1. The following requirements of various vaccines by the Ports of Moji, Wakamatsu, Miike and Hakata are submitted for your assistance in obtaining American vaccine during the period of suspension of the use of Japanese vaccine:

- a. Weekly average number of ships entering above ports: 15
- b. Weekly average number of smallpox vaccinations given: 140
- c. Weekly average number of typhus immunizations: 120
- d. Weekly average number of typhoid paratyphoid immunizations: 315
- e. Cholera, plague, and other immunizations are required occasionally.

SUBJECT: Kokura Occupation Employees Clinic

TO : Commanding Officer, Kyushu Military Government Region,
Headquarters and Headquarters Detachment, APO 929

1. Following repeated complaints from the 24th Division Headquarters, Kokura, regarding the combined Kokura Occupation Employees Clinic and Kokura Venereal Disease Clinic, inspection of the clinics was made jointly by the Kyushu Military Government Region and Fukuoka Military Government Team Public Health Sections on 17 December 1948.

2. While critical shortages of facilities, supplies and personnel were found to account for some of the inactivity, it was felt that most of the defects were due to gross negligence, disregarding of previous instructions from Fukuoka Military Government Team, and general apathy towards carrying out Japanese and Occupation directives concerning care of Occupation employees.

3. The responsible Japanese officials in the Ken Health Department, located in Fukuoka City, were summoned on 18 December 1948 and were given a two week ultimatum to correct the situation by means of the following procedures:

a. Discontinuing use of one building for both the Kokura Occupation Employees Clinic and the Kokura Venereal Disease Clinic.

b. Procure adequate personnel for the Occupational Employees Clinic from the staffs of the Kokura Venereal Disease Clinic and Kokura Health Center.

c. Procure supplies, drugs and equipment to permit the diagnostic and therapeutic procedures required by Japanese and Occupation directives regarding Japanese employees of the Occupation.

d. Solve the related problem of establishing suitable location, staff and facilities for the Kokura Health Center by using the present Venereal Disease Clinic building as a combined Health Center and Occupation Employees Clinic and transferring the Venereal Disease Clinic to the present Health Center building.



1. Saga National Tuberculosis Sanitarium located at Nakabaru-mura, Miyaki-gun, Saga Ken was designated by the Welfare Ministry to set up eight hundred (800) beds for tuberculosis patients. However because of a shortage of nurses and insufficient budget this hospital has only set up four hundred and sixty (460) beds.

2. At the present time there are over one thousand one hundred (1,100) cases of active tuberculosis in this prefecture which require hospitalization. The number of cases requiring hospitalization is increasing steadily. For example in September three hundred and sixty six (366) new cases were reported with only eighty (80) cases gaining admittance to a hospital, thus with a gradual increase in tuberculosis case finding the acuteness of the situation becomes more and more apparent. If the open cases cannot gain admittance to a hospital, tuberculosis control is very seriously hampered. Since there are no beds available this rapidly increasing number of cases cannot be hospitalized. The only apparent solution at the present time seems to be the establishment of more beds for tuberculosis patients.

3. The sanitarium mentioned in paragraph 1 has the room space and beds to handle at least three hundred (300) more patients. They have living quarters to accommodate about one hundred (100) more nurses. They lack, however, the staff and incidental supplies necessary for such an increase in patient load and also budget to carry out an expansion of this magnitude.

4. Because of the increasing problem of hospitalization of tuberculosis patients and the fact that facilities are available to greatly relieve the situation, our section believes an investigation into the possibility of opening some three hundred (300) more beds at this hospital is necessary. Since the original designation was eight hundred (800) beds it seems that an expansion to this number could be done at this time or should have been before this time.

1. The Minister of Welfare, Japanese Government, has designated sulfanilamide and its derivatives, penicillin and streptomycin, and all preparations containing these drugs under Article 41 (g) of the Pharmaceutical Affairs Law, Law No. 197, 29 July 1948, by notification published in the Official Gazette, dated 27 December 1948.

2. This designation puts Article 41 (g) and Article 44 (g) of the Pharmaceutical Affairs Law into full operation.

3. Article 56 of the Pharmaceutical Affairs Law provides that any person who has violated the provisions of Article 44 of the law shall be subject to a penal servitude not exceeding three years or a fine not exceeding ¥30,000 or both.



Medical Service Law (Draft)

PASSED 4 JULY 48
EFFECTIVE 1 OCT 48

25 May 1948

Art. 1. In this Law the hospital means the place where medical doctors or dentists give medical or dental care to the public or to the specific masses and which possesses the equipments with the capacity for not less than 20 patients, and shall be an institution organized and conducted primarily for the purpose of providing facilities where the sick and injured may be given scientific and etjical medical care.

In this law, the clinic means the place where medical doctors or dentists given medical or dental practice to the public or the specific masses and which possesses no equipments for receiving patients or possesses the equipments with the capacity for not more than 19 patients.

Art. 2. In this Law, the midwifery home means the place where midwives carry out their practice (exceptiong one practiced in hospitals or clinics) for the public or for the specific masses.

The midwifery home shall not have equipments with the capacity for more than 9 women in child-bed.

Art. 3. The places where the treatment of the disease (including the midwifery) is carried out and which are not hospitals or clinics shall not be titled as hospitals, branch hospitals, maternity hospitals, sanatoria, clinics or medical doctor's offices or attached the names liable to be confused with the hospitals or clinics.

The clinics shall not be titled as hospitals, branch hospitals or maternity hospitals or attached the names liable to be confused with hospitals.

The places which are not midwifery homes shall not be titled midwifery homes, or attached the names liable to be confused with the places where midwives carry out their business.

Art. 4. The hospital, which possesses equipments with the capacity for not less than 100 patients and has treatment departments of internal medicine, surgery, gynecology, ophthalmology and otorhinology at least and has those equipments mentioned in each item of Art. 22, may be titled as General Hospital (Sogobyoin in Japanese), having obtained the approval by the governor of the urban or local prefecture where it is situated.

The places which are not General Hospitals shall not be titled as General Hospital or attached the names liable to be confused with the General Hospital.

Art. 5. In case of medical doctors, dentists, or midwives engaged in treatment or in their business exclusively by means of visiting for the public or the specific masses, their dwelling places shall be considered as their clinics, or midwifery homes and the provisions of Art. 7, Art. 9, and Art. 39, Art. 40, Para. 3 or Art. 41 shall be applicable to them.

