#### GLENDALE ELKS TO BUILD HOUSE FOR POOR WOMAN HOMESTEADER

An outing which promises a great deal of pleasure to the Elks who will participate in it and which will bring substantial results that will be recorded to their credit in the book of good deeds, will take place next Sunday when a party of men enrolled in B. P. O. E. 1289 will leave this city about 8 a. m. in autos bound for Bouquet Canyon, where they will build a house 12x16 for a widow who has been trying to homestead a piece of land there and whose worn tent is no longer weather proof. The man whom she approached in regard to getting a second-hand tent to take its place was our big-hearted Judge Harry Miller, who at once suggested to "the boys" that they provide her with something more substantial and permanent. The suggestion made a great hit. Brother Alfred Priest was appointed to draft the plans, Harry Moore agreed to paint it, Ed Kerri was made head carpenter, Judge Miller superintendent of construction. When the plan came to their ears members of the Bentley-Schoeneman Company agreed to provide the lumber at wholesale figures, Cornwell & Kelly to furnish the hardware, Clinton Booth the nails. Others clamored to help, among them Mr. Gysin, the sign painter, who was finally authorized to paint a sign for the homestead, "Fidelity Ranch," a name the significance of which will be appreciated by Elks.

The homestead is about eight miles beyond Saugus and thirty-three miles from Glendale. The builders figure it will take two hours to go, a like amount of time to return, and two hours to put up the California house.

The men are planning to take their wives and sweethearts along with plenty of lunch, and Joe Fortunato has been asked to make provision for an abundance of hot coffee.

### TRUSTEES' MEETING

#### BROADWAY RESIDENTS REQUEST ACTION ON INDUSTRIAL DISTRICT POSTPONED

The Board assembled at 8:10 p. m. January 29, 1920. All members were present. The minutes of the regular meeting of January 22, 1920, were read and approved.

W. F. Tower appeared before the Board, calling attention to the fact that no action had been taken by the Board in regard to the matter presented by him at last week's meeting, in reference to the injury of a young man by a police officer. Mr. Tower was informed by the chairman of the Board that the matter is being given serious consideration, but that owing to certain conditions it has not yet been possible to make a full investigation.

A number of residents in the neighborhood of West Broadway, interested in the establishment of the proposed industrial district, were present, and Mrs. Peters, on behalf of some of her neighbors and herself, requested that any action in reference to the establishment of an industrial district by the Board be postponed for one week. On motion of Trustee Jackson, the request of Mrs. Peters was acceded to and the matter went over for one week.

Mr. Craig, representative of the Standard Oil Company, appeared before the Board requesting permission to remove a pepper tree located on the east side of Kenwood Street, north of Broadway, in the parkway. Mr. Craig stated that the plans for the improvement of that corner are depending upon the granting of this request.

On motion of Trustee Woodberry, action in the matter was postponed for one week.

The City Engineer presented a written report in regard to the petition referred to him at the previous regular meeting, in regard to the improvement of Dayton Court, to the effect that he finds 55 per cent of the total frontage of the street represented by the signatures of the petition. On motion of Trustee Henry, it was ordered that the grade on Dayton Court be established as a preliminary to the improvement of the same.

J. H. Grey, who has offered to sell certain land to the city for park purposes was present, and the details of the proposed contract were discussed informally by him and the members of the Board. Mr. Grey expressed himself as being particularly anxious to secure the opening of Patterson Avenue westerly along the line of the proposed park.

The difference between the Board and Mr. Grey in regard to the details of the contract were apparently eliminated, and the matter laid over until the next regular meeting, when a contract prepared by the City Attorney, to be accepted by both parties, will be acted upon.

