LATEST FROM MEXICO.

By the Schooner Libre ZEMPURLTECA, we have received our files from Vera Cruz to the 10th inst. The country is pert cuty quiet. There remained but a handful of the revolutionary troops, who, it was anticipated, would soon be obliged to surrender. The rigorous steps which the government had reserted to, to smother the revolution, have been repealed The project of a law, to reduce the army to sixteen battalions of Infantry, two Cavalry, and two Brigades of artillery, had ricana. been laid before the Congress. Measures, having for their object the more general diffu-

sion of education, had also been taken up. A general amnesty mas been granted by the constituted au

serities, to those who took part, directly or indirectly, in the late revolution. To this, there are exceptions against those who defended the tyrants, as the document which we he have before us expresses it.

Several skirmishes had taken place, in which Gen. Victo ria and Monteguma took part, which resulted generally in the spaces of the National cause. This was confined entively to the remnant of the revolutionary party, who pursued a kind of guerilla warfare, rendering it necessary to hunt them down, and restore a general peace and quiet throughout the whole country.

By a friend we have been favored with a letter dated Ver Cruz, 12th December, which states that Don Lorenzo de Zavala was on the point of his departure for France, where he goes as Envoy Extraordinary, By the said letter we learn that the President, Santa Anna, has obtained from Congress leave of absence for six months from the capital, to his plantation at Mango de Clavo, to repose from his recent fatigue. The Vice-President, Gomes Farsis, will set during his absence, in his place.
