

By yesterday's mail we received Boston papers to the 17th New York and Philadelphia to the 19th, Washington and Baltimore to the 21st, and Charleston to the 24th ult. They furnish us later dates from Europe than heretofore received, and in the domestic department, are completely bare.

We hope that the general interest taken in the elections, and in which we most necessarily have shared, will be an apology for the absence of our usual quantum of editorial remarks. This excitement is over; the triumph has been gained, and to-morrow we shall fall into the beaten path, of our daily avocation.

The election for Mayor, Recorder, and Aldermen of the several wards, came on yesterday, and gave the following results:—Dante Putnam was re-elected, over his competitor H. D. Price, by an overwhelming majority, 542 votes! The total number of voters was, however, the highest number of tickets cast in any of our municipal elections. The canvass between the candidates for the office of Recorder, was more closely contested, "out of" 1629, N. Morse received \$16, and Felix de Armas 783, giving the former a majority of 63 votes. MOPAPE, March 31.

Cotton.—In the time before last, we received a cablegram on Saturday morning from New Orleans, to the effect that 5000 bales of cotton suddenly changed hands. After the arrival of the mail, it was found that Liverpool accounts were confined to the 4th February, noting a brisk market, and an improvement in exports of 1,4 to 1,4. Expresses had privately reached this place, through Gattley, anticipating the mail a few hours, and the transactions alluded to were for those accounts. A rumor presently got abroad that the advices by mail were not so late as known to the express, expectation was on tenterhooks, and nothing done to the cotton sales on Saturday, was followed by the Boston gentleman.

Important and Correct.—The following extract of a letter, dated Middlesex, 21st March, was received by a gentleman in this city, to whom we are indebted for the important information it discloses. The crisis has arrived. The refusal of Judge Dougherty, to carry the mandate of the supreme court into effect, places Georgia in the attitude of resistance to the federal judiciary. It must have been anticipated, and therefore our agents prepared to meet it. We now look forward to its finality.

It says—"There is great ex-

citement in the state, in regard to the decision of the supreme court in the missionary case. Our people in this sector, and from this in every direction, are unanimous, I believe, in the determination that the missionaries shall not be discharged. Gauntlett court was held

last week, at which time and place the mandate of the supreme court was presented. Judge Dougherty refused to yield obedience to its terms. The messenger left forthwith for Washington, where he arrived about yesterday. His hurry was to return in time to present the refusal before the supreme court should adjourn, to obtain an order awarding a session of judgment direct."

The order of the court was to render a decree, and the cause was referred to the circuit court, to be decided by a

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