Art. 6. Concerning the application of provisions of this law to hospitals, clinics and midwifery homes established by the state, special rules shall be fixed by the Cabinet Order.

Chapter II

Hospitals, Clinics and Midwifery Homes

Art. 7. Those who want to establish hospitals, those who are not medical doctors or dentists and want to establish clinics or those who are not midwives and want to establish midwifery homes shall receive the permission of the governor of urban or local prefectures where they are going to be established.

To those who want to establish hospitals, clinics or midwifery homes for the purpose of making profit, the permission mentioned in the preceding paragraph may not be given.

Art. 8. Medical doctors, dentists, or midwives who established clinics or midwifery homes shall report to the governor or urban or local prefectures where clinics or midwifery homes are located within 10 days from the day of opening them.

Art. 9. The establishers of hospitals, clinics or midwifery homes, in case they suspended or abolished the same hospitals, clinics, or midwifery homes, shall report to the governor of urban or local prefectures within 10 days. When the establisher of the hospitals, clinics or midwifery homes have reopened the hospitals, clinics or midwifery homes under suspension, the same.

In case the establisher of a hospital, a clinic or a midwifery home has died or has been sentenced as missing, the obliger for the reporting of dying or missing according to provisions of the Census-register Law (Law No. 224, 1947) shall report it to the governor of urban or local prefecture where it is located within 10 days.

Art. 10. The establisher of a hospital or a clinic which carries out both medical and dental practice shall, in case the same hospital or clinic carried out chiefly medical practice, have a medical doctor manage it, and in case it carried out chiefly dental practice, have a dentist do that.

Art. 11. The establisher of a midwifery home shall have a midwife manage it.

Art. 12. The establisher of a hospital, a clinic or a midwifery home shall, in case he is qualified for the manager of a hospital, a clinic or a midwifery home, manages it himself, provided that, in case he has obtained permission of the governor of urban or local prefecture where the hospital, clinic or midwifery home is located, he is allowed to have another person manage this.

The medical doctor, the dentist or the midwife managing a hospital, a clinic or a midwifery home shall need be one who does not manage any other hospital, clinic or midwifery home, unless he has obtained the permission of the governor of urban or local prefecture where the hospital, the clinic or the midwifery home is located.

Art. 13. Managers of clinics shall not accommodate each patient for more than 48 hours. However, concerning patients who have been given the first aid and whom it is very difficult to transfer within 48 hours, this rule shall not be applied.

The manager of the concerned clinics shall in case he accommodated patients more than 48 hours according to the provision of provide of the preceding paragraph, report to the director of the health center of the area where the clinics are located without delay.

Art. 14. Managers of midwifery homes shall not accommodate more than 9 women in pregnancy or in child-bed at any time.

Art. 15. Managers of hospitals or clinics shall supervise over medical doctors, dentists, pharmacist and other workers serving in the same hospitals or clinics and pay necessary attention in order that they may be able to carry out their practice or business without failure.

Managers of midwifery homes shall supervise over midwives and other workers serving in the same midwifery homes and pay necessary attention in order that they may be able to carry out their business without failure.

Art. 16. Managers of hospitals where medical care is given shall have medical doctors be on night duty, However, in case medical doctors serving in the hospital live in the neighboring place of the same hospital and the permission of the governor of urban or local prefecture where it is located has been given, this rule shall not be applied.

Art. 17. Except for what are provided for in the preceding four articles those matters which the manager of a hospital, a clinic or a midwifery home shall comply with concerning its construction and equipments, administration of medicines and other articles and accommodation of patients and women in pregnancy and in child-bed shall be fixed by the Ministerial Ordinance.

Art. 18. In the hospitals, or in the clinics with not less than three medical doctors serving full time, the establishers shall employ the full time pharmacist: provided that, in case the permission of the governor of urban or local prefectures where the hospitals or clinics are located has been given, this rule shall not be applied.

Art. 19. The establisher of a midwifery home shall make a certain contract with a definite doctor.

Art. 20. Hospitals, clinics or midwifery homes shall keep themselves clean and the construction and equipments of them shall be safe from the view point of hygiene, prevention of fires and public peace.

Art. 21. The hospitals, shall in accordance with the provisions of the ministerial ordinance, possess personnel, equipments and records mentioned in the following items:

1. Numbers of medical doctors, dentists, nurses and other workers fixed by the ministerial ordinance.
2. Consultation rooms for each department.
3. Operation rooms
4. Treatment rooms
5. Equipments for clinical examination
6. X-rays apparatus
7. Dispensary
8. Disinfecting equipments
9. Equipments for boarding
10. Equipments for water-supply
11. Heating equipments
12. Equipments for washing
13. Filth-treating equipments
14. Records concerning medical treatment
15. Equipments other than above mentioned and fixed by the Ministerial ordinance.

Art. 22. The General Hospitals shall possess equipments mentioned in the following items, besides what are mentioned in the preceding article:

1. Equipments for chemical, bacteriological and pathological examination.
2. Rooms for pathological dissection
3. Rooms for study
4. Rooms for lecture
5. Library
6. Equipments fixed by the ministerial ordinance other than above mentioned.

Art. 23. Except for what is provided for in the preceding two articles, necessary standard of the construction and equipments of hospitals, clinics, and midwifery homes shall be fixed by the ministerial ordinance, in order that they may be sufficient from the view-point of ventilation, lighting, illumination, prevention of dampness, preservation of peace, refuge, cleanliness and other hygienical matters.

Art. 24. The governor of the urban or local prefecture may, in case a hospital, a clinic or a midwifery home don't keep itself clean, or in case he considers the construction and equipments of it to be against the provisions of Art. 21 or Art. 22 or the ministerial ordinance under the preceding article or harmful from the hygienical point of view or dangerous to public peace, restrict or prohibit the use of the whole or a part of them for a fixed term, or order the repair or reconstruction of them to the establisher of it.

Art. 25. The Minister of Welfare or the governor of urban or local prefectures may, when he considers to be necessary, cause establishers or managers of hospitals, clinics or midwifery homes to report necessary matters or cause competent government or public officials to inspect hospitals, clinics or midwifery homes and examine the cleanliness, constructions, and equipments or patients record books, midwifery record books and other books and documents.

The competent government or public officials shall, when they inspect and examine according to the preceding paragraph, take the certificate with them and show it to those concerned upon their request.

Art. 26. Medical care inspectors shall be put in the state and urban and local prefectures, to carry out the official power of the competent government or public officials mentioned in para. 1 of the preceding article.

