DAILY INFERENCE REPORT

Period ending 2359, 17 February 1945)1. MINDANAO

(a) DAVAO. The volume of traffic originated here remained low, but included messages addressed to CAGAYAN for the first time.

A substantial number of messages were received by DAVAO. For the second consecutive day, DAVAO was missing from the list of co-addressees of traffic from BAGUIO to 35 ARMY at CEBU and the lower commands at IMPALUTAO, ZAMBOANGA and JOLO.

The DAVAO radio station addressed the following message to BAGUIO: "Where is the CHUTAI HEADQUARTERS?" and BAGUIO replied: "Location, BAGUIO." (No particular CHUTAI was referred to.)

2. CEBU ISLAND

(a) CEBU. Another urgent message was co-addressed to SAIGON, TAKAO, MOJI and MIRI. CEBU also originated traffic for KUMAMOTO, HOME DEPOT of 102 DIV.

CEBU sent a delayed message to CAGAYAN, addressed: "ANCHORAGE BRANCH," (TEI HAKUBA SHIBU).

3. NEGROS

(a) BACOLOD. Traffic associations with OSAKA, KORIYAMA and BAN BAN were the only new ones observed.

BACOLOD addressed the following message to ECHAGUE:
"Please re-encipher and dispatch.

For: 7 AIR SIGNAL REGIMENT, UJIYAMADA.

This regiment is now at IPO (About 90 kilometers North East of MANILA) having moved there since the end of January, and is now under the command of a ground formation (HEIDAN). We bring this to your attention in view of the fact that, for the present, exchange of documents between your unit and HQS. 7 AIR ARMY is impossible. (Signed) C.O. 12 AIR SIGNALS REGIMENT."

4. PALAWAN

(a) PUERTO PRINCESA. In a day of brisk activity, worthy of comment was a message originated at PUERTO PRINCESA and co-addressed to BACOLOD, Poss. ECHAGUE and BAYOMBONG.

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SECRET**5. LUZON**

(a) ARITAO (16 degrees 15 minutes North, 120 degrees East) was observed here for the first time. A message was originated here for LAL-LO.

(b) BAGUIO. Outgoing traffic exceeded the high total of the preceding period, but no unusual connections appeared. The traffic was divided between 35 ARMY at CEBU and its lower commands and the LUZON bases at LAL-LO, WAWA, BALETE PASS, PINGGAN AREA, MONTALBAN and MOUNT MALINPUNYOS.

The important subordinate HQS. on LUZON appear from the pattern of multiple address messages from BAGUIO. They include WAWA, BALETE PASS and LAL-LO.

BAGUIO SHIPPING addressed messages to MACTAN, for the second time in five days and to MONTALBAN for the first time.

(c) BALETE PASS. Traffic was originated for BAGUIO and LAL-LO.

(d) CORREGIDOR was observed in the activity here for the first time, addressing an urgent message to CAGAYAN as follows: "C.O. 12 HIKODAN."

(e) IPO, which is now an ARMY AIR HQS., originated a message for ECHAGUE.

It would seem that communications between IPO and ECHAGUE are not functioning effectively. The following message sent by the BACOLOD radio station to the ECHAGUE radio station appears to have been originated at IPO and sent to BACOLOD for relay to ECHAGUE: "This station (referring to the radio station which served ARMY AIR HQS. at MANILA) is at IPO. How is it that, although we have called your station using urgent we have received no reply whatever? Communication with BACOLOD and CAGAYAN is good...."

(f) SAN JOSE. Traffic was addressed to BAGUIO, LAL-LO and 10 DIV. HOME DEPOT.

(g) TANDOC (16 degrees North, 120 degrees 20 minutes East) was observed for the first time, receiving message from DEL NORTE.

(h) TUAO (17 degrees 45 minutes North, 121 degrees 25 minutes East) originated a message for BAGUIO.

(i) TUGUEGARAO originated messages for BAYUMBANG for the first observed time.

(j) WAWA. Substantial activity continues. Messages were addressed to BAGUIO and BAN BAN.

It is interesting that all of the traffic originated for BAN BAN was also addressed to BAGUIO.

