3) Control Measures. Control measures as described in paragraphs 2, 3, 4 and 6 above will be strictly enforced. These diseases are preventable and a high rate in a unit indicates a lack of discipline in prescribed principles of sanitation.

b. Insect-borne Diseases.

- (1) General. Insect-borne diseases constitute a major health hazard in JAPAN. Mosquitoes, lice, fleas and mites, in addition to flies discussed in paragraph 6 above, are the principle disease vectors. All unit commanders will institute control programs in accordance with Section I, GHQ, FEC, Cir 80, 30 July 1947.

c. Schistosomiasis (Blood Flukes). Schistosomiasis is present in several scattered prefectures in JAPAN. Troops will be advised of the health hazard and instructed not to bathe, wade or wash clothes in lakes or streams which have not been declared free of the hazard. Reference is made to AFPAC Circular 68, 11 September 1945 and TB MED 167, June 1945.

8. Immunizations. Reference is made to Section III, AR 40-210, 25 April 1945. Routine and special immunizations for all personnel will be accomplished and reported as outlined in GHQ FEC Circular 8, 2 March 1948. For information and guidance in procedures, the technical information contained in TB MED 114, 28 February 1947, will be followed.

b. Venereal diseases in JAPAN are a major social and health problem. The responsibility for venereal disease control rests with unit commanders, and for the performance of that duty unit commanders will be held strictly accountable. Every Commander will issue the necessary instructions, appoint and train personnel, and establish an adequate number of Army Control Facilities to effectively reduce excessive rates and to maintain rates below 50 per thousand per annum. Houses of prostitution and other establishments where prostitution is practiced will be placed OFF LIMITS TO OCCUPATION FORCE PERSONNEL. Any existing measures which actually or through implication indicate a variance with or non-support of established War Department policy for the suppression of prostitution, will be promptly and effectively eliminated.

1. Signal Intelligence:

a. The commanding General Eighth United States Army will assume responsibility for Code and Cipher distribution to all units.

2. Captured or Abandoned Enemy Equipment:

a. The use of captured enemy equipment by occupation forces in the fulfillment of their mission is permitted and provided for by Eighth Army Operational Directive 25, 9 April 1948.

b. The program to provide suitable component parts for use in civilian communications, by disassembly of captured enemy equipment, will be carried out in accordance with Operational Directive 25, 9 April 1948.

3. Supply:

a. Photographic Equipment

(1) Issues of photographic expendable supplies will be limited to actual requirements necessary to meet essential occupational and operational official pictorial coverage within the limits of allowances specified in War Department Catalog, Sig 4-1 or other special Department of Army Authorization.

(2) Requisition for photographic supplies and equipment will contain a complete basis and justification, including the applicable TO/E or other special authorization.

b. Class IV Supplies:

(1) Class IV supplies will be obtained on the basis of Department of the Army approved projects prepared and submitted in accordance with paragraph 12 WD Circular 5, 7 January 1946, Eighth Army Circular 110, 20 April 1946, as amended, and Eighth Army Stading Signal Instructions (Item 52-1), 3 July 1947.

(2) Class IV equipment will be accounted for and recorded in accordance with Eighth Army Circular 9, 17 January 1947., as amended.

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c. Common User Items of Signal Equipment:

Equipment to Air Forces:

Channels of supply for common user items of Signal Equipment to all Air Force units in Japan, including Air and Airways communication service and Weather Service will be through Air Force Bases from the local ground Signal Depot without recourse to Air Materiel Areas.

d. Review of Station Stocks:

- (1) Station Signal Stocks will be reviewed by a liaison team or representative through visits to each station on a cycle basis. The following guide is to be used in establishing the frequency of such visits. A station with more than 400 active stock cards should be visited at least quarterly stations with less than 400 cards, at least semi-annually.
- (2) The liaison representative will use a form work sheet in compiling discrepancies or recommended action regarding excesses or changes in station control levels. The Signal Depot Commander will forward recommendations concerning such excesses or levels through command channels for necessary action.