The medical care inspectors shall be appointed by the Minister of Welfare or the governor of urban or local prefectures from among government officials

or public officials of urban or local prefectures.

Except what is provided for in the preceding two paragraphs, necessary matters concerning medical care inspectors shall be fixed by the ministerial ordinance.

Art. 27. Clinics or midwifery homes which possess equipments for receiving patients of women in pregnancy or in child-bed, or hospitals shall not be used, unless they have passed through the inspection of the governor or urban or local prefectures where they are located and been given license by the said governor concerning their construction and equipments.

Art. 28. The governor or urban or local prefectures may, in case the manager of a hospital, a clinic or a midwifery home has committed crimes or done unjust deeds concerning medical affairs or is considered unfit for the management, order to the establisher of it to change him for another.

Art. 29. The governor of urban or local prefectures may, cancel the permission for the establishment of hospitals, clinics or midwifery homes or order the abolishment of them for a fixed term to their establishers, in case they come under one of the following items:

1. In case hospitals, clinics or midwifery homes do not begin practice or business without any proper reason for 6 months after having obtained the permission for the establishment of them.

2. In case establishers of hospitals, clinics or midwifery homes violated orders according to the provisions of Art. 24 or the preceding article.

3. In case establishers of hospitals, clinics or midwifery homes have committed crimes or done unjust deeds concerning medical affairs.

The governor of urban or local prefectures may, in case General Hospitals do not come under Art. 4, para. 1, cancel his approval.

Chapter III Public Medical Facilities

Art. 30. In this Chapter, public medical facilities mean hospitals or clinics established by urban or local prefectures, cities, town, village or those who are fixed by the Minister of Welfare.

Art. 31. The Council for the arrangement of medical facilities (hereinafter referred to as arrangement council) under the jurisdiction of the Minister of Welfare or the governor of urban or local prefectures shall be put in Welfare Ministry and urban and local prefectures to investigate and deliberate important matters concerning the arrangement of medical facilities answering an inquiry of the said Minister or the governor.

Art. 32. The government may, to urban or local prefectures, cities, towns, villages or those who are fixed by the Minister of Welfare, grant in aid sums which are one half of the expenditure necessary for the establishment of public medical facilities.

Art. 33. The Minister of Welfare may, in case he considers especially necessary for the diffusion of medical treatment, order to those mentioned in the preceding article to establish public medical facilities, inquiring of the arrangement council.

In the case of the preceding paragraph, the government shall grant in aid sums which are two thirds of the expenditure necessary for the establishment of them.

Art. 34. The Minister of Welfare or governor of urban or local prefectures may order to establishers or managers of public medical facilities the following matters:

1. To permit duly licensed medical doctors or dentists who are not serving in the concerned public medical facilities to utilize whole or a part of buildings, equipments, apparatus and utensils of the hospitals or clinics for their medical treatment or study, if there is not obstacles for the medical or dental practice of the same hospital or clinics.

2. To be furnished with necessary conditions so that the practical training provided in Art. 11 of the Medical Doctor's Law or the Dentist's Law may be done in them.

Except for what is provided for in each item of the preceding paragraph, the Minister of Welfare or the governor of urban or local prefectures may make necessary indications to establishers of public medical facilities concerning necessary indications to establishers of public medical facilities concerning their management.

Art. 35. The government may, in case the Minister of Welfare ordered matters provided in para. 1 of the preceding article or he considers to be especially necessary for the management, grant in aid sums not more than one fourth of the expenditure necessary for the management of public medical facilities.

Art. 36. The council for management of the public medical facilities (hereinafter referred to as management council) under the jurisdiction of the governor of urban or local prefectures shall be put to investigate and deliberate important matters concerning management of the public medical facilities answering inquiry of the said governor.

Art. 37. The Minister of Welfare may regulate concerning sums of fees for medical treatment which establishers of public medical facilities are allowed to demand.

Art. 38. The Council for Medical Fees under the jurisdiction of the Minister of Welfare shall be put, in order to deliberate matters concerning fees for medical treatment provided in the preceding article answering an inquiry of the said Minister.

Chapter IV Advertisements Concerning
Medical or Dental Profession or Midwifery Business, Etc.

Art. 39. The advertisements concerning medical or dental profession or hospitals or clinics shall not be made by documents or any other methods by any person, except the items specifies in the following items:

1. That he is a medical doctor or a dentist.
2. Names of the treatment departments as provided in Art. 40, para 1.
3. Names of hospitals or clinics, telephone number and matters denoting the sites of hospitals or clinics.
4. Names of medical doctors or dentists engaged in treatment.
5. Days for treatment or hours for treatment.
6. Existence of the equipments for hospitalization.
7. Matters other than above mentioned permitted by the governor of urban or local prefectures.

Anyone, in case he advertises the matters mentioned in Item 4 of the preceding paragraph, if the medical doctors or the dentists are not engaged in treatment full time, shall advertise the days and hours for treatment of the same medical doctors or dentists, at the same time.

Anyone, in case he advertises the matters mentioned in each item of para. 1, shall not denote any matters concerning ability, methods of treatment, personal history or degree of medical doctors or dentists.

Art. 40. Names of the treatment departments provided in item 2 of para. 1, of the preceding article are as follows:

1. Concerning medical profession, internal medicine, psychopathology, pediatrics, surgery, orthopaedy, dermatology and urology (or dermatology, urology) obstetrics and gynecology (or obstetrics, gynecology) ophthalmology, otorhinology, physical treatment department (or radiant rays department).
2. Concerning dental profession, dentistry.

3. The names of the departments outside of the preceding 2 items, of which the medical doctors or dentists are engaged in the concerned treatment, have obtained permission by Minister of Welfare.

The Minister of Welfare shall, in case he gives permission according to the provisions of item 3 of the preceding paragraph, beforehand inquire of the Council for medical morality.

In case of the advertisement of the name of treatment department according to the provision of Para. 1 Item 3, the name of the medical doctor or the dentist who has been given permission concerning the concerned department shall be advertised at the same time.

Art. 41. The advertisements concerning practice of a midwife or a midwifery home shall not be made by documents or any other method by any person, except the Items specified in the following Items:

1. That she is a midwife.
2. Names and telephone numbers of midwifery homes and matters denoting the sites of midwifery homes.
3. Names of midwives engaged in practice.
4. Days for practice.
5. Existence of the equipments for accommodation.
6. Matters permitted by the governor of urban or local prefectures other than above mentioned.

