## My dear Mr. Goldstone:

I have discussed with the United States Commercial Company the possibility of using the expert services of Miss Jakobson in the oriental cultured pearl field. They cannot avail themselves of your generous offer for fear of establishing a precedent which will be difficult to explain to other firms making similar proposals. Other offers have heretofore been rejected for this reason.

The possibility of using the services of Miss Jakobson in Japan to help stimulate the production of pearls there has been explored. I have discussed it with the War Department and a representative of the Supreme Commander of Allied Powers who is in Washington, and find that the reactivation of this industry is already well underway and by 1948 stocks available for export will be substantially increased. I have also been told that 500,000 grams of pearls will be programmed for export through regular commercial channels during the 1947 calendar year. This will represent a considerable increase over 1946 when, as you know, the greater portion of the available stock was sold through military PX facilities.

After probing into the situation, I am highly optimistic that the export: of pearls from Japan will soon begin to show signs of real improvement. That, of course, is what you are most interested in. I suggest we wait and see what develops.