ANNEX 7 TO ADMINISTRATIVE ORDER 21, CHEMICAL PLAN

1. Duties and Responsibilities

a. The Commanding General EIGHTH United States Army will:

- (1) Be responsible for and supervise the supply control of all Chemical Corps supplies in JAPAN, except chemical ammunition and supplies peculiar to the Air Force.
- (2) Supervise the operation of the 10th Chemical Base Depot
- (3) Insure the proper disposal of captured Japanese chemical ammunition and supplies.
- (4) Insure disposition of excess and surplus chemical supplies in JAPAN.

b. Corps will maintain and operate supply points as are required. Corps will maintain proper levels of supply as outlined in paragraph 5 b of Administrative Order 21.

c. The 10th Chemical Base Depot will have the following functions:

- (1) Receipt, storage, maintenance and issue of chemical equipment and supplies for all units in JAPAN, except ammunition and supplies peculiar to the Air Forces.
- (2) Provision of chemical laboratory facilities and services to perform such surveillance and analytical work as assigned by this headquarters.

ANNEX 8 TO ADMINISTRATIVE ORDER 21, MILITARY GOVERNMENT

1. Establishment of Military Control.

a. Military control of JAPAN has been established by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers to carry into effect the surrender terms and further the achievement of the ultimate objectives stated below.

b. JAPAN proper, as used in this annex, is defined to include the four main islands of JAPAN (HOKKAIDO, HONSHU, KYUSHU, SHIKOKU) and about one thousand smaller adjacent islands, including the TSUSHIMA Islands, the IZU Islands including SOFUGAN (Lot's Wife) and the RYUKYU (NANSEI) Islands north of 30 degrees north latitude (excluding KUSHINO) and excluding the KURILE Islands, LIANCOURT ROCKS, QUALPART Islands and all other more distant outlying Pacific Islands.

c. Basic documents relating to the military occupation of JAPAN are:

- (1) Instrument of Surrender
- (2) Proclamation by Emperor of Japan
- (3) Cairo Declaration
- (4) Potsdam Declaration
- (5) Japanese qualified acceptance of (4)
- (6) Reply of UNITED STATES Secretary of State to (5)
- (7) Final Japanese acceptance of (4)
- (8) Basic Post-Surrender Policy for Japan. (Far Eastern Commission - 19 June 1947.)

2. Powers.

a. The authority of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers over Japan is complete for the purpose of carrying out the terms of the surrender. In addition to the powers of a military occupant of enemy territory, the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers has the authority to take any steps deemed advisable and proper by him to effectuate the surrender and to carry out the provisions of the directives of the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

b. The Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers will exercise control

over Japan and the Japanese, to the greatest practicable extent, through the various instrumentalities of the Japanese Government which prove suitable for this purpose. The Japanese Government and its agencies will generally be permitted to exercise the normal powers of government in matters of domestic administration. The Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers may in any case direct action to be taken without making use of the agencies of the Japanese Government.

3. Ultimate Objectives of the Occupation.

a. The ultimate objectives in regard to JAPAN, ^{to} which all policies will conform, are:

- (1) To insure that JAPAN will not again become a menace to the peace and security of the world.
- (2) To bring about the earliest possible establishment of a democratic and peaceful government which will carry out its international responsibilities and will support the objectives of the UNITED NATIONS. Such government in JAPAN should be established in accordance with the freely expressed will of the Japanese people.

b. These objectives will be achieved by the following principal means:

- (1) JAPAN will be completely disarmed and demilitarized. The authority of the militarists and the influence of militarism will totally eliminated from her political, economic and social life. All institutions expressive of the spirit of militarism and aggression will be vigorously suppressed.
- (2) The Japanese people shall be encouraged to develop a desire for individual liberties and respect for fundamental human rights, particularly the freedom of religion, assembly and association, speech and the press. They shall also be encouraged to form democratic and representative organizations.
- (3) JAPAN shall be permitted to maintain such industries as will sustain her economy and permit the execution of just reparations in kind, but not those which would enable her to rearm for war.

