Rieger to Fill Gleason Chair

Dr. Neville Franklyn Rieger, project manager for Mechanical Technology Incorporated (MTI) of Latham, N.Y., has been appointed to the James E. Gleason Professorship in Mechanical Engineering at RIT.

The appointment, effective January 1, 1972, was announced by Dr. Richard A. Kenyon, dean of RIT's College of Engineering, and the trustees of the James E. Gleason and Eleanor Gleason Trust.

The chair was made possible by a \$500,000 gift from the James E. Gleason and Eleanor Gleason Trust. The gift is a memorial to James Gleason, who served on RIT's Board of Trustees from 1899 until his death in 1964.

"The Gleason Professorship," Dr. Kenyon stated, "offers Dr. Rieger a unique opportunity to combine teaching, research, and other activities in an academic environment, as well as

consultation services with Rochester-based industries.

Tigers Take Tourney

Basketball Coach William Cary is still enjoying the miracle that occurred in the George H. Clark Memorial Gymnasium December 4, when the host Tigers came roaring back to defeat RPI, 74-72, and win the RIT Invitational Basketball Tournament.

RIT gained the finals with a 95-50 rout of Brooklyn Poly on December 3. RPI upset Scranton, 86-67. RIT trailed throughout the first half, with RPI holding a 44-31 advantage at halftime. It looked as though the second half would be a repeat of the first, but the Tigers rallied to take the lead with two minutes to go. It was RIT's fifth RIT Invitational Tournament title.

Junior Jimmy Lee Hunter of RIT earned the Most Valuable Player Award and senior captain Pete Wilson was named to the All-Tournament team.

"We are indeed fortunate to have obtained the services of Dr. Rieger in this important new chair. His extensive background and expertise in the field of mechanical engineering will be most beneficial to both the Institute and the community, as we strive for new ways of applying engineering technology towards the solution of problems in a technological society."

A fundamental activity of the Gleason Professorship, Dr. Kenyon said, will be to serve as a nucleus for the development of appropriate engineering research within RIT's College of Engineering, particularly in the Department of Mechanical Engineering.

A native of Australia, Dr. Rieger has been with Mechanical Technology Incorporated since 1962. His background with MTI, a research and development organization for cont'd. p.2

industry and government, covers a wide range of new technologies in the field of mechanical engineering.

Prior to his affiliation with MTI, he taught mechanical engineering at McMaster University in Hamilton, Ontario (Canada). He also served as a design engineer with the Australian Paper Manufacturers, in Melbourne, Australia.

Dr. Rieger received his Ph.D. degree in Structural Dynamics from the University of Nottingham, England. He is also a graduate of the University of Melbourne where he studied as a Commonwealth Research Scholar. He received the Master of Engineering Science degree from the University of Melbourne in 1958, and the Bachelor of Mechanical Engineering degree in 1954.

His fields of specialization in mechanical engineering include structural dynamics, dynamics of rotating machinery, gas and liquid bearings, torsional vibrations, design of vibration suppression equipment, and failure analysis.

Dr. Rieger is the author of two books, "Rota-Bearing Dynamics" and "Design of Gas Bearings," and more than 50 technical papers. He is currently a member of several U.S. and International committees concerned with the problems of stress and vibrations in machinery, and has served extensively as a consultant to many government agencies and industrial corporations during the past decade.

He is a member of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers and the Institution of Mechanical Engineers of London, England.

He currently resides with his wife Heather Elizabeth, and son Michael Franklyn, at 187 South Allen St., Albany, N.Y.