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6. GENERAL. Sightings of allied activity were sent from BACOLOD to IPO, to CEBU and to ZAMBOANGA, from BAGUIO to PINGGAN AREA, and from ZAMBOANGA, BACOLOD, CAGAYAN WEST and DEL MONTE, LASANG, MALAYBALAY and PUERTO PRINCESA.

Period ending 2359, 16 February 1945)1. MINDANAO

(a) DAVAO. The continuance of light activity suggests DAVAO'S diminishing importance and the possibility of a move of its forces elsewhere.

Very significant is the fact that in the series of multiple address messages which BAGUIO originated for 35 ARMY HQS. at CEBU and the lower commands in the Southern PHILIPPINES, DAVAO was not included. However as no new locality appeared it is impossible at the moment to determine the direction of the suggested move.

The IMPALUTAO radio station sent the following message to DAVAO: "CEBU is in communication with us. Are there not enough (frequent) deliveries of letters at your place?"

Later DAVAO replied to IMPALUTAO, requesting the following message to be relayed to CEBU: "There is (only) a NAVAL AIR -mail (service) and we request that this fact be taken into consideration. It is regretted that there is no other way. Morale is high and we pray that all goes well with you."

Comment: Note that the air-mail service is supplied by the N.Y.

(b) DEL MONTE. Traffic remains at substantial levels and the connections observed were with BACOLOD, LASANG, ZAMBOANGA and DALIAO.

(c) ZAMBOANGA. Substantial ARMY and ARMY AIR activity was observed.

2. CEBU ISLAND

(a) CEBU. For approximately a week traffic at CEBU has remained steady. The interesting feature of the activity for the period under review was the fact that slightly over one-half of the messages originated by CEBU were addressed to HUPINE bases. Five (5) urgent messages were co-addressed to MIRI, SAIGON, TAKAO and MOJI which suggests the possibility of impending shipping activity.

A message, dated 31 Jan. was sent by CEBU to TOKYO, addressed: "C.O. ARMY PERSONNEL SECTION," (RIKUGUN SHO JINJI KIYOKU THU).

Another delayed message (30 Jan.) was originated at CEBU for TOKYO, addressed: "C.O. JUDICIAL SECTION, EASTERN DEFENSE ARMY," (TOHUGUN HOKUHU THU).

Also dated 30 Jan. was a message sent by CEBU to TAIWAN, addressed: "C.O. JUDICIAL SECTION TAIWAN ARMY," (TAIWAN GUN HOKUHU THU).

SAIGON sent a message to CEBU, addressed: "CHIEF of STAFF, 35 ARMY," (SHO SANBO THU).

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3. LUZON

(a) BAGUIO. Outgoing traffic was the highest since 30 January and indicates considerable activity at 14 AREA ARMY HQS.

Messages were addressed to 35 ARMY HQS. at CEBU and to its subordinate commands at BIPALUTAO, ZAMBOANGA, JOLO and the radio station which is believed to be serving the remnants of the LEYTE forces. As mentioned above, DAVAO was conspicuous by its absence.

On LUZON, WAWA received the largest number of messages yet from BAGUIO, and a substantial volume of traffic was originated for LAL-IO and BALETE PASS. Only one (1) message was sent to MOUNT MALEPUNYO.

CEBU sent a message to BAGUIO, addressed: "CHIEF of STAFF 14 AREA ARMY" (SHO IU SANBO TEU). BACOLOD sent a message to BAGUIO with the same address.

(b) BALETE PASS. Messages were only addressed to and received from BAGUIO. Since this condition has prevailed, with possibly one exception, since BALETE PASS first appeared in traffic it appears that part of 14 AREA ARMY HQS. is at BALETE PASS.

(c) BANBAN originated messages to SAN MIGUEL.

(d) BEHAGUE. Traffic for BAN BAN was the only interesting connection.

(e) LAL-IO. In addition to the messages from BAGUIO mentioned above, traffic with SAN JOSE was the only other connection observed.

(f) SAN JOSE. Traffic was addressed to 10 DIV. DEPOTS, and to BAGUIO, NORTH BAN BAN and LAL-IO.

(g) SALAT. Activity indicated continued presence of elements of 19 DIV. here.

(h) WAWA addressed a substantial number of messages to BAGUIO. Traffic also was addressed to SAICON and BAN BAN.

WAWA'S importance is evidenced by its presence as a co-addressee in several messages from BAGUIO. During the period under review it was joined with LAL-IO and also with BALETE PASS.