4. Attitude of Occupation Forces Toward Civil Population.

a. The civilian population will treated by the occupying forces

is such a manner as to inspire respect for and confidence in the UNITED STATES and other members of the United Nations and their representatives, and to encourage cooperation in the accomplishment of the occupation objectives. The civilian population will be completely free from all unwarranted interference with their individual liberty and property rights. Historical, cultural and religious monuments and their contents, objects of art, shrines, graveyards and holy places, and all Imperial residences and buildings will be carefully preserved and protected from profanation and mutilation.

b. The occupation forces will observe the obligations imposed upon them by international law and the rules of land warfare.

c. Subject to the requirements of military security, the occupation forces will permit freedom of speech, press, religion and assembly and association.

5. Instructions to the Japanese Government.

a. The Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers will issue all necessary instructions to the Japanese Government. Every opportunity will be given the government and the Japanese people to carry out those instructions without compulsion. If necessary, however, the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers will issue appropriate orders to the Commanding General EIGHTH United States Army and the Commander Naval Activities JAPAN, indicating the action to be taken by them to secure obedience by the agencies of the Japanese Government or the Japanese people, within areas of their responsibilities.

b. The Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers will normally issue orders and instructions to the Japanese through the Japanese Government at TOKYO. Orders to subordinate governmental agencies necessary to carry out the orders and instructions of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers will be issued by the Japanese Government through its own administrative channels.

6. Responsibilities of the Occupation Forces.

a. The Commanding General EIGHTH United States Army is charged with the occupation responsibility for JAPAN proper, except those areas allotted to the Commander Naval Activities JAPAN.

b. Occupation responsibility includes:

- (1) Surveillance, inspection and investigation to verify the compliance by the Japanese Government and people with the directives of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

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ANNEX 8 TO ADMINISTRATIVE ORDER 21, MILITARY GOVERNMENT (Cont'd)

- (2) Taking direct action where necessary. (Direct military government will under no circumstances be inaugurated by subordinate commanders except on specific authority of this headquarters.)
- (3) Encouraging the development of an economy which will permit the peacetime requirements of the Japanese population for subsistence, clothing and shelter to be met.
- (4) Securing and safeguarding intelligence information of value to the Allied Powers and arranging with the Commander Naval Activities JAPAN and the Commanding General Far East Air Forces United States Air Force for mutual exchange and unrestricted access to matters of interest thereto.
- (5) Supervising that part of the Japanese repatriation program which includes the provision of facilities for Japanese Repatriation Centers, overland movements, provision of port direction at those repatriation ports where a Port Director is not furnished by Commander Naval Activities JAPAN, and guards for repatriation trains and ships as may be required.
- (6) Executing missions relating to the Social, cultural and economic development of JAPAN as have been charged heretofore, or as will be charged in the future in instructions from the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.
- (7) Preparation to alleviate human suffering and to preserve order in the event of disaster.
- (8) Procuring from the Japanese Government such indigenous supplies, services, construction and real estate as are approved for procurement by the appropriate supply agency.

7. Orders to Occupation Force Commanders.

Copies of instructions issued by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers to the Japanese Government will be furnished subordinate commanders concerned through this headquarters. If special action is to be taken by subordinate commanders with respect to any instructions issued to the Japanese Government, they will be so directed by this headquarters. The nature of the action to be taken will be specified in each instance.

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ANNEX 8 TO ADMINISTRATIVE ORDER 21, MILITARY GOVERNMENT (Cont'd)

8. Chain of Military Government Command and Areas of Jurisdiction.

a. All functions of military government in the I Corps area of occupational responsibility will be exercised through and by the commanders listed below for their respective sub-areas of jurisdiction.

