		Summary	

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Prices of apples and pears are generally higher than a month ago, but prices of most other fruits have shown relatively little change.

Consumer incomes, which greatly influence the domestic demand for fruits, have made definite gain's during the past 2 months, and are expected by the Bureau of Agricultural Economics, to increase further in the next few months. Little change from a month ago is apparent in the outlook for foreign demand for our fruits - the effect of small European fruit crops being partially offset by continued weakness in foreign industrial activity.

Prospective apple production for 1938 declined about 2 percent during September and is now indicated at 130 million bushels, compared with the 1937 crop of 211 million and the 1927-36 average of 151 million bushels. The 1938 pear crop is now indicated at 31.5 million bushels, 7 percent above the 1937 crop and 30 percent larger than the 1927-36 average. Prospective grape production declined slightly during September, but the 1938 crop of 2.5 million tons is only 10 percent below the record crop of 1937 and 14 percent above average. Total grapefruit production for the 1938-39 marketing season is indicated at 40.7 million boxes, one-third larger than the previous record crop of 1937-38. Production of winter and spring varieties of oranges for 1938-39 is indicated at about 50 million boxes, compared with 46 million boxes in 1937-38, and 38 million boxes in 1936-37.

Domestic Demand

Recent developments in the factors affecting domestic demand for farm products were summarized in the October 15 issue of The Demand and Price Situation as follows:

"Consumer incomes, which as usual are lagging behind industrial recovery, have made definite gains during the past 2 months. Despite the sharp rise in industrial production, factory payrolls failed to change appreciably in July, but the index rose from 70.6 in that month to 76.9 in August, with some additional advance indicated by conditions in September. Other incomes, as usual, are changing more slowly, but the index numbers of national income and of nonagricultural income both experienced slight increases from the low points reached earlier in the summer. The effects of these increases in consumer purchasing power have not yet been plainly reflected in the consumer demand for farm products, due partly to the obscuring effects of other conditions and partly to the usual lag between changes in consumer buying power and demand.

"The advance of industrial production was at a slower page in September, due only partly to the unsettling influence of European political developments. It seems probable that any further improvement during the next few months will be at a slower rate than during the initial stages of the recovery. Some slowing down of the pace of industrial recovery, however, may be considered as a favorable rather than an unfavorable sign, since it may be due to conditions which will make for a more sustained and less irregular recovery than otherwise would occur."

Prospective Production

Apples

Prospective apple production for the 1938 season declined about 2 percent during September and is now indicated at 130 million bushels, compared with 211 million bushels produced in 1937 and the 1927-36 average of 151 million bushels.

The hurricane of September 21 caused a severe loss of unharvested apples in the New England States, particularly the Baldwin variety. Although a large part of the fruit blown off trees will be salvaged for fresh use and cider, it is certain that large quantities will be lost entirely. The October forecast of production excludes the quantity estimated to be a total loss.

In New York and Pennsylvania many apples were blown from the trees, but reports indicate that the greater part of the windfalls probably will be salvaged. Indicated production on October 1 in West Virginia and North Carolina was below that of a month earlier, and prospects were reduced in Ohio, Illinois, Michigan, Idaho, Washington, and Oregon as a result of damage from late brood coddling moths.

Pears

The 1938 pear crop, as indicated by October 1 conditions, totals 31.5 million bushels, compared with the 1937 crop of 29.5 million and the 1927-36 average of 24.3 million bushels.

In Washington, prospects for both Bartlett and winter pears were reduced slightly by hot weather during September. An unusually heavy crop of Bartletts and winter varieties was produced in the important commercial districts of Oregon. However, considerable quantities of Bartletts, included in the estimates of production for Washington and Oregon, were not harvested because of low prices.

The major part of the New York pear crop had been harvested before the September storm.

Grapes

Prospective grape production declined slightly during September chiefly because of rain damage in California, Pennsylvania, and Ohio. October 1 conditions indicated a total United States production of 2.5 million tons compared with the record 1937 crop of 2.8 million tons and the 1927-36 average production of 2.2 million tons.

Rains in California during the last week of September resulted in scme damage to wine varieties and caught many raisins on the drying trays. The total California crop is now indicated at 2.3 million tons, 10 percent smaller than the record 1937 crop and 14 percent above average.

Grape crops in important eastern producing areas are indicated to be much less than the relatively large 1937 crop, ranging from three-fourths smaller in Michigan to one-third smaller in New York.

Grapefruit

Total grapefruit production for the 1938-39 marketing season was indicated on October 1 at 40.7 million boxes, one-third larger than the previous record crop of 1937-38. The 1938-39 crop is much larger than that of 1937-38 in all commercial areas except Arizona, ranging from 11 percent larger in California to 44 percent larger in Florida.

Oranges

Production of oranges from the 1938 bloom, for all varieties except California Valencias, was indicated on October 1 at about 50 million boxes, compared with a little less than 46 million boxes of the same varieties in 1937-38, and 38 million boxes in 1936-37. This prospective crop of 50 million boxes, which is the chief supply from late October through the spring months, is the largest on record.

Foreign demand for United States fresh fruits

There has been little change from a month ago in the outlook for foreign demand for United States fresh fruits. Fruit crops in England and most European countries are still indicated to be small compared with last year. Tending partially to offset this favorable factor, however, is the continued weakness in foreign industrial production and in foreign demand for United States farm products in general.

Prices of fresh fruits

Apples

Apple prices in general have strengthened during recent weeks and are new substantially above prices of a year ago. Prices of New York McIntosh at New York City averaged \$1.86 per bushel for the second week of October this year compared with \$1.24 a year earlier. The weighted average auction price of all western apples at Chicago was \$1.68 per box for the week ended October 14 compared with \$1.54 for the same week of 1937.

Pears

Pear prices have moved upward in recent weeks, but in general are still somewhat lower than prices of a year carlier. California Bartletts at New York averaged \$2.34 for the second week of October this year compared with \$2.09 a month carlier and \$2.97 for the same week of 1937.

Eastern varieties of pears at New York City are selling at lower prices than were received a year ago, but at Chicago prices of local varieties in general are now at nearly the same levels as last year.

Grapefruit

New crop grapefruit began the season with prices materially below those of 1937. For the month of September Florida grapefruit at New York averaged \$2.20 per box this year compared with \$2.90 in September 1937.

Oranges

Current orange prices continue much below prices of a year earlier. California Valencias averaged \$2.89 per box at New York for the week ended October 15 compared with \$5.27 for the corresponding week of 1937. New crop Florida oranges averaged \$2.07 per box for the second week of October this year and \$4.21 a year earlier.

Grapes

Prices of California shipping grapes in general continue below those of a year earlier with juice grapes selling at relatively lower prices than table stock. At the shipping point, the Alicante Bouchet variety (black juice) sold at \$23 per ton in the second week of October this year compared with \$39 for the same week of 1937. The Tokay variety (table) sold at Lodi, California at 57 cents per lug this year and 68 cents per lug a year ago.

Eastern Concords at New York in early October sold at moderately lower prices than were received a year ago. At Chicago, however, this season's prices are about double the very low prices received for Concords at Chicago last year.