4. GENERAL. Sightings of allied activity were sent from BACOLOD to CEBU, DEL MONTE, ZAMBOANGA and LASANG, from SAN JOSE (NEGROS) to BACOLOD, from JOLO to BACOLOD, and from ZAMBOANGA, DEL MONTE, LASANG and BACOLOD.

Period ending 2359, 15 February 1945)1. MINDANAO

(a) DAVAO. For two successive days activity has been very light. Traffic was confined to CEBU, IMPALUTAO and BAGUIO.

(b) DEL MONTE. A new connection with JOLO appeared.

(c) ZAMBOANGA. Traffic for SILAY appeared for the first time.

2. NEGROS

(a) BACOLOD. Very heavy traffic for PURTO PRINCESA was the only outstanding feature of BACOLOD'S activity.

3. LUZON

(a) BAGUIO. The very high level of activity has now continued for three days. The pattern of traffic clearly indicates 14 AREA ARMY'S interests. After a lapse of a few days, messages in substantial numbers are being addressed to 35 ARMY HQS. at CEBU and to the lower commands at DAVAO, IMPALUTAO, ZAMBOANGA and JOLO; Also to the LUZON bases at WANA, BALITE PASS and LALLO, which appear to be the major subordinate headquarters.

A small but consistent volume of traffic is addressed to BACOLOD. And during the period under review a message was sent to UJINA.

(b) BALITE PASS. As usual, the only connection was with BAGUIO.

(c) ECHAGUE. Substantial activity was observed. The redirecting of a message from BACOLOD to ECHAGUE suggests possible return of some ARMY AIR personnel.

A message, which was sent to ECHAGUE, was addressed: "C.O. #16620 BUTAI, SOUTHERN AREA ARMY, (I DAI ICHI HOKU HOKU NI REI HUPAI CHIKU)." The exact unit referred to is not known definitely. However, the unit may be an AIRFIELD HQ. of 2ND AREA ARMY, and if that is correct the presence of the C.O. at ECHAGUE is most interesting.

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3. LUZON (cont.)

(d) IRIGA. There are some slight indications that the radio station here may close down and move to a new location.

(e) SAN JOSE. 10 DIV. connections continue to appear. Traffic was also received from LAL-10.

(f) MANA. Traffic with BACUJO was the heaviest yet observed. And one (1) message was addressed to BAN BAN.

4. GENERAL. Sightings of allied activity were sent from BACOLOD to ZAMBONGA, from DEL MONTE to LASANG and from BACOLOD, DEL MONTE, LASANG, MALAYBALAY and ZAMBONGA.

DAILY INTELLIGENCE REPORT
(Report of Enemy Radio Activity for
Period ending 2359, 14 February 1945)1. MINDANAO(a) CAGAYAN SOUTH. A new connection with TALISAY was observed. CAGAYAN WEST addressed traffic to NEHAGUE for the first time.(b) DEL MONTE. Traffic for CEBU SHIPPING was new and interesting association.2. CEBU ISLANDX (a) CEBU. Activity continues at a substantial level. One (1) message was co-addressed by CEBU to MANILA SHIPPING and SAIGON.

X SAIGON sent a message to CEBU addressed: "CHIEF OF STAFF, 35 ARMY."

CEBU received a message from BACOLOD TE, addressed: "C.O., SHIPPING."

3. NEGROS ISLANDX (a) BACOLOD. Traffic gives every indication of the high tempo of ARMY AIR activity here.

X Two messages, originated at CEBU for BACOLOD, were addressed: "BACOLOD SHIPPING BRANCH." This gives added weight to the suggestion of considerable shipping activity in the CEBU-NEGROS-PANAY area.

4. PALAUAN(a) FUERTO PRINCESA. Activity was brisk. A substantial number of messages were addressed to BACO, and traffic was originated for MANAPLA for the first observed time.5. PANAYX (a) ILO ILO. Heavy traffic between BACOLOD TE and CEBU continues, suggesting that possible movements of personnel is still in progress.6. LUZON(a) BAGUIO. Activity here was very heavy during the period under review. BALETE PASS received the largest number of messages, a majority of which were delayed. On only one (1) other occasion (15 Jan) did BAGUIO exceed the number of messages originated for CEBU during the period under review. WAWA and LAL-LO were the only other LUZON addressees of traffic.