- (1) Corps commanders will administer the regions in their respective areas of responsibility.
- (2) Regional commanders will:
 - (a) Perform surveillance missions with respect to offices of Japanese Government agencies which operate at a regional level.
 - (b) Coordinate the operations of the prefectural teams in their respective regions.
 - (c) Provide supervision, guidance and instruction in the specialized military government activities of the prefectural teams in their respective regions.
 - (d) Provide an administrative office to handle the affairs of the prefectural teams in their respective regions.
- (3) Prefectural commanders will be primarily concerned with the operational functions of military government within their respective prefectures.

b. The Commander General IX United States Corps is charged with military government responsibility in the following areas:

d. The Commanding Officer Kanagawa Military Government Team is charged with military government responsibility in Kanagawa prefecture (less such areas as have been allotted to the Commander United States Fleet Activities, YOKOSUKA, JAPAN) and the IZU Islands including SOFU GAN (Lot's Wife).

e. The Commanding Officer Tokyo Military Government Team is charged with military government responsibility in TOKYO-TO.

f. The Commanding Officer Shizuoka Military Government Team is charged with military government responsibility in SHIZUOKA prefecture.

g. All functions of military government in the areas of JAPAN occupied by the British Commonwealth Occupation Force will be accomplished by United States Military Government units operating directly under this headquarters as follows:

(1) The Commanding Officer Chugoku Military Government Region (headquarters at KURE) is charged with military government responsibility in the following prefectures:

21. Military Government Responsibilities.

a. The commanders listed in paragraph 8 above will:

- (1) Exercise general surveillance to insure compliance by the Japanese with all orders and instructions of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers issued to the Japanese Government. Where special surveillance is required, the degree thereof will be indicated by command instructions.
- (2) Take action in addition to paragraph (1) next above, as directed by this headquarters, with regard to specific orders and instructions issued by the Supreme Commander for the allied Powers to the Japanese Government.
- (3) Maintain contact with local government officials (through local Japanese liaison personnel, where designated) for the purpose of obtaining information and reports, making inspections, and checking compliance with orders and instructions which have been issued to the Japanese officials (through appropriate local Japanese liaison personnel, where designated) to comply with orders received from the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.
- (4) Maintain close liaison with CIC Detachments in their areas of responsibility.
- (5) Utilize such military government and other personnel under their control as may be necessary to comply with paragraphs (1), (2), (3), and (4) above.
 - (a) The General Officer Commanding British Commonwealth Occupation Forces will, when directed by this headquarters, furnish such troops as may be necessary to assist commanders of United States Military Government units in his area in performing their military government missions.
 - (b) The Commanding General IX United States Corps will, when directed by this headquarters, furnish such troops as may be necessary to assist the Commanding Officers of the Tokyo, Shizuoka and Kanagawa Military Government Teams in performing their military government missions.

- (6) Submit promptly to this headquarters a comprehensive report with appropriate recommendations of any matters of urgent character concerning civil, political, social or economic situations, or of any failure by the Japanese Government or the Japanese people to carry out the orders and instructions issued by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers to the Japanese Government.
- (7) Report promptly to this headquarters other significant acts (omission or commission) on the part of the Japanese authorities or Japanese people which are inimical to the occupation objectives and which are not otherwise covered herein or in other directives issued by this headquarters.
- (8) Make appropriate recommendations to this headquarters concerning the following matters pertaining to the civil population:
 - (a) Economic, industrial, financial, scientific and reparations policies and activities.
 - (b) Agriculture, Forestry, fishing and mining policies and activities
 - (c) Public information, education, religious, welfare, health and other sociological problems found in their areas of responsibility.
 - (d) Local government administration matters pertaining to Japanese courts, and the administration of justice.
- (9) Procure from the Japanese Government such labor services as are required by the Occupation Forces in accordance with policies and procedures prescribed by this Headquarters.

b. The issuance of orders to, or the direct operation or supervision of, any Japanese governmental agencies by subordinate commanders will be undertaken only as specifically authorized by this headquarters except in event of emergencies. In such cases, report will be made to this headquarters by the most rapid means of communication available.

c. Removal and appointment of Japanese officials will be done only by the responsible Japanese agency.

d. Commanding officers of the Chugoku and Shikoku Military Government Regions will maintain liaison on military government matters with the General Officer Commanding British Commonwealth Occupation Forces.