Anyone, in case he advertises the matters mentioned in Item 3 of the preceding paragraph, if the midwives are not engaged in practice full time, shall advertise the days and hours for practice of the same midwives, at the same time.

Anyone, in case he advertises the matters mentioned in each item of para 1, shall not denote any matters concerning ability or personal history of midwives.

Chapter V. Penal Rules

Art. 42. Those who come under any one of the following items shall be liable to a penal servitude not more than 6 months or a fine not more than 10,000 yen:

1. Those who violated the provisions of Art. 7, para. 1, Art. 39, Art. 40, para. 3, and Art. 41.

2. Those who violated the provision of Art. 14.
3. Those who violated orders for dispositions according to the provisions for Art. 24, Art. 28, or Art. 29.

Art. 43. In case the competent government or public official or one who has been at the post has let out, without any reason, the secrets on business or the personal secrets of medical doctors, dentists or midwives found at the inspection of the patient's record books or midwifery record books in accordance with the provision of Art. 25, he shall be punished with a penal servitude of not more than 6 months or a fine of not more than 10,000 yen.

In case other public official or former public official who became aware of the secrets has let out the secrets without any reasons, the same as in preceding paragraph.

Art. 44. Those who come under any one of the following items shall be liable to a fine not more than 5,000 yen.

1. Those who violated the provisions of Art. 3, Art. 4, para. 2, Art. 8, Art. 13, 16, 18, 19, 21, 22 or 27.
2. Those who violated the provisions of the Ministerial ordinance according to the provisions of Art. 23.
3. Those who neglected reports mentioned in the provision of Art. 25 or made false reports, or denied, hindered or challenged the inspection of the competent government or public officials according to the same provision.

Art. 45. In case the representative of a juridical person or the substitute the employee or other workers of a juridical person or a person who had done the offensive deeds under Art. 42 or Art. 44 concerning the affairs of the same juridical person or the person, the same juridical person or the person shall be liable to a fine provided in the concerned article, beside punishing the offender.

Supplementary Rules

Art. 46. This law shall be enforced on and after the day of the enforcement of Medical Practitioners' Law.

Art. 47. Clinics or hospitals with the capacity for not less than 20 patients which have been given permission of establishment according to the provision of Art. 21 of the National Medical Treatment Law (Law No. 70, 1942, hereinafter referred to as Former Law) or which have been deemed to have been given permission of establishment according to the provision of Art. 74 of the Enforcement Regulation of the National Medical Treatment Law (Regulation No. 37, 1942, hereinafter referred to as former Regulation) and are actually

in existence at the time of the enforcement of this law shall be deemed to have obtained the permission for the establishment of hospital or clinics or to have reported the establishment of clinics according to the provisions of Art. 7 or Art. 9.

Hospitals with the capacity for not more than 19 patients which have been given permission of the establishment according the provision of Art. 21 of the Former Law or have been deemed to have been given permission according to the provision of Ar. 74 of the Former Regulation and are actually in existence at the time of the enforcement of this law, shall be deemed to have obtained permission for the establishment of clinics or to have reported the establishment of clinics according to the provisions of Art. 7 or Art. 8. However, this clinic may, for 6 months after enforcement of this law, be titled former names notwithstanding the provision of Art. 3, para.2.

Concerning the construction and equipments of hospitals or clinics mentioned in the preceding two paragraphs, provisions of the Former Law may be applied for three years after the enforcement of this law. However, in case it is necessary to make important changes to the construction and equipments, and the permission of the governor of urban or local prefectures where the hospitals or clinics are located has been given, provisions of the Former Law may be applied for two years more.

Concerning places which have been deemed to have been given permission of the establishment of clinics or to have reported the establishment of clinics according to the provisions of para. 1 or para. 2, the provision of Art. 13 shall apply within 3 years but shall not be applied for 5 years after the enforcement of this Law, in those areas where adequate hospital facilities are not available.

Art. 48. Of the advertisements concerning medical or dental profession, practice or midwife, hospitals, or clinics which are actually in existence at the time of the enforcement of this law and are contrary to the provisions of Art. 39, Art. 40 para. 3 or Art. 41, the provisions of the Former Law may be applied, for six months after the enforcement of this law.

Art.49, Of those places which come under midwifery homes provided in this law and are actually in existence at the time of the enforcement of this law, provisions of this law may not be applied for 6 months after the enforcement of this law.

Concerning the construction and equipments of these midwifery homes mentioned in the preceding paragraph which have obtained the permission of the establishment of midwifery homes according to the provisions of Art. 7. or have reported the establishment of midwifery homes according to the provisions of establishment of midwifery homes according the provisions of Art. 8 within 6 months from the enforcement of this law, provisions of this law may not be applied for two years after the enforcement of this law.

Art. 50. Those who have obtained the permission of the governor of urban or local prefectures according to the provisions of Art. 45, para. 1, proviso, para. 2 or Art. 51, proviso of the Former Regulation or have been deemed to have obtained the same permission, according to the provisions of Art. 75 of the Former Regulation shall be deemed as those who have obtained the permission according to the provisions of Art. 12, para 1, proviso, para. 2 of Art. 18 proviso.

Those who have obtained the permission of Minister of Welfare according to the provisions of Art. 36, para. 1, item 1, of the Former Regulation shall be deemed as those who have obtained the permission according to the provisions of Art. 40, para. 1, item 3.

Art. 51. As to the hospitals or clinics continually in suspension of practice before the enforcement of this Law, the reporting of suspension according to the provisions of the Former Law shall be deemed as done according to the corresponding provisions of this Law.

Art. 52. In case thereafter the establishers of hospitals or clinics who have died or been sentenced as missing before the enforcement of this Law, as to those who have not yet reported according to the provisions of Art. 43, para. 2, of the Former Regulation and whose term of reporting is not yet expired at the time of the enforcement of this Law, the reporting shall still be made according to the former provisions.

Art. 53. Measures which have been done by the governor of urban or local prefectures according to the provisions of Art. 57 or Art. 58 of the Former Regulation or have been deemed to have been done according to the provisions of Art. 80 of the same Regulation shall be deemed as done according to the corresponding provisions of this Law.