A communication was read from the City Manager, stating that it seems advisable to appoint a Superintendent of Buildings who may devote his entire time to the inspection of buildings, plumbing and electric wiring. The communication stated further that the same person has been performing these duties in connection with the duties of Sanitary Inspector, and that at present all of this work can not be satisfactorily performed by one person. He therefore requested that the resignation of Mr. L. W. Chobe of the position of Building Inspector be accepted, and that, in accordance with Section 13 of Ordinance No. 355, Mr. E. C. Fairfield be appointed Superintendent of Buildings at a salary of one hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$125.00) per month. On motion of Trustee Shaw, the recommendations of the City Manager were approved, the resignation of Mr. L. W. Chobe as Building Inspector accepted, and Mr. E. C. Fairfield appointed Building Inspector.

Communication was read from the City Treasurer and Tax Collector, accompanied by a letter from Mrs. Edith M. Andrews, in which the latter expressed her desire to redeem certain property sold to the City of Glendale for delinquent taxes. The communication of the Tax Collector stated that the amount now due on this property is thirty-three dollars and seven cents (\$33.07) and recommended that a statement showing this amount as being necessary to redeem the property, be sent to Mrs. Andrews, and that a quit claim deed be issued by the City in her favor. On motion of Trustee Shaw, the recommendation of the Tax Collector was adopted.

#### GOVERNMENT REPORTS SHOW JOBBERS, RETAILERS, ETC., MADE MORE THAN 100 PER CENT

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—Department of Commerce reports indicate that sugar jobbers, wholesalers and retailers are dividing a total profit of over one hundred per cent on sugar retailed at 20c per pound. The reports show that during December the refiners sold sugar for export at eight and one-fourth cents per pound, while the average domestic retail price was fourteen and one-half cents.

### BUSINESS CONDITIONS

#### M. J. BRENNAN RETURNS FROM CHICAGO AND TELLS OF TRADE SITUATION

M. J. Brennan of this city, representative of the Marshall Field Corporation, returned Tuesday night from a three weeks' business trip to Chicago. Like other travelers he reports that he found the weather in the windy city very unsatisfactory as compared with the Southern California variety. There was snow, mild weather, then slush and the same conditions prevailed as far west as Salt Lake City.

Business here found rather quiet, not as good as here, and there were many cases of influenza, but of a much milder type than last year.

Manufacturing is booming but the retail trade duller than on this coast because of the tourist trade which helps us out. The difference between the streets of midwest cities and our metropolis was very noticeable. Denver and Omaha, Mr. Brennan declares, look like villages compared with the thronged thoroughfares of Los Angeles.

Prices are still going up. Mr. Brennan says, with no chance of a letdown until production catches up. Except on absolute necessities, exportations abroad have practically ceased. This is due in part to the credit situation and declining exchange, the French franc being worth now in American exchange only about eight cents, but the falling off in foreign demands is not going to hurt the manufacturers because their output can all be absorbed by America for some time to come.

Prices of clothing, he reports, are higher than they have ever been, and are going higher yet on account.

### TUJUNGA WATER QUESTION (Correspondent)

Water development for Tujunga townsite and acreage area has been the subject of a long study by Harry B. Lynch, engineer for the City of Glendale. He has just made a complete report on the proposed extensions of the system. These proposals may be varied somewhat and added to as the season develops. If it should be a year of almost absolute drought he says that the added facilities necessary under his plans can be established within a week or ten days at any time.

Mr. Lynch has been the master mind behind the development of public utilities at Glendale which has made that municipality one of the foremost in economic strength in Southern California. He says unhesitatingly that this valley has the water resources to amply care for every possible need of the future.

The recommendation for immediate extensions have been accepted by the Haines Canyon Water Company, and installation of the new works only awaits the checking over the Lynch report by the engineers of the railroad commission and the authority to proceed.