ANNEX 8 TO ADMINISTRATIVE ORDER 21, MILITARY GOVERNMENT (Cont'd)

e. Commanding officers of military government teams in the Chugoku and Shikoku regions will conduct all liaison with agencies of the Japanese Government (through local Japanese liaison personnel, where designated) in their areas of responsibility in accordance with the directives of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

10. Reports.

a. Reports on military government matters will be submitted in accordance with paragraph 9a (6), (7) and (8) above, and other directives issued by this headquarters.

b. Commanding Officers of military government teams in the Chugoku and Shikoku regions will furnish the General Officer Commanding British Commonwealth Occupation Force copies of their Monthly Activities Report (MG-4)

ANNEX 9 TO ADMINISTRATIVE ORDER 21. TRANSPORTATION PLAN

1. Responsibilities.

a. Responsibilities of Commanding General, EIGHTH United States Army:

- (1) Secure from the Commander-in-Chief, Far East, allocation of necessary shipping for authorized movement by water and air of units, casual personnel and cargo to or from JAPAN.
- (2) Secure from the Commander-in-Chief, Far East, allocation of necessary shipping for authorized movement by water of personnel and cargo within JAPAN.
- (3) Secure from Commanding General, Far East Air Forces, United States Air Forces, allocation of necessary aircraft for air transportation within JAPAN.
- (4) Secure from the Commander-in-Chief, Far East, necessary shipping for the transportation of excess material and equipment from JAPAN to other areas or to the UNITED STATES, except for such shipping as may be specifically arranged for and directed by the Commander-in-Chief, Far East.
- (5) Provide port facilities and supervision of port operation required by Occupation Forces in JAPAN, except ports at bases under operational control of the Commander Naval Activities, JAPAN, including overall coordination of all shipping employed in implementing the import and export programs approved by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.
- (6) Insure expeditious loading, discharge and forwarding of troops, equipment and supplies.
- (7) Operation and administration of all floating equipment permanently assigned.
- (8) Requisition necessary Army Transport Service personnel.

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- (9) Fulfill all rail (including inter-urban, tram and subway) and rail ferry transportation requirements of the Occupation Forces in JAPAN. Supervise control of movements affecting military operations. Determine policies concerning the movement of personnel and freight.

b. The Commanding General, Far East Air Forces, United States Air Forces, is responsible for:

- (1) The provision and operation of air transportation in JAPAN and of air transportation to and from JAPAN not provided by the Commanding General, Western Pacific Wing, Military Air Transport Service, United States Air Force, for the United States Army and the United States Air Force.
- (2) The control of all aircraft entering, passing over, or departing from JAPAN, except those under the control of the Military Air Transport Service, United States Air Force, in accordance with policies and instructions as prescribed by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.
- (3) The control of operations and the provisions of facilities to approved civil air carriers as directed by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

c. The Commander Naval Activities, JAPAN, is responsible for:

- (1) Operation of such Japanese Merchant Marine (SCAJAP) shipping as is required for missions as directed by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.
- (2) Operation of available Japanese-manned United States owned (SCAJAP) vessels for missions as directed by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.
- (3) The supervision of port direction for ports of YOKOSUKA and KURE, and such other ports in JAPAN as directed by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.
- (4) Coordinating the operation of the shipping prescribed in paragraph 1c (1) and (2) above, with the Commanding General EIGHTH United States Army.

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- (5) Harbor clearance to the high water mark of all harbor areas in JAPAN in use, or required by, the Occupation Forces.
- (6) Insuring that action is taken by the Japanese Government to install and maintain adequate aids to water navigation.

d. The General Officer Commanding British Commonwealth Occupation Forces will:

- (1) Provide all transportation required by his force for movement of personnel, units, equipment and supplies to and from the occupation area and within the area, except as provided in paragraph 1a (9) above.
- (2) Control schedules of shipping pertaining to the British Commonwealth Force and coordinate arrival and departures with the Commanding General, EIGHTH United States Army.

e. The Commanding General, Headquarters and Service Group, General Headquarters, Far East Command, is responsible for advising the Commanding General, EIGHTH United States Army, of his requirements for motor transportation and for the operation of motor transportation facilities for personnel of General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, and such other personnel as may be directed by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

f. The Commanding General, Western Pacific Wing Military Air Transport Service, United States Air Forces, is responsible within his capabilities for provision and operation of air transportation of personnel and cargo pertaining to the United States Army and the United States Air Force.