1. Under the provisions of change 1, AR 615-368, 25 August 1948 and change 2, AR 615-369, 25 August 1948, which gives the Commanding Officer of units of battalion or comparable level authority to bring enlisted men before these boards without too much delay, request that the following procedures be established by all units of your command for purpose of attaining medical clearance:

a. Enlisted Men scheduled to appear before above cited boards be examined and a certificate be furnished by the Unit Surgeon.

b. If, upon examination, the unit surgeon is of the opinion that subject enlisted man has a disqualifying defect sufficient to warrant discharge under the provisions of AR 615-361, he will be referred to this hospital for consultation as an out patient.

c. If the unit surgeon deems it necessary that subject enlisted man should be examined by a psychiatrist, the enlisted man will be referred to this hospital for psychiatric evaluation on a consultation request as an out patient.

2. The above procedure will eliminate the hospitalization of enlisted men who are behavior problems. However, the unit surgeon may rest assured that we will render any assistance needed and that they feel free to consult the staff of this hospital at any time.





To train selected officer and enlisted personnel in the supervision, installation, inspection, maintenance, and repair of electro-mechanical medical technical equipment used by the Army and Navy. Officer graduates are qualified for assignment to duty as Medical Equipment Maintenance Officer (MOS 4890). Enlisted graduates are qualified for assignment to duty as Medical Equipment Repairman (MOS 1229).

"6. Scope. This course embodies theoretical and practical training with medical, electro-mechanical, and dental technical equipment. Approximately one third of the training is devoted to classroom lectures covering the theory of electrical and mechanical functioning of equipment. The remainder of the course consists of applicatory training with tools in the classroom and shop on units representative of each type of medical equipment used by the Army and Navy.

MEDNA 300.6, 1 Aug 48, subj: "Information of Interest to Hospital Commanders and Major Command Surgeons"

"7. Prerequisites. a. Officer mandatory prerequisites.

"(1) Medical Service Corps, Regular Army or category III.

"(2) Civilian employment as mechanical or electrical engineer; or as a repairman of electrical instruments or equipment; or as a radio repairman; or in the manufacture, inspection, testing, maintenance, operation, purchasing, or technical sales of electrical equipment; or must have successfully completed courses on the technical school or college level in general physics and principles of electricity.

"b. Enlisted mandatory prerequisites.

"(1) Must be qualified in one of the following specialties:

Radio Repairman (MOS 648).

Medical Equipment Mechanic (MOS 229).

Instrument Repairman, Electrical (MOS 338).

X-ray Technician (MOS 264).

"(2) AGCT score 100 or higher.

"(3) Not eligible for separation within 15 months after completion of the course.

"c. Enlisted desirable prerequisites. Courses in electricity, mathematics, mechanics, and physical sciences.

"d. Waivers. In exceptional cases waivers on any of the qualifications set forth above may be granted by The Surgeon General. Waivers will be confined to cases where the officer or enlisted man, although failing to meet one of the requirements set forth above, has demonstrated by outstanding performance of duty in the MOS or by high mental capacity, or adequate formal education, that he is capable of successfully completing this course.

"8. Applications will be submitted through channels to reach The Surgeon General, Attention: MEDDC, not later than 17 September 1948. Enlisted men will state the theater for which they enlisted."

* * * * *

"1. It is requested that basic communication be brought to the attention of all eligible personnel, your command.

"2. It is not contemplated that any individuals will be returned to the United States prior to completion of their normal tour of overseas service for the purpose of receiving this training."

6. IMMUNIZATIONS, SPECTACLE PRESCRIPTIONS, DENTURES AND OTHER ENTRIES ON WD AGO FORM 8-117 - IMMUNIZATION REGISTER.

a. It has been brought to the attention of this office that current requirements of regulations regarding entries on WD AGO Form 8-117 with relation to immunization, spectacle prescriptions, dentures and other pertinent entries are not being properly accomplished. Although the responsibility is primarily that of the personnel officer, medical and dental personnel share a joint responsibility in assuring that proper entries are accomplished.

b. It is desired that the following regulations be reviewed by the surgeons of all echelons of command and be brought to the attention of all Medical Department personnel who are directly or indirectly concerned with the proper administration of WD AGO Form 8-117:

(1) Pars 5 and 6, AR 40-215, War Department, 12 Aug 47;

(2) WD Pamphlet No. 8-5, War Department, Feb 47. (NO)

7. HUMAN RABIES VACCINE.

a. Limited amounts of Human Rabies Vaccine, stock no. 1-607-875, are available for issue. Shipment of one (1) package of this item has been made to each General and Station Hospital in Japan and the 332d Medical General Dispensary. Two (2) packages have been shipped to the 385th Medical General Dispensary.

b. Replenishment of this item will be by requisition on the 5th Medical Depot Co, APO 503. Requisitions will state the name of the patient receiving the last unit. Emergency requisitions must be thoroughly justified by stating the names of the individuals necessary to be inoculated.

c. Latest information from the San Francisco Port of Embarkation indicates that the potency of the items is as indicated by the date. The vaccine should not be used after date indicated but should be returned to the 5th Medical Depot Co, APO 503.

d. Preventive measures are necessary to avoid depletion of stock. (NS)

8. SUPPLY OF PITOCIN, ITEM NO. 1-352-350.

Information received from the San Francisco Port of Embarkation indicates that supply of item no. 1-352-350, Pitocin, will be delayed due to difficulties in production. (NS)

9. AVAILABILITY OF CALAMINE LOTION.

a. In view of Item No. 1-111-200, Calamine Lotion, 2 oz: Bottle, currently being in short supply and sufficient quantities not being available for issue to all medical installations throughout this command, future issues of this item by the 5th Medical Depot Co, APO 503, will be made only to divisions and field units in Japan.

b. However, as sufficient quantities of Items Nos. 1-111-000, Calamine, prepared, 1 lb; 1-098-400, Bentonite, 1 lb; 1-219-000, Glycerine, 10 lb; and 1-501-000, Zinc Oxide, 1 lb, ingredients required for the preparation of standard calamine lotion as contained in the official National Formulary, 7th Edition, 1942, are currently available in depot stocks, it is desired that medical installations other than divisions and field units requisition these items for preparation of calamine lotion by pharmacists now on duty at these installations. (NS)

10. DELETED MEDICAL SUPPLY ITEMS.

Attention is again invited to the list of deleted items which remain available at the 5th Medical Depot Co and as listed in Medical Supply Memorandum No. 56, dated 25 June 1948. Many of these items have been replaced by items that are not available at present. Your earnest perusal of subject list is required to avoid waste. (NS)

