Camp, mear Warrenton Junction, Va, Aug. 16—When we arrived at the Junction, we found everything in commotion. Infautry, cavalry, and artillery marching in every direction, and about one hundred contrabant followers of the army standing around a well about forty feet deep, each trying to get a monthful of water to quench the burning thirst. They could get but very little, however, as the supply was almost exhansted, and what remained had the color and taste of such water as may be found in street gutters during a beavy shower. The day was intensely hot, the piece perfectly innocent of shading, and the dry sand thying in all directions from the hoots of galloping horses. Our cauteon had been empty for some hours, and we could not find a drop of water fit to drink for miles along the road. We had to suffer and about, as water could not be found, and after travelling about three miles farther along the road wheel in with that portion of the army of which we were in search.

The butteries were just about encamping, and when they turned into the wood for that purpose we followed them, and pitched our tent on the border of the wood, with a field in front, on which the battery guns are flanked. They are looking at me as I write, gazing grimly through the leafy branches with which they are covered to keep off the scorching son. The men are recuperating after their long marches, bloody attrinsibes and terrible battles through Virginia, Maryland and Fennsylvania.