2. Supply

a. Transportation Officer, EIGHTH United States Army, will:

- (1) Exercise general technical control over the provision of Transportation Corps supplies required for JAPAN.
- (2) Authorize issue of controlled Transportation Corps items of supply and equipment.
- (3) Insure disposition of excess and surplus Transportation Corps property located in JAPAN.

b. The Commanding Officer, 8001st-Transportation Depot will:

- (1) Operate the Transportation Corps Depot.
- (2) Establish stock levels at the depot within the limitations of paragraph 5a, Administrative Order 21.
- (3) Forecast and requisition Transportation Corps equipment and supplies required by paragraph 2a, Administrative Order 21.
- (4) Receive, store, maintain and issue Transportation Corps equipment and supplies for JAPAN, as required by paragraph 2a, Administrative Order 21.
- (5) Furnish supply data for excess and surplus equipment and supplies, as requested, to the Commanding General, EIGHTH United States Army.
- (6) Periodically review station Transportation Corps stocks to insure control of excess, determination of proper levels and proper stock inventories. Corrective action deemed necessary will be handled through command channels.

3. Port Operations

a. The Commanding General, EIGHTH United States Army is responsible for the overall supervision of port operation in all ports occupied or used by the Occupation Forces in JAPAN, except Naval Bases under the operational control of the Navy.

b. The Commanding General, Yokohama Command is responsible for the operation of the port of TOKYO-YOKOHAMA to include URAGA.

c. The Commanding General, Kobe Base, is responsible for the operation of the port of KOBE.

d. The Commanding Generals, I and IX United States Corps, are responsible for such port operations as may be necessary within their areas of responsibility, excepting naval bases under the control of Commander Naval Forces JAPAN.

4. Routing of Vessels

a. Upon completion of discharge, all trans-Pacific United States Army Transports, vessels on "Per Diem Time Charter" and vessels on "Time Charter" will be enroute in accordance with information supplied (by radio or other means) by this Headquarters. All vessels

on "Voyage Charter", "Space Charter", "Berth Terms" or "Commercial Basis" will be enroute by the operators or their licensed agents.

b. Arrival and sailing wires will be handled in accordance with instructions contained in Department of the Army Memo 55-305-3 dated 2 October 1947. Discrepancies incident to shipment as well as damage reports will be handled in accordance with current radio instructions this Headquarters and provisions of Department of Army Memo 55-305-3.

c. PHILRYCOM and MARBO permanent fleet vessels, upon completion of discharge, will be routed in accordance with specific instructions furnished by this Headquarters.

d. Requests for backloading of vessels will be submitted to this Headquarters.

e. The Commanding General, EIGHTH United States Army, will operate a local fleet of assigned vessels. Operation of this fleet, except for those craft used in the operation of harbors or other specified craft, will be under the control of this Headquarters. Sailing and routings will be cleared through local harbor masters.

5. Land Transportation

a. Railways

(1) The Commanding Officer, 3rd Transportation Military Railway Service, will by direct demand on the Ministry of Transportation:

- (a) Exercise full operational control of railroads and rail ferries of JAPAN as may be required for the support of the Occupation Forces. Coordinate requirements of the Occupation Forces with civil requirements, interfering to the least practicable extent with normal public service.
- (b) Determine and direct the maintenance of standards to which equipment in occupation force use will be provided and maintained.
- (c) Require all repairs and improvements to rights-of-way, yard facilities and physical plant necessary for continued safe and effective operation of the rail system and such additional plant construction, improvements, or development to be made as needed specifically to serve requirements of the Occupation Forces.