11. PROFESSIONAL BOOKS.

A list of professional books currently available at the 5th Medical Depot Co, APO 503, was distributed to each conferee present at the Hospital Commanders, Corps, Division and Base Surgeons' Meeting on 22 July 1948. Requisitions for any of the books contained in this list to complete the reference library of your installation can be submitted immediately to the 5th Medical Depot Co, APO 503. (NS)

12. VETERINARY ACTIVITIES.

a. There have been no new cases of animal rabies reported during the current month.

b. There is currently a shortage of Veterinary personnel both commissioned and enlisted. This condition will become more acute rather than improved in the succeeding months. It is necessary that greater responsibility be placed on experienced non-commissioned officers that veterinary inspections are not curtailed and the quality and soundness of foodstuffs in any way lowered thereby.

c. On-the-job training should be intensified, and special instruction and training be given those individuals who are potential replacements for key personnel who might be returned to the Zone of the Interior. (NV)



a. The following circulars were read in part and discussed:

(1) Cir 6, Hq Eighth Army, dtd 26 Jan 48, subj: "Arrest, Entry, Search and Seizure"

(2) Section I, Cir 33, Hq Eighth Army, dtd 26 May 48, Subj: "Venereal Disease Contact Tracing."

b. That all Japanese and/or Foreign National females and males employed by the Occupation Forces be subjected to a complete physical examination to include, in the case of females, a pelvic examination.

c. Reference par 5 b, Report of V D Control Council Meeting, Hq 24th Infantry Division, dated 24 Jun 48.

d. That the old policy of courts martialling personnel contracting V D and making up time lost not in line of duty replace the present new policy which is considered ineffective. This council does not recommend a return to this policy. Such policy, would cause individuals to conceal the disease, employ self treatment or seek unauthorized treatment which would not be adequate and would probably result in further transmission of the disease or serious complications.

7. Recommendations:

a. That all Japanese and/or Foreign Nationals, females and males, employed by the Occupation Forces be subjected to a complete physical examination to include, in the case of females, a pelvic examination. This recommendation is made in view of the possibilities of contraction by female personnel employed in dependent homes and/or other military installations. V D is not limited to any one class of the civilian population.

b. That the present policy of not courts martialling personnel when they contract V D and loss of time being in line of duty stay in effect.

8. The meeting adjourned at 1100 hours to meet at the call of the President.

 2. Allied merchant ships continue to arrive at the port cities of Nagasaki and Sasebo with unsatisfactory immunization status of crews. (A ship should not be cleared from a port until it is prepared medically to enter the next port of call)
 3. The following ships entered the port cities of Nagasaki and Sasebo during the months of May and June 1948 with incomplete immunizations.
 - a. SS Herman Melville arrived Nagasaki 25 June from Honolulu 97% incomplete.
 - b. SS George Eastman arrived Nagasaki 21 May from San Pedro, Calif. 12% incomplete.
 - c. SS Swainby arrived Sasebo 20 June from Singapore 100% incomplete.
 - d. USS Tabitha Brown arrived Sasebo 4 June from Los Angeles 12% incomplete.

e. USS Beloit Victory arrived Sasebo 25 May from Balboa, Canal Zone 75% incomplete.

f. USS Thomas Lyons arrived Sasebo 16 May from Los Angeles 50% incomplete.

It is once again requested that the Public Health Departments responsible for Seaport Quarantine Service be enforced to administer immunizations required by Cir 9, GHQ, SCAP, 29 Mar 48 prior to the vessels departure for Japan, and prior to issuing a "Bill of Health" and a "Port Clearance Permit" to the ship.

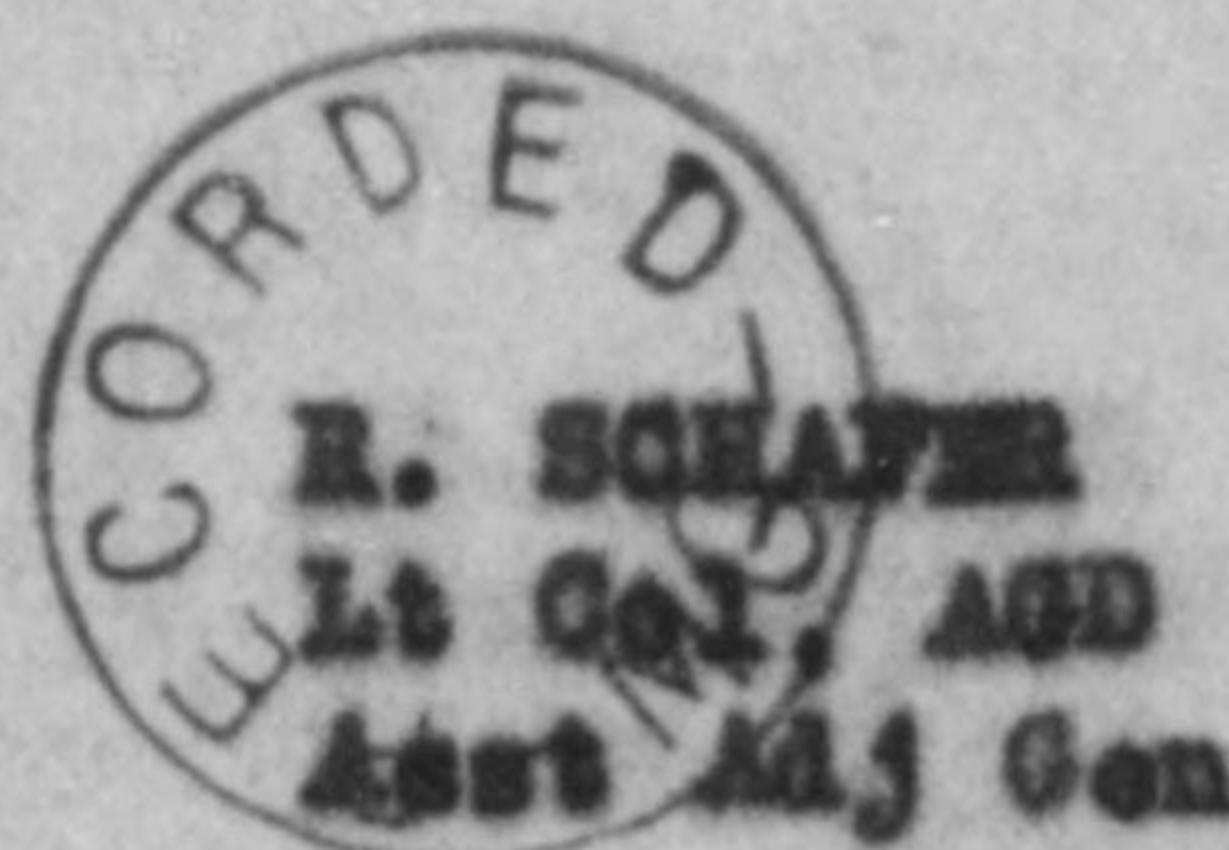

2. Information contained in the above references is inadequate as regards the purpose of the course whether it be to prepare nurse instructions or prepare clinical nurses for leadership and administration of nursing in the hospital.