The report advises the cementing of the upper Haines Canyon reservoir. Establishment of two new large reservoirs, one at the 1700-foot level (Cedar Street); another at the 1940 level (Pine Street). The pumping plant now at Third and Summit Street will be moved to Cedar Street and entirely new works installed at present plant. The reservoirs are of dimensions to permit of irrigations as needed without the interruption of pump service. A new ten-inch pipe line is to be extended between the two new reservoirs. The new motors, pumps, pipe lines, reservoirs, pump house and installations total \$17,000. The new 1940-foot reservoir will take the load off of Haines Canyon and provide for everything in the townsite. Leo Langs corner at Monte Vista and Haines Canyon Road is only 1850 feet elevation, so it will be seen that only a few homes will necessarily be served by Haines Canyon, and in emergency of a complete drought they can get water on a temporary booster plan prepared by the engineer. When the valley is developed to the saturation point Engineer Lynch figures the total supply of water necessary to be one hundred and sixty inches; and that with proper reservoir capacity and pipe line extensions to avoid complications of irrigation runs, that the proposed extensions will care for the needs of the valley for many years.

The railroad commission has set the date of the hearing of the report for February 20th. The calendar of the commission is very crowded. The Haines Canyon Water Company applied in November for an emergency hearing, but the water situation throughout the state is so pressing that no earlier date could be secured.

"We are able to be forehanded in this matter," said Superintendent Buck of the water department. "We have had our orders for pipe and machinery confirmed several weeks ago ready for instantaneous delivery as soon as the plans of the extensions are agreed upon."

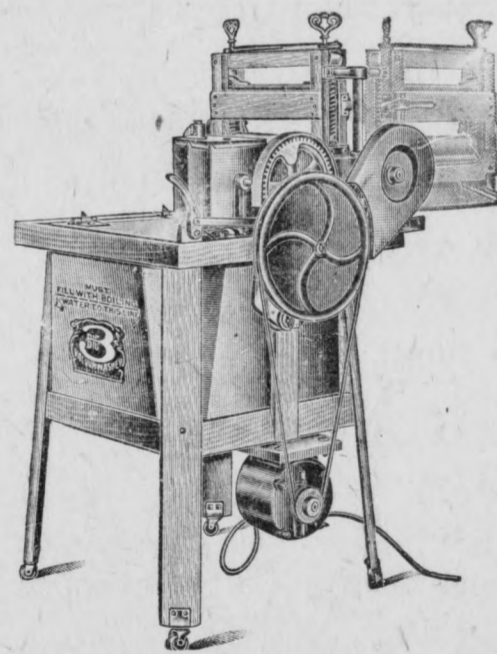
### FIGHT KAISER'S CLAIMS

of the cost of raw materials, of labor, and the poor cotton crops much of which was what is termed "blue tinted," because of continuous rains and impoverished soils. All the surplus left from last year was of this "blue" cotton which no one would take. The situation is further complicated by the fact that the tire manufacturers are trying to grab all the long staple cotton and the spinners of cotton for clothing have to go into the field and bid against the tire people and this has created artificial values. With the price of cotton advancing and labor going up, manufacturers will sell for future delivery only three months ahead where formerly they sold nine months ahead. Because of this situation the Marshall Field Company has bought raw materials in some times for 1921, paying higher prices for them than for 1920 purchases. Much of the stuff published in the public prints is misleading, he declares, saying:

"Some of the government's would-be experts have stated that we ought to be able to buy a man's suit of clothes for \$25 and that such a price is entirely possible, but they are talking through their hats. It is easy

to get publicity on such things, but there is no foundation for such statements. The labor required to produce a suit would cost that.

"There are not many strikes in the East now, and that phase seems to have blown over. Bankers are worrying over the falling exchange and every one has a different idea of how Europe will turn out, and how it will affect this country. Every one has confidence, however, in the federal reserve banks and is glad they are so well distributed. It seems providential that it is so. Under the old plan, sixty per cent of the nation's wealth was centralized in New York and New England. Today it is but forty-four per cent. The Pacific Coast has led the country in increased resources. The increase here has been 1500 per cent against 800 per cent in the South. That is quite a boost for the Federal Reserve banks.

"In spite of the reports circulating in the East about congested housing conditions here, the trains are crowded with people coming this way, and I am receiving constant inquiries from friends asking me to secure accommodations for them. California certainly looks good to me, and I was very glad to get back to it."
