C. P. N. Steamer Amur arrived here last night with a small number of passengers from points in the North. The irip, except when crossing Queen Charlotte Sound, was made in smooth water. In passing through Fitzhugh Sound the wrecked Berha was seen. The reasel was lying easily on the rocks, her bow pretty well submerged, and her stern well out of water. The steamer brings news of the bodies of Thomas McDevitt, James Lodge and Chris Jensen, the three men who perished in a snowlide on Prince of Wales Island on February 3rd, having heen recovered by a searching party ten days later. The bodies had been swept 400 feet down the mountain side by the avalanche and were buried deep in the snow, as described in last Wednesday's Times. Particulars, however, are now given. According to an exchange McDevitt, Lodge and Jensen were employed in the company's tunnel and were on their way to swork when caught in the great rush of snow. They had just left the cook house to wash up the breakfast dishes. This saved his life. It was still dark when the men started over the trail for the tunnel's chring their breakfast dishes. 

The disposition of the re-mains of the other two is not given in the advices received.