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6. LUZON (cont.)

BAGUIO also originated a small amount of traffic for BACOLOD and DAVAO.

(b) BALITE PASS. Traffic for BAGUIO has remained at a steady level for three days, but messages from BAGUIO have been increasing. This rise probably is due to the clearing of delayed messages.

(c) ECHAGUE continues to give evidence of a revival of activity. Several new connections have appeared during the past few days.

(d) IPO received a message from BACOLOD. There is evidence which strongly suggests that IPO has become an ARMY AIR HEADQUARTERS.

(e) LAL-IO. The recurrence of activity here can be attributed to technical reasons. However a substantial number of messages were received from BAGUIO and MANILA SHIPPING.

In one (1) message BAGUIO joined WAWA and LAL-IO as co-addressees, and in another, it joined LAL-IO and BALITE PASS.

This traffic suggests that LAL-IO is intimately connected with the enemy ground forces in the WAWA and BALITE PASS area.

(f) MOUNT MALPUYO again addressed all its traffic to BAGUIO.

(g) MONTALBAN'S only connection was a new one, ECHAGUE.

(h) WAWA. Judging for the volume of traffic originated, WAWA continues as second in importance to BAGUIO on LUZON.

BAGUIO and BAN BAN were the only PHILIPPINE addressees of its traffic, and in several of these messages BAN BAN and BAGUIO were joined as co-addressees.

7. GENERAL. Sightings of allied activity were sent from BACOLOD to LASANG, DEL MONTE and ZAMBOANGA, from DEL MONTE to BACOLOD and from BACOLOD, DEL MONTE, MALAYBALAY, LASANG and PUEBLO PRINCESA.

Period ending 2359, 13 February 1945)1. CEBU ISLAND

(a) CEBU. Brisk activity was observed but there were no unusual connections. A message was sent by BACOLOD to CEBU, addressed: "Chief of Staff", 35 ARMY.

2. NEGROS

(a) BACOLOD continues to originate a very substantial number of messages, which almost always go to the same addressees. The pattern of BACOLOD'S connections, which usually are all ARMY AIR, extends to the MINDANAO bases of CAGAYAN, DEL MONTE, LASANG and ZAMBOANGA, to the NEGROS bases of DUMAGUETE and SAN ROSE, to BAGUIO and ECHAGUE on LUZON, to CEBU, CABATUAN, PUERTO PRINCESA and to the external bases.

(b) TALISAY. In addition to an increase in activity here, two new connections appeared, DUMAGUETE and CAGAYAN.

3. LUZON

(a) BAGUIO. Traffic was the heaviest since 27 January 1945. The great majority of the messages were addressed to WAWA and BALETE PASS, with WAWA receiving more than BALETE PASS.

Messages passed from BAGUIO SHIPPING HQS. to MONTALBAN, presumably for the SHIPPING HQS. which evacuated MANILA.

(b) BALETE PASS. Traffic was originated for and received from BAGUIO only, and this condition has prevailed at least for the past four (4) days.

NOTE: ADDITIONAL TECHNICAL INFORMATION RECEIVED AFTER THE PUBLICATION OF D.I.R. #80, MAKES IT NECESSARY TO DELETE ALL REFERENCE TO 22 IND. MIXED BRIGADE IN PAR. 3, (b).

(c) ECHAGUE continues to receive a very substantial number of messages, its internal PHILIPPINE connections are with CABATUAN, PUERTO PRINCESA and the NEGROS ARMY AIR bases at BACOLOD, FABRICA and TALISAY.

(d) IRIGA addressed messages to WAWA for the first time in four (4) days.

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3. LUZON (cont.)

(e) LAL-IO sent a delayed message to SAN JOSE, (south of BALETE PASS).

(f) MOUNT MALEPUNYO. A substantial number of messages were addressed to BAGUIO.

(g) WAWA originated traffic for BAGUIO and received the largest number of messages yet from BAGUIO, in addition to messages from IRIGA.

4. GENERAL. Sightings of allied activity were sent from BACOLOD to ZAMBOANGA and from DEL MONTE, LASANG, MALAYBALAY, BACOLOD and PUERTO PRINCESA.