3. Some of the hospitals listed offer limited possibilities for improvement; Kurume National Hospital does not have a training school; Kagoshima National Hospital is for treatment of tuberculosis only.

4. In view of the fact that so few nurses can be trained it would appear more practical to concentrate trained personnel in the hospitals that are making a decided effort to improve their schools of nursing and/or their hospitals.

5. Selection of candidates for courses could be expedited if the regional nurse were consulted prior to the release of the list of hospitals and candidates.

6. The nursing schools in the Chikushi National Hospital and the Kumamoto National Hospital are making outstanding efforts to improve their schools but need more trained nurses; Kamagawa National Hospital needs more nurses to teach in the school and clinical nurses to administer the nursing program in the hospital where the nurses are doing all of the bed-side nursing; Kyushu University School of Nursing which should be built up as the leading school in Kyushu was omitted from the list and preference given to minor hospitals. The Kokura, Kagoshima and Kurume National Hospitals, the Saga Prefectural Hospital and the Sasebo Municipal Hospital are all mediocre institutions which offer little future as schools of nursing or teaching institutions, therefore, it would be advisable to eliminate them from the list and select additional candidates from the first group of hospitals.

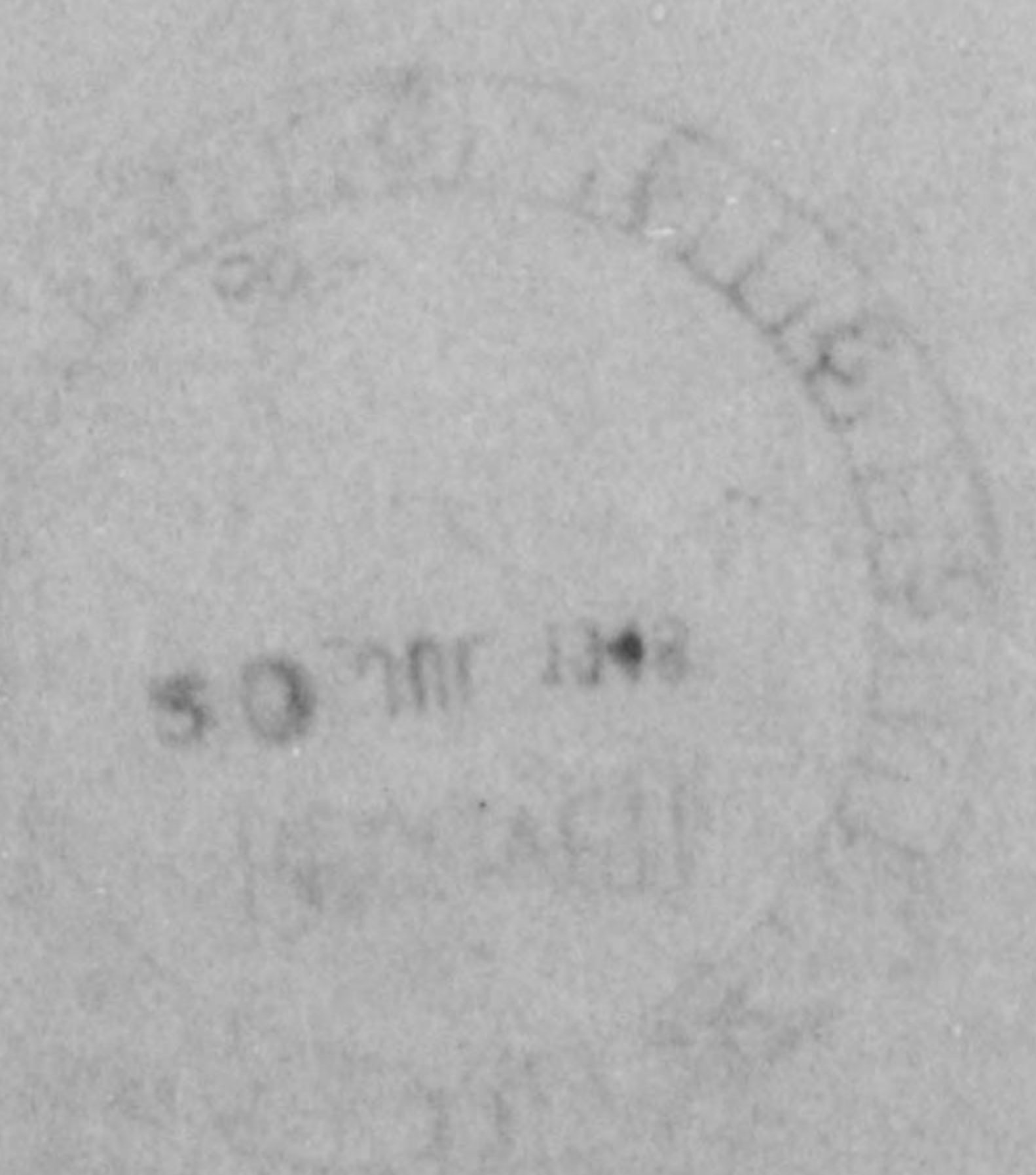

1. Reference par 2, basic letter, the clinical nurses' refresher course is for both classroom instructors and headnurses whose duty includes clinical teaching in the ward. The qualifications, leadership, ability and desire to teach, are essential to both headnurse and classroom instructor.

2. Reference par 3, basic letter, the hospitals on the list were selected by the Ministry of Welfare on recommendations of the Medical Bureau and National Hospitals who are financing the course. Pressure groups representing some of the small inadequate hospitals is one reason for some of the poor choices. Changes may be made, however, where the hospitals selected are below minimum standards and the nursing service is poor. Telephone conversations by this headquarters with all regional nurses were made in attempts to avoid confusion on this point.

3. This headquarters agrees it is far better to concentrate efforts on hospitals which are making an effort to improve their nursing service. This has been the recognized policy from the beginning.

