This is the substance of striking facts and figures laid before the Legislature yesterday afternoon by Hon. J. D. MacLean, who took over the portfolio of Railways early this year and who has reorganized every department of the P.G.E. Dr. MacLean's re-port on the operations of the line for the year—the most optimistic P.G.E. report in years—was received with keen satisfaction on both sides of the House. "The balance sheet and statement of accounts of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway Company for the year ending June 30, 1923, are the most satisfactory that have yet been presented, and give very substantial evidence of real progress having been made in the operation of the railway during that year," Dr. MacLean The operation of the railway during that year," Dr. MacLean

### THE P.G.E. IMPROVES

People of this Province will derive much pleasure from a study of the annual financial statement of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway. At the same time they have already begun to realize that it is much more profitable to assist in popu-larizing the line and so gradually reduce the yearly deficit than to throw up their arms in despair. The reason for this is disclosed in the statement which Dr. MacLean has presented to

the Legislature.

The Minister of Railways has not fixed the year in which there will be a surplus of operat-ing revenue over operating expenditure. But he has shown how the conduct of the business of the system during the last twelve months has reduced the deficit from \$487,383.06 in the fiscal year of 1922 to \$230,786.41 in 1923. This condition very naturally still leaves much to be desired in the annual business of the line. Nevertheless it goes without saying that if a rather more vigorous and intensive policy of development shall be per-sisted in by the proper departments of the public service the business upon which the P.G.E. must depend for its maintenance and growth will undoubtedly be furnished at no distant date.

In any event the people of British Columbia should regard their own property in the same manner as Canadians as a whole are regarding the Canadian National Railways-as assets that are going to pay and not as liabilities without prospect of liquidation. Not so very long ago the operating business of the system over which Sir Henry Thornton presides was far from encourage ing and the annual drain looked like a per

manent institution. But a very considerable change has taken place during the period in which Sir Henry's plans have been in effect. Monthly operating deficits have been converted into monthly revenues that are showing a continual increase. Will it be seriously contested that British Columbia's normal growth within the next few years will not be reflected in the turnover of a public undertaking that is a somewhat cumbersome liability at the moment?

Dr. MacLean has not enlightened us as to what he proposes to suggest for the Squamish-Clinton section of the line. We are still of the opinion, however, that if that mileage were to be dispensed with, and a highway substituted, the in-creased travel of various kinds that such a facility would undoubtedly furnish would indirectly, if not directly, contribute more liberally to the provincial exchequer than would otherwise be the case.


