

Not only has Mr. Benbow secured his patents, but he has organized the American Aerial Navigation Company, with a capital stock of \$30,000, the incorporators all being Montana men. A model, one-fourth the size of the actual ship, was brought to the Patent Office by the inventor, but its mechanism has been most carefully guarded, and the inventor is exceedingly reticent in giving details of its principles. Benbow claims to have recently chal-lenged M. Santos to a hurdle race with his

The balloons are of a longi-tudinal shape, and may be either large or smail, according to the amount of weight which the ship is designed to carry. Two extra balloons are provided, so that if an accident happens to the oues supporting the craft the gas in the ones remaining will be sufficient to carry the aeronaut to the ground without accident. CROP REPORT. The northern portious of the country east of Rocky Mountains are now experieucing favorable weather, with the exception of New England, Rainfalls have ameliorated the crop conditions in the Missouri and Up-per Mississippi Valleys, portions of the lake region and Middle Atlantic States. 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
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