4. The Ministry of Welfare is sponsoring this refresher course and after the selection of hospitals was made, the Ministry then requested the assistance of Public Health and Welfare Section, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers on the final selection. The Public Health Branch, Military Government Section, Headquarters Eighth Army has forwarded to the regions all information received from Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers pertaining to this nursing course. It is anticipated that in the future these programs will be planned far enough in advance of commencement date of courses to permit a more careful selection of candidates without disrupting the normal work program of the local military government nurse.

FILE
1. The Saga Prefectural Hospital has been classified as a "B" Class nursing school although very little is being done in the nursing school and the hospital is poorly managed. Shizuka Kizuka, who received a one month training course at 118th Station Hospital in Fukuoka is not being used in the nursing school although this was the primary aim in sending nurses to the course. The conditions of the student nurses' home is very poor and badly in need of repair. The one "ofuro" in the hospital must serve about a hundred people including the student nurses. There is almost no nursing service in the hospital since the majority of licensed nurses are assigned to the out-patient department. The director of the hospital and the chief nurse were urged to start refresher courses for the clinical nurses so that some bed-side nursing can be established in the hospital.

2. The Saga National Tuberculosis Sanatorium was visited but since the nursing school will very likely be discontinued before 1950 due to lack of general services, only a short time was spent discussing the class B curriculum. The need of good bed-side nursing was emphasized and the nurses were urged to use the Nursing Procedures Manual for their refresher courses.

3. The nursing program for the Karatsu Model Health Center appears to be poorly planned with no thought having been given to placing the best trained public health nurse available in as chief nurse. According to the monthly report of the Health Center only limited time is being spent making home visits. The following recommendations were made:

a. Divide the Karatsu area into seven sections or districts and assign one nurse to each district for which she is responsible.

b. Rotate the nurses in the clinic so that the time is evenly divided.

c. Follow-up and contact tracing should be done as soon as possible on all venereal disease and tuberculosis cases and an effort made to obtain examinations for all.

d. Since many people refuse to go the Venereal Disease Clinic some provision should be made for treatment of prenatal.

4. The annual meeting of the Saga Prefectural Midwives, Public Health Nurses and Clinical Nurses Association was discussed with three of the members of the Board of Directors. According to their version of the first meeting held last year the present board of Directors was appointed by various associations of Midwives and nurses and no election was held. It was requested that the date for the next meeting be settled sufficiently in advance so that it will be possible for the writer to attend.

SUBJECT: Reduction, Separation from the Service, and Punishment related to Venereal Disease.

TC: Commanding Officers, Organic and attached Units.

1. Reference: Messageform, Headquarters Eighth Army, subject: "Venereal Disease", dtd 14 June 1948, file number AGDH 726.1.
2. Punishment is not authorized for contraction of venereal disease (Par 23 F (2) AR 40-210).
3. Failure to report contraction of venereal disease may be punished but only upon competent proof of the following facts:
 - a. That accused was infected with a venereal disease.
 - b. That symptoms existed and were of such a nature that the accused, or any reasonably prudent man, should have recognized the presence of a disease. (Medical Officer's testimony)
 - c. That the accused failed to report the existence of such symptoms.
 - d. That accused had received instructions of a nature which should acquaint the ordinary soldier with the symptoms of venereal disease.

(NOTE: The essence of the offense is that a soldier, knowing he may have a venereal disease, fails to report it. Venereal disease is contagious and an active, untreated case constitutes a menace to the health of those with whom the infected man associates. He is not being punished for contracting the disease but for knowingly and wilfully endangering the health of his associates).

4. Reduction of Noncommissioned Officers:
 - a. The reduction of a noncommissioned officer solely for the contraction of one or two cases of venereal disease is of doubtful validity under present Department of the Army policy.
 - b. When a noncommissioned officer contracts venereal disease, his commander will carefully and thoroughly inquire into his record, manner of performance of duty, and further will determine whether or not the man conducts his private life in such a manner which tends to undermine discipline and respect for command. If such inquiry discloses facts which, in addition to the contraction of venereal disease, indicate that the noncommissioned officer lacks the necessary qualifications for leadership and has failed to set a proper example for his subordinates and associates in the service, reference to a reduction board is warranted.
 - c. The contraction of two new cases of venereal disease will warrant the reduction of a noncommissioned officer unless his efficiency, performance of duty and personal conduct, other than as evidenced by the disease, is outstanding.
5. Separation Pursuant to AR 615-368 and 615-369:
 - a. The contraction of one or two new cases of venereal disease is not alone sufficient to warrant discharge under the above cited Army Regulations. Contraction of venereal disease is, however, strong evidence of undesirability. Nevertheless, additional evidence must be adduced to insure that upon review, the proceedings will not be disapproved. Such additional evidence may consist of repeated disciplinary infractions (whether supported by conviction by court-martial, punishment under AW 104, or not), habitual intemperance, or recurrent

instances of other personal misconduct which effects detrimentally the performance of duty and usefulness to the service of the person concerned.

b. When discharge is recommended pursuant to AR 615-368, the board report must contain evidence of rehabilitation attempts.

c. Discharge under AR 615-369 may be supported by the reasons cited in "a" above and the alternate reason that the soldier concerned cannot absorb further military training. The test as to the applicability of AR 615-368 or 615-369 is the gravity of the undesirable conduct involved, and the fairness of separating the soldier as undesirable. War Department Circular 93, 1947 series states the applicable policy and will be followed in this command as modified by reference, paragraph 1 hereof.

6. Punishment for Offenses Incidental to the Contraction of Venereal Disease:

a. Frequently, investigation will disclose that a soldier at the time he contracted a venereal disease had committed an offense punishable under the Articles of War. Such offense may be a violation of standing orders, wrongful disposition of government property, or a similar crime. When the violation of an Article of War is capable of proof, a noncommissioned officer or private first class may be tried and if found guilty sentenced to be reduced to the grade of private, in addition to other appropriate punishment.

b. In investigating contraction of venereal disease, the restrictions set out in Article of War 24 will be strictly adhered to.

7. Board Proceedings:

a. Boards will be conducted and reported according to AR 420-5. The members of the board will make full inquiry into the subject soldier's qualifications and fitness for the Service and will faithfully report all of the testimony received. Boards are cautioned that their proceedings are reviewed by various agencies and that failure to incorporate in their written report all essential information upon which they base their findings may result in reversal or injustice to the government or the soldier concerned.