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- (d) Direct such changes in management, operations and safety as are of immediate importance affecting service to the Occupation Forces.
- (2) All rail transportation will be arranged through Rail Transportation Officers designated by the Commanding Officer, 3rd Transportation Military Railway Service. No direct arrangements will be made with Japanese Railway officials by using units. Corps commanders and General Officer Commanding, British Commonwealth Occupation Forces, (except as noted in paragraph 5a (3) below) will submit requirements for movement of troops and cargo to authorized representatives of the Commanding Officer, 3rd Transportation Military Railway Service for implementation.
- (3) The General Officer Commanding, British Commonwealth Occupation Forces, is authorized direct communication with local Japanese railroad officials for local rail transportation, as affects only his area of occupation responsibility, providing operational directives issued by the Commanding Officer, 3rd Transportation Military Railway Service, under policies of this Headquarters, are adhered to and standards and procedures of operation and maintenance are observed as directed therein.

b. Motor Transportation

- (1) Commanders will supervise and coordinate all truck transportation in their respective areas.

6. Air Shipments

- a. Priorities for air shipments are controlled by the Commanding General, EIGHTH United States Army.
- b. Emergency air drop requests will be submitted to this Headquarters.
- c. Attention is invited to GHQ letter, AG 580, 23 August 1945 (GD), subject: "Air Transportation Regulations".

ANNEX 10 TO ADMINISTRATIVE ORDER 21. FISCAL PLAN

1. Mission and Responsibilities

a. The mission and responsibilities for budget, fiscal and finance service in the Army will be in accordance with established standard procedures.

b. The Fiscal Officer, Eighth United States Army, will:

- (1) Exercise technical control, supervise, and coordinate all budget, fiscal, and finance operations.
- (2) Furnish advisory service to the Commanding General, Eighth United States Army, on all budget, fiscal and finance matters.

2. Budget and Fiscal Functions

The Fiscal Officer, Eighth United States Army, will be responsible for:

a. Exercising economy in the use of funds and employment of civilian personnel and coordinating with civilian personnel control agencies such as manpower survey boards and personnel audit teams to insure that funds for payment of civilian employees are being efficiently utilized.

b. Maintaining adequate records of accounts for all supplies issued, services rendered, and expenditures made under existing instructions to or for foreign governments or non-Department of the Army agencies, in order to insure prompt and early reimbursement of Department of the Army funds. These accounts will be processed in accordance with procedures prescribed in current directives.

c. The preparation of the annual budget estimates which accurately estimate and completely justify their funding requirements, the exercise of economy in utilization of appropriated funds, and the prompt detection of budget deficiencies.

d. Control and accounting for all allotted funds including their distribution and submission of reports upon their use and status in accordance with current directives.

3. Finance Functions.

The Fiscal Officer, Eighth United States Army, is responsible for:

a. Auditing nonappropriated funds and submission of reports pertaining to such audits in accordance with current directives.

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b. Review of board of officers (other than those boards covering loss, damage, or destruction of United States Government property) involving pecuniary liability or release from responsibility or accountability of individuals or agencies under the jurisdiction of Eighth Army, and for taking final action thereon (except when final action is reserved to the Department of the Army) in the name of the Commander-in-Chief, Far East, by authority of the Secretary of the Army.

c. Administration of the Soldiers' Savings Program and sale of United States Savings Bonds and United States Government Life Insurance within the Eighth Army.

d. Technical supervision of the activities of all Department of the Army disbursing officers and their agents in Japan.

e. Additional responsibilities to Department of the Army and United States Air Forces elements within Japan.

- (1) Distribution of all Class "D" allotment authorizations and Class "F" family allowance authorizations.
- (2) Processing of surety bond applications and termination forms; maintenance of records of the bonded status of personnel who are subject to bonding requirements prescribed by current directives.
- (3) The assignment of numbers to property accounts, except for those accounts which are assigned numbers by the Commanding General, Air Material Command, United States Air Forces.
- (4) Control, establishment, and maintenance of limited depository Military Payment Certificates accounts within Japan.
- (5) Funding for Military Payment Certificates, indigenous yen currency, and United States currency.
